22	CHAPLAIN RYE: Good morning, ladies. Oh,
23	Heavenly Father, we come to you today in glory and
24	anticipation for this wonderful day that you have given
25	us. Help us to open our hearts, open our minds, and enjoy

1 all of the moments that we have together here, Lord. Keep 2 us safe, keep us open, keep us with each other, and keep 3 us full of love. And thank you, Lord, for all of our people here and we ask that you bless this convention and 4 5 give Terry the strength to carry through with all of us. 6 Amen. 7 AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Amen. 8 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: May we observe a 9 moment of silence in honor of our loved ones who have gone 10 on to be with our Heavenly Father? 11 We're going to deviate a little bit from our 12 normal Friday opening. At this point in time we are going 13 to have our National Vice President, Nancy Brown-Park, 14 with our Distinguished Guest Chairman and the 15 Sergeant-at-Arms and Marshal, please escort Nancy 16 Brown-Park. 17 (Processional.) 18 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: At this point in time we have a special quest with us today. Will the 19 Sergeant-at-Arms and Marshal, along with the Distinguished 20 21 Guest Chairman, please escort Glenda Oakley from USAA to 22 this station. 23 (Processional.) 24 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Glenda's company 25 very graciously donated the ditty bags that you received

- 1 when you registered as a delegate. She's going to give us
- 2 a short speech.
- 3 MS. OAKLEY: Yes. I have always been told to
- 4 keep it short and sweet. For those of you I don't know,
- 5 my name is Glenda Oakley. I'm a Legionnaire of Post 2 in
- 6 San Antonio, Texas. I help manage the relationship USAA
- 7 has with the American Legion Auxiliary. I'm also a
- 8 military spouse married to an Army Captain. My father
- 9 served 31 years in the Army as well.
- 10 (Applause.)
- 11 MS. OAKLEY: I had it all the way around,
- 12 military spouse, brat, and a military service member as
- 13 well. I come from a family of Army veterans.
- 14 What I'm here to do is talk to you all today
- 15 about the beautiful American Legion Auxiliary credit card
- 16 that's out on the market. It's been a little bit over the
- 17 year since it's been on the market. We have the beautiful
- 18 poppy design that's on the front of them that's available
- 19 in both MasterCard and American Express. No annual fees,
- low interest rate, as low as 10.9.
- You also get one reward point for you on every
- 22 dollar you spend. On the American Express version you get
- 23 two points for every dollar you send on gas and groceries.
- 24 And for every credit card that is opened, the American
- 25 Legion Auxiliary gets money back supporting programs and

- 1 services.
- 2 And all the retail spent, you ladies out there
- 3 shopping -- I'm not saying run up any debt. You know,
- 4 just do your normal everyday purchases, put it on your
- 5 card and pay USAA, you know, for what you spend, the
- 6 American Legion Auxiliary gets a percentage of your retail
- 7 spent and so does the department of California.
- 8 The National headquarters is looking to share
- 9 some of that money with the department, but we have to
- 10 break through that initial guarantee that they're
- 11 receiving, and the more cards they have in the market, the
- more you're using it, the more money goes back to support
- 13 your programs and services.
- So I just wanted to let you all know about that.
- 15 And I know everybody has seen these lovely bags going
- 16 around town everywhere. And I'm always being asked how
- 17 can I get one. We gave these at National Convention.
- 18 We'll probably do the same this year, but, Madam
- 19 President, I also put a few back there in the office for
- 20 you to award however you feel. Okay? And there's also
- 21 some credit card applications back there for the
- 22 MasterCard version. If you need to apply for the American
- 23 Express, the phone numbers are on the back. You can see
- it in the magazine ad or on the website or you can go on
- 25 usaa.com/ala.

Amen. 9 NATIONAL VICE PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: But it's 10 been a really good year. You've taken on some really big 11 challenges this year and you've done an amazing job. And I think each one of us thanks you for that. 12 13 I want to bring greetings from the National 14 organization. I want to thank each and every one of you for your support over the last -- it's taken ten years and 15 16 it's two months away, so that's pretty darn exciting. And 17 I'm glad that I'll be able to share it with each one of 18 you as we qo. 19 (Applause.) 20 NATIONAL VICE PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: Thank you. Little special note. Every National president has a 21 22 scrapbook chairman. So I had a special scrapbook chairman 23 from California, and it's Kendall Madsen. And for the very first time we're going to do that scrapbook 24 25 electronically. So it's going to be exciting and you're

going to be able to follow me along and Kendall will get 1 2 the information out. So you'll be able to see where I go 3 on my travels. 4 So thank you each and every one of you. This is my home. This is California. This has been my life for 5 6 the last -- I'm not telling you how old I am. And it's 7 really hot; can you believe that? So thank you again. 8 And, Terry, I want to wish you a really 9 successful, exciting, and fun convention. 10 (Applause.) 11 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Thank you. 12 see Nancy's postings on-line. She spends most of her life 13 anymore on airplanes. 14 Barbara, qo ahead. 15 16 READING OF CONVENTION RULES 17 18 RULES CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Good morning. Good morning, Madam President Terry. At this time I will 19 present the convention rules. Your convention rules can 20 21 be found on page 10 of the Book of Reports. Excuse me. 22 Madam Department President Terry, I will hesitate 23 after each rule. Or if there's a question or an 24 amendment, it may be presented at that time. 25 The department rules. All meetings of the

convention shall be called to order at a designated time 1 or as soon thereafter as a quorum is present. 2 3 A quorum shall exist when one-third of the units 4 in good standing are partially or wholly represented by all elected delegates or alternates. 5 6 The audience shall remain seated during the 7 business of the convention. The department president 8 shall designate certain doors to accommodate delegates who 9 find it necessary to enter or leave the convention hall 10 during the reports of committees or when a speaker has the 11 floor. Cell phones must be turned off or in vibrate mode. 12 The chair may deviate from the printed program 13 when necessary or expedient. 14 The credentials chairman shall report 15 registration as directed by the Chair. 16 The registration of the delegates and alternates shall be closed at 9:00 a.m. on Saturday, June 29th, 2013. 17 18 Only qualified delegates shall have a voice or a vote. It shall be the responsibility of each district president, 19 20 excuse me, to see that only accredited delegates and 21 alternates serving as delegates are seated in her district 22 delegation during the business meetings of the convention. 23 If a delegate expects to be absent from the convention, except for the purpose of attending a 24 25 committee meeting, she shall relinquish her delegate card

- 1 to her alternate. The alternate shall then take her seat
- 2 in the voting section. In the event the delegate does not
- 3 have the opportunity of reporting to the district
- 4 president, it shall become the duty of the chairman of the
- 5 unit to report to the district president the absence of
- 6 the delegate and the presence of the alternate or the
- 7 absence of both the delegate and the alternate.
- A delegate wishing the privilege of the floor
- 9 shall rise, address the chair as "Madam Department
- 10 President, give her name, unit and district number,
- 11 pause, and wait to be recognized by the Chair.
- 12 A member speaking in debate on a question shall
- 13 be limited to three minutes. No one shall speak more than
- 14 twice on the same question without consent of the
- 15 assembly.
- 16 Delegates attending called committee meetings
- 17 shall be notified when the convention is considering and
- 18 voting upon adoption of any change in policy or matters
- 19 affecting finance.
- 20 Reports of committees which do not appear to be
- 21 controversial in nature may be adopted by the general
- 22 consent. If there is no objection or if there is
- 23 objection, a vote shall be taken. Following the
- 24 acceptance of a report of a committee, recommendations or
- 25 resolutions may be presented for consideration and

adoption. 1 2 Any committee whose proposed changes in policy might conflict with that of the American Legion shall 3 4 confer with the American Legion before presenting said 5 change to the convention. 6 A committee recommending an appropriation of 7 funds for any purpose shall consult with the department finance committee before presenting the recommendation or 8 resolution to the convention. 9 10 All resolutions to be presented to the convention shall be in triplicate and properly signed. 11 12 Committees may amend resolutions and 13 recommendations referred to them before favorably 14 reporting same. Resolutions or recommendations rejected by a committee shall be marked "rejected," signed by the 15 16 chairman of the committee, and returned to the department resolutions chairman immediately following the committee 17 18 meeting. 19 A unit, district, or members presenting a resolution or recommendation shall have the privilege of 20 21 explaining same to the committee to which it was referred. 22 Committees shall report to the convention all 23 resolutions properly submitted and accepted by a majority 24 convention committee. 25 A resolution rejected by a committee may be

brought before the convention by a two-thirds vote. 1 2 Emergency resolutions which may arise during the convention or after the date for submitting resolutions 3 4 may be presented no later than noon of the second day of 5 convention. 6 Nominations of officers, junior member finance, 7 department delegates, and alternates to the National Convention shall be held Thursday, June 27th afternoon --8 9 excuse me Thursday. June afternoon -- Thursday afternoon 10 June 27th. 11 NATIONAL VA&R COMMITTEE MEMBER CAPAZZI: No. 12 RULES CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Is that wrong? 13 The endorsement of candidates for National office 14 shall follow the nominations. 15 Nomination speeches shall be limited to three 16 minutes. There shall be no seconding of speeches. Election of department officers, junior member of 17 18 finance, National candidate, department delegates, and alternates to the National Convention shall be held on 19 Saturday, June 29th, 2013. 20 The doors of the convention hall shall be closed 21 22 during the entire election procedure and no one shall 23 leave or enter the hall until the Chair states that the election is concluded. The exception to this shall be 24 25 that in an emergency a member may leave, and if her

absence affects the voting strength, the district 1 2 president shall immediately notify the presiding officer. When there is but one nominee for department 3 4 offices and but one nominee for junior member of finance, the nominees shall be elected viva voce. Upon roll call, 5 6 the district presidents shall report the number of units 7 partially or wholly represented by duly elected delegates or alternates present in the delegation at the time of 8 9 roll call. This is to determine that there is a quorum of 10 units present at the time of the election. When there is more than one nominee for the 11 12 department offices or junior member of the finance or National office, election shall be by written ballot. 13 14 district presidents shall, when they are instructed by the Chair, take a roll call of their respective delegations to 15 16 ascertain the total voting strength of their district for the election reporting the same to the Chair. When there 17 is but one nominee for office or junior member of the 18 finance, the ballot may be dispensed with a nominee 19 elected viva voce. 20 21 When there are three or more nominees for an 22 office or a junior member of the finance, unless one nominee receives a majority vote on the first ballot, the 23 nominee receiving the lowest number of votes shall be 24 25 automatically dropped before proceeding with the next

ballot. 1 2 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Barbara, you have a correction on number 22. 3 4 RULES CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Okay. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Nominations of 5 6 officers, junior member finance, department delegates, and 7 alternates to the National Convention shall be held Friday 8 afternoon, June 28th, 2013. 9 RULES CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Okay. I said Thursday, 10 didn't I? I'm sorry. Okay. I'll change that. 11 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Excuse me, Barbara. The same on 25. 12 13 RULES CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Okay. 14 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Twenty-five 15 should reflect the 29th, June 29th. 16 RULES CHAIRMAN DAVIS: It does say June 29th. 17 Okay. Madam Department President, this concludes the reading of the convention rules. I move that the 18 convention rules be considered seriatim and be adopted as 19 20 a whole. 21 PARLIAMENTARIAN KAPSALIS: Second. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: It has been moved 22 23 and seconded that the rules be accepted seriatim and adopted as a whole. Is there any discussion? 24 25 (No response.)

1 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: All those in 2 favor, say aye. 3 ALL PRESENT: Aye. 4 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Any opposed, say 5 no. 6 (No response.) 7 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Motion carried. 8 RULES CHAIRMAN DAVIS: Madam Department President 9 Terry, rule number 3 provides it is your responsibility to 10 designate certain doors to accommodate the delegates to enter or leave the convention. 11 12 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: They've been so 13 delegated. The center doors, please. 14 RULES CHAIRMAN DAVIS: I suggest that we request 15 delegates entering the hall to stand quietly until the 16 speaker has finished before returning to their seats. 17 Thank you, Madam Department President Terry for 18 this appointment and for the opportunity to serve you for 19 the department of California. 20 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Thank you, 21 Barbara. 22 (Applause.) 23 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Anita, please come take the chair. I'm going to be going to the legion. 24 25 (Processional.)

1 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: The Department 2 President Terry is going to visit the Legion at this time. 3 We will now have the report of the National Executive 4 Committeewoman Linda Fercho. 5 6 NATIONAL EXECUTIVE COMMITTEEWOMAN REPORT 7 8 NEC CHAIRMAN FERCHO: Good morning, everyone. 9 AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Good morning. 10 NEC CHAIRMAN FERCHO: To this beautiful day, 11 sunshiny day. I think we should be glad we're inside. 12 Although some of you are waving your fans. I guess maybe 13 it's not quite cool enough for you. Give us ten seconds 14 or ten minutes and our temperatures will change. Just give her a minute. 15 Madam President Wizard, I want you to know that 16 I've enjoyed being your National Executive Committeewoman 17 18 this year. I have been asked what is the definition of the job of the NEC woman. This is it in a nutshell 19 20 because it's quite lengthy and a lot of responsibility, 21 but as a member of the American Legion Auxiliary National 22 Executive Committee, my primary role as a member of the 23 organization's National governing body is to protect the organization. 24 25 My primary responsibility is to serve as a

- 1 forward-thinking steward of the organization to ensure its
- 2 financial sufficiency and organizational integrity so that
- 3 the future generations also have an opportunity to
- 4 participate in our mission. You are responsible for
- 5 reviewing and improving the mission and strategic
- 6 direction, annual budget and key financial transactions,
- 7 and fiscal and governance policies. You're the liaison
- 8 between the National organization and your department.
- 9 This being said, the National organization is
- 10 encouraging every department to consider electing their
- 11 National NEC woman rather than appointing them as we do
- 12 here in California. Our constitutional bylaws states that
- 13 the Junior Past President will automatically become
- 14 California's NEC woman. This is true in probably 99
- 15 percent of the departments in the nation. The reason
- 16 behind their thinking -- and, ladies, this is not pointing
- 17 a finger at California -- is that it would ensure that the
- 18 members of the NEC are better qualified to do the job. It
- 19 would eliminate those that are just there because of the
- 20 rotation of positions in their department, not because
- 21 they understand what the position is and the
- 22 responsibility level they will have.
- 23 They also recommend this be a two-year position
- 24 for continuity. This does not mean that it would not be
- 25 the Junior Past President, as she could certainly throw

- 1 her hat in the ring and run for the position, but it would
- 2 also give anyone who wishes an opportunity to run for this
- 3 position.
- 4 I feel that California needs to consider this and
- 5 that our incoming president appoints a committee that
- 6 would investigate the pros and cons and come up with a job
- 7 description for someone wishing to hold this position and
- 8 a plan for seeing if California wishes to consider
- 9 implementing this change.
- The NEC is sent and goes over many resolutions
- 11 and their changes. One important resolution that was
- 12 passed by the NEC was to ask the assistance of the
- 13 American Legion to obtain a federal charter for the
- 14 American Legion Auxiliary. The American Legion Auxiliary
- is not a federally chartered organization and never has
- 16 been. The American Legion Auxiliary is an international
- 17 organization incorporated in and nationally headquartered
- 18 in the State of Indiana. We are still independent of the
- 19 American Legion and could continue to exist shall a post
- 20 turn in their charter as a widow unit because each unit
- 21 has its own charter independent of the post.
- 22 Having a federal charter does not change the
- 23 Auxiliary's relationship to the Legion. Having a federal
- 24 charter will ensure certain federal protections for the
- 25 Auxiliary as a tax exempt organization and as a female

- 1 organization, especially in its operation of
- 2 gender-specific (all-female) programs. And this has been
- 3 done. And the Legion will assist us so that will be going
- 4 forward and it will take quite a while for the process
- 5 because Congress doesn't move real fast, but at least we
- 6 do have their support and they are going to go forward and
- 7 honor our request.
- Now before you get really excited about me
- 9 busting Michelle Soares, our poppy chairman's, bubble, I
- 10 checked with her before I put the following information in
- 11 my report.
- 12 As NEC I received some exciting news. The Legion
- 13 NEC has adopted a new national poppy program resolution
- 14 that provides much more program flexibility. This
- 15 resolution takes effect immediately and is now the only
- 16 American Legion poppy resolution in force.
- 17 This is just an overview. The entire resolution
- 18 will be brought forward under the next president's poppy
- 19 chairman's duties. She will be going forward, I'm sure,
- 20 explaining it more and getting it out, but this is just it
- in a nutshell, what was the overview of what was adopted.
- It allows anyone to make the poppies with
- 23 preference being for veterans to do so. Poppies can be
- 24 commercially made if it's efficient to do so because
- 25 people are not readily available to make them. It allows

- 1 poppies to be made from any material and allows other
- 2 poppy items can be made/used to distribute for
- 3 contributions to benefit the program. It removes some
- 4 provisions that are 40 years old. Poppy funds can no
- 5 longer be used for mileage to attend conferences, et
- 6 cetera.
- 7 Poppy funds collected from May 9th, 2013 on can
- 8 be used to benefit veterans, active duty military, and
- 9 their families. Specifically for the rehabilitation of
- 10 hospitalized military service personnel returning home and
- 11 awaiting discharge who require treatment in service
- 12 hospitals. And for the welfare of veterans, active
- 13 military personnel, and their families of veterans and
- 14 active military personnel of the above-named period where
- 15 financial and medical need is evident.
- 16 So with the new resolution, what does this mean
- 17 for doing the poppy program? At this time the National
- 18 organization has put in place an Ad Hoc Poppy Future
- 19 Committee and National Poppy Committee who will be giving
- 20 us more information.
- 21 Remember this resolution covers the entire nation
- 22 and it does not mean that California has to change the way
- 23 we have been implementing the program at all. Many states
- in our nation do not have the access to the veterans we
- 25 do. We're so fortunate. We have so many veteran

- 1 facilities, hospitals, homes, veteran homes where we can
- 2 access veterans, but other states aren't that fortunate.
- 3 Other states do not have that access. So this just gives
- 4 flexibility. It doesn't mean we change anything, ladies.
- 5 That will be up to the department of California and next
- 6 year's régime to decide if there is any changes. So it's
- 7 just giving us flexibility.
- 8 And I think the major thing here for me anyway is
- 9 just that we now can service active duty military. I
- 10 think some of us have been doing it. Now it's going to be
- 11 legal. So I think that's the most important part of this
- 12 revamping this program.
- 13 (Applause.)
- 14 NEC CHAIRMAN FERCHO: Madam Wizard, this
- 15 completes my report.
- 16 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: I'm not a
- 17 wizard.
- 18 NEC CHAIRMAN FERCHO: Right now you are. You are
- 19 just standing in for -- well, you're really standing in
- 20 for her. Thank you very much.
- 21 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you.
- 22 NEC CHAIRMAN FERCHO: Thank you, ladies, very
- 23 much for your service.
- 24 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you,
- 25 Linda. Right now will the Sergeant-at-Arms and Marshal,

along with the Distinguished Guest Chairman, do we have 1 2 our poppy girl here? 3 ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEMBER CUCCARO: She is. She's out in the hallway. 4 5 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Can you round 6 her up so we can run her around the room. Okay. I think 7 we've got her. We wrangled her in. 8 Sargent-At-Arms and Marshal, along with the 9 Distinguished Guest Chairman, are escorting Gabrielle 10 Ursuy, also know as Miss Poppy. 11 (Processional.) 12 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Poppy Chairman 13 Michelle. 14 POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: Gabby is our 2012-2013 Miss Poppy. She's in the 13 and up category. And we're 15 16 so proud of her promoting poppies this year. Gabby, I 17 want to award you with this beautiful sash for the 18 princess that you are. 19 (Applause.) 20 POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: And Gabby also has a 21 winning poster there in the back also for her class which 22 was Class 4. So if you want to look at her poster too. 23 She did beautiful work for poppies this year. And here are our certificates. 24 25 (Applause.)

1 POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: I also wanted to present 2 her with a coin that says "American Legion Auxiliary" on 3 the front. On the back it has the poppy. It says, "Serving our veterans and community," and she has done 4 that all year long. 5 6 (Applause.) 7 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you. 8 Thank you, Michelle, and thank you, Gabrielle, for coming 9 today. Give our poppy, Miss Poppy a big round of 10 applause. 11 (Applause.) 12 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: 13 Sergeant-at-Arms and Marshal please escort -- Gabby, do 14 you want to say anything? We normally like to hear the voice of Miss Poppy. But our National Vice President 15 would like to get a picture of you if you would just hang 16 a minute. You guys can sit down. 17 18 All right. Photo op. And would our Chaplain 19 Marge, you're going to report next. 20 ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEMBER CUCCARO: Where is she 21 from? 22 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Where is our 23 Miss Poppy from, Michelle? She's busy smiling. Gabby is from Unit 14, District 25. 24 25 (Applause.)

1	DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: That's really
2	important to know; right? Congratulations, Gabby. Thank
3	you for all you're doing and will continue to do.
4	(Processional.)
5	DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: I love your
6	sash. Look at the back, ladies, as she walks out.
7	"American Legion Auxiliary."
8	We will now hear from our Department Chaplain,
9	Marge Rye.
10	
11	CHAPLAIN REPORT
12	
13	CHAPLAIN RYE: Good morning, ladies. Do I have
14	my recipients up here at the stage? The chaplains of our
15	department have done a wonderful job this year in service
16	and reporting. Of the 29 districts there were 29 reports
17	which gave me 100 percent reporting.
18	(Applause.)
19	CHAPLAIN RYE: That's just the greatest reporting
20	for a chaplain. I'm sorry. My statistical information
21	was not available at the time to go into the Book of
22	Reports because of the other items coming in afterwards
23	and such. So in the my statistics are the number of
24	deceased members was 314. Memorial services were held
25	on in 95 units. Eighty-two charters were draped.

- 1 Memorial contributions received were 40 units received
- 2 \$3,690. Units participating in Chapel of 4 Chaplains was
- 3 36. Units donating to Chapel of 4 Chaplains, there were
- 4 37 units donated \$1580. Units donating to In Loving
- 5 Tribute, there were 32 units donated \$1,138.
- 6 193 units participated in Memorial Day, 136 for
- 7 Independence, 107 for 9/11, and 157 for Veteran's Day.
- 8 That seems like an awfully low number. I'm sure that they
- 9 did a lot more.
- 10 Units participating in Heroes to Hometown were
- 11 41. Make A Difference Day, 41; Healing Fields, three; and
- 12 Community Support were 102. Now that one I know should be
- 13 much, much larger. Number of all types of cards sent were
- 14 7400. Number preparing a prayer book was 16. Sending
- prayers for Department President's prayer book were 12.
- 16 Sending prayers for National President's prayer book were
- 17 12. Using the Reflections page of the ALA magazine were
- 18 83 and using Grace Cards were 20.
- 19 Our chaplains visited patients in hospitals, VA
- 20 homes, convalescent hospitals, and those were homebound.
- 21 They provided spiritual uplifting through prayer and bible
- 22 reading, transportation to doctor appointments, and did
- 23 shopping and prepared meals for those who needed
- 24 assistance. One unit assisted in covering the cost of
- 25 rebuilding a walk-in shower for a longtime Auxiliary

- 1 member who was recovering from surgery. While she was in
- 2 the convalescent home they spent 50 hours fellowshipping
- 3 and reading the bible to her, taking her on day trips in
- 4 her wheelchair, shopping for items to assist in her care,
- 5 and items to eat as well as providing her with a manicure
- 6 and pedicure. They were able to get over \$7,000 of dental
- 7 work donated to restore her teeth.
- 8 Another unit provided more than 100 handmade
- 9 blankets to 70 veterans in assisted living facilities and
- 10 nursing homes. One veteran admired his blanket and with
- 11 tears in his eyes said, "I am always cold and I appreciate
- 12 your gift."
- Our chaplains reached out with their loving
- 14 hearts to their communities, children and youth, the
- 15 elderly who were alone or in need, to our veterans and
- 16 their families. They provided gas, transportation,
- 17 clothing, and food through their Feed the Veterans
- 18 program. They visited veterans in hospitals and homes and
- 19 saw that their holidays were not spent alone.
- 20 Our compassion and giving chaplains through God's
- 21 graces were able to touch and uplift the lives of so many
- 22 people even when all they needed was just a hug or a kind
- 23 smile from someone.
- Now I would like -- Madam President, I would like
- 25 to present or announce my first place awards.

1 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Please do so. 2 CHAPLAIN RYE: Okay. For first place in Unit 3 Supplemental -- before I do this let me tell you. 4 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Marge, did you 5 have a budget committee report? 6 CHAPLAIN RYE: Yes, I do. 7 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Can you give that first? 8 9 CHAPLAIN RYE: Yes, I will. 10 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you. 11 CHAPLAIN RYE: The convention committee for the chaplain met on June 27th, 2013 in the Vista Room of the 12 13 Doral Hotel, Palm Springs, California at 10:00 a.m. The 14 statistical report I just read. Michelle Soares was appointed secretary. Mary Chava offered prayer, and 15 16 Arlene Bartlyn was appointed Sergeant-At-Arms. A total of 20 districts answered roll call and four visitors were 17 18 present. The committee agreed on the following report: We 19 20 opened with prayer and flag salute. Discussion was held on recommendations. Unit forms and district forms for 21 22 reporting were recommended to be more number consistent 23 with like a mirror image because the numbers didn't jibe from the units to the district report forms. And then we 24 25 closed with prayer at 10:35. There were no

recommendations for any code changes. 1 2 Okay. Now back to my awards. I brought my 3 awards to print here, but the hotel does not have the 4 facilities for me to do that. So I wanted to bring you guys up here to recognize you. I do have certificates for 5 a couple of you, but the other certificates will be mailed 6 7 out to you and I will get them to you as soon as possible, 8 but I want you to be recognized. 9 Okay. First place Unit Supplemental goes to 10 District 29, Unit 716, Carrie Taylor. 11 (Applause.) 12 CHAPLAIN RYE: First place for District 13 Supplemental goes to District 22, Mary Williams. 14 (Applause.) 15 CHAPLAIN RYE: Okay. And the rest of the awards 16 I will have to mail to you. But unit -- first place for 17 unit prayer book goes to District 10, Unit 837 Washington 18 Township, Maria Cruz. 19 (Applause.) 20 CHAPLAIN RYE: Okay. Second place for unit 21 prayer book goes to District 19, Unit 314 Hawthorne, Jean 22 Cooley-Desmeules. 23 (Applause.) CHAPLAIN RYE: And third place went to -- for the 24 25 unit prayer book went to District 16, Unit 56 Corporal

The statistical report of the chairman

appears on page 14 on the Book of Reports. 1 2 Marcia Munroe, District 11, was appointed secretary. Diana Livas, District 19, was appointed 3 4 chaplain. Rita Smith, District 29, was appointed as 5 Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 21 district delegates 6 answered roll call and we had three visitors. 7 The Department Community Service code was read with zero changes. Certificates for midyear awards were 8 9 handed out and for second and third place awards were 10 handed out. There were no resolutions and no 11 recommendations. And with no further business, the 12 meeting of the membership committee adjourned at 10:40 13 a.m. And there's a typo in my report. 14 May I continue with my supplemental? 15 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Yes, you may. 16 COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN KARANICKOLAS: Our 17 members have been very active in our communities and have 18 helped to make them the best they can be. - 7 These statistics show that our members donated over
- 8 \$98,637 and spent over 99,541 aiding our local food banks,
- 9 senior centers, homeless shelters, medical clinics,
- 10 nursing home, libraries, and museums.
- We participated in recycling and community
- 12 beautification, such as maintaining a rose garden in their
- 13 city local post. We walked many miles to promote cancer
- 14 awareness and women's programs.
- Our members promoted homelessness prevention and
- 16 we participated in local Stand Downs. One unit handed out
- 17 small metal flat cans with a candy bar inside and poppy
- 18 and told them to give their wife a box of candy and a
- 19 flower. It is the simple things that can bring so much
- 20 joy.
- Our members supported veteran's recovery homes,
- 22 welcome home celebrations, local USO facilities, the PIER
- 23 center, rescue missions, Feed the Hungry, and Meals on
- 24 Wheels programs. We volunteered at Family Readiness Group
- 25 Family Days and at the Ronald McDonald House. Our members

take pride in paying it forward. 1 2 We offered comfort at our local rest homes, 3 supported our local after school programs, senior outreach 4 programs, and transportation for those who do not drive. We visited shut-ins, provided them with home cooked meals 5 6 and even took them to doctor's appointments. 7 We received donations from our local businesses 8 and were able to send care packages to our troops in 9 harm's way. We received children's clothing to give to 10 needy families. We received evening dresses and handbags 11 for the young wives who would not have been able to attend 12 the military ball. We filled backpacks for needy children 13 returning to school. It is just so rewarding to see a 14 child's smile when they are given a new backpack filled 15 with school supplies. 16 A few ways our members were able to generate 17 donations was to hold soup socials, rummage sales, bake 18 sales, cake walks, and boutiques. Many of our members are "happy hookers." They knit sweaters, hats, scarfs, and 19 crochet lap blankets which are donated to our veterans and 20 21 the homeless. And you know who you "happy hookers" are. 22 We participated in community parades, Chamber of Commerce events, Law and Order events, and local church 23 events. We decorated rooms in nursing and assisted living 24 25 facilities.

1 The Wreaths Across American program was also a 2 great success. We put wreaths and flags on veterans' 3 grave sites and assisted with funeral processions of our fallen heroes. Excuse me. 4 This is just a small part of how dedicated our 5 6 members are to this great women's organization. This year 7 has been magical and mystical and there is no end to the creativity and dedication that our members have for their 8 9 community. Our members will continue to show the love and 10 spirit of giving and caring. 11 Madam President, this concludes my report. May I 12 proceed with the first place awards? 13 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Please do. 14 COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN KARANICKOLAS: Our 15 first place Best District Supplemental goes to District 16 28, Susan Baker, District Chair. 17 (Applause.) 18 COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN KARANICKOLAS: Our 19 first place Best Unit Supplemental goes to Unit 777, Carol 20 Fuqua, Unit Chair. 21 (Applause.) 22 COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN KARANICKOLAS: And we 23 have a senior volunteer of the year award goes to Joan M. Lucas, Unit 53, District 21. 24 25 (Applause.)

11	LEGISLATIVE REPORT
12	
13	LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN FERCHO: Good morning,
14	again. The preconvention Legislative meeting was called
15	to order at 11:00 a.m. in the Canyon Suite D at the El
16	Doral Resort in Palm Springs on June 27th, 2013. The
17	statistical report of this chairman appears on page 18 of
18	the Book of Reports.
19	The delegates approved of the following
20	appointments: Secretary: Delores Ryan, District 15.
21	Chaplain: Barbara LaDoucer, District 4.
22	Sergeant-At-Arms: Jeri Adams, District 16.
23	Chaplain offered prayer. Pledge of Allegiance
24	was led by the sergeant-at-arms and the preamble was
25	recited. Kind of. Kind of.

The secretary proceeded with roll call. There 1 2 were 18 delegates present and three quests. The code was 3 read and one code change was presented. It was moved and 4 seconded and passed in committee to present to this delegation. 5 6 At this time, Madam President, I would like to 7 read that code change. 8 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: I don't have a 9 copy of your code change. 10 LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN FERCHO: They're handing it 11 out right now. It's attached to the minutes of my 12 meeting. Attached to the minutes of the meeting. 13 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Go ahead. 14 LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN FERCHO: Thank you. Code 2 15 now reads: "The Department Chairman may attend the 16 Awareness Assembly sponsored by the National organization if approved by the Department President. Funds not to 17 18 exceed \$125 per diem for three days shall be budgeted 19 annually to help defray the cost of attending the 20 Awareness Assembly." 21 Code change to read: "The Department Chairman 22 may attend the American Legion Auxiliary Washington D.C. 23 Conference sponsored by the National organization if approved by the Department President. The chairman's 24 25 expenses cannot exceed the amount budgeted annually to

- 1 help defray the costs of attending the American Legion
- 2 Auxiliary Washington D.C. Conference."
- 3 The rationale for this change is that the
- 4 National -- National has changed the name of the event
- 5 from the "Awareness Assembly" to the "American Legion
- 6 Auxiliary Washington D.C. Conference, " so we need to
- 7 change this code to reflect this change. Also at this
- 8 time we budget \$1,000 for the chairman to attend this
- 9 event, but this amount has to be approved by the
- 10 delegation annually when accepting the budget. Changing
- 11 the wording of the sentence number 2 in this code to read:
- 12 "The chairman's expenses cannot exceed the amount budgeted
- annually to help defray the cost of attending the American
- 14 Legion Auxiliary Washington D.C. Conference" we accomplish
- 15 two things: One, if the budgeted amount changes we are
- 16 not -- if the budgeted amount changes, we are not locked
- into a figure. And, two, if the length of the conference
- 18 changes, we are not locked into three days.
- 19 Madam President, I move the acceptance of this
- 20 code change.
- 21 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: There is a
- 22 motion to change the code in the legislative. It now
- 23 reads: "The Department Chairman may attend the Awareness
- 24 Assembly sponsored by the National organization if
- 25 approved by the Department President. Funds not to exceed

\$125 per diem for three days shall be budgeted annually to 1 2 help defray the cost of attending the Awareness Assembly." 3 Changed to read: "The Department Chairman may attend the American Legion Auxiliary Washington D.C. 4 Conference sponsored by the National organization if 5 6 approved by the Department President. The chairman's 7 exceeds cannot exceed the amount budgeted annually to help 8 defray the costs of attending the American Legion 9 Auxiliary Washington D.C. Conference." 10 Is there any discussion? 11 (No response.) 12 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: All those in 13 favor of this code change? Okay. Come to the 14 microphone, please. 15 FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: The 16 rationale at this time says that we budget a thousand. 17 Well, our budget was changed to 375, so I just wanted to 18 bring that up because --LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN FERCHO: That was approved 19 20 at last convention was 1,000. 21 FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Yes, that 22 was 1,000. So just keep that in mind because the 23 expenses. I know you want this at your discretion, but I 24 just wanted to mention --25 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: I'm sorry,

- 1 Norma. Would you please repeat the first part of what you
- 2 stated? I couldn't see or hear you.
- FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Well, if
- 4 the rationale was we budgeted 1,000 last year --
- 5 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Right.
- 6 FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Well, this
- 7 year we dropped it down to 375.
- 8 LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN FERCHO: That's when you
- 9 present the budget this year and that's at the discretion.
- 10 If per that amount changes, if we change this code,
- 11 whatever is budgeted would be accepted.
- 12 FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: So we're
- 13 eliminating all the dollar figures.
- 14 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Yes, because
- 15 you're budgeting -- you have it in the budget the amount
- that's going to be hopefully approved as 375 for the
- 17 entire time.
- 18 FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Okay.
- 19 That's all I wanted to bring up, so --
- 20 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you. Is
- 21 that right? Ruby would like to speak.
- 22 PARLIAMENTARIAN KAPSALIS: Madam Department
- 23 President, Ruby Kapsalis, Past Department President. The
- 24 code -- the code currently allows 125 days for -- \$375.
- 25 125 days. All right. You've already wore me out. This

- 1 parliamentarian job really gets to you and finance and all
- 2 this other stuff.
- Anyway, \$125 for three days. And the reasoning
- 4 behind that is because as NEC, she gets her airfare paid
- 5 by National, plus she gets one day's per diem. So I don't
- 6 see a problem myself in taking the \$1,000 that was
- 7 budgeted erroneously last year because it should have been
- 8 budgeted for 375, removing the dollar amount and just
- 9 letting the finance committee review it annually and

- in this change was to eliminate the dollar amount, so as
- 14 it changes --
- 15 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you.
- 16 LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN FERCHO: Because it could
- 17 change all the way around lots of times.
- 18 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you. Any
- 19 further discussion on this motion?
- 20 (No response.)
- 21 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: All those in
- 22 favor, say aye.
- 23 ALL PRESENT: Aye.
- DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Any opposed say
- 25 no.

1 (No response.) 2 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Motion carries. You can continue. 3 4 LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN FERCHO: Thank you, thank you. We had no resolutions. Awards were handed out and a 5 6 copy of the list was placed in the delegates' packets and 7 posted in the department office. 8 Madam Wizard, this completes the minutes of the 9 legislative meeting. May I continue with my state remarks 10 and first place awards? 11 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Yes, you may. 12 LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN FERCHO: Madam Wizard, thank 13 you for giving me this appointment. It has been an honor 14 to serve as your Legislative Chairman this year. I want 15 to thank all the grassroots advocates and Giant Slayers, 16 unit and district legislative chairmen for your constant 17 pursuit this year to make our legislators aware of 18 legislation that affects our veterans, active military and 19 their families. 20 This year we were dubbed "Giant Slayers," and 21 what an appropriate term. I know that many of you have 22 felt like David and the establishment being Goliath and you would not be far from the truth. Many times I know 23 that it feels like it's an overwhelming task to try and 24 25 conquer all the many pieces of legislation that is out

there that affects our veterans and our military, but 1 2 through your attendance at the Department of California 3 Day at the State Capitol May 1st and the 2013 Washington 4 conference, we have certainly thrown many stones in our 5 efforts to slay the giant. 6 I also want to thank all the Legislative Chairmen 7 for their determination and diligence in conveying to 8 their members not only the importance of bombarding our 9 giants with e-mails, letters, and texts, but also for 10 their efforts in organizing town meetings, town home 11 meetings, meeting the candidate night, and all the other 12 forms of forums that gave our grassroots advocates an 13 opportunity to impress on our legislatures who we are, 14 what we are do, and making it very clear that we would not stand for them balancing the budget on the backs of our 15 16 veterans and our active duty military. 17 (Applause.) 18 LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN FERCHO: Thank you. 19 this being presidential election year, our grassroots advocates really rolled up their sleeves and picked up a 20 21 bunch of stones and off they went into battle. 22 worked numerous hours making sure that everyone that was 23 eligible to vote signed up to vote. They worked at campaign headquarters for the candidates of their choice. 24

They assisted in polling places and volunteering to take

25

members that do not drive to polling places to vote. 1 2 One huge issue that California went to battle on 3 was letting our giants know that our troops didn't get 4 their absentee ballots to vote in the election. And this was inexcusable. These men and women are overseas 5 6 fighting for our country and our right to vote and they 7 didn't get to participate in the election. That is not 8 just not okay. 9 Our members volunteered over 923 hours this year 10 to slay the giants, and I feel that many of their stones 11 hit the mark and our legislatures are well aware of who we 12 are and our mission. But we can't stop now. We can't 13 ever stop. This is all -- there is always new legislation 14 being presented that affects our veterans, active duty military and their families and their way of life. We 15 16 must continue being diligent giant slayers and grassroots 17 advocates to ensure that our veterans and military have 18 all the benefits they deserve and have fought for. This concludes my legislative report. May I give 19 20 out my first place awards? 21 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Yes, you may. 22 LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN FERCHO: Thank you. There 23 was a whole lot of awards in committee because there was a lot of calculations in this chairmanship. The second 24 25 place supplemental went to Stephanie Janji, Unit 715,

8	AMERICANISM REPORT
9	
10	AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MARSH: Good morning,
11	ladies. The convention committee on Americanism met June
12	27th at the Canyon Suite C room at the Doral Resort in
13	Palm Springs, California. The statistical report of the
14	chairman appears on page 13 on your Book of Reports.
15	Tamra Duron from District 25 served as secretary,
16	Alzora Carter from District 23 offered prayer, and Delores
17	Ryan was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 20
18	districts answered roll call and there were seven visitors
19	present.
20	The committee agreed on the following report:
21	The Americanism committee was called to order at 10:00
22	a.m. The department code was read and there were no code
23	changes. Discussion followed with suggestions to improve
24	and promote the essay contest. Several good suggestions
25	were given and recommendations will be written up and

passed to the next chairman. Second and third place 1 2 awards were presented for essays and supplementals. 3 meeting was adjourned at 10:46 am. 4 Madam President, that's my committee report. 5 I proceed with my supplemental? 6 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Yes, you may. 7 AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MARSH: In keeping with Department President's theme, the District Americanism 8 9 Chairmen were known as "Firecrackers" and the unit 10 chairmen as "Sparklers" to signify they were the spark and 11 energy for patriotism in their districts and units. Along 12 with the motto "Veterans, Our Biggest Treasure," how could 13 we not have a fun and productive year. We started the 14 year with workshops across the state to inform the new 15 district and unit chairmen, and I should have also added 16 department chairman, what their chairmanship responsibilities and possibilities were. That a packet 17 was mailed to each district that included the department 18 19 code and paperwork pertinent to the Americanism program. 20 The Americanism essay contest showed a 21 disappointing participation rate according to the reports 22 received by this chairman. Concerns expressed were too 23 few teachers who were willing to participate, school districts had no time on their agendas, too few willing 24 25 unit chairmen to take on this task, and too many other

organizations offering the same program. But although 1 2 participation on the department level could definitely use 3 some improvement, those that did participate expressed 4 appreciation for the program and did a great job. 5 The following essay titles for the year 2013-2014 were approved at midyear. They were Group 1, grades 4 and 6 7 5: Why should I show respect for the American flag? 8 Group 2, grades 6 and 7: How can I make a difference 9 where I am? Group 3, grades 8 and 9: What does the 10 Pledge of Allegiance mean to me? Group 4, grades 10 to 11 12: Why should I care about the elections? Group 5, 12 exceptional needs, What is a veteran? 13 I don't know if you've noticed the theme. 14 title makes them think about what it means to them, not 15 just a general idea, but what it personally means to them. 16 Units reported folding and giving out pocket 17 flags to departing servicemen and those already deployed. 18 Many units found motivation and enthusiasm to "Get Out the Vote." The campaign took route in different directions 19 including issuing pamphlets, giving rides to local polling 20 21 places, working on voter registration, manning polling 22 places, speaking to others about the importance of voting, 23 attending panels discussions and election time, printed articles in newsletters, work telephone campaigns, set up 24

booths at local events, e-mail promotions, talking to

25

community groups, talking to people at their workplace, 1 2 and even having students decorate ballot boxes. Promoting citizenship is a very underreported 3 activity because members promote citizenship every day in 4 5 ways they don't even realize. Members reported serving on jury duty, donating and volunteering for various 6 7 charities, honored Citizenship Day with a dinner and dance with their essay dinner as a special guest, mentoring 8 9 people attending citizenship classes and programs, 10 teaching flag etiquette to schools and youth groups, 11 sponsoring post contests, planting a flower garden for 12 POW/MIA day, various walks for charity, and helping 13 neighbors in need. 14 One district participates as a district in 15 working with the immigration service providing poppy corsages, patriotic ribbons, flags, flag pins, and flag 16 etiquette pamphlets. Auxiliary members also serve 17 18 alongside the Legionnaires in the Honor Guard for memorial services. 19 20 Auxiliary members played an important role in 21 American Legion programs in the form of donations, 22 fundraisers, serving as judges and helping promote the 23 oratorical contest in the schools and served as moral support for the Legion as only Auxiliary members can do. 24 25 A favorite part of the Americanism program is, of

- 1 course, when we can proudly present and show off the
- 2 beautiful flag of our country. Auxiliary members
- 3 distribute flags to students, neighbors, new and
- 4 soon-to-be citizens, and members of the business
- 5 community. Flag folding and flag etiquette are taught at
- 6 every opportunity. Flag retirement ceremonies, Scouting
- 7 activity, local parades, patriotic holidays, unit
- 8 meetings, memorial services, and visiting school
- 9 classrooms are all occasions where the showing and the
- 10 pride in the red, white, and blue excel. Along with the
- 11 American flag, the blue star and gold star banners are
- dear to the heart of the Auxiliary. Many units presented
- 13 their flags in their communities.
- 14 Patriotic and veterans holidays are celebrated by
- 15 Auxiliary members. Parades and dinners abound. Thousands
- of flags are placed in cemeteries across the state on
- 17 Memorial Day. Wreaths displaying flags and poppies are
- 18 placed at Veteran memorials.
- 19 The statistical -- as I said, the statistical
- 20 records for Americanism can be found in the Book of
- 21 Records. A list of all second and third place winners and
- 22 100 percent reporting awards has been, or will be right
- 23 after this meeting, posted in the department office for
- 24 your viewing. A list was also passed out in committee of
- 25 the second and third place winners. Of course you don't

know who the first place winners were. 1 2 Madam President, this concludes my report. May I 3 continue with my first place awards? 4 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Yes, please do. AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MARSH: Thank you. Okay. 5 In the essence of time, if I could have you hand these to 6 7 them as I read them. Okay. This is my -- well, it's my second favorite thing to do. After getting money myself, 8 9 I like to give it out. So with that in mind, I'm going to 10 present the first place essay award winners. The first 11 place in Group 1 is Celina Allen from Durham Elementary 12 School sponsored by Unit 673, District 4. 13 (Applause.) 14 AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MARSH: Okay. Did these ladies not get their books? Or maybe somebody's not 15 16 there. Okay. I'm sorry. Group 2 -- does that mean I get 17 to keep it? Group 2, first place is Kennan Davis, Round 18 Valley Elementary School, sponsored by Unit 118, District 19 27. 20 (Applause.) 21 AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MARSH: First place from 22 Group 3 is Anna -- and I'm sorry. I'm not even going to 23 murder her last name. From Steven Hansen Tehachapi High School sponsored by Unit 221, District 15. 24 25 (Applause.)

1 AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MARSH: Group 4, which is 2 the educational grant that comes along with the nice check 3 and then a grant, a scholarship. Goes to Maren Rascon 4 McClanahan sponsored by Unit 291, District 29. 5 (Applause.) 6 AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MARSH: Group 5, first place 7 award goes to Melissa Rios from Lone Hill Middle School, 8 sponsored by Unit 475, District 18. 9 (Applause.) 10 AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MARSH: And we have the 11 Veronica Spence award which will be given to Katherine 12 Pope from Truman Benedict School, sponsored by Unit 496, 13 District 19. 14 (Applause.) 15 AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MARSH: Congratulations to 16 these units. In lieu of time I will not read the second 17 and third place winners because they will be posted. 18 First place District Supplemental. And I'm sorry, ladies, there's no checks that goes with these. 19 20 You just get a piece of paper. Okay. First place 21 District Supplemental -- and I'm seeing who this goes 22 with -- goes to District 19, Wilma Miner. 23 (Applause.) 24 AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MARSH: First place unit 25 supplement goes to Ann Marie Brown, Chairman, Unit 6,

1 District 22. 2 (Applause.) 3 AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MARSH: Okay. Also awarded 4 -- I will read these two. Awarded in committee, but the certificates were given there was the outstanding 5 6 citizenship program which went to District 22, Lois 7 Cornish, chairman. 8 (Applause.) 9 AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MARSH: And the best youth 10 Americanism promotion went to Unit 716, District 29, Carol 11 Borgman, chairman. 12 (Applause.) 13 AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MARSH: Madam President, 14 this concludes my report of the Americanism chairman. 15 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you very 16 much, Loretta. Is Junior Conference and Junior Activities ready? Okay. We'll then hear from our -- we're running 17 18 out of people from our morning agenda. Somebody needs to 19 sent out an APB. 20 Okay. Can the Sergeant-at-Arms and Marshal -oh, she's back. She snuck in. I didn't get to stand her 21 22 up or stand you up. 23 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: I'm standing up. 24 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you. We 25 will now hear from our Great Wiz who just blew back in,

3	DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Hello, ladies.
4	I've got to tell you. Even though we're a little warm
5	over here, if you were at the Legion convention, it's hot.
6	
7	DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT'S REPORT
8	
9	DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Okay. It's
10	wonderful to be here today at your convention, to be able
11	to hear your reports and the reports of the endeavors that
12	have been accomplished during my term of your Department
13	President. It has been an interesting year to say the
14	least.
15	For those who were able to attend the chilly
16	midyear at Travis Air Force Base, we are now on the
17	opposite side of the weather pattern with heat. A lot of
18	you didn't know that our National President Peggy Thomas

- 3 valor. She is doing fabulous work. Thank you District 11
- 4 for your hospitality. I truly enjoyed that visit.
- 5 The next stop was the department for the budget
- 6 meeting. This was two and a half very intense days of
- 7 studying our lack of money, the move, and the future
- 8 finances of our department.
- 9 Just last week I attended Girls State and I can
- 10 only say wow. The committee is doing a stupendous job
- 11 presenting the workings of government to the young ladies
- 12 in attendance. Truly this was a jam packed, labor
- intensive, fun filled learning week which could not have
- 14 happened without wonderful volunteers.
- 15 Stella Avina, Diane DeLashmit, and I toured the
- 16 Doral Resort months ago. We were all so very pleased with
- 17 this facility and their willingness to work with us to
- 18 host a convention. What a nice venue for our event.
- 19 Thank you, Stella, and your committee.
- I would be remiss if I did not thank the
- 21 Department Officers and Chairman for taking care of
- 22 business all year. These officers and chairman have sent
- 23 bulletins, answered questions, and have been available to
- 24 you all year. Our District President's Terry's Treasures
- 25 have been at the throne of our districts taking care of

- 1 business, assisting units and helping our organization
- 2 move forward. Then there have been the "Elves," the
- 3 hospital representatives, deputies, and volunteers who
- 4 each day give countless hours of service, time, and money
- 5 to help our hospitalized veterans.
- For those of you who are not aware, our office
- 7 has moved and is now in a new location in San Francisco.
- 8 We hope to be back at the War Memorial Building in 2015.
- 9 This past year has been trying times for our department
- 10 that all the tax filings units and districts have had to
- 11 assume. National has started letting units become "Live
- 12 Units" enabling units to add new members, change addresses
- 13 relieving some of the burden from our department office
- 14 staff. If you do not belong to a "Live Unit," you need to
- 15 consider signing up for \$10 a year. You are able to print
- 16 your unit roster, labels, and other reports.
- 17 On that note, our membership chairman, "The
- 18 Leprechaun, " Danielle White has spent more than her pot of

- 20 bulletins, phone calls, and the numbers of members in

- 25 work as one team with one purpose to reach one goal.

Then there is my very patient and knowledgeable advisory committee who has done a wonderful 24 25 job of supplying me with information and advice. Thank

you, ladies. 1 2 We have answered the siren song of our Past Department Presidents to become officers and chairman of 3 4 the American Legion Auxiliary Department of California. Our sirens are just like an old truck. It keeps -- it 5 6 takes a licking and keeps on ticking. We 12 will be presenting that check before the end of the year. 13 I have listened to countless hours of books on 14 tape while driving up and down Interstate 5, gotten lost numerous times, but the end justified the means. Thank 15 you for my very magical, mystical fantasy year while 16 serving "veterans, our biggest treasure." Thank you, 17 18 ladies. 19 (Applause.) 20 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: You have heard 21 the report by Department President Mikesell. By your 22 applause, we accept your report. Thank you, Madam 23 President. 24 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Okay. We're 25 going to hear our Parliamentarian's report. Ruby

1	DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: To conform with
2	National, she moved that all department codes stating
3	standard annual report form dates of the fourth Friday in
4	April for units and the second Friday in May be changed to
5	the second Friday in April, unit to district, first Friday
6	in May, district to department. In addition, that the
7	department code be reviewed for all pertinent codes
8	relative to this change and corrected accordingly.
9	Now is there any discussion?
10	(No response.)
11	DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: All those in
12	favor, say aye.
13	ALL PRESENT: Aye.
14	DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Any opposed?
15	(No response.)
16	DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: So moved. Thank
17	you, Parliamentarian.
18	At this point in time we'll hear the report of
19	the Vice President Anita Biggs. Ladies, I need to remind
20	you if you're going to take pictures, please take them
21	over there to the right after the reports are done.
22	
23	DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT REPORT
24	
25	DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you,

- 1 Madam President. Good morning. This has been a whirlwind
- 2 second half year filled with some magical, mystical and

- 21 site of our department office.

- 23 honor at the Community Post 46 in Culver City. I can tell
- 24 you without a doubt the ladies in my Unit 252 and 23rd
- 25 District definitely know how to put on the Ritz as we were

- 1 sold out, and everything from the food to the
- 2 entertainment and decorations were truly out of sight. It
- 3 was great to see so many friends that night.
- 4 Later in April, attending Junior Conference was
- 5 so much fun. Little Talia. Such a great president. The
- 6 Western Division National Vice President was our special
- 7 guest, and I had the honor of installing the new officers,
- 8 including Deja'Nae Trimble, Honorary Junior President, who
- 9 is also from the 23rd District. Very excited.
- 10 (Applause.)
- 11 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: May was a very
- 12 busy month as I, along with the incoming Membership
- 13 Chairman, Secretary Peggy, and our current little
- 14 leprechaun, Membership Chairman Danielle, traveled to
- 15 Indianapolis for the first ever Department Leadership
- 16 National Conference, a combination of the former
- 17 membership meeting and the presidents and secretaries
- 18 conference. We were in for a treat, and this was a great
- 19 idea. This meeting was very well done and we all learned
- 20 so much.
- 21 The California delegation was very proud of our
- 22 own Nancy Brown-Park, the leading candidate for National
- 23 President. Her and the national team did a fantastic job.
- 24 And we were graced with a little show that Melanie Taylor
- 25 was a part of. It was unbelievable, but we won't go into

that. It was very cute. I have it on video, if anyone 1 2 wants to see it. Later that month it was back to San Francisco for 3 the annual budget meeting. 2	SECRETARY/TREASURER REPORT
3	
4	SECRETARY/TREASURER VOGELE: Good morning. Roar.
5	This past year the Dragon Lair's pot of gold has been
6	shining like a beacon due to all of you leprechauns that
7	have been sending in.
8	As of this past Wednesday, the Department of
9	California is sixth in the nation with membership of 97.2
10	percent.
11	(Applause.)
12	SECRETARY/TREASURER VOGELE: That equals 24,000
13	members. We can still bring that number up so Madam
14	Department President Wiz and our new Nancy Brown and
15	our own Nancy Brown-Park, who is the American Legion
16	Auxiliary National Vice President, will be really shining
17	at this year's National Convention in Houston, Texas. Our
18	pot of gold, department membership clerk, says to give all
19	of you members out there a huge kiss and an I love you.
20	If you attended midyear, you heard me saying that
21	we are now on our fourth bookkeeper since I had started a
22	year and a half ago. Little Puff, our dragonette is
23	learning and growing while working in the department
24	office. It's extremely helpful for our members to use
25	correct donation forms when sending in their donations.

- 1 No matter what you send into the office, please, please,
- 2 please use the correct form, read the instructions, and be
- 3 aware of deadline dates. And I know you always remember
- 4 to write your unit and district on everything you send
- 5 you.
- The move we have been talking about has finally
- 7 happened. Since 1932 the American Legion Auxiliary
- 8 Department of California has been spoiled living in a
- 9 palace in the Veterans War Memorial Building across the
- 10 street from City Hall. Sorry. My typewriter just -- I'm
- 11 sorry about that.
- On May 11th, 2013 we were relocated to the 13th
- 13 -- to the corner of 13th and Mission Street in the mission
- 14 district. This area is known for gang activity. We share
- 15 the new building with parole officers, drug clinics, sex
- 16 registrants and homeless people sleeping on the street.
- 17 There is a -- and then there's the parking
- 18 situation. There is none. The building management has
- 19 offered us one parking space for \$275. I'm going to read
- 20 this way anyway, but it was voted down in finance. If one
- of our part-time employees parked on the street, fed the
- 22 meter, it would cost over \$450 a month. The parking space
- 23 would certainly help with security and safety. This will
- 24 also give the President, Finance Committee, or any other
- 25 dignitary somewhere to park when they came to visit.

1 The American Legion Auxiliary Department of 2 California, the American Legion Department of California, the American Legion War Memorial Commission and several 3 4 other San Francisco American Legion posts have all been 5 relocated to an area of small offices. I am very 6 fortunate to be able to share an office with the American 7 Legion Department of California Adjutant and their 8 executive secretary. 9 Three offices down is the American Legion 10 Department of California. That's the 11-by-20 room -- I 11 read this wrong. It's the one I mentioned earlier. One 12 wall across -- one wall has cross support beams that 13 extend into the room two feet into the room. So now we're 14 talking about a 9-by-20 foot room. These support beams 15 are there for the fourth floor that's going to be built 16 above us. Also the room -- also in the room is the 17 copier/scanner/fax machine, postage machine, five file 18 19 cabinets, two storage cabinets, a storage rack and two 20 employees. We have a problem with fiberglass dust in our 21 room due to ceiling tiles missing and exposing unwrapped 22 fiberglass insulation. This has now been taken care of, 23 but we have also had serious issues so a report has been 24 filed with OSHA and the building department. 25 It's also become such a health issue that our

- 1 employees have gone to their doctor requesting that they
- 2 no longer work in the office and work from home. We have
- 3 accommodated this by requesting them to do so. Work is
- 4 done via e-mail and on-line. The employees also come to
- 5 the office to pick up assignments and then they return
- 6 them when we're complete. We are hoping that the
- 7 building management can place us in another office that is
- 8 clean of these issues.
- 9 We also have had a local Legionnaire speak to us
- 10 regarding moving to a building he owns in downtown San
- 11 Francisco. We are trying to do whatever we can to keep
- 12 our employees safe and healthy.
- Well, my first two years as the Department
- 14 Secretary/Treasurer have certainly been very interesting
- 15 and unbelievable. Four bookkeepers, lots of meetings here
- 16 and there, and then this move. I am trying to follow
- 17 National's lead: patience, kindness, and being courteous
- 18 to all of our members. If you have a question, please
- 19 check with your unit leadership, then your district. But
- 20 remember you can always call the department office. With
- 21 the new office situation, it may take us longer to get
- 22 back to you, but please have some patience with us and we
- 23 will be courteous to you. Thank you.
- DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Thank you, Peggy.
- 25 Our next chairman we will hear from will be Girls State,

Constitution & Bylaws, and then Past Presidents Parlay. 1 2 Have you noticed our new Parliamentarian? Ms. Odette has assumed the chair. She takes all donations. 3 4 She said don't ask her any questions; she doesn't know anything. Right. 5 6 Are any of you ladies ready for your report? Put 7 those little legs in second gear, Ms. Dona. Do you have 8 your committee report up here, Dona, is that --9 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN ENRIGHT: Yes? 10 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Is any of your committee here? 11 12 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN ENRIGHT: I have one right 13 there. And I need Gloria Sinopoli and Esther Garcia if 14 she's here. 15 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Esther is at the 16 Legion. Okay. As soon as the troll gets it together, 17 she's going to start speaking. 18 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN ENRIGHT: I'm not a troll 19 yet. I'm a mermaid. 20 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Oh. 21 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN ENRIGHT: Payback. 22 23 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN REPORT 24 25 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN ENRIGHT: Good morning.

- 1 convention Committee on Girls State met on June 26th, 2013
- 2 in the Oleander Ballroom of the El Doral Resort, Palm
- 3 Springs, California. Cindy Newman, District 13 was
- 4 appointed secretary. Cyd Kintzer, District 25, offered
- 5 prayer, and Karen Herrera, District 15 was appointed
- 6 Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 25 district delegates
- 7 answered roll call and there were 11 visitors present.
- 8 The committee met and recommends the following

All fees to be sent to the 19 Department Office." 20 Code 26 would read: "Applications must be 21 submitted from the units to the Department Chairman by deadline date of March 31st. All fees to be sent to the 22 23 Department Office." Is there any discussion? 24 25 (No response.)

1 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: All those in 2 favor, say aye. 3 ALL PRESENT: Aye. 4 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Any opposed? 5 (No response.) 6 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Motion carried. 7 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN ENRIGHT: Thank you. 8 Certificates for 100 percent reporting were presented in 9 committee. Second and third place certificates for Best 10 Supplemental were also presented in committee, along with certificates of participation for all districts submitting 11 12 a supplemental. A complete list of awards will be posted 13 outside the secretary's office. 14 Madam President, this concludes the report of the 15 Girls State Committee. I move for its acceptance. 16 (Applause.) 17 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: By your applause 18 you've accepted the report. 19 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN ENRIGHT: Madam President, 20 may I continue with my supplemental report? 21 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: You may. 22 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN ENRIGHT: First of all, I would like to introduce the committee. We have Zana 23 24 Chaney. 25 (Applause.)

1 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN ENRIGHT: Gloria Sinopoli. 2 (Applause.) GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN ENRIGHT: And she is the 3 4 president's alternate. Assistant director is Judy 5 Tabacchi. 6 (Applause.) 7 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN ENRIGHT: And the director cannot be here today. Okay. Thank you, Madam President 8 Terry. Units and districts within the department worked 9 10 their magic to raise funds to send 497 delegates to Girls State. The Girls State Alumni Foundation offered \$200 fee 11 12 assistance for units sponsoring new schools. Five 13 participated. There were a total of 25 new schools. 14 Fundraisers were held up and down the state 15 throughout the year. Units had breakfasts, lunches, and 16 dinners. They had bake sales, no-bake sales, car washes, recycling, garage sales and they worked with other 17 18 nonprofit organizations, including our own American Legion posts, Sons of the American Legion Squadrons, and American 19 Legion Riders. They contacted local businesses to provide 20 21 sponsorship. This effort not only helped with getting the 22 word out on our organization, but also provided these 23 wonderful young ladies an opportunity to learn about the workings of our government and themselves. 24 25 American Legion Auxiliary members also gave their

- 1 time to attend the session last week volunteering their
- 2 time to be a grandmother, a chairman, director, assistant
- 3 director, nurse, and city and county counselors, run the
- 4 store inventorying before and after the session. A staff
- of over 60, with the minority being ALA members. These
- 6 members volunteered close to 9,000 hours to help make this
- 7 program such a success. What an acknowledgment to the
- 8 benefit derived from this program. Of course these
- 9 volunteers get a benefit too, lots of hugs and smiles for
- 10 the many treats their grandmas provide. But isn't that
- 11 the job of a grandma? You spoil them, and then you send
- 12 them home? We're good at that.
- 13 Twenty-one districts held an orientation event
- 14 for the new delegates. Arrangements were made to have
- 15 Girls State alumni, Assemblywoman, and Girls State staff
- 16 speak about their experiences and what these delegates
- 17 could look forward to during their week.
- 18 This chairman was fortunate to attend orientation
- 19 events for five districts. How wonderful to see firsthand
- 20 the different ways used to ready our delegates for their
- 21 unbelievable opportunity. Excuse me.
- I can tell each of you here today, every dollar
- 23 you invested into the program to send a girl comes back
- 24 tenfold in what they will be able to bring forward with
- 25 knowledge of government workings for productive change in

1 our great country. 2 Now our first place winners for Best Supplemental 3 for unit and district. And I'm going to tell you this was 4 not an easy decision. For the Unit Best Supplemental goes to Unit 247, Chairman Margaret "Peggy" McIntosh. 5 6 (Applause.) 7 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN ENRIGHT: And I would hand 8 you the certificate, but it's sitting in that little red 9 thing next to me. So thank you. My certificates are 10 sitting over there. District's Best Supplemental. And I'm going to 11 12 tell you I did receive nine, which was wonderful. It was 13 extremely difficult, but it will go to District 29, our 14 energetic Chairman Elizabeth Tomlin, who's also the Girls 15 State nurse. 16 (Applause.) 17 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN ENRIGHT: Thank you. 4	GIRLS STATE DIRECTOR REPORT
5	
6	GIRLS STATE ASSISTANT DIRECTOR TABACCHI: Sorry,
7	but I can't stand on it and I can't straddle it.
8	Madam Department President Terry and delegates to
9	this convention. I am giving this report on behalf of the
10	Girls State director Sherry Schneider.
11	A little over a week ago, 497 young women leaders
12	from all over our great state converged on the Claremont
13	McKenna campus to begin the 70th session of California
14	Girls State. These young women, entering their senior
15	year in high school came, from very diverse backgrounds
16	and cultures, but joined together in a spirit of
17	sisterhood and unity. Lessons in citizenship, love of our
18	country, and plain fun were shared throughout the week.
19	Citizens had opportunities to run for public
20	office at the city, county, and state levels. Win or
21	lose, the girls learned valuable lessons in resilience,
22	grace, and strength. In addition, they exercised their
23	democratic right to vote, gaining a greater understanding
24	of their responsibilities as citizens.
25	Our service project this year was folding pocket

flags. The citizens of Girls State folded over 600 flags 1 with small thank you notes included that will be sent to 2 3 our men and women serving our country around the world. 4 Each year the Girls State service projects helps connect 5 our citizens to the mission of the American Legion 6 Auxiliary. 7 Our department was honored when our 2012 Girls 8 Nation senator, Alauna Sessoms-Hall, was elected president of Girls Nation. Alauna did a fantastic job and we were 9 10 all very proud of her accomplishments. 11 (Applause.) 12 GIRLS STATE ASSISTANT DIRECTOR TABACCHI: This 13 year the girls selected to represent California at the 14 2013 session of Girls Nation are Jillian Free from Unit 170, District 19. 15 16 (Applause.) 17 GIRLS STATE ASSISTANT DIRECTOR TABACCHI: And 18 Cassidy Mayeda Unit 416, District 22. 19 (Applause.) 20 GIRLS STATE ASSISTANT DIRECTOR TABACCHI: Kelsey 21 Harper from Unit 66 in District 16 was selected as the 22 outstanding citizen of the session. 23 (Applause.) 24 GIRLS STATE ASSISTANT DIRECTOR TABACCHI: And 25 Jillian Free from Unit 170, District 19 was elected

Governor of Girls State. 1 2 (Applause.) 3 GIRLS STATE ASSISTANT DIRECTOR TABACCHI: This year we began the process of online registration for our 4 delegates and alternates. Next year we hope to make the 5 6 registration completely paperless by having all the girls 7 submit their forms online. This process will not only 8 save us money, it will save countless manpower hours spent 9 going through and checking forms. Girls will be unable to submit forms that are not complete, which will save 10 countless headaches for the unit chairman, the Girls State 11 Chairman, and the director. In addition, we will be able 12 13 to contact delegates, alternates, and their parents 14 directly with updates and reminders. 15 We, as an organization, need to continue to find 16 creative ways to fundraise so we can maintain the quality and the status of the program. It is my hope that each of 17 18 you will make a commitment to help grow the program and continue to enrich the lives of young women leaders across 19 20 our state. 21 Madam President, this concludes my report and I 22 move its acceptance. 23 (Applause.) 24 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: By your applause 25 you accept her report. - 2 Gigi Manno, District 22, was appointed secretary.
- 3 Denise Coleman, District 23, offered prayer, and Rosemary
- 4 Weber, District 16, was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. A
- 5 total of 21 district delegates answered roll call. There
- 6 was one visitor present.
- 7 The committee agreed to the following report.
- 8 The department code was read and the following change was
- 9 made. Code number 2 now reads: "The Past Presidents
- 10 Parlay" -- excuse me. I had to move a wire.
- "The Past Presidents Scholarship has been
- designated as a nursing scholarship by the Past Department
- 13 Presidents Parlay and shall be awarded annually in the
- amount of \$2,000 to a veteran or a veteran's wife or
- 15 husband, widow or widower, or child of a veteran of the

1 on Terrorism." 2 Madam Department President, by direction of the 3 Convention Committee, I move the adoption of this code 4 change. 5 PARLIAMENTARIAN KAPSALIS: Second. 6 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: It's been moved 7 and seconded to change Girls State code number 2 -- I mean Past Presidents. Why am I on Girls State? Listen, I was 8 9 at Girls State. That's why I'm at Girls State. Past Presidents Parlay code number 2 presently reads: "The 10 11 Past Presidents Scholarship has been designated as a 12 nursing scholarship by the Past Department Presidents 13 Parlay and shall be awarded annually in the amount of 14 \$2,000 to a veteran or a veteran's wife or husband, widow or widower, or child of a veteran of the World Wars, 15 16 Korea, Vietnam Conflict, Grenada/Lebanon, Panama, Persian Gulf and Wars on Terrorism." 17 18 Recommended change to read: Code 2. "The Past Presidents Scholarship has been designated as a nursing 19 20 scholarship by the Past Department Presidents Parlay and 21 shall be awarded annually in the amount of \$4,000 to a 22 veteran or a veterans wife or husband, widow or widower, 23 or child of a veteran of the World Wars, Korea, Vietnam Conflict, Grenada/Lebanon, Panama, Persian Gulf and Wars 24 25 on Terrorism."

1 Is there any discussion? 2 (No response.) 3 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: All those in 4 favor say aye. 5 ALL PRESENT: Aye. 6 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Any opposed? 7 (No response.) 8 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Passed. Thank 9 you. 10 PAST PRESIDENTS PARLAY CHAIRMAN DUVALL: Thank 11 you. All references to \$2,000 in codes 4, 10, and 14 will 12 be changed to read \$4,000 scholarship. 13 There were no resolutions or recommendations. 14 100 percent reporting certificates were presented to 15 15 districts. The second and third place and Certificates of 16 Recognition were presented in committee with a list included for the districts. The list is also posted in 17 18 the Department Convention Office and attached to this 19 report. 20 Ouestion and answer and discussion followed. 21 With no further business the meeting adjourned at 9:55. 22 This completes the report of the Past Presidents Parlay 23 Committee and I move its acceptance. 24 (Applause.) 25 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: By your applause

you have accepted the report. 1 2 PAST PRESIDENTS PARLAY CHAIRMAN DUVALL: Madam 3 Department President, may I continue with a short 4 supplemental and the first place awards? 5 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: You may. 6 PAST PRESIDENTS PARLAY CHAIRMAN DUVALL: As so 7 wisely stated by one past president from Merle Reed, Unit 8 145, District 15, looking back into the past makes one 9 reminisce. It reminds us of our weak spots and our strengths as we quide our future generations. 10 11 knowledge of our past leaders and their accomplishments build the cornerstone of our future and we continue to add 12 13 to its stability and growth. 14 One-third of the units report mentoring new and 15 seasoned members by providing procedure books, answering 16 questions and providing encouragement. - 3 Every penny counts to a student. For the rest of us, as
- 4 District 18 said it so wisely, the applications were
- 5 covered by dust, cobwebs, and feathers. This will need
- 6 some serious work.
- 7 We take our role as a veterans service
- 8 organization seriously, meeting and keeping the needs of
- 9 veterans and their families front and center in our unit
- 10 and district activities.
- 11 All of your wonderful work is also reported under
- 12 the VA&R. The last couple of years the Past Presidents
- 13 Parlay has changed from not only supporting women veterans
- 14 to include women currently serving in the military. Our
- 15 units continue to seek out these remarkable women that are
- 16 the true embodiment of service and not themselves. This
- 17 year we had two nominees, one Air Force and one Navy. And
- 18 they have been forwarded to National for further judging.
- 19 And they are both dual members of our organization.
- Now for the presentation of the first place
- 21 awards. Our \$2,000 scholarship, Nurses Scholarship
- 22 recipient is not here this weekend. Her name is Shanita
- 23 Buchanan. She was sponsored by Benjamin J. Bowie, Unit

escorted and introduced to the assembly. 1 2 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Will the 3 Sergeant-at-Arms and Marshal please escort to the station 4 the Auxiliary Member of the Year and the Active-Duty 5 Servicewoman of the Year. 6 (Processional.) 7 PAST PRESIDENTS PARLAY CHAIRMAN DUVALL: Thank 8 you. It is now my pleasure to present to you the 9 Auxiliary Member of the Year, Ms. Esther Hanks, sponsored 10 by Ventura Unit 339, District 16. 11 (Applause.) 12 PAST PRESIDENTS PARLAY CHAIRMAN DUVALL: And also 13 Air Force Active-Duty Senior Master Sergeant Josephine 14 Carrillo, sponsored by Carl R. Meairs Unit 289, District 15 21. 16 (Applause.) PAST PRESIDENTS PARLAY CHAIRMAN DUVALL: Ventura 17 18 Unit 339 refers to their 48-year member -- not 48 years old, but 48-year member of the organization as a quardian 19 angel to their unit. Not being able to drive has not 20 21 stopped her from attending all meetings and any activity that the unit is involved with. She has served as unit 22 23 president, continues to serve as Past Presidents Parlay Chairman, Poppy Chairman, and leader of the junior 24 25 program. She meets regularly with the juniors, leading

This 5 exceptional woman is Ms. Esther Hanks. 6 7 (Applause.) 8 PAST PRESIDENTS PARLAY CHAIRMAN DUVALL: Would 9 you like to say a few words, Esther? 10 AUXILIARY MEMBER OF THE YEAR HANKS: I'm nervous, 11 but I'm so proud to be here as a member of the year that I 12 was chosen by the unit and the district. Thank you. And 13 I thank you, Madam President. I was really, really 14 surprised that I was named unit member of the year because I know that a lot of members have worked as hard as I 15 16 have, maybe more. But it is a privilege and a pleasure to 17 be here. 18 (Applause.) 19 PAST PRESIDENTS PARLAY CHAIRMAN DUVALL: Our Navy Active-Duty Servicewoman joined the military in 2010 and 20 as an electronics technician third class is responsible 21 22 for giving correct information in a direct way, not to put her fellow servicemen and women in harm's way. Does it surprise you that she says, "Do not 1 2 underestimate women in the military. We think like 3 mothers and carry extra useful supplies." Her name is 4 Shannon Lovins. She's a Navy electronics third class and she is not able to be here today. Guess why? She's 5 6 active duty. 7 I do have a letter that I received from her, and it says, "Dear Norma DuVall and Members of the American 8 9 Legion Auxiliary. I send my deepest apologies for not 10 being able to attend your convention. I am now and will 11 be on duty during this time. Thank you for the wonderful letter that you sent me. This is such a great honor. I 12 13 hope to meet you all in person to express my gratitude. 14 Please thank your group of judges and all those that selected me to such a great honor." 15 16 I would like to say she is a dual member of the 17 organization. 18 (Applause.) 19 PAST PRESIDENTS PARLAY CHAIRMAN DUVALL: Now 1990 20 was the beginning of reenlistment in the dream career 21 field of our Air Force active-duty servicewomen. She has 22 been deployed seven times since 1996 and medals include 23 Purple Heart. She is part of the 452nd Aeromedical Evacuation Squadron, 452nd Air Mobility Wing, March Air 24 25 Force Reserve Base, and was recently selected by the Wing

Commander to manage the 452nd Air Mobility Wing Yellow 1 2 Ribbon Reintegration Program. 3 (Applause.) 4 PAST PRESIDENTS PARLAY CHAIRMAN DUVALL: 5 community service includes speaking to young women in 6 schools and encouraging them to explore the opportunities 7 that taught her great courage, self-esteem, equality, educational opportunities, and leadership. Please welcome 8 9 Senior Master Sergeant Josephine Carrillo. 10 (Applause.) 11 SENIOR MASTER SERGEANT CARRILLO: First of all, I 12 want to say thank you to you. I think you have the 13 hardest job. You stay at home and worry about us. But 14 you do also send us great things, notes, cookies, 15 brownies. We love them all. We stand on your shoulders 16 to serve. So thank you for what you do. Thank you the 17 American Legion for supporting us and fighting for us to 18 give us rights and benefits. Like they said before, I belong to the 452nd Air 19 20 Mobility Wing. I'm an Aeromedical Evacuation Technician, 21 and I have the privilege to bring home your finest. I 22 take care of them, bring them out of the war zone, and we 23 give care in the air to bring everybody back home with dignity. 24 25 And so I thank you for what you do for us because

- 1 without you, you know, our morale and everything else, it
- 2 wouldn't be there. Right now I'm also serving with our
- 3 Wing Commander in the Yellow Ribbon Reintegration Program.
- 4 It's to help families -- bring families in so they can
- 5 also learn what the military member does and be
- 6 self-sufficient while the military member is away, connect
- 7 them with services and organizations such as the American
- 8 Legion and the VA and other things so that while we are
- 9 gone, everybody else could connect and, you know, just not
- 10 worry at home. It reduces suicides and mental health
- 11 problems and stuff so we all work together. So thank you
- 12 again.
- 13 (Applause.)
- 14 PAST PRESIDENTS PARLAY CHAIRMAN DUVALL: We are
- 15 all so proud of your accomplishments and sacrifices that
- 16 you have made serving others first, not self, and the role
- 17 that you play in shaping a positive future in an
- 18 atmosphere of fellowship, patriotism, peace, and security.
- 19 We will hear a little more from our two remarkable women
- 20 at the luncheon today.
- 21 Madam Department President, this concludes my
- 22 report.

With no further 21 business, the meeting adjourned at 9:45 a.m. 22 Madam President, may I continue with my 23 supplemental report and my first place awards? 24 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: You may. 25 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you.

- 1 Madam President, living and breathing scrolls came to life
- 2 during their magical, mystical journey this year. There
- 3 continues to be a major challenge of units providing
- 4 original signatures on all pages when submitting any
- 5 bylaws and amendments to bylaws. There were also some
- 6 misunderstandings during this year's election season. The
- 7 reminder remains the same: read your bylaws, follow the
- 8 rules. If in doubt, ask questions.
- 9 Aside from those challenges, there were three
- 10 districts and 19 units that completed their mandatory
- 11 rewrites this year, two union bylaws and 39 units with
- 12 amendments. There were a few units whose amendments or
- 13 bylaws could not be approved due to assorted reasons. In
- 14 every case, the chairman or the president -- the chairman
- or the president were contacted by phone or e-mails. Many
- 16 errors were resolved over the phone, while some had to be
- 17 returned for corrections.
- 18 As you can see by the statistics in the Book of
- 19 Reports -- sorry about that -- many units reviewed their
- 20 bylaws and standing rules at the beginning of their
- 21 administrative year. All units should adopt this
- 22 practice. Following our set of rules and bylaws keeps
- 23 members engaged with the necessary governess that is
- 24 required of any large organization.
- The new version soft cover of Roberts Rules of

- Order is also in use by many parliamentarians and members.
- 2 As unit members recite and memorize the preamble, they
- 3 learn to understand what we stand for and why we exist.
- 4 Unit members are also inserting the ALA mission and vision
- 5 statements in their bylaws as is required. Members should
- 6 be encouraged to learn and memorize those statements as
- 7 well.
- By having our bylaws, vision, and mission in
- 9 order and current, we are free to assist our biggest
- 10 treasures, our veterans and their families.
- 11 Madam President, at this time I would like to
- 12 present my first place awards. I don't see my people
- 13 here. Are they in the back? Hey you. So since she's
- 14 waving, first place unit report goes to Linda Fariss,
- 15 Hawthorne Unit 314, District 19.
- 16 (Applause.)
- 17 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Present to you
- 18 your first award. And inside the scroll is a miniature of
- 19 your first place award. Awesome job.
- 20 (Applause.)
- 21 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: First place
- 22 district report awards go to Odette Cuccaro, District 18.
- 23 (Applause.)
- 24 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: And here is
- 25 your first place reward -- award, rather, along with a

scroll with a miniature of your award. 1 2 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Oh, oh. I hear \$5 ringing in my life. 3 4 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Great job too, Odette. Madam President, thank you for this appointment. 5 6 This was truly a learning experience and I appreciate you 7 for selecting me for this, and this concludes my report. 8 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: By your applause 9 you've accepted this report. 10 11 NOMINATIONS FOR DEPARTMENT OFFICERS 2013-2014 12 13 We'll now continue with nominations. At this 14 time we will proceed with the nominations of department 15 officers, Junior Member of Finance, and delegates and alternates to the National Convention. 16 17 Ladies, is there anybody here that's going to 18 nominate anybody? Okay. 19 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: It means you're 20 going to have to do it again. 21 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Come on, come on, 22 come on. No, it does not. I nominate Anita Biggs for 23 president. Oh, yes, I can. I nominate Anita Biggs for president. 24 25 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: I decline. I

- 1 decline.
- 2 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Chair recognizes
- 3 Gloria Williams.
- 4 SERGEANT-AT-ARMS WILLIAMS: Thank you, Madam
- 5 President. Anita Biggs, candidate for Department
- 6 President. Anita Biggs is a 22-year honorary lifetime
- 7 member of Jackson Robinson Unit 252 located in Los
- 8 Angeles, California. Anita is eligible for the Auxiliary
- 9 through the service of her late father, William "Chief"
- 10 Johnson, dedicated -- who was dedicated past 252 and 23rd
- 11 District Commander. He retired after 30 years in the
- 12 United States Navy.
- On the unit level, she has served many
- 14 chairmanships and offices of president,
- 15 secretary/treasurer, Sergeant-at-Arms, Marshal, executive
- 16 committeewoman, and continues to be a proud member and
- 17 co-captain of the Warwick Women Unit 252 Color Guard.
- 18 On the district level, she has served as
- 19 President, First Vice President, Second Vice President,
- 20 Secretary, Treasurer, Sergeant-at-Arms, and Marshal. On
- 21 the department level she has served as Membership
- 22 Chairman, leading the Department to goal for the first
- 23 time in many years; Leadership; Unit Development &
- 24 Revitalization; Poppy; Americanism, National award;
- 25 Children & Youth, National award; and Veterans Affairs &

Rehabilitation, and currently serving as Constitution & 1 2 Bylaws chairman. On the National level, Unit Development and 3 4 Revitalization Chairman and Vice Chairman of Membership Committee, National Security Committee, and as Girls State 5 6 Western Division Chairman and is currently serving as 7 Legislative Committee. Anita has been employed in the mortgage industry 8 9 for over 30 years and is currently employed at One United 10 Bank in Los Angeles, California as a senior loan underwriter. Anita resides in Long Beach, California and 11 12 is married to Lonnie Biggs, Jr. Together they have one daughter, Tiara, two sons, Lonnie and Dillon, as well as 13 14 five grandchildren who are all members of the American 15 Legion Family. The 23rd District and Jackie Robinson Unit 252 16 17 have proudly and wholeheartedly endorsed Anita Biggs for 18 the office of president of the Department of California 19 2013-2014. 20 (Applause.) 21 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Are there any 22 further nominations for Department President? 23 (No response.) 24 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Hearing none, 25 nominations for Department President are now closed.

1 (Applause.) 2 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Nominations are 3 now open for the office of Department Vice President. The 4 chair recognizes Laura Clendenin from District 15. 5 District 15 DELEGATE CLENDENIN: Thank you, Madam 6 President. American Legion Auxiliary Tehachapi Unit 221 7 District 15 nominated Harriet Clendenin for the Department of California Vice President. I am nominating her not 8 9 only because she is my mother, but because of how proud I 10 am as her daughter. 11 On the department level, many watched Harriet 12 going up from all the department chairs from department 13 musician all the way to the VA&R. She has been successful 14 in everything she has done, not only on department level, 15 but also at the unit and district. 16 Tehachapi Unit 221 since she joined in 2006 after being with Camarillo Unit 741 for five years prior has 17 18 grown immensely. - 14 and Americanism Chairman.
- 15 Kathryn is a certified leadership instructor.
- 16 She attended various colleges, ultimately achieving a
- 17 bachelor's degree in cost accounting from National
- 18 American University. She has over 30 years of experience
- in accounting and financial management.
- 20 Kathryn has recently retired. Kathryn will be an
- 21 asset to the Department of California if elected. I
- 22 nominate Kathryn Doran for the office of Junior Member of
- 23 Finance for the year 2013-2014.
- 24 (Applause.)
- 25 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Are there any

2	Finance?
3	(No response.)
4	DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Hearing none,
5	nominations for the department Junior Member of Finance
6	are now closed.
7	Kathryn, do you want to stand?
8	(Applause.)
9	DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Are there any
10	endorsements for national officer?
11	(No response.)
12	DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Hearing none,
13	moving on.

16	NATIONAL CONVENTION

18	DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: We will now
19	proceed with the nominations for delegates to National
20	Convention. Department Constitution Article V, Section

22	Department Secretary/Treasurer are the individuals called
23	by the Department President to serve as the delegation
24	secretary to the National Convention and National Chairman

- 12 think we were at 25. I may have to double-check that, but
- 13 at last count was 25.
- 14 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: I need a correct
- 15 count, please.
- 16 SECRETARY/TREASURER VOGELE: Okay. I will have
- 17 to get back to you on that one.

So then I'll 9 change that for District 7. It's Bonnie Bradbury. 10 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: After the -- you 11 take precedence as being a Department Secretary/Treasurer, 12 and then it goes on count. How many total do we have now 13 with those names I gave you? 14 SECRETARY/TREASURER VOGELE: Twenty-four. And one thing that I'd like to add is the names we have read 15 16 for delegates, are you sure that these people will be 17 attending National? Because I would hate to have it where 18 you're just on the list just because you're the delegate and then when time comes you're not going to be able to 19 20 attend and we're not going to put someone in your place. 21 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: How many do you 22 show? Twenty-two. Peggy and I show 24 and Ruby and Anita 23 show 22. So can we have the count again, please? 24 SECRETARY/TREASURER VOGELE: Yes. I'll use my 25 fingers and toes. - 9 Oh, pardon me. You know who I forgot also on here? Is if
- 10 I need to take Nancy off in her own right, I forgot Linda
- 11 Fercho is on there too, but she's in her own right.
- 12 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Who is Bonnie
- 13 Bradbury?
- 14 SECRETARY/TREASURER VOGELE: Okay. That's my
- 15 question. Am I in the five that's going or am I going to
- 16 represent my district?
- 17 LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN DeLASHMIT: Why are you
- 18 asking me?
- 19 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Just a second.
- 20 Anita, stand there, please. Okay. My National Delegation
- 21 Secretary is going to be Diane DeLashmit from District 25.
- 22 SECRETARY/TREASURER VOGELE: Thank you. Okay.
- 23 Are we ready for me to finger count again?
- 24 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: I don't know. I
- 25 still have my shoes on. We're doing good. One more time,

babe. 1 2 SECRETARY/TREASURER VOGELE: Okay. Terry Mikesell, Anita Biggs, Diane DeLashmit. And I'm taking 3 4 Nancy Brown out of the five. So right now you have four: Terry Mikesell, 9 Anita Biggs, Diane DeLashmit, Melanie Taylor, and one more 10 for the five. 11 LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN DeLASHMIT: That's it. 12 SECRETARY/TREASURER VOGELE: There's just one. 13 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Well, wait a 14 minute. I get five delegates for charter. 15 SECRETARY/TREASURER VOGELE: That's what I'm 16 saying. - 11 the number is you're supposed to end up with.
- 12 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Yeah. Okay.
- 13 Patience, ladies, patience. Thank you, Diane.
- 14 SECRETARY/TREASURER VOGELE: All right. So then
- 15 we have our four, and our four are Terry Mikesell, Anita

- 6 PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT JACOB: We all can't be
- 7 tall.
- 8 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Someone told me
- 9 to look for that little, short gray-haired lady.
- 10 PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT JACOB: That's right.
- 11 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Hello.
- 12 PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT JACOB: I have a
- 13 question, please, and I don't know if anybody in the
- 14 audience could answer it. Janet Wilson District 9 usually
- 15 goes as a Legionnaire.
- 16 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: She does.
- 17 PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT JACOB: And I don't

- 13 (Applause.)
- JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN HAYES: In honor of
- 15 the Military Child, several Tinker Bells performed a
- 16 Military Child Table Setting Ceremony. It is hoped that
- 17 this becomes a tradition at various functions throughout
- 18 California.
- 19 Units and districts were also keeping these
- junior members very busy throughout the year. They
- 21 participated in Stand Downs, bake sales, helped with
- 22 Veterans Day and Memorial Day activities, held outreach
- 23 programs, made crafts and cards, adopted military families
- 24 and veterans, held car washes, helped at veterans' homes
- and hospitals, participated in welcome home celebrations,

- 1 participated in Month of the Military Child, folded pocket
- 2 flags, participated in parades, adopted classrooms,
- 3 collected toys for active duty military children at

23	Education met June 27th, 2013 in the Canyon Suite A of the
24	Doral Hotel in Palm Springs, California. Excuse me. I
25	have laryngitis. The statistical report of this chairman

1 appears on page 16 of the Book of Reports. Delores Ray -- Ryan, excuse me, District 15 was 2 appointed secretary. Leonie Estigoy, District 10, offered 3 4 prayer, and Vickie Crowe, District 15 was appointed 5 Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 22 district delegates were 6 in attendance. There were four visitors present. The committee was called to order at 9:00 a.m. 7 8 with a prayer and Pledge of Allegiance. The code was read 9 with the following proposed changes. 10 Number 6 of the Education Code now reads: "The 11 units and districts shall be urged to make greater use of 12 the CD, 'Need a Lift' or the website www.needalift.org and 13 shall be encouraged to distribute the information to all 14 junior and senior high schools, colleges, and junior colleges within their community and their Girls State 15 citizens as well as the Junior Conference attendees 16 between the ages of 15 and 18." 17 18 The proposed code change. Number 6 will be deleted in its entirety. Change numbers accordingly 19 20 throughout the rest of the code. 21 Madam President, by the direction of the 22 committee I move to adopt this code change. 23 PARLIAMENTARIAN KAPSALIS: Second. 24 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Okay. It's been 25 moved and seconded to delete number 6 of the Education

Each category will be judged 20 21 and scored by individuals chosen by the Department 22 Chairman. Once scored, the Department Chairman shall 23 numerically rank each category with the highest scored application as number one, the next highest number two, 24 25 and so on and so forth until all applications have been

numerically ranked. Once each category is ranked, the 1 2 Department Chairman will assign the highest scored application the highest scholarship and continue assigning 3 4 all available scholarships descending in dollar amount and 5 numerical ranking until all descending -- descending in 6 dollar amounts and numerical ranking until all 7 scholarships in that category have been awarded." By recommendation of the committee, code 8 9 referring to number 12 will now refer to number 11. 10 Madam President, by the direction of the committee, I move to adopt this code change. 11 12 PARLIAMENTARIAN KAPSALIS: Second. 13 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: It's been moved 14 and seconded to change code number 13, which will now be code number 12: "Students applying for Department 15 scholarships shall fill out one application per category 16 per code number 12. Each category will be judged and 17 18 scored by individuals chosen by the Department Chairman. Once scored, the Department Chairman shall numerically 19 20 rank each category with the highest scored application as 21 number one, the next highest as number two, and so on and 22 so forth until all applications have been numerically 23 ranked. Once each category is ranked, the Department Chairman will assign the highest scored application the 24 25 largest scholarship and continue assigning all available

scholarships descending in dollar amount and numerical 1 2 ranking until all descending in dollar amounts" -- huh. 3 EDUCATION CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: That was a typo. 4 Sorry. 5 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Wait a minute. 6 "Descending in dollar amount and numerical ranking until 7 all scholarships in that category have been awarded." 8 By recommendation of the committee, code number 9 12 will now refer to number 11. Okay. So the change 10 would be we're just going to change the numerical number 11 12 to the numerical number 11. Do you want me to read 12 this again? 13 ALL PRESENT: No. 14 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Is there any 15 discussion? 16 (No response.) 17 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: All those in 18 favor, say aye. 19 ALL PRESENT: Aye. 20 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Any opposed? 21 (No response.) 22 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: So carried. 23 EDUCATION CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: Okay. It is recommended that on the last page of the code, number 1 24 25 and 2 will be renumbered to be number 15 and number 16.

1 Madam President, by the direction of the 2 committee I recommend to adopt this code change. 3 PARLIAMENTARIAN KAPSALIS: Second. 4 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: It's been moved and seconded that code number 1 and 2 on the last page of 5 6 the code will be renumbered to number 15 and 16. Is there 7 any discussion? 8 (No response.) 9 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: All those in 10 favor, say aye. 11 ALL PRESENT: Aye. 12 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Any opposition? 13 (No response.) 14 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: So carried. 15 EDUCATION CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: Certificates were 16 handed out for units that participated in the "Give 10 to Education" and units that donated \$50 or more to the 17 department for education. Sixteen certificates were 18 19 handed out to districts that had 100 percent reporting. 20 Second and third place awards were handed out for unit and 21 district supplementals. No further business, the closing 22 prayer was offered and the meeting was adjourned. 23 Madam President, may I continue with my 24 supplemental report? 25 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: You may.

1 EDUCATION CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: In the mystical, 2 magical fantasy world of California the Enchanted Gypsies 3 have been hard at work this year looking into their 4 crystal ball to see what kind of educational and 5 scholarship opportunities they can provide for our 6 veterans, their families, and military children. 7 have done a wonderful job promoting our education program, 8 as you can see. 9 Members donated over 25,000 items that students 10 use in the classrooms such as pens, pencils, paper and backpacks, totaling over \$25,000. They collected hundreds 11 12 of Labels For Education as well as Box Tops to be 13 delivered to military bases and local schools with 14 educator and staff very appreciative of the help. 15 The juniors at Junior Conference put together 16 over 1,000 school items in gift bags that were then delivered to our local needy school. Members collected 17 18 thousands of Pop Tops that were cashed in and held raffles with the proceeds going to the Department for 19 20 scholarships. Unit members handed out to educators and school 21 22 staff fliers and information on ALA KIDDS, American Legion 23 Auxiliary Kids in Danger of Depression or Suicide, also Bullying, what to look for and what to do to prevent it. 24 25 Members also shared information and resources that are

available on how staff can look out for and help military 1 2 children with their unique situation. 3 To help the students enhance respect for the sacrifices of our military heroes, units participated in 4 "Veterans in the Classroom." They made arrangements with 5 schools to have veterans visit and speak to students about 6 7 their unique serving -- their experience serving in the 8 military and what it meant to be a veteran. Some brought 9 relics from their tours. Others showed pictures, gave 10 small flags and patriotic pencils to the children. 11 Students were very excited about their visits. 12 Members spent hundreds of hours reading to 13 schoolchildren, donated books, reading books, comic and 14 coloring books that they had purchased from Emblem Sales and helped students with their reading and writing skills. 15 16 Many participated in National Education Week by offering American flags and flag etiquette books, Pledge 17 of Allegiance comic books and Polar Bears with Poppies to 18 students. To educators, custodians, and staff, members 19 20 visited and took gift and fruit baskets, goodie bags, cards and certificates. 21 22 We had one unit that gave new playground toys to a special education class. These children also decorated 23 cards that were then sent to soldiers overseas. 24 25 The department was able to give out by the

support of our units and districts a total of six General 1 2 and two Continuing/Re-entry scholarships totaling \$9,000. Units also were able to offer 110 local school 3 4 scholarships totaling over \$49,000. What a great job. 5 (Applause.) 6 EDUCATION CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: Madam President, 7 just to change my report, I didn't get four units so that would be closer to \$60,000. So they did an outstanding 8 9 job. 10 It's only with the continued support from our units and districts that our education program will be 11 able to continue offering scholarships. I'm also happy to 12 13 announce that the National Nontraditional student 14 applicant from California won a \$2,000 scholarship. 15 (Applause.) 16 EDUCATION CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: As you can see, the Enchanted Gypsies have done a great job with education for 17 18 our veterans, their families, and military children. Madam President, may I continue with my first 19 20 place winners? 21 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: You may. 22 EDUCATION CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: Okay. I think they 23 should be here. I sent out the notes. First place award for Best Unit Supplemental is awarded to Alpine Unit 258, 24 25 District 22, Mariana Adams, Chairman.

- 5 The committee agreed upon the following report.
- 6 The code was read and accepted as no changes were
- 7 suggested.
- 8 Certificates for 100 percent reporting were
- 9 presented to 29 districts. Congratulations, ladies.
- 10 Everyone turned in a report.
- 11 (Applause.)
- 12 MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WHITE: Eighty percent 3a
- 13 milestone certificates were presented to 95 units. 85
- 14 percent 3b milestone certificates were presented to 116
- 15 units. Congratulations, ladies, this is fantastic.
- 16 (Applause.)
- 17 MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WHITE: Certificates were
- 18 presented to Unit Best Overall Membership Supplemental,
- 19 Group A, 10 to 700 members, third place and second place
- 20 and honorable mention.
- I would like to say about two honorable mentions.
- 22 The reason why is because Madam President and I have a
- 23 little nightmare for a little while and they end up with
- 24 100 percent. And one is a hundred plus two member after
- 25 there were a flat zero last year. And they are Hoopa Unit

415, District 1, and Hopland Unit 529, District 1. It's 2 fantastic. 3 (Applause.) 4 MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WHITE: Group B, 701 to 1500 members were presented third and second place. 5 6 Group C, 1500 plus, were also presented the third 7 place and second place. And I have two honorable mentions because, ladies, it was remarkable. And I said 8 9 remarkable. They were here, there, everywhere. 10 District Best Overall Membership Supplemental I 11 would quickly go over just the name. In Group A, third 12 place District 6, Glenda Schultz. 13 (Applause.) 14 MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WHITE: Second place, 15 District 27, Sharlotte Collins. 16 (Applause.) 17 MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WHITE: Group B, third place was Judith Forrest and second place District 21, Jennifer 18 19 Bieger. 20 (Applause.) 21 MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WHITE: First place and also 22 awards and ribbons to be presented on the convention 23 floor. Questions asked were discussed as time permitted. The chaplain offered a closing prayer. This meeting of 24 25 the Membership preconvention meeting was adjourned at

1 10:30 a.m. 2 Madam President, may I pursue with my 3 supplemental? 4 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Honey, you can do 5 anything you want to. 6 MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WHITE: Oh, thank you. I can 7 get out of here. Can I go home? Okay. 8 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: No, you cannot go 9 home. 10 MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WHITE: Okay. I will stay. 11 Madam Department President Terry, in keeping with President Terry's theme, "Magical, mystical, fantasy" and 12 13 the idea that veterans are our biggest treasures, our 14 membership team has selected the magical, mystical 15 leprechaun, which is the mischievous elf of Irish folklore 16 to carry our motto as follows: One team, one purpose, one 17 qoal. 18 Our leprechauns, our members, have diligently and sturdily climbed our rainbow offering a helping hand to 19 units that had various dilemmas climbing their own 20 21 rainbow. Leprechauns participated in activity with local 22 military bases hoping to recruit new members. And they 23 did. To reach the pot of gold, ultimate success was achieved by setting reasonable and workable goals for 24 25 recruiting Auxiliary members, working to retain present

- ones, and involving them with hands-on activities,
- 2 challenging each member to bring a prospective membership
- 3 to their meeting, encouraging members to attend districts
- 4 and leadership meetings, and budgeting funds for
- 5 membership incentives.
- 6 Challenges between units and districts were a
- 7 great stimulation to work harder. Many units found that
- 8 communication was the key to success with membership.
- 9 Yes, we can get more members by talking to eligible
- 10 members and have them come to the monthly meeting and
- 11 interact with us to see just how much fun we are having.
- 12 Old members rel- -- I don't mean old, old, but, I
- 13 mean, members that have a few years in. I do not want to
- 14 offend anybody, all right, so I said that old members
- 15 realized that as a team we could accomplish a lot more
- 16 toward our goals. The Legion Family atmosphere promotes
- 17 unity in working on programs that support veterans'
- 18 issues, youth, and the community.
- 19 At DEC in January, 443 certificates were
- 20 presented, but today the following certificates are
- 21 issued. Be patient with me. 100 percent units, we will
- 22 have 137. Josie Melgard Award, 100 plus two members is 84
- 23 units. Five district are 100 percent for a total of 432
- 24 certificates, and a grand total of 875 certificates.
- 25 Ladies, you did that yourself and I'm proud, proud, proud

of you. 1 2 (Applause.) 3 MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WHITE: 158 National Angel 4 Pins were issued in your packages. So now you have to 5 fight to get them with the one that attended my meeting 6 because they have the pins. I don't. 7 SALs and Riders -- oh, 184 American Legion Family 8 ribbons will be presented to the American Legion, American 9 Legion Auxiliary, SALs and Riders that have achieved 100 10 percent membership goal. 11 We have kept third or fifth, now we are sixth 12 place in National and the Western Division has remained 13 first all young among the five divisions. 14 (Applause.) 15 MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WHITE: We have challenged 16 Idaho and Oregon. We are ahead of Idaho, but, Leprechauns, watch out. Oregon is behind our butt, so 17 18 keep on renewing members. It is not over. I should have said "derriere." That's French. 19 20 We have learned as veterans that in order to be 21 successful we need to keep the motto of one team, one purpose, one goal. We are a team of leprechauns with a 22 23 purpose of renewal in membership, and a goal of acting as a unit of love and family in the American Legion 24 25 Auxiliary. Veterans are our treasure, and to each the pot

- of gold under the rainbow, we need another 537 lucky
- 2 coins, meaning renewals, to reach our goal. We will do
- 3 it. Nothing will stop us now.
- 4 Okay. I may continue with my awards.
- 5 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Yes, ma'am.
- 6 Could you tell her no? I wouldn't.
- 7 MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WHITE: Okay. I'm not
- 8 wearing black either.
- 9 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Danielle, you
- 10 can't go get a beer now, baby. Where are you going? Let
- 11 Zana get it for you. Just point and they'll help.
- 12 Danielle, talk to your support team there, honey. Uh-oh,
