We have the beautiful poppy design that's on the front of them that's available in both MasterCard and American Express. No annual fees, low interest rate, as low as 10.9.

You also get one reward point for you on every dollar you spend. On the American Express version you get two points for every dollar you send on gas and groceries. And for every credit card that is opened, the American Legion Auxiliary gets money back supporting programs and services.

And all the retail spent, you ladies out there shopping -- I'm not saying run up any debt. You know, just do your normal everyday purchases, put it on your card and pay USAA, you know, for what you spend, the American Legion Auxiliary gets a percentage of your retail spent and so does the department of California.

The National headquarters is looking to share some of that money with the department, but we have to break through that initial guarantee that they're receiving, and the more cards they have in the market, the more you're using it, the more money goes back to support your programs and services.

So I just wanted to let you all know about that. And I know everybody has seen these lovely bags going around town everywhere. And I'm always being asked how can I get one. We gave these at National Convention. We'll probably do the same this year, but, Madam President, I also put a few back there in the office for you to award however you feel. Okay? And there's also some credit card applications back there for the MasterCard version. If you need to apply for the American Express, the phone numbers are on the back. You can see it in the magazine ad or on the website or you can go on usaa.com/ala.

So if you all have any questions for me, let Madam President know or you can come and see me over at the Riviera. We have a booth set up to talk about services of USAA. And so have a blessed convention. I wish you well. For God and Country, thank you.

NATIONAL VICE PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: But it's been a really good year. You've taken on some really big challenges this year and you've done an amazing job. And I think each one of us thanks you for that.

I want to bring greetings from the National organization. I want to thank each and every one of you for your support over the last -- it's taken ten years and it's two months away, so that's pretty darn exciting. And I'm glad that I'll be able to share it with each one of you as we go.
(Applause.)
NATIONAL VICE PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: Thank you. Little special note. Every National president has a scrapbook chairman. So I had a special scrapbook chairman from California, and it's Kendall Madsen. And for the very first time we're going to do that scrapbook electronically. So it's going to be exciting and you're
going to be able to follow me along and Kendall will get the information out. So you'll be able to see where I go on my travels.

So thank you each and every one of you. This is my home. This is California. This has been my life for the last -- I'm not telling you how old I am. And it's really hot; can you believe that? So thank you again.

And, Terry, I want to wish you a really successful, exciting, and fun convention.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Thank you. We see Nancy's postings on-line. She spends most of her life anymore on airplanes.

Barbara, go ahead.

READING OF CONVENTION RULES

RULES CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Good morning. Good morning, Madam President Terry. At this time I will present the convention rules. Your convention rules can be found on page 10 of the Book of Reports. Excuse me.

Madam Department President Terry, I will hesitate after each rule. Or if there's a question or an amendment, it may be presented at that time.

The department rules. All meetings of the
convention shall be called to order at a designated time or as soon thereafter as a quorum is present.

A quorum shall exist when one-third of the units in good standing are partially or wholly represented by all elected delegates or alternates.

The audience shall remain seated during the business of the convention. The department president shall designate certain doors to accommodate delegates who find it necessary to enter or leave the convention hall during the reports of committees or when a speaker has the floor. Cell phones must be turned off or in vibrate mode.

The chair may deviate from the printed program when necessary or expedient.

The credentials chairman shall report registration as directed by the Chair.

The registration of the delegates and alternates shall be closed at 9:00 a.m. on Saturday, June 29th, 2013. Only qualified delegates shall have a voice or a vote. It shall be the responsibility of each district president, excuse me, to see that only accredited delegates and alternates serving as delegates are seated in her district delegation during the business meetings of the convention.

If a delegate expects to be absent from the convention, except for the purpose of attending a committee meeting, she shall relinquish her delegate card
to her alternate. The alternate shall then take her seat in the voting section. In the event the delegate does not have the opportunity of reporting to the district president, it shall become the duty of the chairman of the unit to report to the district president the absence of the delegate and the presence of the alternate or the absence of both the delegate and the alternate.

A delegate wishing the privilege of the floor shall rise, address the chair as "Madam Department President," give her name, unit and district number, pause, and wait to be recognized by the Chair.

A member speaking in debate on a question shall be limited to three minutes. No one shall speak more than twice on the same question without consent of the assembly.

Delegates attending called committee meetings shall be notified when the convention is considering and voting upon adoption of any change in policy or matters affecting finance.

Reports of committees which do not appear to be controversial in nature may be adopted by the general consent. If there is no objection or if there is objection, a vote shall be taken. Following the acceptance of a report of a committee, recommendations or resolutions may be presented for consideration and
adoption.
Any committee whose proposed changes in policy might conflict with that of the American Legion shall confer with the American Legion before presenting said change to the convention.

A committee recommending an appropriation of funds for any purpose shall consult with the department finance committee before presenting the recommendation or resolution to the convention.

All resolutions to be presented to the convention shall be in triplicate and properly signed.

Committees may amend resolutions and recommendations referred to them before favorably reporting same. Resolutions or recommendations rejected by a committee shall be marked "rejected," signed by the chairman of the committee, and returned to the department resolutions chairman immediately following the committee meeting.

A unit, district, or members presenting a resolution or recommendation shall have the privilege of explaining same to the committee to which it was referred.

Committees shall report to the convention all resolutions properly submitted and accepted by a majority convention committee.

A resolution rejected by a committee may be
brought before the convention by a two-thirds vote.
Emergency resolutions which may arise during the convention or after the date for submitting resolutions may be presented no later than noon of the second day of convention.

Nominations of officers, junior member finance, department delegates, and alternates to the National Convention shall be held Thursday, June 27th afternoon -excuse me Thursday. June afternoon -- Thursday afternoon June 27th.

NATIONAL VA\&R COMMITTEE MEMBER CAPAZZI: No.
RULES CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Is that wrong?
The endorsement of candidates for National office shall follow the nominations.

Nomination speeches shall be limited to three minutes. There shall be no seconding of speeches.

Election of department officers, junior member of finance, National candidate, department delegates, and alternates to the National Convention shall be held on Saturday, June 29th, 2013.

The doors of the convention hall shall be closed during the entire election procedure and no one shall leave or enter the hall until the Chair states that the election is concluded. The exception to this shall be that in an emergency a member may leave, and if her
absence affects the voting strength, the district president shall immediately notify the presiding officer.

When there is but one nominee for department offices and but one nominee for junior member of finance, the nominees shall be elected viva voce. Upon roll call, the district presidents shall report the number of units partially or wholly represented by duly elected delegates or alternates present in the delegation at the time of roll call. This is to determine that there is a quorum of units present at the time of the election.

When there is more than one nominee for the department offices or junior member of the finance or National office, election shall be by written ballot. The district presidents shall, when they are instructed by the Chair, take a roll call of their respective delegations to ascertain the total voting strength of their district for the election reporting the same to the Chair. When there is but one nominee for office or junior member of the finance, the ballot may be dispensed with a nominee elected viva voce.

When there are three or more nominees for an office or a junior member of the finance, unless one nominee receives a majority vote on the first ballot, the nominee receiving the lowest number of votes shall be automatically dropped before proceeding with the next
ballot.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Barbara, you have a correction on number 22 .

RULES CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Okay.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Nominations of officers, junior member finance, department delegates, and alternates to the National Convention shall be held Friday afternoon, June 28th, 2013.

RULES CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Okay. I said Thursday, didn't I? I'm sorry. Okay. I'll change that.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Excuse me, Barbara. The same on 25.

RULES CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Okay.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Twenty-five should reflect the $29 t h$, June $29 t h$.

RULES CHAIRMAN DAVIS: It does say June 29th. Okay. Madam Department President, this concludes the reading of the convention rules. I move that the convention rules be considered seriatim and be adopted as a whole.

PARLIAMENTARIAN KAPSALIS: Second.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: It has been moved and seconded that the rules be accepted seriatim and adopted as a whole. Is there any discussion?
(No response.)

Thank you, Madam Department President Terry for this appointment and for the opportunity to serve you for the department of California.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Thank you, Barbara.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Anita, please come take the chair. I'm going to be going to the legion.
(Processional.)

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: The Department President Terry is going to visit the Legion at this time. We will now have the report of the National Executive Committeewoman Linda Fercho.

NATIONAL EXECUTIVE COMMITTEEWOMAN REPORT

NEC CHAIRMAN FERCHO: Good morning, everyone. AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Good morning.

NEC CHAIRMAN FERCHO: To this beautiful day, sunshiny day. I think we should be glad we're inside. Although some of you are waving your fans. I guess maybe it's not quite cool enough for you. Give us ten seconds or ten minutes and our temperatures will change. Just give her a minute.

Madam President Wizard, I want you to know that I've enjoyed being your National Executive Committeewoman this year. I have been asked what is the definition of the job of the NEC woman. This is it in a nutshell because it's quite lengthy and a lot of responsibility, but as a member of the American Legion Auxiliary National Executive Committee, my primary role as a member of the organization's National governing body is to protect the organization.

My primary responsibility is to serve as a
forward-thinking steward of the organization to ensure its financial sufficiency and organizational integrity so that the future generations also have an opportunity to participate in our mission. You are responsible for reviewing and improving the mission and strategic direction, annual budget and key financial transactions, and fiscal and governance policies. You're the liaison between the National organization and your department.

This being said, the National organization is encouraging every department to consider electing their National NEC woman rather than appointing them as we do here in California. Our constitutional bylaws states that the Junior Past President will automatically become California's NEC woman. This is true in probably 99 percent of the departments in the nation. The reason behind their thinking -- and, ladies, this is not pointing a finger at California -- is that it would ensure that the members of the NEC are better qualified to do the job. It would eliminate those that are just there because of the rotation of positions in their department, not because they understand what the position is and the responsibility level they will have.

They also recommend this be a two-year position for continuity. This does not mean that it would not be the Junior Past President, as she could certainly throw
her hat in the ring and run for the position, but it would also give anyone who wishes an opportunity to run for this position.

I feel that California needs to consider this and that our incoming president appoints a committee that would investigate the pros and cons and come up with a job description for someone wishing to hold this position and a plan for seeing if California wishes to consider implementing this change.

The NEC is sent and goes over many resolutions and their changes. One important resolution that was passed by the NEC was to ask the assistance of the American Legion to obtain a federal charter for the American Legion Auxiliary. The American Legion Auxiliary is not a federally chartered organization and never has been. The American Legion Auxiliary is an international organization incorporated in and nationally headquartered in the State of Indiana. We are still independent of the American Legion and could continue to exist shall a post turn in their charter as a widow unit because each unit has its own charter independent of the post.

Having a federal charter does not change the Auxiliary's relationship to the Legion. Having a federal charter will ensure certain federal protections for the Auxiliary as a tax exempt organization and as a female
organization, especially in its operation of gender-specific (all-female) programs. And this has been done. And the Legion will assist us so that will be going forward and it will take quite a while for the process because Congress doesn't move real fast, but at least we do have their support and they are going to go forward and honor our request.

Now before you get really excited about me busting Michelle Soares, our poppy chairman's, bubble, I checked with her before I put the following information in my report.

As NEC I received some exciting news. The Legion NEC has adopted a new national poppy program resolution that provides much more program flexibility. This resolution takes effect immediately and is now the only American Legion poppy resolution in force.

This is just an overview. The entire resolution will be brought forward under the next president's poppy chairman's duties. She will be going forward, I'm sure, explaining it more and getting it out, but this is just it in a nutshell, what was the overview of what was adopted.

It allows anyone to make the poppies with preference being for veterans to do so. Poppies can be commercially made if it's efficient to do so because people are not readily available to make them. It allows
poppies to be made from any material and allows other poppy items can be made/used to distribute for contributions to benefit the program. It removes some provisions that are 40 years old. Poppy funds can no longer be used for mileage to attend conferences, et cetera.

Poppy funds collected from May 9th, 2013 on can be used to benefit veterans, active duty military, and their families. Specifically for the rehabilitation of hospitalized military service personnel returning home and awaiting discharge who require treatment in service hospitals. And for the welfare of veterans, active military personnel, and their families of veterans and active military personnel of the above-named period where financial and medical need is evident.

So with the new resolution, what does this mean for doing the poppy program? At this time the National organization has put in place an Ad Hoc Poppy Future Committee and National Poppy Committee who will be giving us more information.

Remember this resolution covers the entire nation and it does not mean that California has to change the way we have been implementing the program at all. Many states in our nation do not have the access to the veterans we do. We're so fortunate. We have so many veteran
facilities, hospitals, homes, veteran homes where we can access veterans, but other states aren't that fortunate. Other states do not have that access. So this just gives flexibility. It doesn't mean we change anything, ladies. That will be up to the department of California and next year's régime to decide if there is any changes. So it's just giving us flexibility.

And I think the major thing here for me anyway is just that we now can service active duty military. I think some of us have been doing it. Now it's going to be legal. So I think that's the most important part of this revamping this program.
(Applause.)
NEC CHAIRMAN FERCHO: Madam Wizard, this completes my report.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: I'm not a wizard.

NEC CHAIRMAN FERCHO: Right now you are. You are just standing in for -- well, you're really standing in for her. Thank you very much.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you.
NEC CHAIRMAN FERCHO: Thank you, ladies, very much for your service.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you,
Linda. Right now will the Sergeant-at-Arms and Marshal,
along with the Distinguished Guest Chairman, do we have our poppy girl here?

ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEMBER CUCCARO: She is.
She's out in the hallway.
DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Can you round her up so we can run her around the room. Okay. I think we've got her. We wrangled her in.

Sargent-At-Arms and Marshal, along with the Distinguished Guest Chairman, are escorting Gabrielle Ursuy, also know as Miss Poppy.
(Processional.)
DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Poppy Chairman Michelle.

POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: Gabby is our 2012-2013 Miss Poppy. She's in the 13 and up category. And we're so proud of her promoting poppies this year. Gabby, I want to award you with this beautiful sash for the princess that you are.
(Applause.)
POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: And Gabby also has a winning poster there in the back also for her class which was Class 4. So if you want to look at her poster too. She did beautiful work for poppies this year. And here are our certificates.
(Applause.)

POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: I also wanted to present her with a coin that says "American Legion Auxiliary" on the front. On the back it has the poppy. It says, "Serving our veterans and community," and she has done that all year long.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you. Thank you, Michelle, and thank you, Gabrielle, for coming today. Give our poppy, Miss Poppy a big round of applause.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS:
Sergeant-at-Arms and Marshal please escort -- Gabby, do you want to say anything? We normally like to hear the voice of Miss Poppy. But our National Vice President would like to get a picture of you if you would just hang a minute. You guys can sit down.

All right. Photo op. And would our Chaplain Marge, you're going to report next.

ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEMBER CUCCARO: Where is she from?

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Where is our Miss Poppy from, Michelle? She's busy smiling. Gabby is from Unit 14, District 25.
(Applause.)

                        CHAPLAIN REPORT
    CHAPLAIN RYE: Good morning, ladies. Do I have my recipients up here at the stage? The chaplains of our department have done a wonderful job this year in service and reporting. Of the 29 districts there were 29 reports which gave me 100 percent reporting.
(Applause.)
CHAPLAIN RYE: That's just the greatest reporting for a chaplain. I'm sorry. My statistical information was not available at the time to go into the Book of Reports because of the other items coming in afterwards and such. So in the -- my statistics are the number of deceased members was 314. Memorial services were held on -- in 95 units. Eighty-two charters were draped.

Memorial contributions received were 40 units received $\$ 3,690$. Units participating in Chapel of 4 Chaplains was 36. Units donating to Chapel of 4 Chaplains, there were 37 units donated $\$ 1580$. Units donating to In Loving Tribute, there were 32 units donated $\$ 1,138$. 193 units participated in Memorial Day, 136 for Independence, 107 for 9/11, and 157 for Veteran's Day. That seems like an awfully low number. I'm sure that they did a lot more.

Units participating in Heroes to Hometown were 41. Make A Difference Day, 41; Healing Fields, three; and Community Support were 102. Now that one I know should be much, much larger. Number of all types of cards sent were 7400. Number preparing a prayer book was 16 . Sending prayers for Department President's prayer book were 12. Sending prayers for National President's prayer book were 12. Using the Reflections page of the ALA magazine were 83 and using Grace Cards were 20.

Our chaplains visited patients in hospitals, VA homes, convalescent hospitals, and those were homebound. They provided spiritual uplifting through prayer and bible reading, transportation to doctor appointments, and did shopping and prepared meals for those who needed assistance. One unit assisted in covering the cost of rebuilding a walk-in shower for a longtime Auxiliary
member who was recovering from surgery. While she was in the convalescent home they spent 50 hours fellowshipping and reading the bible to her, taking her on day trips in her wheelchair, shopping for items to assist in her care, and items to eat as well as providing her with a manicure and pedicure. They were able to get over $\$ 7,000$ of dental work donated to restore her teeth.

Another unit provided more than 100 handmade blankets to 70 veterans in assisted living facilities and nursing homes. One veteran admired his blanket and with tears in his eyes said, "I am always cold and I appreciate your gift."

Our chaplains reached out with their loving hearts to their communities, children and youth, the elderly who were alone or in need, to our veterans and their families. They provided gas, transportation, clothing, and food through their Feed the Veterans program. They visited veterans in hospitals and homes and saw that their holidays were not spent alone.

Our compassion and giving chaplains through God's graces were able to touch and uplift the lives of so many people even when all they needed was just a hug or a kind smile from someone.

Now I would like -- Madam President, I would like to present or announce my first place awards.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Please do so. CHAPLAIN RYE: Okay. For first place in Unit Supplemental -- before $I$ do this let me tell you.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Marge, did you have a budget committee report?

CHAPLAIN RYE: Yes, I do.
DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Can you give that first?

CHAPLAIN RYE: Yes, I will.
DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you.
CHAPLAIN RYE: The convention committee for the chaplain met on June 27th, 2013 in the Vista Room of the Doral Hotel, Palm Springs, California at 10:00 a.m. The statistical report I just read. Michelle Soares was appointed secretary. Mary Chava offered prayer, and Arlene Bartlyn was appointed Sergeant-At-Arms. A total of 20 districts answered roll call and four visitors were present.

The committee agreed on the following report: We opened with prayer and flag salute. Discussion was held on recommendations. Unit forms and district forms for reporting were recommended to be more number consistent with like a mirror image because the numbers didn't jibe from the units to the district report forms. And then we closed with prayer at 10:35. There were no
recommendations for any code changes.
Okay. Now back to my awards. I brought my awards to print here, but the hotel does not have the facilities for me to do that. So I wanted to bring you guys up here to recognize you. I do have certificates for a couple of you, but the other certificates will be mailed out to you and I will get them to you as soon as possible, but I want you to be recognized.

CHAPLAIN RYE: Okay. Second place for unit prayer book goes to District 19, Unit 314 Hawthorne, Jean Cooley-Desmeules.
(Applause.)
CHAPLAIN RYE: And third place went to -- for the unit prayer book went to District 16, Unit 56 Corporal

It was very eye opening and I learned an awful lot about it's not just saying prayers at the beginning and ending and sending out cards. There's a lot more involved. But I do thank you for the appointment, and that concludes -- this concludes my --
(Applause.)

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you, Marge. Thank you very much.

Okay. The next officer we're going to hear from will be the musician and then the historian and then the Sergeant-at-Arms in that order. So right now we will hear from our Musician Kat Conrad. Here she comes all decked
out in her fairy clothes.

MUSICIAN REPORT

MUSICIAN CONRAD: Good morning. First off I would like to apologize for not making it to midyear at Travis. I did receive songs from a couple of districts and I will be making certificates for District 18 and District 22. Thank you because they were very, very good. (Applause.)

MUSICIAN CONRAD: Some chairmen requested songs as well. I have posted a list of song choices at the department office and while we are here, if you come up with a song I will try to find it and add it to the list. I also have a copy up here at my musical station if you want to come up and see it and add to it.

Coming from the Emerald Triangle from District 1 was quite an adventure and it was a magic carpet ride. Thank you, Madam President, for this appointment and your Wood Nymph may run around with few clothes on in this heat, but not just leaves. I blend in in the forest and the mountains where I reside, but here in the sand not so much. Have a great convention and I hope to keep the music flowing. And that concludes my report.
(Applause.)

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Excuse me, Kat. Kat, do you have a preconvention committee report?

MUSICIAN CONRAD: I do not.
DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Okay. Thank you very much. We will now hear from our Historian, Carol Fuqua.

HISTORIAN REPORT

HISTORIAN FUQUA: Good morning, ladies. The Historian Committee met in the Canyon Suite B of the Doral Hotel on June 27th, 2013 at 11:00 a.m. Jean Cooley-Desmeules from District 19 was appointed secretary. Jen Paxton from District 25 was appointed chaplain. Lupe Galaviz from District 18 was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms.

Eighteen delegates answered roll call. Three guests were present. The statistical report for Historian can be found on page 16 in the Department Book of Reports.

The code was read and there were no changes or recommendations made. Citations were given out for second and third place supplementals for districts and units for the districts with 100 percent reporting, for the district sending in the most photos, for units completing the Veteran History Project, and second and third place Picture and Written History Books for districts and units.

The meeting adjourned at 11:30 a.m. This concludes my historian committee report.

Madam Vice President, may I continue with my supplemental and my first place awards?

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Yes, you may.
HISTORIAN FUQUA: Greetings to Madam President and to the convention delegation. This year it was a magical time in the department of California. Once upon a time there came a great wizard from the land of Shasta. This wizard's name was Terry. She watched over all the magical kingdoms from the country called California. It was a pleasure to attend some of President Terry's district visitations and attend 5th Area Auxiliary
meetings and numerous fundraisers for the American Legion Family. This historian has so much enjoyed meeting Auxiliary ladies and their Legion Families of California. Thank you to all for your gracious hospitality during my visits.

Madam President, thank you for this appointment.

appears on page 14 on the Book of Reports. Marcia Munroe, District 11, was appointed secretary. Diana Livas, District 19, was appointed chaplain. Rita Smith, District 29, was appointed as Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 21 district delegates answered roll call and we had three visitors.

The Department Community Service code was read with zero changes. Certificates for midyear awards were handed out and for second and third place awards were handed out. There were no resolutions and no recommendations. And with no further business, the meeting of the membership committee adjourned at 10:40 a.m. And there's a typo in my report.

May I continue with my supplemental?
DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Yes, you may.
COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN KARANICKOLAS: Our members have been very active in our communities and have helped to make them the best they can be. We made great strides in being part of the community events not only during the holidays, but all day long. Our members can be seen out and about as well as behind the scenes. Our dedicated members gave generously of their time, money, and hard work.

The end of year reports received have shown that the units have been working in a variety of ways to honor
the service of our veterans, active duty personnel, and military families. Our members participated in each of the National Auxiliary recognized days of service and they made sure that Make a Difference Day is every day.

We had 100 percent reporting from our districts and the statistics can be found in the Book of Reports. These statistics show that our members donated over $\$ 98,637$ and spent over 99,541 aiding our local food banks, senior centers, homeless shelters, medical clinics, nursing home, libraries, and museums.

We participated in recycling and community beautification, such as maintaining a rose garden in their city local post. We walked many miles to promote cancer awareness and women's programs.

Our members promoted homelessness prevention and we participated in local Stand Downs. One unit handed out small metal flat cans with a candy bar inside and poppy and told them to give their wife a box of candy and a flower. It is the simple things that can bring so much joy.

Our members supported veteran's recovery homes, welcome home celebrations, local USO facilities, the PIER center, rescue missions, Feed the Hungry, and Meals on Wheels programs. We volunteered at Family Readiness Group Family Days and at the Ronald McDonald House. Our members
take pride in paying it forward.
We offered comfort at our local rest homes, supported our local after school programs, senior outreach programs, and transportation for those who do not drive. We visited shut-ins, provided them with home cooked meals and even took them to doctor's appointments.

We received donations from our local businesses and were able to send care packages to our troops in harm's way. We received children's clothing to give to needy families. We received evening dresses and handbags for the young wives who would not have been able to attend the military ball. We filled backpacks for needy children returning to school. It is just so rewarding to see a child's smile when they are given a new backpack filled with school supplies.

A few ways our members were able to generate donations was to hold soup socials, rummage sales, bake sales, cake walks, and boutiques. Many of our members are "happy hookers." They knit sweaters, hats, scarfs, and crochet lap blankets which are donated to our veterans and the homeless. And you know who you "happy hookers" are.

We participated in community parades, Chamber of Commerce events, Law and Order events, and local church events. We decorated rooms in nursing and assisted living facilities.

LEGISLATIVE REPORT

LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN FERCHO: Good morning, again. The preconvention Legislative meeting was called to order at 11:00 a.m. in the Canyon Suite D at the El Doral Resort in Palm Springs on June 27th, 2013. The statistical report of this chairman appears on page 18 of the Book of Reports.

The delegates approved of the following appointments: Secretary: Delores Ryan, District 15. Chaplain: Barbara LaDoucer, District 4. Sergeant-At-Arms: Jeri Adams, District 16.

Chaplain offered prayer. Pledge of Allegiance was led by the sergeant-at-arms and the preamble was recited. Kind of. Kind of.

The secretary proceeded with roll call. There were 18 delegates present and three guests. The code was read and one code change was presented. It was moved and seconded and passed in committee to present to this delegation.

At this time, Madam President, I would like to read that code change.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: I don't have a copy of your code change.

LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN FERCHO: They're handing it out right now. It's attached to the minutes of my meeting. Attached to the minutes of the meeting.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Go ahead.
LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN FERCHO: Thank you. Code 2
now reads: "The Department Chairman may attend the Awareness Assembly sponsored by the National organization if approved by the Department President. Funds not to exceed $\$ 125$ per diem for three days shall be budgeted annually to help defray the cost of attending the Awareness Assembly."

Code change to read: "The Department Chairman may attend the American Legion Auxiliary Washington D.C. Conference sponsored by the National organization if approved by the Department President. The chairman's expenses cannot exceed the amount budgeted annually to
help defray the costs of attending the American Legion Auxiliary Washington D.C. Conference."

The rationale for this change is that the National -- National has changed the name of the event from the "Awareness Assembly" to the "American Legion Auxiliary Washington D.C. Conference," so we need to change this code to reflect this change. Also at this time we budget $\$ 1,000$ for the chairman to attend this event, but this amount has to be approved by the delegation annually when accepting the budget. Changing the wording of the sentence number 2 in this code to read: "The chairman's expenses cannot exceed the amount budgeted annually to help defray the cost of attending the American Legion Auxiliary Washington D.C. Conference" we accomplish two things: One, if the budgeted amount changes we are not -- if the budgeted amount changes, we are not locked into a figure. And, two, if the length of the conference changes, we are not locked into three days.

Madam President, I move the acceptance of this code change.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: There is a motion to change the code in the legislative. It now reads: "The Department Chairman may attend the Awareness Assembly sponsored by the National organization if approved by the Department President. Funds not to exceed
$\$ 125$ per diem for three days shall be budgeted annually to help defray the cost of attending the Awareness Assembly."

Changed to read: "The Department Chairman may attend the American Legion Auxiliary Washington D.C. Conference sponsored by the National organization if approved by the Department President. The chairman's exceeds cannot exceed the amount budgeted annually to help defray the costs of attending the American Legion Auxiliary Washington D.C. Conference."

Is there any discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: All those in favor of this code change? Okay. Come to the microphone, please.

FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: The rationale at this time says that we budget a thousand. Well, our budget was changed to 375 , so $I$ just wanted to bring that up because --

LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN FERCHO: That was approved at last convention was 1,000.

FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Yes, that was 1,000. So just keep that in mind because the expenses. I know you want this at your discretion, but I just wanted to mention --

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: I'm sorry,

Norma. Would you please repeat the first part of what you stated? I couldn't see or hear you.

FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Well, if
the rationale was we budgeted 1,000 last year --
DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Right.
FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Well, this year we dropped it down to 375.

LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN FERCHO: That's when you present the budget this year and that's at the discretion. If per that amount changes, if we change this code, whatever is budgeted would be accepted.

FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: So we're eliminating all the dollar figures.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Yes, because you're budgeting -- you have it in the budget the amount that's going to be hopefully approved as 375 for the entire time.

FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Okay. That's all I wanted to bring up, so --

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you. Is that right? Ruby would like to speak.

PARLIAMENTARIAN KAPSALIS: Madam Department President, Ruby Kapsalis, Past Department President. The code -- the code currently allows 125 days for -- $\$ 375$. 125 days. All right. You've already wore me out. This
parliamentarian job really gets to you and finance and all this other stuff.

Anyway, $\$ 125$ for three days. And the reasoning behind that is because as NEC, she gets her airfare paid by National, plus she gets one day's per diem. So I don't see a problem myself in taking the $\$ 1,000$ that was budgeted erroneously last year because it should have been budgeted for 375, removing the dollar amount and just letting the finance committee review it annually and approving it.

LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN FERCHO: I really -- Madam President, I just think that's what I was trying to stress in this change was to eliminate the dollar amount, so as it changes --

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you.
LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN FERCHO: Because it could change all the way around lots of times.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you. Any further discussion on this motion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: All those in favor, say aye.

ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Any opposed say no.
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Motion carries. You can continue.

LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN FERCHO: Thank you, thank you. We had no resolutions. Awards were handed out and a copy of the list was placed in the delegates' packets and posted in the department office.

Madam Wizard, this completes the minutes of the legislative meeting. May I continue with my state remarks and first place awards?

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Yes, you may.
LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN FERCHO: Madam Wizard, thank you for giving me this appointment. It has been an honor to serve as your Legislative Chairman this year. I want to thank all the grassroots advocates and Giant Slayers, unit and district legislative chairmen for your constant pursuit this year to make our legislators aware of legislation that affects our veterans, active military and their families.

This year we were dubbed "Giant Slayers," and what an appropriate term. I know that many of you have felt like David and the establishment being Goliath and you would not be far from the truth. Many times I know that it feels like it's an overwhelming task to try and conquer all the many pieces of legislation that is out
there that affects our veterans and our military, but through your attendance at the Department of California Day at the State Capitol May 1st and the 2013 Washington conference, we have certainly thrown many stones in our efforts to slay the giant.

I also want to thank all the Legislative Chairmen for their determination and diligence in conveying to their members not only the importance of bombarding our giants with e-mails, letters, and texts, but also for their efforts in organizing town meetings, town home meetings, meeting the candidate night, and all the other forms of forums that gave our grassroots advocates an opportunity to impress on our legislatures who we are, what we are do, and making it very clear that we would not stand for them balancing the budget on the backs of our veterans and our active duty military.
(Applause.)
LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN FERCHO: Thank you. With this being presidential election year, our grassroots advocates really rolled up their sleeves and picked up a bunch of stones and off they went into battle. They worked numerous hours making sure that everyone that was eligible to vote signed up to vote. They worked at campaign headquarters for the candidates of their choice. They assisted in polling places and volunteering to take
members that do not drive to polling places to vote.
One huge issue that California went to battle on was letting our giants know that our troops didn't get their absentee ballots to vote in the election. And this was inexcusable. These men and women are overseas fighting for our country and our right to vote and they didn't get to participate in the election. That is not just not okay.

Our members volunteered over 923 hours this year to slay the giants, and I feel that many of their stones hit the mark and our legislatures are well aware of who we are and our mission. But we can't stop now. We can't ever stop. This is all -- there is always new legislation being presented that affects our veterans, active duty military and their families and their way of life. We must continue being diligent giant slayers and grassroots advocates to ensure that our veterans and military have all the benefits they deserve and have fought for.

LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN FERCHO: Second place Unit Supplemental went to Danielle White, District 27.
(Applause.)
LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN FERCHO: First place Unit Supplemental goes to Unit 118, District 27, Danielle White.
(Applause.)
LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN FERCHO: That little
leprechaun is just kind of pooped a little. She's been hopping around getting our membership up there and just doing an amazing job on that. But congratulations, Danielle, very much. You need this present. Trust me. When this is over, you need it. You need it.

LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN FERCHO: Thank you. This concludes my report.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you very much, Linda. We will now hear from our Americanism Chairman Loretta Marsh. Is Girls State ready, Rhodona? AUDIENCE MEMBER: She's not here right now. DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: I guess she's not ready yet.

AMERICANISM REPORT

AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MARSH: Good morning, ladies. The convention committee on Americanism met June 27 th at the Canyon Suite $C$ room at the Doral Resort in Palm Springs, California. The statistical report of the chairman appears on page 13 on your Book of Reports.

Tamra Duron from District 25 served as secretary, Alzora Carter from District 23 offered prayer, and Delores Ryan was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 20 districts answered roll call and there were seven visitors present.

The committee agreed on the following report: The Americanism committee was called to order at 10:00 a.m. The department code was read and there were no code changes. Discussion followed with suggestions to improve and promote the essay contest. Several good suggestions were given and recommendations will be written up and
passed to the next chairman. Second and third place awards were presented for essays and supplementals. The meeting was adjourned at 10:46 am.

Madam President, that's my committee report. May
I proceed with my supplemental?
DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Yes, you may. AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MARSH: In keeping with Department President's theme, the District Americanism Chairmen were known as "Firecrackers" and the unit chairmen as "Sparklers" to signify they were the spark and energy for patriotism in their districts and units. Along with the motto "Veterans, Our Biggest Treasure," how could we not have a fun and productive year. We started the year with workshops across the state to inform the new district and unit chairmen, and I should have also added department chairman, what their chairmanship responsibilities and possibilities were. That a packet was mailed to each district that included the department code and paperwork pertinent to the Americanism program. The Americanism essay contest showed a disappointing participation rate according to the reports received by this chairman. Concerns expressed were too few teachers who were willing to participate, school districts had no time on their agendas, too few willing unit chairmen to take on this task, and too many other
organizations offering the same program. But although participation on the department level could definitely use some improvement, those that did participate expressed appreciation for the program and did a great job.

The following essay titles for the year 2013-2014 were approved at midyear. They were Group 1, grades 4 and 5: Why should I show respect for the American flag? Group 2, grades 6 and 7: How can I make a difference where I am? Group 3, grades 8 and 9: What does the Pledge of Allegiance mean to me? Group 4, grades 10 to 12: Why should I care about the elections? Group 5, exceptional needs, What is a veteran?

I don't know if you've noticed the theme. Every title makes them think about what it means to them, not just a general idea, but what it personally means to them.

Units reported folding and giving out pocket flags to departing servicemen and those already deployed. Many units found motivation and enthusiasm to "Get Out the Vote." The campaign took route in different directions including issuing pamphlets, giving rides to local polling places, working on voter registration, manning polling places, speaking to others about the importance of voting, attending panels discussions and election time, printed articles in newsletters, work telephone campaigns, set up booths at local events, e-mail promotions, talking to
community groups, talking to people at their workplace, and even having students decorate ballot boxes.

Promoting citizenship is a very underreported activity because members promote citizenship every day in ways they don't even realize. Members reported serving on jury duty, donating and volunteering for various charities, honored Citizenship Day with a dinner and dance with their essay dinner as a special guest, mentoring people attending citizenship classes and programs, teaching flag etiquette to schools and youth groups, sponsoring post contests, planting a flower garden for POW/MIA day, various walks for charity, and helping neighbors in need.

One district participates as a district in working with the immigration service providing poppy corsages, patriotic ribbons, flags, flag pins, and flag etiquette pamphlets. Auxiliary members also serve alongside the Legionnaires in the Honor Guard for memorial services.

Auxiliary members played an important role in American Legion programs in the form of donations, fundraisers, serving as judges and helping promote the oratorical contest in the schools and served as moral support for the Legion as only Auxiliary members can do.

A favorite part of the Americanism program is, of
course, when we can proudly present and show off the beautiful flag of our country. Auxiliary members distribute flags to students, neighbors, new and soon-to-be citizens, and members of the business community. Flag folding and flag etiquette are taught at every opportunity. Flag retirement ceremonies, Scouting activity, local parades, patriotic holidays, unit meetings, memorial services, and visiting school classrooms are all occasions where the showing and the pride in the red, white, and blue excel. Along with the American flag, the blue star and gold star banners are dear to the heart of the Auxiliary. Many units presented their flags in their communities.

Patriotic and veterans holidays are celebrated by Auxiliary members. Parades and dinners abound. Thousands of flags are placed in cemeteries across the state on Memorial Day. Wreaths displaying flags and poppies are placed at Veteran memorials.

The statistical -- as I said, the statistical records for Americanism can be found in the Book of Records. A list of all second and third place winners and 100 percent reporting awards has been, or will be right after this meeting, posted in the department office for your viewing. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: We'll now have the report of our Secretary/Treasurer Peggy Vogele.

SECRETARY/TREASURER REPORT

SECRETARY/TREASURER VOGELE: Good morning. Roar. This past year the Dragon Lair's pot of gold has been shining like a beacon due to all of you leprechauns that have been sending in.

As of this past Wednesday, the Department of California is sixth in the nation with membership of 97.2 percent.
(Applause.)
SECRETARY/TREASURER VOGELE: That equals 24,000 members. We can still bring that number up so Madam Department President Wiz and our new Nancy Brown -- and our own Nancy Brown-Park, who is the American Legion Auxiliary National Vice President, will be really shining at this year's National Convention in Houston, Texas. Our pot of gold, department membership clerk, says to give all of you members out there a huge kiss and an I love you.

If you attended midyear, you heard me saying that we are now on our fourth bookkeeper since I had started a year and a half ago. Little Puff, our dragonette is learning and growing while working in the department office. It's extremely helpful for our members to use correct donation forms when sending in their donations.

No matter what you send into the office, please, please, please use the correct form, read the instructions, and be aware of deadline dates. And I know you always remember to write your unit and district on everything you send you.

The move we have been talking about has finally happened. Since 1932 the American Legion Auxiliary Department of California has been spoiled living in a palace in the Veterans War Memorial Building across the street from City Hall. Sorry. My typewriter just -- I'm sorry about that.

On May 11th, 2013 we were relocated to the 13th -- to the corner of 13 th and Mission Street in the mission district. This area is known for gang activity. We share the new building with parole officers, drug clinics, sex registrants and homeless people sleeping on the street.

There is a -- and then there's the parking situation. There is none. The building management has offered us one parking space for $\$ 275$. I'm going to read this way anyway, but it was voted down in finance. If one of our part-time employees parked on the street, fed the meter, it would cost over $\$ 450$ a month. The parking space would certainly help with security and safety. This will also give the President, Finance Committee, or any other dignitary somewhere to park when they came to visit.

The American Legion Auxiliary Department of California, the American Legion Department of California, the American Legion War Memorial Commission and several other San Francisco American Legion posts have all been relocated to an area of small offices. I am very fortunate to be able to share an office with the American Legion Department of California Adjutant and their executive secretary.

Three offices down is the American Legion Department of California. That's the 11-by-20 room -- I read this wrong. It's the one I mentioned earlier. One wall across -- one wall has cross support beams that extend into the room two feet into the room. So now we're talking about a 9-by-20 foot room. These support beams are there for the fourth floor that's going to be built above us.

Also the room -- also in the room is the copier/scanner/fax machine, postage machine, five file cabinets, two storage cabinets, a storage rack and two employees. We have a problem with fiberglass dust in our room due to ceiling tiles missing and exposing unwrapped fiberglass insulation. This has now been taken care of, but we have also had serious issues so a report has been filed with OSHA and the building department.

It's also become such a health issue that our
employees have gone to their doctor requesting that they no longer work in the office and work from home. We have accommodated this by requesting them to do so. Work is done via e-mail and on-line. The employees also come to the office to pick up assignments and then they return them when we're complete. We are hoping that the building management can place us in another office that is clean of these issues.

We also have had a local Legionnaire speak to us regarding moving to a building he owns in downtown San Francisco. We are trying to do whatever we can to keep our employees safe and healthy.

Well, my first two years as the Department Secretary/Treasurer have certainly been very interesting and unbelievable. Four bookkeepers, lots of meetings here and there, and then this move. I am trying to follow National's lead: patience, kindness, and being courteous to all of our members. If you have a question, please check with your unit leadership, then your district. But remember you can always call the department office. With the new office situation, it may take us longer to get back to you, but please have some patience with us and we will be courteous to you. Thank you.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Thank you, Peggy. Our next chairman we will hear from will be Girls State,

GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN REPORT

GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN ENRIGHT: Good morning. The
convention Committee on Girls State met on June 26th, 2013 in the Oleander Ballroom of the El Doral Resort, Palm Springs, California. Cindy Newman, District 13 was appointed secretary. Cyd Kintzer, District 25, offered prayer, and Karen Herrera, District 15 was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 25 district delegates answered roll call and there were 11 visitors present.

The committee met and recommends the following code change. The code currently reads: "Number 17. Unit procedures for selecting of candidates. All materials and necessary information relative to the qualifications and methods of selection shall be presented to the school representative by the unit chairman or her substitute. The recommendation of candidates and alternates shall be made by the school faculty and provided to the sponsoring unit. Only the unit shall have the final approval of the recommendations, subject to acceptance by the Department Chairman. Last year's Girls State Citizen may provide guidance in selection of the current candidate and may be included as part of the committee when interviews are scheduled. When the unit has chosen the candidate, the fee and the supporting papers shall be forwarded not later than March 12th as provided in the instructions. Publicity may be released indicating that the candidate has been chosen. If selected delegate and alternate, due
to circumstances beyond control, cannot attend the Girls State Session, a second alternate selected in the same manner shall attend to prevent forfeit of the unit fee."

The recommended code change will read: "Number
17. Unit procedures for selecting of candidates. All materials and necessary information relative to the qualifications and methods of selection shall be presented to the school representative by the unit chairman or her substitute. The recommendation of candidates and alternates shall be made by the school faculty and provided to the sponsoring unit. Only the unit shall have the final approval of the recommendations, subject to acceptance by the Department Chairman. Last year's Girls State Citizen may provide guidance in selection of the current candidate and may be included as part of the committee when interviews are scheduled. When the unit has chosen the candidate, the fee and the supporting papers shall be forwarded not later than March 31st as provided in the instructions. Publicity may be released indicating that the candidate has been chosen. If selected delegate and alternate, due to circumstances beyond control, cannot attend the Girls State Session, a second alternate selected in the same manner shall attend to prevent forfeit of the unit fee."

By direction of the Girls State Committee I move
adoption of this code change.
PARLIAMENTARIAN KAPSALIS: Second.

All materials and necessary information relative to the qualifications and methods of selection shall be presented to the school representative by the unit chairman or her substitute. The recommendation of candidates and alternates shall be made by the school faculty and provided to the sponsoring unit. Only the unit shall have the final approval of the recommendations, subject to acceptance by the Department Chairman. Last year's Girls State Citizen may provide guidance in selection of the current candidate and may be included as part of the committee when interviews are scheduled. When the unit has chosen the candidate, the fee and the supporting papers shall be forwarded not later than March 12th as provided in the instructions. Publicity may be released indicating that the candidate has been chosen. If selected delegate and alternate, due to circumstances beyond control, cannot attend the Girls State Session, a second alternate selected in the same manner shall attend to prevent forfeit of the unit fee."

It's recommended a change to read: "Unit
procedures for selecting of candidates. All materials and necessary information relative to the qualifications and methods of selection shall be presented to the school representative by the unit chairman or her substitute. The recommendation of candidates and alternates shall be made by the school faculty and provided to the sponsoring unit. Only the unit shall have the final approval of the recommendations, subject to acceptance by the Department Chairman. Last year's Girls State Citizen may provide guidance in selection of the current candidate and may be included as part of the committee when interviews are scheduled. When the unit has chosen the candidate, the fee and the supporting papers shall be forwarded not later than March 31st as provided in the instructions. Publicity may be released indicating that the candidate has been chosen. If selected delegate and alternate, due to circumstances beyond control, cannot attend the Girls State Session, a second alternate selected in the same manner shall attend to prevent forfeit of the unit fee."

This effort not only helped with getting the word out on our organization, but also provided these wonderful young ladies an opportunity to learn about the workings of our government and themselves.

American Legion Auxiliary members also gave their
time to attend the session last week volunteering their time to be a grandmother, a chairman, director, assistant director, nurse, and city and county counselors, run the store inventorying before and after the session. A staff of over 60, with the minority being ALA members. These members volunteered close to 9,000 hours to help make this program such a success. What an acknowledgment to the benefit derived from this program. Of course these volunteers get a benefit too, lots of hugs and smiles for the many treats their grandmas provide. But isn't that the job of a grandma? You spoil them, and then you send them home? We're good at that.

Twenty-one districts held an orientation event for the new delegates. Arrangements were made to have Girls State alumni, Assemblywoman, and Girls State staff speak about their experiences and what these delegates could look forward to during their week.

This chairman was fortunate to attend orientation events for five districts. How wonderful to see firsthand the different ways used to ready our delegates for their unbelievable opportunity. Excuse me.

I can tell each of you here today, every dollar you invested into the program to send a girl comes back tenfold in what they will be able to bring forward with knowledge of government workings for productive change in
our great country.
Now our first place winners for Best Supplemental for unit and district. And I'm going to tell you this was not an easy decision. For the Unit Best Supplemental goes to Unit 247, Chairman Margaret "Peggy" McIntosh.
(Applause.)
GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN ENRIGHT: And I would hand you the certificate, but it's sitting in that little red thing next to me. So thank you. My certificates are sitting over there.

District's Best Supplemental. And I'm going to tell you I did receive nine, which was wonderful. It was extremely difficult, but it will go to District 29, our energetic Chairman Elizabeth Tomlin, who's also the Girls State nurse.

GIRLS STATE DIRECTOR REPORT

GIRLS STATE ASSISTANT DIRECTOR TABACCHI: Sorry, but I can't stand on it and I can't straddle it.

Madam Department President Terry and delegates to this convention. I am giving this report on behalf of the Girls State director Sherry Schneider.

A little over a week ago, 497 young women leaders from all over our great state converged on the Claremont McKenna campus to begin the 70 th session of California Girls State. These young women, entering their senior year in high school came, from very diverse backgrounds and cultures, but joined together in a spirit of sisterhood and unity. Lessons in citizenship, love of our country, and plain fun were shared throughout the week.

Citizens had opportunities to run for public office at the city, county, and state levels. Win or lose, the girls learned valuable lessons in resilience, grace, and strength. In addition, they exercised their democratic right to vote, gaining a greater understanding of their responsibilities as citizens.

Our service project this year was folding pocket
flags. The citizens of Girls State folded over 600 flags with small thank you notes included that will be sent to our men and women serving our country around the world. Each year the Girls State service projects helps connect our citizens to the mission of the American Legion Auxiliary.

Our department was honored when our 2012 Girls Nation senator, Alauna Sessoms-Hall, was elected president of Girls Nation. Alauna did a fantastic job and we were all very proud of her accomplishments.

GIRLS STATE ASSISTANT DIRECTOR TABACCHI: This year the girls selected to represent California at the 2013 session of Girls Nation are Jillian Free from Unit 170, District 19.

(Applause.)
GIRLS STATE ASSISTANT DIRECTOR TABACCHI: Kelsey Harper from Unit 66 in District 16 was selected as the outstanding citizen of the session.
(Applause.)
GIRLS STATE ASSISTANT DIRECTOR TABACCHI: And Jillian Free from Unit 170, District 19 was elected

We, as an organization, need to continue to find creative ways to fundraise so we can maintain the quality and the status of the program. It is my hope that each of you will make a commitment to help grow the program and continue to enrich the lives of young women leaders across our state.

some serious work.

We take our role as a veterans service organization seriously, meeting and keeping the needs of veterans and their families front and center in our unit and district activities.

All of your wonderful work is also reported under the VA\&R. The last couple of years the Past Presidents Parlay has changed from not only supporting women veterans to include women currently serving in the military. Our units continue to seek out these remarkable women that are the true embodiment of service and not themselves. This year we had two nominees, one Air Force and one Navy. And they have been forwarded to National for further judging. And they are both dual members of our organization.

Now for the presentation of the first place awards. Our $\$ 2,000$ scholarship, Nurses Scholarship recipient is not here this weekend. Her name is Shanita Buchanan. She was sponsored by Benjamin J. Bowie, Unit 228, District 23.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Will the Sergeant-at-Arms and Marshal please escort to the station the Auxiliary Member of the Year and the Active-Duty Servicewoman of the Year.

PAST PRESIDENTS PARLAY CHAIRMAN DUVALL: Thank you. It is now my pleasure to present to you the Auxiliary Member of the Year, Ms. Esther Hanks, sponsored by Ventura Unit 339, District 16.
(Applause.)
PAST PRESIDENTS PARLAY CHAIRMAN DUVALL: And also
Air Force Active-Duty Senior Master Sergeant Josephine Carrillo, sponsored by Carl R. Meairs Unit 289, District 21.
(Applause.)
PAST PRESIDENTS PARLAY CHAIRMAN DUVALL: Ventura Unit 339 refers to their 48 -year member -- not 48 years old, but 48-year member of the organization as a guardian angel to their unit. I do have a letter that I received from her, and it says, "Dear Norma DuVall and Members of the American Legion Auxiliary. I send my deepest apologies for not being able to attend your convention. I am now and will be on duty during this time. Thank you for the wonderful letter that you sent me. This is such a great honor. I hope to meet you all in person to express my gratitude. Please thank your group of judges and all those that selected me to such a great honor."

I would like to say she is a dual member of the organization.

PAST PRESIDENTS PARLAY CHAIRMAN DUVALL: Now 1990 was the beginning of reenlistment in the dream career field of our Air Force active-duty servicewomen. She has been deployed seven times since 1996 and medals include Purple Heart. She is part of the 452 nd Aeromedical Evacuation Squadron, 452nd Air Mobility Wing, March Air Force Reserve Base, and was recently selected by the Wing

Commander to manage the 452 nd Air Mobility Wing Yellow Ribbon Reintegration Program.
(Applause.)
PAST PRESIDENTS PARLAY CHAIRMAN DUVALL: Her community service includes speaking to young women in schools and encouraging them to explore the opportunities that taught her great courage, self-esteem, equality, educational opportunities, and leadership. Please welcome Senior Master Sergeant Josephine Carrillo.
(Applause.)
SENIOR MASTER SERGEANT CARRILLO: First of all, I want to say thank you to you. I think you have the hardest job. You stay at home and worry about us. But you do also send us great things, notes, cookies, brownies. We love them all. We stand on your shoulders to serve. So thank you for what you do. Thank you the American Legion for supporting us and fighting for us to give us rights and benefits.

Like they said before, I belong to the 452 nd Air Mobility Wing. I'm an Aeromedical Evacuation Technician, and I have the privilege to bring home your finest. I take care of them, bring them out of the war zone, and we give care in the air to bring everybody back home with dignity.

And so I thank you for what you do for us because
without you, you know, our morale and everything else, it wouldn't be there. Right now I'm also serving with our Wing Commander in the Yellow Ribbon Reintegration Program. It's to help families -- bring families in so they can also learn what the military member does and be self-sufficient while the military member is away, connect them with services and organizations such as the American Legion and the VA and other things so that while we are gone, everybody else could connect and, you know, just not worry at home. It reduces suicides and mental health problems and stuff so we all work together. So thank you again.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: I'm not sure I want to accept that welcome. It's hotter than you know what. And besides that, they turned the lights off last night. They didn't give me a flashlight. DISTRICT 21 DELEGATE CRUDO: I --

DISTRICT 21 DELEGATE CRUDO: No. My comment is this. We do have -- Mother Nature decided to pull a trick on us. This is unusual for us to have this weather at this particular time. Later on, that's okay.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Right.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Thank you.
Ladies, the luncheon is across the hallway in the Oleander Room. This lady should have talked to us three days ago before we packed. Now next time I get hot and the sweat is pouring off, I'm going to come let you fan me. Thank you.
(Lunch recess: 12:07 p.m.)

AFTERNOON SESSION - 2:02 p.m.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Okay. Ladies, we're going to start with our Junior report, and then we'll have nominations. And so if you're nominating somebody, get ready. We're going to have Junior Conference Director and Junior Activities Chairman first.

Ms. Pilar, I'm going to start without you. Move it, baby. Come on, Duke.

While we are having a very social time here, if you are a district president or department chairman and you have not checked in with me, please see me here before -- that's you, Genieca -- please see me up here before you leave this afternoon.

Okay. Ladies, can you tell me the problem with all the ladies standing in the back? Did somebody steal your chair while you weren't looking?

Ms. Madeline Lee, I know you have a chair. They're bringing in chairs for the three districts that don't have anyplace to sit. You know, if I didn't have anyplace to sit, I'd go to my room.

Okay. Scratch my plan for having Junior Activities. They're going to have to wait. Constitution \& Bylaws. We'll reconvene. Ladies, if you don't have a chair, you don't need to socialize. So can you quietly
not have a chair?

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Ladies.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Okay. Ladies, that's enough. I need silence, please. CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS REPORT

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you. The convention -- this is our Constitution \& Bylaws. Since you were talking you might not have heard the president announce that. The convention committee on Constitution \& Bylaws met on June 27th, 2013 in the Vista Chino Room of the Doral Hotel here in Palm Springs.

The statistical report of this chairman does not appear in the Book of Reports. Several copies will be provided to each district for you to insert in your Book of Reports prior to leaving this convention, hopefully if the copy machine has been repaired. If you do not receive a copy, I've been told by our dragon, Secretary Peggy, that you may go to the office and obtain a copy if you so desire one. I have given them my only original, so that is in the department office.

Carol Fuqua, District 25, was appointed secretary. Tina Minasian, District 6, offered prayer, and CJ Reyes was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 16

districts answered roll call. There were two visitors present.

The committee agreed on the following report: The code was read and there were no code changes. There were no resolutions, except that National Poppy Chairman Melanie Taylor advised that the National organization has changed the deadline dates for reporting and an emergency resolution may be presented to change all program report dates. We have already taken care of that business earlier.

The recommendations by this chairman was to remind all members that original signatures are required on bylaws and amendments, not photocopies of original signatures. They are not acceptable. To use model forms as are required by the code, and to change the guideline recommending no less than three members are required for a quorum on a general membership meeting.

The 100 percent reporting awards were inserted in the delegates' packets. Honorable mentions, third, and second place awards were presented. With no further business, the meeting adjourned at 9:45 a.m.

Madam President, may I continue with my supplemental report and my first place awards?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: You may.

Madam President, living and breathing scrolls came to life during their magical, mystical journey this year. There continues to be a major challenge of units providing original signatures on all pages when submitting any bylaws and amendments to bylaws. There were also some misunderstandings during this year's election season. The reminder remains the same: read your bylaws, follow the rules. If in doubt, ask questions.

Aside from those challenges, there were three districts and 19 units that completed their mandatory rewrites this year, two union bylaws and 39 units with amendments. There were a few units whose amendments or bylaws could not be approved due to assorted reasons. In every case, the chairman or the president -- the chairman or the president were contacted by phone or e-mails. Many errors were resolved over the phone, while some had to be returned for corrections.

As you can see by the statistics in the Book of Reports -- sorry about that -- many units reviewed their bylaws and standing rules at the beginning of their administrative year. All units should adopt this practice. Following our set of rules and bylaws keeps members engaged with the necessary governess that is required of any large organization.

The new version soft cover of Roberts Rules of

Order is also in use by many parliamentarians and members. As unit members recite and memorize the preamble, they learn to understand what we stand for and why we exist. Unit members are also inserting the ALA mission and vision statements in their bylaws as is required. Members should be encouraged to learn and memorize those statements as well.

By having our bylaws, vision, and mission in order and current, we are free to assist our biggest treasures, our veterans and their families.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: And here is your first place reward -- award, rather, along with a
scroll with a miniature of your award.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Oh, oh. I hear \$5 ringing in my life.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Great job too, Odette. Madam President, thank you for this appointment. This was truly a learning experience and I appreciate you for selecting me for this, and this concludes my report.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: By your applause you've accepted this report.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Who is Bonnie Bradbury?

SECRETARY/TREASURER VOGELE: Okay. That's my question. Am I in the five that's going or am I going to represent my district?

LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN DeLASHMIT: Why are you asking me?

## JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN REPORT

JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN HAYES: Madam President, by direction of the Junior Activities/Junior Conference Committee, I present the following: The convention committee of Junior Activities/Junior Conference met on June 27th, 2013 in the Canyon Room of the Doral, Palm Springs resort in Cathedral City, California.

Margaret Myles was appointed as secretary.
Vergie Goffney offered prayer, and Jackie Cleveland was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 18 districts answered roll call. There were four visitors present.

The committee agreed on the following report: There were no Junior Activities code changes. Citations for 100 percent reporting and second and third place awards for Best District Supplemental, Best Unit Supplemental, District and Unit Selling Most Junior Conference Tickets were presented in the committee. A list of awards and Junior Conference raffle winners can be found in the Department Office.

JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN HAYES: May I give my supplemental report and first place awards?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Yes you may.
JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN HAYES: In keeping with the Department of California President's theme, "Mystical, Magical Fantasy," our year began by stepping into Never, Neverland. Pied Pipers from all districts took their Tinker Bells leading them into a year of
learning, working the ALA programs, and enjoying their roles of American Legion Junior Auxiliary members.

Junior Conference raffle tickets were distributed to all units and districts in June. Ticket sales brought in $\$ 4,107$, which represents a profit of $\$ 3,281.32$. Thank you to all units and districts for helping to make this year's raffle ticket sale a successful event.

A Mystical Festival For Learning workshop was held in February. Each Tinker Bell was given a poppy and as a group all were able to make their own. They soon realized the difficulty that our veterans have in making them, especially those who are handicapped. Tinker Bells were given other age appropriate tasks to do while at this workshop which would help them earn their badges.

For instance, they read books to younger members, learned how to fold the flag, were taught flag etiquette, wrote thank you letters to those who made them eligible to become Auxiliary members, and many, many more activities. Needless to say, the day was full of activities which taught these girls many things, especially what it means to be an American Legion Auxiliary member. A big, big thank you to Diane DeLashmit for all her help with this workshop to make this workshop a success.

JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN HAYES: In honor of the Military Child, several Tinker Bells performed a Military Child Table Setting Ceremony. It is hoped that this becomes a tradition at various functions throughout California.

Units and districts were also keeping these junior members very busy throughout the year. They participated in Stand Downs, bake sales, helped with Veterans Day and Memorial Day activities, held outreach programs, made crafts and cards, adopted military families and veterans, held car washes, helped at veterans' homes and hospitals, participated in welcome home celebrations,
participated in Month of the Military Child, folded pocket flags, participated in parades, adopted classrooms, collected toys for active duty military children at Christmastime, and donated to the Give 10 to Education Program, and so on.

The Junior Auxiliary for Los Alamitos Unit 716 in District 29 helped a fallen hero's legacy live on through a function called "Matthew Freeman Project: Pens \& Paper for Peace." They helped raise funds to collect school supplies for 16 care packages to go to Afghanistan.

appears on page 16 of the Book of Reports.
Delores Ray -- Ryan, excuse me, District 15 was appointed secretary. Leonie Estigoy, District 10, offered prayer, and Vickie Crowe, District 15 was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 22 district delegates were in attendance. There were four visitors present.

The committee was called to order at 9:00 a.m. with a prayer and Pledge of Allegiance. The code was read with the following proposed changes.

Number 6 of the Education Code now reads: "The units and districts shall be urged to make greater use of the CD, 'Need a Lift' or the website www.needalift.org and shall be encouraged to distribute the information to all junior and senior high schools, colleges, and junior colleges within their community and their Girls State citizens as well as the Junior Conference attendees between the ages of 15 and 18."

The proposed code change. Number 6 will be deleted in its entirety. Change numbers accordingly throughout the rest of the code.

Madam President, by the direction of the committee I move to adopt this code change.

PARLIAMENTARIAN KAPSALIS: Second.

Once each category is ranked, the Department Chairman will assign the highest scored application the highest scholarship and continue assigning all available scholarships descending in dollar amount and numerical ranking until all descending -- descending in dollar amounts and numerical ranking until all scholarships in that category have been awarded." By recommendation of the committee, code referring to number 12 will now refer to number 11. Madam President, by the direction of the committee, I move to adopt this code change. PARLIAMENTARIAN KAPSALIS: Second. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: It's been moved and seconded to change code number 13, which will now be code number 12: "Students applying for Department scholarships shall fill out one application per category per code number 12. Each category will be judged and scored by individuals chosen by the Department Chairman. Once scored, the Department Chairman shall numerically rank each category with the highest scored application as number one, the next highest as number two, and so on and so forth until all applications have been numerically ranked. Once each category is ranked, the Department Chairman will assign the highest scored application the largest scholarship and continue assigning all available
scholarships descending in dollar amount and numerical ranking until all descending in dollar amounts" -- huh. EDUCATION CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: That was a typo. Sorry.

EDUCATION CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: In the mystical, magical fantasy world of California the Enchanted Gypsies have been hard at work this year looking into their crystal ball to see what kind of educational and scholarship opportunities they can provide for our veterans, their families, and military children. They have done a wonderful job promoting our education program, as you can see.

Members donated over 25,000 items that students use in the classrooms such as pens, pencils, paper and backpacks, totaling over $\$ 25,000$. They collected hundreds of Labels For Education as well as Box Tops to be delivered to military bases and local schools with educator and staff very appreciative of the help.

The juniors at Junior Conference put together over 1,000 school items in gift bags that were then delivered to our local needy school. Members collected thousands of Pop Tops that were cashed in and held raffles with the proceeds going to the Department for scholarships.

Unit members handed out to educators and school staff fliers and information on ALA KIDDS, American Legion Auxiliary Kids in Danger of Depression or Suicide, also Bullying, what to look for and what to do to prevent it. Members also shared information and resources that are
available on how staff can look out for and help military children with their unique situation.

To help the students enhance respect for the sacrifices of our military heroes, units participated in "Veterans in the Classroom." They made arrangements with schools to have veterans visit and speak to students about their unique serving -- their experience serving in the military and what it meant to be a veteran. Some brought relics from their tours. Others showed pictures, gave small flags and patriotic pencils to the children. Students were very excited about their visits.

Members spent hundreds of hours reading to schoolchildren, donated books, reading books, comic and coloring books that they had purchased from Emblem Sales and helped students with their reading and writing skills.

Many participated in National Education Week by offering American flags and flag etiquette books, Pledge of Allegiance comic books and Polar Bears with Poppies to students. To educators, custodians, and staff, members visited and took gift and fruit baskets, goodie bags, cards and certificates.

We had one unit that gave new playground toys to a special education class. These children also decorated cards that were then sent to soldiers overseas.

The department was able to give out by the
support of our units and districts a total of six General and two Continuing/Re-entry scholarships totaling \$9,000. Units also were able to offer 110 local school scholarships totaling over $\$ 49,000$. What a great job. (Applause.)

EDUCATION CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: Madam President, just to change my report, I didn't get four units so that would be closer to $\$ 60,000$. So they did an outstanding job.

It's only with the continued support from our units and districts that our education program will be able to continue offering scholarships. I'm also happy to announce that the National Nontraditional student applicant from California won a $\$ 2,000$ scholarship. (Applause.)

EDUCATION CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: As you can see, the Enchanted Gypsies have done a great job with education for our veterans, their families, and military children.

To reach the pot of gold, ultimate success was achieved by setting reasonable and workable goals for recruiting Auxiliary members, working to retain present
ones, and involving them with hands-on activities, challenging each member to bring a prospective membership to their meeting, encouraging members to attend districts and leadership meetings, and budgeting funds for membership incentives.

Challenges between units and districts were a great stimulation to work harder. Many units found that communication was the key to success with membership. Yes, we can get more members by talking to eligible members and have them come to the monthly meeting and interact with us to see just how much fun we are having.

Old members rel- -- I don't mean old, old, but, I mean, members that have a few years in. I do not want to offend anybody, all right, so I said that old members realized that as a team we could accomplish a lot more toward our goals. The Legion Family atmosphere promotes unity in working on programs that support veterans' issues, youth, and the community.

At DEC in January, 443 certificates were presented, but today the following certificates are issued. Be patient with me. 100 percent units, we will have 137. Josie Melgard Award, 100 plus two members is 84 units. Five district are 100 percent for a total of 432 certificates, and a grand total of 875 certificates. Ladies, you did that yourself and I'm proud, proud, proud

We have kept third or fifth, now we are sixth place in National and the Western Division has remained first all young among the five divisions.

We are a team of leprechauns with a purpose of renewal in membership, and a goal of acting as a unit of love and family in the American Legion Auxiliary. Veterans are our treasure, and to each the pot
of gold under the rainbow, we need another 537 lucky coins, meaning renewals, to reach our goal. We will do it. Nothing will stop us now.

MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WHITE: I'm getting back at her. And those are 1500 plus. They are first place and good Lord, ladies, you have my membership.
(Applause.)
MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WHITE: And this one I don't have to give it away. Do I have to give it to her, Madam President? I don't have to give it to Ruby, do I?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Honey, if I were you, I'd pass it on.

MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WHITE: Okay. It's District 28, first place for 1500 -- no. For 701 to 1500, first place. And she works so hard. Where is Prunedale. Is Prunedale here? Oh, boy. She was waiting for Prunedale. I'll give it to you now, but $I$ want it back. So I have to take it and have it re-engraved, but I'll get it back later on.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Danielle, you
made a mistake.
MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WHITE: Well, I made quite a few, I'll tell you. Now I want to tell you something that is very close to my heart and close to probably a lot of us. We have 24,000 members in and we need 24,537 ; right? So this year, it's a very, very special year. First we have Madam President, but we have someone very special that we are going to install in Indianapolis.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: No, Houston.
MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WHITE: Houston. Okay. Houston. I was going to go to Indianapolis. I guess I better be -- it's National President Elect Nancy Brown-Park. We -- Park, not spark. We want to be 100 percent California. So I have a plan, ladies. I have a plan that I presented yesterday at a special meeting in my room. And I've already heard it -- don't go. Don't go because you've got to listen to this plan because I need everybody, everybody's help. And I think, I think with God's help, and he will help us, we can make it before convention is over.

What I'm suggesting is -- do I have the guts to say that?

EDUCATION CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: Yeah.
MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WHITE: Yeah. That if each and every one of you pay for one member per capita only,
every one of you pay one member by Sunday, by tomorrow. I have plenty -- I'm prepared for you to tell us who you want. I can write it. I can do the transmittal. I am ready to do all that, I think, and I'm pretty sure we will meet our goal.

Okay? We are seniors and we are juniors. So let's say the 17, if you want to give 20 or ten for junior, but I don't know if you have ten in your district that have not paid. And if everybody would do that, ladies, we will make it. And don't you want to make it? (Applause.)

MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WHITE: We're so close and yet so far away. Even if I let you go home after convention, I am not going to make it because you people will say forget it, 2014's coming. But if you do it now, we will do it. And it's been 30 years since we had the California National President, don't you think it would be a nice gift to give her to have perfect state, 100 percent?
(Applause.)
MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WHITE: Are you with me?
(Applause.)
MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WHITE: Let me hear you. Are you with me?
(Applause.)

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Who has a nonpaid roster for the Department of California, an unpaid member? So if you want to shop on the unpaid roster or if you want to give her the dues to make the selection, she'll do so.

MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WHITE: But the check must be addressed to the Department of California American Legion. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: She'll take a check.

NATIONAL VICE PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: Okay. I'm making the first donation. Here's my $\$ 20$ to pay for a member who hasn't paid and maybe they'll come back and pay next year. It's a junior and a senior, how's that? Tell me what we need.

MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WHITE: Ladies, if you need cash, I want to -- if we have some receipt.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: That's okay. I'll keep track.

MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WHITE: Okay. We will keep track. Ladies, believe me, it's worth it. I have goose bumps to tell you we're going to make it. Now please help me. Now I would like to make a presentation, Madame. May I come to you?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Yes. Thank you, Leprechaun. "Madam Department President Terry. Membership is a sheltering tree." There's \$50 in here.
"Thanks for always being there. I will cherish our friendship forever. Thank you for bestowing your trust in your Leprechaun Danielle. Buy yourself a new dress for National Convention. Love, Danielle."

Let me tell you something, Danielle. Since this leprechaun gave me this $\$ 50$, I'm going to give this $\$ 50$ to my little leprechaun for membership. Come here, baby. Take this for membership.

NEC CHAIRMAN FERCHO: I'm going to add a dollar, and that's three.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: They're going to add a dollar so we'll pay for three senior members. Like I said, she does have a current unpaid roster for the whole Department of California. So if you have somebody in your unit or district you want to pay for, you can select that person or you can just donate and let Danielle make a selection for you.

Danielle, are you -- where did that leprechaun get off to now? Get back over there and finish, baby.

DISTRICT 24 PRESIDENT STEWART-WILSON: Madam President?

MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WHITE: Madam President, this concludes my report.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Rebecca is on the floor. Go ahead, Rebecca.

DISTRICT 24 PRESIDENT STEWART-WILSON: Madam Membership Chairman Danielle, Madam Membership Chairman, I have a transmittal that is actually here and ready to go with two plus a check. So that's two from District 24.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Okay. If you want to meet Kathy Harris back in the corner behind District 2. We're seated in the back of the bus, but this year I've decided that being in the back of the bus is not bad because they think you don't know anything. Back of the bus is not such a bad place. District 2 is back there in the back. You meet Kathy Harris back there in the back. Kathy, put your hand up there. See that leprechaun there? She's going on the back corner if you want to give her money.

Okay. Leprechaun, hit it. She's done? I don't think she's done. Danielle, are you done with everything?

MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WHITE: Wait a minute. We have the fifth area. Do they want to make their presentation right now because it has to do with membership?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Cheryl Neiffer.
I know Ruth Hackney has got money. Donate some money into that pocket there. Come on. Who else do I recognize out here? Genieca. Oh, baby. Karen, Deanna, Harriet,

Delores. Come on, ladies. Karen, pay somebody else's dues. Oh, good. Come on, Ruby. The junior's dues is $\$ 2$. The senior dues is 17. Little leprechaun only needs 537 and we'll be in the front. I know I said the best place to be was in the back of the bus, but at National Convention, the place to be is at the front.

MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WHITE: I will tell you the result tomorrow, Madam President.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Thank you, Danielle.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: By applause you have accepted Danielle's report.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Okay. Ladies, district presidents that have not seen me in my room -Susie Tozier I need to touch bases. If you haven't seen me, come up here before you go to your room. I'll see you at 8:30 in the morning here. We're going to reconvene. Most all of you have this evening off. And our department secretary has been looking in her crystal ball and, oh, my God, it's full of papers.

MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WHITE: Madam President, I think the fifth area wants to make a presentation.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Okay. Will you
let Ms. Peggy do her crystal ball first?

Because you know her so well, it has changed. It will not be tomorrow afternoon, tomorrow morning, it will be right after we convene tonight in the lounge to have a beverage.

Linda's Workmen, Clark's Patriots, Bonnie's Prom Princesses, and Sandy's Colonels will meet for lunch on Saturday in one of the meeting rooms at the hotel. So
please meet in the hallway tomorrow.

District 29 PRESIDENT NEIFFER: Madam President, my half of the money went to your special project.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Well, thank you.
District 29 PRESIDENT NEIFFER: And the other half of the money is going to Children's Welfare Foundation.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Thank you very, very much.

District 25 DELEGATE FLETCHER: Madam President, I have another announcement.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Announcements. (Singing.)

District 25 DELEGATE FLETCHER: Thank you. Okay. Also I'd like to say that we as a fifth area challenged Area 6 for, to you know, we challenged them as membership. And I'm pleased to announce that fifth area won. Thank
you sixth area for the $\$ 50$. That is going to go to our VA\&R program. Thank you.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: If Debbie would have lost, she never would have said that.

ADJOURNMENT

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Okay. Is there any other business this afternoon? Okay. Ladies, we will stand in recess until 8:30 in the morning. Have a good evening. Remember, if you haven't seen me, please come do so.
(The American Legion Auxiliary Convention was adjourned at 5:02 p.m. to be reconvened on Saturday, June 29, 2013, at 8:30 a.m.)
