## CONVENTION RULES

RULES CHAIRMAN TELFORD: Good morning, everyone. Good morning, Madam President.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Good morning, Belen.
RULES CHAIRMAN TELFORD: At this time $I$ will
present the convention rules. Your convention rules can be found on page 11 of the report.

Number 1: All meetings of the convention shall be called to order at the designated time or as soon thereafter as a quorum is present.

Number 2: A quorum shall exist when one-third of the units in good standing are partially or wholly represented by duly elected delegates or alternate. Article IV, Section 3, Department Constitution.

Number 3: The audience shall remain seated until the business of the convention. The Department President shall designate certain doors to accommodate the delegates who find it is necessary to enter or leave the convention hall during the reports of the committee or when a speaker has the floor. Cell phones must be turned off or in vibrate mode.

Number 4: The chairman may deviate from the printed program when necessary or expedient.

Number 5: The Credentials Chairman shall report registration as directed by the Chair.

Number 6: The registration of delegates and alternates shall close at 9:00 a.m., Saturday, June 21st, 2014.

7: Only qualified delegates shall have voice and
vote.
8: It shall be the responsibility of the
district president to see that only accredited delegates and alternates serving as delegates are seated in their district delegation during the business meeting of the convention.

9: If a delegate expected to be absent from the convention, except for purpose of attending a committee meeting, she shall relinquish her delegate card to her alternate. The alternate shall then take her seat in the voting section. In the event the delegate does not have the opportunity of reporting to the district president it

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shall become the duty of the chairman of the unit delegation to report to the district president the absence of the delegate and the presence of the alternate or the absence of both the delegate and the alternate.

Number 10: A delegate voting the privilege of the floor shall rise, address the Chair as Madam President, give her name, unit, district name -- numbers, excuse me, pause, and wait to be recognized by the Chair. 11: A member speaking in debate on a question shall be limited to three minutes. No one shall speak more than twice on the same question without consent of the assembly.

12: Delegates attending called committee meetings shall be notified when the convention is considering and voting upon adoption of any changes in policy or matters affecting finance.

13: Reports of committees which do not appear to be controversial in nature may be adopted by general consent if there is no objection. If there is objection, a vote shall be taken. Following the acceptance of a report of a committee, recommendation or resolving may be presented for consideration and adoption.

14: Any committee whose proposed changes in the policy might conflict with that of the American Legion shall confer with the American Legion before presenting said change to the convention.

15: A committee recommending an appropriation of funds for any purpose shall consult with the Department Finance Committee before presenting the recommendation or resolving to the convention.

16: All resolves to be presented to the convention shall be in triplicate and properly signed.

Number 17: Committees may amend resolving and recommendation referring to them before favorable reporting the same. Resolving or recommendation rejected by a committee shall be marked rejected, signed by the chairman of the committee, and returned to the department resolving chairman immediately following the committee meeting.

18: A unit, district, or member presenting a resolving or recommendation shall have the privilege of explaining the same to the committee to which it was referred.

19: Committee shall report to the convention all resolves properly submitted and accepted by a majority of the convention committee.

20: A resolved rejected by a committee may be brought before the convention by a two-thirds vote.

21: Emergency resolving which may arise during the convention or after the date for submitting resolving

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may be presented no later than noon of second day of the convention. Article IV, Section 4b, Department Constitution.

22: Nomination of officers, junior member of finance, department delegates and alternates to the national convention shall be held Friday afternoon, June 20th, 2014.

23: Endorsement of candidates for national office shall follow nominations.

24: Nomination speeches shall be limited to
three minutes. Here shall be no seconding speeches.
25: Election of department officers, junior
member of finance, national candidate, department delegates, and alternates to the national convention shall be held on Saturday morning, July 21st, 2014.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: June.
RULES CHAIRMAN TELFORD: June. Thank you. 26:
The doors of the convention hall shall be closed during the entire election procedure and no one shall leave or enter the hall until the Chair states that election is concluded. The exception to this shall be that in an emergency, a member may leave, and if her absence affects the voting strength, the district president shall immediately notify the presiding officer.

27: When there is but one nominee for all department officers and but one nominee for junior member of finance, the nominees shall be elected vice-a-versa. Article V, Section 3, Department Constitution. Upon roll call, the district president shall report the number of units partially or wholly represented by duly elected delegates or alternates present in the delegation at the time of roll call. This is to determine that there is a quorum of units present at the time of the election.

28, when there is more than one nominee for the department officer, junior member of finance, or endorsement for national office, election shall be by written ballot. The district president shall, when they are instructed by the Chair, take a roll call of their respective delegations and alternate. The wholly voting -- totally voting strength of their district for the election reporting the same to Chair.

29: When there are three or more nominees for the office, junior member of office, or endorsement of national office, unless one nominee receives a majority note on the first ballot, the nominee receiving the lowest number of votes shall be automatic dropped before proceeding with the next ballot.

30: When there is a candidate or candidates for endorsement for the national office, a majority vote shall be by ballot. Constitution Article V, Section 13.

31: Each district president and department member of election committee shall distribute and collect the votes casted by the district delegation and deliver them to the department chairman of elections.

32: Department officers, chairmen, committee members and past department presidents shall vote with their representative district.

33: Each delegate shall be entitled to one vote, the vote of an absent unit is not represented by the alternate shall be casted by the majority of the delegate from the unit. When two delegates represented three votes, the chairman of the unit delegation shall cast the third vote.

34: A majority of the votes cast shall elect, except that in the election of national delegates and alternates, a plurality shall elect.

35: These convention rules may be amended during the convention by two-thirds vote.

36: Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised, shall be the parliamentary authority on all points not covered by these rules, the department constitution and bylaws and the convention mandates.

Madam Department President, this concludes the reading of the convention rules. I move that the convention rules be considered as read and be adopted as a whole.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Second. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: It has been moved and seconded that the rules be accepted seriatim and adopted as a whole. Is there any discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: All those in favor
say aye.
ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Those opposed say
no.
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Motion carried.
Thank you, Belen. Great job.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: You can give her a
round of applause. At this time I will designate the doors for entering and exiting the hall as these doors on the sides, unless there is an emergency and you need to leave from the rear. But these doors are designated for exiting and those for entering. The bathrooms are located on my left and to the right when you exit the door. They're right there to the right.

At this time we will have the Constitution \& Bylaws Chairman Harriet Clendenin.

CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: Good morning. We have an emergency before us and this is going to be the first. Article III -- I'm sorry. Article V, Section 13 now reads: Endorsement for national office. All members seeking national office shall be endorsed at a department convention by a majority vote not more than two years prior to the date they are to be a candidate for office. Votes shall be by ballot.

If adopted the change will be: Endorsement for national office. All members seeking national office shall be endorsed at a department convention by a majority vote not more than two years prior to the date they are to be a candidate for office. Vote shall be by viva voce unless there is more than one candidate. Then election shall be by ballot. Thank you.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you. This is the first reading of an emergency resolution and it will be read again tomorrow morning. You will be voting on it at that time to change the constitution. So did you all hear and understand what Harriet read?

AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Yes.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you. The vote is tomorrow. We're going to move on. Will the Vice President Harriet Clendenin please assume the Chair so I can give my report. I will be giving my report as the Alternate NEC as well as my Department President's report.

## ALTERNATE NEC WOMAN REPORT

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Good morning. You all look wonderful out there. Kind of spread out, but you look fabulous.

It was my honor -- this is my Alternate NEC or National Executive Committee report. It was my honor to represent California at the Washington D.C. conference due to the illness of our NEC Woman Terry Mikesell. Once in Washington D.C., the spirit of our service is immediately felt. The National Executive Committee approved the ambitious five-year centennial strategic plan with five goals.

The vision is by 2019, the American Legion Auxiliary's million members will be making a difference for veterans and their families in every neighborhood.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: I will tell you the five goals. Goal 1: Attain a million members by our 100th Anniversary, 2019-2020 year. Goal 2: Create an internal culture of goodwill. Goal 3: Develop leadership at all levels. Goal 4: Strengthen department and units. Goal 5: With the American Legion, build brand loyalty.

The strategies associated with each goal can be found at the national website www.alaforveterans.org. You will be hearing much more about this plan and how important you are to meeting these goals.

There were many outstanding presentations, workshops, and events which included meeting the author of "Dinner With the Smileys," a beautiful military family, mother and three sons, who hosted a different person for dinner each week at their home while Mr. Smiley was deployed.

(Applause.)
NATIONAL EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEMBER REPORT

ACTING SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: Madam Department President, it has been an honor and a privilege to serve as the Department Acting Secretary/Treasurer for the past nine months. ACTING SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: And a big thanks to a conscientious staff, Mel and Janeen, membership is now being received and posted within two days of receipt.
(Applause.)
ACTING SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: And all checks are deposited the same week they are received.
(Applause.)
ACTING SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: A special thanks to Terry Mikesell for volunteering and doing a tremendous job assisting Janeen posting and keeping membership current. I am sure glad she likes to do it because I don't know what we would have done without her.

Another volunteer I would be remiss if I didn't mention, the one I owe a deep debt of gratitude to is my husband, Art, who is always there keeping the information on the website current and up-to-date. His understanding, patience, and being a husband without a wife for three days each week for nine months, never, never complaining has been phenomenal and greatly appreciated.
(Applause.)
ACTING SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: Everyone probably has noticed that the membership on the website is now being updated and will continue being updated weekly every Wednesday morning. And he gets up at 3:00 o'clock in the morning so it will be there when you wake up.
(Applause.)
ACTING SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: And the nice thing about this the is Department has -- it's not --
we don't have to do anything. It's being downloaded directly from the National ALAMIS database, so it saves us a lot of work.

We are so fortunate to have such dedicated volunteers always willing to step up to the plate to do what they can do for our organization. And Pilar Reyes exemplifies and sets the example for others to emulate. Thank you, Pilar.
(Applause.)
ACTING SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: It didn't matter when or why she was needed. She was always there. Last but not least and by no means -- last but not least by any means, my deepest appreciation to the American Legion staff for their help and specially Sarah Etzel for all of her computer assistance she provided during the transition.

Speaking of the American Legion, I want to publicly thank them for allowing the Auxiliary to share in the profits from the sweepstakes program they oversee and also thank Past Department President Margie Shank who had the insight and worked this deal out with the Legion. We received a total of $\$ 9,902$ this year to help offset the expenses of our general fund operating expenses.
(Applause.)
ACTING SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: This is our best fundraising income and $I$ want to encourage all of our members to participate and buy the tickets when they receive them. Actually, two sweepstake programs are held, one in the summer and one in the winter. The more money earned, the more receipts received for the Auxiliary. And not only that, our members have a great opportunity to win some good cash prizes as well. A win/win situation for all concerned.

I'm told California leads the nation in the number of units who have signed up to the National ALA Management Information System, better known to many as ALAMIS or live unit formerly called Test Units. And I've told this story to a few people, but $I$ have to tell you when $I$ first got in the office in September, units would call in and $I$ would -- they were asking questions, and immediately I would say do you realize if you were a live unit that you could go to the ALAMIS database and find out this information. Well, I don't know, she may be in the room. I don't know who $I$ was talking to, but I said, "Well, are you a live unit?" And she responded, "Well, of course we're alive."
(Applause.)
ACTING SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: So in
future phone calls I had to -- every time I would start asking if they were live, and I would have to rethink what

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I was saying. A test unit or something.
Okay. Ninety-five out of 274 units in California are signed up. This is one of the best membership tools a unit can have because not only does it allow the unit to keep track of their membership, they can pull paid and unpaid membership rosters for the current and past year. They can export the information into an Excel worksheet and use it as a database to create letters, mailing labels, and make address or name changes themselves rather than sending in a member data form. I have to tell you a fun -- oh, I already told you that story. That's one of the funniest stories.

This upcoming year all donations to National Auxiliary Emergency Fund, Spirit of Youth, National President's Special Project or National President's Scholarships will be sent directly from the unit to national with a copy of the report form only. The checks and a form go -- you will mail it directly to national. This is a new way of doing business which will alleviate work for the department office and still allow the department to keep track of how much our members are donating to those programs.

Along the same note, the department is reducing the number of donation forms back down to one form for donations to department.
(Applause.)
ACTING SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: We hope that this change will not only improve our way of doing business, but will eliminate a lot of confusion and cut down on the amount of paperwork that our units, districts, and department have to keep track of. We are always looking for easier and more efficient ways to operate and welcome suggestions from all members.

Financial aspect of our operations is not where I'd like it to be yet, but is a work in progress and I believe we will reach all milestones during the upcoming year. Madam Department President, $\$ 20,000$ was moved from the general fund checking into a business high-yield savings account and combined with the $\$ 7,000$ that was previously invested in a $C D$ when the account was opened and not earning very much interest. We not only get a better interest rate, but these funds automatically serve as a backup protection preventing overdrafts and we can withdraw or add money without any penalties.
(Applause.)
ACTING SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: It has been a real pleasure working with the finance committee this year and thank them for their patience and understanding when we were unable to provide reports in a timely manner. Kathryn Doran was instrumental in getting our accounts
cleared up and always willing to step up to the plate to help. Thank you, Kathryn. Another instance where I don't know what we would have done without you.
(Applause.)
ACTING SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: And I have to tell you, Wells Fargo they have this young gentleman at our -- we have an account for Wells Fargo for our general fund. And he is calling me out or sending me emails all the time. He knows we have money over at US Bank and he wants us to move it over to his bank. But he's so cute. He says the more money we put in, the more interest you'll make.

Most of you already met Cassie Mikesell who is taking care of the department office this year and another one $I$ don't know what $I$ would do without. If you haven't already guessed, Cassie is Terry's daughter-in-law and member of Unit 197 in District 2. I want to publicly thank her for being here and accepting the job. It's a job she is very familiar and done a few times before, so if you need anything, stop by the office and she'll take good care of you.

With your permission, I would like to shoot three more hoops before I conclude. 2015 membership cards are here and can be picked up by incoming district presidents to distribute to the units in her district in the department office. And if you picked up -- I understand that several units have already picked up some membership cards. If you picked your cards up before today, there were no blank cards in there. You'll need to go to the office to get some blanks. Okay?

The national delegate and alternate packets are also in the office at the Hyatt -- or no, in the office, and those can be picked up after elections on Saturday. All of the 2014 Dream Team needs to ensure they turn in their procedure books flash drives and get a receipt from Cassie before they pick up their mileage checks on Sunday. 2015 officers and chairmen need to make sure they pick up their procedure books no later than Sunday at close of convention.

Madam Department President, thank you for your vote of confidence and putting your trust in me to carry out the responsibilities of this position and I hope that together we have exceeded the expectations in meeting the needs of our department and its members. And this concludes my report.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Absolutely.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Oh, my goodness. I just heard some disparaging news. We did send an email out. Did anyone bring in membership and transmittals? We

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offered that. Did anyone get the message? Oh, you did. Oh, good. We will really -- I think, 23, did you bring memberships? Okay. I'm getting ready to go see the Legion. I think they're beating us in membership. Oh, no. I don't want to be dressing up as Wilt Chamberlain. He's going to forget my part of the challenge. If I have any membership on transmittals with the money attached, please see Ruby. Okay? And if you have any membership that you know you can transmit, I think we have this transmittal. If you have the money, see Ruby.

At this time I would request that our Vice President Harriet Clendenin assume the Chair. I will be going to visit the Legion, and I'll be right back. Thank you.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: And I'm taking our National President with me. Thank you.
(Processional.)
DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: We're going to have the reports of the Chaplain, the Musician, and the Historian. Could you please come to the stage. And let's start with the Chaplain, the Team Spirit.

## DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN REPORT

CHAPLAIN CHRISTENSEN: Madam President, the convention committee on chaplains, for God and Country, met on June 19th, 2014 in Room 211 of the Santa Clara Convention Center, Santa Clara, California. The statistical report of this chairman appears on page 14 of the Book of Reports. CHAPLAIN CHRISTENSEN: And in the unit category,
District 4, Unit 88, Josephine Whitmore.
(Applause.)
CHAPLAIN CHRISTENSEN: And you may hold your applause because there are many second places. District 18, No. 755, Diane Mitchell.
(Applause.)
CHAPLAIN CHRISTENSEN: Unit 359, District 19, Chaplain Marie Cowan; Unit 53, District 21, Chaplain Jeri Johnston; Unit 434, District 22, Chaplain Georgie Charles; and Unit 31, District 28, Chaplain Sabrina Orozco. Thank you.
(Applause.)
CHAPLAIN CHRISTENSEN: In Loving Tribute, the largest donation was cumulative. District 22, District Chaplain Amy Gemmell.
(Applause.)
CHAPLAIN CHRISTENSEN: And the unit was 6,
District 22, Chaplain Genevieve Lamb.
(Applause.)
CHAPLAIN CHRISTENSEN: The best supplement goes to District 28, District Chaplain Sherryl Panek.
(Applause.)
CHAPLAIN CHRISTENSEN: And the unit goes to 359,
District 19, Marie Cowan.
(Applause.)

CHAPLAIN CHRISTENSEN: The best prayer book as you know was judged here at convention. The best prayer book goes to District 25, District Chaplain Arlene Barton. (Applause.)
CHAPLAIN CHRISTENSEN: The unit prayer book goes to Unit 280, District 18, Rev. Dr. Rodica Andreescu. And the junior, we have a junior prayer book, that goes to Unit 282, District 22, and the chaplain is Jolina M. Freeman.
(Applause.)
CHAPLAIN CHRISTENSEN: Thank you, ladies. There was 100 percent reporting 18 of 29 districts. Congratulations to each of the unit and district chaplains.

Madam President, I'm going to do my narrative now. The name given chaplains this year, "Team Spirit," not only reflects the concept to make an impact on a team, not just one, and spirit includes not only the manner in which we do our work, but includes our God in all things. Service not self, our motto, was demonstrated in all that chaplains do.

Chaplains, unit and district made contact with department chaplain, some with phone calls or notes attached to death notices. Some just shared what was going on in their life. I feel chaplains at all levels did their utmost in support of the theme H.O.O.P.S., Honoring Our Opportunity to Provide Services for our veterans. Madam President, this concludes my report.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Thank you. CHAPLAIN CHRISTENSEN: May I approach the podium?
DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Would you
like to wait until Anita gets back?
CHAPLAIN CHRISTENSEN: Whatever you wish. Thank
you.
DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Thank you, Alice. We now will hear from the Musician Joyce Patton. She's here.

MS. COOLEY-DESMEULES: Starfish.
MUSICIAN PATTON: Holiday songs. And I hope this is something the new music chairman picks up also. Because they did so much work on this, I had to do something for her, and I'd like to present her with this basketball basket.

MUSICIAN PATTON: And she's going to put the book in the back so you guys can look at it. I hope it will be all right. HISTORIAN DIEBEL: First place winner for best
district picture book goes to Cathy Medina, Unit 496, District 19.
(Applause.)
HISTORIAN DIEBEL: Madam President, this
concludes my awards. May I please approach your bench or your station? Your bench.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: My bench. You can
come to my bench any time.
HISTORIAN DIEBEL: Skybox. Okay. This is your
H.O.O.P.S. rule book.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Oh, how beautiful.
Okay. And this is a rule book. Very beautiful.
HISTORIAN DIEBEL: That's the Department
Constitution \& Bylaws, all of the standing rules.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Fabulous.
HISTORIAN DIEBEL: Everything we need to run our
business.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: I needed that
earlier in the year.
HISTORIAN DIEBEL: This is your H.O.O.P.S.
playbook.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Playbook.
HISTORIAN DIEBEL: And this is all the plan of
actions.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: With all the plan of
actions. Thank you so much. This is beautiful.
HISTORIAN DIEBEL: Okay. This is your
communication book, everything that was sent out and your reports from today will -- of this meeting will be in there as well.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: This is absolutely
gorgeous.
(Applause.)
HISTORIAN DIEBEL: Because of all the pictures that I have gotten, I only brought a sample of the book because $I$ can't bring them all down here. Will you hand me the other book that's in there?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: She lives in Lynwood. That's like right next door to Long Beach. I'll pick it up. Good. Thank you so much.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Is Linda Hayes in the audience?

ACTING SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: She's in the office.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: She's in the office. Okay. Did Teresa Jacob come back in the room? Not yet. Okay. I'm going to defer Girls State then until Linda can show up. And we'll then begin with Terry Mikesell with Legislative, and then after Terry it will be Community

Service, Jackie Cleveland for Junior Conference -- no. I'm going to move you to tomorrow.

## LEGISLATIVE REPORT

LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN MIKESELL: The convention committee on Legislative met on June 19, 2014 in Room 212 of the Hyatt Hotel Convention Center, Santa Clara. The statistical report of this chairman appears on page 21 of the Book of Reports.

Harriet Clendenin was appointed secretary, Florence Perdue offered prayer, and Barbara Ross was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 18 district delegates answered roll call. There were six visitors present.

The committee agreed upon the following report: The code was read with the following proposed changes. Code 6 currently reads: "A copy of Legislator's replies to letters of our members should be sent directly to: Director, National Legislative Commission, The American Legion, 1608 K Street NW, Washington, D.C. 20006 with a copy to the Department Chairman. The unit name and number shall be indicated on all replies so that California may receive credit. 1999."

They recommended that we remove after consultation with the National Legislative Chairman. Renumber remaining 6 through 8.

Madam Department President, by direction of the committee $I$ move the adoption of this code change. DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Second. LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN MIKESELL: Have I confused you? DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Yeah, big time.
Okay. You're just moving to delete this code? LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN MIKESELL: Yes, ma'am. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: It has been moved and seconded that we delete code 6 that currently reads: "A copy of Legislator's replies to letters of our members should be sent directly to: Director, National Legislative Commission, The American Legion, 1608 K Street NW, Washington, D.C. $20006 . "$ Is there any discussion? LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN MIKESELL: No, it's no longer necessary.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Let me read the remainder of this code: "With a copy to the Department Chairman. The unit name and number shall be indicated on all replies so that California may receive credit." We're removing that entire section of the code. Did you offer rationale? I'm sorry. Did I miss it?

LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN MIKESELL: I beg your
pardon?
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Did you offer rationale to it?

LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN MIKESELL: Yes, ma'am. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Can you repeat it?
LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN MIKESELL: Because it's no longer necessary. The plan of action will be sent via email or some other form I can't remember, but they're no longer physically sending by snail mail hard copies to that address. And like I said, I did confer with Melanie on this code change.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you very much, Madam Chairman. Is there any discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: All those in favor,
say aye.
ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Any opposed say no.
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: That motion is
carried. Thank you.
LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN MIKESELL: Thank you, Anita. Certificates for second and third place unit and district supplemental were given in the unit packets. Copy of these winners has been posted in the department office. 100 percent reporting certificates were presented to District $4,6,7,9,19,23,27,28$, and 30 . There were no resolutions nor any recommendations. With no further business, the meeting adjourned at 11:02 a.m.

supplement, District 27 , Unit 118 , Danielle White,
Chairman. And this report was submitted to the National
Western Division Chairman. And to accept on her behalf is District President Vella Myers.
(Applause.)
LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN MIKESELL: Danielle is on
her way to Alaska. I'm very pleased to report that I learned a lot from this chairmanship. Madam President Anita Biggs, this concludes my report.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you very much. Terry Mikesell, would you please stay at the podium for the purposes of a presentation by Carol Fuqua. Carol, are you prepared?

ELECTIONS CHAIRMAN FUQUA: I'm right here.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Okay. Only for
Terry.

California do a lot of work.
LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN MIKESELL: Yeah.
ELECTIONS CHAIRMAN FUQUA: And they gave me a lot
of stuff.
LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN MIKESELL: I've got to tell you, I was strutting myself because I don't have a program next year, so I didn't have to take a tub home. Shame on me.

ELECTIONS CHAIRMAN FUQUA: But it's full of
treasures.
LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN MIKESELL: Thank you.
ELECTIONS CHAIRMAN FUQUA: And a few other gifts that you'll enjoy.

LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN MIKESELL: Thank you.
ELECTIONS CHAIRMAN FUQUA: And I've learned many
new things. How to use a camera, how to use a computer,
how to get the film down from the camera to the computer.
And I've never scrapbooked in my life.
LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN MIKESELL: She has now.
ELECTIONS CHAIRMAN FUQUA: I am experienced.
Enjoy.
LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN MIKESELL: Thank you, Carol.
Now I would like to make a presentation to Carol with your permission, Anita.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Yes, you may.
LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN MIKESELL: Thank you. I wanted to get from Jackson \& Perkins a rose. I can't remember the name of it. Diane?

PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: Honoring Our
Veterans.
LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN MIKESELL: Honoring Our Veterans. And when I went to order it, they said it would be speed delivered at planting time. Well, I couldn't wait for that. So, Carol, this rose is for you. And its name is We Salute You. And it's a beautiful orange and pink rose.
(Applause.)
LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN MIKESELL: And it had a very tough ride and been in a dark room the last two or three days.

ELECTIONS CHAIRMAN FUQUA: I hope there's instructions. Yeah, there's instructions. Thank you.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Wow, that's fantastic.

ELECTIONS CHAIRMAN FUQUA: Yes. Keep the hats. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you. ELECTIONS CHAIRMAN FUQUA: You're welcome. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Is Joan Cannon here? Okay. Joan Cannon, Community Service Chairman. And then after that we're going to have our -- I see her -- Girls State Director Val Hardy and Chairman Linda Hayes. Will you all come to the stage, please?

And before -- while y'all are coming to the stage -- that's my southern roots -- will the Distinguished Guest Chairman please escort the Sons of the American Legion Detachment Commander Christopher Affolter to the podium or to the microphone for an announcement.
(Processional.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Oh, did I say that?
I meant a dribble. You've got to come to the stage. They've got sad music for you to come to the stage.

DETACHMENT COMMANDER AFFOLTER: Madam President, with your permission.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Yes.
DETACHMENT COMMANDER AFFOLTER: I have two
announcements; one is inviting --
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: They're going to sing that song.
(Singing.)
DETACHMENT COMMANDER AFFOLTER: I won't do that no more. You know, I didn't know that that was a tradition in the Auxiliary. I know it is a tradition in scouting. I will watch that word whenever I come to see you.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Perfect.
DETACHMENT COMMANDER AFFOLTER: I have a few
things to share.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Okay.
DETACHMENT COMMANDER AFFOLTER: How's that? I have a few things to share. At 3:00 p.m. today there's going to be a bus or van that will be right outside of the convention center that will be taking, if you would like, the juniors, adults, and also youth sons and some adults. They're going to be going to a water park for free. Okay?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: I brought my suit.

DETACHMENT COMMANDER AFFOLTER: We have room for 30 participants, whether it's adults or you. The Sons of the American Legion does this every year to provide for our youth because we all believe in our youth. Don't we, ladies?
(Applause.)
DETACHMENT COMMANDER AFFOLTER: Because we want them to grow up to be great citizens of this great nation. Yes, so that's happening. And you love veterans and VA\&R; right?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Very much.
DETACHMENT COMMANDER AFFOLTER: Okay. Well, this evening at 4 -- Post 419, we have a burger fry that the Detachment of -- well, actually one of the Squadrons from the 3rd area that is actually putting on a burger fry. And the proceeds will go for the VA\&R Foundation for the Department of California which is the -- which is my personal project for this year. I believe that we need to keep our money right here in California to be able to provide for our veterans right here.
(Applause.)
DETACHMENT COMMANDER AFFOLTER: And, of course, we have been diligently working to get those funds into place. I made a commitment to the American Legion of $\$ 10,000$. And I don't even know where we stand right now, but I will by the time that my cap turns to all light blue, which means that I'll be a junior past and I'll be presenting a check to the American Legion.

And I know that your H.O.O.P.S. program is, you know, jumping too. So $I$ would just really thank you for the time to share this information along to you. And I'll get out of your way with your permission, Madam President.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you very much, Commander. We appreciate you. That invitation is at 3:00?

DETACHMENT COMMANDER AFFOLTER: 3:00 p.m. And, by the way, hot dogs, chips are provided, you know, so they have a dinner too.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Okay. We'll let our Chairman of the Junior Pages coordinate that if they're able to go. That will disrupt our delivery if we do without our pages, so we'll have to have the Sergeant-At-Arms and Marshal step up. But thank you very much for the offer.

DETACHMENT COMMANDER AFFOLTER: They'll be back about 7:00, 8:00 o'clock.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: May give somebody a
break.
DETACHMENT COMMANDER AFFOLTER: Absolutely.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you so much,

Commander. Sergeant-at-Arms and Marshal, please escort our Detachment Commander Mr. Christopher Affolter from the stage. Thank you.
(Processional.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: We'll now hear from our Community Service Chairman Joan Cannon. After that we'll do Girls State.

## COMMUNITY SERVICE REPORT

COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN CANNON: The
convention committee on Community Service met on June 19th, 2014 in Room 208 of the Santa Clara Convention Center, Santa Clara, California. The statistic report of this Chairman appears on page 17 of the Book of Reports.

Susan Baker, District 28 was appointed secretary. Marge Rye, District 21 offered prayer, and Ann Philcox, District 20 was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 19 district delegates answered roll call. There were four visitors present.

The committee agreed upon the following report:
The department community service code was read with zero changes. There were no resolutions and no
recommendations. Certificates for 100 percent reporting. Walk, Run \& Roll participation, and second and third place awards were handed out.

During question and answer session it was noted that Community Service Chairman did not receive any applicants for a junior volunteer of the year. It was requested this upcoming year to really look into our units and find those very special members, whether a senior or a junior. Marge Rye District 21 noted that Junior
Activities and Education Chairman should work closely with the Community Service Chairman to help this be accomplished.

With no further business the meeting of the membership committee -- Community Service committee adjourned at 10:42 a.m. Madam President, may I continue with my supplement?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Yes, you may. COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN CANNON: Who gives her time, talents, love, money, understanding, and a gratefulness for no reward? An American Legion Auxiliary unit member. Department of California's treasures is our members who continually step up and take charge to ensure our military service members, their families, and our veterans, their families, and our communities are given what is needed at the time of need. We do not hesitate in organizing, planning, and delivering our services. Department of California district and units
participated in six Walk, Run \& Rolls with three of them benefiting veterans programs. Two members participated in the Monterey Peninsula Stop Soldier Suicide Motorcycle Run adding $\$ 3,000$ to their fund. Eleven members donated 120 hours and provided full meals for 200 riders in Ride 2 Recovery Wounded Warrior project. The last added $\$ 1200$ for veterans projects within their district. The remaining walks supported various cancer programs.

Department of California Auxiliary members are out in our communities working to support our military and veterans and their families. Our units are driving many miles to support veterans that are patients in local VA hospitals and veterans homes. We are providing Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners with all the trimmings, as well as gifts, ornaments, and cards. We are making lap robes, hats, and scarves, afghans, and providing books and shoes. But the most special gift we give is ourselves visiting our veterans and spending time just talking.

Some special activities $I$ would like to share. Several units have adopted veterans that are either homeless or in veterans homes. A motor home was purchased and placed on a unit member's property taking a homeless veteran off the streets and giving him a safe place to live.

Another unit provided a veteran with household items, furniture, new quarters and gift cards to stock his pantry, a gift that keeps giving was paying for the veterans membership dues to the post. Providing him with a new family and continued support.

A female veteran was adopted from Menlo Park VA facility. The unit provided her with clothing, books, puzzles, and her favorite chocolates. This veteran is a gold star mother who lost her son in Iraq and was adopted by the unit and provided her with an honorary lifetime membership just to say thank you for your service and your sacrifices for our country.

Numerous units volunteered time at VA hospitals, VA homes, nursing homes, and veterans -- house veterans. They provide meals, gifts, their time visiting and singing with veterans. We send Girl Scout Cookies to our soldiers in Afghanistan. We have members that are housebound, but they still volunteer their time doing what they can.

We have a unit member that makes baby blankets for newborn babies at the Ventura County Naval Base. This unit member has completed 100 blankets and was presented with a certificate of appreciation for her dedication.

Several units do something that seems so simple, but the effect is life changing. They collect pull tabs from cans and donate to their local Ronald McDonald House. Why is this important? Many active duty military members
stay at the Ronald McDonald house while their children are in the hospital receiving treatment. This allows military families time to support their children in the time of need. Something so simple, but allows the parents peace of mind by being able to be there for their children.

We are holding Stand Downs supporting our
veterans and bringing them resources and materials needed.
We have unit members serving on our local committees working on homeless issues and awareness. We have units bringing veterans into our post, serving them meals, fellowship, and just listening to their stories. We gather cans and use this money to buy food for our local homeless veterans.

One of our Auxiliary members had a special moment when she took an entire family to San Diego to welcome their son home from a cruise on the USS Coronado. And to make that trip extra special, they all made their local news.

The Department of California had 3,731 volunteers who donated $\$ 67,272$ and had 81,689 volunteer hours serving our military, veterans, and our communities. A job well done. The stories can go on and on. Department of California Auxiliary members are always searching, planning, and working for our military veterans, their families, and our communities.

It has been a pleasure working with our 29 districts learning their great works. We, the Auxiliary, are always ready to serve and lift up those that are broken, lost, and forgotten.

That concludes my report. May I continue with my first place awards?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Yes, you may,
please. Thank you.
COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN CANNON: First place
district supplemental, District 28, Susan Baker.
(Applause.)
COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN CANNON: Our first place unit supplemental, Unit 741, District 16, Madeline Lee.
(Applause.)
COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN CANNON: Those just keep on working. My last award is for our volunteer of the year. She was unable to be here, so in her place is -- her name is Donna Baker from Unit 26, District 15. She was unable to be here so -- okay. So her unit president, Deanne Graham from Unit 26 is here to accept her award.
(Applause.)
COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN CANNON: And this year
I just wanted to note that all of our community service
volunteers were called shooting stars, and I was able to find for Donna -- oops, a shooting star for her great work.
(Applause.)
COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN CANNON: And this
concludes my report and thank you for the great year I had.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you. Are you going to talk about the walk --

COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN CANNON: Oh, yes.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: That little thing we did yesterday on Wednesday.

COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN CANNON: Yes. We had our Walk, Run, Roll Wednesday, and thank you for everyone who came and participated. We still have these lovely little wristbands over in District 11. And if any district wants to come and get a bunch and help pass them out. And we'd like a $\$ 2$ donation for Anita's special project. We are so close, ladies, to $\$ 6,000$ raised.
(Applause.)
COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN CANNON: If you could just visit us in District 11 , we can make that 6,000 goal and maybe even break it. So $I$ do appreciate everyone. And I will ask for a little bit of time. I'm closing out the donations Saturday at noon and I'll just ask for maybe a couple seconds to hand out the monetary awards for unit, district, and individual who donated the most money to Anita's special project.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you so much, Joan Cannon.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: I will not have time to do Girls State at this time. I will get you immediately following the nominations this afternoon. I have to do Past Presidents' Parlay. I have no choice. As quickly as possible, we'll hear from our Girls State Director and our Girls State Chairman. I apologize.

GIRLS STATE DIRECTOR REPORT
GIRLS STATE DIRECTOR HARDY: Okay. I'm really
sorry. I'm getting on a plane to get back to be at Girls State.

Madam President Anita, my good friend Nancy, distinguished guests and teammates. This is really short. Thirty-four years ago $I$ had the privilege and the honor to be selected by District 19 , Unit 314 to represent El Segundo High School at California Girls State. The experience changed my life.

I was able to reinvent myself at Girls State and
try things I had never done before. I had always felt like a good American coming from a military family. My dad served in the Army Air Corps in World War II and my brother served in the Marine Corps in the Vietnam conflict. Girls State lit a fire of patriotism in me giving me greater pride in our country and a stronger understanding of democracy.

All these years later $I$ am still involved with Girls State, taking on the role of director.
(Applause.)
GIRLS STATE DIRECTOR HARDY: Thank you. The 2014 session will occur shortly after this convention with 522 delegates slated to attend. And I will be departing this afternoon so $I$ can ready for tomorrow.

I must tell you that the preparation leading up to this Girls State has been very difficult. As of May 15th, we had 72 reservations without delegate paperwork. There are still many today with paperwork that is incomplete. Girls State is a program that requires months of preparation, careful planning, and hours of work leading up to the session.

Anyone who has attended Girls State in one capacity or another can attest to that fact. So raise your hand if you have helped at Girls State or are a Girls State Chairman. So you know the number of hours that go into that.

The program we present is one we can all be very proud of. I know we can accomplish our mission with almost every young woman who attends. The job of director is one of preparation prior to and to act as the leader during the session. I will be on-call 24 hours a day for our six-day session, and that has certainly been part of my expectation. What I did not expect was working eight-hour days teaching kindergarten, followed by an additional eight hours each day for the last month working on Girls State. Thank you God I have an understanding husband in Jack.

As $I$ am buried in paperwork, $I$ think about all the hundreds of hours we could have saved, not to mention the money in paper, printing and postage by eliminating a paper registration -- excuse me. A paper registration for our delegates and alternates.

Who are our clients at Girls State? They are 16and 17-year-old young women. If we hope to reach these young women and get them excited about our mission, we need to meet them where they are. And where they are is online.
(Applause.)
GIRLS STATE DIRECTOR HARDY: Now you're going to make me cry. They speak social media. They turn in their
homework online. Their college applications are all online. They Tweet, use Instagram, Facebook, and take selfies, which I'm hoping Nancy will come and do for me. They're connected with the world through their technological literacy. A paper application is as archaic to them as a ditto machine.

We have been charged by the National Organization to use Girls State as a tool to increase our membership. How are we to do this you ask? By making our Girls State Chairmen women who don't have to be paper pushers, but women who are passionate about our mission for veterans, their families, and our community. Don't just select your girls and forget about them. All of these girls are required to complete volunteer hours prior to graduation. So why not volunteer with us? With us. With us.

Girls State Chairmen shall be the face of our organization to our young people. They should be inviting the girls to spaghetti dinners, Memorial Day commemorations and visits to the VA hospitals and homes. These girls may already be involved in community activities in their schools and in their community, but they are truly looking to make a difference in the world.

By meeting them where they are and providing them with the opportunities for service, we let them see that the American Legion Auxiliary is as relevant today as it was 90 years ago. We can and we must change with the times to improve the Girls State program and increase our membership. Let's work together to make this dream a reality.
(Applause.)
GIRLS STATE DIRECTOR HARDY: Thank you, Madam President. That concludes my report.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you, Valerie. Great job. We'll now hear from our Girls State Chairman Linda Hayes while they get their selfies in. After that will be our Past Presidents' Parlay Chairman, and then we'll move to the luncheon. So we have to get moving, Linda. Thank you. Get to the podium.

## GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN REPORT

GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: Whew, I made it.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Yeah, I'm glad.
GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: They're passing out the reports to go to our ladies.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Don't worry about
the passing out. You can start your report.
GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: Good morning, Madam
President.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Good morning.

GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: The Girls State pre-convention meeting was held Thursday, June 19th in Room 206 at the convention center. There were 23 delegates and seven guests present.

Secretary was LuAnn Capazzi and the Chaplain was Elizabeth Tomlin and our Sergeant-at-Arms was Anita Kelly. The Girls State Director, Valerie Hardy, explained potential changes to the Girls State application form which will streamline the entire application process.

Afterwards the department code was read and the changes were voted on and passed. Madam President, may I read the changes?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Yes, you may.
GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: Code 12 currently
reads: "Reservation forms for Girls State will be made available on the department website and mailed by the Department Chairman annually, naming the school or schools they desire to sponsor for the next session of Girls State. Deadline date for the reservations to the Department Chairman is October 1st. Failure to file a reservation form by deadline date will indicate the school is being dropped and thus creating a numerical vacancy. The Department Chairman shall fill such vacancies by advising units who have letters on file requesting an opening in their area. The application packet shall be mailed and made available on the department website by the department office or chairman the first week of November." And that was done in 2008.

The proposed change will read: "Reservation
forms for Girls State will be made" --
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Excuse me, Linda.
GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: Yes.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: You must read the
code as it is -- as it is written, and Code 12 is different in our code. So it has to be read exactly as it's written in the code now. Do you have a copy of your code?

GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: No.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: I have a copy. I've
got a copy right here.
GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: Thank you. Okay.
Currently reads: "Reservation forms for Girls State will be made available on the department website and mailed by the department office by September 30th."

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: September 1st. GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: I meant September 1st. Well, September 1st. I'm sorry. I left that out. "Unit shall file a reservation with the Department Chairman annually naming the school or schools they desire to sponsor for the next session of Girls State. Deadline
date for reservations to the Department Chair is October 1st. Failure to file a reservation form by deadline date will indicate the school is being dropped and thus creating a numerical vacancy. The Department Chairman shall fill such vacancies by advising units who have letters on file requesting an opening in their area. The application packet shall be mailed and made available on the department website by the department office or chairman the first week of November. After November 30th the cost of duplicate mailing of packets will be $\$ 5$," and then five dollars written out. This was passed in 2008. The proposed change will read: "Reservation forms for Girls State will be made available on the department website and mailed by the Department Chairman annually, naming the school or schools they desire to sponsor for the next session of Girls State." In there it should say mailed -- no, it shouldn't.

Okay. "Deadline date for the reservations to the Department Chairman is October 1st. Failure to file a reservation form by deadline date will indicate the school is being dropped and thus creating a numerical vacancy. The Department Chairman shall fill such vacancy by advising units who have letters on file requesting an opening in their area. The application" -- we're deleting "mail" and inserting "packet," "shall be made available on the department website by the department office or chairman the first week of November." We are deleting the last sentence. It ends there. In 2014. May I have a motion to have this code change accepted?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: There's no motion moved. This was approved in committee; right? All right. It's been recommended. The motion was made and seconded that the proposed change for Code 12 will read:
"Reservation forms are for Girls State will be made available on the department website and mailed by the Department Chairman annually naming the school or schools they desire to sponsor for the next session of Girls State. Deadline date for the reservations to the Department Chairman is October 1st. Failure to file a reservation form by deadline date will indicate the school is being dropped and thus creating a numerical vacancy. The Department Chairman shall fill such vacancy by advising units who have letters on file requesting an opening in their area. The application packet shall be made available on the department website by the department office or chairman the first week of November."

Are there any questions?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Are you ready for the question? All those in favor, say aye.

ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: All opposed, say no. (No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: The motion carried. You can continue.

GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: Okay. Code 14A currently reads under eligibility requirements: "Limited to girls who are 11th grade students for the current school year, (public private or home schooled). Each candidate must plan to continue high school and attend one or more semesters immediately following the Girls State session."

The proposed change is to read -- is housekeeping only. We're deleting one comma and adding two. "Limited to girls who are 11th grade students for the current year" take out that comma, (public, private, or home schooled). Each candidate must plan to continue high school and attend one or more semesters immediately following the Girls State session."

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you. That housekeeping code change is accepted.

GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: Code 14C currently reads as follows: "Candidates shall be selected on the basis of outstanding leadership, scholastic merit, interest in community and government, character, honesty, and cooperativeness. Candidates should be independent in the physical requirements of daily living; if not; they must provide an attendant at their own expense. This attendant shall be a minimum of 21 years of age, female and must be able to attend the entire session."

The proposed change is housekeeping only: Delete the comma after "living" and the semicolon after "not," and replace by commas. And that already was wrong. Let's see. The comma after "living" stays. It's the semicolon that we're removing and inserting a comma after "if not."

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you. That housekeeping change has been accepted. You can continue.

GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: Code 16C currently reads: "Shall provide the campus rules, Girls State constitution and bylaws, (bound in the program book) to the citizens upon registration."

Proposed change is to be: "Shall provide the campus rules, Girls State constitution and bylaws to the citizens upon registration." We're removing "bound in the program book."

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: So by the direction of your committee, they have approved or moved and seconded that we accept the change to code 16C to read: "Shall provide the campus rules, Girls State constitution and bylaws to the citizens upon registration."

Is there any discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: All those in favor,
say aye.
ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Any opposed say no.
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: That motion carried.
Thank you.
GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: 16D currently reads: "Shall file with the department office a complete set of all materials given to the candidates, including the roster for future references after the close of Girls State Sessions."

The proposed change again is housekeeping only. To remove the "S" on "sessions." "Shall file with the department office a complete set of all materials given to the candidates, including the roster for future references after the close of Girls State Session."

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you. That housekeeping change has been accepted.

GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: Code 17 currently reads: "Unit procedures for selecting of candidates. All materials and necessary information relative to the qualifications and methods of selection shall be presented to the school representative by the unit chairman or her substitute. The recommendation of candidates and alternates shall be made by the school faculty and provided to the sponsoring units. Only the unit shall have final approval of the recommendations, subject to acceptance by the Department Chairman. Last year's Girls State Citizen may provide guidance in selection of the current candidate and may be included as part of the committee when interviews are scheduled. When the unit has chosen the candidate, the fee and supporting papers shall be forwarded no later than March 12 th as provided in the instructions."

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: It says March 31st.
GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: Does it?
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: In the code it
states not later than March 31st.
GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: Okay. This is a little bit old then. "As provided in the instructions. Publicity may be released indicating that the candidate has been chosen. If selected delegate and alternate, due to circumstances beyond control, cannot attend the Girls State Session, a second alternate selected in the same manner shall attend to prevent forfeit of the unit fee. 2004. Each application must be signed by the candidate, the unit chairman, and the school representative. When
two or more units sponsored one candidate, only one application form shall be" --

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Hold on, Linda. We don't know where you are. You're reading Code 17? I don't know what old book you have. It's old. Did you move on to 18?

GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: No, I am reading here what I have for 17.

PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: That was the end of 18.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: No, that was actually 18 . The end of 17 is "second alternate selected in the same manner shall attend to prevent forfeit of the unit fee." That's the end.

GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: Then this book is --
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: I know we're getting close to 12:00, but we were told that it may take a while for our Past Presidents' luncheon. So if you can be patient we'll just do the preconvention meeting for Girls State and we'll pick up her report supplemental report after lunch. Is that good? Okay. But we have to have the Past Presidents' Parlay speak so, if you can finish these code changes as soon as possible. What are you changing in code 17?

GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: Code 17 changes: "Unit procedures for selection of candidates," we're removing "selecting" and inserting "selection." "All materials and necessary information relative to the qualifications and methods of selection shall be presented to the school representative by the unit chairman or her substitute. The recommendation of candidates and alternates shall be made by the school faculty and provided to the sponsoring unit. Only the unit shall have final approval of the recommendations, subject to acceptance by the Department Chairman. Last year's Girls State Citizen may provide guidance in selection of the current candidate and may be included as part of the committee when interviews are scheduled. When the unit has chosen the candidate, the fee and supporting" -inserting "documents," removing "papers" -- "shall be forwarded no later than March 31st as provided in the instructions. Publicity may be released indicating that the candidate has been chosen. If selected delegate and alternate, due to circumstances beyond control, cannot attend the Girls State Session, a second alternate selected in the same manner shall attend to prevent forfeiture of the unit fee."

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: By direction of the Girls State committee, they are presenting the following code change to 17: "Unit procedures for selection of
candidates. All materials and necessary information relative to the qualifications and methods of selection shall be presented to the school representative by the unit chairman or her substitute. The recommendation of candidates and alternates shall be made by the school faculty and provided to the sponsoring unit. Only the unit shall have final approval of the recommendations, subject to acceptance by the Department Chairman. Last year's Girls State Citizen may provide guidance in selection of the current candidate and may be included as part of the committee when interviews are scheduled. When the unit has chosen the candidate, the fee and supporting documents shall be forwarded no later than March 31st as provided in the instructions. Publicity may be released indicating that the candidate has been chosen. If selected delegate and alternate, due to circumstances beyond control, cannot attend the Girls State Session, a second alternate selected in the same manner shall attend to prevent forfeiture of the unit fee."

Are you ready for the question? Is there any discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: All those in favor, say aye.

ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Any opposed say no.
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: That motion has
carried.
GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: Code 18 reads as
follows: "Each application must be signed by the candidate, the unit chairman, and the school
representative. When two or more units sponsor one candidate, only one application form shall be
forwarded" -- I see what you mean now. I went on it --
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Yeah.
GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: I'm sorry. "The
unit responsible for processing the application shall sign
the forms and the co-sponsoring unit or units shall attach their name, number, and signature on a separate sheet so that proper recognition may be given."

The proposed changes shall read: "The contact sheet must be signed by the candidate, the unit chairman, and the school representative. When two or more units sponsor one candidate, only" -- oh, that's right. We
changed "contact sheet" to say "signature page."
"The signature page must be signed by the candidate, the unit chairman, and the school
representative. When two or more units sponsor one candidate, only one signature page shall be forwarded.

The unit responsible for processing the signature page shall sign the form and the co-sponsoring unit or student shall be attached their name, number, and signature on a separate sheet so that proper recognition may be given."
"Each application" is removed to say "signature sheet page."

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: By the direction of the Girls State committee, they have approved a code change, Code 18 to state: "The signature page must be signed by the candidate, the unit chairman, and the school representative. When two or more units sponsor one candidate, only one signature page shall be forwarded. The unit responsible for processing the signature page shall sign the form and the co-sponsoring unit or student shall be attached their name, number, and signature on a separate sheet so that proper recognition may be given." Is there any discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: All those in favor, say aye.

ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Any opposed say no.
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you. Motion
carried.
GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: Code 20A of --
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Linda, due to time and we have to go to lunch and we must have report by the Past Presidents' Parlay Chairman, would you please continue your report after the nominations this afternoon? GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: Sure.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you very much. You all hold that thought for Girls State and we'll finish with the code changes and her supplemental report. Thank you, Linda.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Now I'll call on our Past Presidents' Parlay Chairman Pilar Reyes. And we are okay because they needed a short delay anyway for us for lunch. So we're on time. Our secretary will drive provide a dribble after the report to tell us where we're going. If Sandy or Teresa Jacob is in the room, we need to see you as soon as possible.

## PAST PRESIDENTS' PARLEY REPORT

PAST PRESIDENTS' PARLEY CHAIRMAN REYES: Madam Commissioner, the Convention Committee on Past Presidents' Parley Program met on June 19th, 2014 in Room 208 of the Santa Clara Convention Center, Santa Clara, California.

The statistical report of this chairman appears on page 23 of the Book of Reports.

Joan Cannon of District 11 was appointed secretary, Vella Myers of District 27 offered prayer, and Emily Magwili of District 10 was appointed
Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 20 delegates answered roll call and there was one visitor present.

The committee agreed upon the following report: The meeting started with the opening ceremonies in the prepared agenda. The department code was read and the attached proposed change was made. Madam Department President, I would like to read the proposed change. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Please go ahead. PAST PRESIDENTS' PARLEY CHAIRMAN REYES: "The department" -- the current code reads: "The department Chairman will send out rules for Auxiliary Member of the Year competition. Entries will be submitted to the Department President for judging by the first Friday in May. The Department President shall notify the recipient by letter and send a copy of the letter and nomination to the Department Chairman. The Department Chairman shall notify the National Chairman, National Secretary, and Department Office prior to June 1st. The recipient will be honored at an appropriate function during the Department Convention. The Department Chairman will send an invitation to the recipient for the event where she will be honored and will notify her unit and district presidents of the honor extended their member as soon as possible. The Department Office will supply the recipient with housing forms and agenda for the National Convention where she will be honored. The recipient will be given mileage for attendance at the department function where she will be honored. She shall be given a ribbon similar to page's ribbon inscribed 'California' in the year she is honored. The ribbon shall be given to her whether or not she is able to attend a department function."

The proposed change to this code is -- it's only a simple one. A change in "Auxiliary" the to word "Unit." With the adoption, the first sentence of Past Presidents' Parley Article 13 will now read -- Madam President, for the essence of time? May I request that I will just read the first statement that's in bold.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: That's acceptable.
That's fine.
PAST PRESIDENTS' PARLEY CHAIRMAN REYES: It's
okay?
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: That's okay. PAST PRESIDENTS' PARLEY CHAIRMAN: "The
Department Chairman will send out rules for Unit Member of the Year competition." That is the only change, changing
"Auxiliary" to "Unit." And God bless you.
The rationale is we need to make this change for consistency and to confirm with the eligibility requirement specified in the rules that the applicant should not have achieved any elected or appointed leadership role beyond that of a Unit President. Auxiliary Member of the Year can be any member of different levels and may have achieved a leadership role beyond that of a Unit President which negates the eligibility requirement.

Madam President, I move the adoption of this
change.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you, Pilar. PAST PRESIDENTS' PARLEY CHAIRMAN REYES: By direction of the committee.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Yeah. Thank you. PAST PRESIDENTS' PARLEY CHAIRMAN REYES: I move for the adoption of this code. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you. It has been moved by the Girls -- I mean Girls State. I'm sorry. They're going to drive me crazy. By direction of the Past Presidents' Parley committee, the adoption for the change to Code 13 will read: "The Department Chairman will send out rules for Unit Member of the Year competition. Entries will be submitted to the Department President for judging by the first Friday in May. The Department President shall notify the recipient by letter and send a copy of the letter and nomination to the Department Chairman. The Department Chairman shall notify the National Chairman, National Secretary, and Department Office prior to June lst. The recipient will be honored at an appropriate function during the Department Convention. The Department Chairman will send an invitation to the recipient for the event where she will be honored and will notify her unit and district presidents of the honor extended their member as soon as possible. The Department Office will supply the recipient with housing forms and agenda for the National Convention where she will be honored. The recipient will be given mileage for attendance at the department function where she will be honored. She shall be given a ribbon similar to page's ribbon inscribed 'California' in the year she is honored. The ribbon shall be given to her whether or not she is able to attend a department function."

Is there any discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: All those in favor,
say aye.
ALL PRESENT: Aye. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Those opposed say
no.
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Motion carried for this code change to code 13. You can continue, Pilar.

PAST PRESIDENTS' PARLEY CHAIRMAN REYES: Thank you, Madam Commissioner.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Motion carried.
PAST PRESIDENTS' PARLEY CHAIRMAN REYES: It has been a pleasure and an enriching experience to serve under your command as the Department of California Past Presidents' Parley chairman.

The reports of all the 29 districts reflected the continuance of the Past Presidents' Parley in 54 units with a total of 1,379 members and formation of two new parleys. This chairman is very positive that there are more unreported parleys in our department with members doing outstanding jobs in the promotion of this program. Eighty-six units had Past Presidents' Parlay leaders who trained and encouraged new and seasoned members.

Congratulations to all our units and district Past Presidents' Parley chairmen for your unselfish support and for all you do in carrying out your responsibilities, mentorship, and encouragement to our Auxiliary members and recognition of our women veterans.

Nurse's scholarship: 110 units donated a total of $\$ 5,380$-- ignore this number because it has changed -to the Nurse's -- that's the minimum -- to the Nurse's Scholarship Fund reflecting strong support by units and members, but disappointingly, not many units participated in recruiting the applicants. Two deserving applicants were awarded $\$ 4,000$ for the winner and $\$ 2,000$ for the second recipient. Four applications were received, but two were disqualified. Three judges composed of two past department presidents and a professional nurse were appointed and provided with the rules/criteria for the selection. The decision was unanimous without any of them conferring with each other. Some units are giving their own scholarships in their own area -- where am I? Some units -- oh, okay.

Some units are giving their own scholarships in their area to local students ranging from \$100 to \$1,000. Units embark on various fundraisings and the proceeds were donated towards the Nurse's Scholarship Fund.

For Unit Member of the Year, 19 units honored and recognized their own Auxiliary Members of the Year within their units in so many ways, giving them flowers and various gifts, honoring them at surprise luncheon or dinner, reading their great accomplishments, presenting them with poppy corsages and gave Certificate of Appreciation at Unit general meetings. Fifteen units sent
applicants to the Department President for selection.
Now going to active duty servicemen, 61 units honored and recognized their own women veteran members. Some units assisted female veterans and their families who are suffering financially, as many are single mothers. Some members continue making monthly visits with their adopted veteran at Menlo Park VA facility, driving hundreds of miles, giving them clothing, gifts, and hygenic needs.

Forty units sought out active-duty servicewomen and 23 units celebrated the efforts and accomplishments of these women. Twenty-nine units adopted a woman veteran this year and 17 units signed up 25 new members who are veterans. One event selected a nominee for the Air Force branch of service and her nomination will be forwarded to National for judging.

The selfless involvement of our past presidents in all levels has a great impact on the development and growth of our organization. The support of our members raising funds in so many ways to enable them to give donations towards the Nurse's Scholarship and other projects of the program has been outstanding and will keep the Past Presidents' Parley growing stronger.

Thank you all for your hard work and support and for your tolerance to my persistence. Oh, I kept bugging all those districts.
(Applause.)
PAST PRESIDENTS' PARLEY CHAIRMAN REYES: You know I was just doing this to squeeze out all the good things that you do for our organization. Otherwise you will just put them aside and ignore them. So we have to give you recognition for your outstanding job.

Madam Commissioner, this concludes my report, and may I present the first place awards?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Yes, please do.
PAST PRESIDENTS' PARLEY CHAIRMAN REYES: For
first place district supplemental, the award goes to Tamara Bell, Chairman, District 29.
(Applause.)
PAST PRESIDENTS' PARLEY CHAIRMAN REYES: I have
to have a picture.
PUBLIC RELATIONS CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you very
much.
PAST PRESIDENTS' PARLEY CHAIRMAN REYES: Okay.
Thank you. Sorry I have to limp my way through. Okay. The first place unit supplemental goes to Lakewood Unit 496, District 19, and the winner is Mina Carrasco.
(Applause.)
PAST PRESIDENTS' PARLEY CHAIRMAN REYES: Oh, she is accepting for Mina Carrasco. Okay. Sorry, and this is

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for you and for your unit.
(Applause.)
PAST PRESIDENTS' PARLEY CHAIRMAN REYES: At this
time it is my honor and pleasure to present to you the
unit member of the year. Carol, aka Carrie, Taylor is

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: The -- if you have a discussion, you have to wait until I announce this. It has been moved that Code 26 be changed: "Applications must be submitted to the Department Chairman by deadline date of March 31. All fees to be sent to the department office."

Is there a discussion? The Chair recognizes
LuAnn Capazzi.
PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CAPAZZI: I believe we also said to add March 31 st to that sentence, that all the fees need to be in by March 31st.

GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: We did. Thank you. LuAnn is right. All fees to be sent to the department office by March 31st needs to be added.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Okay. So with that direction, the last sentence: "All fees to be sent to the department office by March 31st." Are there any questions?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: All those in favor, say aye.

ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Those opposed, say
no.
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Motion carried.
GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: Madam President, that concludes the department code changes.
(Applause.)
GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: Madam President, may
I continue with the supplemental report?
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: You could, but our Acting Secretary would like to amend the last code change because it's too redundant.

ACTING SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: Madam President, I would like to amend that last code change to read, and it's just merely getting March 31st in there one time rather than repeating it twice. And the proposed change would read: "Applications must be submitted to the Department Chairman and the fees to the -- all fees to the Department Office by deadline date of March 31st." We're putting too much 31st in there.

PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: No, I understand.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: We understand. PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: Let's make it application and fees.

ACTING SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: Yeah, it's just poorly worded. "Applications and fees must be submitted to the Department Chairman" --

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: No, because the fees go to the office. You were right the first time.

ACTING SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: Okay.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Okay.
ACTING SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: Is this my third strike or what. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: You can't strike
out.
ACTING SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: Please make it my third strike. "Applications must be submitted" -DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: To the department. ACTING SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: -- "to the Department Chairman and all fees sent to the Department Office by March 31st." Thank you. (Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: So it's been moved and seconded to change Girls State Code 26 to read: "Applications must be submitted to the Department Chairman and all fees to be sent to the Department Office by deadline date of March 31st."

Any discussion? Chair recognizes Liz Tomlin.
DELEGATE TOMLIN: Hi. Alyssa Tomlin, District
29. It's more of a question to Linda. Which code change was it that we were changing to the electronic application? I thought Anita said we were finished and I don't remember discussing it. No, it's not the signature page.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Excuse me, ladies.
Let me hear from the Chairman, Linda.
GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: The word
"electronic" doesn't appear in that. It says -- if I can find it. I believe it says website.

DELEGATE TOMLIN: That we submit it to the
website. I just don't remember us discussing that change. That's all -- that was my question. And I don't remember which code.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: It's not pertaining
to the motion we have.
DELEGATE TOMLIN: Okay. I'm sorry.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Okay. Are there any questions to the Code 26? Do you have a question?

DELEGATE KELLEY: Not on Code 26.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Okay. Are there any
questions to the motion for Code 26 ?

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(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: If there are none, all those in favor say aye.

ALL PRESENT: Aye
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Those opposed say
no.
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: That motion carried.
So now if you want to entertain another question to the chairman at this time.

DELEGATE KELLEY: Ann Kelley, District 12, Unit 83. We actually had a change to 20A which you skipped over and went to 20 E . And I'm not sure that $20 \mathrm{E}-\mathrm{I}$ Id like to hear $20 E$ repeated. I think there was an issue there. And then we haven't done 27 and there was a change there as well.

GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: I'm sorry. I must
have --
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: We did 20E. 20E we didn't -- we haven't done 20A yet.

GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: I thought we did read that.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Can you please do -you did not do 20A. You picked back up with $20 E$ and we didn't have a vote on 20A.

GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: 20A: "All required forms shall be forwarded with the application form including a brochure to the unit with instructions that all forms and applications together with the fee must be returned as provided in the instructions."

So Code 20A proposed changes. "All required" -the paragraph is to be deleted. It's to read: "All required forms and fees must be returned as provided in the instructions."

Madam Department President, by direction of the committee I move acceptance of this code change.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: By direction of the Girls State Committee, Code 20 A will read: "All required forms and fees must be returned and as provided in the instructions."

Is there any discussion on this code change?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: All those in favor, say aye.

ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Those opposed say
no.
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Motion carried.
GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: We did 20E, yes.

And I'm trying to see what it was on 27 that was changed. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Ann Kelley, did you understand Code $20 E$ that was changed? DELEGATE KELLEY: No, I don't understand it. I'd like you to read it again, please. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Okay. It reads as follows: "Has the responsibility of carefully checking and ensure that all questions are completely answered and required signatures have been obtained" -- I don't think this was done. This is a different one than what $I$ saw before.

I am going to request that the Girls State Committee, preconvention committee please meet -- you can go right outside the door, get together on these codes, make sure you have them all together correctly as voted in your meeting, and then chairman can bring back the ones that we have not taken care of.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you very much,
ladies. Okay. I have education. Michelle Soares, can you report now?

## EDUCATION REPORT

EDUCATION CHAIRMAN SOARES: Good afternoon, everybody. We're in the home stretch. The convention committee on Education met on June 19th in Room 207 of the Santa Clara Convention Center, Santa Clara, California. The statistical report of this chairman appears on page 19 of the Book of Reports. There is one correction to that. I incorrectly reported the number of districts reporting instead of units. And so where it says units reporting 28, it's actually districts. So I had 28, actually 29 all 29 actually showed up in the end, so that was good.

Wendy O'Brien from District 6 was appointed secretary, Mary Carolan from District 29 offered prayer, and Sheila Murray from District 23 was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 18 district delegates answered roll call. There were four visitors present. The committee agreed on the following report: The code was read and some $Q$ and $A$ followed. All second, third, 100 percent reporting and Give 10 to Education certificates were passed out in committee. If adopted there will be one code addition. It will be labeled number 14. "The Connie Settles Memorial Trust Scholarship shall be awarded annually to Senior Auxiliary members attending college whose membership dues are paid for the current and past three consecutive years. One scholarship up to $\$ 5,000$ shall be awarded annually and may include book stipends. The application," which I created and we

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will get to -- "E21S and rules for the scholarship will be mailed to all units and posted on the department website. 2014."

With the addition -- if adopted, with the addition of this code all other code numbers will be renumbered accordingly. By the direction of the committee, I move to accept the following code addition.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: By direction of the education committee, following code addition. Number 14: "The Connie Settles Memorial Trust Scholarship shall be awarded annually to senior Auxiliary members attending college whose membership dues are paid for current and past three consecutive years. One scholarship up to $\$ 5,000$ shall be awarded annually and may include book stipends. The application E21S and rules for the scholarship will be mailed to all units and posted on the department website."

Are there any questions on this motion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: All those in favor,
say aye.
ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Those opposed say
no.
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you. The
motion carried.
EDUCATION CHAIRMAN SOARES: Madam President, this concludes my committee report. May I continue with my supplemental?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Yes, you may.
EDUCATION CHAIRMAN SOARES: Madam Department
President, the ladies of the Department of California have done an outstanding job implementing the education program objectives into their unit activities. Education is the cornerstone of our future and this chairman believes in order to be effective we must educate our youth on this great organization, our programs as a whole, and membership when it's applicable.

In order to achieve these goals, I distributed bulletins to the district and unit chairmen containing the national organization's objectives along with scholarship applications for both National and our department scholarships available. I also distributed the how-to guides provided by National on how to implement and be successful within certain programs such as the Give 10 program and how to find military children within our schools.

Give 10 to Education is very popular. At the time of the writing of this report it was 78 , but it
turned out to be 83 units that 10,935 items have been donated to date at a value of $\$ 19,143.85$. It was stated that this is -- that does deserve applause.
(Applause.)
EDUCATION CHAIRMAN SOARES: It was stated that this is one of the easiest ways to participate within the Education program especially in the smaller units. Fifty units also have chosen to make monetary donations directly to schools ranging in amounts from $\$ 50$ to $\$ 2,000$. The total amount donated for the year is $\$ 10,238$ to date. This helps the schools with individual projects they may not have the money for otherwise.

As we all know, teachers are spending their own money to fund their classrooms and the direct donations help ease this burden in small and in some cases big ways. Sixty-three units sought out local opportunities, built scholarships in 146 schools. Counselors were given scholarship brochures, Need A Lift CD, and scholarship applications.

California offers two main scholarships under the Education program. The Educational Assistance For High School Seniors and that Our Children of Veterans heading to college within California and continuing reentry assistance for people continuing their college experience or who are reentering after a hiatus. The reason I bring this up is because $I$ had the displeasure of turning away several applications because the applicants were not the child of a veteran, but rather a grandchild or great grandchild. Reading the rules in their entirety is a must and no exceptions should be made. Rather, asking questions so that the child can be directed to the proper scholarship application and not be disappointed or rejected is an easier alternative than, you know, some poor simp like me writing a letter.

Yeah, and I bring that up because I did have to do that and because the deadlines had passed for the other scholarships they found out that they were eligible.

So anyway, a total of 28 units participated in American Education Week doing various things. Several units reported that they donated fruit baskets and homemade treats to the staff of local schools. One unit reported that they read and gave books to students at a local elementary school. However, most units promoted the scholarship programs available by handing out brochures and talking with students directly.

The most exciting thing, $I$ think, is that 28 units have gotten excited and involved in the Veterans in the Classroom Project. These units reported that a whooping 285 veterans talked with students in 37 schools from first grade through college. The children and young
adults were allowed to interview the veterans after their initial presentations. Some of these interviews and assemblies have lasted more than three hours. The list of age appropriate questions were handed out to teachers as well as to the children.

Twenty-seven units assisted and supported 1,265 veterans pursuing higher or vocational education. This support came in various ways such as tutoring, providing a food pantry for those studying away from home and financial support in undisclosed amounts.

Literacy is so important, but surprisingly is still a problem in American schools. Twenty-three units participated in literacy programs. We have two women who volunteer as ESL teachers, many tutor young children and teenagers in reading and donate books to reading programs. Excuse me.

One unit donates patriotic books and presidential bookmarks and then holds a contest to see who can remember the most presidents. They make it fun for the kids while they're learning. Several women read to young children and -- sorry. And stress the importance of reading and understanding what they read. Units have created or already had in place their own scholarship programs. Sixty-five units gave out 121 scholarships totaling -- are you ready for this one? -- $\$ 60,190$.
(Applause.)
EDUCATION CHAIRMAN SOARES: That -- that is an average of almost $\$ 500$ per student. Plus 22 units gave out book stipends totaling $\$ 2,814$. What a tremendous accomplishment for the units of California. Eight districts also reported -- eight districts also reported that they have their own program and gave $\$ 3,435$ in scholarships this year.

One hundred units supported the Education program by purchasing $\$ 2,226$ worth of poppy seals. Of the units reporting, 127 of them donated a total of $\$ 4820$ to the Department of California Education Fund. That is the number that $I$ have today anyway.

Members are still actively clipping Box Tops For Education and donating to their own local schools. Those schools also are very appreciative and many letters saying -- by the units in California for helping them with their ongoing commitment to helping the schools. To date, more than 15,000 Box Tops have been donated this year. One unit holds a teacher appreciation day in May where the Auxiliary sends invitations to every teacher and administrator and holds a reception for them. They feed them finger foods and drinks and they also take the opportunity to inform the teachers and administrators about the scholarships available, find out what the
schools need, as well as talk about the Americanism contest. This unit has been hosting this event for more than 20 years and the average attendance is approximately one hundred and many times the attendance has topped 150 teachers and administrators. This is all done free of charge including drinks, if they so desire, as a way of thanking them for all they do for our young people.

National scholarships were promoted and
applications were read. I'm proud to say that a spirited young scholarship was won by a young woman from California named Kyley Warther who was sponsored by Unit 277. She won a $\$ 5,000$ scholarship from National.
(Applause.)
EDUCATION CHAIRMAN SOARES: Entries have always been received for most outstanding American Education Week and most outstanding literacy program. Winners will be forwarded to the appropriate committee members and hopefully California will have one or two more national winners. But there are no losers as far as I'm concerned. As true winners are the children of veterans and the veterans themselves along with all the other students and teachers our Auxiliary members have helped with their educational needs along the way.

This concludes my report. May I continue with my first place awards?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Please do.
EDUCATION CHAIRMAN SOARES: Someone is telling me
that they didn't get their Give 10 certificates. I will say that I have some to get out, but it's because your districts didn't list the unit numbers on the form. So I asked at the committee meeting to slip me notes. I hope everyone got my -- they did get my notes. I can see them standing over there.

The first award I'm going to give and was forwarded to National for further competition is most outstanding literacy program. And that went to Inyo Unit 118, Danielle White chairman.
(Applause.)
EDUCATION CHAIRMAN SOARES: Danielle is on an Alaskan cruise, so we have Vella Myers, the district president. Thank you.
(Applause.)
EDUCATION CHAIRMAN SOARES: Most outstanding
American Education Week program goes to Bradley Keffer Unit 138, Kim Vincent, Chairman, District 30. This report was also forwarded to National for further competition. (Applause.)
EDUCATION CHAIRMAN SOARES: Best overall district supplemental report goes to District 29, Carol Grosspoint, chairman.

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(Applause.)
EDUCATION CHAIRMAN SOARES: Cheryl Neiffer is accepting on her behalf. These ladies worked really hard and I'll tell you the truth it was really, really difficult to whittle all of these report supplementals down to, you know, what was going to get what.
Outstanding best overall unit report I have a little bit of a problem here because $I$ had two really great ones and so I broke up the tie in an unusual way, and I'll get to that in one second.

The best overall unit report standard issue goes to John M. Armitage Unit 684, LuAnn Capazzi, chairman, District 27.
(Applause.)
EDUCATION CHAIRMAN SOARES: The other report it
was -- it was a phenomenal read, I have to tell you, but it was really -- I created an award because I'm the chairman and I can do that. It's the best department themed unit report. And first place goes to Jackie Robinson Unit 252, Sheila Mary, Chairman. District 23. (Applause.) EDUCATION CHAIRMAN SOARES: A little bird told me
this is your first convention. DELEGATE MARY: Yes, it is. EDUCATION CHAIRMAN SOARES: Now you have to come
back.
DELEGATE MARY: Yes, so I see. EDUCATION CHAIRMAN SOARES: You have to defend your title.

DELEGATE MARY: Okay. Okay. Thank you so much. EDUCATION CHAIRMAN SOARES: Madam President, thank you for this appointment and that concludes my report. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you so much, Michelle. Next we'll hear from our Auxiliary Emergency Fund, little Rhodona Enright.

Hello. The convention committee on Auxiliary Emergency Fund met on June 19th, 2014 in Room 201 of the Santa Clara Convention Center, Santa Clara, California. The statistical report of the Chair appears in the Book of Reports.

Barbara Knight, District 18 , was appointed secretary. Earleen Paige, District 23, offered prayer, and Maria Lopez, District 6 was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 23 district delegates answered roll call. There were eight visitors present.

The committee agreed on the following report: The code was read and the following change was recommended. Code 6 currently reads: "Units wanting to submit an application for an eligible member shall request forms from the Department Headquarters."

The proposed Code 6 will read: "Units wanting to submit an application for an eligible member can obtain a copy of the application on the department or national website, websites. A copy can also be obtained from the Department Chairman."

Madam Department President, by direction of the committee $I$ move acceptance of this code change.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Any opposed, say no. (No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Motion carries. AUXILIARY EMERGENCY FUND CHAIRMAN ENRIGHT: Thank
you.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: You have that right. AUXILIARY EMERGENCY FUND CHAIRMAN ENRIGHT:
Certificates for 100 percent reporting were presented in committee. Second place awards for best supplemental at district and unit levels were also presented in committee. A complete list of awards will be posted outside the secretary's office.

Madam President, this concludes the report of the Auxiliary Emergency Fund Committee meeting and I move for its acceptance.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: You may continue. AUXILIARY EMERGENCY FUND CHAIRMAN ENRIGHT: You don't need a motion to accept my report?

AUXILIARY EMERGENCY FUND CHAIRMAN ENRIGHT: Units and districts got on board to help provide for our members in need. They held bake sales, offered baskets for raffles, held luncheons, dinners, and dances. Several district chairmen collected funds at each district meeting and held drawings awarding small gifts. Chairmen talked about the importance of this program and its benefits at
their meetings. Many put articles in their unit post bulletins. Our members filed 13 applications for assistance at the unit level. I know of at least one received help from National. Great job, ladies.

Our units and districts responded distributing more than $\$ 8519$. That's not bad when you consider that only about 35 percent of our units actually made a donation. That is according to the department records. It is extremely important and $I$ know we did something earlier to make this code change, but stay with me for a minute. It is extremely important to make your donations to the department according to Code 3, the check payable to National, then mailed to department. Can you imagine what would happen if every unit donated something? And remember, every dollar counts.

I am very proud of our members for their hard work and dedication to this most worthwhile program. Remember, the Auxiliary Emergency Fund is members helping other members.

Now for our first place winners for unit and district supplementals. And I will apologize. My gifts are at home but $I$ will be able to get that to you in the next week. Best unit supplement goes to George Tadlock Unit 472, Chairman Lou Thompson.

AUXILIARY EMERGENCY FUND CHAIRMAN ENRIGHT: And the best district supplemental was for Crystal Romo-Reyes, District 19.

DISTRICT 19: Go 19.
AUXILIARY EMERGENCY FUND CHAIRMAN ENRIGHT: Thank
you. Madam Department President Anita, thank you for this appointment and for the opportunity to continue my learning experience and thank you for the opportunity to serve you and our department. Madam Department President, that concludes my report.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you, so much, Rhodona, for accepting the position. You did a great job.

And as Loretta Marsh right now makes her way, would the Editor Estella Avina and Gloria Williams please come to the stage for your reports. Is there -- if you want to make any statement or have a question, any delegates, you'll have to come to the microphone. You can go ahead, Loretta.

We had a total of 14 district delegates answering roll call and two visitors.

The department code was read and no code changes were recommended. All certificates and awards were presented in committee except first place supplements. Discussion followed to share what units are doing to have a successful and productive National Security program.

## MEMBERSHIP REPORT

MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WILLIAMS: Yes. Madam President, may $I$ make a request? I would like a few of the Membership support team members to come on up. If Dorothy could come up if she's here. Cheryl, you don't have to come. And Barbara LaDoucer.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Come on, y'all
better wake up now. This is Membership. We'll rock you.
MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WILLIAMS: Madam President,
the Convention Committee on Membership met on June 19th, 2014 in the Santa Clara Convention Center, Santa Clara California. The statistical report of this chairman appears on page 22. Joyce Patton, District 23, was appointed secretary, Susan Mar, District 6, offered prayer, and Diana Livas, District 19, was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. There were 16 districts with 100 percent reporting. District $2,4,6,7,9,10,11,19$, 23, 24, 25, 26, 27, 28, 29, 30 .
(Applause.)
MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WILLIAMS: Very good. A
total of 26 district delegates answered roll call. There were 13 visitors present. Madam President Anita Biggs was our special guest. She presented her February and March Madness awards.

The committee agreed upon the following report: The code was read and there was one change. Under National awards, the National President's Citation has not been recognized by the National organization for many years. After a brief discussion, the Chair did entertain a motion. I would like to read at this time the way the code was written and then you will know what the change actually is under the National Award. That's page 51. "The National President's Citation shall be awarded to units who have reached their membership goals set by the department and dues have been transmitted by the department office to National Headquarters prior to January 31st, provided National makes no changes in the basis for the National Citation. The deadline date for the department office to transmit to National shall be four days earlier than the date set by National, that is January 27th."

It was moved by Joyce Patton, Unit 252 , District 23, seconded by Linda Schultz, Unit 21, District 6, and carried by the delegation to delete under the membership code national awards National President's Citation.

By the direction of the membership convention committee, I move for the acceptance of this code change.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: By the direction of the Membership committee, they have moved to delete under the Membership code national awards national citation -let me read it. National -- it was read by the chairman. So the motion is to completely delete the code or that section of the code, that section of the code. And it's not numbered. There's no number to that code. It's under national awards and it's regarding the National
President's Citation awarding units. It's obsolete, in other words.

MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WILLIAMS: Yes.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Is there any
discussion on this motion?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: All those in favor,
say aye.
ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Those opposed say
no.
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Motion carried.
Thank you.
MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WILLIAMS: 100 percent
reporting was given to the districts that were present and second and three place awards and honorable mention, top senior recruiter, Pier Warmuth, Unit 328 , top Junior recruiter, Cindy Mayfield, Unit 716 , and we had two Silver Brigade winners, Glenda Schultz, Unit 521, District 6, and Sheridan Greene, Unit 496, District 19.
(Applause.)
MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WILLIAMS: Group ABC District Shoot Out contest winners. Department president "February Fever." March Madness contest winners received awards during the meeting. A complete list will be posted in the department office at the conclusion of this report.

Madam Department President, this concludes the
Membership committee meeting report. Closing prayer was given by acting Chaplain Susan Mar. Meeting adjourned at 11:20 a.m. Madam Department President, may I continue with my supplemental?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Yes, you may.
MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WILLIAMS: When it was
declared that California Membership teams were playing for the gold, it was impossible to know the amount of creativeness and the tenacity they would bring to the Membership program. Membership was worked by all units reporting in conjunction with our Auxiliary major programs. Eighty-eight units reached 100 percent plus and 51 units will receive the Josie Melgard award. Only 16 units out of 26 reporting had 100 percent reporting. I would encourage all districts and unit chairmen to read very carefully the guidelines, instructions, and dates before submitting year-end reports and supplementals.

We are at 23,671 members strong, that's as of June the 11th, 2014. I hope this increased. We are a force to be reckoned with and still growing. This game isn't over, team. National's goals is to have one million strong Auxiliary members by the year 2019 in celebration of our centennial.

Many districts use pictorial basketball boards at their meeting to visually track their units and their percentage ratings. Members delighted in seeing what units were scoring slam dunks and what units were still dribbling. Some districts had set up races within their districts to encourage units in reaching 100 percent goal. Unit members have used the telephone, the Internet, personal contact to gather renewals. Some of our units had to find their key shots, but once they did, they were hitting three pointers and making goals. Other units hosted welcome teas for its members. One unit offered a free one-year membership to members that renewed by a certain date. Another unit member recruited 328 members. California has two Silver

Brigade entries which we have sent to National.
Several districts reported providing one-on-one training to their unit chairmen. To keep the flow of information moving, they shared all department member bulletins with units. Units are promoting the ALAMIS with personal contact to units effectively providing a new avenue for better communicative techniques. These chairmen truly understand what it means to pass it on.

Another unit held its early bird membership drive in conjunction with its Post and Sons of the American Legion last October. This drive was well attended and the unit collected over $\$ 1,000$ in dues. Other units held joint membership drives with great success. One unit hosts a dinner each year for its new members and recognize their senior members. The importance of members feeling valued is the only way we're going to retain them.

Diversity within our units has been encouraged by the National and Department. One unit who had previously been on probation was able to turn its unit around by recruiting female roller derby skaters, wrestlers, entertainers, and professional women. The unit was on probation and now has reached 120 percent, holding the highest unit percentage in its district.

Teamwork between units inspire and motivates all of California's members to play for the gold toward reaching that one million membership base by 2019. I would like to thank the Membership support team. Some of them are behind me now. I have Barbara LaDoucer, Ms. Dorothy, and there you are, Rosalie. These ladies have been tremendous.
(Applause.)
MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WILLIAMS: Madam
Commissioner, this concludes my supplemental report and as this head coach thanks you for allowing me to serve the Department of California in shooting H.O.O.P.S. for you. May I continue with the first place department awards? DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Yes, you may. MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN WILLIAMS: I need some music. You have to give me. Thank you, ladies and I thank all of you for lining up. Many of you will need to remain even after this award. I'm going to start with the first place unit supplemental in a group. Group A, which is 10 to 700 members, first place goes to George Tadlock Unit 472, District 26.
