Donna Mattox, District 25 was appointed secretary. Debbie Washburn, District 14 offered prayer, and Debbie Falkenberg, District 28 was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 26 district delegates answered roll call and we had four guests.

The Committee agreed upon the following. The code was read and there were no changes. It was reported that only 194 units and 25 districts provided year-end reports. Hopefully that will be 100 percent next year.

This year the special project for this program was Feed the Pig for the American Legion Child Welfare

Foundation. Off went the piggy banks for adventures throughout the state. We collected a total of \(\$ 1,974.99\) with the help of the piggy banks. This combined with other donations, \(\$ 5,451\), to Child Welfare Foundation for a hotel of \(\$ 7,425.99\). Well done units and districts. CHILDREN \& YOUTH CHAIRMAN TOZIER: She's the one that came up with the idea and she really beat the bushes out there in the high desert. That's for you.
(Applause.)
Thank you, Madam President, for the fun -- I didn't do anything. I liked to hear all notes and e-mails. And I apologize if I spammed you. If you got spammed, I'm sorry. I have a new e-mail address. But it was great hearing from you and having pictures. I forwarded them on to National, so thank you very much.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Thank you, Susie.
We'll now hear from National Security, Tami Bell.

NATIONAL SECURITY CHAIRMAN BELL: Good morning, Madam President.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Good morning, Tami.

NATIONAL SECURITY CHAIRMAN BELL: We did not have a typewriter, so the committee meeting report is very neatly handwritten.

The Convention Committee on National Security met Thursday, June 27th, 2013 in the Canyon Room D in Palm Springs, California. The statistical report of this chairman appears on page 19 of the Book of Reports.

Lillian Perez of District 29 was appointed secretary. Cindy Mayfield offered prayer, and Connie Raya of District 29 was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 22 district delegates answered roll call. There were six visitors present.

We're very easy in our committee that there were no code changes, there were no resolutions, and there were no recommendations.

Unfortunately we did not receive 100 percent reporting. Our second and third place and all of our certificates were given out in committee and the awards were posted in the office yesterday.

If I may, Madam President, go on with my
narrative.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: You may.
NATIONAL SECURITY CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you. The Department of California National Security Chairman has been working the Action Steps and Objectives from our National Plan of Work. This chairman wrote monthly or bimonthly bulletins with in-depth instructions and program ideas on how to implement the various objectives and activities to help each district and unit create a well-rounded National Security program.

One district chairman planned a yearlong program assigning each unit a different program, and by using the bulletin how-tos successfully managed to complete at least five National Security action steps.

We also devised an activity that worked under the POD program, giving some of our smaller units a way to complete some activities in their National Security program and also Children \& Youth, Membership, Publicity, and VA\&R.

We worked with our Legion Family to deliver a continuing response to the needs of our service members and their families. Many units adopted troop units, active duty families and responded to TAL Family support requests. Those units and districts serving active duty military bases cooked hundreds of holiday meals, acted as
elves assisting Santa in passing out presents, stuffed Easter baskets, and donated food, drinks, and games to many FRG morale parties.

One unit has two ladies who donate their time every Friday babysitting a three-year-old and a two-year-old of a full-time National Guard whose wife has stage 2 cancer so they may go to chemo treatments.

We have many units that sponsor baby showers for our expecting solders or wives of soldiers. One unit associated with Port Hueneme Base donated \(\$ 2,617.25\) to the new Baby Sea Bag Program. We have a unit who hosted one very difficult event, a baby shower for an expectant wife whose soldier was killed in Afghanistan.

We have babysat, helped -- that makes me cry. We have babysat, helped repaired vehicles, sent kids to camp and hosted military balls for those children whose soldier parents have repeatedly been deployed.

We have volunteered over 4,138 hours knitting, crocheting and sewing scarves, caps, and cooling neck wraps for our soldiers under Operation Comfort Warriors. The busy sewing bees of one unit made 987 cooling scarves that were sent to Afghanistan.

We have supported the National Security programs of the American Legion. Our members have participated in Citizen Corps, completing community emergency response
training. We have a unit that sent six ladies to become CERT trained, and then they went back to their unit and hosted a community-based teaching course on emergency preparedness.

One unit presented our Department President a how-to cooler filled with need-specific first aid items. One particular area of interest many units learned was how to take care of their pets in an emergency.

We have hosted many activities to support our Blue Star Mothers and pay homage to our Gold Star Mothers. A unit worked for four months with their Sons squadron to plan an afternoon with live entertainment, all proceeds of which went to their Blue Star Mothers group for sending troop packages overseas. We gave 64 certificates of appreciation to our Blue and Gold Star Mothers.

We have had 140 volunteers devoting 803 hours following the POW/MIA initiatives on the Internet, Facebook, and Twitter. We have supported ROTC and Junior ROTC, Young Marines and Junior Naval Cadets. We have hosted pizza party fundraisers for the Young Marines to travel to their competitions, and given 17 awards to local ROTC units for their exemplary conduct on behalf of grateful units of which they assisted in Auxiliary activities of patriotism and service.

We have participated in Department of Defense
programs that support our military and their families throughout an entire deployment. Many units participated in Yellow Ribbon programs, explaining the service and programs of the American Legion Auxiliary to deploying troops and their families and passing out membership applications and signing up new members also. One unit lined all the trees of their main street with yellow ribbons with the help of their juniors.

The Department of California participated in many welcome home events, providing refreshments, games to keep the kids occupied and raised welcome home banners made by our juniors. And, of course, joining in to give our own hugs and kisses as the soldiers deployed.

Our department has also the honor to solemnly bring home three heroes killed in Afghanistan, lining the airfield at attention with our Legion Family and Patriot Guard. And that's really hard to do. We have assisted with funerals and donated foods for services.

We have worked closely with our Department of California Family Readiness Groups and Operation Ready Family. We have been personally -- we have been personally selected by Lieutenant Colonel Lalley of the California National Guard to be the California National Guard and AUSA's go-to provider. We have a few Auxiliary members that have been presented by the Army National

Guard with certificates of commendation for their service to our troops and their families.

We were asked by the National Guard to provide the first ever children's military ball for the southern command of California, of which we gave a resounding, yes, we can do this. This event was a first in many areas of our organization. We worked together with the 19th, 23rd, 24th, and 29th districts of the Legion Family, together with the Mexican American Veterans Association and Orange County VFW to put on this event. Active duty National Guard from San Diego to Bakersfield made the trek to bring their families to this fun party.

There were some families whose soldiers had been deployed three and four times. One Sergeant Major had been deployed five times. One soldier had tears in his eyes thanking us for providing his family with such a fun evening.

We have sent thousands of care packages overseas, which included handwritten cards from local schools and scout troops thanking the troops for their service. This chairman has been honored to work closely with our units and district to provide our troops and their families ongoing compassion and care.

POPPY REPORT

POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: Good morning. The

Convention Committee on Poppies met on June 27th, 2013 in the Canyon Suite B of the Doral Resort, Palm Springs, California. Susan Baker was appointed secretary, Eleanor Bray offered prayer, and Lois Cornish was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 25 delegates answered roll call and there were nine visitors present.

The department code on Poppies was read, and after some lively and informative \(Q\) and \(A\), the committee agreed on the following report. By the way, all second and third place winners, 100 percent reporting certificates, and all of that was also given out in committee.

Code 5 now reads: "Poppy funds shall conform with American Legion and Auxiliary codes to include the rehabilitation of all veterans and their families, and to include hospitalized service personnel returning home and waiting to be discharged." This was in 1998.

Code 5 if adopted will now read: "Poppy funds shall conform with American Legion and Auxiliary codes to include the rehabilitation of all veterans and their families, and to include hospitalized service personnel returning home and waiting to be discharged and shall also include active military personnel and their families where financial and medical need is evident."

By direction of the committee \(I\) move for this
code change.
PARLIAMENTARIAN KAPSALIS: Second.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: It's been moved and seconded to change Code 5. Code 5 currently reads:
"Poppy funds shall conform with American Legion and
Auxiliary codes to include the rehabilitation of all veterans and their families, and to include hospitalized service personnel returning home and waiting to be discharged."

The recommended change is Code 5: "Poppy funds shall conform with American Legion and Auxiliary codes to include the rehabilitation of all veterans and their families, and to include hospitalized service personnel returning home and waiting to be discharged and shall also include active military personnel and their families where financial and medical need is evident."

Is there any discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Hearing none, all
those in favor say aye.
ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: So any opposed?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Passed.
POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: Thank you, ladies. Under
the contests, Code \(6(B)\) now reads: "Poppy monetary prices shall be awarded per the budget as follows: The poppy poster contest shall be awarded as follows: All categories will receive \(\$ 20\) for first place awards. Second and third place winners shall receive certificates. Categories are determined by National. Class I, Grades 2 and 3. Class II, Grades 4 and 5. Class III, Grades 6 and 7. Class IV, Grades 8 and 9. Class V, Grades 10 and 11. Class VI, Grade 12. Class VII, Students with Special Needs." This was in 2010.

This is more of a housekeeping change, ladies, so it's very, very slight. You might not even notice the change. If adopted Code \(6(\mathrm{~B})\) will now read: "Poppy monetary prices shall be awarded per the budget as follows: The poppy poster contest shall be awarded as follows: All categories will receive \(\$ 20\) for first place awards. The second and third place winners shall receive certificates. Categories are determined by National." And then it proceeds on with the classes. I don't think I need to read all of that.

By direction of the committee, I move for this code change.

PARLIAMENTARIAN KAPSALIS: Second.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: It's been moved and seconded to change the Poppy Code 6(B). Here we go.
"Poppy monetary prices shall be awarded per the budget as follows: The poppy poster contest shall be awarded as follows: All categories will receive \(\$ 20\) for first place awards. The second and third place winners shall receive certificates. Categories are determined by National."

It then goes to the classes and the grades. Is there any discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: All those in favor, say aye.

If adopted, Code 8 will now read: "A year-round poppy production is authorized at the California Veterans Home at Yountville, Chula Vista and WAVE Clinic San Diego and Long Beach VAMC to give veterans the opportunity to
participate in the therapeutic and incentive work programs without the pressures of a short-term production."

By direction of the committee, I move for this code change.

PARLIAMENTARIAN KAPSALIS: Second.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: It's been moved and seconded to change Code 8 , which currently reads: "A year-round poppy production is authorized at the California Veterans Home at Yountville, Chula Vista and WAVE Clinic San Diego and Long Beach VAMC to give veterans the opportunity to participate in the therapeutic and incentive work programs without the pressures of a short-term production."

Is there any discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Hearing none, all
those in favor say aye.
ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Any opposed?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Passed.
POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: Thank you, ladies.
(Applause.)
POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: This concludes my committee report. May I continue with my supplemental and

first place winners?
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: You may.
POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: Madam Department
President, I am going to make this short, sweet, and virtually painless as I know you have a lot to get to today.

First of all, I don't know if I want to thank you or shoot you for this appointment. In all seriousness though, being the first chairman to come in after a huge change like Poppy Week to Poppy Month definitely had its challenges. However, I felt that the Poppy Genies and Pixies could handle it. And handle it they did.

Units first decided to use up some of their leftover poppies from last year by using them in table decorations, corsages, Christmas wreaths, Veterans Day, Pearl Harbor Day, along with many other patriotic holiday observances. Members would give poppies to everyone in attendance, and if they didn't know about the poppy, our members were right there to educate them. Many wreaths made to lie on veteran grave sites during the year.

Speaking of educating, one district genie made a packet for each of the pixies in her district, giving them the poppy order form, poppy financial report form, unit end-of-year forms, poppy seal order form, poppy identification card holders, and the rules for all of the
various contests within the program. She also included the poppy story, the poem, "In Flanders Fields" and a copy of the department code. Now that is what I call a District Chairman/Genie going the extra mile.

Many units across the state sent letters to their members as well as post members along with a poppy and a copy of the Poppy Story asking for donations. This always seems to work well in raising money, but it doesn't always raise awareness because our members for the most part know the story.

So it was off to the storefronts our members went offering poppies to everyone that passed by. One unit with around 87 members ordered 11,000 poppies and raised over \(\$ 10,000\) for their unit. How did they do it you ask? (Applause.)

POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: Well, they recruit workers from outside the Auxiliary, asking area youth groups to help with distribution. This happened to be Terry's unit. Yes, Terry, you can take a bow on that one. (Applause.)

POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: Youth groups are always looking for volunteer activities and it's usually part of how they advance in their particular programs. So this is a good way to get help if you need it. This unit was able to recruit approximately 37 volunteers to help work their
magic. What a great idea.
Now for the nuts and bolts of the program. The units of California ordered 328,664 poppies and another 2,700 were ordered and paid for from other units in the Departments of Iowa, Vermont, and Oklahoma. We were happy to help these other departments as there has been a shortage of poppies this year.

Admittedly, there were some problems this year with poppy quality for a few units, but just to let the delegation know, this problem has been identified and a fix has been put into place so as to avoid any future problems.

A large number of our units chose to pay for their poppies in advance, although they have the option to pay after the poppies are distributed. As of June 11th, 2013 \$58,495 has been collected, of which 10 cents of every 18 cents goes directly to the veterans producing the poppies. I just talked to my dad on the phone and I have envelopes in my mailbox, so that number will probably go up.

Also as of June 11 th we also have \(\$ 8,307.96\) in the poppy distribution fund. However, I am still waiting patiently for those who have not yet turned in their financial report and I am hoping to see this number increase greatly as these funds are used to directly help
veterans and their families.
Please don't hold your check back. If you haven't sent it, please do so ASAP. Like I said, I already have more envelopes waiting for me when I get home, so I expect that number to change also.

This concludes my floor remarks. May I continue with my awards and the introduction of a very special guest?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: You may. Are you ready for the Sergeant-At-Arms and Marshal or which way do you want to go?

POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: I'll do my awards first, if that's okay.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Okay.
POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: At DEC we had a poppy -our poppy usage contest. The first place went to Deborah Driscoll of Unit 29, District 716.
(Applause.)
POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: For our poppy poster contest in Class III went to Daniela Hernandez. And she is from Unit 98, District 4.
(Applause.)
POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: The first place poppy poster winners get \(\$ 20\) too, so there's a check in there. Don't lose it.

First place poppy poster in Class VI went to Vanessa Garcia Ogden of Unit 598, District 28.
(Applause.)
POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: Our first place Unit Supplemental goes to Judith Urich, Unit 43, District 24.
(Applause.)
POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: Our first place District Supplemental. This was the first chairmanship at the district level that this chairman helped, so I just wanted to recognize that. She wrote a fantastic supplemental, and that was Tracy Varnell from District 16.
(Applause.)
POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: Happy birthday.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Will the
Sergeant-at-Arms and Marshal escort our very special guest, Rachel O'Brien.
(Processional.)
POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: Rachel is seven years old and loves working the poppy program. Rachel helped us distribute poppies to over 5,000 motorcycle riders at West Coast Thunder which is held on Memorial Day and she plans to go again. She also gave poppies to her neighbors, friends, and at her home Post, which is Carl R. Meairs Unit 289, District 21.
(Applause.)

POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: For all of these reasons and more, she has been chosen 2012-2013 Little Miss Poppy. (Applause.)

POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: And Rachel would like to say a few words.

LITTLE MISS POPPY O'BRIEN: Hello. My name is Rachel O'Brien. I am seven years old and a three-year Junior Auxiliary member in Riverside, California. I am going to be the second grade next year. I am excited about being Junior Miss Poppy. As Junior Miss Poppy of our unit, I've raised almost half of all the donations collected by our unit.
(Applause.)
LITTLE MISS POPPY O'BRIEN: I went to West Coast Thunder on Memorial Day at the Harley dealer. There were over 7,000 bikers there. I also collected donations for Poppies in my neighborhood and other fun events in our area. Besides my Memorial poppy activities, I like to help wherever I can. I do this because I care for our veterans.

I really like helping to serve that dinner on steak night when they are there. For Valentine's Day I made 65 Valentines and gave them to our vets.
(Applause.)
LITTLE MISS POPPY O'BRIEN: I like doing stuff
because I care about our veterans. Thank you to everyone who voted for me. I will be a great Junior Miss Poppy. (Applause.)

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Rachel, we have our National Poppy Chairman here in the room, Ms. Melanie Taylor, and she would like to have her picture taken with you. And she is our National Chairman. And I think Rachel has got some very proud family in the back of the room. Thank you for bringing Rachel.
(Applause.)
POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: While the pictures are being taken, I will say that concludes my report. Thank you.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Thank you Michelle, great job. Okay. While they're having a picture moment, next chairman up will be VA\&R, please.

Okay. We have a member in the room who is extremely allergic to oranges, even the aroma. Please do not eat oranges in this room. She can have a very strong reaction. So any of you ladies who have oranges, please don't eat them in this room or orange juice or whatever. Where is she sitting? Do you know?

VA\&R REPORT

VA\&R CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: Madam President, that's going to be very hard to go after that little speech.

The Convention Committee on VA\&R met on June 27th, 2013 in the Oleander Ballroom C at the Doral Hotel, Palm Springs. The statistical report of this chairman appears on page 21 of the Book of Reports.

Ellen McClure, District 14, was appointed secretary. Madeline Lee, District 16, offered prayer, and Connie Raya, District 28, was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 22 district delegates answered roll call and there were ten visitors.

The committee agreed upon the following report. The code was read and there were no code changes. Certificates for second and third place winners were presented. Unit donating 73 cents per capita for Gift Shop Patient Remembrance and 97 cents per capita or more
to the district -- I'm sorry -- Department VA\&R funds were in the packets, as well as district 100 percent reporting certificates. These went to 3, 4, 9, 11, 14, 18, 19, 20, \(23,24,25,27,28\).

There were no resolutions nor any recommendations. Prayer was recited. With no further business, the meeting adjourned at 11:00 a.m.

May I go on with my supplement?
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: You may.
VA\&R CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: Thank you. Good morning The Wiz, Madam President.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Good morning.
VA\&R CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: Your motto of "Veterans, our biggest treasures" did not fall on deaf ears. The Veterans Affairs and Rehabilitation Heralders, District Chairman, and Elves, hospital representatives, and deputies took this to heart.

All units and districts report holiday parties, bingo, bunco, and poker tournaments that directly are for our veterans. Whether they are at Veterans Administration Medical Centers, California veterans homes, or the local nursing facilities, veterans are treated to all kinds of fun activities, not to mention homemade cakes, cookies, and other delectables.

Speaking of home service, many hours were spent
by Auxiliary members on quilts, lap robes, and other handmade items enjoyed by our veterans. Sometimes the facility needs them but the provider is several hours away. Arrangements were made to connect the donor and the facility.

Fort Miley is an example of this. Amador Unit 108 has an avid crocheter. At the Gustine workshop Owedia Dupress, the chief of voluntary services, received several large bags of lap robes from the Unit 108 members, and the relationship bloomed.

Field service volunteers are ready at the call to take a veteran to doctors' appointments, clean and decorate a veteran cemetery, and help a veteran in any way. During the holidays, shut-ins are provided food and presents. In nursing homes, veterans are treated to hats and scarves, lap robes, and other treats.

In conjunction with Leadership Chairman, many members have taken field service orientation courses and are now able to obtain their field service pins. It is suggested the units honor these hardworking individuals by getting the pins from Department.

Donations to Department are a little sluggish; however, we need to be reminded of the importance of doing so. Out of this money is a very important program of Temporary Financial Assistance. On the department level,

12 veterans applied and received money. The needs were for everything from phone bills, rent, storage, and other necessities. Many of these veterans were getting into housing after being homeless, so it was an honor for this chairman to be able to help with this transition.

One great story was from Unit 419, District 13. A veteran and his wife were riding the bus all night to stay warm. A unit member requested money to help them out. While paying the storage bill the unit member made the comment, "The next step is finding you a job." The storage manager hired the veteran on the spot.

Since that comment worked so well, she mentioned housing, and once again the storage manager had an apartment complex. Since he knew what he was paying the veteran, he made the apartment affordable. In one swoop the veteran had a job, housing, and he didn't need his storage anymore. This is an example of you never know what you will say and to whom that will make a huge difference.

Units have also reported helping veterans out with monetary donations for their bills. Any unit can submit Temporary Financial Assistance; however, all local assistance should be exhausted before applications for TFA are submitted to the department chairman. There are many organizations and agencies that can help, so it is a good
idea for unit members to be aware of what is available in their particular area.

It has been brought to my attention, units realize the importance of TFAs and want to make a donation directly to this fund. The budget for TFA is based upon donations received to the department VA\&R Fund. So please be generous as there are a lot of veterans and families out there that can use our help.

There seems to be a special place in our hearts for female veterans. The District 24 held baby showers and donated baskets of goodies for the moms-to-be. District 15 also helped a female veteran in transition housing with baby items right before she delivered her baby .

District 29 reports the "Renew" program at the Long Beach VAMC which is for women who experienced sexual trauma while in the military. Most of these women are or have been homeless, and once a month they host a theme party. One such party was an application of makeup for job interviews, while another were yoga classes for stress relief.

There were many terrific projects the Auxiliary members afforded, especially when it comes to therapeutic activities. We are all aware of many of our new veterans' mental health such as posttraumatic stress disorder and
traumatic brain injury. District 28 reports supporting 150 veterans attending a fishing derby sponsored by Monterey Bay Incorporated and Ride 2 Recovery. While District 16 also reports \(R 2 R\) plus AmpSurfs, a sailing and surfing program.

Unit 755, District 18 reports supporting Freedom Dogs, an organization that has trained dogs to assist more than 100 -- more than one veteran and can do multiple tasks. Another project is the equine programs. District 25 reports the "Equine Assisted Learning and Therapy For Veterans With PTSD." This is sponsored through Equus Medendi.

There are similar programs. HOPE in Ojai and Healing Horses and Armed Forces in Tehachapi. While looking up these various programs, I saw grant money is available for this project, so maybe there will be more of them popping up around the state.

Our homeless veterans are taken care of as best we can. Stand Downs are the most common denominator to find, reach out, and help these veterans. Many districts report participation, and there are a few worth mentioning. District 16 covers three counties and each county has a Stand Down. Unit participation is reported. Also mentioned were three Stand Downs in the 29th District, one being for females only. Units donate
toiletries, clothing, and time. They, along with the Legion Family, will cook meals and plan and prepare for the event.

Again, due to federal grant money, funding is available for homeless programs and housing. The plan is to never have the words "homeless" and "veteran" in the same sentence.

Our junior members report participation in the AV\&R program. While at Junior Conference the younger juniors made thank you cards which were passed out at the Santa Maria Clinic. Also, the older girls tied knots on scarves made of fleece. While there the girls were asked what they pictured in their mind of a veteran. Most of them said their parent or grandparent.

We were fortunate to be able to introduce a pretty 23-year-old female and another woman counselor. They asked questions and learned about volunteer opportunities that existed for them.

While reading reports, this chairman had a few great idea moments. District 5 reports collecting items from hotels such as lamps, radios, pillows, toiletries and bed linens.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Am I in the right place?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Now we know why
they're screwed to the desk. District 5, Melanie, I don't believe you were capable of this.

VA\&R CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: I had to ask for them. They collected them.

NATIONAL POPPY CHAIRMAN TAYLOR: This was an honest acquisition.

VA\&R CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: I thought it was a good idea because we all collect the toiletries which we do take, but to get radios and lamps and -- okay.

Toiletries and bed linens which were distributed to Pathway House in Yountville and Fort Miley VAMC in San Francisco. The point of that is we should probably ask first.

They also connected with the HUD VASH social worker and donated household items and furniture to eight previously homeless veterans. District 20, Unit 348 had a car wash for veterans at the Pete Knight Veterans Home in Lancaster. Free to the veterans, juniors, and seniors alike along with a Youth Soccer Team washed 18 residents' cars.

District 27 reports during their POW/MIA program, pieces of paper were passed out to the audience and each person rose and read the information about that particular POW/MIA.

District 25, Unit 466 reports supporting the Life

Community Development Homeless Women's Veteran's Home in Adelanto.

Our elves report the many activities they participate in at their facility. Our Gift Shop Patient Remembrance money gets used up quickly. Elves report using it for holiday decorations, active wear clothing, movie tickets, socks, calendars, and the list goes on. Several also report supporting bingo and other parties in the Community Living Centers, being the concierge, providing coffee for the waiting veterans, and having on-hand ditty bags filled with personal hygiene items.

And because there is still time in the day and money in our coffers, units donate time and money to: Fisher House, Creative Arts both on the national and local level, Wounded Warrior Project. And on the local level, cemeteries and other projects that directly benefit the veteran.

Our magical, mystical fantasy of making a difference in the lives of our veterans is clearly shown by our hardworking members throughout the Department of California.

Madam President, it was an honor and learning experience to be your VA\&R chairman for this year. Thank you.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Okay. Ladies, please take your chairs. Ladies, we are now reconvened. Will R2-D2 and C3-PO along with Chubacca please bring in the Sons Commander of the Department of California Chris Affolter and the National Sons Commander Christopher Huntzinger.
(Processional.)

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Chris Affolter is not here.

NATIONAL SONS COMMITTEEMAN MEJIA: Well, first let me say hello, ladies. Hello to all of you. Are you having a good time? So are we. I'm glad to be here. This is an amazing event. I can't believe so many women in one room. Wow, wow. We have one of those stories we walked in and we had to wait a little bit because there weren't enough bathrooms, so a lot of women were using the men's stall.

Before I forget, I know some of you here, but my name is John Mejia. I'm our National Executive Committeeman for the Sons of the American Legion. My post is Post 155. A big hello to all of you. It's my pleasure to be here today to thank you for inviting us today. It's my honor to introduce to all of you Chris Huntzinger, our National Commander for The Sons of the American Legion who hails from Pittsburgh.
(Applause.)
NATIONAL SONS COMMITTEEMAN MEJIA: I would like for you to come forward and say a few words.
(Applause.)
NATIONAL SONS COMMANDER HUNTZINGER: Thank you. Thank you very, very much. President Terry, members of the American Legion Auxiliary, members of the American

Legion Family here gathered this morning, and ladies and gentlemen, it is a good morning and thank you for the invitation to participate and bring a few greetings on behalf of the 353,000 members of the Sons of the American Legion.
(Applause.)
NATIONAL SONS COMMANDER HUNTZINGER: My name is Chris Huntzinger and I do hail from Harrisburg, Pennsylvania. I've been a member of the Sons of the American Legion, a charter member of Penbrook Squadron 730 in Harrisburg since 1990. And I have my eligibility through my dad, Paul Huntzinger, who is a Korean War Veteran. My father, thank the Lord, is still living at age 81, and my grandfather Paul, or Philip, J. Huntzinger, Sr. who was a United States Army veteran and was in the service in the Army stationed at the Carlisle barracks outside of Harrisburg when the Japanese bombed Pearl Harbor in December of 1941. He's a career man like my grandfather, Philip James Huntzinger. So I have my eligibility from both.
(Applause.)
NATIONAL SONS COMMANDER HUNTZINGER: Thank you.
I would like to thank all the veterans that are in the house also this morning because we appreciate the sacrifices that you made when you gave your years in
serving our great nation in our Armed Forces. And thank you, veterans, who are here today for your service in the American Legion so that we can be here.
(Applause.)
NATIONAL SONS COMMANDER HUNTZINGER: You know, when I went to my father years ago and I wanted to become a member, we started Penbrook Squadron 730 Sons of the American Legion, and I needed my dad to join the American Legion because he wasn't a member.

And I went to Dad and I explained what I wanted to do, and he said, "Son, I'll join the organization. I'll do what you want." And I said, "Dad, you've been eligible to be a member of the American Legion for decades, why didn't you join?"

And Dad said, "Well, son, I didn't know much about the organization." He said, "I was never asked." And you get that many times over the years. I never forgot that. And I know the American Legion -- I see some heads nodding that you've had that in the American Legion Auxiliary. Just ask. I know the American Legion; years ago I wanted to make that a focal point of our campaign on the SAL membership bandwagon this year as we head into Houston to get that 105 percent. Because I really do because that "just ask" works. If you ask a potential member of the organization to join the American Legion

Family, nine times out of ten they say they will. But, you know, educate them, they will then return. They will continue their membership. Ask them to join, educate them, and they will stay. And I really believe that's true because education plus communication instills the motivation, and that equals success in really everything we want to do.

President Terry, congratulations on the project that you've had this year, Operation Comfort, I believe, and thank you for what you're doing on that. To help families of veterans of our warriors returning home today from around the nation, Iraq and Afghanistan, from the war.

And my project this year was the Fisher House Foundation. So it's sort of also in the same ballpark when you think about that.
(Applause.)
NATIONAL SONS COMMANDER HUNTZINGER: I met a United States Marine Corps veteran of the Vietnam War who was housed at the Denver Fisher House a few months ago when I was in the detachment in Colorado. And I went to Fisher House that morning and Jim, who had been getting chemotherapy and radiation for six weeks, he had a strong handshake. And his wife Janet said, "Commander, he didn't have that strong a handshake six weeks ago."

Well, Jim looked at me and he said, "Commander, the chemotherapy and the radiation, they are working. It's making me stronger, it really is." And he says, "I think I can beat this cancer." And he says, "But the Fisher House has given me the will to live." And I never forgot that. And I know that any projects that we do for veterans is going to benefit them with whatever we do with the American Legion Family.

And, you know, your Sons here, you can be proud of them for what they've done. They donate to the Fisher House. They also donated over \(\$ 18,000\) this year to the American Legion Child Welfare Foundation and across the nation this year, \(\$ 453,599\), your Sons of the American Legion donated to CWF. And I don't know if you know this --
(Applause.)
NATIONAL SONS COMMANDER HUNTZINGER: -- but
probably this time of year when we start our 2013-2014 year, we will donate as the Sons of the American Legion over \(\$ 6\) million to CWF.
(Applause.)
NATIONAL SONS COMMANDER HUNTZINGER: Thank you for your support on that. They also here with the Sons, they also have a new motorized Wheelchair For Veterans program that's very costly, but they're asking for
donations from the Sons to be able to give back to that project for our veterans in wheelchairs that need the help. And it's fantastic in what they do.

One of the Squadrons Post 328 has the food bank and also Riverside, California that do this and they help some of the area of San Bernardino in Los Angeles. And you know something, that food bank that the Sons supports, they feed and they help with eight million -- I'm sorry. Eight million dinners, eight million meals a year -(Applause.) NATIONAL SONS COMMANDER HUNTZINGER: -- to help those in need. But I've taken up enough of your time and I've seen from the crowds here, I knew -- and you have a great house there, it's a packed house for the American Legion Auxiliary Department of California is fantastic. And I always knew that I was surrounded by royalty, but now with the crowns I really know I'm surrounded by royalty.

But thank you, ladies, so much for your hospitality. I appreciate you. God bless you all and god bless our men and women serving our nation and God bless our United States of the America. Thank you again.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: And to the American Legion Foundation this year. Thank you very
much. Thank you, sir.
NATIONAL SONS COMMANDER HUNTZINGER: I appreciate it.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Thank you. Thank you, gentlemen.
(Processional.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: The doors will be closed so we can start our election process. The delegates should be seated with their districts. Session will come to order.

Please remember that only delegates and alternates taking the place of the delegates will be allowed in the room during the election.

Will the Sergeant-at-Arms and Marshal please see that everyone that's in the lobby knows that the doors are being closed for the election process, and if they want to come in, please do so immediately. Check in your badges and close the doors. No one will be permitted to enter or leave except in an emergency until the Chair states that elections are concluded.

We will now have the report of the Elections Chairman Kathy Harris-Richardson followed by the reading of the election rules. Will the district presidents please proceed to the microphones and line up numerically. District presidents line up numerically. Go ahead, Kathy. ELECTIONS REPORT

ELECTIONS CHAIRMAN HARRIS-RICHARDSON: Madam Department President, good afternoon everyone. Madam Department President, the convention committee on Elections met at 11:00 a.m. on Thursday, June 27th, 2013 in the Canyon Suite C of the Doral Desert Princess Resort, Palm Springs, California. There is no statistical report for this chairmanship.

Vergie Goffney, District 22, was appointed secretary. Denise Coleman, District 23, was appointed chaplain and she offered prayer. JoAnne Adams, District 19, was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. And she did a very good job with people coming in and out. A total of 18 delegates answered roll call. There were four visitors present.

Each delegate received a copy of the 2013 convention rules. The election rules were read and discussed. There were no code changes, no resolutions, and no recommendations, but we did have a lively discussion. The meeting adjourned at 11:50 a.m.

Madam Department President Terry, I truly, truly, after you ran me down and sprinkled a little fairy dust on me, I want to thank you for this appointment. It has been
my honor serving as your elections chairman. This concludes my committee report and I move for its acceptance.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Thank you, Kathy.
By your applause, you have accepted Kathy's report.
ELECTIONS CHAIRMAN HARRIS-RICHARDSON: And may I proceed to the reading of the election rules.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Please.
ELECTIONS CHAIRMAN HARRIS-RICHARDSON: Okay. These rules will be found in the Book of Reports on page 12, convention rules numbers 25 through 33. Everybody ready.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Yes, ma'am.
ELECTIONS CHAIRMAN HARRIS-RICHARDSON: Okay. Yes, ma'am. So old.

READING OF ELECTION RULES

ELECTIONS CHAIRMAN HARRIS-RICHARDSON: Election of department officers, junior member of finance, national candidate, department delegates, and alternates to the National Convention shall be held on Saturday morning, June 28th, 2013.

Number 26: The doors of the convention hall
shall be closed during the entire election procedure and no one shall leave or enter the hall until the Chair states that the election is concluded. The exception to this shall be that in an emergency a member may leave, and if her absence affects the voting strength, the district president shall immediately notify the presiding officer.

Number 27: When there is but one nominee for all department offices and but one nominee for junior member of finance, the nominees shall be elected viva voce. Article V, Section 3, Department Constitution. Upon roll call, the district presidents shall report the number of units partially or wholly represented by duly elected delegates or alternates present in the delegation at the time of roll call. This is to determine that there is a quorum of units present at the time of the election.

Number 28: When there is more than one nominee for the department offices or junior member of finance or national office, election shall be by written ballot. The district president shall, when they are instructed by the Chair, take a roll call of their respective delegations to ascertain the total voting strength of their district for the election, reporting the same to the Chair. When there is but one nominee for office or junior member of finance, the ballot may be dispensed with a nominee elected viva voce.

Number 29: When there are three or more nominees for an office or a junior member of finance, unless one nominee receives a majority vote on the first ballot, the nominee receiving the lowest number of votes shall be automatically dropped before proceeding with the next ballot.

Number 30: Each district president and district member of the elections committee shall distribute and collect the votes cast by the district delegation and deliver them to the department chairman of the elections.

Thirty-one: Department officers, chairmen, committee members, and past department presidents shall vote with their respective districts.

Number 32: Each delegate shall be entitled to one vote. The vote of an absent unit delegate, not represented by an alternate, shall be cast by the majority of the delegates from the unit. When two delegates represent three votes, the chairman of the unit delegation shall cast the third vote.

Number 33: A majority of all votes cast shall elect, except that in the election of the national delegates and alternates a plurality shall elect.

Number 34: These convention rules may be amended during the convention by a two-thirds vote.

Number 35: Roberts Rules of Order, newly
revised, shall be the parliamentary authority on all points not covered by these rules. The department constitution and bylaws and convention mandates.

This concludes the reading of the rules. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Thank you, Kathy. ELECTIONS CHAIRMAN HARRIS-RICHARDSON: May I be seated?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Yes, you may. Thank you. You know, I've known Kathy for years and she's been my good buddy. And when I needed an elections person, you know, the fairy dust went down the phone line and she answered.

Okay. The secretary will call the roll call of districts. Thank you, Peggy. We will now proceed.

SECRETARY/TREASURER VOGELE: District 1 -- pardon me. District 1.

AUXILIARY EMERGENCY FUND REPORT

AUXILIARY EMERGENCY FUND CHAIRMAN MORENO: Thank you, Madam Great Wiz. The Convention Committee on Auxiliary Emergency Fund met on June 27th, 2013 in Canyon A of the Doral in Palm Springs.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Diane, can I interrupt you for a second? Do you have the copies of the report to pass out?

AUXILIARY EMERGENCY FUND CHAIRMAN MORENO: Oh, I do. Sorry.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Sorry about that, lady. You can start over, Diana.

AUXILIARY EMERGENCY FUND CHAIRMAN MORENO: I'm rewinding. It's a magical rewind.

The Auxiliary Emergency Fund Committee met on June 27, 2013 in the Canyon A Room of the Doral Hotel in Palm Springs, California. The statistical report of the chairman -- of this chairman appears on page 13 of the Book of Reports.

Donna Lennox was appointed secretary. Barbara Rosen offered prayer, and JoAnn Adams was appointed

Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 16 districts answered roll call. There were three visitors present. The committee agreed on the following report: The code was read and no changes were recommended. Cheers.
(Applause.)
AUXILIARY EMERGENCY FUND CHAIRMAN MORENO: And, again, no resolutions or recommendations were submitted for consideration.
(Applause.)
AUXILIARY EMERGENCY FUND CHAIRMAN MORENO:
Department certificates of appreciation were presented to units and individuals donating \(\$ 100\) or more to the Auxiliary Emergency Fund. National certificates of appreciation were presented to individuals donating \(\$ 50\) or more. National AEF pins will be forwarded as soon as Peggy finds them in the boxes at the department office.

Second and third place certificates for Best Unit and District Supplementals were presented.

Great Wiz, this concludes my statistical report.
May I continue with my supplemental?
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: You may.
AUXILIARY EMERGENCY FUND CHAIRMAN MORENO: Thank you. In a nation experiencing high unemployment rates and unmerciful onslaught of extreme weather and catastrophic events, it is evident that if we are to continue to offer
emergency assistance to members who give so much of themselves to veterans, the military and their families, children, youth and the community, we must inspire units to increase donations to the Auxiliary Emergency Fund -- I lost my place -- and provide direct aid to our own members.

In the spirit of the Great Wiz Terry's theme, this Fairy Godmother challenged her Playful Pixies to sprinkle Pixie Dust upon their units and districts to magically encourage them to hold mystical fundraisers for the Auxiliary Emergency Fund. And the wondrous Pixies did just that.

Twenty units held fundraisers in a myriad of magical ways that netted a total of \(\$ 3,539.42\) in donations. Some unit Pixies circulated donation cans, a treasure box, a Fairy bank, penny banks, and even a mystical See's Candy jar filled with surprises that made it fun for members to support this important fund.

Other units held opportunity drawings for dozens of free-range eggs, baskets and candy. While some held AEF breakfasts, fish fries, and a Mexican dinner. One clever Pixie's members played a Count Your Blessings game and one unit collected fines from members caught not wearing their Auxiliary badge. While another unit fined members for phones ringing during a meeting. And the
wondrously talented juniors of another unit offered handmade jewelry for donations at both unit and district meetings and functions.

Five district chairmen raised \(\$ 1,111\), three by passing donation cans at meetings, a Pixie purse, a whimsical hat, and a treasure chest, and two held monthly opportunity drawings.

114 units sent a total of \(\$ 5,154.75\) to the National Auxiliary Emergency Fund, well exceeding last year's donations. Donations to AEF are budgeted line items of 91 units, with 16 units increasing their donations and eight increasing their -- decreasing their donations due to difficult economic times that even their chairman's Pixie Dust could not overcome.

An amazing \(\$ 12,920\) by units and \(\$ 325\) by districts was directly provided to their own members who had suffered catastrophic losses. Inspiring stories of the units and districts helping members included paying bills for two members suffering from terminal cancer and gifting one member's costs to attend her father's funeral after first losing her job and shortly after her father.

Beautiful stories of selflessness included providing Thanksgiving dinner, Christmas gifts and dues paid for a member and her Legionnaire husband who provided a home for a troubled teenager, despite the fact that they
were both out of work. A unit and district temporarily helped pay some of the bills of a retired member who lost her school crossing guard job after going blind in both eyes due to cancer, and members of a unit that took turns sitting with the member's gravely ill husband so she could attend meetings.

For this Fairy Godmother, the most inspiring fundraiser was held shortly after Hurricane Sandy hit the east coast. During a unit AEF meeting an AEF Pixie whose unit donated \(\$ 200\) didn't stop there. She asked for personal donations and received another \(\$ 700\) from her unit's president who matched the -- this was added a little bit later. Who matched the monies that were donated out of their entertainment room following the meeting. She went out and just asked for personal donations, and then their president matched those funds, ultimately raising \(\$ 1,600\). And this is in the span of like a half an hour.

The unit sent the entire \(\$ 1,600\) directly to a sister unit in Staten Island where the monies were distributed to unit members most affected by the hurricane's devastation. A lesson we can learn is that sometimes the simplest fundraisers, asking for donations without the prizes we have grown so used to giving and receiving is sometimes the most fruitful due to mankind's
inherent eagerness to help others.
In addition to holding fundraisers, 141 unit chairmen actively enlightened members about the Auxiliary Emergency Fund and 67 handed out AEF brochures resulting in 21 units submitting applications to National, 19 for Emergency Assistance and two for Education Assistance.

In conclusion, this humble former Pixie, now a Fairy Godmother, would like to thank the Great Wiz Terry for appointing me to the exalted position of Fairy Godmother of the Playful Pixies. Do we have any Playful Pixies here? Raise your hands.

AUXILIARY EMERGENCY FUND CHAIRMAN MORENO:
Hopefully you are as proud as I am of the magic created by the Playful Pixies who inspired their units and districts to so generously support the Auxiliary Emergency Fund and their own members in need this past year. May their efforts continue in the years to come, even without the magical, mystical Pixie Dust of this year's Playful Pixies.

Roberta Stephens, Unit 184, was appointed secretary. Kim Thompson offered prayer, and Oretha Calloway, Unit 710, was appointed Sergeant-At-Arms. A total of 11 district delegates answered roll call. There were three visitors present.

The committee agreed on the following report. The code was read. No changes were made and there were no resolutions.

Recommendations: Unit 419, District 13, Cindy Newman suggested coordination between unit and district chairmen while working projects so as to not duplicate efforts. Cindy also suggested each unit go to buildasign.com for a free 3-by-5 banner that can be used during the four major holidays. Just make sure you obtain all permissions from the city if you're placing the banner on any city property.

Unit 69, District 28, Sandy Green provided an example of how to get the word out to our communities on activities supporting our veterans. They planted flowers
to remember POW/MIA's during Memorial Day. Unit 69 maintains the flower displays, which are red, white, and blue, year-round. This has brought many questions to them about American Legion Auxiliary and our programs.

Unit 319, District 18 suggested American Legion Auxiliary members not be afraid to use technology to our advantage. If you are not sure how to use Facebook, ask your children or grandchildren for their support.

Second place District Award was presented with gift to District Karen Bobren, Chairman. Second place Unit Award with gift was presented to Unit 324 , Evelyn T. Rodriguez, Chairman. And third place Unit Award was presented to Unit 314, Jean A. Cooley-Desmeules during the committee meeting.

PUBLIC RELATIONS CHAIRMAN CANNON: Madam
President, your Public Relations Heralds have been working hard to ensure their networks are established allowing advancements of American Legion Auxiliary programs. American Legion Auxiliary members have been working in their communities supporting our military, their families, veterans, and the underprivileged. How do we do this? By keeping informed about the American Legion and the

American Legion Auxiliary.
There are 416 subscriptions to e-news, a great way to keep up with events and special information. Our generous ALA members have purchased 184 gift subscriptions, an ideal way to ensure others are provided with ALA information.

We are writing and submitting newspaper articles on our activities to a tune of 461 with 431 actual published articles. We are writing to our local editors making our opinions heard by submitting 64 letters with 35 published.

To keep ALA and our benefactors in the public eye, we submitted 97 letters of appreciation and sent them to our local newspapers, a great way to promote ALA programs and say at the same time thank you to those that support us. And the best part, it's cost free to the unit.

We have been on TV 50 times, had 252 radio announcements, and were seen on local cable TV 34 times, each and every time promoting ALA programs and getting the word out about other military, their families, and our veterans.

And as we gain experience with telecommunications more units are using social media. Currently we have 34 units with a website and 42 share with their posts. Even
districts are getting involved. Four have their own website. We have 35 units with Facebook pages, but 337 ALA members with personal Facebook pages all supporting our programs. With a quick click of a mouse, an individual can share information which is magically sent to more people, another cost-free method to ensure accurate information is available to all unit members and our Facebook friends.

We are communicating with each other in all the normal ways: telephone, word of mouth, unit meetings, district meetings, e-mail, newsletters, Facebook, and even Twitter. We are writing to ALA members, city leaders, state and federal representatives on veterans concerns, asking for support, and requesting attendance at local functions.

I want to thank all the unit and district heralds that submitted end-of-year reports and a supplemental report. It was not only a pleasure, but also a learning reading all that our units have done this year.

LuAnn Capazzi, District 27, was appointed Secretary. Narsis Williams, District 21, offered prayer, and Jeri Adams, District 16, was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 19 districts answered roll call. There were five visitors present.

The committee agreed on the following report: The code was read and the following changes were presented. Number 4 as it now reads: "Newly appointed Department Chairman will count the number of white cards remaining from the previous year. She shall request additional cards to equal 50. She shall request cards when her supply is low. When lists are received she will complete the cards and forward to the Department President for signature. She shall request the Department Office to order 50 blue cards with the new National President's signature as soon as possible."

The proposed change would be: "Newly appointed Department Chairman will count the number of white cards remaining from the previous year. She shall request
additional cards to equal 50. She shall request cards when her supply is low. When lists are received she will complete the cards and forward to the Department President for signature."

By direction of the committee, I move the acceptance of this change.

With no further business the meeting was adjourned at 9:55 a.m. Diane DeLashmit, Leadership Chairman.

Madam President, may I continue with my supplemental?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: You may.
LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN DeLASHMIT: Madam Wizard Terry, this year was very challenging, exciting, and rewarding for this Fairy Godmother. Special emphasis was placed on taking the correspondence course. The course was taken by 70 members. Not all passed. Some members took the course as many as three times before passing. Some district chairmen had workshops that focused on the course. There were three junior members that passed the junior correspondence course. There is a lot of valuable
material included in this course that can be utilized for the senior membership as well.

This year districts in our vast kingdom were encouraged to hold a Department School of Instruction, a leadership workshop, in their area and to invite surrounding districts to attend. The intent was to offer opportunities in villages where there had not been any training for some time. Response was received from five districts from the San Francisco Bay Area to the Mexican border.

Attendance varied from 16 to 35 present, however, it was worth the effort since there were a total of 125 attendees, including 14 new members, and 36 first timers.

Working with Linda Hayes, the Junior Activities Chairman, a workshop for junior members was held with 16 attending and five districts represented. There were many senior members present also that helped facilitate the program.

At each workshop certified instructors were assigned portions of the program to facilitate. Many mediums were used in the presentations which offered a lot of versatility and dynamics. Those in attendance were encourage to participate in skits, question and answer quizzes and other fun ways of learning. Hands-on demonstrations were provided for proper presentation of

Colors, escorting of guests, poppy making, and much more. Handouts were provided for each attendee. Many subjects were presented; however there was much in which there just wasn't enough time.

Districts reported 22 new leadership activities developed in the units and districts. Some were new member packets that contained information regarding preamble, emblem, acronyms, Constitution \& Bylaws, standing rules, flag etiquette, poppy stories, and contact information, et cetera. Some units appointed co-chairmen to learn the various programs. The correspondence course was initiated in some. Public speaking experience was offered in one unit. Unique ways of presenting the program was a big hit in another unit.

A mentoring program was reported by 70 units. The big sister idea was used at two units. The name of a seasoned member was given to newer members to contact for questions and information in another. Many liked the one-on-one concept. There were many old ideas that were used for the first time in some units and districts.

Some districts mentoring new units or -- let's see. Some districts maintain new units -- or mentoring new units or those having difficulty, by attending each of their meetings for a year to be a resource person. Depending on how the unit is doing, the mentor from then
on only attends occasionally.
All in all, leadership was offered to a vast amount of members; however, as is always the case, those that need it the most do not avail themselves of the opportunity. It is encouraging that many of our seasoned members continue to learn more and more about our organization.

And now for the awards. Our first place Best Unit Supplemental goes to Madeline Lee, Camarillo Unit 741.

LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN DeLASHMIT: I will leave you with this quote: "True leadership must be for the benefit of the followers, not the enrichment of the leaders." From Robert Townsend.

Madam Wizard, this concludes my report.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Thank you, Diane, you wise old owl.

LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN DeLASHMIT: Oh, and I forgot about this. Excuse me.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Before we hear from our Convention Commission, we are going to have a quick Membership update report from our Leprechaun Danielle. It will be very short and sweet.

MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WHITE: Short and sweet is the word. Okay. We started with 572 members that we needed to renew. Ladies, first of all, we collected \(\$ 2,213\) with you guys. And last night from the Legion we collected another 300. So we collected \(\$ 2,539\).
(Applause.)
MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WHITE: That's remarkable. As of now we have paid for 449 members. You can applaud yourself because --

MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WHITE: But importantly we still have 124 seniors to renew. We have taken care of all the seniors at each district and unit, so it took us all morning to do that. This afternoon we're going to take care of all the juniors, except for District 13 that doesn't want them paid. So we will have to get about 124 senior members. But I know you guys. It's getting so close, so close.

So what I'm going to ask you is see if you can be
giving for one more senior and we will make it for sure. So that's up to you now, the last drop. But we are ready with a very big smile to see if we can make it. And if we do, you will know by tomorrow morning. Thank you, ladies.

GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN ENRIGHT: Yes. District 18, Unit 755 is giving -- okay. I'm sorry; I can't read. 247 is giving you a check for one senior, five juniors from their unit.

GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN ENRIGHT: And we have one other senior from the district.

MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WHITE: Madam President, I have forgotten -- if I may excuse myself, I have forgotten to thank you for this Membership assignment. I'm not sure if I want to say thank you, but let me tell you it was challenging and the work with Madam President was a delight. Thank you.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Thank you, Danielle.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Now our little
leprechaun will be in the back of the room and if you are able to once again contribute so that we can get these
about 120 members paid, it would help. You can go together to come up with the \(\$ 17\) per capita. So see the little leprechaun in the back of the room. Thank you, ladies, very, very much.

Now we are going to have our Convention Commission Linda Caples, and we have Mr. Jim Leyser from the American Legion Convention Commission.

CONVENTION COMMISSION REPORT

CONVENTION COMISSION CHAIRMAN CAPLES: Madam President, a positive note. I have enjoyed this chairmanship and was very lucky to have already known and been what \(I\) consider friends with those who are on the American Legion Commission. And have been very helpful and have kept me informed as to what has been taking place since the last convention and why no meetings and et cetera this past year.

This has been a very busy year for this chairman and I am sad to say a very uneventful year due to the American Legion Department of California moving forward to become the American Legion Department of California Convention Corporation. The resolution at the last convention in Redding to form was presented and passed. This also meant their writing constitution and bylaws that
would conform to Department and National.
Yesterday \(I\) was invited to once again attend the American Legion Convention City Commission meeting at 1:00 o'clock. My co-part, so to speak, and chairman for the Legion, Jim Leyser, was appointed to run the meeting. The meeting finished at about 3:00 p.m. and was a very, very informative meeting.

At this meeting they presented their bylaws for the American Legion Department of California Convention Corporation. They were read and then discussed, with a few little housekeeping items. Vote was taken, they were accepted and they were passed.

A little information. The members of the American Legion Department of California Convention Corporation will be known as trustees. There will be nine trustees: three members of the American Legion Department of California, two members of the Department of California American Legion Auxiliary, two members of the Sons of the American Legion Detachment of California, and two members of the American Legion Riders Department of California. These trustees shall be elected at the annual conventions and each trustee shall serve for three years.

The American Legion Department of California Convention Corporation will be taking over next year 2014 after the Santa Clara convention and at that time all
future conventions, at which time it will then be known as the American Legion Department of California Convention Corporation instead of the American Legion Convention Commission.

Our future conventions at this time are: 2014 Santa Clara. 2015 Ontario as voted. And possibly 2016 Fresno.

It is this chairman's recommendation as was the past chairman, Beverly Sparks', recommendation in her convention report that this chairmanship be for a longer term. They should also be from the north and south to save expenses for our department as previously in the past they were all pretty close to one area.

You also might like to know that not all hotels pay for rooms when we tour and sometimes not even lunch or coffee. This can save our Department on unneeded expenses. It is also a recommendation that the incoming Department President form a committee to take on the task of conforming to the American Legion Department of California Convention Corporation so that we can continue to work together in the future without issues and success.

This chairman also recommends that this committee review "The Department Requirements For Convention" and that it also be revised as we need to have new figures possibly each year as continuing to go 1,000 for
attendance is extra work, empty chairs, and possibly extra money for our department. This chairman has put the figures given in the procedure work for help on this issue from the Redding convention last year. Thank you, Madam Terry, for that.

I am sorry to have to bring this before you, but I do know we have awesome, intelligent, and very smart members and that they know how to get the job done to save our department unnecessary funds to keep us moving forward.

And at this time I would like to introduce our Convention Commission Committee members: Our one-year member, Bonnie Christner.
(Applause.)
CONVENTION COMISSION CHAIRMAN CAPLES: And our two-year member: Melanie Taylor.
(Applause.)
CONVENTION COMISSION CHAIRMAN CAPLES: I would also like to introduce the American Legion Convention Commission Chairman, Jim Leyser, who will share with us about the new changes and the American Legion Department of California Convention Corporation.
(Applause.)
LEGION CONVENTION COMMISSION CHAIRMAN LEYSER:
Thank you, Linda. Good afternoon, ladies.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Good afternoon.
LEGION CONVENTION COMMISSION CHAIRMAN LEYSER:
Madam President Terry, so happy to stand up with you with all the rest of my Past First Mommas. Will they all stand up who have worked with me in the past years? I have a bunch of them, I know I do. Where's Madeline Lee? She worked with me. Bonnie in the back. Norma, there we go look at that.

It's been a real pleasure working with you, ladies, and I hope to continue for the next few years. But to give you a little history about the convention commission, we're getting smaller. They're getting fewer, so we don't have a lot of places.

In fact, 2015 in Ontario right at this moment is up in the air. We don't have a convention corporation to put one on down there. Both districts are at odds with each other so they're not going to put one together. So that's why or one reason we're hoping to get this corporation together before that so that we would be able to move in. When there's not a city corporation available we'll be able to move in and set it up.

And so we're hoping that everybody that gets elected to the corporation has experience with putting on a convention at one time or another while they were members of the Auxiliary.

Number two, we're going to be going into smaller venues. As you look around you now, you see a lot of empty chairs. Some people may have left due to illness or whatever, but look at your opening day and then look at your ending day. For every chair you see in this room we pay \(\$ 1 . \quad\) They don't fill those chairs anymore. They used to. When I first started we got the chairs and the convention city corporations were willing to work with us. And they still are, but they want us to pay anywhere from 70- to \(\$ 80,000\) for a convention center.

So you can see the importance of this corporation getting put together so that we can go in and look at places that have little convention centers in them, but they're still large enough to take care of us. And so in that respect, like Linda said, we're asking that each group, the Auxiliary, the Sons of the American Legion, the Riders and the Legion as well, look at your needs. Because we're going to look at them alongside of you and we want to try to help you, but we're going to have to downsize.

I would rather see -- I mean, you ladies have done well this year. You're going to be 100 percent, yes?

CONVENTION COMISSION CHAIRMAN CAPLES: Thank you.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: We are going to hear from the Finance Committee and the budget.

DISTRICT 20 PRESIDENT PHILCOX: Madam President.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Yes, ma'am.
DISTRICT 20 PRESIDENT PHILCOX: May I interrupt just a second? It's my honor and pleasure to let you know that Pat Haus from District 20, Unit 520 -- I mean, district -- yeah, District 20, Unit 520 also donated a hundred dollars for membership in Veronica's name.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Thank you. Norma Billings, our finance chairman, Kathy Martinez, our senior
member of finance, and Geri Fitzpatrick, our junior member of finance.

FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT AND BUDGET

FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Good afternoon, ladies.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Before we start, do we have copies of the budget?

FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Oh, I'm sorry. Do we have budgets for the members? All the members have a copy of the budget?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: We're going to step back.

NATIONAL POPPY CHAIRMAN TAYLOR: Thank you, Madam President. While we're waiting for the copies to go around, I wanted to share something with all of you. As National Poppy Chairman this year, I received an e-mail from a unit in Grand Rapids, Michigan. And one of the ladies got this brilliant idea of going to her bakery and asking if she would make poppy cookies. The lady at the bakery said she would be honored to, and so that unit raised monies for their VA\&R program by offering these poppy cookies to the public.

So I called the owner of the bakery and I said,
"Marge, this is Melanie Taylor. I live in California. I'm the American Legion Auxiliary National Poppy Chairman. Would you please ship me three dozen of your poppy cookies. I want to take them Houston, Texas for the National Convention."

And she said, "Oh, honey, I can't really do that, but I know you have a lot of bakeries in California. Why don't you contact one of them?"

Well, I have a very dear friend who owns a bakery in my town of Healdsburg. And it's a gold medal, nationwide baker. And I called Will Seppi and I said, "Will, would you help my unit raise monies for the poppy fund to help our veterans at the Yountville Veterans Home?" We have a PTSD ward over there and it was mentioned earlier in the VA\&R report by Harriet.

This PTSD ward gets no money from federal or state funding, and these are veterans who have suffered TBI and PTSD while serving our country in Iraq and Afghanistan. So Will said, "I would be honored to do that."

He made these poppy cookies and sold them for \(\$ 3\) and 50 cents to the general public gave my unit \(\$ 2\) for each cookie sold, and in two weeks' time I had a check from that bakery in the amount of \(\$ 450\).
(Applause.)

NATIONAL POPPY CHAIRMAN TAYLOR: This is a white sugar cookie about this big. It was frosted in a hard crunch frosting. It has our Flanders Field poppy on one side and written across the top are the words, "We remember." And he only did this with two weeks' notice and in two weeks he sold almost 18 dozen cookies. Like I said, \(\$ 450\), and that money \(I\) used to buy gasoline cards for the van that the new residents will be using. They have to travel over to Travis Air Force Base in Sacramento to see doctors over there. They have to go down to Fort Miley in San Francisco and they have to go to the Palo Alto VA down there, you know, because they have had TBIs, traumatic brain injuries.

So that \(\$ 450\) helped put a lot of gas in the van to get those residents down to those medical facilities. So, you know, these -- these cookies are beautiful. They taste fantastic. So, ladies, check with your bakeries in your local town in the month of May and let's have some poppy cookies. You know, that's an easy way, you know, if they will help you to make money for your poppy account. And so three programs, three national programs were covered in this promotion: VA\&R because the money went to the veterans, public relations, because it went into all the local newspapers. It was on the radio stations. It was in San Francisco and Oakland TV stations. And it's
also poppy. So why not. What a sweet way to remember our veterans. Thank you.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Thank you, Norma.
FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Oh, you're welcome. Madam President, there are going to be some extra copies. May I ask the district presidents to hold them up? Each district should have received 16 copies. So if you have extras, can you please hold them up so that we can have our juniors collect them?

Okay. Madam President Terry, may I proceed with my statistical?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Your committee meeting, yes, ma'am.

FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Okay. The convention committee on Finance met on June 27th, 2013 in the Oleander Ballroom B of the Doral, Palm Springs, California.

The statistical report of this chairman appears -- that's not applicable. Kathie Martinez was appointed secretary, Geri Fitzpatrick offered prayer, and Sandy Jacobs was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 19 district delegates answered roll call. There were six visitors present.

The committee agreed upon the following report:

Code was read. Finance Department Code Number 9 reads: "A fee of \(\$ 25\) will be charged to any Unit, District, Department Officers, and Chairmen, Past Department Presidents, and individual members who wish to receive monthly mailings in paper form. All recipients of monthly mailings via e-mail will not be charged. 2010."

The proposed change: "A fee of \(\$ 25\) will be charged to any Unit, District, Department Officers and Chairmen, Past Department Presidents, and individual members who wish to receive bimonthly mailings in -excuse me -- paper form. All recipients of bimonthly mailings via e-mail will not be charged."

I move the acceptance with approval of committee of this code change.

PARLIAMENTARIAN KAPSALIS: Second.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: It's been moved and seconded to change finance code 9, which currently reads: "A fee of \(\$ 25\) will be charged to any Unit, District, Department Officers, and Chairman, Past Department Presidents, and individual members who wish to receive monthly mailings in paper form. All recipients of monthly mailings via e-mail will not be charged. 2010" to "A fee of \(\$ 25\) will be charged to any Unit, District, Department Officers and Chairman, Past Department Presidents, and individual members who wish to receive
bimonthly mailings in paper form. All recipients of bimonthly mailings via e-mail will not be charged."

Is there any discussion?
POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: Yes. Madam President, Michelle Soares.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Yes, Michelle.
POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: Is this going to double the amount of paper in the mailings? And if so, then it would pretty much double the costs, so what is the savings here.

FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: That's a good point. We want to eventually get everybody on e-mail. There's about a hundred units that do receive. I know I'm kind of veering away from the answer here, but yes, the paper will be doubled.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Excuse me. Recognize Ruby Kapsalis, Past Department President.

PARLIAMENTARIAN KAPSALIS: The idea behind this is postage costs cost the Department of California \(\$ 18,000\) this year. That's just strictly for the mailings. The idea is to have the Department only do a bimonthly mailing and have the officers and chairmen do a bulletin directly to the district counterparts instead of department. So the officers and chairmen would be sending bulletins to the district chairman to disseminate to the units six
times a year and the bimonthly mailings would be going out six months a year. So you would still be getting information the 12 months and it would not be doubling the cost of -- the paperwork would not be doubled.

FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Wasn't her question the paperwork being doubled?

POPPY CHAIRMAN SOARES: That's fine. That answers it.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: So any further discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Hearing none, all those in favor say aye.

ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Any opposed?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Passed.
FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Okay.
Department Code Administrative 1. The Department Secretary/Treasurer shall be authorized and charged with responsibility of investing Department -- oops. I'm going to back up one more.

Let's go back to Department Policy Code Number 17 which reads: "The budget status report and a trial balance report prepared by the Department Office shall be
sent to the Department President and Finance Committee quarterly."

We've deleted in its entirety as it is a duplication of Finance Code Number 5. So Code Number 5 will be eliminated, and for housekeeping we will renumber the balance of codes accordingly. So 18 will become 17 ending with 25 becoming 24.

I move the acceptance with approval of committee this code change.

PARLIAMENTARIAN KAPSALIS: Second.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: It's been moved and seconded to delete Code 17: "The budget status report and a trial balance report prepared by the Department Office shall be sent to the Department President and Finance Committee quarterly." The motion is made to delete that entirely and to renumber number 18 through 24.

Is there any discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Hearing none, all those in favor say aye.

ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Any opposed?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Passed.
FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Next code.

Department Code Administrative Code Number 1: "The Department Secretary/Treasurer shall be authorized and charged with the responsibility of investing Department funds in savings accounts, certificates of deposit, et cetera, interest bearing checking accounts, where practical. The investment of funds must be made in major banking institutions insured by the federal government." The proposed change: "The Department Secretary/Treasurer shall be authorized and charged with the responsibility of investing Department funds in savings account, certificates of deposit, et cetera, interest bearing checking accounts, where practical. The investment of funds must be made in major banking institutions insured by the federal government."

The addition to this: "A, the Department President and Secretary/Treasurer shall serve as signatories on all financial accounts. The Department Vice President shall serve as a signatory on bank accounts, but not investment accounts. Annually the Department Secretary/Treasurer will send a letter to the appropriate financial investment institution/institutions with copy of election minutes from the Book of Proceedings and Post Convention Minutes for nomination/election of the Secretary/Treasurer updating current authorized signatories on all financial investment accounts."

Okay. I move the acceptance with approval of committee this code change.

PARLIAMENTARIAN KAPSALIS: Second.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: It's been moved and seconded to change Department Code Administrative Number 1. As it currently reads: "The Department Secretary/Treasurer shall be authorized and charged with the responsibility of investing Department funds in savings accounts, certificates of deposit, et cetera, interest bearing checking accounts, where practical. The investment of funds must be made in major banking institutions insured by the federal government."

The proposed change: "The Department Secretary/Treasurer shall be authorized and charged with the responsibility of investing Department funds in savings account, certificates of deposit, et cetera, interest bearing checking accounts, where practical. The investment of funds must be made in major banking institutions insured by the federal government.
"A, the Department President and Secretary/Treasurer shall serve as signatories on all financial accounts. The Department Vice President shall serve as a signatory on bank accounts, but not investment accounts. Annually the Department Secretary/Treasurer will send a letter to the appropriate financial investment
institution/institutions with copy of election minutes from the Book of Proceedings and Post Convention Minutes for nomination/election of the Secretary/Treasurer updating current authorized signatories on all financial investment accounts."

Is there any discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: All those in favor, say aye.

ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Any opposed?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Passed.
FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Okay. The budget was read and the following changes were made: \(\$ 8500\) relocation expense is being moved from the General Fund Reserves. GF62411, rent-parking-utilities, decreased to \$500. GF62461, national candidates reserve, \$500. WF68505, expense account as well as gift shop, patient remembrance, corrected to reflect donations received at an amount of \(\$ 13,888.48\). The WF48733, income-restricted funds account, increased by \(\$ 2025\) from reserves to cover total scholarship awards. WF68702, scholarships-general, increased to 10,000 .

A question regarding the totals in the actual
columns were addressed. We do not have correct/accurate totals in these columns due to incorrect postings in the general ledger.

The finance committee had to reconvene after the memorial program to discuss a proposed code change from Past Presidents Parlay Committee meeting. This one -there was a motion seconded and carried by Norma DuVall -- Madam President Terry, should I read this?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: No, ma'am.
FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Okay. Thank you. Madam President Terry, this concludes my report. May I proceed with my supplemental?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: You may.
FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Okay. The finance budget meeting met May 18th through the 20th of 2013 at Red Coach Inn and department office. Attendees: Terry Mikesell, Department President; Anita Biggs, Department First Vice President; myself, Finance Chairman; Kathie Martinez, Senior Member of Finance; Geri Fitzpatrick, Junior Member of Finance.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: We don't have the budget committee meeting minutes, Norma.

FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Okay.
Anyway --
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Can we go right
to the budget, babe?
FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: I would just like to go over who attended our budget meeting. We discussed the proposed budget 2013-14 and our discussions lasted three days. We were going over each line item with a fine-tooth and comb, pardon the expression. All went well and a lot was accomplished. We diligently expressed the need for accuracy. We completed the proposed budget and the end result was a deficit budget. We continued to discuss where we need to decrease our Department's operational expenses.

Discussions continued with various issues, specifically possible raises for the Department office staff. We felt at this time due to a deficit we could not approve.

The Department office's relocation expenses were discussed, specifically a parking space that would incur a yearly cost. Secretary/Treasurer Peggy Vogele informed us that we need a parking space for the staff. The area in her -- well, in her estimation is not a very safe area to be in due to gangs and the homeless. The parking space would also be available to the Department President, Department Vice President, and other business visitors.

Okay. And also since Mr. Van Ho will no longer be with us -- he was our auditor for last year. Or this
year. He will be retiring. We received a proposal from Wai S. Chui, CPA. Mr. Chui stated in his proposal that he will not prepare our organization's federal and state returns for the fiscal year-ending June 30th. We will continue to contact other CPAs to reduce our expenses.

So with that being said, Finance received another proposal that will reduce the costs of auditors to decrease by approximately 9,000 creating a balanced budget possibly.

Personnel policies were reviewed and there were proposed changes as well as discussion on Finance and Department codes proposed changes. The code changes will be presented at convention in Palm Springs.

Okay. All in all, \(I\) know we will continue to make all things flow and flow as smoothly as possible. I want to thank you Ruby Kapsalis for her continued efforts as financial advisor. I want to thank Madam President for her support. I want to thank Secretary/Treasurer Peggy for her hard work.

Okay. So we're going to go ahead and vote on this new proposal. You can have it back because I have it right here.

Okay. We received a proposal from Troy Van Sloten \& Associates. And they will prepare the organization's Federal and State Information Returns for
the period ending June 30th, 2013. I just highlighted a few things on my proposal here. They estimate our fees for these services will range from 6,000 to 8,000 for the audit and 1,000 for the information returns. The fee estimate is based on anticipated cooperation from your personnel and the assumption that unexpected circumstances will not be encountered during the engagement. So we're looking at a cost of possibly \(\$ 9,000\).

So I move to accept this proposal from Troy Van Sloten.

PARLIAMENTARIAN KAPSALIS: Second.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: It's been moved and seconded to accept a proposal from Troy Van Sloten, CPA, to do our audit and taxes for \(\$ 9,000\). Is there any discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Are there any questions?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: All those in favor, say aye.

ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Any opposed?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Passed.

Thank you, Norma.
FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Thank you. Thank you, Madam President. Again, I want to thank Ruby Kapsalis for her continued efforts and advice. I'd like to thank Madam President for her support and also for Secretary/Treasurer Peggy for her hard work.

And last but not least, it has been an honor to serve as the Finance Chairman for this fiscal year. And it has been quite challenging and I feel my dedication to the Auxiliary has made me feel proud to be a part of this organization's finances. This is definitely a position that takes a three-year commitment. And my three years are complete.
(Applause.)
FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: I'm puzzled. I put all these pieces together and it's complete.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Thank you, Norma.
FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: So this concludes my supplemental report. And, Madam President, may we proceed with the reading of the proposed budget?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: You may.
FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Senior
Member Kathie Martinez will start the reading.
SENIOR FINANCE MEMBER MARTINEZ: Good afternoon,
ladies. Everyone has a budget I hope. If not, look at your neighbor's. Madam --

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: She takes no prisoners either.

SENIOR FINANCE MEMBER MARTINEZ: No, I don't. Madam President, would you like this to be read line by line?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Yes, ma'am.
SENIOR FINANCE MEMBER MARTINEZ: Thank you.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: You're welcome. Let me tell you something, ladies. When there is a problem during the year and the total budget is not listed in the convention proceedings, you do not have a legal or a clear record to refer back to. Sorry, ladies. Line by line. The wizard has spoken.

NATIONAL POPPY CHAIRMAN TAYLOR: Melanie Taylor, past department president. I'm looking at in particular the GF42462 - Midyear/DEC Meals. What was budgeted for 2012-13 was 2250. Actual is 5815. I just have a question why that's doubled.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: To answer your question, that included the luncheon -- we have luncheons -- the banquet. We had a special luncheon on Saturday. We had the hospital reps and deps. Is that in there too? And it was at Travis Air Force Base. Everything was in that amount?

SENIOR FINANCE MEMBER MARTINEZ: Yeah, that was all the meals.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: It shouldn't be that many meals at the next meeting.

SENIOR FINANCE MEMBER MARTINEZ: Thank you. Any other questions to page 1?

DISTRICT 16 DELEGATE CROWE: Yes.
SENIOR FINANCE MEMBER MARTINEZ: Anita.
DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: I'm sorry recognizing the delegate at the microphone.

DISTRICT 16 DELEGATE CROW: Thank you. Vickie Crowe, District 16, Unit 741. Dues membership per capita is not 16 , it's 17.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Is that due to the dollar assessment?

SENIOR FINANCE MEMBER MARTINEZ: Yes. That does not include the dollar assessment for the Auxiliary dues. That is in a separate column.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Auxiliary dues
is a dollar out of the 17.
SENIOR FINANCE MEMBER MARTINEZ: Yes, it has been broken out.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT BIGGS: Are you done?
Do you have a question?
SENIOR FINANCE MEMBER MARTINEZ: I like that.
Good deal. Good deal. Moving to page 2. Live Units -everybody on page 2? Live Units: \$200. Relocation: \(\$ 8,500\). I do not have -- oh, there it is. Total income General Fund: \$499,787.50.

question was -- Pamela Hicks cannot get to a microphone,
but the question was because we just voted on the auditing
contract for \$9,000, our auditing expense should be
reduced from 16,000 to 9,000 which General Fund -

Do we have any other questions on page 2 ?
DELEGATE MONROE: Marsha Monroe, District 11, Unit 249. Just wondering on line 62405, the actual last year was \(\$ 4,000\) and we only used 39 percent of the budget, and then it was increased so the budget was 16,000. And then it says a decrease of \(\$ 2,000\). I just didn't understand that.

SENIOR FINANCE MEMBER MARTINEZ: There have been
-- how do I do this very correctly? There have been instances of mispostings into general fund accounts. It is unfortunate that the figures in the actual column are not accurate. We as a finance committee along with Madam President, our advisor, Ruby Kapsalis, have been working diligently with the department office to get the errors corrected. Some of them have been. Unfortunately not all of them have been, and this is an instance of incorrect postings.

DELEGATE MONROE: Thank you.
SENIOR FINANCE MEMBER MARTINEZ: You're welcome.
And again, ladies, as we're waiting for any other questions, this is one of the reasons we went to a bimonthly mailing, to reduce this cost. It is horrendous. Do we have any other questions?

DELEGATE PEREZ: Missy Perez, District 25, Unit 229. It's on the return check ones. I have a question.

Is it from the Department of California returned checks or are they checks from the unit or district? And do you charge the unit or district the late fees?

SENIOR FINANCE MEMBER MARTINEZ: Yes, we do. DELEGATE PEREZ: Okay.

SENIOR FINANCE MEMBER MARTINEZ: If it is a unit or a personal check that is returned from the bank that individual unit or person is charged the return check fee. Because of the volume of checks that we deposit, we incur a per item fee to deposit our money. Yeah, this is where a lot of this expense comes in. And this is -- yeah, and we have recently acquired a scanner. We had one -- we had issues with it and it could not handle the volume that we were putting through it. We have gotten the upgraded one and I know the department is using it so our bank fees should reduce. Because that's what 90 percent of this is is bank fees.

DELEGATE PEREZ: Thank you.
SENIOR FINANCE MEMBER MARTINEZ: Thank you.
PARLIAMENTARIAN KAPSALIS: While we're talking about this, this is where the units and districts can help out here because if you will combine your checks as is suggested now, and there are forms on the website telling you which donations you can send out a check. The banks in San Francisco, after we deposit, I believe, maybe 300,
they take 50 cents out of every check we deposit. We're paying them to put our money in the bank. And if we reduce those checks -- yes, if you will reduce your checks by combining your donations, that will help us tremendously and it will make more of the money go towards the programs rather than to the Wells Fargo Bank or the other one.

SENIOR FINANCE MEMBER MARTINEZ: Thank you, Ruby. Okay. Everybody got on page 2? All right.

Page 3, General Fund Other Expenses. Relocation/Office Expenses: \$2,920. I'm sorry. Did I -okay. Charitable Trusts: \$75. Relocation/Storage: \(\$ 2,280\). You all are confusing me.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Ladies, you need to have your little piece of paper so you can put it on there like a ruler so you can follow it across.

SENIOR FINANCE MEMBER MARTINEZ: Yeah, not all line items have dollar figures in them and I'm trying my best not to read a line item if there is no dollar figure there.

National Dues: 193,739. Department President Pins: \$2,000. Fundraising Pins, Charms, Promos: \$3,000. Ways \& Means Other: 1,000. Departments President's Special Project: 10,000. Membership Junior and Senior: \$3,700. Total General Fund - Other Expenses: \$218,714.

Ladies, I do have the figure with the new figures on the audit. Total bottom of the page 2 -- we kind of got sidetracked with the return check thing. Are you ready? \(\$ 198,249.50\). Did everybody get that? Does everybody have it now? Okay.

Okay. Continuing on page 3, General Fund Executive Expense. Department President: \$7,500. Department Vice President: \$200. District Presidents: \$4,500. Training and Program Workshops: \$4,000. Parliamentarian: \$25. Authorized travel: \$2,000. Executive Committee Meeting: 12,300. Distinguished Guests: \$400. Secretary/Treasurer Travel Allowance: \(\$ 500\). Past Department President Pin: \(\$ 300\). National Candidates' Reserve \$500. National President's Visit: \(\$ 1,500\). Do we have any questions on page 3 ?

Moving to page 4. Officers \& Chairmen's Liability D \& O: \$1,800. National Department Leadership Conference: \$2,000. Musician: \$25. Total General Fund Executive Expense: \(\$ 37,550\).

JUNIOR FINANCE MEMBER FITZPATRICK: I've got to have my ruler. Okay. General Fund Program Expense. General Fund Administrative: 205,249.50.

PARLIAMENTARIAN KAPSALIS: Geri, that page has changed.

SENIOR FINANCE MEMBER MARTINEZ: That's changed.

That's the one I gave you.
JUNIOR FINANCE MEMBER FITZPATRICK: Okay.
Ladies, I have some corrected figures that even makes me feel better. Okay. Because of lowering the auditor's costs, the General Administrative Fees then would be 198,249.50.

Okay. Other Expenses: \(\$ 218,714\). Executive Expense: 37,550. Convention Expenses: 29,750. Committee Expense: 12,500. The program expense now is \(\$ 496,763.50\), putting us on a positive side of \(\$ 3,024\).
(Applause.)
JUNIOR FINANCE MEMBER FITZPATRICK: \$3,024. Any
questions? The total -- the expenditures are what -okay. 496,763.50. Okay. Anything else?

Okay. General Fund Reserves and Restricted Summary. General Fund Reserves: \$298,908.76. Okay. Well, I thought we had more money than we do.

Americanism Essay: 55,585. California Disaster:
\(\$ 43,557\). Auxiliary News: \(\$ 26,616\). Display Case:
\$3,093. National Candidate: \$500. Total General Fund Restricted: \$129,351. Total General Fund Reserve: \(\$ 169,557.76\). Any questions on page 5?

Page 6. Poppy Orders: 600,000. No. 60,000. I'm sorry. They should have put the commas in there. Poppy Distribution: 120,000. No. 1200 -- 12,000. Okay.

I'll get it right yet. Okay. Interest Income Restricted: There is none. Poppy Production From Income: 72,000.

Poppy Production Fund Expenses. Poppy Production Manager: \$2200. Poppy Proceeds Distribution: \$1200. Administrative Fee, \(\$ 6,000\). Poppy Production Labor: \(\$ 4,000\)-- 40,000. Here we go again, the commas. Okay. Poppy Production Poppy Kits: 18,000. Poppy Awards: 200. Poppy Chair: 175. Bank Fees/Service Charges: We don't have any in there, so that's good. Poppy Production Fund Expenses: \(\$ 67,775\). And then we have another \(\$ 4,225\). Okay. We budgeted more income over the expenses. Let's put it this way, ladies, we're not in the deficit on the Poppies.

Got it. Wrong line. Okay. Patient Welfare Funds:

SENIOR FINANCE MEMBER MARTINEZ: Yes, it is. JUNIOR FINANCE MEMBER FITZPATRICK: Okay. \(\$ 13,888.48\). And what goes into this fund, ladies, has to go back out.

AUDIENCE MEMBER: What is TFA?
JUNIOR FINANCE MEMBER FITZPATRICK: Temporary
Financial Assistance.
AUDIENCE MEMBER: Thank you.
JUNIOR FINANCE MEMBER FITZPATRICK: VAMC tours is when the president and the hospital representatives take tours of our medical facilities; right?

FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Yes.
Continue on with page 7. Hospital Representatives: 2700. Midyear Meetings/Representatives: 2500. Chairman: 400. There were no bank fees. We have Creative Arts. It was
not budgeted here, so that's a zero. For a total of \(\$ 35,188.48\). And this is also -- actually it's in the positive. The total didn't come out on here unfortunately, but it's 1111.52. That's the difference between the income and expense.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: What line are you on, Norma?

FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: That is for the totals. For some reason it didn't pick that up.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Can you give me a GF code?

FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: The GF code is WF68500. Welfare Fund Expense VA\&R, page 7. The total for WF68500 Welfare Fund Expense VA\&R, total is \(\$ 35,188.49\). So your income less your expenses gives us \(\$ 1,111.52\). \(\$ 1,111.52\). So our income is going to be more as well on the VA\&R. We're on page 7.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Norma.
FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Yes, Madam President.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: To me, I don't understand. We should never have an overage in VA\&R. So why do we have an overage in VA\&R? I got totally lost there.

FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Okay. I
guess apparently --

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: What changed on income? We never changed the income.

FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Well, let's see. We had decreased our gift shop/patient remembrance and --

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: To balance the in and out.

FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Yes, to balance in and out.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Now it doesn't balance. Now we have an overage of \(\$ 1,111.52\). My suggestion would be to put it back in there.

FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: That's what we should do because it will balance it out at 363. Okay. I would like to move to make that change on our VA\&R Gift Shop/Patient Remembrance, WF68505 to go back to the original proposed figure of 15,000.

PARLIAMENTARIAN KAPSALIS: Second.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Thank you. All
those in favor of that change, say aye.
ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Any opposed?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Thank you,

ladies. Great discussion.
FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Thank you,
Madam President.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Aren't you ladies
glad I don't belong to your unit?
FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: It should
be balance at \$36,300.
DISTRICT 28 PRESIDENT DOIDGE: District 28,
Elizabeth Doidge. Madam President, if we change the gift
shop/patient remembrance to the 15,900 from last year,
you're now negative by like 900 bucks.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: We changed the 15,000 in the proposed budget.
FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Not the actual on the previous column.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Norma, you have a request to read your final again.
FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: I'm sorry?
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: You have a request to read the final amount again, the 36 .
FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: For the total on the VA\&R, it's $\$ 36,300$ for income, and for expense it's also $\$ 36,300$.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: So line total WF68500 now reads 36,300.

FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Yes, ma'am. Next the VA\&R Fund Reserve are at \(\$ 78,734.50\). Our Welfare Fund/Children \& Youth. Children \& Youth Donation/Unit Income: 7,000. Poppy Fund Distribution: 300. And the Welfare Fund/Children \& Youth total is 7300. Looking at the income, the administrative expense is \(\$ 1,750\). The TFA Welfare Cases: \(\$ 5,400\). Chairman is \$150. Balanced at 7,300.

And we have -- as of \(3 / 31 / 2013\) we -- actually, that's not there. I was looking at the reserves for Children \& Youth: \$43,898.42. Well, it's actually 43,998.70 and it's on there according to the Ameritrade statements, but in last year's audit we had \(\$ 43,898.42\). Not much of a difference. Yeah, we haven't made much at all. The market is showing a depreciation in some of our reserve accounts. Any questions?

Going on with Education. Our Education Donations/Income is \(\$ 17,500\). Poppy 10 percent Distribution is \(\$ 300\). Income - Restricted Funds is \(\$ 2,025\). Income Poppy Seals, 2,000, with a total of \(\$ 11,825\).

Going on to Education Expenses. Administration: \$1,875. Our Scholarship - General we did increase this to 10,000. Poppy Seals: \$1,000. Chairman: 150. And the total is \(\$ 13,025\), which brings us with more expenses due
to that increase in scholarships, but that's -- that gets pulled out of reserves. So I'm just trying to say it's not a big concern. Any negative number should be a big concern but -- Past Presidents Parlay. Donations: \$10,200. Poppy Fund Distribution: 300, with a total of \(\$ 10,500\).

Past Presidents Parlay Expenses. Administrative Fee: \$1,625. Nurse Scholarships: \$8,275. \$100 for the Chairman. And then our Welfare Fund for the PPP luncheon awards: \(\$ 500\), with a balance of \(\$ 10,500\), total balance. And then going on to the summary of our welfare programs. Summary of income: The Welfare Fund/VA\&R: \$36,300. Children \& Youth: 7300. Education Income, there's a change in this one; right, Kathie?

SENIOR FINANCE MEMBER MARTINEZ: Yes.
FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: So we have 11,825 for the Education Income and 10,500 , so our total comes to \(\$ 65,925\). And the summary of the expenses, this is where there was a change, a little bit of change in that one.

SENIOR FINANCE MEMBER MARTINEZ: Yeah.
FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Okay. So we're looking at the same \(\$ 36,300,7300,13,025\), and \(\$ 10,500\) with a total of -- total on the expenses for the welfare accounts -- okay. Well, my total here for the

VA\&R is still saying 35,188 and we changed -- that should be changed because of the remembrance, the gift account. It should be 36,300 . That needs to be changed on the VA\&R summary of accounts on page 9, the very last page. Because we want it to balance, those two accounts. So you're looking at WF68500. Okay. That's your total, 67,125. And is there an over and under?

I'm not showing a deficit of \(\$ 1200\) due to that one account that we changed to the scholarships account to 10,000 that made us go into a deficit. Because originally -- okay. That sounds good to me. Because we're in a balanced budget and that's a good thing.

Okay. Summary of Welfare Reserves. Veterans Rehabilitation. We're looking at last year's audit report, and that came up to 11 -- \(\$ 114,476.46\). As of Ameritrade, we've got was 78,734.50. Audit last year, 32,110.48. Ameritrade, 43,998.70. Last year's audit, 41,538.82. I'll have to repeat that. 43,898.42, and then that was Past Presidents Parley, 55,577.30. And the totals on the welfare reserves as of last year's audit: 232.024.18. And as of 3/31/13: 231,572.08. So there's not that much of a loss.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Okay. Wait.
Don't you dare do that, Ruby.
Okay. Do you have the motion that I made in the

Finance Committee regarding the reserves and the disbursements and that from the Finance Committee meeting?

FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: We did make a motion on that, did we not?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Yes, we did and it passed, and the reserved figures do not reflect the motion.

FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Okay. Well, I move to amend that motion. Can I do that or no? We can't amend that. I just --

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Okay. It was a consensus of the committee. Okay. Ladies, I don't know if this is official or approved or whatever, but I'll give you a little history because at the time I happened to be on the Finance Committee.

When I was on the Finance Committee, we didn't have any way of tracking what was in the reserves. So we took it kind of tongue and shoe, whatever you want to call it, and disbursed the reserves as we felt that -- Anita is covering her head up. Don't listen to me, Nancy.

So since that point in time it's been brought to our attention that our reserve figures are not correct. Education reserves should be \(\$ 41,538.82\). VA\&R allocation, it should be \(\$ 114,476.46\). Children \& Youth reserves should be \(\$ 32,110.48\). Past Presidents Parlay should be

43,898.42. Oh, they've moved them over a column. Well, Norma, you little rat.

FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: I just added my additional figures, so there wasn't nothing taken away from what we motioned.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Because the way we had it disbursed before was incorrect. We were taking money from VA\&R and putting it in other programs.

FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Excuse me. Madam President, I don't think it was incorrect.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: I was on the Finance Committee.

FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: Well, I've been on the Finance Committee for three years. I'm sorry. You don't know my past two years' experience. I'm sorry and I appreciate your input, but apparently that -- I totally disagree, so I'm sorry. That's all I can say. I'm sorry. So with that said --

PARLIAMENTARIAN KAPSALIS: Madam Department
President --
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Recognize Ruby Kapsalis, Past Department President.

PARLIAMENTARIAN KAPSALIS: Our Department President is not incorrect. This -- what happened was it was before Norma got on the Finance Committee that I
believe that this occurred and the error was not brought to the attention of the Finance Committee until this session, so --

FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BILLINGS: You might be more credible than I am, but I've been on this Finance Committee for three years. I understand my commitment to this committee and I respect your knowledge. I respect you for what you have done in this past year, but I have three years, so I totally understand. So I'm sorry if I have to say that, but --

PARLIAMENTARIAN KAPSALIS: What we did is, Norma, the Finance Chairman's figures on the Ameritrade are correct from the Ameritrade account. What we did -- what we did -- the motion that was made in the Finance Committee was to adjust those figures to coincide with the percentage that was reduced three years ago that should not have been done. There was an injustice. The VA\&R went down. I can bring the figures if I can find them in my book. I'd have to look for them.

But basically you'll see there's very little difference between the Ameritrade and the middle column in your budget. They're almost the same. There's a difference of -- there's \(232,024.18\). That was the motion, and so those figures would be what we would carry on in those reserves for those programs in the future regardless
of what the Ameritrade account has. The Ameritrade -those are all -- that's one figure in the Ameritrade account. Okay? And so the committee voted to redistribute those funds back to where they should have been and never taken away from.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: And that was the motion that was made in the Finance Committee and it was passed.

SENIOR FINANCE MEMBER MARTINEZ: Okay. We got it straightened out.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Yes, ma'am.
SENIOR FINANCE MEMBER MARTINEZ: Okay. Now that that's cleared up, Madam President, I move the adoption of this budget as presented to the body.

PARLIAMENTARIAN KAPSALIS: Second.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: It's been moved and seconded to accept the budget as presented. Is there any discussion?
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: All those in favor, say aye.

ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Any opposed?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Okay. You have a
budget, ladies. Thank you. SENIOR FINANCE MEMBER MARTINEZ: And, Madam President, at this time may we approach the station? DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: You certainly may.

SENIOR FINANCE MEMBER MARTINEZ: Madam President, on behalf of the Finance Committee, as a token of our appreciation, Madam President, on behalf of the Finance Committee, a little token of our appreciation and our love. I know you will enjoy that. This way you can be comfortable.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: If only Odette will let me wear it.

SENIOR FINANCE MEMBER MARTINEZ: We'll whisper sweet nothings in her ear.

JUNIOR FINANCE MEMBER FITZPATRICK: I only hope the hamburger that was in there didn't split. SENIOR FINANCE MEMBER MARTINEZ: There is something in there, in her Happy Meal.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: I've got the toy and a gift card. Thank you, ladies, very, very much. SENIOR FINANCE MEMBER MARTINEZ: Thank you. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: We are going to retire the Colors tomorrow, but at this time we are going to have the Distinguished Guest Chairman's report from Ms.

Linda Workman.
While we're waiting, Talia Avina real quickly is going to have a listing of junior officers.

JUNIOR DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT AVINA: Okay. So to
get away from the tension in the room and get off the topic. I don't know what that was about, but I felt like I was going to get slapped or something. So as you know, I'm the Honorary Department Junior President, but as we go on we have to retire. So me and Terry had a wonderful year together, had a splendid time at Junior Conference, especially with Anita. And so as I was hearing from a couple of the fairies around the room -- I don't know why you picked fairies, but I'm -- I'll go with it.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Did you have a choice?

JUNIOR DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT AVINA: I'm sorry. Sergeant-at-Arms is Nicole Garcia. She could not make it. And Marshal is Iona Evans, and she could not make it also. But as the two that are here, I'm glad that you get to go to 2013-2014.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Will any Past Honorary Junior Presidents please rise.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Susan, Nancy, Susan Gallegos, Nancy Brown-Park. Are there any more in the room? You want to come up and get a hug? Thank you, ladies, for your service and your continuing to serve. Miss Linda.

DISTINGUISHED GUEST CHAIRMAN REPORT

DISTINGUISHED GUEST CHAIRMAN WORKMAN: Hello. It's a little limp. Okay. We'll just work with it. How's that?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Linda, do you want to borrow Peggy's basketball?
