The convention committee on Children & Youth

- 1 met in the Oleander Ballroom C at the El Doral Resort,
- 2 Palm Springs, California. The statistical report of this
- 3 chairman appears on page 14 of the Book of Reports.
- 4 Donna Mattox, District 25 was appointed
- 5 secretary. Debbie Washburn, District 14 offered prayer,
- 6 and Debbie Falkenberg, District 28 was appointed
- 7 Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 26 district delegates
- 8 answered roll call and we had four quests.
- 9 The Committee agreed upon the following. The
- 10 code was read and there were no changes. It was reported
- 11 that only 194 units and 25 districts provided year-end
- 12 reports. Hopefully that will be 100 percent next year.
- In the National Plan of Work, it says that you
- 14 could add pictures to the year-end reports. This is
- something we didn't do in the past because we were told
- 16 not to.
- 17 There were three temporary financial aid requests
- 18 received by this chairman. Units need to be sure to keep
- 19 donating to the Children & Youth Fund. In the near future
- 20 we will need more -- we will see more need of help.
- 21 The Army Operation Military Kids may have closed
- 22 in California. Units and Legion families need to keep up
- 23 the good work. Tami Bell of District 29 reported on the
- 24 Operation Military Kids ball they hosted. Their Legion
- 25 Family included five districts and other community groups.

What a good use of resources. This made the event more 1 2 memorable to everyone. Second and third place and 100 percent reportings 3 4 were presented in committee. No new business or old 5 business. Meeting closed at 11:30 a.m. 6 May I continue? 7 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: You may. 8 CHILDREN & YOUTH CHAIRMAN TOZIER: I've already 9 reported that the statistical report appears on page 14. 10 This year the Auxiliary members made a lot of wishes come true. Members of California started running. 11 12 They started with Operation Military Kids camps and beach 13 parties. Hero packs and backpacks were given to children 14 at these events. Parties during the holidays brought smiles to military family. The Easter Bunny left eggs for 15 16 the children. Welcome home parties were held as parents returned from deployment. These events brought smiles to 17 18 several children's faces. Everybody kept saying there were a lot of smiles. A lot of these events were done by 19 20 the Legion Family and other community operations. 21 This year we said goodbye to Operation Military 22 Kids program funded by the Army. This program was 23 cancelled because of government budget issues. Even though the funding was cut for California, units and their 24 25 Legion Family still hit the pavement hard and fast to make

- 1 a difference in the lives of our veteran and military
- 2 families. I know that this program is still alive and
- 3 well in California.
- 4 This year we had three families of children who
- 5 needed money through the help of TFA. This does not
- 6 include those families that were helped by units and
- 7 posts. In the future with the release of military
- 8 personnel, we will see more -- we will see more who will
- 9 need our help. I hope this year and in the future years
- 10 you continue to support the Children & Youth TFA. It will
- 11 make a difference.
- 12 Face painting and food baskets were sent home
- 13 with children. These events put a smile on the children's
- 14 faces. I did this at 4:30 in the morning because it was
- 15 too hot when the air-conditioner went off. I think I
- 16 needed to sleep a little bit.
- 17 Community children have also benefited from our
- 18 generosity. Toys and candy were collected all year long.
- 19 These were given to the children at their local
- 20 communities. Face painting, games, and food made these
- 21 events memorable to them. Do not forget the hugs. Units
- 22 participated in Send a Kid to Camp, drug and alcohol
- 23 programs, and supplies for school.
- 24 This year the special project for this program
- 25 was Feed the Pig for the American Legion Child Welfare

Foundation. Off went the piggy banks for adventures 1 2 throughout the state. We collected a total of \$1,974.99 with the help of the piggy banks. This combined with 3 4 other donations, \$5,451, to Child Welfare Foundation for a hotel of \$7,425.99. Well done units and districts. 5 6 If you wish upon a start, you do make a child 7 smile and happy. Please keep up the good work and you are wonderful. 8 9 May I give the first place awards, please? 10 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: You may. 11 CHILDREN & YOUTH CHAIRMAN TOZIER: Our first 12 award is for April is Children & Youth Month. Best 22 Unit Support, this was also sent out to National, goes to 23 Los Alamitos Unit 716, District 29. 24 (Applause.) 25 CHILDREN & YOUTH CHAIRMAN TOZIER: Yes, you saw

me carrying around cases of Mason jars, but they're 1 2 getting apple jelly that I made from my garden. It's in the freezer. 3 4 Best District Report went to District 22, Ann 5 Marie Brown. 6 (Applause.) 7 CHILDREN & YOUTH CHAIRMAN TOZIER: And Feed the 8 Pig. Her friends are going to love that she's not going 9 to have that pig around anymore. District 27, LuAnn 10 Capazzi. She collected \$451.24. 11 (Applause.) 12 CHILDREN & YOUTH CHAIRMAN TOZIER: She's the one 13 that came up with the idea and she really beat the bushes 14 out there in the high desert. That's for you. 15 (Applause.) 16 Thank you, Madam President, for the fun -- I didn't do anything. I liked to hear all notes and 17 e-mails. And I apologize if I spammed you. If you got 18 19 spammed, I'm sorry. I have a new e-mail address. But it 20 was great hearing from you and having pictures. I 21 forwarded them on to National, so thank you very much. 22 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Thank you, Susie. 23 We'll now hear from National Security, Tami Bell. 24 25 NATIONAL SECURITY REPORT

1 2 NATIONAL SECURITY CHAIRMAN BELL: Good morning, Madam President. 3 4 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Good morning, 5 Tami. 6 NATIONAL SECURITY CHAIRMAN BELL: We did not have 7 a typewriter, so the committee meeting report is very 8 neatly handwritten. 9 The Convention Committee on National Security met 10 Thursday, June 27th, 2013 in the Canyon Room D in Palm 11 Springs, California. The statistical report of this 12 chairman appears on page 19 of the Book of Reports. 13 Lillian Perez of District 29 was appointed 14 secretary. Cindy Mayfield offered prayer, and Connie Raya of District 29 was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 15 16 22 district delegates answered roll call. There were six visitors present. 17 18 We're very easy in our committee that there were 19 no code changes, there were no resolutions, and there were 20 no recommendations. 21 Unfortunately we did not receive 100 percent 22 reporting. Our second and third place and all of our 23 certificates were given out in committee and the awards were posted in the office yesterday. 24 25 If I may, Madam President, go on with my

1 narrative. 2 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: You may. 3 NATIONAL SECURITY CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you. The 4 Department of California National Security Chairman has 5 been working the Action Steps and Objectives from our National Plan of Work. This chairman wrote monthly or 6 7 bimonthly bulletins with in-depth instructions and program ideas on how to implement the various objectives and 8 9 activities to help each district and unit create a 10 well-rounded National Security program. One district chairman planned a yearlong program 11 assigning each unit a different program, and by using the 12 13 bulletin how-tos successfully managed to complete at least 14 five National Security action steps. 15 We also devised an activity that worked under the 16 POD program, giving some of our smaller units a way to complete some activities in their National Security 17 18 program and also Children & Youth, Membership, Publicity, 19 and VA&R. We worked with our Legion Family to deliver a 20 21 continuing response to the needs of our service members 22 and their families. Many units adopted troop units, 23 active duty families and responded to TAL Family support 24 requests. Those units and districts serving active duty 25 military bases cooked hundreds of holiday meals, acted as

- 1 elves assisting Santa in passing out presents, stuffed
- 2 Easter baskets, and donated food, drinks, and games to
- 3 many FRG morale parties.
- 4 One unit has two ladies who donate their time
- 5 every Friday babysitting a three-year-old and a
- 6 two-year-old of a full-time National Guard whose wife has
- 7 stage 2 cancer so they may go to chemo treatments.
- 8 We have many units that sponsor baby showers for
- 9 our expecting solders or wives of soldiers. One unit
- 10 associated with Port Hueneme Base donated \$2,617.25 to the
- 11 new Baby Sea Bag Program. We have a unit who hosted one
- 12 very difficult event, a baby shower for an expectant wife
- 13 whose soldier was killed in Afghanistan.
- We have babysat, helped -- that makes me cry. We
- 15 have babysat, helped repaired vehicles, sent kids to camp
- 16 and hosted military balls for those children whose soldier
- 17 parents have repeatedly been deployed.
- 18 We have volunteered over 4,138 hours knitting,
- 19 crocheting and sewing scarves, caps, and cooling neck
- 20 wraps for our soldiers under Operation Comfort Warriors.
- 21 The busy sewing bees of one unit made 987 cooling scarves
- 22 that were sent to Afghanistan.
- We have supported the National Security programs
- of the American Legion. Our members have participated in
- 25 Citizen Corps, completing community emergency response

- 1 training. We have a unit that sent six ladies to become
- 2 CERT trained, and then they went back to their unit and
- 3 hosted a community-based teaching course on emergency
- 4 preparedness.
- 5 One unit presented our Department President a
- 6 how-to cooler filled with need-specific first aid items.
- 7 One particular area of interest many units learned was how
- 8 to take care of their pets in an emergency.
- 9 We have hosted many activities to support our
- 10 Blue Star Mothers and pay homage to our Gold Star Mothers.
- 11 A unit worked for four months with their Sons squadron to
- 12 plan an afternoon with live entertainment, all proceeds of
- 13 which went to their Blue Star Mothers group for sending
- 14 troop packages overseas. We gave 64 certificates of
- 15 appreciation to our Blue and Gold Star Mothers.
- We have had 140 volunteers devoting 803 hours
- following the POW/MIA initiatives on the Internet,
- 18 Facebook, and Twitter. We have supported ROTC and Junior
- 19 ROTC, Young Marines and Junior Naval Cadets. We have
- 20 hosted pizza party fundraisers for the Young Marines to
- 21 travel to their competitions, and given 17 awards to local
- 22 ROTC units for their exemplary conduct on behalf of
- 23 grateful units of which they assisted in Auxiliary
- 24 activities of patriotism and service.
- We have participated in Department of Defense

- 1 programs that support our military and their families
- 2 throughout an entire deployment. Many units participated
- 3 in Yellow Ribbon programs, explaining the service and
- 4 programs of the American Legion Auxiliary to deploying
- 5 troops and their families and passing out membership
- 6 applications and signing up new members also. One unit
- 7 lined all the trees of their main street with yellow
- 8 ribbons with the help of their juniors.
- 9 The Department of California participated in many
- 10 welcome home events, providing refreshments, games to keep
- 11 the kids occupied and raised welcome home banners made by
- 12 our juniors. And, of course, joining in to give our own
- 13 hugs and kisses as the soldiers deployed.
- Our department has also the honor to solemnly
- 15 bring home three heroes killed in Afghanistan, lining the
- 16 airfield at attention with our Legion Family and Patriot
- 17 Guard. And that's really hard to do. We have assisted
- 18 with funerals and donated foods for services.
- 19 We have worked closely with our Department of
- 20 California Family Readiness Groups and Operation Ready
- 21 Family. We have been personally -- we have been
- 22 personally selected by Lieutenant Colonel Lalley of the
- 23 California National Guard to be the California National
- 24 Guard and AUSA's go-to provider. We have a few Auxiliary
- 25 members that have been presented by the Army National

Guard with certificates of commendation for their service 1 2 to our troops and their families. 3 We were asked by the National Guard to provide 4 the first ever children's military ball for the southern 5 command of California, of which we gave a resounding, yes, 6 we can do this. This event was a first in many areas of 7 our organization. We worked together with the 19th, 23rd, 8 24th, and 29th districts of the Legion Family, together 9 with the Mexican American Veterans Association and Orange 10 County VFW to put on this event. Active duty National 11 Guard from San Diego to Bakersfield made the trek to bring 12 their families to this fun party. 13 There were some families whose soldiers had been deployed three and four times. One Sergeant Major had 14 15 been deployed five times. One soldier had tears in his 16 eyes thanking us for providing his family with such a fun evening. 17 18 We have sent thousands of care packages overseas, which included handwritten cards from local schools and 19 20 scout troops thanking the troops for their service. This 21 chairman has been honored to work closely with our units 22 and district to provide our troops and their families 23 ongoing compassion and care. 24 Thank you, Madam President. 25 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Thank you, Tami,

18	National President's program. Thank you.
19	DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Thank you, Tami.
20	Next we'll hear from Michelle Soares, our Poppy
21	Chairman.

23	POPPY REPORT
24	
25	POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: Good morning. The

- 1 Convention Committee on Poppies met on June 27th, 2013 in
- 2 the Canyon Suite B of the Doral Resort, Palm Springs,
- 3 California. Susan Baker was appointed secretary, Eleanor
- 4 Bray offered prayer, and Lois Cornish was appointed
- 5 Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 25 delegates answered roll
- 6 call and there were nine visitors present.
- 7 The department code on Poppies was read, and
- 8 after some lively and informative Q and A, the committee
- 9 agreed on the following report. By the way, all second
- 10 and third place winners, 100 percent reporting
- 11 certificates, and all of that was also given out in
- 12 committee.
- Code 5 now reads: "Poppy funds shall conform
- 14 with American Legion and Auxiliary codes to include the
- 15 rehabilitation of all veterans and their families, and to
- 16 include hospitalized service personnel returning home and
- 17 waiting to be discharged." This was in 1998.
- Code 5 if adopted will now read: "Poppy funds
- 19 shall conform with American Legion and Auxiliary codes to
- 20 include the rehabilitation of all veterans and their
- 21 families, and to include hospitalized service personnel
- 22 returning home and waiting to be discharged and shall also
- 23 include active military personnel and their families where
- 24 financial and medical need is evident."
- 25 By direction of the committee I move for this

code change. 1 2 PARLIAMENTARIAN KAPSALIS: Second. 3 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: It's been moved 4 and seconded to change Code 5. Code 5 currently reads: 5 "Poppy funds shall conform with American Legion and 6 Auxiliary codes to include the rehabilitation of all 7 veterans and their families, and to include hospitalized 8 service personnel returning home and waiting to be 9 discharged." 10 The recommended change is Code 5: "Poppy funds shall conform with American Legion and Auxiliary codes to 11 include the rehabilitation of all veterans and their 12 13 families, and to include hospitalized service personnel 14 returning home and waiting to be discharged and shall also 15 include active military personnel and their families where financial and medical need is evident." 16 17 Is there any discussion? 18 (No response.) 19 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Hearing none, all 20 those in favor say aye. 21 ALL PRESENT: Aye. 22 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: So any opposed? 23 (No response.) 24 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Passed. 25 POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: Thank you, ladies. Under

- 1 the contests, Code 6(B) now reads: "Poppy monetary prices
- 2 shall be awarded per the budget as follows: The poppy
- 3 poster contest shall be awarded as follows: All
- 4 categories will receive \$20 for first place awards.
- 5 Second and third place winners shall receive certificates.
- 6 Categories are determined by National. Class I, Grades 2
- 7 and 3. Class II, Grades 4 and 5. Class III, Grades 6 and
- 8 7. Class IV, Grades 8 and 9. Class V, Grades 10 and 11.
- 9 Class VI, Grade 12. Class VII, Students with Special
- 10 Needs." This was in 2010.
- 11 This is more of a housekeeping change, ladies, so
- 12 it's very, very slight. You might not even notice the
- 13 change. If adopted Code 6(B) will now read: "Poppy
- 14 monetary prices shall be awarded per the budget as
- 15 follows: The poppy poster contest shall be awarded as
- 16 follows: All categories will receive \$20 for first place
- 17 awards. The second and third place winners shall receive
- 18 certificates. Categories are determined by National."
- 19 And then it proceeds on with the classes. I don't think I
- 20 need to read all of that.
- 21 By direction of the committee, I move for this
- 22 code change.
- 23 PARLIAMENTARIAN KAPSALIS: Second.
- 24 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: It's been moved
- and seconded to change the Poppy Code 6(B). Here we go.

"Poppy monetary prices shall be awarded per the budget as 1 follows: The poppy poster contest shall be awarded as 2 follows: All categories will receive \$20 for first place 3 4 awards. The second and third place winners shall receive certificates. Categories are determined by National." 5 6 It then goes to the classes and the grades. Is 7 there any discussion? 8 (No response.) 9 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: All those in 10 favor, say aye. 11 ALL PRESENT: Aye. 12 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Any opposed? 13 (No response.) 14 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Passed. 15 POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: Under poppy production, 16 Code 8 now reads: "A year-round poppy production is authorized at the California Veterans Home at Yountville, 17 18 Chula Vista and WAVE Clinic San Diego, as they are available, to give veterans the opportunity to participate 19 20 in the therapeutic and incentive work programs without the 21 pressures of a short-term production." 22 If adopted, Code 8 will now read: "A year-round 23 poppy production is authorized at the California Veterans Home at Yountville, Chula Vista and WAVE Clinic San Diego 24 25 and Long Beach VAMC to give veterans the opportunity to

participate in the therapeutic and incentive work programs 1 2 without the pressures of a short-term production." 3 By direction of the committee, I move for this 4 code change. 5 PARLIAMENTARIAN KAPSALIS: Second. 6 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: It's been moved 7 and seconded to change Code 8, which currently reads: "A 8 year-round poppy production is authorized at the 9 California Veterans Home at Yountville, Chula Vista and 10 WAVE Clinic San Diego and Long Beach VAMC to give veterans 11 the opportunity to participate in the therapeutic and 12 incentive work programs without the pressures of a 13 short-term production." 14 Is there any discussion? 15 (No response.) 16 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Hearing none, all 17 those in favor say aye. 18 ALL PRESENT: Aye. 19 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Any opposed? 20 (No response.) 21 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Passed. 22 POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: Thank you, ladies. 23 (Applause.) 24 POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: This concludes my 25 committee report. May I continue with my supplemental and

first place winners? 1 2 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: You may. 3 POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: Madam Department President, I am going to make this short, sweet, and 4 5 virtually painless as I know you have a lot to get to 6 today. First of all, I don't know if I want to thank you 7 or shoot you for this appointment. In all seriousness 8 9 though, being the first chairman to come in after a huge 10 change like Poppy Week to Poppy Month definitely had its 11 challenges. However, I felt that the Poppy Genies and 12 Pixies could handle it. And handle it they did. 13 Units first decided to use up some of their 14 leftover poppies from last year by using them in table decorations, corsages, Christmas wreaths, Veterans Day, 15 16 Pearl Harbor Day, along with many other patriotic holiday observances. Members would give poppies to everyone in 17 18 attendance, and if they didn't know about the poppy, our members were right there to educate them. Many wreaths 19 20 made to lie on veteran grave sites during the year. 21 Speaking of educating, one district genie made a 22 packet for each of the pixies in her district, giving them 23 the poppy order form, poppy financial report form, unit end-of-year forms, poppy seal order form, poppy 24 25 identification card holders, and the rules for all of the

various contests within the program. She also included 1 2 the poppy story, the poem, "In Flanders Fields" and a copy of the department code. Now that is what I call a 3 4 District Chairman/Genie going the extra mile. Many units across the state sent letters to their 5 6 members as well as post members along with a poppy and a 7 copy of the Poppy Story asking for donations. This always 8 seems to work well in raising money, but it doesn't always 9 raise awareness because our members for the most part know 10 the story. So it was off to the storefronts our members went 11 12 offering poppies to everyone that passed by. One unit 13 with around 87 members ordered 11,000 poppies and raised 14 over \$10,000 for their unit. How did they do it you ask? 15 (Applause.) 16 POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: Well, they recruit workers from outside the Auxiliary, asking area youth 17 groups to help with distribution. This happened to be 18 19 Terry's unit. Yes, Terry, you can take a bow on that one. 20 (Applause.) 21 POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: Youth groups are always 22 looking for volunteer activities and it's usually part of 23 how they advance in their particular programs. So this is a good way to get help if you need it. This unit was able 24 25 to recruit approximately 37 volunteers to help work their

- 1 magic. What a great idea.
- Now for the nuts and bolts of the program. The
- 3 units of California ordered 328,664 poppies and another
- 4 2,700 were ordered and paid for from other units in the
- 5 Departments of Iowa, Vermont, and Oklahoma. We were happy
- 6 to help these other departments as there has been a
- 7 shortage of poppies this year.
- Admittedly, there were some problems this year
- 9 with poppy quality for a few units, but just to let the
- 10 delegation know, this problem has been identified and a
- 11 fix has been put into place so as to avoid any future
- 12 problems.
- 13 A large number of our units chose to pay for
- 14 their poppies in advance, although they have the option to
- 15 pay after the poppies are distributed. As of June 11th,
- 16 2013 \$58,495 has been collected, of which 10 cents of
- 17 every 18 cents goes directly to the veterans producing the
- 18 poppies. I just talked to my dad on the phone and I have
- 19 envelopes in my mailbox, so that number will probably go
- 20 up.
- 21 Also as of June 11th we also have \$8,307.96 in
- 22 the poppy distribution fund. However, I am still waiting
- 23 patiently for those who have not yet turned in their
- 24 financial report and I am hoping to see this number
- 25 increase greatly as these funds are used to directly help

veterans and their families. 1 2 Please don't hold your check back. If you 3 haven't sent it, please do so ASAP. Like I said, I 4 already have more envelopes waiting for me when I get home, so I expect that number to change also. 5 6 This concludes my floor remarks. May I continue 7 with my awards and the introduction of a very special 8 quest? 9 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: You may. Are you 10 ready for the Sergeant-At-Arms and Marshal or which way do 11 you want to go? 12 POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: I'll do my awards first, 13 if that's okay. 14 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Okay. 15 POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: At DEC we had a poppy --16 our poppy usage contest. The first place went to Deborah Driscoll of Unit 29, District 716. 17 18 (Applause.) 19 POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: For our poppy poster 20 contest in Class III went to Daniela Hernandez. And she 21 is from Unit 98, District 4. 22 (Applause.) 23 POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: The first place poppy 24 poster winners get \$20 too, so there's a check in there. 25 Don't lose it.

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POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: For all of these reasons 1 2 and more, she has been chosen 2012-2013 Little Miss Poppy. 3 (Applause.) 4 POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: And Rachel would like to 5 say a few words. 6 LITTLE MISS POPPY O'BRIEN: Hello. My name is 7 Rachel O'Brien. I am seven years old and a three-year Junior Auxiliary member in Riverside, California. I am 8 9 going to be the second grade next year. I am excited about being Junior Miss Poppy. As Junior Miss Poppy of 10 our unit, I've raised almost half of all the donations 11 12 collected by our unit. 13 (Applause.) 14 LITTLE MISS POPPY O'BRIEN: I went to West Coast Thunder on Memorial Day at the Harley dealer. There were 15 over 7,000 bikers there. I also collected donations for 16 17 Poppies in my neighborhood and other fun events in our 18 area. Besides my Memorial poppy activities, I like to help wherever I can. I do this because I care for our 19 20 veterans. 21 I really like helping to serve that dinner on 22 steak night when they are there. For Valentine's Day I 23 made 65 Valentines and gave them to our vets. 24 (Applause.) 25 LITTLE MISS POPPY O'BRIEN: I like doing stuff

1 because I care about our veterans. Thank you to everyone 2 who voted for me. I will be a great Junior Miss Poppy. 3 (Applause.) 4 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Rachel, we have our National Poppy Chairman here in the room, Ms. Melanie 5 6 Taylor, and she would like to have her picture taken with 7 you. And she is our National Chairman. And I think 8 Rachel has got some very proud family in the back of the 9 room. Thank you for bringing Rachel. 10 (Applause.) 11 POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: While the pictures are 12 being taken, I will say that concludes my report. Thank 13 you. 14 (Applause.) 15 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Thank you 16 Michelle, great job. Okay. While they're having a 17 picture moment, next chairman up will be VA&R, please. 18 Okay. Madeline Lee, District 16, offered prayer, and 17 Connie Raya, District 28, was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. 18 A total of 22 district delegates answered roll call and 19 20 there were ten visitors. 21 The committee agreed upon the following report. 22 The code was read and there were no code changes. 23 Certificates for second and third place winners were presented. Unit donating 73 cents per capita for Gift 24 25 Shop Patient Remembrance and 97 cents per capita or more

- 1 to the district -- I'm sorry -- Department VA&R funds were
- 2 in the packets, as well as district 100 percent reporting
- 3 certificates. These went to 3, 4, 9, 11, 14, 18, 19, 20,
- 4 23, 24, 25, 27, 28.
- 5 There were no resolutions nor any
- 6 recommendations. Prayer was recited. With no further
- 7 business, the meeting adjourned at 11:00 a.m.
- 8 May I go on with my supplement?
- 9 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: You may.
- 10 VA&R CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: Thank you. Good
- 11 morning The Wiz, Madam President.
- 12 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Good morning.
- 13 VA&R CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: Your motto of
- 14 "Veterans, our biggest treasures" did not fall on deaf
- 15 ears. The Veterans Affairs and Rehabilitation Heralders,
- 16 District Chairman, and Elves, hospital representatives,
- 17 and deputies took this to heart.
- 18 All units and districts report holiday parties,
- 19 bingo, bunco, and poker tournaments that directly are for
- 20 our veterans. Whether they are at Veterans Administration
- 21 Medical Centers, California veterans homes, or the local
- 22 nursing facilities, veterans are treated to all kinds of
- 23 fun activities, not to mention homemade cakes, cookies,
- 24 and other delectables.
- 25 Speaking of home service, many hours were spent

- 1 by Auxiliary members on quilts, lap robes, and other
- 2 handmade items enjoyed by our veterans. Sometimes the
- 3 facility needs them but the provider is several hours
- 4 away. Arrangements were made to connect the donor and the
- 5 facility.
- 6 Fort Miley is an example of this. Amador Unit
- 7 108 has an avid crocheter. At the Gustine workshop Owedia
- 8 Dupress, the chief of voluntary services, received several
- 9 large bags of lap robes from the Unit 108 members, and the
- 10 relationship bloomed.
- 11 Field service volunteers are ready at the call to
- 12 take a veteran to doctors' appointments, clean and
- decorate a veteran cemetery, and help a veteran in any
- 14 way. During the holidays, shut-ins are provided food and
- 15 presents. In nursing homes, veterans are treated to hats
- 16 and scarves, lap robes, and other treats.
- 17 In conjunction with Leadership Chairman, many
- 18 members have taken field service orientation courses and
- 19 are now able to obtain their field service pins. It is
- 20 suggested the units honor these hardworking individuals by
- 21 getting the pins from Department.
- 22 Donations to Department are a little sluggish;
- 23 however, we need to be reminded of the importance of doing
- 24 so. Out of this money is a very important program of
- 25 Temporary Financial Assistance. On the department level,

12 veterans applied and received money. The needs were 1 2 for everything from phone bills, rent, storage, and other 3 necessities. Many of these veterans were getting into 4 housing after being homeless, so it was an honor for this 5 chairman to be able to help with this transition. 6 One great story was from Unit 419, District 13. 7 A veteran and his wife were riding the bus all night to 8 stay warm. A unit member requested money to help them 9 out. While paying the storage bill the unit member made the comment, "The next step is finding you a job." 10 11 storage manager hired the veteran on the spot. 12 Since that comment worked so well, she mentioned 13 housing, and once again the storage manager had an 14 apartment complex. Since he knew what he was paying the veteran, he made the apartment affordable. In one swoop 15 16 the veteran had a job, housing, and he didn't need his storage anymore. This is an example of you never know 17 what you will say and to whom that will make a huge 18 19 difference. 20 Units have also reported helping veterans out 21 with monetary donations for their bills. Any unit can 22 submit Temporary Financial Assistance; however, all local 23 assistance should be exhausted before applications for TFA 24 are submitted to the department chairman. There are many 25 organizations and agencies that can help, so it is a good

- 1 idea for unit members to be aware of what is available in
- 2 their particular area.
- It has been brought to my attention, units
- 4 realize the importance of TFAs and want to make a donation
- 5 directly to this fund. The budget for TFA is based upon
- 6 donations received to the department VA&R Fund. So please
- 7 be generous as there are a lot of veterans and families
- 8 out there that can use our help.
- 9 There seems to be a special place in our hearts
- 10 for female veterans. The District 24 held baby showers
- and donated baskets of goodies for the moms-to-be.
- 12 District 15 also helped a female veteran in transition
- 13 housing with baby items right before she delivered her
- 14 baby.
- District 29 reports the "Renew" program at the
- 16 Long Beach VAMC which is for women who experienced sexual
- 17 trauma while in the military. Most of these women are or
- 18 have been homeless, and once a month they host a theme
- 19 party. One such party was an application of makeup for
- job interviews, while another were yoga classes for stress
- 21 relief.
- 22 There were many terrific projects the Auxiliary
- 23 members afforded, especially when it comes to therapeutic
- 24 activities. We are all aware of many of our new veterans'
- 25 mental health such as posttraumatic stress disorder and

- 1 traumatic brain injury. District 28 reports supporting
- 2 150 veterans attending a fishing derby sponsored by
- 3 Monterey Bay Incorporated and Ride 2 Recovery. While
- 4 District 16 also reports R2R plus AmpSurfs, a sailing and
- 5 surfing program.
- 6 Unit 755, District 18 reports supporting Freedom
- 7 Dogs, an organization that has trained dogs to assist more
- 8 than 100 -- more than one veteran and can do multiple
- 9 tasks. Another project is the equine programs. District
- 10 25 reports the "Equine Assisted Learning and Therapy For
- 11 Veterans With PTSD." This is sponsored through Equus
- 12 Medendi.
- There are similar programs. HOPE in Ojai and
- 14 Healing Horses and Armed Forces in Tehachapi. While
- 15 looking up these various programs, I saw grant money is
- 16 available for this project, so maybe there will be more of
- 17 them popping up around the state.
- Our homeless veterans are taken care of as best
- 19 we can. Stand Downs are the most common denominator to
- 20 find, reach out, and help these veterans. Many districts
- 21 report participation, and there are a few worth
- 22 mentioning. District 16 covers three counties and each
- 23 county has a Stand Down. Unit participation is reported.
- 24 Also mentioned were three Stand Downs in the 29th
- 25 District, one being for females only. Units donate

- 1 toiletries, clothing, and time. They, along with the
- 2 Legion Family, will cook meals and plan and prepare for
- 3 the event.
- 4 Again, due to federal grant money, funding is
- 5 available for homeless programs and housing. The plan is
- 6 to never have the words "homeless" and "veteran" in the
- 7 same sentence.
- 8 Our junior members report participation in the
- 9 AV&R program. While at Junior Conference the younger
- 10 juniors made thank you cards which were passed out at the
- 11 Santa Maria Clinic. Also, the older girls tied knots on
- 12 scarves made of fleece. While there the girls were asked
- 13 what they pictured in their mind of a veteran. Most of
- 14 them said their parent or grandparent.
- We were fortunate to be able to introduce a
- 16 pretty 23-year-old female and another woman counselor.
- 17 They asked questions and learned about volunteer
- 18 opportunities that existed for them.
- 19 While reading reports, this chairman had a few
- 20 great idea moments. District 5 reports collecting items
- 21 from hotels such as lamps, radios, pillows, toiletries and
- 22 bed linens.
- 23 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Am I in the
- 24 right place?
- 25 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Now we know why

- 1 they're screwed to the desk. District 5, Melanie, I don't
- 2 believe you were capable of this.
- 3 VA&R CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: I had to ask for them.
- 4 They collected them.
- 5 NATIONAL POPPY CHAIRMAN TAYLOR: This was an
- 6 honest acquisition.
- 7 VA&R CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: I thought it was a good
- 8 idea because we all collect the toiletries which we do
- 9 take, but to get radios and lamps and -- okay.
- Toiletries and bed linens which were distributed
- 11 to Pathway House in Yountville and Fort Miley VAMC in San
- 12 Francisco. The point of that is we should probably ask
- 13 first.
- 14 They also connected with the HUD VASH social
- 15 worker and donated household items and furniture to eight
- 16 previously homeless veterans. District 20, Unit 348 had a
- 17 car wash for veterans at the Pete Knight Veterans Home in
- 18 Lancaster. Free to the veterans, juniors, and seniors
- 19 alike along with a Youth Soccer Team washed 18 residents'
- 20 cars.
- 21 District 27 reports during their POW/MIA program,
- 22 pieces of paper were passed out to the audience and each
- 23 person rose and read the information about that particular
- 24 POW/MIA.
- District 25, Unit 466 reports supporting the Life

- 1 Community Development Homeless Women's Veteran's Home in
- 2 Adelanto.
- 3 Our elves report the many activities they
- 4 participate in at their facility. Our Gift Shop Patient
- 5 Remembrance money gets used up quickly. Elves report
- 6 using it for holiday decorations, active wear clothing,
- 7 movie tickets, socks, calendars, and the list goes on.
- 8 Several also report supporting bingo and other parties in
- 9 the Community Living Centers, being the concierge,
- 10 providing coffee for the waiting veterans, and having
- on-hand ditty bags filled with personal hygiene items.
- 12 And because there is still time in the day and
- 13 money in our coffers, units donate time and money to:
- 14 Fisher House, Creative Arts both on the national and local
- 15 level, Wounded Warrior Project. And on the local level,
- 16 cemeteries and other projects that directly benefit the
- 17 veteran.
- Our magical, mystical fantasy of making a
- 19 difference in the lives of our veterans is clearly shown
- 20 by our hardworking members throughout the Department of
- 21 California.
- 22 Madam President, it was an honor and learning
- 23 experience to be your VA&R chairman for this year. Thank
- 24 you.
- 25 May I go on with my awards?

1 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: You may. 2 (Applause.) VA&R CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: Okay. My first place 3 4 Unit Supplemental goes to Unit 595, District 21, Jennifer 5 Beiger. 6 (Applause.) 7 VA&R CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: Okay. My first place 8 Homeless Supplemental went to Linda Farris, District 29. 9 (Applause.) 10 VA&R CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: Linda and Jennifer's 11 reports were forwarded to National. 12 (Applause.) 13 VA&R CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: Our first place 14 district -- I'm sorry. District supplemental, District 15 19, Becky Bullard. 16 (Applause.) 17 VA&R CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: Don't go anywhere. 18 Okay. The most home and field service hours reported was by the same women from District 14, Judy. I gave her a 19 20 certificate for both her field service hours reported were 21 8,277 and her home service hours were 7,447. 22 (Applause.) 23 VA&R CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: Okay. My best 24 Representative's Report went to Pat Alvarez. She's over 25 there.

1 (Applause.) VA&R CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: And we have a Vista 2 Award Volunteers and Service to Others. And that is a 3 4 recommendation from the facility, and that goes to Becky 5 Bullard at Long Beach VA. 6 (Applause.) 7 VA&R CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: Madam President, may I 8 please introduce the elves? 9 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: You may. Ladies, 10 I don't want you walking in here with any sheets or lamps. 11 VA&R CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: Are they coming up? 12 Would you please come up, ladies. 13 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Will the 14 Sergeant-at-Arms and Marshal, better known as R2-D2 and 15 C3-PO and Chubacca escort our elves to the front. 16 (Processional.) VA&R CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: Okay. As I call your 17 18 names, ladies, please step forward. And our 11 representative from San Diego, Cindy Simmons and Irma 12 Manthei. 13 (Applause.) 14 VA&R CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: Our representatives 15 from Loma Linda, Jerry L. Pettis, Mavis Kanka and Elaine 16 Gallagher. And we have -- from Long Beach we have Pat 17 Alvarez, representative of the poppy production manager. 18 We have Tami Bell, deputy, and we all know Becky Bullard, 19 brand-new deputy. Earlean Paige, representative West LA. 20 (Applause.) 21 VA&R CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: Kathy Richardson, 22 deputy West LA Ambulatory Care Center. CJ Reyes, deputy 23 East Los Angeles. 24 (Applause.) 25 VA&R CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: Pam Hicks, deputy East

I'm glad to be here. 5 6 This is an amazing event. I can't believe so many women 7 in one room. Wow, wow. We have one of those stories we walked in and we had to wait a little bit because there 8 9 weren't enough bathrooms, so a lot of women were using the 10 men's stall. 11 Before I forget, I know some of you here, but my 12 name is John Mejia. I'm our National Executive 13 Committeeman for the Sons of the American Legion. My post 14 is Post 155. A big hello to all of you. It's my pleasure to be here today to thank you for inviting us today. It's 15 16 my honor to introduce to all of you Chris Huntzinger, our 17 National Commander for The Sons of the American Legion who 18 hails from Pittsburgh. 19 (Applause.) NATIONAL SONS COMMITTEEMAN MEJIA: I would like 20 21 for you to come forward and say a few words. 22 (Applause.) 23 NATIONAL SONS COMMANDER HUNTZINGER: Thank you. Thank you very, very much. President Terry, members of 24 25 the American Legion Auxiliary, members of the American

Legion Family here gathered this morning, and ladies and 1 2 gentlemen, it is a good morning and thank you for the 3 invitation to participate and bring a few greetings on 4 behalf of the 353,000 members of the Sons of the American 5 Legion. 6 (Applause.) 7 NATIONAL SONS COMMANDER HUNTZINGER: My name is 8 Chris Huntzinger and I do hail from Harrisburg, 9 Pennsylvania. I've been a member of the Sons of the 10 American Legion, a charter member of Penbrook Squadron 730 11 in Harrisburg since 1990. And I have my eligibility 12 through my dad, Paul Huntzinger, who is a Korean War 13 Veteran. My father, thank the Lord, is still living at 14 age 81, and my grandfather Paul, or Philip, J. Huntzinger, Sr. who was a United States Army veteran and was in the 15 16 service in the Army stationed at the Carlisle barracks 17 outside of Harrisburg when the Japanese bombed Pearl 18 Harbor in December of 1941. He's a career man like my grandfather, Philip James Huntzinger. So I have my 19 eligibility from both. 20 21 (Applause.) 22 NATIONAL SONS COMMANDER HUNTZINGER: Thank you. I would like to thank all the veterans that are in the 23 house also this morning because we appreciate the 24 25 sacrifices that you made when you gave your years in

- 1 serving our great nation in our Armed Forces. And thank
- 2 you, veterans, who are here today for your service in the
- 3 American Legion so that we can be here.
- 4 (Applause.)
- 5 NATIONAL SONS COMMANDER HUNTZINGER: You know,
- 6 when I went to my father years ago and I wanted to become
- 7 a member, we started Penbrook Squadron 730 Sons of the
- 8 American Legion, and I needed my dad to join the American
- 9 Legion because he wasn't a member.
- 10 And I went to Dad and I explained what I wanted
- 11 to do, and he said, "Son, I'll join the organization.
- 12 I'll do what you want." And I said, "Dad, you've been
- 13 eligible to be a member of the American Legion for
- 14 decades, why didn't you join?"
- And Dad said, "Well, son, I didn't know much
- 16 about the organization." He said, "I was never asked."
- 17 And you get that many times over the years. I never
- 18 forgot that. And I know the American Legion -- I see some
- 19 heads nodding that you've had that in the American Legion
- 20 Auxiliary. Just ask. I know the American Legion; years
- 21 ago I wanted to make that a focal point of our campaign on
- 22 the SAL membership bandwagon this year as we head into
- 23 Houston to get that 105 percent. Because I really do
- 24 because that "just ask" works. If you ask a potential
- 25 member of the organization to join the American Legion

- 1 Family, nine times out of ten they say they will. But,
- 2 you know, educate them, they will then return. They will
- 3 continue their membership. Ask them to join, educate
- 4 them, and they will stay. And I really believe that's
- 5 true because education plus communication instills the
- 6 motivation, and that equals success in really everything
- 7 we want to do.
- President Terry, congratulations on the project
- 9 that you've had this year, Operation Comfort, I believe,
- 10 and thank you for what you're doing on that. To help
- 11 families of veterans of our warriors returning home today
- 12 from around the nation, Iraq and Afghanistan, from the
- 13 war.
- And my project this year was the Fisher House
- 15 Foundation. So it's sort of also in the same ballpark
- 16 when you think about that.
- 17 (Applause.)
- 18 NATIONAL SONS COMMANDER HUNTZINGER: I met a
- 19 United States Marine Corps veteran of the Vietnam War who
- 20 was housed at the Denver Fisher House a few months ago
- 21 when I was in the detachment in Colorado. And I went to
- 22 Fisher House that morning and Jim, who had been getting
- 23 chemotherapy and radiation for six weeks, he had a strong
- 24 handshake. And his wife Janet said, "Commander, he didn't
- 25 have that strong a handshake six weeks ago."

1 Well, Jim looked at me and he said, "Commander, 2 the chemotherapy and the radiation, they are working. 3 It's making me stronger, it really is. " And he says, "I 4 think I can beat this cancer." And he says, "But the Fisher House has given me the will to live." And I never 5 6 forgot that. And I know that any projects that we do for 7 veterans is going to benefit them with whatever we do with 8 the American Legion Family. 9 And, you know, your Sons here, you can be proud 10 of them for what they've done. They donate to the Fisher 11 They also donated over \$18,000 this year to the House. 12 American Legion Child Welfare Foundation and across the 13 nation this year, \$453,599, your Sons of the American 14 Legion donated to CWF. And I don't know if you know 15 this --16 (Applause.) 17 NATIONAL SONS COMMANDER HUNTZINGER: -- but 18 probably this time of year when we start our 2013-2014 19 year, we will donate as the Sons of the American Legion over \$6 million to CWF. 20 21 (Applause.) 22 NATIONAL SONS COMMANDER HUNTZINGER: Thank you 23 for your support on that. They also here with the Sons, they also have a new motorized Wheelchair For Veterans 24 25 program that's very costly, but they're asking for

donations from the Sons to be able to give back to that 1 2 project for our veterans in wheelchairs that need the 3 help. And it's fantastic in what they do. 4 One of the Squadrons Post 328 has the food bank and also Riverside, California that do this and they help 5 6 some of the area of San Bernardino in Los Angeles. And 7 you know something, that food bank that the Sons supports, 8 they feed and they help with eight million -- I'm sorry. 9 Eight million dinners, eight million meals a year --10 (Applause.) 11 NATIONAL SONS COMMANDER HUNTZINGER: -- to help 12 those in need. But I've taken up enough of your time and 13 I've seen from the crowds here, I knew -- and you have a 14 great house there, it's a packed house for the American Legion Auxiliary Department of California is fantastic. 15 16 And I always knew that I was surrounded by royalty, but 17 now with the crowns I really know I'm surrounded by 18 royalty. But thank you, ladies, so much for your 19 20 hospitality. I appreciate you. God bless you all and god 21 bless our men and women serving our nation and God bless our United States of the America. Thank you again. 22 23 (Applause.) 24 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: And to the 25 American Legion Foundation this year. Thank you very

much. Thank you, sir. 1 2 NATIONAL SONS COMMANDER HUNTZINGER: I appreciate 3 it. 4 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Thank you. Thank 5 you, gentlemen. 6 (Processional.) 7 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: The doors will be 8 closed so we can start our election process. The 9 delegates should be seated with their districts. shall be closed during the entire election procedure and 1 2 no one shall leave or enter the hall until the Chair states that the election is concluded. The exception to 3 4 this shall be that in an emergency a member may leave, and if her absence affects the voting strength, the district 5 6 president shall immediately notify the presiding officer. Number 27: When there is but one nominee for all 7 department offices and but one nominee for junior member 8 9 of finance, the nominees shall be elected viva voce. 10 Article V, Section 3, Department Constitution. Upon roll 11 call, the district presidents shall report the number of 12 units partially or wholly represented by duly elected 13 delegates or alternates present in the delegation at the 14 time of roll call. This is to determine that there is a 15 quorum of units present at the time of the election. 16 Number 28: When there is more than one nominee for the department offices or junior member of finance or 17 18 national office, election shall be by written ballot. district president shall, when they are instructed by the 19 Chair, take a roll call of their respective delegations to 20 21 ascertain the total voting strength of their district for 22 the election, reporting the same to the Chair. When there is but one nominee for office or junior member of finance, 23 the ballot may be dispensed with a nominee elected viva 24 25 voce.

1 Number 29: When there are three or more nominees 2 for an office or a junior member of finance, unless one 3 nominee receives a majority vote on the first ballot, the 4 nominee receiving the lowest number of votes shall be 5 automatically dropped before proceeding with the next 6 ballot. 7 Number 30: Each district president and district member of the elections committee shall distribute and 8 9 collect the votes cast by the district delegation and 10 deliver them to the department chairman of the elections. 11 Thirty-one: Department officers, chairmen, 12 committee members, and past department presidents shall 13 vote with their respective districts. 14 Number 32: Each delegate shall be entitled to 15 one vote. The vote of an absent unit delegate, not 16 represented by an alternate, shall be cast by the majority of the delegates from the unit. When two delegates 17 18 represent three votes, the chairman of the unit delegation shall cast the third vote. 19 20 Number 33: A majority of all votes cast shall 21 elect, except that in the election of the national 22 delegates and alternates a plurality shall elect. 23 Number 34: These convention rules may be amended during the convention by a two-thirds vote. 24 25 Number 35: Roberts Rules of Order, newly

revised, shall be the parliamentary authority on all 1 2 points not covered by these rules. The Convention Committee on 8 Auxiliary Emergency Fund met on June 27th, 2013 in Canyon 9 A of the Doral in Palm Springs. 10 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Diane, can I 11 interrupt you for a second? Do you have the copies of the 12 report to pass out? 13 AUXILIARY EMERGENCY FUND CHAIRMAN MORENO: Oh, I 14 do. Sorry. 15 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Sorry about that, 16 lady. You can start over, Diana. 17 AUXILIARY EMERGENCY FUND CHAIRMAN MORENO: I'm 18 rewinding. It's a magical rewind. 19 The Auxiliary Emergency Fund Committee met on 20 June 27, 2013 in the Canyon A Room of the Doral Hotel in 21 Palm Springs, California. The statistical report of the 22 chairman -- of this chairman appears on page 13 of the 23 Book of Reports. 24 Donna Lennox was appointed secretary. Barbara 25 Rosen offered prayer, and JoAnn Adams was appointed

Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 16 districts answered roll 1 2 There were three visitors present. The committee 3 agreed on the following report: The code was read and no 4 changes were recommended. Cheers. 5 (Applause.) 6 AUXILIARY EMERGENCY FUND CHAIRMAN MORENO: 7 again, no resolutions or recommendations were submitted for consideration. 8 9 (Applause.) 10 AUXILIARY EMERGENCY FUND CHAIRMAN MORENO: 11 Department certificates of appreciation were presented to 12 units and individuals donating \$100 or more to the 13 Auxiliary Emergency Fund. National certificates of 14 appreciation were presented to individuals donating \$50 or 15 more. National AEF pins will be forwarded as soon as 16 Peggy finds them in the boxes at the department office. Second and third place certificates for Best Unit 17 18 and District Supplementals were presented. Great Wiz, this concludes my statistical report. 19 20 May I continue with my supplemental? 21 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: You may. 22 AUXILIARY EMERGENCY FUND CHAIRMAN MORENO: 23 you. In a nation experiencing high unemployment rates and unmerciful onslaught of extreme weather and catastrophic 24 events, it is evident that if we are to continue to offer 25

- 1 emergency assistance to members who give so much of
- 2 themselves to veterans, the military and their families,
- 3 children, youth and the community, we must inspire units
- 4 to increase donations to the Auxiliary Emergency Fund -- I
- 5 lost my place -- and provide direct aid to our own
- 6 members.
- 7 In the spirit of the Great Wiz Terry's theme,
- 8 this Fairy Godmother challenged her Playful Pixies to
- 9 sprinkle Pixie Dust upon their units and districts to
- 10 magically encourage them to hold mystical fundraisers for
- 11 the Auxiliary Emergency Fund. And the wondrous Pixies did
- 12 just that.
- 13 Twenty units held fundraisers in a myriad of
- 14 magical ways that netted a total of \$3,539.42 in
- 15 donations. Some unit Pixies circulated donation cans, a
- 16 treasure box, a Fairy bank, penny banks, and even a
- 17 mystical See's Candy jar filled with surprises that made
- 18 it fun for members to support this important fund.
- 19 Other units held opportunity drawings for dozens
- 20 of free-range eggs, baskets and candy. While some held
- 21 AEF breakfasts, fish fries, and a Mexican dinner. One
- 22 clever Pixie's members played a Count Your Blessings game
- and one unit collected fines from members caught not
- 24 wearing their Auxiliary badge. While another unit fined
- 25 members for phones ringing during a meeting. And the

wondrously talented juniors of another unit offered 1 2 handmade jewelry for donations at both unit and district 3 meetings and functions. 4 Five district chairmen raised \$1,111, three by 5 passing donation cans at meetings, a Pixie purse, a 6 whimsical hat, and a treasure chest, and two held monthly 7 opportunity drawings. 114 units sent a total of \$5,154.75 to the 8 9 National Auxiliary Emergency Fund, well exceeding last year's donations. Donations to AEF are budgeted line 10 items of 91 units, with 16 units increasing their 11 donations and eight increasing their -- decreasing their 12 13 donations due to difficult economic times that even their 14 chairman's Pixie Dust could not overcome. 15 An amazing \$12,920 by units and \$325 by districts 16 was directly provided to their own members who had suffered catastrophic losses. Inspiring stories of the 17 18 units and districts helping members included paying bills for two members suffering from terminal cancer and gifting 19 one member's costs to attend her father's funeral after 20 21 first losing her job and shortly after her father. Beautiful stories of selflessness included 22 23 providing Thanksqiving dinner, Christmas gifts and dues paid for a member and her Legionnaire husband who provided 24 25 a home for a troubled teenager, despite the fact that they

were both out of work. A unit and district temporarily 1 2 helped pay some of the bills of a retired member who lost her school crossing quard job after going blind in both 3 4 eyes due to cancer, and members of a unit that took turns 5 sitting with the member's gravely ill husband so she could 6 attend meetings. 7 For this Fairy Godmother, the most inspiring fundraiser was held shortly after Hurricane Sandy hit the 8 9 east coast. During a unit AEF meeting an AEF Pixie whose unit donated \$200 didn't stop there. She asked for 10 personal donations and received another \$700 from her 11 unit's president who matched the -- this was added a 12 13 little bit later. Who matched the monies that were donated out of their entertainment room following the 14 meeting. She went out and just asked for personal 15 16 donations, and then their president matched those funds, ultimately raising \$1,600. And this is in the span of 17 18 like a half an hour. The unit sent the entire \$1,600 directly to a 19 sister unit in Staten Island where the monies were 20 21 distributed to unit members most affected by the hurricane's devastation. A lesson we can learn is that 22 23 sometimes the simplest fundraisers, asking for donations without the prizes we have grown so used to giving and 24 25 receiving is sometimes the most fruitful due to mankind's

inherent eagerness to help others. 1 2 In addition to holding fundraisers, 141 unit 3 chairmen actively enlightened members about the Auxiliary 4 Emergency Fund and 67 handed out AEF brochures resulting 5 in 21 units submitting applications to National, 19 for 6 Emergency Assistance and two for Education Assistance. 7 In conclusion, this humble former Pixie, now a Fairy Godmother, would like to thank the Great Wiz Terry 8 9 for appointing me to the exalted position of Fairy 10 Godmother of the Playful Pixies. Do we have any Playful Pixies here? Raise your hands. 11 12 (Applause.) 13 AUXILIARY EMERGENCY FUND CHAIRMAN MORENO: 14 Hopefully you are as proud as I am of the magic created by 15 the Playful Pixies who inspired their units and districts 16 to so generously support the Auxiliary Emergency Fund and 17 their own members in need this past year. May their 18 efforts continue in the years to come, even without the 19 magical, mystical Pixie Dust of this year's Playful 20 Pixies. 21 Great Wiz, this concludes my remarks. May I 22 present this year's awards? 23 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: You may. 24 AUXILIARY EMERGENCY FUND CHAIRMAN MORENO: Thank 25 you. Best Unit Fundraiser, the certificate goes to La

Kim Thompson offered prayer, and Oretha 8 9 Calloway, Unit 710, was appointed Sergeant-At-Arms. A 10 total of 11 district delegates answered roll call. There 11 were three visitors present. 12 The committee agreed on the following report. 13 The code was read. - 20 hard to ensure their networks are established allowing

- 25 keeping informed about the American Legion and the

- 2 There are 416 subscriptions to e-news, a great
- 3 way to keep up with events and special information. Our
- 4 generous ALA members have purchased 184 gift
- 5 subscriptions, an ideal way to ensure others are provided
- 6 with ALA information.
- We are writing and submitting newspaper articles
- 8 on our activities to a tune of 461 with 431 actual
- 9 published articles. We are writing to our local editors
- 10 making our opinions heard by submitting 64 letters with 35
- 11 published.
- To keep ALA and our benefactors in the public
- 13 eye, we submitted 97 letters of appreciation and sent them
- 14 to our local newspapers, a great way to promote ALA
- 15 programs and say at the same time thank you to those that
- 16 support us. And the best part, it's cost free to the
- 17 unit.
- We have been on TV 50 times, had 252 radio
- 19 announcements, and were seen on local cable TV 34 times,
- 20 each and every time promoting ALA programs and getting the
- 21 word out about other military, their families, and our
- 22 veterans.
- 23 And as we gain experience with telecommunications
- 24 more units are using social media. Currently we have 34
- 25 units with a website and 42 share with their posts. Even

names and addresses of certified instructors and shall 1 2 provide each district with the approved list at the 3 Department Convention." 4 The proposed change would be: "The Department 5 Chairman shall maintain a current list of names, unit 6 numbers, and districts of certified instructors and shall 7 provide each district with the approved list at the Department Convention." 8 9 By direction of the committee I move this change. 10 PARLIAMENTARIAN KAPSALIS: Second. 11 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: It's been moved 12 and seconded to change leadership code number 14: "The 13 Department Chairman shall maintain a current list of names and addresses of certified instructors and shall provide 14 each district with the approved list at the Department 15 Convention." 16 17 Proposed change would read: Number 14: 18 Department Chairman shall maintain a current list of names, unit numbers, and districts of certified 19 20 instructors and shall provide each district with the 21 approved list at the Department Convention." 22 Is there any discussion? 23 (No response.) 24 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: All those in 25 favor, say aye.

1 ALL PRESENT: Aye. 2 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Any opposed? 3 (No response.) 4 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Passed. 5 LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN DeLASHMIT: There were no 6 resolutions or recommendation. 100 percent reporting 7 citations were given and second and third place winners 8 were presented. And I have it here, but I've posted it in 9 the office but I have it. But I have the list and each 10 district has a copy of it. 11 With no further business the meeting was 12 adjourned at 9:55 a.m. Diane DeLashmit, Leadership 13 Chairman. Madam President, may I continue with my 14 15 supplemental? 16 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: You may. 17 LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN DeLASHMIT: Madam Wizard 18 Terry, this year was very challenging, exciting, and rewarding for this Fairy Godmother. Special emphasis was 19 20 placed on taking the correspondence course. The course 21 was taken by 70 members. Not all passed. Some members 22 took the course as many as three times before passing. 23 Some district chairmen had workshops that focused on the There were three junior members that passed the 24 course. 25 junior correspondence course. There is a lot of valuable

material included in this course that can be utilized for 1 2 the senior membership as well. This year districts in our vast kingdom were 3 4 encouraged to hold a Department School of Instruction, a 5 leadership workshop, in their area and to invite surrounding districts to attend. The intent was to offer 6 7 opportunities in villages where there had not been any 8 training for some time. Response was received from five 9 districts from the San Francisco Bay Area to the Mexican 10 border. 11 Attendance varied from 16 to 35 present, however, it was worth the effort since there were a total of 125 12 13 attendees, including 14 new members, and 36 first timers. 14 Working with Linda Hayes, the Junior Activities 15 Chairman, a workshop for junior members was held with 16 16 attending and five districts represented. There were many 17 senior members present also that helped facilitate the 18 program. At each workshop certified instructors were 19 20 assigned portions of the program to facilitate. Many 21 mediums were used in the presentations which offered a lot 22 of versatility and dynamics. Those in attendance were 23 encourage to participate in skits, question and answer quizzes and other fun ways of learning. Hands-on 24 25 demonstrations were provided for proper presentation of

- 1 Colors, escorting of guests, poppy making, and much more.
- 2 Handouts were provided for each attendee. Many subjects
- 3 were presented; however there was much in which there just
- 4 wasn't enough time.
- 5 Districts reported 22 new leadership activities
- 6 developed in the units and districts. Some were new
- 7 member packets that contained information regarding
- 8 preamble, emblem, acronyms, Constitution & Bylaws,
- 9 standing rules, flag etiquette, poppy stories, and contact
- 10 information, et cetera. Some units appointed co-chairmen
- 11 to learn the various programs. The correspondence course
- 12 was initiated in some. Public speaking experience was
- offered in one unit. Unique ways of presenting the
- 14 program was a big hit in another unit.
- 15 A mentoring program was reported by 70 units.
- 16 The big sister idea was used at two units. The name of a
- 17 seasoned member was given to newer members to contact for
- 18 questions and information in another. Many liked the
- 19 one-on-one concept. There were many old ideas that were
- 20 used for the first time in some units and districts.
- 21 Some districts mentoring new units or -- let's
- 22 see. Some districts maintain new units -- or mentoring
- 23 new units or those having difficulty, by attending each of
- their meetings for a year to be a resource person.
- 25 Depending on how the unit is doing, the mentor from then

on only attends occasionally. 1 2 All in all, leadership was offered to a vast 3 amount of members; however, as is always the case, those 4 that need it the most do not avail themselves of the 5 opportunity. It is encouraging that many of our seasoned 6 members continue to learn more and more about our 7 organization. And now for the awards. Our first place Best 8 9 Unit Supplemental goes to Madeline Lee, Camarillo Unit 10 741. 11 (Applause.) 12 LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN DeLASHMIT: Congratulations. 13 One of our seasoned. Thank you, Madeline. 14 (Applause.) 15 LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN DeLASHMIT: And first place 16 District Unit Supplemental goes to Pat Alvarez, District 29. 17 18 (Applause.) 19 LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN DeLASHMIT: I will leave you 20 with this quote: "True leadership must be for the benefit 21 of the followers, not the enrichment of the leaders." From Robert Townsend. 22 23 Madam Wizard, this concludes my report. 24 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Thank you, Diane, 25 you wise old owl.

1 LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN DeLASHMIT: Oh, and I forgot 2 about this. Excuse me. 3 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Before we hear from our Convention Commission, we are going to have a 4 quick Membership update report from our Leprechaun 5 6 Danielle. It will be very short and sweet. 7 MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WHITE: Short and sweet is 8 the word. Okay. We started with 572 members that we 9 needed to renew. Ladies, first of all, we collected 10 \$2,213 with you guys. And last night from the Legion we collected another 300. So we collected \$2,539. 11 12 (Applause.) 13 MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WHITE: That's remarkable. As of now we have paid for 449 members. You can applaud 14 15 yourself because --16 (Applause.) 17 MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WHITE: But importantly we 18 still have 124 seniors to renew. We have taken care of all the seniors at each district and unit, so it took us 19 all morning to do that. This afternoon we're going to 20 21 take care of all the juniors, except for District 13 that 22 doesn't want them paid. So we will have to get about 124 senior members. But I know you guys. It's getting so 23 close, so close. 24 25 So what I'm going to ask you is see if you can be

giving for one more senior and we will make it for sure. 2 So that's up to you now, the last drop. But we are ready 3 with a very big smile to see if we can make it. And if we 4 do, you will know by tomorrow morning. Thank you, ladies. 5 (Applause.) 6 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Dona Enright. 7 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN ENRIGHT: Yes. District 18, Unit 755 is giving -- okay. I'm sorry; I can't read. 247 8 9 is giving you a check for one senior, five juniors from 10 their unit. 11 MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WHITE: Thank you very much. 12 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN ENRIGHT: And we have one 13 other senior from the district. 14 MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WHITE: Madam President, I have forgotten -- if I may excuse myself, I have forgotten 15 16 to thank you for this Membership assignment. I'm not sure if I want to say thank you, but let me tell you it was 17 18 challenging and the work with Madam President was a 19 delight. Thank you. 20 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Thank you, 21 Danielle. 22 (Applause.) 23 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Now our little leprechaun will be in the back of the room and if you are 24 25 able to once again contribute so that we can get these

1	about 120 members paid, it would help. You can go
2	together to come up with the \$17 per capita. So see the
3	little leprechaun in the back of the room. Thank you,
4	ladies, very, very much.
5	Now we are going to have our Convention
6	Commission Linda Caples, and we have Mr. Jim Leyser from
7	the American Legion Convention Commission.
8	
9	CONVENTION COMMISSION REPORT
10	
11	CONVENTION COMISSION CHAIRMAN CAPLES: Madam
12	President, a positive note. I have enjoyed this
13	chairmanship and was very lucky to have already known and
14	been what I consider friends with those who are on the
15	American Legion Commission. And have been very helpful
16	and have kept me informed as to what has been taking place
17	since the last convention and why no meetings and et
18	cetera this past year.
19	This has been a very busy year for this chairman
20	and I am sad to say a very uneventful year due to the
21	American Legion Department of California moving forward to
22	become the American Legion Department of California
23	Convention Corporation. The resolution at the last
24	convention in Redding to form was presented and passed.
25	This also meant their writing constitution and bylaws that

- 1 would conform to Department and National.
- 2 Yesterday I was invited to once again attend the
- 3 American Legion Convention City Commission meeting at 1:00
- 4 o'clock. My co-part, so to speak, and chairman for the
- 5 Legion, Jim Leyser, was appointed to run the meeting. The
- 6 meeting finished at about 3:00 p.m. and was a very, very
- 7 informative meeting.
- 8 At this meeting they presented their bylaws for
- 9 the American Legion Department of California Convention
- 10 Corporation. They were read and then discussed, with a
- 11 few little housekeeping items. Vote was taken, they were
- 12 accepted and they were passed.
- 13 A little information. The members of the
- 14 American Legion Department of California Convention
- 15 Corporation will be known as trustees. There will be nine
- 16 trustees: three members of the American Legion Department
- of California, two members of the Department of California
- 18 American Legion Auxiliary, two members of the Sons of the
- 19 American Legion Detachment of California, and two members
- 20 of the American Legion Riders Department of California.
- 21 These trustees shall be elected at the annual conventions
- 22 and each trustee shall serve for three years.
- The American Legion Department of California
- 24 Convention Corporation will be taking over next year 2014
- 25 after the Santa Clara convention and at that time all

- 1 future conventions, at which time it will then be known as
- 2 the American Legion Department of California Convention
- 3 Corporation instead of the American Legion Convention
- 4 Commission.
- 5 Our future conventions at this time are: 2014
- 6 Santa Clara. 2015 Ontario as voted. And possibly 2016
- 7 Fresno.
- 8 It is this chairman's recommendation as was the
- 9 past chairman, Beverly Sparks', recommendation in her
- 10 convention report that this chairmanship be for a longer
- 11 term. They should also be from the north and south to
- 12 save expenses for our department as previously in the past
- 13 they were all pretty close to one area.
- 14 You also might like to know that not all hotels
- 15 pay for rooms when we tour and sometimes not even lunch or
- 16 coffee. This can save our Department on unneeded
- 17 expenses. It is also a recommendation that the incoming
- 18 Department President form a committee to take on the task
- 19 of conforming to the American Legion Department of
- 20 California Convention Corporation so that we can continue
- 21 to work together in the future without issues and success.
- This chairman also recommends that this committee
- 23 review "The Department Requirements For Convention" and
- 24 that it also be revised as we need to have new figures
- 25 possibly each year as continuing to go 1,000 for

- attendance is extra work, empty chairs, and possibly extra
 money for our department. This chairman has put the
- 3 figures given in the procedure work for help on this issue
- 4 from the Redding convention last year. Thank you, Madam
- 5 Terry, for that.
- I am sorry to have to bring this before you, but
- 7 I do know we have awesome, intelligent, and very smart
- 8 members and that they know how to get the job done to save
- 9 our department unnecessary funds to keep us moving
- 10 forward.
- 11 And at this time I would like to introduce our
- 12 Convention Commission Committee members: Our one-year
- 13 member, Bonnie Christner.
- 14 (Applause.)
- 15 CONVENTION COMISSION CHAIRMAN CAPLES: And our
- 16 two-year member: Melanie Taylor.
- 17 (Applause.)
- 18 CONVENTION COMISSION CHAIRMAN CAPLES: I would
- 19 also like to introduce the American Legion Convention
- 20 Commission Chairman, Jim Leyser, who will share with us
- 21 about the new changes and the American Legion Department
- 22 of California Convention Corporation.
- 23 (Applause.)
- 24 LEGION CONVENTION COMMISSION CHAIRMAN LEYSER:
- 25 Thank you, Linda. Good afternoon, ladies.

1 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Good afternoon. 2 LEGION CONVENTION COMMISSION CHAIRMAN LEYSER: 3 Madam President Terry, so happy to stand up with you with 4 all the rest of my Past First Mommas. Will they all stand up who have worked with me in the past years? I have a 5 bunch of them, I know I do. Where's Madeline Lee? 6 7 worked with me. Bonnie in the back. Norma, there we go 8 look at that. 9 It's been a real pleasure working with you, 10 ladies, and I hope to continue for the next few years. 11 But to give you a little history about the convention commission, we're getting smaller. They're getting fewer, 12 13 so we don't have a lot of places. 14 In fact, 2015 in Ontario right at this moment is 15 up in the air. We don't have a convention corporation to 16 put one on down there. Both districts are at odds with 17 each other so they're not going to put one together. 18 that's why or one reason we're hoping to get this 19 corporation together before that so that we would be able 20 to move in. When there's not a city corporation available we'll be able to move in and set it up. 21 22 And so we're hoping that everybody that gets elected to the corporation has experience with putting on 23 a convention at one time or another while they were 24 25 members of the Auxiliary.

Number two, we're going to be going into smaller 1 2 venues. As you look around you now, you see a lot of 3 empty chairs. Some people may have left due to illness or whatever, but look at your opening day and then look at 4 your ending day. For every chair you see in this room we 5 pay \$1. They don't fill those chairs anymore. They used 6 7 to. When I first started we got the chairs and the 8 convention city corporations were willing to work with us. 9 And they still are, but they want us to pay anywhere from 10 70- to \$80,000 for a convention center. 11 So you can see the importance of this corporation 12 getting put together so that we can go in and look at 13 places that have little convention centers in them, but 14 they're still large enough to take care of us. And so in that respect, like Linda said, we're asking that each 15 16 group, the Auxiliary, the Sons of the American Legion, the Riders and the Legion as well, look at your needs. 17 18 Because we're going to look at them alongside of you and we want to try to help you, but we're going to have to 19 downsize. 20 I would rather see -- I mean, you ladies have 21 22 done well this year. You're going to be 100 percent, yes? 23 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Yes, sir. Honey, I want some money out of your pocket. Thirty-four bucks, 24 25 please.

1 LEGION CONVENTION COMMISSION CHAIRMAN LEYSER: 2 want you to know I got robbed in the hallway back there 3 when the lights were off. 4 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Well, you're 5 restocked by then. Give me 34 bucks, please. 6 (Applause.) 7 LEGION CONVENTION COMMISSION CHAIRMAN LEYSER: What am I giving you 34 bucks for? 8 9 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Two per capita 10 for two senior members. 11 LEGION CONVENTION COMMISSION CHAIRMAN LEYSER: I'll tell you what. Then I'll give you 40. 12 13 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Thank you, sir. 14 (Applause.) LEGION CONVENTION COMMISSION CHAIRMAN LEYSER: I 15 16 think you already beat the Legion. When are you going to have this man. 17 18 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Well, baby, that's because we're going to be having a "you do." 19 20 LEGION CONVENTION COMMISSION CHAIRMAN LEYSER: I 21 don't know. Jim is going home. Bad leg, bad leg. 22 Mary, are you listening? I want to introduce my wife. And this is her first convention. 23 24 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Uh-oh. 25 LEGION CONVENTION COMMISSION CHAIRMAN LEYSER:

- 1 And she's going to -- and she's been my biggest supporter
- 2 for 22 years in the American Legion. Mary, stand up.
- 3 (Applause.)
- 4 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Hey, Jim, does
- 5 she have any money?
- 6 LEGION CONVENTION COMMISSION CHAIRMAN LEYSER:
- 7 Not much. Well, she came down here now.
- 8 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Keep doing it
- 9 there, dude.
- 10 LEGION CONVENTION COMMISSION CHAIRMAN LEYSER:
- 11 There. That's all of it.
- DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: On, baby.
- 13 LEGION CONVENTION COMMISSION CHAIRMAN LEYSER: So
- 14 now you get an idea. See, you guys have fun and
- 15 camaraderie and everything. I love that. It's really
- 16 great to come over and see you guys and visit with you
- 17 once in a while.
- 18 Oh, thank you. I'm going to frame this and put
- 19 it in a glass case; that's the most expensive mug I ever
- 20 held.
- 21 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: It just cost him
- 22 \$77 because he made another additional \$37 donation.
- 23 Thank you, Jim.
- 24 LEGION CONVENTION COMMISSION CHAIRMAN LEYSER:
- 25 You're welcome. So please think about it and work with

- 1 it. We're hoping to get this corporation off the ground
- 2 before 2015. We just got the bylaws passed today so now
- 3 we can go to Sacramento and get the corporation papers,
- 4 and then we'll be going on to elect the members and get
- 5 that done. So American Legion, on the American Legion
- 6 side the first year they will be appointed, and then after
- 7 that they will be elected in staggered form, three, two,
- 8 and one. And so is there any other questions?
- 9 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: We want you to
- 10 give out your phone number so these ladies can call you
- 11 with a question. He has a cell phone, but he's pretty
- 12 tricky because he gives you the number, but not the area
- 13 code.
- 14 LEGION CONVENTION COMMISSION CHAIRMAN LEYSER:
- 15 Terry, I live in Fresno.
- 16 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Yes.
- 17 LEGION CONVENTION COMMISSION CHAIRMAN LEYSER:
- 18 Everybody knows the area code for Fresno.
- 19 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: No, they don't.
- 20 I get lost in a shoebox, dude.
- 21 LEGION CONVENTION COMMISSION CHAIRMAN LEYSER:
- 22 All right. Get your pen out.
- DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: I've got it. I'm
- 24 ready.
- 25 LEGION CONVENTION COMMISSION CHAIRMAN LEYSER:

Area code (559) 907-1804. And I'll let you know, Mary 1 2 screens all my calls so it better be legitimate. 3 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Thank you, sir. 4 LEGION CONVENTION COMMISSION CHAIRMAN LEYSER: You're more than welcome. Any other questions? Thank you 5 6 very much and thank you for your time. 7 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Thank you. Will 8 the Sergeant-at-Arms and Marshal please escort Mr. Jim 9 Leyser from the room. 10 CONVENTION COMISSION CHAIRMAN CAPLES: Thank you, 11 Jim. And his honey too. 12 (Processional.) 13 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: While this was 14 going on, Margaret Quinones and Ruby Kapsalis donated \$102 15 for six seniors in memory of Veronica McGough. 16 (Applause.) 17 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Now what we've 18 all been waiting for for days. 19 CONVENTION COMISSION CHAIRMAN CAPLES: Wait, 20 wait. 21 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Oh, excuse me. 22 Sorry, Linda. 23 CONVENTION COMISSION CHAIRMAN CAPLES: Madam President, this concludes my report and I thank you for 24 25 this appointment. It has been an honor to serve you and

1 our department. 2 Madam President, may I also approach your station 3 for the purpose of a gift? 4 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: You may. CONVENTION COMISSION CHAIRMAN CAPLES: I was 5 Linda's convention chairman in Redding and we had sinful 6 7 ice cream at the pool. And it was good. 8 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: I should have 9 done this when Jim was here. He could have opened it. 10 Yeah, you can pop and we don't care. Oh, isn't she a 11 beautiful fairy. And she has a crystal ball. Thank you, 12 Linda. Beautiful, Linda. Thank you. 13 CONVENTION COMISSION CHAIRMAN CAPLES: Thank you. 14 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: We are going to 15 hear from the Finance Committee and the budget. 16 DISTRICT 20 PRESIDENT PHILCOX: Madam President. 17 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Yes, ma'am. 18 DISTRICT 20 PRESIDENT PHILCOX: May I interrupt just a second? It's my honor and pleasure to let you know 19 that Pat Haus from District 20, Unit 520 -- I mean, 20 21 district -- yeah, District 20, Unit 520 also donated a 22 hundred dollars for membership in Veronica's name. 23 (Applause.) 24 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Thank you. Norma 25 Billings, our finance chairman, Kathy Martinez, our senior

member of finance, and Geri Fitzpatrick, our junior member 1 2 of finance. 3 4 FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT AND BUDGET 5 6 FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Good 7 afternoon, ladies. 8 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Before we start, 9 do we have copies of the budget? 10 FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Oh, I'm 11 sorry. Do we have budgets for the members? All the 12 members have a copy of the budget? 13 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: We're going to 14 step back. 15 NATIONAL POPPY CHAIRMAN TAYLOR: Thank you, Madam 16 President. While we're waiting for the copies to go 17 around, I wanted to share something with all of you. As 18 National Poppy Chairman this year, I received an e-mail 19 from a unit in Grand Rapids, Michigan. And one of the ladies got this brilliant idea of going to her bakery and 20 21 asking if she would make poppy cookies. The lady at the 22 bakery said she would be honored to, and so that unit 23 raised monies for their VA&R program by offering these 24 poppy cookies to the public. 25 So I called the owner of the bakery and I said,

- 1 "Marge, this is Melanie Taylor. I live in California.
- 2 I'm the American Legion Auxiliary National Poppy Chairman.
- 3 Would you please ship me three dozen of your poppy
- 4 cookies. I want to take them Houston, Texas for the
- 5 National Convention."
- And she said, "Oh, honey, I can't really do that,
- 7 but I know you have a lot of bakeries in California. Why
- 8 don't you contact one of them?"
- 9 Well, I have a very dear friend who owns a bakery
- in my town of Healdsburg. And it's a gold medal,
- 11 nationwide baker. And I called Will Seppi and I said,
- 12 "Will, would you help my unit raise monies for the poppy
- 13 fund to help our veterans at the Yountville Veterans
- 14 Home?" We have a PTSD ward over there and it was
- 15 mentioned earlier in the VA&R report by Harriet.
- 16 This PTSD ward gets no money from federal or
- 17 state funding, and these are veterans who have suffered
- 18 TBI and PTSD while serving our country in Iraq and
- 19 Afghanistan. So Will said, "I would be honored to do
- 20 that."
- 21 He made these poppy cookies and sold them for \$3
- 22 and 50 cents to the general public gave my unit \$2 for
- 23 each cookie sold, and in two weeks' time I had a check
- 24 from that bakery in the amount of \$450.
- 25 (Applause.)

1 NATIONAL POPPY CHAIRMAN TAYLOR: This is a white 2 sugar cookie about this big. It was frosted in a hard 3 crunch frosting. It has our Flanders Field poppy on one 4 side and written across the top are the words, "We 5 remember." And he only did this with two weeks' notice and in two weeks he sold almost 18 dozen cookies. Like I 6 7 said, \$450, and that money I used to buy gasoline cards for the van that the new residents will be using. They 8 9 have to travel over to Travis Air Force Base in Sacramento 10 to see doctors over there. They have to go down to Fort 11 Miley in San Francisco and they have to go to the Palo 12 Alto VA down there, you know, because they have had TBIs, 13 traumatic brain injuries. 14 So that \$450 helped put a lot of gas in the van to get those residents down to those medical facilities. 15 16 So, you know, these -- these cookies are beautiful. They taste fantastic. So, ladies, check with your bakeries in 17 your local town in the month of May and let's have some 18 poppy cookies. You know, that's an easy way, you know, if 19 20 they will help you to make money for your poppy account. 21 And so three programs, three national programs were 22 covered in this promotion: VA&R because the money went to the veterans, public relations, because it went into all 23 24 the local newspapers. It was on the radio stations. It 25 was in San Francisco and Oakland TV stations. And it's

1 also poppy. So why not. What a sweet way to remember our 2 veterans. Thank you. 3 (Applause.) 4 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Thank you, Norma. 5 FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Oh, you're 6 welcome. Madam President, there are going to be some 7 extra copies. May I ask the district presidents to hold 8 them up? Each district should have received 16 copies. 9 So if you have extras, can you please hold them up so that 10 we can have our juniors collect them? 11 Okay. Madam President Terry, may I proceed with 12 my statistical? 13 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Your committee 14 meeting, yes, ma'am. 15 FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Okay. The 16 convention committee on Finance met on June 27th, 2013 in 17 the Oleander Ballroom B of the Doral, Palm Springs, California. 18 19 The statistical report of this chairman appears -- that's not applicable. Kathie Martinez was appointed 20 21 secretary, Geri Fitzpatrick offered prayer, and Sandy 22 Jacobs was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 19 district delegates answered roll call. There were six 23 24 visitors present. 25 The committee agreed upon the following report:

- 17 and seconded to change finance code 9, which currently
- 18 reads: "A fee of \$25 will be charged to any Unit,
- 19 District, Department Officers, and Chairman, Past
- 20 Department Presidents, and individual members who wish to
- 21 receive monthly mailings in paper form. All recipients of
- 22 monthly mailings via e-mail will not be charged. 2010" to
- 23 "A fee of \$25 will be charged to any Unit, District,
- 24 Department Officers and Chairman, Past Department
- 25 Presidents, and individual members who wish to receive

bimonthly mailings in paper form. All recipients of 1 2 bimonthly mailings via e-mail will not be charged." 3 Is there any discussion? 4 POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: Yes. Madam President, 5 Michelle Soares. 6 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Yes, Michelle. 7 POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: Is this going to double 8 the amount of paper in the mailings? And if so, then it 9 would pretty much double the costs, so what is the savings 10 here. 11 FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: That's a 12 good point. We want to eventually get everybody on 13 There's about a hundred units that do receive. I 14 know I'm kind of veering away from the answer here, but yes, the paper will be doubled. 15 16 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Excuse me. 17 Recognize Ruby Kapsalis, Past Department President. 18 PARLIAMENTARIAN KAPSALIS: The idea behind this 19 is postage costs cost the Department of California \$18,000 20 this year. That's just strictly for the mailings. The 21 idea is to have the Department only do a bimonthly mailing 22 and have the officers and chairmen do a bulletin directly to the district counterparts instead of department. So 23 the officers and chairmen would be sending bulletins to 24 25 the district chairman to disseminate to the units six

times a year and the bimonthly mailings would be going out 2 six months a year. So you would still be getting information the 12 months and it would not be doubling the 3 4 cost of -- the paperwork would not be doubled. FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Wasn't her 5 6 question the paperwork being doubled? 7 POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: That's fine. That 8 answers it. 9 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: So any further 10 discussion? 11 (No response.) 12 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Hearing none, all 13 those in favor say aye. 14 ALL PRESENT: Aye. 15 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Any opposed? 16 (No response.) 17 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Passed. 18 FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Okay. 19 Department Code Administrative 1. The Department 20 Secretary/Treasurer shall be authorized and charged with 21 responsibility of investing Department -- oops. I'm going 22 to back up one more. 23 Let's go back to Department Policy Code Number 17 24 which reads: "The budget status report and a trial 25 balance report prepared by the Department Office shall be

sent to the Department President and Finance Committee 1 2 quarterly." 3 We've deleted in its entirety as it is a 4 duplication of Finance Code Number 5. So Code Number 5 5 will be eliminated, and for housekeeping we will renumber 6 the balance of codes accordingly. So 18 will become 17 7 ending with 25 becoming 24. 8 I move the acceptance with approval of committee 9 this code change. 10 PARLIAMENTARIAN KAPSALIS: Second. 11 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: It's been moved 12 and seconded to delete Code 17: "The budget status report 13 and a trial balance report prepared by the Department 14 Office shall be sent to the Department President and Finance Committee quarterly." The motion is made to 15 16 delete that entirely and to renumber number 18 through 24. Is there any discussion? 17 18 (No response.) 19 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Hearing none, all 20 those in favor say aye. 21 ALL PRESENT: Aye. 22 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Any opposed? 23 (No response.) 24 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Passed. 25 FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Next code.

As it currently reads: "The Department 7 Secretary/Treasurer shall be authorized and charged with 8 the responsibility of investing Department funds in 9 savings accounts, certificates of deposit, et cetera, 10 interest bearing checking accounts, where practical. The 11 investment of funds must be made in major banking 12 institutions insured by the federal government." 13 The proposed change: "The Department 14 Secretary/Treasurer shall be authorized and charged with 15 the responsibility of investing Department funds in 16 savings account, certificates of deposit, et cetera, interest bearing checking accounts, where practical. 17 The 18 investment of funds must be made in major banking institutions insured by the federal government. 19 20 "A, the Department President and 21 Secretary/Treasurer shall serve as signatories on all 22 financial accounts. The Department Vice President shall 23 serve as a signatory on bank accounts, but not investment 24 accounts. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Any opposed? 11 12 (No response.) 13 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Passed. 14 FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Okay. The 15 budget was read and the following changes were made: 16 \$8500 relocation expense is being moved from the General Fund Reserves. GF62411, rent-parking-utilities, decreased 17 18 to \$500. GF62461, national candidates reserve, \$500. WF68505, expense account as well as gift shop, patient 19 remembrance, corrected to reflect donations received at an 20 amount of \$13,888.48. The WF48733, income-restricted 21 22 funds account, increased by \$2025 from reserves to cover 23 total scholarship awards. WF68702, scholarships-general, increased to 10,000. 24 25 A question regarding the totals in the actual

columns were addressed. We do not have correct/accurate 1 2 totals in these columns due to incorrect postings in the 3 general ledger. 4 The finance committee had to reconvene after the 5 memorial program to discuss a proposed code change from 6 Past Presidents Parlay Committee meeting. This one --7 there was a motion seconded and carried by Norma DuVall -- Madam President Terry, should I read this? 8 9 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: No, ma'am. 10 FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Okay. 11 Thank you. Madam President Terry, this concludes my 12 report. May I proceed with my supplemental? 13 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: You may. 14 FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Okay. The 15 finance budget meeting met May 18th through the 20th of 16 2013 at Red Coach Inn and department office. Attendees: 17 Terry Mikesell, Department President; Anita Biggs, 18 Department First Vice President; myself, Finance Chairman; Kathie Martinez, Senior Member of Finance; Geri 19 Fitzpatrick, Junior Member of Finance. 20 21 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: We don't have the 22 budget committee meeting minutes, Norma. 23 FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Okay. 24 Anyway --25 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Can we go right

to the budget, babe? 1 2 FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: I would 3 just like to go over who attended our budget meeting. We 4 discussed the proposed budget 2013-14 and our discussions 5 lasted three days. We were going over each line item with 6 a fine-tooth and comb, pardon the expression. All went 7 well and a lot was accomplished. We diligently expressed 8 the need for accuracy. We completed the proposed budget 9 and the end result was a deficit budget. We continued to 10 discuss where we need to decrease our Department's 11 operational expenses. 12 Discussions continued with various issues, 13 specifically possible raises for the Department office 14 staff. We felt at this time due to a deficit we could not 15 approve. 16 The Department office's relocation expenses were discussed, specifically a parking space that would incur a 17 18 yearly cost. Secretary/Treasurer Peggy Vogele informed us that we need a parking space for the staff. The area in 19 20 her -- well, in her estimation is not a very safe area to be in due to gangs and the homeless. The parking space 21 22 would also be available to the Department President, 23 Department Vice President, and other business visitors. Okay. And also since Mr. Van Ho will no longer 24 25 be with us -- he was our auditor for last year. Or this

- 1 year. He will be retiring. We received a proposal from
- 2 Wai S. Chui, CPA. Mr. Chui stated in his proposal that he
- 3 will not prepare our organization's federal and state
- 4 returns for the fiscal year-ending June 30th. We will
- 5 continue to contact other CPAs to reduce our expenses.
- 6 So with that being said, Finance received another
- 7 proposal that will reduce the costs of auditors to
- 8 decrease by approximately 9,000 creating a balanced budget
- 9 possibly.
- 10 Personnel policies were reviewed and there were
- 11 proposed changes as well as discussion on Finance and
- 12 Department codes proposed changes. The code changes will
- 13 be presented at convention in Palm Springs.
- Okay. All in all, I know we will continue to
- 15 make all things flow and flow as smoothly as possible. I
- 16 want to thank you Ruby Kapsalis for her continued efforts
- 17 as financial advisor. I want to thank Madam President for
- 18 her support. I want to thank Secretary/Treasurer Peggy
- 19 for her hard work.
- Okay. So we're going to go ahead and vote on
- 21 this new proposal. You can have it back because I have it
- 22 right here.
- Okay. We received a proposal from Troy Van
- 24 Sloten & Associates. And they will prepare the
- 25 organization's Federal and State Information Returns for

the period ending June 30th, 2013. I just highlighted a 1 2 few things on my proposal here. They estimate our fees for these services will range from 6,000 to 8,000 for the 3 4 audit and 1,000 for the information returns. The fee 5 estimate is based on anticipated cooperation from your 6 personnel and the assumption that unexpected circumstances 7 will not be encountered during the engagement. So we're 8 looking at a cost of possibly \$9,000. 9 So I move to accept this proposal from Troy Van 10 Sloten. 11 PARLIAMENTARIAN KAPSALIS: Second. 12 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: It's been moved 13 and seconded to accept a proposal from Troy Van Sloten, 14 CPA, to do our audit and taxes for \$9,000. Is there any 15 discussion? 16 (No response.) 17 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Are there any 18 questions? 19 (No response.) 20 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: All those in 21 favor, say aye. 22 ALL PRESENT: Aye. 23 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Any opposed? 24 (No response.) 25 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Passed.

1 Thank you, Norma. 2 FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Thank you. 3 Thank you, Madam President. Again, I want to thank Ruby 4 Kapsalis for her continued efforts and advice. I'd like 5 to thank Madam President for her support and also for 6 Secretary/Treasurer Peggy for her hard work. 7 And last but not least, it has been an honor to 8 serve as the Finance Chairman for this fiscal year. And 9 it has been quite challenging and I feel my dedication to the Auxiliary has made me feel proud to be a part of this 10 organization's finances. This is definitely a position 11 12 that takes a three-year commitment. And my three years 13 are complete. 14 (Applause.) 15 FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: I'm 16 puzzled. I put all these pieces together and it's 17 complete. 18 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Thank you, Norma. 19 FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: So this 20 concludes my supplemental report. And, Madam President, may we proceed with the reading of the proposed budget? 21 22 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: You may. 23 FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Senior 24 Member Kathie Martinez will start the reading. 25 SENIOR FINANCE MEMBER MARTINEZ: Good afternoon,

Just wondering on line 62405, the actual last 3 4 year was \$4,000 and we only used 39 percent of the budget, and then it was increased so the budget was 16,000. 5 6 then it says a decrease of \$2,000. I just didn't 7 understand that. 8 SENIOR FINANCE MEMBER MARTINEZ: There have been 9 -- how do I do this very correctly? There have been 10 instances of mispostings into general fund accounts. It 11 is unfortunate that the figures in the actual column are not accurate. We as a finance committee along with Madam 12 13 President, our advisor, Ruby Kapsalis, have been working 14 diligently with the department office to get the errors corrected. Some of them have been. Unfortunately not all 15 16 of them have been, and this is an instance of incorrect 17 postings. 18 DELEGATE MONROE: Thank you. 19 SENIOR FINANCE MEMBER MARTINEZ: You're welcome. 20 And again, ladies, as we're waiting for any other 21 questions, this is one of the reasons we went to a 22 bimonthly mailing, to reduce this cost. It is horrendous. 23 Do we have any other questions? DELEGATE PEREZ: Missy Perez, District 25, Unit 24 25 229. It's on the return check ones. I have a question.

Is it from the Department of California returned checks or 1 2 are they checks from the unit or district? And do you charge the unit or district the late fees? 3 4 SENIOR FINANCE MEMBER MARTINEZ: Yes, we do. 5 DELEGATE PEREZ: Okay. 6 SENIOR FINANCE MEMBER MARTINEZ: If it is a unit 7 or a personal check that is returned from the bank that 8 individual unit or person is charged the return check fee. 9 Because of the volume of checks that we deposit, we incur 10 a per item fee to deposit our money. Yeah, this is where 11 a lot of this expense comes in. And this is -- yeah, and 12 we have recently acquired a scanner. We had one -- we had 13 issues with it and it could not handle the volume that we 14 were putting through it. We have gotten the upgraded one and I know the department is using it so our bank fees 15 16 should reduce. Because that's what 90 percent of this is is bank fees. 17 18 DELEGATE PEREZ: Thank you. 19 SENIOR FINANCE MEMBER MARTINEZ: Thank you. 20 PARLIAMENTARIAN KAPSALIS: While we're talking 21 about this, this is where the units and districts can help 22 out here because if you will combine your checks as is suggested now, and there are forms on the website telling 23 24 you which donations you can send out a check. The banks 25 in San Francisco, after we deposit, I believe, maybe 300,

- 1 they take 50 cents out of every check we deposit. We're
- 2 paying them to put our money in the bank. And if we
- 3 reduce those checks -- yes, if you will reduce your checks
- 4 by combining your donations, that will help us
- 5 tremendously and it will make more of the money go towards
- 6 the programs rather than to the Wells Fargo Bank or the
- 7 other one.
- 8 SENIOR FINANCE MEMBER MARTINEZ: Thank you, Ruby.
- 9 Okay. Everybody got on page 2? All right.
- 10 Page 3, General Fund Other Expenses.
- 11 Relocation/Office Expenses: \$2,920. I'm sorry. Did I --
- 12 okay. Charitable Trusts: \$75. Relocation/Storage:
- 13 \$2,280. You all are confusing me.
- 14 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Ladies, you need
- 15 to have your little piece of paper so you can put it on
- there like a ruler so you can follow it across.
- 17 SENIOR FINANCE MEMBER MARTINEZ: Yeah, not all
- 18 line items have dollar figures in them and I'm trying my
- 19 best not to read a line item if there is no dollar figure
- 20 there.

JUNIOR FINANCE MEMBER FITZPATRICK: VAMC tours is 19 20 when the president and the hospital representatives take 21 tours of our medical facilities; right? 22 FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Yes. 23 Continue on with page 7. Hospital Representatives: 2700.

Midyear Meetings/Representatives: 2500. Chairman: 400.

There were no bank fees. We have Creative Arts. It was

- 7 on, Norma?
- 8 FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: That is for
- 9 the totals. For some reason it didn't pick that up.
- 10 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Can you give me a
- 11 GF code?
- 12 FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: The GF code
- is WF68500. Welfare Fund Expense VA&R, page 7. The total

- 15 \$35,188.49. So your income less your expenses gives us

- 18 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Norma.
- 19 FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Yes, Madam
- 20 President.
- 21 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: To me, I don't
- 22 understand. We should never have an overage in VA&R. So
- 23 why do we have an overage in VA&R? I got totally lost
- 24 there.
- 25 FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Okay. I

1 guess apparently --2 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: What changed on 3 income? We never changed the income. 4 FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Well, let's see. We had decreased our gift shop/patient remembrance 5 6 and --7 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: To balance the in and out. 8 9 FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Yes, to 10 balance in and out. 11 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Now it doesn't 12 balance. - 17 request to read your final again.
- 18 FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: I'm sorry?
- 19 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: You have a
- 20 request to read the final amount again, the 36.
- 21 FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: For the
- 22 total on the VA&R, it's \$36,300 for income, and for
- 23 expense it's also \$36,300.
- 24 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: So line total
- 25 WF68500 now reads 36,300.

- 1 FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Yes, ma'am.
- Next the VA&R Fund Reserve are at \$78,734.50.
- 3 Our Welfare Fund/Children & Youth. Children & Youth
- 4 Donation/Unit Income: 7,000. Poppy Fund Distribution:
- 5 300. And the Welfare Fund/Children & Youth total is 7300.
- 6 Looking at the income, the administrative expense is
- 7 \$1,750. The TFA Welfare Cases: \$5,400. Chairman is
- 8 \$150. Balanced at 7,300.
- 9 And we have -- as of 3/31/2013 we -- actually,
- 10 that's not there. I was looking at the reserves for
- 11 Children & Youth: \$43,898.42. Well, it's actually
- 12 43,998.70 and it's on there according to the Ameritrade
- 13 statements, but in last year's audit we had \$43,898.42.
- 14 Not much of a difference. Yeah, we haven't made much at
- 15 all. The market is showing a depreciation in some of our
- 16 reserve accounts. Any questions?
- Going on with Education. Our Education
- 18 Donations/Income is \$17,500. Poppy 10 percent
- 19 Distribution is \$300. Income Restricted Funds is
- 20 \$2,025. Income Poppy Seals, 2,000, with a total of
- 21 \$11,825.
- 22 Going on to Education Expenses. Administration:
- 23 \$1,875. Our Scholarship General we did increase this to
- 24 10,000. Poppy Seals: \$1,000. Chairman: 150. And the
- 25 total is \$13,025, which brings us with more expenses due

- 1 to that increase in scholarships, but that's -- that gets
- 2 pulled out of reserves. So I'm just trying to say it's
- 3 not a big concern. Any negative number should be a big
- 4 concern but -- Past Presidents Parlay. Donations:
- 5 \$10,200. Poppy Fund Distribution: 300, with a total of
- 6 \$10,500.
- 7 Past Presidents Parlay Expenses. Administrative
- 8 Fee: \$1,625. Nurse Scholarships: \$8,275. \$100 for the
- 9 Chairman. And then our Welfare Fund for the PPP luncheon
- 10 awards: \$500, with a balance of \$10,500, total balance.
- And then going on to the summary of our welfare
- 12 programs. Summary of income: The Welfare Fund/VA&R:
- 13 \$36,300. Children & Youth: 7300. Education Income,
- 14 there's a change in this one; right, Kathie?
- 15 SENIOR FINANCE MEMBER MARTINEZ: Yes.
- 16 FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: So we have
- 17 11,825 for the Education Income and 10,500, so our total
- 18 comes to \$65,925. And the summary of the expenses, this
- 19 is where there was a change, a little bit of change in
- 20 that one.
- 21 SENIOR FINANCE MEMBER MARTINEZ: Yeah.
- 22 FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Okay. So
- 23 we're looking at the same \$36,300, 7300, 13,025, and
- \$10,500 with a total of -- total on the expenses for the
- 25 welfare accounts -- okay. Well, my total here for the

- 1 VA&R is still saying 35,188 and we changed -- that should
- 2 be changed because of the remembrance, the gift account.
- 3 It should be 36,300. That needs to be changed on the VA&R
- 4 summary of accounts on page 9, the very last page.
- 5 Because we want it to balance, those two accounts. So
- 6 you're looking at WF68500. Okay. That's your total,
- 7 67,125. And is there an over and under?
- 8 I'm not showing a deficit of \$1200 due to that
- 9 one account that we changed to the scholarships account to
- 10 10,000 that made us go into a deficit. Because originally
- 11 -- okay. That sounds good to me. Because we're in a
- 12 balanced budget and that's a good thing.
- Okay. Summary of Welfare Reserves. Veterans
- 14 Rehabilitation. We're looking at last year's audit
- 15 report, and that came up to 11 -- \$114,476.46. As of
- 16 Ameritrade, we've got was 78,734.50. Audit last year,
- 17 32,110.48. Ameritrade, 43,998.70. Last year's audit,
- 18 41,538.82. I'll have to repeat that. 43,898.42, and then
- 19 that was Past Presidents Parley, 55,577.30. And the
- 20 totals on the welfare reserves as of last year's audit:
- 21 232.024.18. And as of 3/31/13: 231,572.08. So there's
- 22 not that much of a loss.
- DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Okay. Wait.
- 24 Don't you dare do that, Ruby.
- Okay. Do you have the motion that I made in the

- 1 Finance Committee regarding the reserves and the
- 2 disbursements and that from the Finance Committee meeting?
- FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: We did make
- 4 a motion on that, did we not?
- 5 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Yes, we did and
- 6 it passed, and the reserved figures do not reflect the
- 7 motion.
- FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Okay.
- 9 Well, I move to amend that motion. Can I do that or no?
- 10 We can't amend that. I just --
- 11 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Okay. It was a
- 12 consensus of the committee. Okay. Ladies, I don't know
- if this is official or approved or whatever, but I'll give
- 14 you a little history because at the time I happened to be
- 15 on the Finance Committee.
- When I was on the Finance Committee, we didn't
- 17 have any way of tracking what was in the reserves. So we
- 18 took it kind of tongue and shoe, whatever you want to call
- 19 it, and disbursed the reserves as we felt that -- Anita is
- 20 covering her head up. Don't listen to me, Nancy.
- 21 So since that point in time it's been brought to
- 22 our attention that our reserve figures are not correct.
- 23 Education reserves should be \$41,538.82. VA&R allocation,
- 24 it should be \$114,476.46. Children & Youth reserves
- 25 should be \$32,110.48. Past Presidents Parlay should be

- 1 43,898.42. Oh, they've moved them over a column. Well,
- 2 Norma, you little rat.
- FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: I just
- 4 added my additional figures, so there wasn't nothing taken
- 5 away from what we motioned.
- 6 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Because the way
- 7 we had it disbursed before was incorrect. We were taking
- 8 money from VA&R and putting it in other programs.
- 9 FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Excuse me.
- 10 Madam President, I don't think it was incorrect.
- 11 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: I was on the
- 12 Finance Committee.
- 13 FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Well, I've
- 14 been on the Finance Committee for three years. I'm sorry.
- 15 You don't know my past two years' experience. I'm sorry
- 16 and I appreciate your input, but apparently that -- I
- 17 totally disagree, so I'm sorry. That's all I can say.
- 18 I'm sorry. So with that said --
- 19 PARLIAMENTARIAN KAPSALIS: Madam Department
- 20 President --
- 21 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Recognize Ruby
- 22 Kapsalis, Past Department President.
- 23 PARLIAMENTARIAN KAPSALIS: Our Department
- 24 President is not incorrect. This -- what happened was it
- 25 was before Norma got on the Finance Committee that I

- 1 believe that this occurred and the error was not brought
- 2 to the attention of the Finance Committee until this
- 3 session, so --
- 4 FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: You might
- 5 be more credible than I am, but I've been on this Finance
- 6 Committee for three years. I understand my commitment to
- 7 this committee and I respect your knowledge. I respect
- 8 you for what you have done in this past year, but I have
- 9 three years, so I totally understand. So I'm sorry if I
- 10 have to say that, but --
- 11 PARLIAMENTARIAN KAPSALIS: What we did is, Norma,
- 12 the Finance Chairman's figures on the Ameritrade are
- 13 correct from the Ameritrade account. What we did -- what
- 14 we did -- the motion that was made in the Finance
- 15 Committee was to adjust those figures to coincide with the
- 16 percentage that was reduced three years ago that should
- 17 not have been done. There was an injustice. The VA&R
- 18 went down. I can bring the figures if I can find them in
- 19 my book. I'd have to look for them.
- 20 But basically you'll see there's very little
- 21 difference between the Ameritrade and the middle column in
- 22 your budget. They're almost the same. There's a
- 23 difference of -- there's 232,024.18. That was the motion,
- 24 and so those figures would be what we would carry on in
- 25 those reserves for those programs in the future regardless

of what the Ameritrade account has. The Ameritrade --1 2 those are all -- that's one figure in the Ameritrade 3 account. Okay? And so the committee voted to 4 redistribute those funds back to where they should have been and never taken away from. 5 6 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: And that was the motion that was made in the Finance Committee and it was 7 8 passed. 9 SENIOR FINANCE MEMBER MARTINEZ: Okay. We got it 10 straightened out. 11 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Yes, ma'am. 12 SENIOR FINANCE MEMBER MARTINEZ: Okay. Now that 13 that's cleared up, Madam President, I move the adoption of 14 this budget as presented to the body. 15 PARLIAMENTARIAN KAPSALIS: Second. 16 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: It's been moved 17 and seconded to accept the budget as presented. Is there 18 any discussion? 19 (Applause.) 20 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: All those in 21 favor, say aye. 22 ALL PRESENT: Aye. 23 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Any opposed? 24 (No response.) 25 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Okav. You have a

- 1 budget, ladies. Thank you.
- 2 SENIOR FINANCE MEMBER MARTINEZ: And, Madam
- 3 President, at this time may we approach the station?
- 4 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: You certainly
- 5 may.
