DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: And it is a 12 beautiful morning. The weather is cooperating. It's not 13 14 supposed to be as hot, so it's going to be a great day. 15 Just a couple of things. We will be having lunch over at the Red Lion. Later this morning we will be introducing 16 our Unit Member of the Year. And we're all excited. 17 will be here. And I think we have some recipients of some 18 scholarships also, so we're very happy about that. 19 At this time I would like to ask all members in 20 21 the audience that are here for the first time to a convention please stand. Your first time to one of our 22 23 conventions. 24 (Applause.) 25 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: I see a lot of

- 1 great ones here. Thank you. Thank you. Thank you very,
- 2 very much. And also at this time we introduce our
- 3 district presidents, but we all go back to our roots no
- 4 matter what we do. National president elect, after her
- 5 year, we go back. We go back to where? To the unit.
- 6 That's where we start. That's where we go back.
- 7 Myself, I like the kitchen. I like cooking. I
- 8 like being in the kitchen, so they're ready to have me
- 9 back for some Monday night tacos, Monday Night Football.
- 10 But I'd like to have all unit presidents in the audience
- 11 please stand. I'd like to recognize those that are there
- 12 on a full-time basis.
- (Applause.)
- 14 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Thank you. Thank
- 15 you very much. Yesterday I had a lot of thank yous and I
- 16 introduced a lot of people. And you know how it is when
- 17 you get up here. I mean, I thought I was so prepared, and
- 18 I'll tell you, I'm a nervous wreck. You know, I love you
- 19 all and I know if I goof and I blow it, you guys are just
- 20 going to say: Okay; that's her, and we're going to go on.
- 21 But you do. You get kind of nervous. You think you're
- 22 ready, but you're just not.
- 23 And yesterday there was one very, very important
- 24 person. And when Sharon sang "Wind Beneath My Wings" --
- 25 my daughter, Tracy, please stand.

1	(Applause.)
2	DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: But she not only
3	has been a support for me, but also for her dad two years
4	ago as the past Commander of the State when he was State
5	Commander. So our family the family truly thanks you
6	because they don't have to do it.
7	
8	READING OF CONVENTION RULES
9	
10	DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: At this time we
11	will have the convention rules read by Carol Fuqua.
12	RULES CHAIRMAN FUQUA: Good morning, Madam
13	President Linda. At this time I will recite the
14	convention rules. Your convention rules can be found on
15	page 10 of the book of reports.
16	Madam President Linda, this chairman will
17	hesitate after each rule or if there is a question or an
18	amendment, it may be presented at that time.
19	Okay. Rule number 1: All meetings of the
20	convention shall be called to order at the designated
21	times or as soon thereafter as a quorum is present.
22	Number 2: A quorum shall exist when one-third of
23	the units in good standing are partially or wholly
24	represented by all elected delegates or alternates.
25	Number 3: The audience shall remain seated

- 1 during the business of the convention. The department
- 2 president shall designate certain doors to accommodate
- 3 delegates who find it necessary to enter or leave the
- 4 convention hall during the reports of committees or when a
- 5 speaker has the floor. Cell phones must be turned off or
- 6 in vibrate mode.
- 7 Number 4: The chair may deviate from the printed
- 8 program when necessary or expedient.
- 9 Number 5: The credentials chairman shall report
- 10 registration as directed by the Chair.
- 11 Number 6: The registration of delegates and
- 12 alternates shall close at 9:00 a.m. Saturday, June 23rd,
- 13 2012.
- 14 Number 7: Only qualified delegates shall have
- 15 voice and vote.
- Number 8: It shall be the responsibility of each
- 17 district president to see that only accredited delegates
- 18 and alternates serving as delegates are seated in her
- 19 district delegation during the business meetings of the
- 20 convention.
- 21 Number 9: If a delegate expects to be absent
- 22 from the convention, except for the purpose of attending a
- 23 committee meeting, she shall relinquish her delegate's
- 24 card to her alternate. The alternate shall then take her
- 25 seat in the voting section. In the event the delegate

- 1 does not have the opportunity of reporting to the district
- 2 president, it shall become the duty of the chairman of the
- 3 unit to report to the district president the absence of
- 4 the delegate and the presence of the alternate or the
- 5 absence of both the delegate and the alternate.
- 6 Number 10: A delegate wishing the privilege of
- 7 the floor shall rise, address the chair as "Madam
- 8 Department President," give her name, unit and district
- 9 numbers, pause, and wait to be recognized by the Chair.
- 10 Number 11: A member speaking in debate on a
- 11 question shall be limited to three minutes. No one shall
- 12 speak more than twice on the same question without consent
- 13 of the assembly.
- 14 Number 12: Delegates attending called committee
- 15 meetings shall be notified when the convention is
- 16 considering and voting upon adoption of any change in
- 17 policy or matters affecting finance.
- Number 13: Reports of committees which do not
- 19 appear to be controversial in nature may be adopted by
- 20 general consent. If there is no objection -- if there is
- 21 objection, a vote shall be taken. Following the
- 22 acceptance of a report of a committee, recommendations or
- 23 resolutions may be presented for consideration and
- 24 adoption.
- 25 Number 14: Any committee whose proposed changes

- 1 in policy might conflict with that of the American Legion
- 2 shall confer with the American Legion before presenting
- 3 said change to the convention.
- 4 Number 15: A committee recommending an
- 5 appropriation of funds for any purpose shall consult with
- 6 the department finance committee before presenting the
- 7 recommendation or resolution to the convention.
- Number 16: All resolutions to be presented to
- 9 the convention shall be in triplicate and properly signed.
- 10 Number 17: Committees may amend resolutions and
- 11 recommendations referred to them before favorably
- 12 reporting same. Resolutions or recommendations rejected
- 13 by a committee shall be marked "rejected," signed by the
- 14 chairman of the committee, and returned to the department
- 15 resolutions chairman immediately following the committee
- 16 meeting.
- 17 Number 18: A unit, district, or members
- 18 presenting a resolution or recommendation shall have the
- 19 privilege of explaining same to the committee to which it
- 20 was referred.
- 21 Nineteen: Committees shall report to the
- 22 convention all resolutions properly submitted and accepted
- 23 by a majority convention committee.
- 24 Number 20: A resolution rejected by a committee
- 25 may be brought before the convention by a two-thirds vote.

Number 21: Emergency resolutions which may arise 1 2 during the convention or after the date for submitting resolution may be presented no later than noon of the 3 4 second day of convention. Number 22: Nominations of officers, junior 5 member finance, department delegates, and alternates to 6 7 the national convention shall be held Friday afternoon, June 22nd, 2012. 8 9 Number 23: The endorsement of candidates for national office shall follow the nominations. 10 Number 24: Nomination speeches shall be limited 11 to three minutes. There shall be no seconding of 12 13 speeches. Number 25: Election of department officers, 14 junior member of finance, national candidate, department 15 delegates, and alternates to the national convention shall 16 be held on Saturday morning, June 23rd, 2012. 17 Number 26: The doors of the convention hall 18 shall be closed during the entire election procedure and 19 no one shall leave or enter the hall until the chair 20 21 states that the election is concluded. The exception to 22 this shall be that in an emergency a member may leave, and 23 if her absence affects the voting strength, the district president shall immediately notify the presiding officer. 24 25 Number 27: When there is but one nominee for

- 1 department offices and but one nominee for junior member
- 2 of finance, the nominees shall be elected viva voce. Upon
- 3 roll call, the district presidents shall report the number
- 4 of units partially or wholly represented by duly elected
- 5 delegates or alternates present in the delegation at the
- 6 time of roll call. This is to determine that there is a
- 7 quorum of units present at the time of the election.
- 8 Number 28: When there is more than one nominee
- 9 for the department offices or junior member of the finance
- 10 or national office, election shall be by written ballot.
- 11 The district president shall, when they are instructed by
- 12 the Chair, take a roll call of their respective
- delegations to ascertain the total voting strength of
- 14 their district for the election reporting the same to the
- 15 Chair. When there is but one nominee for office or junior
- 16 member of the finance, the ballot may be dispensed with a
- 17 nominee elected viva voce.
- Number 29: When there are three or more nominees
- 19 for an office or a junior member of the finance, unless
- 20 one nominee receives a majority vote on the first ballot,
- 21 the nominee receiving the lowest number of votes shall be
- 22 automatically dropped before proceeding with the next
- 23 ballot.
- 24 Madam Department President Linda, this concludes
- 25 the reading of the convention rules. I move that the

convention rules be considered seriatim and be adopted as 1 2 a whole. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: There's two more. 3 4 AUDIENCE MEMBER: There's five more. 5 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: There's a couple 6 more. 7 RULES CHAIRMAN FUQUA: Well, that page was 8 missing. 9 When there are three or more nominees for an office or junior member of the finance, unless one nominee 10 receives a majority vote on the first ballot, the nominee 11 receiving the lowest number of votes shall be 12 13 automatically dropped before proceeding with the next ballot. 14 Number 30: Each district president and district 15 member of the elections committee shall distribute and 16 17 collect the votes cast by the district delegation and deliver them to the department chairman of the elections. 18 19 Thirty-one: Department officers, chairmen, 20 committee members, and past department presidents shall 21 vote with their respective districts. 22 Number 32: Each delegate shall be entitled to one vote. The vote of an absent unit delegate, not 23 represented by an alternate, shall be cast by the majority 24 25 of the delegates from the unit. When two delegates

represent three votes, the chairman of the unit delegation 1 2 shall cast the third vote. Number 33: A majority of all votes cast shall 3 4 elect, except that in the election of the national delegates and alternates a plurality shall elect. 5 6 Number 34: These convention rules may be amended during the convention by a two-thirds vote. 7 8 Number 35: Robert's Rules of Order, Newly 9 Revised, shall be the parliamentary authority on all 10 points not covered by these rules, the department constitution and bylaws, and the convention mandates. 11 At this time, Madam President, this concludes the 12 reading of the convention rules. I move that the 13 convention rules be considered seriatim and be adopted as 14 a whole. 15 16 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Do I have a second? 17 AUDIENCE MEMBER: Second. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Move and seconded 18 to accept the department's reading of the convention's 19 rules as a whole. All those in -- discussion? 20 21 AUDIENCE MEMBER: I didn't hear it very well. 22 Can you read it again? 2.3 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Thank you, Linda. How many are in favor of reading them again? 24 25 AUDIENCE MEMBERS: No.

PARLIAMENTARIAN DELASHMIT: Madam President, 1 2 Diane DeLashmit, Department Parliamentarian. Rule number 25 was read as Saturday morning, June 22nd, 2012. It 3 should be June 23rd. 4 AUDIENCE MEMBER: She read the 23rd. 5 6 PARLIAMENTARIAN DELASHMIT: Oh, okay. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Thank you very 7 8 much. Yeah, I think the copy that we do have does have the 23rd. All in favor? 9 10 ALL PRESENT: Aye. 11 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Opposed? Linda? 12 (No response.) 13 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Thank you very, 14 very much. 15 Thank you, Carol. 16 RULES CHAIRMAN FUQUA: Madam Department 17 President, rule number 3 provides it is your responsibility to designate certain doors to accommodate 18 19 the delegates to enter or leave the convention. 20 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Far right. Your 21 left. DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MIKESELL: That one 22 23 back there where Linda Workman is. 24 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Linda, wave your 25 hand. Where she's at, that will be the door. Not really

where she's at, but where the exit sign is. So we'll 1 2 designate that. RULES CHAIRMAN FUQUA: Okay. Madam President, I 3 4 suggest that we request delegates entering the hall to stand quietly until the speaker has finished before 5 6 returning to their seats. 7 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Thank you. RULES CHAIRMAN FUQUA: And thank you, Madam 8 Department President Linda, for this appointment and the 9 10 opportunity to serve the Department of California. 11 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Thank you very much, Carol. 12 13 (Applause.) 14 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Okay. So we do need to close this door. 15 16 NATIONAL EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT 17 18 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: At this time I 19 would like to start with our officers' reports. And we're 20 21 going to hear first from Madam Pilar Reyes. She will be reporting as the National Executive Committee Woman. 22 2.3 NEC WOMAN REYES: Slippery. Well, we have to have some excitement sometimes, you know. There's 24 25 something slippery here.

Okay. Now let's go to the -- Madam Department 1 2 President and all, good morning. AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Good morning. 3 NEC WOMAN REYES: It is indeed an honor to serve 4 as California National Executive -- they're wiping me off. 5 6 I didn't -- I'm not wet up here. Thank you. It is indeed an honor to serve as California 7 National Executive for 2011-2012. 8 9 At the NEC post convention meeting held in 10 Minnesota on September 1st, 2011, NEC adopted separate motions that approved this calendar year 2012 annual 11 national budget and national appointments. On November 12 13 30, 2011 at its virtual meeting, the National Executive Committee approved establishing an ALA Affinity credit 14 15 card program through USAA which is already at the height 16 of its promotion for support. In February 2012 I was privileged to attend the 17 Washington D.C. conference, this time both as NEC and 18 Department Legislative Chairman. Although it was my third 19 time to attend the event, it had always offered a valuable 20 21 educational and learning experience ever to be remembered 22 by everyone in attendance. 23 I would like to thank Madam President Linda for filling in for me in the Saturday orientation session 24 25 because I missed my early flight due to a chain of

unfortunate events and did not get in on time for the 1 2 first meeting. The following day I was able to attend the 3 4 skill-building workshop designed for skills and leadership development and advocating for our veterans and their 5 6 families. These include first improving organizational effectiveness through role clarification. Is it by 7 8 governance or management? 9 And by the way, I will present this issue at the 10 new business, so it is an important matter. Whether heads of units, departments, or the national organization, 11 Auxiliary volunteer leaders at all levels are facing 12 13 challenges in critical areas such as member recruitment and retention and organization governance. The session 14 15 discussed strategies how to manage these challenges. 16 The second one is listening to each other. This is creating a positive member experience for all the 17 generations. The American Legion Auxiliary has a 18 multi-generational membership. This session offered 19 20 participants an opportunity to listen to three members in 21 their role-playing of various generations, traditional, 22 baby boomers, and contemporary generations who shared 2.3 their experiences in the Auxiliary and what motivates them to serve. 24 25 Bottom line is every generation has the same

- 1 motivation, to serve our veterans and their families as a
- 2 way of thanking them for their service to our country.
- 3 The third one is advocacy fundamentals.
- 4 Effective advocacy on behalf of our veterans and their
- 5 families is one of the Legion Family's key strategies and
- 6 strengths. The session introduced the fundamentals of
- 7 engagement with public policymakers to ALA members who are
- 8 new to advocacy. Attendees learned the difference between
- 9 lobbying and advocacy, how they are approached, and
- 10 importance of each for our mission for our veterans and
- 11 their families.
- There were many more presentations by speakers on
- 13 national security and veterans affairs matters and I had
- 14 mentioned some of them in my legislative bulletin number 4
- 15 and legislative report. This will be coming.
- 16 For your information, a reminder from NEC on the
- 17 charter cancellations. I am sure some of you already know
- 18 this, that the deadline for submitting unit charters for
- 19 cancellation should be received no later than July 20,
- 20 2012. Before a unit charter can be considered for
- 21 cancellation by the National Executive Committee, a letter
- 22 from the department officer should be received verifying
- 23 that the DEC has taken the appropriate action. Any
- 24 requests for cancellation of unit charters received after
- 25 the July 29th deadline will be held until the next meeting

1	of the NEC. And there will be no exceptions.
2	Thank you, Madam President. This concludes my
3	report.
4	(Applause.)
5	DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Thank you.
6	
7	DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT'S REPORT
8	
9	DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: At this time I'd
10	like to ask our lieutenant governor to please take the
11	station while I present my report. I got my marching
12	orders from the Pages, so I'm trying to get in the right
13	direction here. I don't want to I don't want to
14	upstage our NEC woman and have to dance with her later,
15	so
16	To all the good citizens of Fort Friendly and the
17	Territory of California. I am here today to let you know
18	what an honor it has been this past year for me to be your
19	territorial governor. Your support and continued
20	dedication to our mission has been unwavering, but I am
21	here to say that I will not be seeking reelection. I
22	think that's what all good politicians are supposed to say
23	when they have come to the end of a good run and a very
24	qualified candidate will be their successor.
25	All kidding aside, this has been an amazing year.

- 1 I have traveled over 33,000 miles and have put a dozen
- 2 horses out to pasture at the ranch who have carried me

- 6 many Legion or Auxiliary events that I attended
- 7 representing each of you. Everywhere I went I was
- 8 constantly amazed by your creativity in using the western
- 9 theme in your decorations, gifts, programs, or reports.
- 10 I have issued two State of the Territory reports
- 11 that I hope that you all have had an opportunity to read.
- 12 In them I have talked about the many places I have been,
- 13 so I'm not going to repeat all of them.
- 14 Some of the highlights of this year have been
- 15 installation in Ontario where your Fort Friendly saloon
- 16 owner, department gopher-in-training and my best friend
- 17 Past Department Commander Dennis and I two-stepped down
- 18 the aisle.
- 19 Wasn't that western mural amazing? My unit, my
- 20 post, my Legion family there put that together, and I hope
- 21 you all enjoyed it. It's now on eBay if anybody wants to
- 22 buy it. They have refused to put it up again.
- Then I started riding all over the territory
- 24 bringing Wild West shows to your areas. Fourth of July,
- 25 my birthday, was a real town celebration from riding in

- 1 the 4th of July parade in Pacific Palisades on one of
- 2 those newfangled motor machines to the surprise party at
- 3 Camarillo Post 741.
- We had a long, rough stagecoach ride all the way
- 5 to Minnesota for the National Convention where I was
- 6 installed with National President Kris Nelson.
- 7 Back in the territory took a few buckboard rides
- 8 visiting districts. I needed the buckboards to bring home
- 9 all the loot received from all of you. Thank you for all
- 10 the donations to my special project Ride 2 Recovery. The
- 11 department received over \$13,000 in cash donations, but
- 12 over \$32,000 was recorded in kind donations.
- 13 As they rode through our state, you served them
- 14 food, you housed them, you took care of those Riders.
- 15 Those Wounded Warriors will never, ever forget their ride
- 16 down the coast of California. Thank you very much. Your
- 17 generosity was very humbling.
- 18 National President Kris came to the territory in
- 19 October and had an amazing time at the Junior Jamboree.
- 20 She is still talking about that. She visited the West LA
- 21 Veterans Hospital, the USO at LAX, joined the Ride 2
- 22 Recovery in San Francisco, had dinner in Webster, and was
- 23 presented -- and was present at Palo Alto VA when Past
- 24 Department President Pilar presented her generous
- 25 donation. Then we had dinner in Santa Clara.

The holidays came and went in a blur as we were 1 2 on the trail again visiting as many towns as we could while we headed for the department rodeo in Oxnard in 3 4 January. The rodeo was a huge success and the saloon owner had all his saloon girls dressed in their finest 5 6 ready to entertain the rodeo quests. But one stole the show. Past Department 7 8 President Odette truly impressed everyone at the saloon, especially the saloon owner who asked her to dance. She 9 10 said, "I haven't danced in years." He says, "That's okay." I want to thank all of you residents in the territory California for making this best darn year anyone 11 could ever have. 12 Thank you. Years of service, God bless America, 13 14 God bless our organization, God bless our soldiers. you, thank you, thank you. 15 16 (Applause.) 17 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Thank you. 18 19 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT'S REPORT 20 21 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: At this time I'm going to have our Lieutenant Governor, Terry Mikesell, 22 23 please read her report. DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Good 24 25 morning, ladies.

1 AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Good morning. 2 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MIKESELL: It has been a tremendous honor serving as your vice president this 3 4 past year. Installing the new honorary junior officers at Junior Conference is an experience that I will never 5 6 forget. There are some very capable young ladies everyone will be working with next year. I will be going over to bring 17 greetings to the Legion from all of you and see why they 18 weren't here yesterday. I know why. We're going to give 19 you an excuse. They were in jail. 20 21 VETERANS AFFAIR & REHABILITATION CHAIRMAN BIGGS: 22 Do you want to borrow my gun? 2.3 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: I probably need to

13	CHAPLAIN CARTER: The convention meeting of
14	chaplains met on Thursday, June 21st, 2012 in the Buckskin
15	Room of the Holiday Inn Hotel in Redding at 10:15 a.m.
16	With the consent of a committee I appointed C.J. Reyes,
17	District 19, as secretary, Deloris Artis, District 24, as
18	chaplain, Jennifer Bieger, District 21, as
19	Sergeant-at-Arms.
20	The chaplain offered prayer and the
21	Sergeant-at-Arms led the pledge of allegiance. Secretary
22	C.J. Reyes called the roll of district delegates. There
23	were 22 delegates answering roll call and four guests
24	present.
25	The statistical report of this chaplain appears

- 1 on page 13 of the Book of Reports. The Department
- 2 Chaplain's code was read with no code changes. There were
- 3 no resolutions.
- 4 Certificates were given to 27 districts for 100
- 5 percent reporting. Awards for some first place and second
- 6 and third place winners were given in committee. A copy
- 7 was placed in the secretary's office.
- 8 With no further business, the preconvention
- 9 meeting of chaplains and delegates adjourned at 10:45 a.m.
- 10 with prayer.
- 11 Madam President, this concludes my committee
- 12 report. May I continue on to the first place awards?
- 13 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MIKESELL: You may.
- 14 CHAPLAIN CARTER: Our department chaplains, aka
- 15 preachers, have done an outstanding job as spiritual
- 16 leaders of this great state. It has been the
- 17 responsibility of each chaplain to be strong and ask their
- 18 personal saviour for strength and guidance.
- Many have spent a total of over 4600 hours
- 20 visiting and praying for and with active military and
- 21 their families. Our continuous support of the veterans is
- 22 always a priority on every chaplain's agenda.
- 23 We have assisted many activities of our American
- 24 Legion Family by visiting the sick, the shut-in, coming to
- 25 homes, veterans' homes, and all the members. As the

- 1 spiritual leaders of this great state, we have sent out
- 2 over 8,000 get well cards, sympathy cards, and some
- 3 birthday cards to our veterans and our American Legion
- 4 Family.
- 5 Many chaplains were asked to be at ceremonies, to
- 6 opening and closing prayers of meetings in units and
- 7 districts, as well as give invocations at their local
- 8 churches and memorial services.
- 9 It is with sadness that we have lost a total of
- 10 330 voting members, to include our Past Department and
- 11 Past National President Josie Melgard and our Past Finance
- 12 Chairman, Lucille Taylor, of District 23. Services were
- 13 held for Josie Melgard with our department and national
- 14 leaders and members in attendance. A memorial service for
- 15 the past finance chairman, Lucille Taylor, was given at
- 16 the home post of Jackie Robinson, which is my home post,
- 17 Unit 252 with some of our past department presidents and
- 18 national representatives. They both are truly, truly
- 19 missed. Many charters were draped in honorary colors as
- 20 well as memorial services were held.
- 21 Spiritual leaders visited VA hospitals to share
- 22 joy and love while participating in holiday festivities.
- 23 Their participation made a difference in Armed Forces Day,
- 24 Field of Honor and Random Acts of Kindness Day. And
- 25 Operation Backpack where supplies, cards, and letters of

- 1 encouragement were placed on the barracks of the trinity
- 2 of Camp Pendleton.
- 3 Many came to the Santa Monica Pier wearing red,
- 4 white, and blue to our Wounded Veterans at the Road 2
- 5 Recovery. Over 100 units with four chaplains participated
- 6 in the unit meeting as some came to remember the brave
- 7 chaplains. Some units donated in loving tribute and many
- 8 of a loved one.
- 9 Veterans Day and Memorial Day some chaplains
- 10 visited the cemeteries of unknown soldiers and placed
- 11 flowers and poppies, wreaths. Many participated in Armed
- 12 Forces parades and of course the 4th of July ceremonies.
- 13 Over \$3,000 were donated to various memorial
- 14 contributions.
- 15 We will always remember the reason God gave
- 16 chaplains the ability to pray and love everyone regardless
- 17 of their religious faith. God is good all of the time.
- 18 This is not a myth, but a true statement.
- 19 At this time I will present the first place
- 20 winners. For unit supplemental, Los Alamitos, Unit 716,
- 21 District 29 Carrie Taylor, Chaplain.
- 22 (Applause.)
- 23 CHAPLAIN CARTER: First place district
- 24 supplemental award to District 29, Kendall Madsen,
- 25 Chaplain.

1 (Applause.) 2 CHAPLAIN CARTER: Most prayers sent to this department chairman, but some were sent to National, goes 3 to William Bill Proud Unit 211, District 16. Lucy Rocha 4 5 sent to this chaplain 600 prayers. 6 (Applause.) CHAPLAIN CARTER: This is what we call a 7 chaplain. She's not just a chaplain. She's a preacher. 8 9 All of those prayers. She made two prayer books, one for 10 her unit and one for her post commander. Wonderful. 11 Thank you so much. 12 (Applause.) 13 CHAPLAIN CARTER: We have the first place prayer book. It goes to Unit 282, District 22. District 22. 14 15 (Applause.) 16 CHAPLAIN CARTER: District prayer book goes to District 21. Thank you. 17 18 (Applause.) CHAPLAIN CARTER: The judges for the prayer book, 19 I would like to thank Ruth Hackney and Deloris Artis. 20 21 Thank you so much. Madam President, it has been a pleasure serving 22 23 as the chaplain for our department. I thank you for this 24 opportunity. I think I'm not a preacher, but I try. 25 Again, thanks for entrusting me with this assignment.

1	Hats off to you, Madam President, for all that you have
2	done for the American Legion Auxiliary volunteers. She's

4	DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MIKESELL: You want to

13	be seated up here?

15	HISTORIAN'S REPORT
16	
17	DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MIKESELL: We're going
18	to hear from Historian Cherie Galvan next.
19	HISTORIAN GALVAN: The Historian Committee met at
20	the Red Lion on June 21, 2012. Fourteen delegates
21	answered roll call. There were four guests present. The
22	statistical report can be found on page 15 of the Book of
23	Reports.
24	The code was read and there were questions from
25	the delegates on Code 4, that they felt it was unclear.

The first question was does "history book" refer to 1 2 written only or written and picture. And the second question was do districts and units compete separately for 3 4 awards or against each other for awards because it's been 5 done both ways. 6 May I read the code? 7 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Yes. HISTORIAN GALVAN: Okay. As currently the code 8 reads: History book competition: Unit and districts may 9 10 compete on department level under the following classifications: Seniors. Juniors class I, up to age 12. 11 Juniors class II, 13 to 17. Prizes: Unit and district 12 shall be awarded first, second, and third. Junior class 13 I: first and second. Junior class II: first and second. 14 15 Proposed changes are inserting the words "picture and written history book competition" at the beginning of 16 code and inserting the word "each" to the prize section 17 so that it will be clear and no longer open to 18 19 interpretation. May I read the code in its entirety with those 20 21 proposed changes? 22 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Did you guys 23 vote on this in committee? HISTORIAN GALVAN: Yeah. 24 25 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Did you give

Linda a copy of your code change? 1 2 HISTORIAN GALVAN: No. I just verbally told her this is what the committee wanted to do. I did not do 3 4 that. 5 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Okay. Well, we're going to have to have the Circuit Court Judge be 6 7 involved in this here because -- but go ahead and read the 8 code in its entirety, please. 9 It's in your report. Did you not get this? 10 HISTORIAN GALVAN: Proceed or wait? DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MIKESELL: We believe 11 12 she's ready. 13 HISTORIAN GALVAN: Proposed change. Code 4 would 14 be: Written and picture history book competition. Units 15 and districts may compete on department level under the following classifications: Senior. Juniors Class I, up 16 to age 12. Juniors Class II, 13 to 17. Prizes: Unit and 17 district shall each be awarded first, second, and third. 18 Junior Class I: first and second. Junior Class II: 19 first and second. 20 21 By direction of the committee I move for the 22 acceptance of this change. 2.3 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MIKESELL: It's been moved and seconded. Is there any discussion? 24 25 (No response.)

1 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Hearing 2 none, all those in favor say aye. ALL PRESENT: Aye. 3 4 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MIKESELL: That portion 5 is passed. 6 HISTORIAN GALVAN: Passed. Continuing on, 7 discussion on what happens in years where there is no Department Cavalcade of Memories Chairman. It was 8 9 suggested that Historian felt Cavalcade duties in those 10 years or perhaps doing away with the program altogether. And then after that certificates were given for second and 11 third place supplementals and then all unit and district 12 awards for district both written and picture history 13 books. 14 That concludes my report. May I continue with my 15 16 supplemental? 17 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Yes, you 18 may. HISTORIAN GALVAN: Sorry. Thank you for this 19 appointment. I'm going to cry. Even though this was much 20 21 more work than I expected, I have felt -- I'm 22 embarrassed -- it's been a valuable learning experience. To the district historians, thank you. I think 23 Madam President will be very happy with what we have. 24 25 Those who sent me nothing, please, it's not too late.

Okay? Pick up your history books at the end of session 1 2 tomorrow. That concludes my little report. May I continue 3 4 with first place awards, please? 5 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Yes, you 6 may. HISTORIAN GALVAN: Say yes. Unit supplemental 7 report goes to Jean Cooley-Demeules, Unit 314. 8 9 (Applause.) 10 HISTORIAN GALVAN: Okay. District supplemental goes to District 29, Sharon Starr. 11 (Applause.) 12 HISTORIAN GALVAN: That's okay. We'll get 13 pictures afterwards. Okay. For overall written history 14 15 we judged the districts and the units and then did the voting by the numbers. That is Unit 291, Wendy Meyer, 16 also District 29. 17 18 (Applause.) 19 HISTORIAN GALVAN: And overall picture history book goes to District 19, Jean Cooley-Demeules. 20 21 (Applause.) 22 HISTORIAN GALVAN: That concludes my report. 2.3 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Thank you, 24 Cherie. Excellent job. 25 HISTORIAN GALVAN: You're welcome.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Ladies, at 1 2 this time we have the Sons of The American Legion. Will 3 the Sons --(Processional.) DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Well, I 5 6 recognize Gil so I guess Gil is going to be the gentleman 7 to speak. 8 VICE COMMANDER AREA 4 DEMEULES: Good morning, 9 ladies. 10 AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Good morning. VICE COMMANDER AREA 4 DEMEULES: This is very 11 impressive what you've got. I was back there watching you 12 guys. This is kind of cool. Just hearing my wife there 13 14 too, congratulations. 15 (Applause.) VICE COMMANDER AREA 4 DEMEULES: I'm here for the 16 17 songs. You know, we're having a Need 2 Speed night -- can you hear me? - 13 (Applause.)
- 14 PARLIAMENTARIAN DELASHMIT: But we can do this in
- 15 a very nice way. Other problems concern relationships
- 16 with our own members. We don't necessarily have to like
- 17 each other, but we need to work together. We need to
- 18 remember what our organization is about and who we are
- 19 serving.
- We are volunteers. We are not getting paid to do
- 21 the things we do. We need to show respect to each other
- 22 even when it's infuriating. Take stock of ourselves. Do
- 23 you want to be talked to in the way you perhaps dish it
- 24 out? A lot of problems can be solved if we follow the
- 25 Golden Rule: Do unto others as you would have them do

1	unto you.
2	We also need to take time to know our
3	organization. When we follow the rules you will have a
4	lot less conflict. Answers to many of your concerns and
5	questions, et cetera, can be found in the constitution and
6	bylaws and standing rules and the unit handbook. In order
7	to be a positive influence in your unit or district, you
8	owe it to yourself to become more informed.
9	Remember that a full house divided don't win no
10	pots. Governor, I'm happy that I was able to serve you
11	and the department in this capacity.
12	And before I leave, I have \$20 bail money because
13	one of the Pages tried to rob me. I told her I didn't
14	think she was using good judgment since I was the judge.
15	So I told her she's going to jail and she gave me some
16	hush money. So I have \$20 to donate to our department
17	our governor's special project.
18	(Applause.)
19	PARLIAMENTARIAN DELASHMIT: That person is Zana
20	Chaney, if you can believe it.
21	DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Thank you,
22	Diane.

The next report will be from Girls State. 14 15 GIRLS STATE DIRECTOR SCHNEIDER: Madam Department President and delegates to this convention, I would like 16 17 to take this opportunity to give a big thank you to all unit members in the audience and throughout the state who 18 have worked to raise funds for the Girls State program. I 19 would also like to give a special thank you to Lou and her 20 21 committee who have worked countless hours to ensure that this year's session of Girls State will be a 22 23 once-in-a-lifetime experience for those delegates who 24 choose to immerse themselves in the opportunity before 25 them.

1 On Monday the 2012 session of Girls State will 2 begin as 504 delegates from around the state converge on the Claremont McKenna campus and begin to work together 3 for a week to build a society where camaraderie and 4 5 compromise are actually a part of politics. During my tenure as director, I have worked to 6 create an environment where our Girls State committee 7 works hand in hand with our exceptional volunteer 8 9 counseling staff. - 5 compromise in our units, districts and this department.
- 6 Let's realize that all members have value in this
- 7 organization and recognize each other's strengths so that
- 8 we can use those strengths to advance the many programs of
- 9 the American Legion Auxiliary.
- 10 Thank you and that concludes my remarks.
- 11 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Thank you,
- 12 Sherry.

- 14 committee of Girls State met June 21st, 2012 at 11:00 a.m.
- in the Buckskin Room of the Holiday Inn Convention Center.
- 16 The statistical report of this chairman appears on page 15
- 17 on the Book of Reports.
- Tricia Smith was appointed secretary, Gloria
- 19 Sinopoli offered prayer, and Sherry Schneider was
- 20 appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 27 district
- 21 delegates answered roll call. There were 15 visitors
- 22 present.

- 25 Girls State Code be tabled and be referred to the

- 24 the Girls State Committee meeting. The Girls State
- 25 enrollment and registration fees shall be recommended

- 1 annually by the Girls State Committee after the review of
- 2 the previous year's budget, expenses and the current bids
- 3 received from colleges for the following administrative
- 4 year. The enrollment and registration fees and location

- 6 I'm sorry. Recommended at the Midyear DEC meeting for

- 9 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Okay. It's

- 11 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN THOMPSON: By direction of
- 12 the committee, I so move.
- 13 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Thank you,
- 14 Lou. I got a little ahead of myself there. Okay. It's
- 15 been moved by the Girls State Committee to change Code 8
- 16 to read: The Department President, in consultation with
- 17 the Girls State Chairman, shall call a meeting of the
- 18 Girls State Committee to be held as soon as possible, but
- 19 no later than October 1st. The secretary/treasurer shall
- 20 attend the Girls State Committee meeting. The Girls State
- 21 enrollment and registration fees shall be recommended

of Girls State shall be recommended at the Midyear DEC 1 2 meeting for approval at the convention. Is there any 3 discussion? VETERANS AFFAIR & REHABILITATION CHAIRMAN BIGGS: 5 I have a question. 6 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Anita. 7 VETERANS AFFAIR & REHABILITATION CHAIRMAN BIGGS: 8 Did you state shall be ratified? 9 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MIKESELL: No. That 10 word was deleted. VETERANS AFFAIR & REHABILITATION CHAIRMAN BIGGS: 11 12 Okay. Thank you. DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MIKESELL: That word 13 was deleted. Is there any further discussion? 14 15 (No response.) DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MIKESELL: All those in 16 17 favor, signal by saying aye. 18 ALL PRESENT: Aye. DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Any opposed? 19 20 (No response.) 21 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Thank you, ladies. 22 23 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN THOMPSON: Code 27 was also offered to increase the registration fee from \$50 to \$75. 24 25 That was defeated.

1 Resolutions. There were no resolutions 2 pertaining to the Girls State. The following recommendation will be placed in the procedure book for 3 next year's Girls State Chairman. The Girls State 4 Director Sherry Schneider, District 26, is suggesting that 5 6 the applications arriving after April 30th will require an additional handling fee of \$50. 7 Presentations. There's a listing of all of the 8 citations with the exception of the most outstanding 9 10 district and unit Girls State chairman. And the citations were given to 22 districts and 33 unit chairmen. A copy 11 of the listing is posted in the department convention 12 office. 13 Madam President, may I continue my report? 14 15 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MIKESELL: You may. 16 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN THOMPSON: Thank you. Michele Jackman, California Girls State Senator in 1961 17 and a long-time member of the counseling staff says, 18 "Girls State makes you extra, extra out of the ordinary. 19 It is a kind of mini-lottery. We girls win and then we 20 21 find out how it makes us winners in life forever if we choose to make it happen. Don't hide after this magical 22 23 experience." California Girls State, like the Girls State 24 25 across the nation, sparkles in the sunshine, taking a

- 1 small piece of our future and embellishing it with gems of
- 2 civic pride, charms of public awareness, and a glittering
- 3 cooperative spirit.
- 4 505 high school young women and a staff of 62
- 5 will come to Claremont McKenna College June 25th, 2012 to
- 6 experience what others have for the last 68 summers. The
- 7 69th session of California Girls promises to successfully
- 8 enhance the possibilities for the delegates. There may
- 9 even be miracles happening as they embark on this
- 10 life-altering, once-in-a-lifetime event.
- 11 There are dynamic speakers who will surely
- 12 enlighten, engage, and energize the entire Girls State
- 13 community. As requested by the national organization,
- 14 Girls State citizens will participate in an activity which
- 15 will generate 505 friendship bracelets with handwritten
- 16 letters attached to be given to Operation Military Kids
- 17 participants.
- 18 Sixty-four units and districts donated an
- 19 additional \$4,185 towards the Girls State 2012 session.
- 20 This year the Girls State Committee launched a new
- 21 fundraising activity intended to be supported by parents,
- 22 schools, and the communities of our delegates. The
- 23 handbook advertising generated \$600 which will be used to
- 24 offset the cost of producing the handbook. Thank you to
- 25 Units 3, 277, 472, 496, 552, 595, and 741 for submitting

ads. 1 2 (Applause.) GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN THOMPSON: The program 3 4 offered a loss of 30 schools sponsored last year, but not this year. However, there is an increase of 63 new 5 6 schools with a net gain of 33 schools. 186 units from 28 districts sponsored delegates to this year's session. 7 8 The program was significantly enhanced with a 9 donation of \$22,500 from the American Auxiliary Legion San 10 Gabriel Post 442 upon the surrender of its unit. This surprise came at a perfect time and will be held as a 11 reserve for future Girls State sessions. 12 At this time I would like to present four special 13 awards. Would someone from Unit -- this Girls State 14 citizen was a delegate in 2011. City of Lassen, County of 15 Bidwell. For her senior project she joined the unit's 16 17 homeless veterans backpack activity earning enough money through her bake sale to purchase and fill six packs with 18 the remaining \$200 being donated to the department's VA&R 19 program. Please join me in acknowledging Madison Forney 20 21 for being the most outstanding Girls State citizen of 2012. 22 23 (Applause.) GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN THOMPSON: The California 24 25 Girls State Alumnae Foundation represented by Nancy

Brown-Park is here. I want to recognize their New Unit 1 2 Matching Grant Program which supported 11 new schools this year with a total donation of \$2200. Please join me in 3 4 thanking the California Girls State Alumnae Foundation for its most outstanding contribution to the Girls State 5 session 2012. 6 7 (Applause.) GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN THOMPSON: This district is 8 sending 43 delegates to the Girls State 2012. 9 10 sponsoring seven new schools. This district enhanced the core Girls State program by providing the delegates and 11 their parents and the school staff with an orientation 12 13 program that included showing the Girls State and Boys State DVD, the POW/MIA table set up and explanation, an 14 15 explanation of the American Legion Auxiliary Poppy and its 16 symbolism, and a guest speaker who is not only a counselor at one of the sponsored schools, but also a former Girls 17 State citizen from 2002. 18 This district chairman jumped in for some of the 19 units in her district when they were unable to manage the 20 21 interviews. She helped promote the American Girls State 22 California Fund Alumnae Foundation New Grant Program with 23 three of the seven new schools received grants. 24 Please join me in acknowledging the most 25 outstanding Girls State Chairman from District 29,

President Carol Borgman. 1 2 (Applause.) GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN THOMPSON: This unit Girls 3 4 State Chairman organized the sponsorship of four high The high school counselors were invited to 5 schools. 6 attend the interviews and the district orientation. Monthly e-mails were sent to the delegates, alternates, 7 and their parents and the school staff. The Need-a-Lift? 8 9 publication was suggested to all participants, with one 10 high school counselor expressing thanks for introducing her to something she knew nothing about. 11 The unit gives gift bags filled with goodies and 12 13 more Legion Family information to their delegates attending the district orientation. The unit shared the 14 15 information about the new handbook advertising campaign with about 50 local organizations and businesses. 16 17 join me in acknowledging the most outstanding unit Girls State chairman for 2012 from Unit 277, Stacey Smith. 18 19 (Applause.) 20 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN THOMPSON: We are prepared 21 for a most exciting week of learning and leadership. Ιt is such a privilege to work at Girls State, a truly 22 23 inspiring and unique experience that just can't be described adequately in words. Our sunny location in 24 25 Southern California is just perfect. The weather is

ideal, the jacarandas are in bloom splashing the 1 2 tree-lined streets with a deep purple, and we're meeting for the first time with lifelong friends. It's sparkling. 3 I would like to introduce the Girls State 4 5 Committee. If they could stand in place, please. For 6 2011-2012, Director, Sherry Schneider; assistant director, 7 Trish Smith; Two-year committee member, Bobbi Estes; one-year committee member, Rhodona Enright; nurse, Kat 8 Conrad; advisor, Vicki Crow; president's alternate, Jeri 9 10 Adams; vice president's alternate, Gloria Sinopoli. Madam President, this concludes the 69th Girls 11 State chairman's report. 12 13 (Applause.) 14 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Thank you, Lou. I see our governor in the back of the room. 15 16 (Processional.) DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Well, I went over 17 to the Legion and I took one of our alien guns, told them 18 19 that we had cowboys and aliens over there. And I held him up. Thank you very much. 12 13 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN THOMPSON: Thank you. 14 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: That was exciting. That was exciting for Stacey. 15 16 AUXILIARY EMERGENCY FUND CHAIRMAN'S REPORT 17 18 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: So at this time 19 we'll have a report from AEF Kat Conrad. As I said, 20 21 ladies, if you're going to be reporting, be prepared 22 because we will be moving things around some. We do have 2.3 some requests for a little shifting because of Girls State. It's a long ride, long trail ride, dusty ride down 24 25 to Southern California for where they are going, so we're

- 1 going to let them be there a little earlier so they can
- 2 get them horses down the road. They've got their
- 3 saddlebags packed and they're ready.
- 4 AEF CHAIRMAN CONRAD: Good morning. The
- 5 preconvention committee meeting for the Auxiliary
- 6 Emergency Fund, AEF, was held in the Cascade Room at the
- 7 Red Lion Hotel in Redding beginning at 10:34 a.m. on 6/21.
- 8 No code changes were done, but a recommendation
- 9 to stress to incoming chairmen when presenting information
- 10 about AEF program is that aid is temporary and not all
- 11 applicants are awarded monies from this fund. Monies
- 12 allotted to those in need come from donations from units,
- 13 districts, and individuals.
- 14 With all life's challenges that face our members
- 15 and the population at large, from the economy, loss of
- 16 work, the wages and limited job opportunities, many are
- 17 left struggling to provide food, shelter, and clothing to
- 18 themselves and their families. Environmental disasters
- 19 always seem to strike with little or no warning often with
- 20 devastating effects.
- 21 With that, prayer was offered by Alberta
- 22 Cummings, District 23; Secretary Elizabeth Doidge,
- 23 District 28; Sergeant-at-Arms Bonnie Chavoya, District 7;
- 24 and the Pledge of Allegiance by Linda Fariss, District 29.
- 25 Seventeen delegates were in attendance with six guests.

1 Twenty-one districts sent in reports with eight 2 supplementals. I was surprised for getting supplementals being submitted by both unit and district. The monies 3 donated on the reports came to grand total of \$5,792.88. 4 Units also indicated that individuals donated to members 5 6 in need, but did not submit application for aid. One was for \$460 from one member. This amount is not included in 7 8 the total above. 9 Reports indicated that 21 members applied for AEF funds and 19 for emergency assistance. These numbers 10 alone indicate the value of donating to this valuable 11 program and the reasons that not all will be given 12 assistance. 13 14 Some delegates were surprised that no report had been received from their districts. 15 Districts that did not submit reports were also 16 given a certificate to stress the importance of reporting 17 no matter what the donation. Every penny counts. 18 program is invaluable in today's troubled times and many 19 members who apply will not receive aid due to lack of 20 21 resources available at the National level. Surviving life's storms and helping out our members is indeed 22 service, not self. 23 Certificates to all districts were awarded by 24 25 donation level. A complete list will be posted by

district number, not amount, in the department office. 1 2 District 25 made the largest donation of \$848.61. (Applause.) 3 4 AEF CHAIRMAN CONRAD: Followed by District 29 with \$711. 5 6 (Applause.) AEF CHAIRMAN CONRAD: All supplemental reports 7 received a hats off for a job well done for service, not 8 9 self and individualized to what was stressed in their 10 report. Prizes were awarded as well by this chairman to second and third place at the preconvention meeting. They 11 will be posted in the department office. First place is 12 awarded to District 29, Unit 715 for -- oh, 716. I'm 13 sorry -- for their report that most exemplified President 14 15 Linda's theme of the Old West and uniqueness of activities to earn monies for this program. 16 This chairman did submit a report to National's 17 Western Division Chairman with an attachment from our 18 19 department bookkeeper with the amounts that were submitted to department and forwarded to National. The goal was a 20 21 10 percent increase from the previous year. I indicated 22 to her that our timeframes were out of sync and I had yet 23 to get the actual, a term for money in the Old West, from the districts. I received an e-mail back thanking me for 24 25 the information and saying what a wonderful job California

did for this program. 1 2 Thank you, Madam President, for this appointment. Thank you, members of California, for all your hard work. 3 Hats off to a job well done. Enjoy the rest of this 4 5 convention and that concludes my report. 6 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Thank you. 7 8 LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN'S REPORT 9 10 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: At this time I'm going to have our Legislative Chairman -- are you ready 11 or --12 NEC WOMAN REYES: I'm always ready. 13 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: I know you're 14 15 always ready. Rough and ready, that's you. And I'm going to have you step over to this microphone. 16 NEC WOMAN REYES: Yeah, I don't want to fall 17 18 again. 19 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: I might have to 20 start dancing with you again. 21 NEC WOMAN REYES: Good morning again. Good morning. The convention committee on Legislative met on 22 23 June 21st, 2012 at 11:00 a.m. in the Appaloosa Room over 24 at the Holiday Inn Convention Center in Northern 25 California. The statistical report of this chairman

appears on page 14 or 16 -- there are two pages, but it's 1 2 page 14. So it is there in the reports. Nancy Niles of District 24 was appointed 3 4 secretary, Chris de la Rosa of District 28 offered prayer, and Cathy McCoy of District 21 was appointed 5 6 Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 19 district delegates answered roll 7 call and there were seven visitors. Each delegate 8 received a copy of the legislative code which was read by 9 10 this chairman. 11 There were no code changes, no resolutions, and no recommendations. The meeting adjourned at 11:55 a.m. 12 13 This concludes my Legislative report, Madam President. May I proceed to my supplemental report? 14 15 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Please. NEC WOMAN REYES: This chairman takes pride to 16 report on the outstanding activities of our Auxiliary 17 members in the Department of California as they worked 18 19 very hard to promote the Legislative program in support of the American Legion's priorities concerning our veterans, 20 21 their families and their communities. Twenty-nine districts reported with 233 units reporting after 22 23 persistent bugging by this chairman. 328 subscriptions of the "Dispatch" were 24 25 purchased by units and members. Other Legion publication

magazines including, "How a Thought Becomes a Bill" and 1 2 "How a Bill Becomes a Law," "Legislative Handbook," and "How to Make a Difference Through Effective Grassroots 3 4 Lobbying," were given out at the Department Executive Committee fair. 5 6 All legislative updates and other information on vital issues affecting our veterans received from National 7 Legislative Director and Division Chairman and other 8 9 sources were all shared with the membership regularly 10 through bulletins and e-mails sent to districts and units. Units kept busy reaching out to their legislators by 11 writing letters, making phone calls, e-mailing, trying all 12 13 means of communication just to be heard and to awaken their consciousness that we as Auxiliary members are in 14 15 full support for the American Legion on all the priority issues they are fighting for, including the Flag 16 Amendment, Fiscal Year 2013 VA Budget, and all priority 17 issues of vital importance to our veterans and their 18 families. 19 In the essence of saving time I will not read the 20 21 outstanding activities that I have listed. I can make a 22 copy for anyone interested to see those activities. 23 Attending the Washington D.C. conference on February 25 to 29, 2012 was a very valuable privilege and 24 25 a most informative and educational experience forever to

- 1 be remembered by this chairman. Speakers shared
- 2 impressive and enlightening views and information on
- 3 legislative issues relevant to veterans' concerns and
- 4 benefits.
- 5 One of the highlights of this event was the
- 6 enjoyable experience on the "Hill Walk" to meet and talk
- 7 to congressional leaders and their legislative assistants
- 8 who listened to our questions of concerns.
- 9 As Auxiliary members we can make a difference on
- 10 behalf of our veterans by persistent contact with our
- 11 lawmakers, awakening their awareness and getting their
- 12 favorable support on issues of vital importance to our
- 13 veterans who have fought for our country and to those who
- 14 are still fighting so that they can better serve them and
- 15 our nation as a whole.
- This concludes my supplemental report, Madam
- 17 President. May I proceed to the presentation of my first
- 18 place awards?
- 19 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Please do.
- 20 NEC WOMAN REYES: Thank you. Okay. Do we have
- 21 all the recipients ready? I have a citation of first
- 22 place awarded to District 29, Tami Bell. Chairman, this
- 23 is best overall district report.
- 24 (Applause.)
- 25 NEC WOMAN REYES: Congratulations. You did a

great job. The next one is first place awarded to best 1 2 unit supplemental report. Inyo Unit 118, District 27. 3 (Applause.) NEC WOMAN REYES: Pictures can be taken later. 4 Okay. Now another first place awarded to -- I won't say 5 that. I will say what the -- I mean, the category. Most 6 7 contacts made to government officials. Goes to District 8 19, Nina Freeman. 9 (Applause.) 10 NEC WOMAN REYES: Next one is first place district ordering most dispatch awarded to District 22, 11 Cindy Simons. 12 13 (Applause.) NEC WOMAN REYES: And last but not least, most 14 15 letters sent to congressional officials by a district. 16 And this goes to District 14, Martha Sweeney, chairman. 17 (Applause.) NEC WOMAN REYES: Okay. And that concludes my 18 19 report, Madam President. 20 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Okay. She's good. 21 She bounced back really well. 22 2.3 SECRETARY/TREASURER'S REPORT 24 25 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: At this time I'd

like to have some words from the ranch. 1 2 SECRETARY/TREASURER VOGELE: All right. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: If you're ready. 3 4 She galloped on over with me to the men's side. So we're going to have the words from our ranch now. We're doing 5 6 some of the remarks from the stage, from this podium because of the stairs and the situation earlier. 7 8 please bear with us. Thank you. 9 SECRETARY/TREASURER VOGELE: Howdy Cowgirls and 10 Cowboys. Back at the ranch we've been having the best trail ride ever. I would first like to start off with my 11 thanks first. - 4 sure the membership are being processed in a timely
- 5 manner. Please make sure when sending in the transmittals
- 6 that the correct form is used, names are in alphabetical
- 7 order, and the correct amount of money is sent. If any of
- 8 this is incorrect, our Membership clerk will return it to
- 9 have you fix it, and this does slow down the membership
- 10 clerks.
- 11 QuickBooks has been our accounting software in
- 12 the office for almost two years now. Our bookkeeper
- 13 enjoys researching issues and creating new reports. It is
- 14 extremely helpful for the bookkeeper when the checks are
- 15 received in the office with the correct form attached,
- 16 both the unit and district numbers is on the correct form,
- 17 and a remark is written on the note area of the check.
- This time next year the Department of California
- 19 office will be in a new location, but we don't know where
- 20 we're going to be yet. The City/County of San
- 21 Francisco will be starting an earthquake retrofit on July
- 22 1st, 2013. Rumor has it that there will be -- we will be
- 23 there at the new location for about two years. This past
- 24 February we started getting ready by clearing out over 200
- 25 boxes from the basement. We are also planning on a

12	DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Thank you. And we
13	don't all have an opportunity to go to the department
14	office, but they have it decorated so cute. Western with
15	chaps, and it's just really cute. Thank you for getting
16	in the theme and having that ranch house really warm and
17	welcoming.

19	COMMUNITY SERVICE REPORT
20	
21	DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: At this time I'm
22	going to ask Bonnie Christner to please give the Community
23	Service report for Loretta Marsh who is unable to be with
24	us at this time. Following her will be Esther Garcia with
25	Constitution & Bylaws, and we'll see where we go from

- 1 there.
- 2 PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CHRISTNER: Madam
- 3 Department President, the convention committee on
- 4 Community Service met on June 21st, 2012 in the Trinity
- 5 Room in the Red Lion Hotel in Redding, California.
- 6 The statistical report for Community Service can
- 7 be found on page 14 in the Book of Reports.
- 8 In the absence of Department Chairman Loretta
- 9 Marsh, Past Department President, myself, was asked to
- 10 chair the meeting. Genieca Risner, District 15, was asked
- 11 to act as chaplain. Pat Davis, District 23,
- 12 Sergeant-at-Arms, and Lois Cornish District 22 secretary.
- The meeting was called to order with a prayer by
- 14 Genieca and the Pledge of Allegiance led by
- 15 Sergeant-at-Arms Pat.
- 16 Including chairman Bonnie, 20 districts answered
- 17 roll call with five delegates replaced by alternates. Six
- 18 visitors were welcomed.
- 19 The Community Service code was read in its
- 20 entirety with no changes made. No resolution or
- 21 recommendations were made.
- 22 Except for the first place certificates were --
- 23 except for the first place, certificates were handed out.
- 24 First place will be awarded when report is presented on
- 25 the floor. Gifts accompanied the certificates.

Discussion was held on how the Community Service 1 2 report was aimed at veterans and how to apply hours worked and funds expended during programs and projects for 3 4 Community Service. The meeting was adjourned with a prayer by 5 6 Genieca. 7 This is my committee report, Madam President. 8 May I go on with my supplement? 9 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Please. 10 PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CHRISTNER: I shouldn't say "my" supplement. It's the supplement by Loretta Marsh 11 who is your Community Service chairman. And she did an 12 13 excellent job this year. 14 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: She did. PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CHRISTNER: The 15 16 Auxiliary units of the Department of California put the National plan of action to work right out of the gate this 17 year. Our Department President chose a western rodeo 18 theme for us to work with this year and asked each 19 chairman to name her committee accordingly. As Community 20 21 Service we chose the theme name Civic Organization of Women, or COWS. I'm sure she had her reasoning for that. 22 23 I don't know what it is, but --24 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: We're not going to 25 take that one personal.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CHRISTNER: Yeah. With 1 2 that we had a very fun and productive year. Homeless veterans were recipients of much effort 3 and attention and donations. Along with food, clothing 4 and sundry items, two units reported furnishing small 5 6 apartments for patients coming out of drug and alcohol rehab and trying to rebuild their lives which they have 7 done successfully. They have volunteered many hours and 8 9 dollars working at veteran Stand Downs all up and down the 10 state. And what a sight it must have been from a bird's 11 eye point of view of all the poppies, crosses, and flags 12 13 that were placed in cemeteries on Veteran's Day, Memorial Day. Parades, parties, and picnics were abundant for 14 these days, as well as Martin Luther King Day. 15 16 Make a Difference Day and Family Volunteer Day 17 brought out the giving nature and kindness of our members. Things were happening in the neighborhoods. They were 18 weeding, planting, painting, shopping, cooking, driving, 19 entertaining, building, removing graffiti and picking up 20 21 trash, all to help a neighbor and make their community a 22 better place. 23 Even the animals fare well with these volunteers. Care and attention of pets were considered when homeless 24 25 veterans are given care because many of them have pets and

- 1 can't just leave them behind. And some military personnel
- 2 need pet care when they are deployed, so Auxiliary members
- 3 are there for them.
- I would like to share a couple of stories related
- 5 in the reports that I found of interest. One unit held a
- 6 new beginning tea party in which 13 ladies from a local
- 7 homeless shelter, eight of them from military families,
- 8 were sent formal invitations to the post home for a tea.
- 9 They were each given a purse filled with makeup and
- 10 toiletries and given the opportunity to choose accessories
- 11 such as a scarf, hat, hair ornaments, or jewelry from a
- 12 chest.
- 13 They were served dainty sandwiches and cookies
- 14 and tea from a dainty cup and saucer which they are given
- 15 to take with them to remind them of new beginnings. The
- 16 quests commented they had not felt like ladies in a long
- 17 time. They were given the opportunity to share where
- 18 these -- where they see themselves and where they hope to
- 19 be in a few years from now. The occasion was so rewarding
- 20 the unit wants to make it an annual affair.
- 21 One unit reported volunteering at a convalescent
- 22 care center. They served the usual refreshments and
- 23 visited with patients. They provided karaoke for the
- 24 entertainment. One gentleman patient sitting off to the
- 25 side in a wheelchair broke out singing, "She'll Be Coming

- 1 Around the Mountain" without the benefit of music even.
- 2 The staff was stunned. They said he had not spoken one
- 3 word since he arrived several weeks ago. How awesome is
- 4 that, huh? He was continuing -- he has continued to speak
- 5 freely since that day. I bet you can't shut him up now.
- 6 Auxiliary volunteers surely do make a difference in the
- 7 lives of others.
- 8 The deeds of the American Legion Auxiliary cannot
- 9 be given justice and totally described in a short report
- 10 as one can see from the following figures. They are
- 11 genuine heroines to so many.
- 12 Units reported the following statistics regarding
- 13 the National plan of action: Number of units
- 14 participating in National recognized days of service, 144.
- 15 Homeless veteran activity, 97. Jobs/career fair, 35.
- 16 Number of volunteers, 1,989. Number of
- 17 veterans/military/family members, 38,724. Hours, 16,361.
- 18 Innovative community service activities, 29. Cost to the
- 19 units, 51,661. Value of in-kind donations, 72,512.
- 20 Miscellaneous activities outside the National
- 21 service days: Volunteer, 5,255. Dollars donated,
- 22 140,838. Value donations, 144,326. Hours, 132,604. You
- 23 ladies are awesome.
- 24 These figures reflect activity in schools,
- 25 libraries, churches, civic organizations, blood banks,

cancer fundraisers, senior centers, women's shelters, 1 2 recycling programs, animal shelters, community centers, Habitat for Humanity, and a multitude of others. 3 4 God bless the American Legion Auxiliary and its outstanding members awards. Madam President, this 5 6 concludes Loretta's report. May I proceed with her first 7 place awards? DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Please do. 8 PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CHRISTNER: The best 9 10 unit supplement going to Monterey Unit 694, District 28, Emily Tafoya, Chairman. 11 12 (Applause.) 13 PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CHRISTNER: 14 district supplemental goes to Linda Hunt, chairman, District 16. 15 16 (Applause.) PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CHRISTNER: And, 17 Danielle White, are you the woman. I'm sorry. I'll give 18 this to you. There she is. Danielle, you weren't at 19 committee and I apologize. I should have sent this to 20 21 your district this morning. She got it for the best blood 22 drive activity. 2.3 (Applause.) PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CHRISTNER: And the 24 25 Community Service senior volunteer of the year goes to

Rosalie Moyer, Unit 53, District 23. 1 2 (Applause.) PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CHRISTNER: And the 3 4 junior Community Service volunteer of the year goes to Maya Novicki, Unit 43, District 24. 5 6 (Applause.) PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CHRISTNER: 7 8 President, Loretta would like to tell you that it has been 9 a pleasure to serve on your team and this concludes her 10 report. 11 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Thank you very much. 12 13 PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CHRISTNER: Madam 14 President, may I take a point of privilege, please? 15 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Absolutely. 16 PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CHRISTNER: thank you. I would be remiss if I did not thank you so 17 much for your thoughts and prayers and your support over 18 19 the last year and a half with my husband Thomas and 20 myself. 5	DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: And now we'll hear
6	from I like to two-step, but you guys are just

8	CONSTITUTION & BYLAWS CHAIRMAN GARCIA: The
9	Constitution & Bylaws committee met at the Palomino Room
10	at the Holiday Inn on June 21st, 2012 at 9:00 a.m. in
11	Redding, California. Excuse me. Thank you.
12	The statistical report of this chairman appears
13	on page 14 of the Book of Reports. Carol Fuqua of
14	District 25 was appointed secretary, Phyllis Holmberg from
15	District 22 was appointed chaplain, and Zana Chaney from
16	District 15 was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. Roll call
17	found 19 delegates and one guest present.
18	The committee approved I can't read. The
19	committee agreed on the following report. The code was
20	read and the following changes were made. Code number
21	6(a) now reads: When rewriting the bylaws, two complete
22	sets, including signature page, and three additional
23	signature pages will be required for submission to the
24	department chairman. Three additional signature pages

Districts are not independent and 19 20 should not be regarded as independent because they are not 21 chartered entities recognized by the national organization. The department has the power to 22 23 determine/establish the rights, prerogatives, and duties of districts, but these rights, duties, and prerogatives 24 25 cannot and do not change the fact that the districts are

subordinate to the department. Any money collected or 1 2 maintained by the department is considered department funds and any money spent by the district should be 3 regularly reported to the department. The finances of the 4 district should be regularly reported to the department. 5 6 Districts should be included in the department's IRS Form 990. The exception is a district that is separately 7 8 incorporated and which has its own tax exempt status 9 granted via a letter of determination from the IRS. 10 And whereas, the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) requires a governing document of the organization to be in 11 place stating the name, intent and purpose of the 12 13 organization at the time the organization calls and requests the IRS to add the organization into their system 14 15 so that they can file appropriate tax forms with IRS. 16 And whereas, the only governing document currently in place for districts is the district model 17 bylaws which doesn't contain the intent nor the purpose 18 and in order to meet IRS criteria. 19 Therefore be it resolved, that an additional page 20 21 be added to the district model bylaws after the index and prior to the articles, listing the ALA preamble to the 22 23 constitution, and using the national mission and purposes 24 to satisfy IRS criteria. 25 Mission/Intent: In the spirit of service, not

- 1 donating care package items to overseas service members,
- 2 and becoming pen pals with a soldier in Iraq through
- 3 Soldiers Angels.
- 4 My current and future efforts over the next few
- 5 weeks and few months include visiting wounded warriors at
- 6 the naval hospital down at Balboa in San Diego, sewing
- 7 aprons to be sold on SB and through my Ms. Armed Forces
- 8 Facebook page in which the net proceeds will go to Travis
- 9 Mills who was a staff -- he is a staff sergeant in the
- 10 U.S. Army and he is only the fourth quadruple amputee to
- 11 survive from his wounds from Afghanistan and Iraq, and
- 12 collecting hygiene products to be donated to homeless
- 13 veterans in the fall.
- 14 If you ask a veteran what their favorite part of
- 15 the service is, it's definitely not going to be the 4:30
- 16 a.m. calls that we had to do to clean vehicles or the four
- 17 hours that we spent inspecting our weapons or the six
- 18 hours a day that sometimes we would spend just picking
- 19 weeds in between rocks, but rather, the family members
- 20 that we made and that we'll have for life.
- 21 And as Legion and Auxiliary members, we are a
- 22 part of that family. And I consider myself lucky to be
- 23 surrounded by so many caring, supportive, dedicated women
- 24 such as yourself and hope to continue doing good in the
- 25 veteran community and be just as good, if not better, than

I've already been in the past. And I look to you ladies 1 2 as my mentors and I thank you very much for everything that you've done for the veteran community. And I am so 3 4 proud to be a lady of the Auxiliary, so thank you so much. 5 (Applause.) 6 MS. McKIMMY: And I also want to say thank you to 7 my fiance who exactly one year today will be my lovely 8 husband. 9 (Applause.) 10 MS. McKIMMY: He's here somewhere. 21	(Processional.)
22	DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: The men can be our
23	guests. We also have the lovely, lovely most gracious
24	first lady, Yoko, with him. All right. Commander.
25	DEPARTMENT COMMANDER CROOKS: Ladies. Ladies of

the Auxiliary, I have never seen such beautiful lovely 1 2 ladies in my entire life. (Applause.) 3 4 DEPARTMENT COMMANDER CROOKS: But I came to bring you greetings and a welcome to the 94th convention for the 5 6 Department of California. First off, I've learned this year -- this has been a learning -- you do not come visit 7 8 the Department President without a gift. See now two 9 years ago I would have come here and just walked in and 10 said hi, and they would say how rude, not even -- now this time from the first lady and I to your president, roses. 11 Because a rose is a rose. 12 13 (Applause.) - 2 Vice Commander Merv Gunderson.
- 3 NATIONAL VICE COMMANDER GUNDERSON: Thank you,
- 4 Hugh. I have to tell you, Hugh told me that he wouldn't
- 5 be where he was without the Auxiliary.
- 6 DEPARTMENT COMMANDER CROOKS: That's right.
- 7 NATIONAL VICE COMMANDER GUNDERSON: And that goes
- 8 for most of our departments. We talk about a Legion
- 9 family. We talk about what we do together. We do so much
- 10 more when we all work together as the Riders and Sons of
- 11 the Legion, the American Legion Auxiliary, our juniors
- 12 program, and the American Legion. If we work together, we
- 13 get a lot of things accomplished.
- 14 And I really appreciate you, being from Montana,
- 15 putting all these boots up and keeping the cool weather
- 16 here today. I appreciate that. They told me it was going
- 17 to be hot in Redding and I'm thinking, boy, somebody
- 18 missed the boat there.
- But it's a pleasure being in California. I had
- 20 an interesting flight down and spent 12 hours at the San
- 21 Francisco airport, so I got to find out about travel in
- 22 California. As I told them at the Legion convention, I
- 23 got to fly over at night. It was about 2:30 in the
- 24 morning, 3:30 this morning I'm flying over. And looking
- 25 out the airplane window, I know when I'm in Montana at

- 1 night and I'm flying, you'll see a light way off in the
- 2 distance and that's one of our cities. And then you see
- 3 another light way off, and that's probably another state.
- 4 And when we left San Francisco, it's all lights. And I
- 5 thought this is a little different, but it's fun.
- It's great being out here and it's good to see
- 7 the western part of our state and California and the
- 8 coast. And I'm really looking forward to meeting some of
- 9 you. I'm hoping that as we get together, stop up and say
- 10 hi. Let's talk a little bit and find out what you're
- 11 doing and how well you're helping us out.
- 12 President, thank you very much for the invite.
- 13 (Applause.)
- 14 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: And this year I
- 15 have a bit of a western theme going on, Commander, so I
- 16 would like to present you with one of my garters and my
- 17 pen.
- 18 NATIONAL VICE COMMANDER GUNDERSON: I don't know
- 19 if that will fit over my boots.
- 20 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: I don't know, but
- 21 we can try it later. The ladies like too much info. He's
- 22 turning as red as his hat.
- 23 I also have one for the Commander. And the man
- 24 with the beer, for you is a garter too. You deserve it.
- 25 (Applause.)

- 1 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Men bearing gifts.
- 2 Yoko, now I know where your garter would look good. I
- 3 know men want to put it on, but that's kind of something
- 4 you do when you get married and you've been married a long
- 5 time. But you might want to relive that moment, so here
- 6 you go.
- 7 (Applause.)
- 8 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Now we also had a
- 9 little challenge going on. You know, Doc came over here a
- 10 little earlier and he says that we're having a lot more
- 11 fun than you are. And so, you know, I told you, ladies,
- 12 when I came back that I threatened him with some feathers,
- 13 but I knew we were going to take it easy on him because
- 14 after all, we were real close, very close, so -- but it
- 15 does take a boa.
- Now this is -- actually, I should have all the
- 17 PDPs doing this. They're the saloon girls and you ought

- 16 alternate Linda Diebel.

DISTRICT 27 PRESIDENT WHITE: Yeah, but we need 8 9 the help. Myself. I will put myself. 10 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Danielle, are you 11 going to make it? DISTRICT 27 PRESIDENT WHITE: Yeah, I'll go to 12 13 help you. 14 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: I think that's it. 15 Let me check real quick. 16 (Applause.) DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Ladies, we do have 17 21. Thank you. Tammy, would you come to the podium --18 19 come to the microphone. SECRETARY/TREASURER VOGELE: Who was that last 20 21 one you just now made? 22 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Patricia Taylor, 23 Unit 132. Thank you. SECRETARY/TREASURER VOGELE: I move to close 24 25 nominations.

1	AUDIENCE MEMBER: Second.
2	DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: I have a move and
3	second to close nominations for alternate to national
4	convention. All in favor?
5	ALL PRESENT: Aye.
6	DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Do we have any

8	(No response.)
9	DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: All in favor?
10	ALL PRESENT: Aye.
11	DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Thank you, ladies,
12	very much.

14	CONSTITUTION & BYLAWS COMMITTEE REPORT (Continued)
15	
16	DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Now at this time
17	when we recessed for lunch, we were having a discussion or
18	were with the Constitution & Bylaws. Would Esther please
19	come back to the station?
20	I talked about that we were going to have to have
21	a roll call vote for the increase of the \$4 to National
22	per capita, the dollar increase to department per capita
23	because it did take a two-thirds vote. One of the things
24	that didn't happen was that we didn't have very much
25	discussion and I know that this was sprung on many of you

- 1 here and I feel at this time to be in all fairness to that
- 2 resolution and to you the membership, you the delegation,
- 3 we should have some explanation of why this has been
- 4 presented at this time and why we didn't have this
- 5 knowledge prior to.
- 6 So at this time I'm going to ask the -- I'm going
- 7 to open that resolution for discussion and I'm asking our
- 8 finance chairman, Susie Tozier, to please give some
- 9 background as to why and what has transpired.
- 10 CONSTITUTION & BYLAWS CHAIRMAN GARCIA: Madam
- 11 President, can we read it first because everybody seems to
- 12 be --
- 13 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Oh, yes, we can do
- 14 that. Absolutely. It's number 4, Article IX, Section 2.
- 15 Would you like to reread that, chairman, please?
- 16 CONSTITUTION & BYLAWS CHAIRMAN GARCIA: It now
- 17 reads: Per capita tax shall be payable in advance
- 18 annually. National senior dues \$5, department senior \$6,
- 19 Auxiliary News assessment \$1, national junior \$1.25,
- 20 department junior 75 cents.
- 21 So the proposed change: It's per capita tax will
- 22 be payable in advance annually. National dues, \$9,
- 23 department seniors, \$7, Auxiliary News assessment, \$1,
- 24 Auxiliary News assessment -- sorry. National junior,
- 25 \$1.25, department junior 75 cents.

I was asked -- it was brought up that that totals 1 2 19. Yes, it does, but the senior per capita tax is only the national seniors \$9, department seniors \$7, and the 3 Auxiliary News \$1. The total is 17. 4 5 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Correct. But this 6 does represent the \$4 --CONSTITUTION & BYLAWS CHAIRMAN GARCIA: 7 8 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: -- in the national increase and the dollar. 9 10 CONSTITUTION & BYLAWS CHAIRMAN GARCIA: 11 dollar for the department fees. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: So we moved to have 12 this and we had a second. Now we're going to open with 13 some explanation under discussion that should have come up 14 prior to. We were kind of rushing, but I feel it's very 15 16 important for you, the delegation, to have all the facts and more information on this before we take a final vote. 17 FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN TOZIER: Ladies, we 18 19 did the budget in May and we again have come up with the general fund in a deficit. This is the fourth year the 20 21 general fund has been in a deficit. We have tried -- they have tried all kinds of cost-cutting methods up there in 22 23 department. Costs are going up just like for everybody else and we can't keep operating in the deficit because we 24 25 are taking from the reserve funds and we are supposed to

- 1 keep reserve funds for an emergency and that's dwindling
- 2 quite fast, especially this being four years in a row in
- 3 the deficit.
- 4 The dollar increase was decided at the May
- 5 meeting that we would present that to the congregation.
- 6 It was not something that we wanted to surprise on you,
- 7 but it is a necessity for the department office. They
- 8 have not had a raise in several years for the expenses up
- 9 there, so it is very needed to continue operating the
- 10 department office.
- We are down to two part-time people. We've got
- 12 rid of the full-time people, and there are no benefits for
- 13 those people. So we -- you know, they have really, really
- 14 cut back a lot to give you the services you need to keep
- 15 the State of California operational.
- Is there any questions you would like to ask of
- 17 me?
- 18 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Would anyone like
- 19 to come to the microphone and make any other discussion on
- 20 this?
- 21 ELECTIONS CHAIRMAN TAYLOR: Madam President,
- 22 Melanie Taylor, past department president. I stood as
- 23 opposed to this because when the code change was made, I
- 24 myself did not clearly understand that. I was not aware
- 25 of what was happening. I more than anybody I think

understand having served as your department 1 2 secretary/treasurer that our department coffers need this money, so I will be standing in favor of this. Thank you. 3 4 ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEMBER CUCCARO: Madam Department President, Odette Cuccaro, District 18. The 5 6 rationale to this was to vote on and change the Constitution & Bylaws for the national raise of \$4. 7 8 dollar increase from the department gave us no forewarning to go back to our units to discuss this and to see just 9 10 where we can help, but to just bring it under the same umbrella as the national \$4 is not the way to do it. 11 12 (Applause.) 13 PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT KAPSALIS: Madam President, Ruby Kapsalis, Past Department President. 14 15 our finance chairman explained to everyone, this department is off -- is operating on a shoestring budget. 16 17 Believe me, they have cut corners and done everything they possibly can. And surely if we can give national \$4, we 18 can give our department \$1. 19 20 (Applause.) 21 PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT KAPSALIS: I don't know 22 when the last time was that we got a per capita raise, but 2.3 it was a long time ago, ladies. So please I ask you as a past department president and a member who cares about 24 25 this department, please vote yes for this resolution.

(Applause.) 1 2 MS. KULLEN: Ann Kullen, District 12, Unit 83. I'm in favor of this position because I look at all the 3 4 people up there doing all that volunteer work and all the people out there doing volunteer work, and if you need 5 6 that money to operate, which is the information that you 7 give us, it's just dire. We need it, we need you, and we 8 need to give you a dollar. 9 PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: Madam 10 President, Nancy Brown-Park, Past Department President. I speak in favor of the dollar dues increase. Our last dues 11 increase for the department of California was in 2003. 12 13 How much do we each care about those that we honor by our membership? Is that dollar really going to hurt us? We 14 owe it to those we serve. It's just a dollar. 15 16 (Applause.) DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Chair recognizes 17 Linda Fariss. 18 MS. FARISS: Linda Fariss, 19, Unit 414. Madam 19 20 President, I wasn't really against the dollar. I was just 21 surprised. I was surprised it wasn't mentioned before the 22 motion was made to pass it. Because I'm like sitting 2.3 there because I didn't have the written, and when she says \$7, I thought we sent less than that. I believe it was --24 25 should have been presented as the \$4 increase as one

change and the dollar as a separate change and then I 1 2 wouldn't -- then we would have been done before lunch because I wouldn't have said anything. I felt blind sided 3 that because the resolution we all received at home 4 said -- didn't mention the raise for the department. 5 6 So we're not being stingy or anything like that. We were just a little -- exactly. We were very surprised. 7 Felt a little like we were getting hoodwinked. 8 9 PARLIAMENTARIAN DELASHMIT: Diane DeLashmit, 10 Department Parliamentarian. I just want to clear something up that the amendments to Constitution & Bylaws 11 have to be into the department office the first part of 12 April. And so there's deadline dates. There's 75 days 13 they have to be in before convention. The budget meeting 14 wasn't until May. It was at that time that we realized 15 that we were quite a bit over budget in general fund. 16 So it wasn't that it was trying to pull the wool 17 over anybody's eyes. There's deadline dates and it's just 18 the way it happened with the budget being done after the 19 resolutions had to be in or the amendments had to be in. 20 21 Perhaps it -- because she's right. It went out with just 22 that \$4 increase, but it was brought up in finance. It was amended there. Or it was -- you know, that resolution 23 was amended. Whoever sat in on finance should have 24

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reported that to your caucus. It also was brought up in

25

- 1 Constitution & Bylaws. Whoever was sitting in
- 2 Constitution & Bylaws should have brought it up in your
- 3 district caucus meeting so that it was not a surprise when
- 4 you came here to the floor.
- 5 The motion probably should have been as amended
- 6 rather than just changing the motion, but that's what
- 7 happened. It wasn't anything devious that anyone was
- 8 trying to do. So I hope that explains that to you that we
- 9 have deadline dates that have to be met for resolutions
- 10 and for proposed Constitution & Bylaws changes.
- 11 (Applause.)
- 12 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Chair recognizes
- 13 Past President Madeline Lee at microphone one.
- 14 ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEMBER LEE: I just want to
- 15 comment that perhaps the information was misunderstood,
- 16 you know, by everyone and so forth, but that does not mean
- 17 that we don't need the dollar. And so I strongly
- 18 recommend that you vote for the raise. Thank you.
- 19 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Chair recognizes
- 20 Rodeo Queen District 27, Danielle White.
- 21 DISTRICT 27 PRESIDENT WHITE: Ladies, you like
- 22 the Auxiliary, don't you? Then you should support the
- 23 Auxiliary. And if they need a dumb dollar, excuse my
- 24 English, you maybe skip a candy bar or a drink and that
- 25 will give you more than a dollar.

(Applause.) 1 2 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Judy Tabachi, District 18. 3 MS. TABACHI: Judy Tabachi, Unit 755, District 4 18. I have a very simple solution. I know that my unit 5 6 has almost 200 members. When that money comes in, we'll send the 200 or send the \$200 to department and it will 7 8 come out of our programs. Thank you. 9 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Ladies, at this 10 time we will be calling for the vote. I am going to once again try to do a standing vote. It does need to pass 11 two-thirds. If once again we feel that we need to, we 12 13 will caucus and we will have you vote on it. So at this time everyone in favor of the proposed change -- this 14 15 would read: Per capita tax shall be payable in advance annually, national senior \$9, department senior \$7, 16 Auxiliary News assessment \$1, national junior \$1.25, 17 department junior 75 cents. 18 19 If you are in favor of this change, please stand. Ladies, I do believe that -- well, wait, wait, 20 21 wait. Okay. Sit down because I do want to give the 22 opportunity to those because I believe it is our 2.3 obligation to give every member the right to speak their 24 mind. All those that are not in favor, please stand. 25

Thank you very much, ladies. And it is 1 2 definitely a two-thirds vote and this amendment has passed. And I tell you that the department will use that 3 money very, very wisely. They really will. They have 4 worked very hard and, like I said, they do not get any 5 6 benefits. They don't get any raises. We're not asking for any increases in anything. They're just -- and we 7 have had to cut the staff and the job doesn't stop. The 8 job doesn't get cut. The job is still there to make sure 9 10 we have all the things that we need. 11 So thank you very much, ladies. Thank you for your patience on that. I truly, truly know you have the 12 13 Auxiliary at heart, the best of our department at heart. Thank you. 14 And at this time I'll ask Esther Garcia to 15 continue with her report. 16 CONSTITUTION & BYLAWS CHAIRMAN GARCIA: I wanted 17 to correct the proposal bylaws change which was a 18 housekeeping thing. It was to Article V, Section 6. I 19 had said Section 4. 20 21 There were no recommendations. Awards were 22 presented, and a copy will be posted in the department 2.3 office. Changes included dues increase, quorum totals, meeting places, dates and times. 16 These numbers express that units worked on their Constitution & Bylaws. 17 It was a very busy year and I can say that the 18 establishment did an excellent [sic] in assisting units 19 and districts with their constitution and bylaws. I thank 20 21 them all for your hard work. 22 Madam President, may I present my awards? 2.3 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Please. CONSTITUTION & BYLAWS CHAIRMAN GARCIA: 24 25 you. First place unit submittal goes to Linda Fariss,

- 21 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Yes.
- 22 PAST PRESIDENTS PARLEY CHAIRMAN CAPAZZI: Thank
- 23 you. Madam President, congratulations to all the past
- 24 presidents in the department for their continued work in
- 25 this wonderful program. Your involvement at the unit and

district levels as mentors and partners has made it 1 2 possible for our organization to continue to grow. When it looked like a parley may have to fold, 3 4 you asked the members to join with your group to carry on the work that needed to be done in both areas. 5 6 Our program is not a single-minded kind of endeavor. We have three areas that we work in. 7 8 nurses scholarship is probably the most common area that 9 we identify with when we speak of the Past Presidents 10 Parley program, but we have two other very important areas in which to get involved. We have the Unit Member of the 11 Year and the Salute to Active Duty Service Women. 12 13 In reading the supplemental reports from all the districts and units, I can see that all of these areas 14 15 have been a regular part of your Parleys. You have made our scholarship program application for those interested 16 in the nursing profession a widespread availability in 17 your area through newspaper articles and flyers at your 18 district meetings. A college education has become very 19 expensive and any time we as an organization can help with 20 21 finances for a deserving individual, we must do so. I learned that many of our units and districts 22 23 have their own nurse's scholarship fund to help with local students as well as donating to our to our department 24 25 scholarship program. That is a great way to show our

- 1 communities what we are all about and how we are involved
- 2 in our community.
- 3 Your visitations to our VA homes and hospitals
- 4 with handmade goods and gift bags for all our veterans was
- 5 wonderful to read about. Please continue to be visible to
- 6 these veterans and let them know we are there for them.
- 7 Those Parleys who adopted a women veteran and
- 8 invited her to meetings and visited her on birthdays and
- 9 holidays was especially rewarding to read about. There
- 10 are many who do not have family members around to visit
- 11 with them on special days and so it is important that we
- 12 have become a part of their family who can make that
- 13 visit.
- 14 Having a special luncheon or dinner for the
- 15 active duty members in your area was a great idea and also
- 16 helped recruit new members. Paying for their first year's
- 17 dues didn't hurt either. Well done, ladies.
- As you can see from the statistical report in the
- 19 Book of Reports, we have done well this year, but we need
- 20 to give a little more to our PPP fund so that next year's
- 21 chairman has a little more to work with for our
- 22 scholarships and we can help a few more deserving future
- 23 nurses.
- 24 Ladies, as we start a new Auxiliary year in July,
- 25 please keep a sharp eye out for that special unit member

- 1 that is always there, always willing to lend a hand, and
- 2 never looking for a pat on the back. She is going to be
- 3 your nomination for Unit Member of the Year next spring.
- 4 We need more applications in this area.
- I know that many of you do not have a military
- 6 base in your area and therefore may not have the
- 7 opportunity to offer a woman active duty person the chance
- 8 to write about her experiences as a woman in the service
- 9 to her country. Those of you that do have this
- 10 opportunity, please make an effort early in the year to
- 11 locate these women and ask them to apply for this award
- 12 and honor.
- 13 Again, thank you all for your hard work in this
- 14 program. Continue your mentoring and sage advice to those
- 15 new members and new officers and new chairmen.
- 16 Madam President, this concludes my floor remarks.
- 17 May I present my first place awards?

And the one that's here is 5 Doris Davis. 6 7 (Applause.) 8 9 JUNIOR CONFERENCE REPORT 10 JUNIOR CONFERENCE DIRECTOR CLEVELAND: Thank you. 11 Before I give my report, I would like to say hats off to 12 13 Diane Levias for giving us the assistance with the juniors 14 here today. She just took it over and ran with it. So thank you, Diane. 15 16 (Applause.) JUNIOR CONFERENCE DIRECTOR CLEVELAND: Our Junior 17 Wranglers arrived at Forest Home campsite very excited. 18 What? No snow. Just beautiful weather, a new location to 19 enjoy and plenty steps to climb. 20 21 A total of 60 juniors and 23 adults attended the conference. We had six new juniors and five new 22 23 counselors. Juniors participated in and learned about the Auxiliary programs and made new friends. They had 24 25 wonderful entertainment.

I am sure they will represent the department juniors very well. 24 The delegates for the national convention in 25

- 1 Indianapolis, Indiana are Elaina Gutierrez of Unit 252,
- 2 District 23 and the alternate is Maya Novicki, Unit 43,
- 3 District 24.
- 4 I would like to thank all of the counselors who
- 5 gave their time for a working weekend. Also thanks for
- 6 driving our juniors to the conference.
- 7 Madam President Linda, thank you for this
- 8 appointment. It was a wonderful experience for me. Thank
- 9 you.
- 10 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Thank you. That
- 11 was a wonderful conference, but I'll tell you that we, me
- 12 and my lieutenant governor here, and our NEC woman will
- 13 vouch for this, that we do not have to go to the gym and
- 14 do the StairMaster for the rest of our life. I really
- 15 thought my cardiovascular would get better, but it didn't.
- 16 I'm sure glad I'm not a smoker because I don't know that I
- 17 could have made it.
- 18 JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN ROBINSON: Madam
- 19 President, may I ask one other thing? The SALs are taking
- 20 the youth out tonight -- tomorrow night. I need about two
- 21 chaperons to go with us. If you want to be a chaperon,
- 22 please see me after this announcement. Thank you.

I mean, I have been bucked off quite a few horses, but I get 9 10 back up. 11 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Thank you. 12 13 JUNIOR ACTIVITIES COMMITTEE REPORT 14 JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN ROBINSON: 15 convention committee -- the convention committee in Junior 16 Conference met on June 21st, 2012 in the Sierra Room of 17 the Red Lion Inn in Redding, California. The statistical 18 19 report of this chairman appears on page 15 of the Book of 20 Reports. 21 Jackie Cleveland, Junior Conference Director, offered prayers. Dorothy Davis was appointed secretary 22 23 and Lula Goodman was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 20 district delegates answered roll call. There were 24 25 four senior members and three junior members as visitors.

The committee agreed upon the following code 1 2 I will first read the code as it reads now and then I will read upon the changes -- read the changes. 3 4 Paragraph 29 -- is that correct, Madam President? 5 Thank you. 6 Paragraph 29 currently reads: Airfare \$100 per diem for two days and the registration fee of \$25 will be 7 paid for by the department office for the delegates to 8 9 National Convention. If the alternate delegate chooses to 10 attend National Convention, she will do so at her own expense, except for \$25 registration fee which will be 11 paid for by the department. In the event the Department 12 13 Junior Delegate is unable to attend National Convention, the allowable expenses will be given to the alternate 14 15 delegate. 16 That code currently reads -- or the change. I'm 17 sorry. For the change, we would like to change it to read: Airfare 100 percent -- \$100 per diem for two days 18 and the registration fee will be paid for by the 19 department office for the delegate and alternate to the 20 21 National Convention. The department president -- no. sorry. The national -- let me go back. I am sorry. I am 22 23 nervous. 24 Airfare \$100 per diem for two days and the 25 registration fee will be paid for by the department office

- 1 for the delegate and alternate to the National Convention.
- 2 Should the delegate not be able to attend the alternate
- 3 will move up to delegate. The Department President,
- 4 Junior Activities Chairman, Junior Conference Director,
- 5 and Junior Conference Committee will select a junior that
- 6 attended the current year junior conference to attend as
- 7 the alternate. In the event that both the delegate and
- 8 the alternate are unable to attend National Convention,
- 9 the Department President, Junior Activities Chairman,
- 10 Junior Conference Director, and Junior Conference Chairman
- 11 will select two junior members that attended the current
- 12 year junior conference to attend as the delegate and
- 13 alternate.
- 14 Madam -- I don't have the sheet with the
- 15 rationale on there, but, Madam President, at this time I
- 16 -- it was accepted in my committee and I move for the
- 17 acceptance of this code change.
- 18 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: It has been moved
- 19 and seconded to accept the code change. Any discussion?
- 20 FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN TOZIER: Madam
- 21 President, Susie Tozier, Chairman of Finance. This was
- 22 not brought to the finance committee.
- DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: It was brought in
- 24 the finance meeting when we met with the budget.
- 25 FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN TOZIER: But they did

- 1 not bring it to the finance committee for approval. And
- 2 it states some different numbers than what we have in the
- 3 finance budget for them.
- 4 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: I thought that we
- 5 budgeted \$2,000 for that.
- 6 FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN TOZIER: Yeah, but the
- 7 finance committee did not review this change so the
- 8 finance committee at convention did not endorse the change
- 9 or make any additions or corrections, you know, on the
- 10 numbers. Because for the budget we have both for the
- 11 junior -- for the alternate and delegate to go, we
- 12 budgeted \$800 for airfare, per diem \$400, plus \$80 for
- 13 registration for a total of \$1280. And that's what we
- 14 had.
- 15 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: I thought we had
- 16 2,000 budgeted.
- 17 FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN TOZIER: Well, we do
- 18 have \$2,000, but that's just an estimated number. But it
- 19 was still not brought to the finance committee for their
- 20 endorsement. I mean, I don't know if that's a sticky
- 21 number or anything. It's going to be a no brainer, but we
- 22 don't have it in our notes that we endorsed this. They
- 23 have the money to do this.
- 24 JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN ROBINSON: Madam
- 25 President, I would like to continue because I do remember

the rationale on this. 1 2 FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN TOZIER: They do have the money to do this, but they just didn't bring it to the 3 finance committee here at convention for endorsement. 4 5 PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT KAPSALIS: Call the finance committee and let them vote on it. 6 7 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: I'm going to at this time table this code change, ask the finance 8 9 committee to please convene at the back of the room 10 following this meeting. When we recess we will discuss this in the finance committee meeting and, ladies, we will 11 bring this back to the floor tomorrow. Please proceed and 12 we will bring it back. Thank you. Thank you, Susie. 13 JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN ROBINSON: Thank you. 14 15 Madam President, may I continue on with my supplemental? It is with pride that I present this report on 16 behalf of the California Juniors. Our Department 17 President's theme "Western," her slogan "Hats off to 18 American Legion Family Volunteers," this was perfect for 19 our Wranglers, aka Juniors. In August the juniors 20 21 throughout the state did a roundup recruiting and electing new officers in their units. 22 23 Juniors statewide had many fundraisers to purchase school supplies for military children whose 24 25 parents were deployed to Afghanistan and Iraq. The

- 1 supplies were distributed to many elementary, middle, and
- 2 high schools. A total of \$1,113.18 cents was raised. Our
- 3 juniors requested on-line for a needy military families,
- 4 and the response was three families. The mission was to
- 5 raise enough money for Christmas gifts and food baskets.
- 6 Wranglers sent out care packages to troops in Afghanistan
- 7 along with hero packs. Make a difference day found our
- 8 Wranglers feeding the homeless, giving out school
- 9 supplies, volunteering at the VA hospital, dog walking,
- 10 and just giving service, not self.
- 11 Our Junior Jamboree was held in September where
- 12 our Wranglers learned more about the programs of the
- 13 American Legion Auxiliary. The Jamboree was hosted at
- 14 District 29. The girls learned CPR, self-defense, and how
- 15 to fold pocket flags. Senior members joined in the action
- 16 as well. They helped packed and box up Operation Military
- 17 Kids, OMK, backpacks.
- 18 At our Jamboree we had a special guest speaker
- 19 who you all met this afternoon, Miss Armed Forces, who
- 20 encouraged our Wranglers to stay in school -- who
- 21 encouraged our Wranglers to stay in school -- to stay and
- 22 if choosing at any time to join the military, it would be
- 23 a great idea as the military has much to offer those who
- 24 wish to continue their education after high school.
- 25 The local fire department watched as the

legionnaires held a flag burning ceremony after the 1 2 closing of the Jamboree showing us how to properly dispose of a flag. The girls learned much about VA&R, community 3 4 service, and the Poppy program. My, what a difference a 5 day makes. 6 We had 22 juniors participate in the Ride 2 Recovery in the City of Santa Monica where they helped 7 serve over 60 wounded veterans as they made their way onto 8 9 the pier. The juniors dressed in their red, white, and 10 blue and waved the American flag of our country to each of the cyclists. Many of our juniors raised funds to assist 11 the Ride 2 Recovery and the Creative Art Festival. 12 13 From July 2011 to this convention roundup with 625 Wranglers serving over 200 projects, earning 80 14 15 patches, volunteering 3,030 hours spending \$14,153. They have adopted 927 military families and serving 1,871 16 active duty military men and women. They participated in 17 welcome home celebrations and farewell parties and even 18 did pet sitting while our veterans were away on duty . 19 Project food basket was put into place as the juniors 20 21 received money for food and toys for needy families. Many juniors tutored students at school and home 22 23 helping the families of active military. Juniors tutored

and Internet. One unit of juniors put together a

senior members with Twitter, texting, e-mail, Facebook,

- 1 thesaurus of acronyms for the senior members to understand
- 2 new technology.
- 3 Another junior, Deja Nae Trimble, District 23,
- 4 Unit 578 started a Facebook page, Girls of the American
- 5 Legion Auxiliary, keeping all the State of California
- 6 juniors in touch with each other. They earned many junior
- 7 technology patches.
- 8 California junior members are very diverse and
- 9 interesting group of girls. They have the energy and
- 10 openness of preschoolers and grade school girls, the
- 11 know-it-all attitudes of the junior high school girls, and
- 12 the young adult attitudes of teenagers who are starting to
- 13 show their independence. All stages are perfectly normal
- 14 and a required part of growing up. Yet this group of
- 15 outstanding young ladies came together in hopes to become
- 16 an award winning department.
- 17 This diverse group -- I'm getting dry up here.
- 18 Okay. This diverse group gathered in celebration of the
- 19 riches of our organization and their country, working as
- 20 one unit at our junior conference making poppies, folded
- 21 200 pocket flags, making 68 hero cards for VA&R program,
- 22 and packing of OMK backpacks again.
- 23 At our conference the juniors elected and
- 24 appointed new officers and chairmen for 2012-2013. This
- 25 has been a great year for our department of California

juniors. 1 2 Twenty-nine districts of active juniors, 23 districts reported with 625 juniors participating in 3 4 various programs of the American Legion Auxiliary. They have helped their prospective units to feed many of our 5 6 wounded veterans, visiting the VA hospitals, as well as the elderly with Operation Care Comfort in veterans' 7 homes. California Wranglers have folded 1,000 flags, 8 9 shipped 2050 OMK backpacks, welcomed home 750 servicemen 10 and women, had farewell parties for over 30 troops, spending \$3,053, and volunteering 1050 hours. 11 Way to go, Wranglers. Yay, great job. 12 13 (Applause.) DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Good job. 14 15 JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN ROBINSON: Opportunity drawing was held at junior conference. Three third place 16 winners were won by Unit 48, District 16. Two second 17 place prizes were won by District 15 of \$25 each. 18 prize was won by District 21 and 22 of \$50. And first 19 prize was 75 won by Diane Levias, District 19. Winning 20 21 tickets are posted in the department office. One ticket 22 did not bear a name. We are asking that all opportunity 23 drawings for our junior activities to please put your name, district, and unit numbers on them. A telephone 24 number will be great as well. It is very hard to give 25

money away when it is not properly filled out. When 1 2 tickets are not filled out, we will have no choice but to disqualify that ticket and pull another one. 3 With the energy and enthusiasm of our juniors and 4 the continuous good leadership from our members, the 5 6 future for the American Legion looks very bright. 7 Madam President, this concludes my supplemental. - 22 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: From the juniors.
- 23 That's scary.
- 24 JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN ROBINSON: Juniors,
- 25 look up.

1	DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Juniors, look up.
2	(Applause.)
3	DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: My goodness. Oh,
4	my goodness.
5	Oh, give me pity; I'm on a committee. Which
6	means that from morning to night we attend and amend and
7	contend to defend without a conclusion in sight. We
8	confer and concur, we defer and demur. We reiterate all
9	of our thoughts. We revise the agenda with frequent
10	addenda and consider a loaded report. We compose and
11	propose and suppose and oppose and the points of procedure
12	are fun, but though various notions are brought up as
13	motions, there's terribly little that gets done. We
14	resolve and absolve, but never dissolve. Since it's out
15	of the question to us what a shattering pity to end our
16	committee. Where else could we make such a fuss?
17	
18	AMERICANISM COMMITTEE REPORT
19	
20	DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: We will now hear
21	from our Americanism.
22	AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SOARES: How do you follow
23	that? Good afternoon. I know you guys are getting tired
24	already so I'm going to try to keep this as short as
25	possible.

1 Madam Department President, the convention 2 committee on Americanism met on June 21st, 2012 in the Appaloosa Room of the Holiday Inn in Redding, California 3 at 10:00 a.m. The statistical report of this chairman 4 5 appears on page 12, my lucky number, of the Book of 6 Reports. Chris de la Rosa of District 28 was appointed 7 secretary, Cathy McCoy of District 21 was appointed 8 9 chaplain, and Liz Plogger of District 2 was appointed 10 Sergeant-at-Arms. Prayer was given and the Pledge of Allegiance was given by Sergeant-at-Arms Liz Plogger. 11 Secretary de la Rosa took roll call and there 12 13 were 24 delegates present and 11 quests in attendance. The code was read and the committee agreed on the 14 15 following report: A proposed code change to code 6(f), which now reads: Unit chairmen shall be encouraged to 16 seek out home school students, Girl Scout and Boy Scout 17 troops, as well as traditional classroom students to 18 participate in the department Americanism essay contest 19 under the established essay contest rules provided by the 20 21 unit chairmen. The essays received from the above will be put into the proper grade levels and judged along with the 22 2.3 traditional classroom students. This code would now read: Unit chairmen shall be 24 25 encouraged to seek out home school students, Girl Scout

- 1 and Boy Scout troops and other youth groups and
- 2 organizations as well as traditional classroom students to
- 3 participate in the department Americanism essay contest
- 4 under the established essay contest rules provided by the
- 5 unit chairmen. The essays received from the above will be
- 6 put into the proper grade levels and judged along with the
- 7 traditional classroom students.
- 8 I move for this code change.
- 9 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Is there any
- 10 discussion?
- 11 (No response.)
- 12 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: The code change
- 13 will read: Unit chairmen shall be encouraged to seek out
- 14 home school students, Girl Scout and Boy Scout troops and
- 15 other youth groups and organizations as well as
- 16 traditional classroom students to participate in the
- 17 department Americanism essay contest under the established
- 18 essay contest rules provided by the unit chairmen. The
- 19 essays received from the above will be put into the proper
- 20 grade levels and judged along with the traditional
- 21 classroom students.
- 22 All in favor -- oh, wait, wait. Discussion. I'm
- 23 sorry.
- MS. RAMOS: I'm Betty Ramos, Unit 261, District
- 25 18. I'm a newbie. This is my first conference. I want

to inquire does -- private schools are included in this 1 2 contest? AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SOARES: Yes. 3 MS. RAMOS: Okay. Thank you. I just want to 4 5 make sure. 6 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Welcome. Thank you for coming up and speaking too. I appreciate that. 7 8 MS. GREEN: I'm Sandy Green from Unit 69 and I know that everybody calls us the baby club. We have a 9 10 club or an organization that is worldwide in all of our military bases, and that's the 4-H. It is the only youth 11 group that is sponsored by the United States government 12 13 under the Department of Agriculture. I would like to see that put in because I think the military kids that are on 14 those bases and the 4-H kids in our country need to be 15 16 included in this. Thank you. 17 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Thank you. And I do believe when they are addressing this addition --18 19 excuse me. I'm sorry. I just wanted to reiterate that 20 you're absolutely correct and thank you for the 21 information; and 4-H is extremely important, and when they 22 address "and other youth groups and organizations," that's 23 one of the reasons why this was put in there so that it could be broadened out to those type of youth groups. 24 25 this would encompass this and others that might come after

that. So I just wanted to let you know that and I'm 1 2 hoping you'll vote yes on that because that will make this happen. Thank you. 3 4 AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SOARES: If I could just give here a little bit further rationale, a lot of the 5 6 schools are overloaded with their own agendas and we are 7 having a lot of -- especially into the south getting into 8 the schools. If we can broaden our horizons a little bit, I think we can increase the number of essays we receive. 9 10 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Thank you very 11 much. Any other discussion? 12 (No response.) DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: All in favor? 13 14 ALL PRESENT: Aye. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Opposed? 15 (No response.) 16 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Thank you. Passed. 17 AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SOARES: There was also a 18 recommended code addition which would be numbered 10. And 19 20 it would read: The Department Chairman shall provide a 21 list of essay winners' names to the Department 22 Secretary/Treasurer no later than June 1st when a monetary 23 prize is awarded. By the direction of the committee I move for this 24 25 code addition.

	9	AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SOARES: May I proceed with
	10	my supplemental and my first place awards?
	11	DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Please.
	12	AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SOARES: Madam Department
	13	President, the ladies of the Department of California have
	14	done an outstanding job implementing the Americanism
	15	program into their unit activities for our 2011-2012
	16	Auxiliary year.
	17	Units have participated in the R2R Challenge by
	18	waving flags along the bike route, making and serving
	19	food, and having children from an elementary and middle
	20	school make over 150 place mats for a dinner served to the
	21	veterans.
	22	Thousands of pocket flags were purchased and
	23	distributed. During Junior conference, the girls had a
	24	chance to help fold pocket flags which we left for an
	25	incoming group of active duty military and their families
I		

- 1 that were coming to the camp for a retreat before being
- 2 deployed.
- In an interesting twist to the Americanism
- 4 program, one unit made and displayed a Betsy Ross
- 5 scarecrow at an annual Scarecrow Festival. It was
- 6 displayed at a Veteran's hall next to a soldier and a
- 7 little boy waving an American flag.
- 8 On Veterans Day over 2500 small flags were put
- 9 out at local cemeteries in honor of the service these
- 10 veterans performed for our country. Veterans Day also was
- 11 a day when many units held activities at their post homes
- 12 and passed out small flags to all who attended.
- The department's essay contest brought us many
- 14 exciting essays. They were judged by three independent,
- 15 non-affiliated professional people and I think they made
- 16 some great choices. I'm pleased to say that we did
- 17 receive some participation in the national essay contest.
- 18 All were forwarded to the Western Division Chairman for
- 19 evaluation. Although our entries for National were small,
- 20 I hope it brought some joy to the National Chairman, our
- 21 own Melanie Taylor. It is my understanding it has been a
- 22 very long time since our department has participated at
- 23 the national contest.
- 24 Units in concert with their posts participate in
- 25 the proper disposal of retired flags are disposed of with

- 1 respect and reverence. Several units participated with
- 2 the Girl Scouts, teaching them about the meaning behind
- 3 the colors of the flag and how disposal is important.
- 4 Units are also teaching flag etiquette and proper
- 5 care of the flag in the schools. One unit gave out 100
- 6 books on proper flag etiquette to custodians in their
- 7 local school district. Another unit put these same books
- 8 in businesses around town.
- 9 Members are encouraged to fly their flags daily
- 10 if possible and some display their flags on lighted poles
- 11 day and night 365 days a year.
- One member is active in, "History through the
- 13 Eyes of Women" with costumed first-person presentations
- 14 and will be featuring Betsy Ross at the annual program
- 15 provided for children on President's Day. This member
- 16 also spent many hours as Betsy Ross at the Reagan Library
- 17 showing visitors how to cut a paper five-pointed star.
- 18 She also developed and often presents a museum lecture
- 19 titled "Women's Contributions during World War I and II
- 20 inspired by Poster Art" to celebrate the women who gave so
- 21 much to the war effort.
- 22 One unit offers incentives to school children for
- 23 good citizenship. They also hosted two patriotic
- 24 assemblies in the schools.
- 25 One district sponsors a naturalization program

- 1 yearly with approximately 600 to 900 new citizens each
- 2 year. This district also offers Poppy corsages and
- 3 boutonnieres for the new citizens to wear during their
- 4 citizenship ceremony. The wonderful part is this ceremony
- 5 takes place during February which as you all know is
- 6 Americanism month.
- 7 Another unit was able to take part in a
- 8 citizenship ceremony as well where 139 new citizens were
- 9 given the oath of citizenship.
- 10 One member volunteers as a mentor in classes for
- 11 English as a second language for immigrants preparing for
- 12 citizenship. Her unit has provided materials to teach the
- 13 Pledge of Allegiance, history of our flag, and videos for
- 14 the Eddie Eagle program through the American Legion. They
- 15 are also promoting flag etiquette and distributing
- 16 materials to students.
- 17 Units continue to get out the vote by holding
- 18 town hall meetings and hosting local debates. Volunteers
- 19 are already planning to drive seniors and disabled to the
- 20 polls in the upcoming elections in 2012.
- 21 One unit participated in the Junior Auxiliary
- 22 Americanism program. Every year this unit's juniors and
- 23 SAL receive patriotic books as gifts from the unit. All
- 24 of the books are geared towards the age and educational
- 25 level of each child.

1 A total of 67 books and 34 sets of flashcards 2 were presented this year with some of the titles being, "History Happened Here" and, "When I Was a Girl, Memories 3 4 From Celebrated Women, and "Slightly Odd United States, Wacky Facts of a Great Country." What an amazing way to 5 6 educate Auxiliary and SAL juniors. As you can see, the women of California are very 7 8 active in the Americanism program; we should all be very 9 proud of them. 10 This concludes my report. If I can continue with my first place awards. I hope everyone got my notes. In 11 group 1, the essay contest was won with a \$100 prize to 12 Kennah Davis, sponsored by Unit 118, District 27. 13 14 (Applause.) 15 AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SOARES: In group 2, first place goes to Ricardo Curiel-Jimenez who was sponsored by 16 Unit 694, District 28 who also got a \$100 prize. 17 18 (Applause.) 19 AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SOARES: Group 3, first prize goes to Sawyer Seth who was sponsored by Unit 720, 20 21 District 2 who won \$200. 22 (Applause.) 23 AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SOARES: Thank you, Terry. Group 4 -- now I get to the good stuff because the group 24 25 4s received -- for you new people out there, they receive

educational grants. First price gets a \$2500 grant with 1 2 the first part of it being \$500 and the rest gets forwarded to their college when they start college. So in 3 4 group 4 our winner was Jasmine Mendez, sponsored by Unit 5 777, District 25. 6 (Applause.) 7 AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SOARES: Group 5 is our exceptional needs children, and first place for ages 11 to 8 9 14 was Justin Etheridge, Unit 118, District 27, \$200. 10 (Applause.) 11 AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SOARES: Group 5, 14 years to nine months -- 14 years, nine months to 20 years of age 12 13 was won by Brittany Tolbert who was sponsored by Unit 147 of District 14, \$200. 14 15 (Applause.) 16 AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SOARES: First place unit 17 supplemental goes to Cathy Blankenbeker, Unit 742, District 21. And my first place district supplement goes 18 to Danielle White, district 27. There's no crying at the 19 Auxiliary, Danielle. 20 21 (Applause.) 22 AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SOARES: Thank you Madam 23 President for this appointment. It has been very challenging at times, but I learned a lot and I hope that 24 25 some of you did too. Thank you.

1	DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Thank you,
2	Michelle. Job well done.
3	(Applause.)
4	Children & Youth. Sue Hooker will be handling
5	that for Harriet Clendenin. Having phoned earlier, she is
6	greeting her daughter, who is one of our juniors who's now
7	in the military.
8	I do have a very happy note to report that our
9	Community Service Chairman Loretta Marsh who was called to
10	the bedside of her brother who was not doing well, he is
11	doing much better.
12	(Applause.)
13	DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: And he just rallied
14	back. He's done. He's got a lot to do with his sister
15	there, Loretta. So she was giving everybody the good news
16	and we were certainly happy to get that news. Thank you.
17	Thank you District 16 for telling me that.
18	
19	CHILDREN & YOUTH COMMITTEE REPORT
20	
21	DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Now we will hear
22	from Sue Hooker, Past President Department, who is filling
23	in for Harriet Clendenin.
24	PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT HOOKER: Thank you,
25	Madam President.

Madam President, the Children & Youth statistical 1 2 report is on page 14 in the Book of Reports. The committee met in the Sierra Room at 10:00 a.m. June 21st, 3 4 2012. Kathy Smith, District 6 served as chaplain. Ruth 5 Hackney from District 24 was secretary, and LuAnn Capazzi 6 served as Sergeant-at-Arms. There were 30 -- 23 delegates and five guests. 7 8 The code was read. There were no changes, no resolutions, 9 and no recommendations. 10 Madam President, may I continue with Harriet's 11 report? DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Absolutely. 12 PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT HOOKER: Good 13 afternoon, Madam President. The Children & Youth nannies 14 15 have done a tremendous job this year. Realizing the importance of taking care of our children, especially the 16 17 military child, is paramount. Looking at the numbers, the territory of California made a difference in the lives of 18 over 7400 military families and spent over \$81,000. 19 Incredible work everyone. 20 21 A big part of this is the Operation Military Kids project. As part of the California team, connections with 22 23 the Family Readiness Officials enabled us to be on the front line, meeting the families, giving the children hero 24

packs, and making the connection with our military

25

children and their families on a meet and greet. 1 2 Hugs and big thank yous were the norm, and of course who can resist the smiles. Our nannies recognized 3 4 the importance of letting the children know that they are also heroes. 2,264 hero packs were assembled with 74 of 5 6 them assembled at junior conference. Even units with no connection to a base or armory could pass out the hero 7 packs to a family who was in their vicinity with a 8 9 deployed parent. And sometimes a Family Readiness 10 Official would contact this nanny to help the family in a different community. 11 The territory of California is notorious for 12 partying, holiday parties especially. Halloween, 13 Christmas, Easter, and predeployment. The list goes on. 14 15 Many units reported parties in their own post or at the military base or a school or even a VA facility. Youth 16 oriented activities and lots of gifts were on hand and 17 units reported spending over \$50,000. The burning 18 question is who had more fun, the unit members or the 19 children who benefited? 20 21 Many nannies reported activities with youth groups from the Boy and Girl Scouts to 4-H, Big Brother 22 23 Big Sisters, and Boy and Girls Clubs and, of course, the junior Auxiliary members. Working together for the 24 25 betterment of our children was the priority, whether it be

- 1 for parties, Operation Military Kids, or just members
- 2 volunteering.
- 3 4-H groups have recently become a partner with
- 4 the Operation Military Kids and the Boys and Girls Clubs,
- 5 the Big Brothers Big Sisters have trained courses on
- 6 military mentoring which has been successful. Boys and
- 7 Girl Scouts have also been instruments for connecting the
- 8 students with the military child.
- 9 Case in point, District 6 connected with a Boy
- 10 Scout who became a recipient of a hero back. What a great
- 11 opportunity to honor a military child and also teach the
- 12 nonmilitary children about our program.
- With these trying economic times, it is not
- 14 surprising that units and department donated over \$32,000
- in direct aid to our veterans' children, over 3,000 of it
- 16 coming from Department in the form of temporary financial
- 17 assistance. Much of that going to basic family needs such
- 18 as diapers, food, and even helped out with housing and
- 19 utilities. Units also helped the parents with educational
- 20 assistance so the parent can eventually have a career, not
- 21 just a job.
- 22 There were many terrific projects nannies
- 23 participated in or planned for our youth. District 11,
- 24 Unit 102 reported mentoring a 4-H member and helped her
- 25 achieve a community service badge. Unit 83, District 12

- 1 aided a homeless veteran's daughter to go to her prom.
- 2 Many units adopted classrooms and sometimes even
- 3 entire schools. For example, a long-standing tradition in
- 4 a unit in the 15th district is to host a party for
- 5 underprivileged children at a local military school. A
- 6 unit in the 13th reported hosting a party for special
- 7 education students. And in the 16th district parties were
- 8 held for children from the local military bases.
- 9 District 22, also near several bases, helped
- 10 military children with Operation Military Kids backpacks
- 11 for back to school. Unit 348, District 20 donated money
- 12 to the Eagle Scouts -- to an Eagle Scout so he can get his
- 13 Eagle Award. The project was building a fire pit at the
- 14 Lancaster Veterans Home for flag retirement ceremonies.
- 15 District 20 also reports a junior member and her soccer
- 16 team made pocket flags.
- 17 Unit 694, District 28 reported donating time to
- 18 support a local food bank which served 325 children and
- 19 another food bank which served over 1200 yearly.
- 20 Districts 22 and 29 report baby showers for soon-to-be
- 21 military moms with clothes and blankets being delivered by
- 22 nanny storks.
- 23 Probably the most inspiring story came from
- 24 District 18, Unit 247. A military family, single mom, and
- 25 four siblings were destitute around the holidays. The

oldest sibling stationed in Germany was not aware of the 1 2 family's situation. Hearing of this family, the Auxiliary went to work, paid their rent, and then found there were 3 even more in need. The family needed to get rid of their 4 bedbug-infested mattresses. They also needed a microwave, 5 toaster, and blender. The unit with the help of their 6 7 entire post family raised enough money to purchase these items. But they didn't stop there. Food, clothes, toys, 8 and Christmas ornaments were also delivered. Can you 9 10 imagine the faces of the family when the Auxiliary and post members or family walked into the apartment? 11 Madam President, thank you for appointing me to 12 13 this program. We all know that our nannies truly did work the motto, "Hats off to the American Legion family 14 volunteers, " and made a difference in the lives of many of 15 our Children & Youth. 16 17 (Applause.) 18 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Thank you. PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT HOOKER: May I continue 19 with Harriet's first place awards? 20 21 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Absolutely. 22 PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT HOOKER: Okay. Here we 23 First place unit supplemental which was forwarded to National goes to Unit 416, District 22, Nanny Laura -- and 24 25 I'm probably going to butcher your last name. Laura

2	(Applause.)
3	PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT HOOKER: I'm going to
4	apologize to Laura. The first place, honoring their
5	service first place award, and it goes to National is
6	District 18, Unit 247 Nanny Sandy Houseknect.
7	(Applause.)
8	PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT HOOKER: She schooled
9	me in how to do that last night but I forgot. Nanny
10	Pamela Dixon-Hicks, first place district supplement.
11	(Applause.)
12	PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT HOOKER: Thank you,
13	Madam President.
14	DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Thank you for
15	filling in for her and doing such a wonderful job, Sue.
16	
17	NATIONAL SECURITY COMMITTEE REPORT
18	
19	DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: We're going to now
20	hear from National Security Terry Mikesell followed by
21	Membership. If you have a note from Terry, please come on
22	down.
23	DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MIKESELL: The
24	convention committee on National Security met on June 21,
25	2012 in the Appaloosa Room of the Holiday Inn, Redding,

- 1 California. The Statistical report of this chairman
- 2 appears on page 17 of the Book of Reports.
- 3 Sue Hooker was appointed secretary, Diana Levias
- 4 offered prayer, and Faye Sanchez was appointed
- 5 Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 18 district delegates
- 6 answered roll call. There were five visitors present.
- 7 The committee agreed upon the following report.
- 8 The Code was read with no changes recommended.
- 9 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Thank you.
- 10 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MIKESELL: The chaplain
- 11 offered closing prayer.
- 12 Madam President, this concludes my report. May I
- 13 continue?
- 14 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: I love it.
- 15 (Applause.)
- 16 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: What a great
- 17 lieutenant governor we got.
- 18 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Short and
- 19 sweet. Our scouts answered the call to action immediately
- 20 and set to work for our active duty military and their
- 21 families.
- 22 Hundreds of yellow ribbons are being displayed
- 23 throughout California to honor our serving heros. Others
- 24 are displayed awaiting their return. You have worked with
- 25 military bases in support of active duty military and

- 1 families while supplying babysitting, paying bills, giving
- 2 hugs, and being there. Picnics have been hosted, baby
- 3 showers given, and spending hours awaiting a returning
- 4 group of service personnel.
- 5 Units have prepared themselves and others in
- 6 their communities for emergency preparedness. You have
- 7 attended classes, hosted classes, attended training and
- 8 shared pamphlets about being prepared in an emergency. In
- 9 our great state it can happen anywhere at any given time.
- 10 Blue star banners have been presented in our
- 11 communities to those families who have military deployed.
- 12 Units have presented the POW/MIA ceremony and we continue
- 13 to lobby for a full accounting.
- 14 What a wonderful thing it is when units support
- 15 the USO's. We donate supplies, raise monies, and all of
- 16 the other little things that we can do to offer comfort to
- 17 traveling military. Units also sponsor ROTC/JROTC
- 18 whenever they become aware that this program is in their
- 19 local schools. These young people are the future
- 20 military. Medals, money, and certificates have been
- 21 presented.
- 22 Several special stories were shared with the
- 23 Western Division Chairman. Unit 585, District 26 each
- 24 month has shipped six to ten boxes to U.S. Army medics and
- 25 U.S. Marine infantry at a postage cost of \$12 per box.

- 1 Each box's contents value 50 to \$100. A truly remarkable
- 2 project. This is a Legion Family project.
- 3 Unit 179, District 5 has shipped 895 packages
- 4 within the last 12 months. This unit goes out into their
- 5 community for donations for the contents and the shipping
- 6 costs. What a great community awareness this is and a
- 7 great new membership tool.
- 8 Unit 102, District 11 has a female veteran who is
- 9 married to an active duty National Guard officer. She
- 10 travels with him and works our mission wherever she is.
- 11 She has participated in training for emergencies, helped
- 12 with lunches, massage therapy, she also acts as a driver
- 13 for those who are unable to drive.
- 14 My final special story is about Unit 118,
- 15 District 27. Now they really involve their Legion Family
- 16 in the community in this event. It started out as an
- 17 emergency blood drive for children with leukemia and they
- 18 continued holding other blood drives with involvement of
- 19 Juniors, American Legion Auxiliary, Legion Members and
- 20 other communities.
- 21 All certificates were presented in committee
- 22 except for the first place unit supplemental and the first

District 21, Cathy McCoy, Chairman. 1 2 (Applause.) DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Our first 3 4 place unit supplemental goes to Unit 716 Tami Bell, 5 chairman. 6 (Applause.) DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Tami's 7 8 report has been submitted to National. 9 Madam Department President Linda, thank you so 10 much for this appointment. It has been a pleasure working 11 this program this year. This concludes my report. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Thank you very 12 13 much. Great report. 14 15 MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE REPORT 16 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Membership. Karen. 17 MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN KARANICKOLAS: Terry, I just 18 19 might beat you as far as time going. And I did send notes out to those districts who 20 21 should have somebody up here. And I found out later two were sitting on the 12 floor. 13 The department Membership code was read with zero 14 changes. Certificates for those units and districts 15 achieving milestone number 2, number 3, and number 4 were 16 handed out along with Recruit 3 Pins. So there were lots 17 of certificates, lots of envelopes were flying. 18 Ribbons for Early Bird and 100 percent goal units 19 will be ordered and delivered to the districts after 20 21 convention. My apologies for this. There were no resolutions or recommendations. 22 23 And with no further business, the meeting of the Membership committee adjourned at 9:45. May I continue 24 25 with my supplemental report?

2	MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN KARANICKOLAS: The
3	end-of-year reports received show that the units had been
4	working in a variety of ways to honor the service of our
5	veterans. The Honoring Their Service program has put a
6	face to the reason why we joined this great organization.
7	The Commemorative buttons was a great idea. Wearing the
8	commemorative buttons while volunteering at community
9	events has helped to spread the word about who we are and
10	what we do.
11	There are many success stories out there. One of
12	them was despite having lost a few members, we had one
13	unit recruit 51 new members which helped them make goal.
14	This just goes to show how dedicated our members are to
15	this organization and want to keep it growing and
16	prospering. When we keep in mind that membership is
17	everyone's responsibility, our membership will flourish.
18	Since midyear we have had three milestones.
19	Milestone number two was January 25th for 70 percent. We
20	had 26 districts and 188 units achieve this milestone.
21	Milestone number 3 was March 28th for 85 percent.
22	We had 18 districts and 176 units make this milestone.
23	Most importantly, just last week was milestone
24	number 4 of 100 percent on June 15th. We had three
25	districts and 113 units achieve 100 percent.

Congratulations to all those units for all their hard 1 2. work. (Applause.) 3 4 MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN KARANICKOLAS: The area 5 Membership support team has worked diligently this past 6 term to help the units and districts with their membership. Their support has been invaluable. 7 department office has worked with the District Membership 8 Chairman to help resolve those pesky membership issues. 9 10 Your diligence to help resolve those issues has been 11 greatly appreciated. May I continue with my three awards? 12 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Yes. 13 MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN KARANICKOLAS: There are 59 14 15 units which qualified for the Josie Melgard Award which is for achieving goal plus two members by close of books. 16 Those certificates were handed out at the committee 17 meeting. MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN KARANICKOLAS: Madam 7 8 Department President, it has been a great honor to serve 9 the Auxiliary this past term. Hats off to the American 10 Legion Family of Volunteers. 6	is truly about. But it's Veteran Outreach. It's an
7	Internet radio show that she started that brings the
8	latest news and information to and for veterans and their
9	families.
10	Veteran Outreach has been in production for
11	approximately 15 months. It has been heard on the
12	Internet via computers, smart phones, and telephones. The
13	shows are aired live and prerecorded and then archived on
14	their website. Veteran Outreach also trains veterans for
15	careers in media such as television, radio, Internet,
16	photography, and journalism. I believe they're trying to
17	become syndicated.
18	I'm going to have her talk more about it. She
19	has interviewed some amazing people. And I'm going to
20	maybe steal a little of her thunder in that one of the
21	women she interviewed is her name? The Goodwill. We
22	both forgot. Stephanie Stone. She works with the
23	Goodwill Industry. She received a \$7,000 grant to work
24	with women veterans that are in need of help, jobs, or are
25	on the verge of becoming homeless.

And also she celebrated the birthday of Bea 1 2 Coleman, 102-year-old woman veteran, oldest woman veteran in California. And it was an amazing celebration. It all 3 4 came about through Tammy's persevering of opening this radio station, interviewing these people. And her hats 5 6 off award is for her dynamite personality and perseverance. Tammy Sollazzo, please. 7 8 (Applause.) 9 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Tammy is an 10 extremely humble, humble person also. And she's busy taking pictures, and so she put her notes back here, but 11 she has a message for us all. 12 MS. SOLLAZZO: I'll make it brief. I started 13 with this Veteran Outreach and he has taught me a lot. 14 And because of his help, I have been able to meet a lot of 15 amazing organizations that are all nonprofit organizations 16 17 that are out there helping veterans in more ways than any of us can even imagine. And through the interviews that 18 I've done I have networked and been able to connect 19 certain organizations with other organizations so that 20 21 they can help each other. And I just truly feel blessed that I'm able to be 22 2.3 part of this radio station. We are currently on the 24 Internet if you ever want to check us out. We're at 25 www.veteran-outreach.com. And all of our shows we do

- 1 record every one live and then they are archived, so you
- 2 can go back and listen to them at any time.
- What we currently do is interview three or four
- 4 people once a month. And during that month that we're --
- 5 or the time we're not interviewing, we are out there, or I
- 6 am, hitting the pavement trying to get people to
- 7 interview. And it's -- it's amazing people that are out
- 8 there doing great things like we are for our
- 9 organizations. And I'll give you a few examples.
- 10 One that you all know, Coats of Valor. Great
- 11 organization. Two, Rescue At Sea. Have any of you ever
- 12 heard of Rescue At Sea? They're based out of San Pedro
- and they actually help veterans who had drug and alcohol
- 14 problems integrate back into society instead of going the
- 15 AA route where, you know, they sit in a room and talk and
- 16 all that stuff. So it's an amazing program.
- 17 I met Stephanie Stone, Goodwill Southern
- 18 California. And she's doing a women's veteran breakfast
- 19 every month. All women veterans are welcome. It's free,
- 20 totally free. They always have employers there. So
- 21 they're doing great things. And people don't know this so
- 22 what our radio station is doing, what we're trying to
- 23 accomplish is to get that out there so that there's one
- 24 place for everyone to go out there a veteran and say, wow,
- 25 I need this or I need that.

I met a wonderful Marine who's helping OEF return 1 2 amputees that need help with their homes. And I know District 19 jumped up on that one. We were able to pair 3 4 him with District 19 Auxiliary and they've helped out a lot. I just have interviewed some amazing, amazing 5 people. And because of them, it's what keeps me going on 6 7 continuing this because it's a lot of work. But I love 8 it. 9 I met Vet Hunters. I don't know if any of you 10 ever heard of Vet Hunters, but Joe is one man who said screw the system, excuse me, but if I have a veteran 11 that's homeless, I'm going to get him into a home and I'm 12 not going to go to the route of all the red tape. And 13 he's doing amazing things. And all these people need the 14 15 same thing we do. They need the funding. They need the public to know what's going on. They need volunteers. 16 17 we're putting that out there. And it's easy for me to interview because I just 18 say who, what, when, where, and why, and then I let them 19 do all the talking. So I love it. Any of you can do it. 20 21 And we also train other media specialists. So if you're interested, contact me. You can find me through Veteran 22 Outreach and I'm tammy@veteranoutreach.com. And I'll get 23 24 back to you right away. So that's it. 25 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: One of the reasons

I had Tammy speak about this is because she can use your 1 2 help in connecting with organizations that you know. Your units are working with outreach type organizations that 3 have things to offer, and her goal is to get this all in 4 one spot where our veterans can go and get help. So if 5 6 your unit has any information about someone that -- or a group, please come to her, talk to her, let her interview 7 and get them on this radio station. 8 9 Thank you, Tammy, so much. And hats off. 10 (Applause.) DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: What is the value 11 of one member? Ten little members standing in a line, one 12 just disliked the president, then there were nine. 13 Nine district members offered to work late, one 14 15 forgot her program, then there were eight. Eight creative members had good ideas as good as 16 heaven, one lost enthusiasm, then there were seven. 17 Seven loyal members got into a fix, they 18 quarrelled over programs, and then there were six. 19 One dropped out, then there were five. 20 21 Four cheerful members who never disagreed until one complained of meetings, then there were three. 22 23 Two little lonely members, our rhyme is nearly done, one joined a bridge club, and then there was one. 24 25 One faithful member was feeling rather blue, met

with a neighbor, then there were two. 1 2 Two earnest members each enrolled one more, doubling their numbers, then there were four. 3 Four determined members just couldn't wait until 4 each one had another, and then there were eight. 5 6 Eight excited members signed up 16 more. another six verses, there will be 1,024. 7 8 (Applause.) DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: If each of us 9 10 enrolled one new member, think where we would be in our numbers? And we need those numbers to help build the 11 mission that we have. 12 Ladies, at this time, believe it or not, we're a 13 little early so I will be recessing us for the evening. 14 15 We will be reconvening promptly at 8:30. Now remember tomorrow be sure and order your 16 17 boxed lunch before you come into convene because we will be recessing 15 minutes to go get our box lunches and come 18 back for an extremely, extremely important workshop being 19 given by Past Department Present Ruby "Taxes" Kapsalis and 20 21 Diane DeLashmit. And I would like to encourage every 22 delegate to do this. And it's important for your units 23 and it's important for your districts and it's important 24 for more than one person to hear it because we all know 25 how that can happen.
