CHAPLAIN CHRISTENSEN: Let us pray. Let us pray. As we continue our convention, we thank you for your blessing and seek your guidance in our work. Give us strength and ability to accomplish the tasks before us. Help us be mindful of service that we may render to our veterans and their families. Amen.

ALL PRESENT: Amen.
PRESIDENT BIGGS: The Department Americanism Chairman Diana Moreno will now lead us in the Pledge of Allegiance.

## PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

ALL PRESENT: I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and to the republic for which it stands, one nation under God, indivisible, with Liberty and Justice for all.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Linda, are you all
ready?
DISTINGUISHED GUEST CHAIRMAN WORKMAN: Sure.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Will the
Sergeant-at-Arms and Marshal, along with the Distinguished Guest Chairman, please escort from the Palo Alto Veterans Administration Medical Center Tommy Fitzgerald, the deputy director, a 16-year veteran, and a life-time American Legion member to the station.
(Processional.)
MR. FITZGERALD: Okay. Okay. I see I finally got a chance to see everybody. So, first of all, I want to thank everybody for inviting me here this morning and also for giving us this great gift that we're getting ready to receive from the -- oh, I'm sorry. Can you hear me now? I'm a little bit short, so I've got to come down.

So, yeah, I want to thank everybody for inviting me here and also thank you for inviting us to receive this very, very heartwarming gift that we're going to get from

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the Auxiliary today. We're doing great things at the VA Palo Alto. We invite everybody to come out and visit. And I tell you, it's very heartfelt. I served this country for 16 years myself in the United States Army. (Applause.)
MR. FITZGERALD: Thank you. And I continue to serve. I wanted to tell the Auxiliary members also thank you for your service. We are -- I mean, if you come see our hospital, I mean, we have two billion dollars' worth of construction going. We're taking care of 67,000 veterans every day. We have 11 sites of care. So we provide care all the way from Sonora to Monterey. That's where our footprint is. And we couldn't meet our mission without our VSO help, our partners. You know, I was talking to Al in the back, we've got to continue to have partnerships such as this to make it better and whole again.

So again, I really, really appreciate it. I
thank you. I hope you guys have a wonderful, wonderful convention. And keep doing great things and helping us help each other and taking care of those who serve, their widows, and their orphans. Thank you again.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: We just so happen to have in our -- at our convention making her official visit to California from our own state, our National President Nancy Brown-Park. I would like to introduce her. I have one of your pins I'm going to give to Mr. Fitzgerald. This is her pin and I'm going to have you -- I'm going to have you and Nancy and our National Executive Committee Woman Terry Mikesell, she's our past president. She will be making a presentation to you at that station. Thank you very much for coming.

MR. FITZGERALD: Thank you.
NEC CHAIRMAN MIKESELL: Anyway, while Nancy is doing her thing back there, as you ladies know, my special project was the families of support while the warriors are receiving service at Palo Alto. And to your generosity or from your generosity, the check I'm presenting today is \$14, 291. 21 .
(Applause.)
NEC CHAIRMAN MIKESELL: With all the love and blessing, here is a check. And I thank you for coming on your day off to accept it.

MR. FITZGERALD: Thank you.
NEC CHAIRMAN MIKESELL: Thank you, sir.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Terry, can you
repeat the last thing you said? Can you just repeat just the last thing that you said? 14,000 --

NEC CHAIRMAN MIKESELL: 14,291.15. Thank you,
ladies.
(Applause.)
NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: So I had the opportunity to visit your hospital and it's absolutely incredible.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Can't hear you. NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: Okay. Can you
hear me now?
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: We need to turn the microphones up, whoever is in charge.

NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: So we want to
thank you for all that you do for our veterans and we want to thank you for your service to our country and for your life service in the Legion. And I want you to have one of our --

MR. FITZGERALD: Thank you, Ms. Brown.
NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: Thank you.
(Processional.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you, Tommy.
Will the Sergeant-at-Arms and Marshal with the
Distinguished Guest Chairman please escort to this station
the National Executive Committeeman from the State of
California, Mr. Al Lennox.
(Processional.)
NEC COMMITTEEMAN LENNOX: Good morning.
NEC CHAIRMAN MIKESELL: Good morning, sir.
NEC COMMITTEEMAN LENNOX: Please -- the Reverend
Billy Graham had a speaking engagement and his chauffeur
came to his house to pick him up. And he felt like driving. Of course, it's long past since he's had a driver's license, but his chauffeur said, "Sure, Mr. Graham, if you want to drive."

So the reverend was driving down the freeway and a young CHP just out of the academy pulled him over. And he came up to the window and Reverend Graham rolled down the window and the young officer said, "Excuse me."

He went back to his car, and he called in. He said, "Sergeant, I can't give this man a ticket." And he said, "Well, wait a minute. You were told
in the academy there's no favoritism."
And he said, "Well, sarge, I can't give him a
ticket."
And he says, "Well, who is he? Is he the mayor?"
"No. He's higher than that."
"Is he the -- is he the governor?"
"No, he's higher than that."
"Is he the president of the United States?"
"No, he's higher than that."
"Well, who the heck is he?" He said, "Well, it must be Jesus because he's got

Reverend Billy Graham as his chauffeur."
(Applause.)
NEC COMMITTEEMAN LENNOX: Thank you for having me this morning. Madam National President, Madam State President, ladies, thank you for having me. I'll start off with thank you, thank you, thank you and thank you for what you do. The world is changing. America is changing and many of those core values are being lost in that change. And it is our job and our responsibility as members of the American Legion, the American Legion Auxiliary to make sure that we remember those changes and that we remember the heritage of our forefathers and forewomen.

Americanism, the four pillars that we honor so greatly. We need to remember Americanism. We need to remember our children and youth, our national security, and our primary function, taking care of our veterans and their families. That's a big job in this day and age, but I am absolutely sure that the American Legion and the American Legion Auxiliary can make it happen and make a difference in this country.

I firmly believe that without our organization and what we do, there would be a hole in America today. There would be a void that could not be filled. I believe that.
(Applause.)
NEC COMMITTEEMAN LENNOX: And you make it happen. You make it happen every day at your local units, districts, areas, and right here now. And I salute you for that.

Just a quick summary of my two years. I am
terming out in August at the national organization. My goal was to do two things well, and that was to professionally represent California and then to communicate up and down this state what was going on back at the national organization. In all humility, I think I've accomplished my goals.

When I left, I had several past national -- well, more than several past national banners and the national judge advocate ask me, "It's too bad you guys can't run again." And that was a very, very nice compliment. So obviously my goal to be professional at all times paid off a little bit.

We had great challenges back at the national organization. Some of the things we did, we revitalized our membership plan. Don't forget; we're coming up on a hundred years. We need to work on that. We couldn't help losing the greatest generation, but now as that generation passes, it's time to take the gauntlet up and move forward.

We revitalized our financial reporting back at National to make sure it was more current with today's financial needs. And $I$ think the largest thing we did in the last two years was we restructured and revitalized all our commissions and committees. Many of them were antiquated, many of them were not germane to today's society, and we were lacking in some areas also. We took a hard look at that. We made some good changes and I think we will better serve those four pillars in the years to come.

You know, the largest issue pending right now is the VA. We've heard about it. It's in the news every day. The American Legion is the largest watchdog of that organization, the $V A$, of any other organization in the world.
(Applause.)
NEC COMMITTEEMAN LENNOX: We talked several years ago about the status and the condition of the VA and we made some recommendations to the Veterans Administration in Washington. And then we stepped back and just waited to see if any of those implementations came to fruition. They didn't, and that's when the American Legion came to the conclusion that we needed a change of leadership at the VA. It broke our heart, but we recommended that General Shinseki be removed. We were the first and I believe still the only veterans organization to support that. And then of course it came to fruition.

It needed to happen. The VA needed to shape up. The VA needs to be looked at hard and we need to make sure that they are providing the care that our veterans and their families so greatly need. There is legislation back in Washington. The senate committee on Veterans Affairs under the leadership of John McCain has come up with several ideas. One of the ideas is if you need to see a doctor and you can't make an appointment within a certain time frame, you can go to a private physician.
(Applause.)
NEC COMMITTEEMAN LENNOX: If you need a procedure done and you can't get it done within a time period, you can go to a private physician.
(Applause.)
NEC COMMITTEEMAN LENNOX: This new legislation pending gives the ability to fire administrators that don't do their job.
(Applause.)
NEC COMMITTEEMAN LENNOX: It also allows for private primary care for veterans that live outside of the catchment area of a VA facility. So if you're out in Nevada or if you're somewhere that is not near a VA facility, it will allow you to go to a private facility to
get the care you need.
(Applause.)
NEC COMMITTEEMAN LENNOX: Our generation, yours and mine, we're making a difference. We're making a difference. Believe it, we're making a difference. When the American Legion walks in, they know we're here. They know we're here and they know we mean business and they know we care.

I guess the best way I could put it is the best thing we can do for our generation is to leave the organization and the country a better place than when we started.

Ladies and gentlemen, it has been my honor to serve as National Executive Committeeman for the American Legion. It has been my honor to serve next to Nancy Brown-Park. Or not next to her. Below her.
(Applause.)
NEC COMMITTEEMAN LENNOX: Only -- I won't touch it. I'll leave it alone. I'm sorry. I'm just a guy, you know. Quick story about Nancy. Years ago, if I may, when we used to walk the houses of Congress in Legislative Week back in Washington, a small select group, and Nancy was part of that group, we used to pick a house and we would start at the top floor. And if you've ever been back to Washington, you know that the state flag flies in front of each office. Well, instead of just going to our own representatives, we would start at the top floor and walk down the halls. And every office that had a California flag on it, we went in. We went in. And I'm timid. Some of the other guys were timid. But not Nancy. If we didn't see the chief of staff or the elected representative, she was in their face. And she put her foot in the door many times. They're scared to death of that lady.
(Applause.)
NEC COMMITTEEMAN LENNOX: Thank you again for what you do. I truly mean from the bottom of my heart that you are the salt of the earth and this right here is the greatest organization in the world.
(Applause.)
NEC COMMITTEEMAN LENNOX: I will leave -- I will end with again thank you. It's been my honor, and if there's anything that $I$ could ever do or you could do for me. Well, I understand we have a run, rock and roll. Or Walk, Rock \& Roll. Oh, oh, I forgot to date it. I'm sorry. This is June. Hang on. Hang on. '14. What year? I would like to donate to your Walk, Rock \& Roll \$1,000.

long as you want to. Joan Cannon. Where you at? Come get this.

NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: Madam President, quickly I want to thank you, Al. It's been fun serving you. ## CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS REPORT

CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: Thank
you. The convention committee on Constitution \& Bylaws met on June 19th, 2014 in Room 212 of the Santa Clara Convention Center, Santa Clara, California.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Excuse me, Harriet.

I'm so sorry. Are you going to do the second reading first? Oh, I'm sorry. Go ahead. I didn't know. CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: Thank you. Met on June 19th, 2014 in Room 212 of the Santa Clara Convention Center, Santa Clara, California. The statistical report for this chairman appears on page 18 of the Book of Reports.

Norma DuVall, District 18, was appointed secretary, Pilar Reyes, District 10, offered prayer. And Rosalie Taylor, District 14 was appointed
Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 19 district delegates answered roll call. There were seven visitors present. The committee agreed upon the following report:
The code was read and the following code change. 6A now reads: "When rewriting the unit bylaws, two complete sets (including five original signature pages) are required for submission to the Department Chairman. Three original signature pages will be returned to the unit after the Department President signs them. The original signature pages are to be attached to three copies of the new Constitution \& Bylaws. One set is to be retained by the Unit Constitution \& Bylaws Chairman. One set to the District President. One set to the District Constitution \& Bylaws. It is recommended that the Unit Secretary also maintain a set of these bylaws."

The new code will read: "When rewriting the unit bylaws, two complete sets (including five signature pages) are required for submission to the Department Chairman. Three signature pages will be returned to the unit after the Department President signs them. The signature pages are to be attached to three copies of the new unit Constitution \& Bylaws. One set is to be retained by the Unit Constitution \& Bylaws Chairman. One set to the District President. One set to the District Constitution \& Bylaws Chairman. And it is recommended that the Unit Secretary also maintain a set of these bylaws."

By direction of the preconvention Constitution \& Bylaws committee, $I$ move for the acceptance of this code change.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: There is a motion to change code number 6A by the Constitution \& Bylaws committee. The new code will read: "When rewriting the unit bylaws, two complete sets (including five signature pages) are required for submission to the Department Chairman. Three signature pages will be returned to the unit after the Department President signs them. The signature pages are to be attached to three copies of the new unit Constitution \& Bylaws. One set is to be retained by the Unit Constitution \& Bylaws Chairman. One set to the District President. One set to the District

Constitution \& Bylaws Chairman. And it is recommended that the Unit Secretary also maintain a set of these bylaws."

Is there any discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Hearing none, all
those in favor say aye.
ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Those opposed say
no?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Motion carried. CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: Thank
you. Second 6B now reads: "When district bylaws are rewritten, two complete sets, including four original signature pages are required for submission to the Department Chairman."

The new code will read: "When district bylaws are rewritten, two complete sets, including four signature pages are required for submission to the Department Chairman."

By direction of the preconvention Constitution \& Bylaws committee, $I$ move for the acceptance of this code change.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: There is a motion by the Constitution \& Bylaws committee to change code 6B to: "When district bylaws are rewritten, two complete sets, including four signature pages are required for submission to the Department Chairman."

Is there any discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: All those in favor, say aye.

ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Those opposed say
no.
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Motion carries. CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: Thank you. The resolutions were read as following. Article $V$, Section 13 now reads: "Endorsement for National Office. All members seeking National Office shall be endorsed at a Department Convention by a majority vote not more than two years prior to the date they are to be a candidate for office. Vote shall be by ballot."

If adopted it will read: "Endorsement for National Office. All members seeking National Office shall be endorsed at a Department Convention by a majority vote not more than two years prior to the date they are to be a candidate for office. Vote shall be by viva voce

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unless there is more than one candidate, then election shall be by ballot."

The rationale is there is no reason to have a ballot vote when there is only one candidate.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: One second. Madam
Chairman, could you amend your motion to take out the word
"election" and change that word to "endorsement"? Since it's not an election, we're just endorsing the National candidate, we're not electing her. We will be voting to endorse one over the other, so it's still a vote to endorse. It's not a vote to electing anyone. We're just endorsing them. I was asking her to amend, but if there's any discussion, she didn't make a motion to do that. So change it. There's a discussion on that, on my request? Did you want to --

CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: By the direction of the preconvention -- okay. Sorry. By the direction of the preconvention committee on Constitution \& Bylaws, I move for the acceptance of this emergency resolution.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: I'm sorry. Did you
change it to endorsement?
CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: No, I
haven't. Okay. How about this: "If adopted:
Endorsement for National Office. All members seeking National Office shall be" --

PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: No. You would need to go back to committee if you're going to change it. So just move to accept what you read.

CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: I move to accept what $I$ read. I move for the acceptance of the resolution.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: There is a motion to -- a motion by the preconvention committee meeting to accept the change to Article V, Section 13 of the constitution to read: "All members seeking National Office shall be endorsed at a Department Convention by a majority vote not more than two years prior to the date they are to be candidate for office. Vote shall be by viva voce unless there is more than one candidate then election shall be by ballot."

Is there any discussion? The Chair recognizes the National President Nancy Brown-Park. NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: Nancy Brown-Park, National President. My concern is as to two years prior. As a national candidate for National President, once you reach Children \& Youth is when we start to campaign and we truly needed those three years to raise the amount of money we needed for the campaign. So my recommendation would be that it is three years prior to the date.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Are you moving to amend?

NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: I move to amend to three years instead of two. That was good, Terry. Thanks.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Go ahead and get it out, Madam President.

NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: So it would read: "All members seeking National Office shall be endorsed at a Department Convention by a majority vote not more than three years prior to the date they are to be a candidate for the office. Vote shall be by viva voce unless there is more than one candidate, then election shall be by ballot."

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: There is a motion to amend all members -- it's been moved and seconded. "All members seeking National Office shall be endorsed at a Department Convention by a majority vote not more than three years prior to the date they are to be a candidate for the office. Vote shall be by viva voce unless there is more than one candidate, then election shall be by ballot."

Is there any discussion on the amendment?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: All those in favor,
say aye.
AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Oh, I'm sorry.
HOSPITAL REP TAYLOR: I was standing as tall as I
could.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: The Chair recognizes
Rosalie Taylor.
HOSPITAL REP TAYLOR: Rosalie Taylor, District
14. I think that this should read: "All members seeking National Office shall be endorsed at a Department
Convention by a majority vote not more than three years
prior to the date they are to be a candidate for office. Vote shall be viva voce unless there is more than one candidate, then endorsement shall be by the ballots."

NEC CHAIRMAN MIKESELL: Second.
PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: No, you've got to
take care of the --
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: I'm speaking on the amendment to three years.

HOSPITAL REP TAYLOR: Okay. I'll back off.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Then I'll entertain another amendment. Is there any discussion on the amendment for three years? You're a delegate and would you like to speak on this amendment?

DELEGATE RISNER: On this resolution.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: On the -- just the amendment?

DELEGATE RISNER: Yes. Good morning, Madam President. My name is Heather Risner. I'm from 24, Unit 43. I just wanted to suggest the word "election" be changed to "vote."

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: We are going to discuss that later. We're talking about the three years only right now. We're talking about the three years amendment. Okay? Any further discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Hearing none, all
those in favor, say aye.
ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Those opposed say
no.
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: You've amended the
motion. Now the Chair will recognize Rosalie Taylor.
HOSPITAL REP TAYLOR: Okay. Madam President, Rosalie Taylor, District 14. I propose that we amend the endorsement for National Office to: "All members seeking National Office shall be endorsed at a Department Convention by a majority vote not more than three years prior to the date they are to be a candidate for office. Vote shall be by viva voce unless there is more than one candidate, then endorsement shall be by ballot."

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Would you do that in
the form of a motion please?
HOSPITAL REP TAYLOR: I move --
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: You just move that
change?
HOSPITAL REP TAYLOR: Yes, I move that change. Thank you.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Thank you.
NEC WOMAN MIKESELL: Second.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you. It has been moved and seconded to amend this Article V, Section 13: "All members seeking National Office shall be endorsed at a Department Convention by a majority vote not more than three years prior to the date they are to be a candidate for office. Vote shall be by viva voce unless there is more than one candidate, then endorsement shall be by ballot."

Is there any further discussion on this amendment?

DELEGATE RISNER: Heather Risner, District 24. I just believe the proper grammar of the bylaw or the resolution that you are trying to change is "vote," and not "endorsement."

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Would you like to make that in the form of a motion, Heather? DELEGATE RISNER: Yes, ma'am. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Oh, I'm sorry. I still have to take this vote, but you can come back later and change it. You can stay there and they can either vote yes or no to this amendment and then propose your -or move for what you think would be the correct verbiage. Okay?

DELEGATE RISNER: Okay.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: All those in favor of changing this amendment or approving this amendment as read, please say aye.

AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Those opposed say
no.
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Okay. Motion
carried.
Now, Heather, come back. Now move for your change.

DELEGATE RISNER: I move that -- and the reasoning behind this is that as it reads "vote" is what we're doing. So my -- I'm making a motion to change the word that has now been voted as "endorsement" to "vote" because you're simply voting for the endorsement.

ACTING SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: Second.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: There is an amendment to this Article $V$, Section 13, moved and seconded that would read: "All members seeking National Office shall be endorsed at a Department Convention by a majority vote not more than three years prior to the date they are to be a candidate for office. Vote shall be by viva voce unless there is more than one candidate, then vote shall be by ballot."

Is there any discussion on this motion amendment?
The Chair recognizes Rosalie.
HOSPITAL REP TAYLOR: Yes, ma'am. Rosalie Taylor, District 14. Do I have to read the whole thing? No?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Did you want to
change something, a word?
HOSPITAL REP TAYLOR: Yes. Just down there at
the bottom for the endorsement. "Then vote for
endorsement shall be by ballot." No?
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: That's too
convoluted.
HOSPITAL REP TAYLOR: I just -DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: I mean, if you
wanted my opinion. Oh, I don't have an opinion. If you
want to make that change though.
HOSPITAL REP TAYLOR: No, I got a lot of moans, so no.

ACTING SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: Okay. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Okay. Ruby?
ACTING SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: I think
we're beating a dead horse here.
(Applause.)
ACTING SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: And if you really look at the way it originally read, "election" is correct because if there is two candidates you are going to vote. You are going to actually have an election to make one of those the -- endorse one of those candidates. So it is an election. You're going to -- if there's two, you're going to have to have a ballot vote. So that word "election" in the beginning was correct.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: I mean, this isn't an opinion, this is a fact that you've already voted to change the word "election" from "election" to
"endorsement" to "vote." And so, you know, are we still discussing it? I think we already have it as "vote." Is there any further discussion on this amendment?

Okay. We voted on the amendment. The last word is "vote." Now we will vote on the complete motion as amended. Article V, Section 13: "All members seeking National Office shall be endorsed at a Department Convention by a majority vote not more than three years prior to the date they are to be a candidate for office. Vote shall be by viva voce unless there is more than one candidate, then vote shall be by ballot."

Is there any discussion on the amended motion? (No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Are you ready for the question? All those in favor, say aye.

AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Any opposed say no. (No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you. Motion
carried.
(Applause.)
CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: Okay.
Another -- I'm sorry. On the -- on the Book of Reports were copies of the Constitution \& Bylaws proposed changes. I hope you can see them. Constitution Article VII, Section 1: Personnel and Powers of. As it now reads: "Between Department Conventions, the administrative power shall be vested in a Department Executive Committee, but without power to modify any previous Department Convention action. This committee shall be composed of Department

President, Department Vice President, Junior Past Department President, Past National President of the Department of California, District Presidents, Department Chairmen of Standing Committees, Members of the Finance Committee, Parliamentarian, Girls State Director and Junior Conference Director. The Secretary/Treasurer and Parliamentarian shall be a non-voting member of the Executive Committee and a voting member of the Department Convention."

The proposed change will read. "Between
Department Conventions, the administrative power shall be vested in a Department Executive Committee, but without power to modify any previous Department Convention action. This committee shall be composed of Department President, Department Vice President, Junior Past Department
President, Past National President of the Department of California, District Presidents, Department Chairmen of Standing Committees, Members of the Finance Committee, Parliamentarian, Girls State Director and Junior
Conference Director. The Secretary/Treasurer, if a paid employee, and Parliamentarian shall be a non-voting member of the Executive Committee and a voting member of the Department Convention."

The rationale is that at some point there may be more than one Past National President and in the event we have an office manager instead of a full-time paid Secretary/Treasurer who is then not an employee, she will have the right to vote.

By direction of the Constitution \& Bylaws
preconvention committee meeting, I move for the acceptance of this bylaws change. Constitution change.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: There is a motion by the preconvention committee of the Constitution \& Bylaws to change Constitution Article VII, Section 1, Personnel and Powers Of. The proposed change shall read: "Between Department Conventions, the administrative power shall be vested in a Department Executive Committee, but without power to modify any previous Department Convention action. This committee shall be composed of Department President, Department Vice President, Junior Past Department
President, Past National President of the Department of California, District Presidents, Department Chairmen of Standing Committees, Members of the Finance Committee, Parliamentarian, Girls State Director and Junior Conference Director. The Secretary/Treasurer, if a paid employee, and Parliamentarian shall be a non-voting member of the Executive Committee and a voting member of the Department Convention."

Is there any discussion?
(No response.)

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: All those in favor, please say aye.

ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Those opposed say
no.
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Motion carried. CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: Thank you. Article VII, Section 5 as it now reads: "Section 5 Nomination of Department Secretary/Treasurer. The newly elected/appointed Executive Committee shall meet immediately following Department Convention. The Department President shall nominate a Department Secretary/Treasurer and the Department Executive Committee shall elect by majority vote. She may be removed from office by majority vote of the Department Executive Committee. She shall be a non-voting member of the Executive Committee and a voting member of the Department Convention."

The proposed change is: "The newly elected/appointed Executive Committee shall meet immediately following Department Convention. There shall be a Department Secretary/Treasurer to be nominated by the Department President and confirmed by the Department Executive Committee at the Post-Convention Department Executive Committee Meeting. She may be removed from office by majority vote of the Department Executive Committee. She shall be a non-voting member, if a paid employee, of the Executive Committee and a voting member of the Department Convention."

Rationale is to be consistent with National and add only if paid employee. By direction of the Constitution \& Bylaws preconvention committee meeting, I move for the acceptance of this proposed constitution bylaws change.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: There is a proposed change to Article VII, Section 5 by the preconvention committee on Constitution \& Bylaws to read: "The newly elected/appointed Executive Committee shall meet immediately following Department Convention. There shall be a Department Secretary/Treasurer to be nominated by the Department President and confirmed by the Department Executive Committee at the Post-Convention Department Executive Committee Meeting. She may be removed from office by majority vote of the Department Executive Committee. She shall be a non-voting member, if a paid employee, of the Executive Committee and a voting member of the Department Convention."

Is there any discussion on this change?
(No response.)

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: All those in favor, say aye.

ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Any opposed say no. (No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Motion carried. CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: Thank you. Under Bylaws Article I, Section 3 as it now reads: "Section 3 Department Secretary/Treasurer. The Department Secretary/Treasurer shall be a paid, full-time employee responsible to the Department President and Department Executive Committee. She shall be a member of the American Legion Auxiliary and an officer of the Department of California. As a Department officer, she shall serve as a non-voting member of the Executive Committee and a voting member of the Department Convention. The Department Secretary/Treasurer may be removed from office at any time by a majority vote of the Department Committee. She shall ensure that all duties relative to the necessary operation of the Department office be performed on a timely basis. She shall monitor all investments, record books, ledgers, and accounts and assure they are current and accurate."

The proposed change is: "The Department Secretary/Treasurer may be a paid, full-time employee responsible to the Department President and Department Executive Committee. She shall be a member of the American Legion Auxiliary and an officer of the Department of California. As a paid employee and Department officer, she shall serve as a non-voting member of the Executive Committee and a voting member of the Department Convention. The Department Secretary/Treasurer may be removed from office at any time by a majority vote of the Department Committee. She shall ensure that all duties relative to the necessary operation of the Department office be performed on a timely basis. She shall monitor all investments, record books, ledgers, and accounts and assure they are current and accurate. In the event the Department Secretary/Treasurer is not a paid employee, she shall have the privilege to vote."

The rationale is by changing the word "shall" to "may" allows an option for an office manager to be hired that is not necessarily a member of the American Legion Auxiliary which gives more flexibility in the hiring process. In the event an office manager conducts the day-to-day -- oh, sorry. In the event an office manager conducts the day-to-day operation of the Department Office and the Secretary/Treasurer is not a paid employee, there is no conflict of interest, therefore she should have the right to vote.

By the direction of the Constitution \& Bylaws preconvention committee meeting, I move for the acceptance of this Bylaws change.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: There is a proposed change to the Bylaws Article I, Section 3 by the preconvention Constitution \& Bylaws committee to read: "The Department Secretary/Treasurer may be a paid, full-time employee responsible to the Department President and Department Executive Committee. She shall be a member of the American Legion Auxiliary and an officer of the Department of California. As a paid employee and Department officer, she shall serve as a non-voting member of the Executive Committee and a voting member of the Department Convention. The Department Secretary/Treasurer may be removed from office at any time by a majority vote of the Department Committee. She shall ensure that all duties relative to the necessary operation of the Department office be performed on a timely basis. She shall monitor all investments, record books, ledgers, and accounts and assure they are current and accurate. In the event the Department Secretary/Treasurer is not a paid employee, she shall have the privilege to vote."
"Department" is not on this paper, but Harriet read Department Secretary/Treasurer, so I figured she was going to correct this. I was just reading what I -repeating what -- you said "Department
Secretary/Treasurer" as the last sentence. Did you need that in there or out because you did say "Department." CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: Yes, we do need it in. That was a typo. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: It should be in. CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: Yes. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Is there any
discussion on the motion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: All those in favor say aye.

ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Any opposed say no. (No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Motion carries. CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: Thank
you. Article II, Section B Referendum Vote: "When referendum vote is used the Department Executive Committee, consisting of the Department President, Department Vice President, Department Secretary/Treasurer, Junior Past Department President, Past National Presidents of the Department of California, Members of the Finance Committee, District Presidents, Department Chairman of Standing Committees, Girls State Director, and Junior

Conference Director shall vote."
The proposed change: "When referendum vote is used by the Department Executive Committee, consisting of the Department President, Department Vice President, Department Secretary/Treasurer (if not a paid employee), Junior Past Department President, Past National Presidents of the Department of California, Members of the Finance Committee, District Presidents, Department Chairman of Standing Committees, Girls State Director, and Junior Conference Director shall vote."

Rationale: To be consistent throughout the document that a paid employee does not vote as Department Executive Committee member.

By the direction of the Constitution \& Bylaws preconvention committee, I move for the acceptance of this Bylaws change.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: One second, Harriet. Okay. Thank you. You stated -- you used the word "by." You said, "When referendum vote is used by," but you don't have that typed and originally it does not have the word "by." So if you just say you're going to strike that word "by."

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: I strike
the word "by."
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Right. What's
written is --
CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN:
Correct. I threw a word in. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Okay. I'm sorry. There is a proposed change to the Bylaws Article II, Section B: "When referendum vote is used the Department Executive Committee, consisting of the Department President, Department Vice President, Department Secretary/Treasurer, Junior Past Department President, Past National Presidents of the Department of California, Members of the Finance Committee, District Presidents, Department Chairman of Standing Committees, Girls State Director, and Junior Conference Director shall vote."

Is there any discussion on this change? I read the wrong one. I'll read that -- "When referendum vote is used the Department Executive Committee, consisting of the Department President, Department Vice President, Department Secretary/Treasurer (if not a paid employee), Junior Past Department President, Past National Presidents of the Department of California, Members of the Finance Committee, District Presidents, Department Chairman of Standing Committees, Girls State Director, and Junior Conference Director shall vote."

Any discussion?
(No response.)

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: All those in favor, say aye.

ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Any opposed say no. (No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Motion carries.
CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: Thank
you very much. May $I$ take a point of privilege?
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: You may.
CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: I
would really like to thank Diane, our Parliamentarian, and Ruby for helping me get through that.
(Applause.)
CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: 100
percent reporting certificates were in the district packets. Second and third place certificates for unit and district supplementals were given out. Having finished the business, an ending prayer was read and a committee meeting ended at 10:00.

May I now proceed with my supplemental and first place awards?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: You may.
CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: Thank
you. Good morning, Madam President.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Good morning.
CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: When reading the reports of the coaches of the rules, there were many themes that didn't change at all. It is comforting to know that all the units and districts study their constitution and bylaws annually. All that reported also used Robert's Rules of Order and the Unit Handbook to guide them through their meetings. Several Units and Districts used the analogy that like the basketball game, the Constitution \& Bylaws along with their standing rules are the rules that if followed prevent chaos in their meeting or in this case, the basketball court.

The coaches of the rules are diligent in making sure units and districts bylaws are studied yearly. On the district level they may not -- they make sure that not only do they have the current copies of each units, but the president and sometimes the parliamentarians have copies. On the unit level it is reported they are with the president, the Constitution \& Bylaws chairman at every meeting, and with their secretary. Most also report they are given along with the standing rules in their new member packet.

Everyone reported how helpful it is to have standing rules. They are aware how each unit or district has standing rules specific to their needs. Many report they are updated and studied regularly, especially in the
beginning of the year. This seems to be a good time to update them, being mindful to not be in conflict with the bylaws, but only include items that are not covered. Besides educating members, units and districts report how the preamble is made a part of each meeting. Unit 146 , District 22 reported that their president's goal was for every member to memorize the preamble. While they didn't meet 100 percent, there is an increase over last year of those who recite it by heart. Many reported that while the organization is changing and modernizing, the preamble is a comfort knowing our history and what we are all about will never change.

Madam President, thank you for asking me to be the Department's Constitution \& Bylaws Chairman this year. What a learning experience it has been. While I have made many mistakes -- I'll admit it.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: We won't talk about
those.
CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN:
-- over time, I am comfortable enough to be able to answer questions that come up and have a real working knowledge of the rules which govern this organization on all levels. Having rules helps us as members to honor our opportunity to provide services to our veterans and at the same time pass it on. This concludes the report of the Constitution \& Bylaws Chairman. May I go with my first place supplementals?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Yes, you may.
CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: Okay.
My first place unit supplement goes to Unit 598, District 10, Pilar Reyes.
(Applause.)
CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN:
Amazing work, ladies.
PAST PRESIDENTS' PARLEY CHAIRMAN REYES: Thank
you very much. CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: You're welcome. My first place district goes to District 19, CJ Reyes. Do you notice a little theme going on there with the Reyeses?
(Applause.)
CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN CLENDENIN: Thank
you. Thank you, everybody.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you so much,
Harriet. Great job. Absolutely.
Due to the essence of time we're going to need to move into our election of our new officers and $I$ will defer the reports after the elections. I need Elizabeth Doidge. There she is.

CREDENTIALS CHAIRMAN DOIDGE: I've been waiting over there.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: And we also need the Rules Chairman Belen Telford to come to the stage. We need to change a rule. Or we need to look at a rule, rather.

We are not in recess. If you can please remain seated. Please remain seated. We are not in recess. Thank you. At this time $I$ would like to hear from our Children \& Youth Chairman, Sherry Schneider. Fortunately she has to go to Girls State and to catch a flight. So we need to listen to the Children \& Youth report. Thank you.

## CHILDREN \& YOUTH REPORT

CHILDREN \& YOUTH CHAIRMAN SCHNEIDER: The convention committee on Children \& Youth met on June 19, 2014 in Room 202 of the Santa Clara Convention Center. Tami Bell from District 29 was appointed secretary, Dolores Ryan from District 15 shared two beautiful prayers with us as our Chaplain, Bonnie Christensen from District 20 served as our Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 23 district delegates answered roll call and there are 11 visitors including one junior member.

The committee agreed upon the following report: The Children \& Youth code was read and there were no recommended changes. There were no resolutions presented to this committee.

The following districts were awarded citations for 100 percent unit reporting: $6,10,11,22,24,25$, 27, 28 and 30. Awards for best unit supplemental Children and Youth were awarded as follows: Third place went to Unit 118, District 27, Danielle White, chairman. Second place was awarded to Unit 359, District 19, Rosie Kraft and Sandra Sanchez, chairmen.
(Applause.)
CHILDREN \& YOUTH CHAIRMAN SCHNEIDER: Awards for best district supplemental Children \& Youth report were awarded as follows: Third place went to District 21 , Sylvia Alcantar, chairman. Second place was awarded to District 22, Ann Marie Brown, chairman.
(Applause.)
CHILDREN \& YOUTH CHAIRMAN SCHNEIDER: There were no recommendations brought up during the meeting. The committee was adjourned in prayer at 11:22.

Madam President, that concludes my committee report. May $I$ continue with the presentation of my first place awards?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Yes, you may. CHILDREN \& YOUTH CHAIRMAN SCHNEIDER: Best unit

Children and Youth supplemental first place citation goes to Oceanside Unit 146, District 22, Mary Thorsten, chairman.
(Applause.)
CHILDREN \& YOUTH CHAIRMAN SCHNEIDER: Best
district Children and Youth supplemental first place
citation goes to District 21, Alma Jarquin, chairman.
(Applause.)
CHILDREN \& YOUTH CHAIRMAN SCHNEIDER: This year the Department of California had 153 units participate in the Children \& Youth program. These units stepped up big this year serving over 26,745 children in their
communities. They gave over $\$ 173,543$ in direct aid to help the children of California. Our members volunteered over 43,758 hours for the Children \& Youth program.

I wanted to extend my thanks to all those members who stepped up for the children in our communities to make sure they had a brighter and happier world than the one they had before we offered our assistance.

Madam President, that concludes my report and I move for its acceptance.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: By your applause we've accepted the speedy report. Glad we had it in writing. Thank you, Sherry, very much. I know you've got to go hurry up and say good-bye to catch your plane.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Okay. We're going to need to have the Rules Chairman come up to the microphone. And we will be voting. We need a two-thirds vote to amend the rules as the Constitution \& Bylaws have been amended to match the election rules. And then the Elections Chairman, Carol Fuqua, you will need to amend your election rules if the amendment is passed. So heads up.

Okay. In order to be prepared for our elections, we will have 15 minutes' recess so the districts can take roll call of their delegates and be ready to report their voting strength when the secretary calls for roll of the districts. Please remember that the doors will be closed at 10- -- it is 10:05. At 10:20 we will start our election and no one will be allowed to enter and leave after the doors are closed.

And at this time all delegates should be with their district elected during the election. We are taking a 15 -minute recess. Please be back promptly or the doors will be locked. Thank you.
(Recess from 10:07 a.m. to 10:23 a.m.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Ladies, please.
This session is reconvened. I'm going to call on our

Rules Chairman -- excuse me -- Rules Chairman Belen Telford for a proposed change to the rule. RULES CHAIRMAN TELFORD: Thank you, Madam President. I move that we amend rule number 30 that reads: "When there is a candidate or candidates for amendment to the" -DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Excuse me, Belen. RULES CHAIRMAN TELFORD: Sorry. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Would you do as
instructed by the Parliamentarian with regards to --
she'll come talk to you. RULES CHAIRMAN TELFORD: I'm nervous. I'm sorry.
Oh, okay. I move that $I$ am -- I amend -DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Slow down. Listen, and then repeat.

RULES CHAIRMAN TELFORD: I amend -- I move to change the convention rule. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: It has been moved and seconded to change the convention rules. Is there any discussion? (No response.) DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: All those in favor
say aye.
AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Aye. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Opposed, say no. (No response.) DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Motion carried. RULES CHAIRMAN TELFORD: Okay. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Due to the Constitution \& Bylaws change that we voted on this morning, the rules must be changed as well. Did you all want to change your vote?

RULES CHAIRMAN TELFORD: I move to delete rule number 30 that now reads: "When there is a candidate or candidates for amendment -- endorsement, excuse me, to a National Office, a majority vote shall be by ballot." Constitution Article V, Section 13. DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Second. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: It has been moved and seconded to delete rule number 30 which reads: "When there is a candidate or a candidates for an endorsement to a National Office, a majority vote shall be by ballot." Constitution Article V, Section 13. Is there any discussion? (No response.) DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: All those in favor, say aye. (No response.) DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Those opposed say
no.
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: The motion carried.
RULES CHAIRMAN TELFORD: I move to -- I move to change rule number 7 -- excuse me. 27 that now reads: "When there is but one nominee for all Department Officers and but one nominee for Junior Member of Finance, a nominee shall be elected vice-a-versa [sic] (Article V, Section 3 Department Constitution.) Upon roll call, but the district presidents shall report the number of units partly or wholly represented by duly elected delegates or alternate presented delegation at the time of roll call. This is to determine that there is a quorum of units present at the time of election."

And I'm going to insert, when there is but one nominee for Department Officer, but one nominee for Junior Member of Finance this one insert -- one candidate for National Office for endorsement and the rest will remain the same.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: It has been moved and seconded to change rule number 27 to read: "When there is but one nominee for all Department Officers and but one nominee for Junior Member of Finance, and but one nominee" -- I'm sorry -- "one candidate for National Office for endorsement, the nominee shall be elected viva voce. (Article V, Section 3 Department Constitution.) Upon roll call the district presidents shall report the number of units partially and wholly represented by duly elected delegates or alternates present in the delegation at the time of roll call. This is to determine that there is a quorum of units present at the time of election." Is there any discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: All those in favor, say aye.

ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Those opposed say no.
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Motion carried.
Thank you, Belen.
RULES CHAIRMAN TELFORD: Thank you.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Will everyone please be seated with their respective districts? Please remember that only delegates and alternates taking the place of delegates will be allowed to be in this room during election. If you are not a delegate or an alternate, you must leave this room. Well, I don't mean to leave. You can sit with the delegation. She's right. Go back there. Hang around.

Will the Sergeant-at-Arms and Marshal please see
that everyone that's in the lobby knows that the doors are closed and are closed for this election process. And if they want to come in, to do so immediately. Can you please check outside the room and see if there's anyone hanging around? Check their badges and then close those doors. No one will be permitted to enter or leave except in an emergency until the Chair states that the elections are concluded.

DISTRICT 13 PRESIDENT HIDALGO: Madam President,
we voted yesterday and we would like for our National
alternate name be changed to Patricia McLeod.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Okay. You first
need to entertain a motion to reopen the nominations for
-- is it delegate or alternate? DISTRICT 13 PRESIDENT HIDALGO: Alternate. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: I need a motion from
someone --
NEC CHAIRMAN MIKESELL: So moved. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: -- to reopen the nominations. DISTRICT 13 PRESIDENT HIDALGO: Yeah, to remove
Patricia -DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: I need a motion to reopen the nominations for alternate. DISTRICT 13 PRESIDENT HIDALGO: I move that we reopen the nominations for alternate for National Convention. (Applause.) NEC CHAIRMAN MIKESELL: Second. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you. It has been moved and seconded to reopen the nominations for the alternate for National Convention. Is there any discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: All those in favor,
say aye.
ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Those opposed say
no.
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Motion carried. DISTRICT 13 PRESIDENT HIDALGO: I would like to change the name for the alternate to Patricia McLeod. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: District 13, your changing who? You're removing Cherie Whitaker and replacing her with? DISTRICT 13 PRESIDENT HIDALGO: Patricia McLeod. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: MC?

DISTRICT 13 PRESIDENT HIDALGO: M-C-L-E-O-D. ACTING SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: Madam
Department President, $I$ also can't count. And the last -DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: I can count. ACTING SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: The last alternate that was elected as an alternate was Vicki Crow, which we need to remove because we have 22 instead of 21 . Sorry, Vicky.

DELEGATE CROW: It's all right with me. ACTING SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: Thank you. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you, Mary. DISTRICT 13 PRESIDENT HIDALGO: Thank you. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Yeah, we really can't just remove her. She would have to -- we would either have to take a vote, a ballot vote, or Vicky would have to or someone would have to decline.

NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: Madam President,
National President Nancy Brown-Park.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: The Chair recognizes
National President Nancy. NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: I just have a comment to make. Is everybody who is an alternate planning to attend National Convention? DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: That's a very good question.

NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: If you're not, please withdraw your name now so that we do not have to have a ballot vote. Thank you.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: She's correct. If there's any alternate that is not planning on attending the National Convention, please consider withdrawing your name because you are taking the space of someone who will incur the burden or the expense to go to National and be representing California. And as well, they need to attend a preconvention committee meeting that you will be assigned. We need your body there to take votes to be an active delegate.

The Chair recognizes Wendy O'Brien. I'm sorry. Not Wendy. Jennifer Bieger.

DISTRICT 21 PRESIDENT BIEGER: Jennifer Bieger, District 21. We would remove the name of Joanne Evans because she'll be attending on the Legion side and that will leave space for Vicky.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: You're back in, Vicky. Thank you, Madam National President, for bringing that up.

We will now have the report of the Elections Chairman Carol Fuqua followed by the reading of the

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election rules.

DISTRICT 14 PRESIDENT URBAN: Sandy Urban, 14th District. I would -- as alternate $I$ would like to remove Ellen McClurg.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Ellen McClurg. DISTRICT 14 PRESIDENT URBAN: Ellen McClurg. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: We'll leave her in for now. We'll talk to you later. Thank you.

Go ahead, Carol.
ELECTIONS REPORT
ELECTIONS CHAIRMAN FUQUA: The Elections committee met in the Santa Clara Convention Center in Room 206 on June 19th, 2014 at 11:30 a.m.

Jennifer Bieger from District 21 was appointed secretary -- just a moment. I slipped up. Roseann Bean from District 9 was appointed Chaplain, and Gabriele Rowland from District 25 was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. Nineteen delegates answered roll call. Five guests were present.

The Election and Appointment of Officers from the Department Constitution Article V, Sections 1 through 13, pages $C-4$ through $C-7$ was reviewed with the committee. Each delegate received a copy of the 2014 Convention Rules. The Election rules were read and discussed. Rule number 33 was furthered clarified and -- clarified on the delegate voting.

The emergency resolution from the Department Constitution Article $V$, Section 13 was reviewed and discussed. There were no recommendations or suggestions. The meeting adjourned at 11:50 a.m.

Madam President Anita, thank you for this appointment. It has been my honor serving as your Elections Chairman. This concludes my Election committee report. Madam President, may I proceed to the reading of the election rules?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Yes, you may. Thank
you.
ELECTIONS CHAIRMAN FUQUA: These will be found on the Book of Reports on page 12 and 13. The convention rule numbers are 25 through 33. Number 25 reads: "Election of Department Officers, Junior Member of Finance, National Candidate, Department Delegates and Alternates to the National Convention shall be held on Saturday morning June 21st, 2014.
"Number 26: The doors of the convention hall shall be closed during the entire election procedure and no one shall leave or enter the hall until chairman
states -- until Chair states that the election is concluded. The exception to this shall be that in an emergency, a member can be leave and if her absence affects the voting strength, the district president shall immediately notify the presiding officer.
"Number 27: When there is but one nominee for Department Officers and but one nominee for Junior Member of Finance or one candidate for endorsement for National Office, the nominees shall be elected viva voce, per Article V, Section 3 Department Constitution. Upon roll call, the district presidents shall report the number of units partially or wholly represented by duly elected delegates or alternates present in the delegation at the time of roll call. This is is to determine that there is a quorum of units present at the time of the election.
"Number 28: When there is more than one nominee for Department Officers, Junior Member of Finance, or endorsement for National Office, the election shall be by written ballot. The district president shall, when instructed by Chair, take a roll call of the respective delegation to ascertain the total voting strength of their district for the election reporting the same to Chair.
"Number 29: When there are three or more nominees for office, Junior Member of Finance, or endorsement of National Office, unless one nominee receives a majority vote on the first ballot, the nominee receiving the lowest number of votes shall be automatically dropped before proceeding with the next ballot."

Number 30, which used to be number 31 as we just deleted that other number: "Each District President and District Member of Elections Committee shall distribute and collect the votes cast by the District delegation and deliver them to the Department Chairman of the Elections."

Number 31, which was formerly 32: "Department
Officers, Chairmen, Committee Member, and Past Department Presidents shall vote with their respective district."

Number 32, formally 33: "Each delegate shall be entitled to one vote. The vote of an absent unit delegate not represented by an alternate shall be cast by the majority of the unit. When two delegates represent three votes, the chairman of the unit delegation shall cast the third vote."

Number 33, formerly 34: "A majority of all votes cast shall elect, except that in the election of National delegates and alternates a plurality shall elect."

Number 34, formerly 35: "These convention rules may be amended during the convention by a two-thirds vote."

Number 35, formerly 36: "Robert's Rules of

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Order, Newly Revised shall be the parliamentary authority on all points not covered by these rules, the Department Constitution \& Bylaws, and Convention mandates."

That concludes the reading of the Election rules.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you very much,
Carol. We will now hear from the Credentials Chairman Elizabeth Doidge to give the final Credential Report.

## FINAL CREDENTIALS REPORT

CREDENTIALS CHAIRMAN DOIDGE: Madam President Anita Biggs, thank you for asking me to serve as your Credentials Chairman this year. It was a valuable learning experience. I'm glad it's almost over.

This morning we met with the District Presidents; we went over the procedures on how to poll the district and what was expected. My thanks to Ruby, Carol Fuqua, Suzie Q, Cassie Mikesell, Carol and Lois Cornish for their help. I couldn't have done it without them. Also thank you for the Auxiliary registration secretaries and the members who worked the registration tables. You did an outstanding job.

The total voting strength for this convention is 552. Divided by half is 276 to elect.

We changed the "parent's release." The
rationale, we changed the wording "parent's release"
application form to "signature page." We changed "and" to "to." Removed the phrase "are completely answered and the required signatures" and in their place added "by
receiving the signature page from the candidate," replaced the words "papers to Department" to read "signature page," and remove the "S" from "fees."

Madam Department President, by direction of the committee I move for acceptance of this code change.

In case of hardship, the fee can be paid by the unit, district, school, and/or outside source, but must be paid no later than March 31 when the fees are due from the unit to the department."

My computer took a look at all the work ahead of us and ended up with the Geek Squad, not once, not twice, but three times.

Upon return after spending enough money to buy two or three more computers and inviting Dr. Microsoft in to observe her, she finally took a turn for the better and came back to life after 11 hours of intensive surgery through a remote overhaul.

Many, many thanks going out to fellow committee member Elissa Kirkland. She took time out of her day to travel to Palmdale meet me at Post 348 where we immediately took over the pool table, covering it in six heavy tubs, boxes of file folders, and set up camp for the remainder of the day and on into the evening, finally deciding to call it a night around 9:00 p.m. Two unit members also pitched in, Rosie Parra and Carol McChesney. I can't begin to tell you how much I appreciated their help. Elissa was kind enough to come a second time.

This time my husband, Richard, helped us out. We worked another solid day right into the evening. And I really am not sure if it was his beautiful bride or an overwhelming desire to get those tubs of paper out of his living room.

Elissa took all the applications home with her and has worked many more hours on them. She's not with us this week, but $I$ know she deserves more than a thank you from me.
(Applause.)
GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: This is a job that requires many, many hours of intensive work. When you think about it, we have 520 girls who will be attending Girls State in less than two days. 520 applications times an eight-page application, throw in copies of physicals, one to five more pieces of paper, copies of insurance cards, another 800 more applications from the first and
second alternates, times a minimum of ten pages for most. If you take time to figure it out, we are talking about 30 reams of paper. Add to that are all the phone calls, the emails, and additional missing paperwork that's being mailed.

Now we are drawing close to the first day of Girls State. The committee members are arriving tomorrow, for some, one more day, and we will realize what all this hard work has accomplished. I am so looking forward to the week ahead of us, the 71st Girls State Session. I am truly excited to meet and spend a week with California's top-notch young women.

I was honored by being invited to five of the -two Girls State teas where I met a few of them in advance. Unfortunately $I$ was unable to attend -- excuse me. Unfortunately I was able to attend only two because some dates conflicted.

Wow, the young women I met were so impressive. It is impossible not to admire them, their goals, and who they will become in the near future. On my way to convention on Wednesday afternoon, I received a phone call from California Assemblyman Alvarez 's representative. He said that the assemblyman was interested in knowing more about the American Legion Auxiliary Girls State program. He asked a lot of questions, asked about the girls' desires in the future and what they were looking forward to getting from their week of participation in the Girls State program.

I left him with a sense of how important this program is and what it does for these girls and what it means to the American Legion Auxiliary to be able to provide this experience to some of California's top-notch girls.

It has been a great year with many surprises. It has been an interesting learning experience for this Girls State Chairman. Through the many months of preparation, trials, and tribulations, I thank you, Madam President, for all of your support and encouragement. I also thank co-committee members, Val Hardy and Elissa Kirkland and Elizabeth. I was trying to say her name, but I couldn't. I'm sorry.

Thank you, Madam President, for giving me this opportunity. There are no words to express my sincere appreciation for the honor you have given me. Linda Hayes.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you. Did you
want to acknowledge the rest of the committee that are here?

GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: Pardon?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Did you want to acknowledge the rest of the committee that are here? GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: To introduce them? DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Yeah. Do you want to have them stand? Would the committees who are here please stand up. And our Assistant Girls State Director Linda Fercho right here in front.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you very much. Elizabeth Tomlin is our nurse. Thank you, Liz. Diane is an assistant nurse. She's like an assistant nurse. You are an assistant nurse. I know you're not, but you're an assistant nurse. We just want to say your name. We like your name. She said her job consists as the assistant nurse to hand out Band-Aids and tampons. And many, many trips to the emergency room.

Who did I say were going to be next? Juniors. (Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Stacey Smith.
JUNIOR ACTIVITIES REPORT
JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN SMITH: Man, I feel like I don't know what I should do here.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Put that closer to you.

JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN SMITH: Good? Okay. Madam President, unfortunately $I$ was not able to attend the Junior Activities/Junior Conference Committee meeting on Thursday June 19th held in Room 202 of the Hyatt in Santa Clara. However, Jackie is so awesome she's already met with me and given me the information of what occurred during the meeting.

Ashley Bolingshead was appointed the secretary and Julie Miller offered prayer. [Inaudible] was
appointed Sergeant-At-Arms. Sorry. A total of 22
districts answered roll calls and there were four visitors present. No code changes and no resolutions. And recommendations were to encourage units and districts to have junior activity members. The meeting ended at 9:55 a.m. Second and third place awards were given in committee meeting.

We did have one recommendation from a district chairman, and that was to distinguish the line on the unit report form as to whether or not they bought junior conference tickets and a separate line for any donations to junior activities or junior conference and a dollar amount. We will put that in the procedure book or on the flash drive for the next chairman.

The statistical report for junior activities can
be found on page 20 of the Book of Reports. Yet, after reporting the numbers to the department, several more district reporters were received so the numbers are not quite the same as what was sent to the National Chairman. May I give my supplement report and first place awards?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Yes, you may. JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN SMITH: Thank you. In keeping with Madam President's them, Honoring Our Opportunity to Provide Services, we started the year by asking the Dribblers to focus on the patch program and as well as to take the Mean Stinks "Gang Up For Good" pinkie swear.

Unfortunately, not many of the Unit for District chairmen paid attention to the instructions for the patch program to send their patch program completed sheets to me. Every district received a packet at midyear with these sheets as well as an explanation about how to handle the patch program. Although with all but nine districts reporting, there were 29 red level patches earned, 57 gold level patches earned, and 16 blue level patches earned, we cannot present those patches today as they could not be ordered in time from National without the completed sheets. So in order to receive the patches from National in time for convention and not to disappoint those Dribblers who did send their patch sheets, we will hand those out today.

Also disappointing to this chairman was that not one unit supplemental or district supplemental reported anything about the pinkie swear even after handing out blue nail polish at midyear meeting and small "Gang Up for Good" slips to remind everybody about the program. That was one of the focuses of National.

Since bullying is an aggressive behavior that involves negative actions and an imbalance of power, we may even be able to use some of their tips, tools and resources within our own units and districts and not just for the juniors since we all need to change our thoughts and behavior at some time or another.

To take the pinkie swear, just paint your pinkie nail blue in a show of peace and solidarity to keep mean out of your group. Let everyone who asks about your blue pinkie know what it's all about and just think how we can make a change in the world. We can all join in the movement to stop bullying.

On a more positive note, California Dribblers have been encouraged by many of the senior members. You've shown them how to make a poppy. You've encouraged them to tutor in a subject they did well with. You've taught them flag etiquette. You've taught them about the

American Legion Auxiliary and you've asked them or helped them write thank you cards and letters to our active duty military. You were able to keep your Dribblers busy all year with the participation in parades, bake sales, stand downs, collecting canned goods, car washes, pocket flag project, packing boxes to go overseas, and collecting school supplies.

The California Junior Dribblers went straight to work at the beginning of the Auxiliary year by Giving 10 to Education, participating in craft fairs, selling baked goods and plants as fundraisers, and making no-sew
blankets for veterans at a veterans medical center. They continued to work in local food banks, collecting clothes for homeless shelters and volunteering at the SPCA Humane Society.

On Memorial Day 2013, juniors could be found assisting their units and districts honoring our deceased veterans with placing over 1800 flags on veterans' grave sites after securing poppies to the top of each flag, leading the Pledge of Allegiance for the program, and distributing poppies to attendees.

Junior Dribblers have volunteered at 9/11
ceremonies by leading patriotic sing-alongs, leading the pledge, reciting the In Flanders Field poem, and even helping a lost child find his parents when they became lost during the candle lighting ceremony.

For Halloween, juniors organized and attended a reverse trick or treat at the local veterans hospital. The pirates, princesses, cowgirls and doctors paraded the halls of the blind center and the nursing home handing out handmade thank you cards, pens, ChapStick, sugar-free candies, lotions and diabetic socks.

Christmas found juniors adopting families with their units, posts, and Sons Squadrons to supply toys and food for families along with decorated Christmas trees and grocery gift cards. Juniors of several units have started their own Facebook page coordinated by senior members. They've made decorated flower pots and planted them with small plants for Earth Day, then delivered to the local veterans home.

Showing sportsmanship, sharing and teamwork, our California Dribblers have been able to help senior members with electronic social networking. Amen. To hear the juniors tell the stories, many seniors needed more help than originally thought and some of the juniors even thought it quite silly that grownups didn't understand texting, e-mailing, and how to put a picture on an email or to even download the picture. There should be at least 75 California senior members who are now more knowledgeable with the internet, Facebook texting, Twitter
and Adobe Photoshop. One Junior even taught members of her unit how to use the iPhone and iPad, and she is only five years old.
(Applause.)
JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN SMITH: Unfortunately the names of the junior were not provided and no pictures were submitted.

California can boast of junior members in Oregon, Alaska, Africa and Australia who celebrated the 4 th of July with traditional American food, sparklers and American patriotic music. They collected Toys for Tots and were happy when the Marines received and thanked them for the toys. One out-of-state junior helped shovel snow for a neighbor so they could use their front door walkway. Thank God for California weather.

Another junior asked her grandmother to speak to her eighth grade class about what she experienced as a World War II prisoner of war in the Philippines. The presentation lasted an hour and a half including student questions.

Special accolades were given to one unit's members who has 11 senior members who are former juniors and four of those have served as district presidents, two have been department presidents, and one is in line to be department president. One is a candidate for Western Division National Vice President. Two served as honorary department presidents and the one who served as the first Department of California Honorary Junior President currently serves as our National President.
(Applause.)
JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN SMITH: Isn't that a testament to the junior program? Another junior traveled with her family from Africa to visit the Christmas holidays and they led everyone in traditional African songs in Swahili.

Many units reported that their juniors participated in the pocket flag project and the veterans history project. Some will also be volunteering at local veterans medical centers and california veterans homes.

The Department of California juniors are ready to play harder than they ever played when they attend our annual junior conference in April and they are committed to giving 110 percent themselves in the final half of the game. Truly your California Dribblers have worked hard at Honoring Our Opportunity to Provide Services to our veterans communities and children.

Madam President, may $I$ present the first place awards?

VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: I've got to lose all that
candy weight.
JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN SMITH: Thank you. VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: Okay; I can breathe. JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN SMITH: Best unit
supplement, Unit 742 , District 21 , Susan Romero, chairman. (Applause.)
JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN SMITH: Are we good?
Best junior community service program, District 22 ,
Annette Grimsley and Virgie Goffney, co-chairmen. (Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Unit selling the most junior conference tickets, Unit 359, District 19. (Applause.)
JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN SMITH: This is my momma dragon lady. I love her. Here you go. Oh, my goodness. District junior selling the most junior conference tickets, Unit 277, my godfather, Jordyn Piane. (Applause.)
JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN SMITH: Thank you all who purchased junior conference tickets and supported the junior conference with your donations. Patches for the program successfully completed for all areas, Unit 277, District 29, Viviana Sanford, Jordyn Piane and Valentine Sanford. A list of their awards will be at the department office. Is DejaNae right there?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Little DejaNae or DejaNae the president?

JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN SMITH: Okay. Mom, can you get the -- sorry. At this time I'd like to make a really short presentation to our really tall president. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Let me put my really tall shoes on. Thank you.

JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN SMITH: Thank you so
much and --
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you so much. You are a doll, one of our juniors who's grown into a beautiful woman. I really appreciate you Stacey and all of your hard work. That was a great junior conference for Jackie as well. It was actually fantastic.

JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN SMITH: Thank you. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Are you done with
your report? Excuse me. Are you done with your report? JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN SMITH: I'm done with my report. I don't know about Jackie.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Jackie Cleveland, junior conference director.

JUNIOR CONFERENCE DIRECTOR REPORT
JUNIOR CONFERENCE DIRECTOR CLEVELAND: Good
morning. What an awesome junior conference. So many exciting things happened. Our Honorary Junior President wanted to go out with a bang. JUNIOR CONFERENCE DIRECTOR CLEVELAND: I think that's an honor. The graduation made me shed tears. Six juniors were leaving. Most of them have been with me since the age of ten and now they're 18. I encouraged them to be devoted senior members as they were as junior members.

Thank you, Madam President, for the appointment. It was a great experience and a joy to work with you. I'd like to deviate a little bit. First of all, I would like to ask Diane Livas to come up. I have a special
presentation.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: You did a great job. JUNIOR CONFERENCE DIRECTOR CLEVELAND: May we
present something to you? And you can push down this envelope and not open it. Madam President, on behalf of the juniors, all of the juniors, we'd like for you to open that and show you what we have. Now you must turn the back of it.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: It's got my name

begged her aunt to make that last Friday night.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you, love.
Thank you.

something for her.
JUNIOR MEMBER JOLINA: Madam Department of
California President, thank you for everything and for supporting me. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: You're so welcome. I love you, Jolina. Oh, you're going to cry. Don't cry. (Applause.) DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: There's no crying. JUNIOR MEMBER JOLINA: And my Department of California Junior President, we had a great year and -DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Oh, my goodness, they're crying. Girls, turn those tears into joy. Thank
you so much. Thank you so much, Jackie.
JUNIOR CONFERENCE DIRECTOR CLEVELAND: Madam
President, that concludes my report.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you. Great report. However, at this time we would like to have our newly elected Honorary Department of California Junior President Maya Novicki District 24 , Unit 43 in Hollywood. (Processional.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: I'm so proud of you.
I remember our very first junior conference with very short hair and very shy. And she goes, "I don't even know what I was thinking with that short hair." You look fantastic. Would you like to say -- aren't you going to Girls State? And she's going to Girls State this week. HONORARY DEPARTMENT JUNIOR PRESIDENT NOVICKI: Hi everyone. I'm glad to be here. Thank you.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: She's very shy. And her mom is here, Heather. Heather, wave. District 24. Thank you so much, love. We got your back. Very proud of you. We'll see you soon in convention. Or actually at Girls State. We'll see you at Girls State. Thank you. Give her a big round of applause.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: We're going to get rid of that shyness. Okay. We're going to have to break for lunch. We've done quite well. We're trying to catch up. We'll try to get some more catching up done this afternoon. Leadership, poppy, VA\&R. We won't go any further.

I want you to know that after we return from lunch, we will have our Dream Team Shooting H.O.O.P.S. on Parade around the inside of this room with costumes or your outfits. Please be prepared to join us. And I told you who would be coming immediately following the Dream Team parade. We are in recess until 1:30.

be a shame. They're just -- look at the amount of people and they're up here to display. They're in an
amphitheater and there's thousands of people. And so anyway, if you would consider that. And I thank Barbara LaDoucer for the donation.

Also Lou Thompson has come into the assembly and
Lou --
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Speak in the microphone, Ruby. We can't hear you.

ACTING SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: I owe Lou
-- the Department of California, not me, owes Lou deep gratitude for her assistance in the transition in September. She was instrumental in transmitting members to National and also training our new membership clerk Janeen Thomas who $I$ think is in the room over here in District 3. That is Janeen Thomas.

## AFTERNOON SESSION - 1:52 P.M.

Okay. Thank you.
(Applause.)
ACTING SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: Madam Department President, while Bill is here, I would just like to reiterate to him, he didn't hear, I did put in my in-box thanking the American Legion for all the help that you and your staff have given to the American Legion Auxiliary especially Sarah Etzel who as you know got us through your computer problems. And Bill, Bill calls himself -- I didn't know this until I got there in September, he calls himself the Agitator. He's not the Adjunct, he's the Agitator. But also for the raffle that the American Legion allows the Auxiliary to participate in too, we truly appreciate the Legion for allowing us to be a part of that and earning so much help for our general fund. (Processional.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Go Bill, go Bill, go
Bill. Ruby is going to remember that move tonight.
You've got to get the lint out.
Also we need to bring up Americanism Chairman
Diana Moreno. We'll get going with leadership.

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## LEADERSHIP REPORT

LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: Thank you, Madam President. First off, I apologize -- hello? Okay. First off, I'd like to apologize for the handwritten committee report. I had a little malfunction with the printer, so --

Okay. The convention committee on leadership met June 19th, 2014 in Room 208 of the Santa Clara Convention Center, Santa Clara, California. The statistical report for this chairman appears on page 21 of the Book of Reports.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Any opposed say no. (No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Motion carried.
LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: Thank you.
Certificates for 100 percent reporting, second and third place, and participation awards were given out in committee. I will post the awards in the office. A list

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of current certified instructors were handed out to districts and updated on the department website. With no further business, the meeting adjourned at 9:30. Madam President, this concludes my committee report. May $I$ continue with my supplemental report and first place awards?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Yes, you may. LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: Thank you. Our year started out with the Department President holding three exciting workshops, sharing information on the Auxiliary programs, National Plan of Action, and what her plans were for the upcoming year. Her theme was Shooting H.O.O.P.S., Honoring Our Opportunity to Provide Service For Veterans.

She and her chairmen answered questions about different ways that can be done with all the programs. This was a great start to the year. We also had three six-hour department leadership workshops throughout the state with help of certified leaders. I would like to thank the District Presidents Barbara Daily, District 2, Glenda Schultz, District 6, and Vella Myers, District 27 as well as anyone that helped put on these successful trainings.

Information was presented about the ALA policies, meeting procedures, basic protocols, and parliamentary rules. Members learned about flag etiquette, responsibility of officers and chairmen, as well as the importance of procedure books and end of year reporting. Challenging games about the ALA were played and enjoyed by all. The classes were well received.

It was wonderful seeing how eager the ladies were to share what they knew and how units used different ways to accomplish the same goals. The workshops were very productive, fun and existing. Our purpose is to prepare knowledgeable and capable leaders to carry on the growth and success of the American Legion Auxiliary.

We were also fortunate to have many leaders throughout the state that helped units and districts conduct over 50 mini workshops and trainings this year. Information was presented on a variety of different topics. Training was done using the ALA handbook, Constitution \& Bylaws, Standing Rules, Robert's Rules, National Plan of Action, as well as the National and department bulletins. Instructors spoke about ALA policies, responsibilities of officers and chairmen, as well as traditions of the Auxiliary, what the acronyms such as AEF, VA\&R and TFA were, just to name a few, and also tax information. Past Department Presidents shared their responsibilities, held $Q$ and $A$ sessions, sharing ideas, and encouraging each other. These classes were
found to be a great way to build enthusiasm.
Units have set up mentoring programs such as Buddy Partners and Big Sister/Little Sister. This is where seasoned members take under their wing a new Auxiliary member answering any questions that they may have about the Auxiliary, things like our acronyms, how meetings are conducted, proper protocol and the programs. Some units have senior members that have committed to working with a new member for two years. Some have found that asking the new member to be a co-chairman of a program has helped to make them grow in knowledge and excitement for the ALA. They are more willing to come to meetings and participate. Some have found people more open to learning and sharing if they are not held back by the old attitude of, well, we've always done it that way. This leaves room to learn new and modern ways to implement our programs. Having an open line of communication, listening to suggestions and keeping a positive attitude are other ways that have been useful.

Good leaders will be observant of how the newer members and sometimes older members understand what information they are trying to convey. Does she look like she understands or does she stare like a deer in the headlights? Some newer members have not asked questions because they feel it makes them look ignorant for not knowing. These are things a good instructor will look for.

This year we are privileged to have from California the highest leader in our organization, our National President Nancy Brown-Park. Her theme this year is "Pass It On" and that is just what our unit and district members have done, sharing what they have learned at workshops and training classes, passing out department and national bulletin and brochures about our programs. Helping every member realize her leadership potential. This is the goal of the leadership program. By participating in meetings, sharing ideas, and encouraging new members to do the same.

The national mission training was attended by 34 of our members including myself. This was a time for ladies from all over the western division to get together and learn from our National Officers and chairmen. We learned from their vast knowledge and then returned home rejuvenated and with a new zeal for the ALA. We passed on to our unit and district members all the information that was presented.

Everyone was encouraged to take the national correspondence course this year. We had members from all levels of the Auxiliary take the training, both juniors and seniors. I'm happy to say that we had a total of 13
members take the course with two junior and five senior members passing it. I'm also very excited to announce a new certified instructor to our organization, Karen Herrera, District 15, Unit 20. She will be added -(Applause.)
LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: She will be added to the existing 202 certified leaders in California.

Leadership is a team effort and an important program of the American Legion Auxiliary. Our members have shared their skills, knowledge, and training. They have found opportunities to excite, rejuvenate and encourage other members so that we can continue to complete our goal of serving veterans, active military, and their children in the future. May I present my first place awards?

(Applause.)
LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: And first place for best overall district supplemental goes to LuAnn Capazzi, District 27.
(Applause.)
LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: Thank you very
much.
MS. CAPAZZI: Thank you.
LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: Thank you, Madam President, for having faith in me for this position this year. May $I$ approach your station? DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Yes, you may. LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: My husband and I would like to contribute to your -- what do we all that? \$200.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Oh, wow. \$200 cash.
Thank you. Thank you so much, Wendy.
LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: Madam President, this concludes my report.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you. Great job. We'll now hear from our Poppy Chairman Alzora Carter.

POPPY CHAIRMAN CARTER: Good afternoon, Madam President. The convention committee on Poppy met on June 19th, 2014 in Room 211 of the Santa Clara Convention Center, Santa Clara, California. The statistical report of this chairman appears on page 23 of the Book of Reports. Lois Cornish, District 22, was appointed
secretary. Dorothy Davis, District 16 , was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms and she also led the Pledge of
Allegiance. June Coatney was appointed chaplain. A total of 23 delegates answered roll call. There were four guests.

The chairman read the code and was assisted by the secretary due to this chairman's voice was lost. There were no recommendations. Awards for 100 percent reporting and all second place awards were given. A copy of those awards has been posted in the department office. With no further business the meeting adjourned with prayer at 10:05 a.m.

Madam President, this concludes the preconvention meeting. May $I$ continue with my supplement and first place awards?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Yes, you may.
POPPY CHAIRMAN CARTER: First of all, 100 percent
reporting was from District $2,3,4,5,6,7,8--$ I'm sorry. Nine, 10, 13, 14, 18, 23, 24, 25, 26, 27, 28 and 30. Before I commence with my Poppy report, this coach would like to dedicate this program in the memory of Trish Ladre, Past Poppy Production Manager for Long Beach VAMC. Trish passed away early this year and had a beautiful celebration at the Hawthornes Post 314 which I attended. Trish will always be remembered as a dedicate poppy production manager and Auxiliary member. Thank you.
(Applause.)
POPPY CHAIRMAN CARTER: There are so many words this coach can use to describe this year's Poppy program. Due to the economy, we were down approximately 10,000 poppies. Although our revenue is still being submitted to our department office, we truly hope it will be a great total. As you know, our Past Department President Ruby is doing a fantastic job keeping up. It must be quite difficult doing so many other tasks.

Past Department President Ruby, I admire you so much for stepping in as others have done in helping our department. If we all think about how this affects our veterans who are the ones that definitely suffer from this decrease, we can do just a little better for our veterans as they have sacrificed so much for us.

Please increase your poppies next year. We have so many unit members who continue to dedicate and are so enthused about all of our programs. This coach was pleased with the activities that each unit held to bring in poppy proceeds. Poppy fish fry was a hit in so many units. High fashion poppy shows at the unit level, DEC and even junior conference was definitely a hit.

One particular unit chairman was very new, very confused as to how to make money to pay for the poppies.

Well, the High Fashion Poppy Show was one for this unit. She made over $\$ 2,000$ in one effort and used over 2300 poppies. Another unit stuffed 7,000 poppies with two poppies each to their members and yet another unit member who is 99 years young fluffed all of their poppies and passed them out with a smile.

What about the unit who was able to get a local bakery to sell their poppy cookies for revenue. I know because I bought some. Thanks to American Legion Family for working so well together for our veterans by distributing and offering poppies. We all can see we just did. Pass it on as many unit poppy chairmen worked hard with their membership team to recruit, renew, and retain members.

A very special thanks to poppy production managers. As $I$ call your name, please stand up. Pat Alvarez, Long Beach VAMC.
(Applause.)
POPPY CHAIRMAN CARTER: Stay standing, please. You know, that's okay, Pat. You can stand a little bit longer. Lois Cornish, San Diego/Chula Vista VAMC and WAVE clinic, Geri Fitzpatrick.
(Applause.)
POPPY CHAIRMAN CARTER: It was a task to manage these facilities, the veterans, making sure the poppy orders are filled and delivered in a timely manner. They deserve a big round of applause.
(Applause.)
POPPY CHAIRMAN CARTER: Complaints we will have, but maybe you can volunteer to assist. Thank you again, ladies, for your service to the Auxiliary and to our veterans. Thank you to all the judges who have made the decisions of all the beautiful displays. This year our Department President's theme was on basketball and her motto H.O.O.P.S., which is Honoring Our Opportunity to Provide Services to Our Veterans. This coach held a poppy light contest at our midyear meeting. All funds raised were donated to our President's special project temporary financial assistance. These funds are given to veterans who are experiencing temporary financial assistance. We know the challenge of ordering, offering, getting donations, and reporting, but the ultimate reward is apparent when we can look at the faces of our nation's veterans and know that we are doing our best to help support some of their needs through our amazing poppy program.

I was thrilled and very excited if you all notice this weekend to see hotel employees wearing poppies. When you are at the bar you saw them, in the restaurant, and even at our parlay luncheon. I was so thrilled and I
thank the Hyatt staff and management and, of course, Sandy Jacob, our convention cochairman, for making the poppies and distributing them to the staff.

(Processional.)

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Ruby, would you please assume the Chair while I go for a presentation?

Hi, Kolina. I know your sister Hannah and your mommy. You want to stand on the little podium there, the little step stool? There you go.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Kolina, on behalf of the American Legion Auxiliary Department of California, we want to present to you this citation of recognition as our Little Miss Poppy for 2013-2014 from Los Alamitos Unit

716, District 29 for rendering to this organization your invaluable help and cooperation by fulfilling your
commitment to the program of Poppy. We are honoring you and we are so proud of you and continue the great work. And I will sign this. I'll sign this right now before you get it. Okay? And this is some money for you. Cash money award of $\$ 20$. So don't spend that in one place. We thank you. We think you're awesome and we're so proud for you to represent us. Thank you.
(Applause.)
POPPY CHAIRMAN CARTER: And also you will get a poppy cookie. A poppy cookie. That's for you.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: You can eat that.
POPPY CHAIRMAN CARTER: There are some other
goodies in there that $I$ am quite sure you will love. You
love Hello Kitty? Okay. You have a bracelet and a
necklace from me. Okay.
LITTLE MISS POPPY KOLINA: Thank you.
POPPY CHAIRMAN CARTER: Thank you so much for
being Ms. Poppy. Do you want to come down?
NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: I just shared that $I$ am so proud of you -- she's so busy smiling. I'm so proud of you in all that you did for our veterans. You just keep up that good work and you are absolutely
beautiful. Thank you so, so much. Thank you.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Will the
Sergeant-at-Arms and Marshal please escort Little Miss
Poppy. What is she going to do? She's a page. She's got
to get back to work.
POPPY CHAIRMAN CARTER: May I now proceed?
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: They're taking
pictures. Okay. Go ahead, Madam Chairman.
POPPY CHAIRMAN CARTER: Thank you.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Oh, there they go
now. They're going. There goes our Little Miss Poppy 2013-2014, Miss Kolina Janji. Hey, give it up.
(Processional.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Love that dress.
There you go.

(Applause.)

(Applause.)
POPPY CHAIRMAN CARTER: Thank you. Okay. Our first place display contest, which we had judges for all of them, went to District 21. And I'm looking for the certificates and $I$ don't see them. They were there, but anyway, $I$ will call their name. Cheryl Fleming, District 21, Unit 328.
(Applause.)
POPPY CHAIRMAN CARTER: The first place
President's choice went to Deborah Driscoll, Unit 716, District 29.
(Applause.)
POPPY CHAIRMAN CARTER: First place President's
theme: Karen Herrera, District 15, Unit 20.
(Applause.)
POPPY CHAIRMAN CARTER: And thank you, Madam
President, for doing your judging and all the other judges. First place supplemental report goes to District 22, Maureen Moe Giacalone.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Giacalone.
(Applause.)
POPPY CHAIRMAN CARTER: First place overall unit poppy program goes to Jackie Robinson Unit 252, Bertha Edmondson, chairman.
(Applause.)
POPPY CHAIRMAN CARTER: Madam President, one special award is given to this individual who is really hard to decide to get someone so close and you cannot leave them out. It's given to an individual that is so supported by her unit, all she loved to do is write supplemental reports. This special award goes to George Tadlock Unit 472, Beatrice Brunner.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Is that you, Bea? I
didn't know.
DELEGATE BRUNNER: My name changed five years
ago.
POPPY CHAIRMAN CARTER: There you go.
DELEGATE BRUNNER: Thank you.
POPPY CHAIRMAN CARTER: Thank you. Madam
President Anita, it has truly been a tremendous experience serving as the Poppy Chairman this year. It has been fun,
stressful, and just plain old thankful for the many
travels with boxes of poppies in my trunk to give out in honor of our veterans. I thank you so very much for this assignment. PAST DEPARTMENT GOPHER JACOB: Ladies, how are you today? Have you enjoyed your convention? Anita, have
you enjoyed your convention?
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Absolutely.
CHAIRMAN JACOB: I know Lonnie enjoyed last
night. I don't know if at the convention. Before he went
home. But this young man here is a -- let me start over again.

Many years ago a little organization was formed, no tax deductible organization, but for those of you who don't know, the husband of your president is called the gopher. 1996. Okay. The gopher -- they're called the gopher because when the Madam President says "I need," we go for it. Lonnie couldn't be here today because he's on probation at our meeting last night. And I'm sure you missed it during the day. During this week he didn't bring his gopher with him, the little dancing gopher that we had a few years ago so --

MS. CAPAZZI: Is it still alive?
PAST DEPARTMENT GOPHER JACOB: We've been told it's still alive, but he's not off probation until it's proven. So I'll turn this over to Peter because we want to make a presentation to the president's special project.

PAST DEPARTMENT GOPHER DUVALL: Good afternoon
ladies.
AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Good afternoon.

you all. Thank you for your generosity of $\$ 260$ to our special project.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Will the
Sergeant-at-Arms, along with the Distinguished Guest Chairman please escort these Past Department Gophers from the room. Don't just take them to the back. Take them out of here.
(Processional.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Okay. Outside of
the room raffle tickets are being drawn. You may check that later on this afternoon. They're drawing those tickets, the ones in the hallway. The Ways \& Means will close sales this afternoon. So when we close this session, they will close the sales and she will announce winners. On the 50/50 she'll announce tomorrow, but they will draw the baskets and have the numbers on the baskets, the tickets of the baskets.

We will now hear from our Veterans Affairs \& Rehabilitation Chairman who's at the podium, Susie Tozier.

VA\&R REPORT
VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: The convention committee for Veterans Affairs \& Rehabilitation met on June 19th, 2014 at 9:00 a.m. in Room 201 of the Santa Clara Convention Center. The statistical report of this chairman appears on pages 25 and 26 of the Book of Reports.

Donna Smith, District 22 was appointed secretary.

Faye Sanchez, District 3 offered prayer. Jerry Darnielle, District 4, was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 21 delegates answered roll call and there were eight visitors.

The code was read and the following code changes were approved by the committee. Department code number 1:
"The Department Veterans Affairs \& Rehabilitation Chairman oversees and is responsible for all aspects of the VA\&R program and serves as the hospital, field, and home services directors as well as chairman." This was done in 2008.

They have deleted "home service" from National:
"The Department Veterans Affairs \& Rehabilitation Chairman oversees and is responsible for all aspects of the VA\&R program and serves as the hospital" -- wait a minute. I forgot to take out the word. Oh, never mind. My eyes are -- "serves as the hospital and field service directors as well as the chairman." We are deleting "and home services."

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Okay.
VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: I move for -- I move for the adoption.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: By direction of the
V -- did the committee make that a motion?
VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: Yes.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Or you want to make
the motion?
VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: I'm making the motion.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: You second it;
right?
PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: Yeah, I second it. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: That the VA\&R code number 1 be changed to read: "The Department Veterans Affairs \& Rehabilitation chairman oversees and is responsible for all aspects of the VA\&R Program and serves as the hospital and field service directors as well as chairman."

Is there any discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: All those in favor
say aye.
ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Those opposed say
no.
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Motion carried.
VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: Next code number 4. This deals with the national assessment; we no longer get assessed by National. The code right now reads: "The budget shall include amounts to fulfill the obligations of

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financial aid for rehabilitation cases, chairmen and program allowances, Medical Center Representative allowances, National Assessment, administrative expenses, and such other conferences as may be authorized by the Department President. Reimbursement for authorized travel out of state shall be coach airfare and per diem as allowed at the rate established by Department and approved by the Finance Committee."

We are just going to delete "National
Assessment." It will read: "The budget shall include amounts to fulfill the obligations of financial aid for rehabilitation cases, chairmen and program allowances, Medical Center Representative allowances, administrative expenses, and such other conferences as may be authorized by the Department President. Reimbursement for authorized travel out of state shall be coach airfare and per diem as allowed at the rate established by Department and approved by the Finance Committee."

We're just deleting "National Assessment." I move for the adoption.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: It's been moved and seconded to change the VA\&R code number 4 to read: "The budget shall include amounts to fulfill the obligations of financial aid for rehabilitation cases, chairmen and program allowances, Medical Center Representative allowances, administrative expenses, and such other conferences as may be authorized by the Department
President. Reimbursement for authorized travel out of state shall be coach airfare and per diem as allowed at the rate established by Department and approved by the Finance Committee."

Is there any discussion? (No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: All those in favor say aye.

ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Those opposed say
no.
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Motion carried. VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: Number 8 reads: "The National Assessment to support the National Rehabilitation fund shall be paid from the Department Welfare Fund and the check shall be sent to the National Treasurer upon receipt." I move to delete this code and renumber 9, 10, and 11 to 8, 9, 10 and 11.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: It has been moved to delete the code in its entirety, number 8: "The National Assessment to support the National Rehabilitation fund shall be paid from the Department Welfare Fund and the
check shall be sent to the National Treasurer upon receipt."

Is there any discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: All those in favor
say aye.
ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Those opposed say
no.
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Motion carried.
VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: On the new code number 8:
"Applications for Rehabilitation aid (casework) shall be completed and signed by the Unit Chairman and Unit
President. Checks shall be made payable to the Unit Chairman. Additional checks shall not be issued until receipts for previous expenditures, accompanied by form number 2 have been received by the Department Chairman."

We want to change code number -- this code to read -- we're just going to delete the word "chairman" at the end of the third sentence. It will read:
"Applications for Rehabilitation aid (casework) shall be completed and signed by the Unit Chairman and Unit President. Checks shall be made payable to the Unit. Additional checks shall not be issued until receipts for previous expenditures, accompanied by form number 2 have been received by the Department Chairman."

I move the adoption. Instead of going to the Unit Chairman, it's just going to go to the unit.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: It has been moved and seconded to change new code number 8 , the new numbered code number 8 to: "Applications for Rehabilitation aid (casework) shall be completed and signed by the Unit Chairman and Unit President. Checks shall be made payable to the Unit. Additional checks shall not be issued until receipts for previous expenditures, accompanied by form number 2 have been received by the Department Chairman." Is there any discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: All those in favor say aye.

ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Those opposed say
no.
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Motion carried.
VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: New number 10 reads: "The Department Secretary/Treasurer shall notify the Department Chairman on an annual basis the current cost of all pins available for the VA\&R program. The cost shall include
tax and handling expenses. The Department Chairman shall then mail the Hospital Certification Form to all Medical Center Representatives and the Field and Home Service Pin Certification Forms to all units. Only Hospital
Representatives are authorized to purchase Hospital pins. New volunteers shall receive an identification patch with her pin. Patches are supplied free of charge by the Department."

We are going to -- we want to replace the word "mail" with "website" and delete "Home Services" so it will read. "The Department Secretary/Treasurer shall notify the Department Chairman on an annual basis the current cost of all pins available for the VA\&R program. The cost shall include tax and handling expenses. The Department Chairman shall post on the Department website the updated forms for Hospital Certification and Field Service Pin Certification. Copies will be mailed to Hospital Representatives who do not have access to the website. Only Hospital Representatives are authorized to purchase Hospital pins. New volunteers shall receive an identification" -- I forgot something there. "Shall receive an identification patch" -- can you drop the D off of that so it reads "and." Thank you. "Receive an identification patch with her pin. Patches are supplied free of charge by Department." It was a typo error. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Yeah. We have a point of order here with regard to the new name for the VA\&R. It's not Field Service. NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: Field service -Madam President, Nancy Brown-Park, National President. Field service, home service has been combined and there's a new name for it. And Harriet and I are both pulling our hair out trying to remember the new name which goes into effect for the next administrative year.

I've just sent a text to my National Vice
President, so hopefully $I$ will have it soon, but I'm not sure.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Yeah, we may need to amend the code once we get the right name. It's not "field services." It's like a hospital or it's something. VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: Yeah, I didn't know about that one. Okay.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Our minds are not as good as they used to be. Did you already make a motion on this --

VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: Yes. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: -- code change? Any second?

VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: I make a motion to accept this code change as presented.

PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: I'll second it. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: It's been moved and seconded to change the new number 10 code to read: "The Department Secretary/Treasurer shall notify the Department Chairman on an annual basis the current cost of all pins available for the VA\&R program. The cost shall include tax and handling expenses. The Department Chairman shall post on the Department website the updated forms for Hospital Certification and Field Service Pin
Certification. Copies will be mailed to Hospital
Representatives who do not have access to the website. Only Hospital Representatives are authorized to purchase Hospital pins. New volunteers shall receive an identification patch with her pin. Patches are supplied free of charge by Department." Is there any discussion on this code change? One second. I'm humming the Jeopardy theme in my head. Okay. We have the new name. VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: All right. I amend number 10 -- we'll go back and do the other one. I amend the new number 10 to replace the words "Field Service" with "Service to the Veterans." So it will read: "The cost shall include tax and handling expenses. The chairman shall post on the Department website the updated forms for Hospital Certification and Service to the Veterans Certification" -- is it going to be certified too? DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: "Service to Veterans Pin Certification."

VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: "Pin Certification."
Okay. "Copies will be mailed to Hospital Representatives who do not have access to the website. Only Hospital Representatives are authorized to purchase hospital pins. New volunteers shall receive an identification patch with" -- on those patches are OBE because they say "field service" on them. So we're --

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: They will have to come up with a new patch, the National organization. That's their change. The organization is going to come with new patches.

VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: Are you going to have patches too?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Yeah, it will be changed. Everything is going to be changed. A new pin. Our National President is speaking to me as we speak. We'll have redesigned Service to Veterans pins and patches.

VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: So I'll continue. We left that in the annual report. "Patch with her pin. Patches are supplied free of charge by the Department." I move for the adoption.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: It's been moved and seconded to amend the new code 10 of the VA\&R to read: "The Department Secretary/Treasurer are shall notify the Department Chairman on an annual basis the current cost of all pins available for the VA\&R program. The cost shall include tax and handling expenses. The Department Chairman shall post on the Department Website the updated form for Hospital Certification and Service to Veterans Pin Certification. Copies will be mailed to Hospital Representatives who do not have access to the website. Only Hospital Representatives are authorized to purchase hospital pins. New volunteers shall receive an identification patch with their pin. Patches are supplied free of charge by the Department."

Is there any discussion on this change?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Hearing none, all
those in favor say aye.
ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Those opposed say
no.
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: That motion is
carried.
VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: Back to department code number 1. I would like to change the words "Field Service" to "Service to the Veterans." So it will read: "The Department Veterans Affairs \& Rehabilitation Chairman oversees and is responsible for all aspects of the VA\&R program and serves as the Hospital and Service to the Veterans director as well as Chairman." I move for the adoption.

PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: Second.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: It's been moved and seconded to amend code 1 to read: "The Department
Veterans Affairs \& Rehabilitation Chairman oversees and is responsible for all aspects of the VA\&R program and serves as the Hospital and Service to Veterans director as well as Chairman."

Is there any discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: All those in favor
say aye.
ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Those opposed say
no.
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Motion carried.
VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: Number 2 under Medical
Center Gift Shops/Patient Remembrance: "Only carefully

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selected new gifts shall be sent to the Representatives by November 1st. The Representatives may re-evaluate the gifts, sending the corrected evaluation to the Units. Representatives shall be permitted to purchase additional gifts for the patients only when suitable gifts are not on hand. Representatives shall provide instruction to the unit members prior to their serving in the gift shop."

We want to add the following words to the beginning of the sentence: "For those facilities that have gift shops, only carefully selected new gifts shall be sent to the Representatives by November 1st. The Representatives may re-evaluate the gifts, sending the corrected evaluation to the Units. Representatives shall be permitted to purchase additional gifts for the patients only when suitable gifts are not on hand. Representatives shall provide instruction to the unit members prior to their serving in the gift shop."

I move for the adoption.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: It has been moved and seconded. Item 2 changed to read: "For those facilities that have gift shops, only carefully selected new gifts shall be sent to the Representatives by November 1st. The Representatives may re-evaluate the gifts, sending the corrected evaluation to the Units.
Representatives shall be permitted to purchase additional gifts for the patients only when suitable gifts are not on hand. Representatives shall provide instruction to the unit members prior to their serving in the gift shop."

Is there any discussion on this code change?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: All those in favor,
say aye.
ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Those opposed say
no.
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Motion carried. VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: Section 3.a(2). "The decision regarding District assignments and where gifts will be sent shall be made by the Department Chairman." We want to change to read: "The decision regarding District assignments and where donations will be sent shall be made by the Department Chairman." We're taking the word "gift" out because these are donations. I move for the adoption.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: It has been moved and seconded to change item 3.a(2) to: The decision regarding District assignments and where donations will be sent shall be made by the Department Chairman." Is there any discussion on this code change?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: All those in favor
say aye.
ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: All opposed say no.
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Motion carried.
VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: Field service code. I
would like to change the title to Service to Veterans. I move for the change of title.

ACTING SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: I'll second that.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: It's been moved and seconded to change the title from "Field Service Code" to
"Service to Veterans Code." Is there any discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: All those in favor say aye.

ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Those opposed say
no.
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Motion carries.
VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: Number 1: "The Department
VA\&R Chairman serves as the Field Services Director and must complete the American Legion Auxiliary orientation course to be certified."

The change to read: "The Department VA\&R Chairman serves as the Field Service to the Veterans Director." Deleting the "and must complete the American Legion Auxiliary orientation course to be certified." I move for the adoption.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Well, this is a bit redundant because we already have the code that she serves as the Service to Veterans. She wants to just delete that then.

VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: They told me there's not going to be any certification.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: The National
President is stating that there will still be a course, so --

VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: So I'm going to amend and just change the word "Field Service" to "Service to Veterans."

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Okay.
VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: And leave the remainder of the sentence so it will now read: "The Department VA\&R Chairman serves as the Service to Veterans Director and must complete the American Legion Auxiliary orientation course to be certified."

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DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: It has been moved and seconded to change under the code -- the Service to Veterans code number 1 to: The Department VA\&R Chairman serves as the Service to Veterans Director and must complete the American Legion Auxiliary orientation course to be certified."

Is there any discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: All those in favor, say aye.

ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Those opposed say
no.
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Motion carried.
VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: The next code is on the information $I$ just got. It currently reads: "The Field Service Director shall make arrangements for at least one Field Service orientation course during the year. She should encourage certified members to offer the orientation course within their own Districts. A certified Field Service Director's permission. A list of members attending the District orientation course shall be sent to the Field Service Director for certification and the issuance of cards."

I want to just change "Field Service" to "Service to the Veterans" in the two places that's in that sentence. "The Service to the Veterans Director shall make arrangements for at least one Service to the Veterans" -- I'm going to -- let me start again.
"The Service to the Veteran Director shall make arrangements for at least one orientation course during the year. She should encourage certified members to offer the orientation course within their own district. A certified Service to the Veterans" -- I think I forgot something when $I$ typed that.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: The code as it's worded now is read: "A certified Field Service volunteer may give orientation course to the district with the field service director's permission."

VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: That's what --
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Yeah, that's not
what you read.
VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: I left off --
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Yeah. That sentence is incomplete.

VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: Yeah. "The orientation course within their own District with the certified Service to the Veterans Director's permission." You're going to delete the period after "districts" and put in
"with the certified."
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Yeah, I understand what you're saying. Comma. It should be a comma. Susie, there should just be a comma after "districts" and it should say, "with the certified Service to Veterans Director's permission."

VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: Correct.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: And then you need to read the last sentence.

VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: Okay. "A list of members attending the District orientation course shall be sent to the Service to the Veterans director for certification and issuance of cards."

I move for the adoption.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: It has been moved and seconded that the Service to Veterans Director shall make arrangements for at least one Field Service -- never mind. "Service to Veterans orientation course during the year. She should encourage certified members to offer the orientation within their own districts with the certified Service to Veterans director's permission. A list of members attending the District orientation course shall be sent to the Service to Veteran Director for certification and the issuance of cards."

Is there a discussion on this code change?
DELEGATE PHILCOX: Ann Philcox, District 20.
You're saying "Service to Our Veterans." Susie is saying
"Service to the Veterans." Is it to the veterans or to our veterans?

VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: To veterans.
DELEGATE PHILCOX: To veterans. So there's no
"our" or no "the."
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Hold on.
DELEGATE PHILCOX: Okay. So you're both wrong. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: So my little -- my
word will be changed "to the Veterans."
DELEGATE PHILCOX: It's "the Veterans."
VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: Is it "the Veterans"?
DELEGATE PHILCOX: "Service to the Veterans."
NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: They don't belong
to us. Maybe some of them.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Okay. "To the
Veterans."
VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: Thank you.
DELEGATE PHILCOX: Thank you.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: We'll make sure the
word is -- court reporter, "Service to Veterans." I don't even think there's a "the" or "our." Nancy, is it Service to Veterans? Okay. Yes, Service to Veterans. Yeah, Service to Veterans. So just when you heard me say "the"
and "our," it's just Service to Veterans.
Is there any further discussion on that code change?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: All in favor say
aye.
ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Those opposed say
no.
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Motion carries. VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: Home Service Code. I move deletion of this section. I did -- we changed what we were going to do for that section because that was talking about taking out the orientation course. So all we did was just change the title.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Are you stating
that -- are you motioning to delete the entire Home Service Code?

VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: Yes.
PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: I'm talking about the one above it.

VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: The one above it is based on the information we got. This was deleting the certification. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Oh, I understand what she's saying. The one before the Home Service Code, this new unit 2, you didn't read that. VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: No, we didn't read that one. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Are you going to? VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: We just changed it, changed the name of Field Service Director to Service to Veterans, and that's all we did in that code. We didn't go through the whole thing. We deleted the course and all that so new 2 is no good. Oh, I'm sorry. I did miss a section, Diane.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: I knew you would catch up with us. I was just standing there.

VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: Okay. I was going to delete code number 2 in its entirety, but we changed the numbers and so now the old -- the 3, under 3: "Unit VA\&R Chairman shall submit requests for certificates, pins and hour bars on the proper forms to the Department Office. The Department VA\&R Chairman will mail those forms to all units annually after she receives the pricing information from the Department Office. A copy of each Unit's request shall be mailed to the Department VA\&R by the Department Office."

Change the code to read: "Unit VA\&R Chairman
shall submit requests for certificate, pins and hour bars on the proper forms to the Department Office. The Department VA\&R Chairman will post these new forms to the Department website and included in program bulletins mailed to those who pay for the Department mailing."

I move for the adoption.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: It's been moved and seconded to change number 3 of the Service to Veterans code to read: "Unit VA\&R Chairman shall submit requests for certificate, pins and hour logs on the proper forms to the Department Office. The Department VA\&R Chairman will post these new forms to the Department website and included in program bulletins mailed to those who pay for the Department mailing."

All those in favor say aye.
ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Those opposed say
no.
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Motion carried.
VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: I move for the deletion of the Home Service Code.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: You will need to
read the code as it is.
VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: Okay. "The Department VA\&R chairman serves as the Home Service Director. One, Home Service Director shall have current patterns and the list of needed items for the representatives. She shall compile a mass list by facilities for distribution to the units at department workshops. Unit VA\&R Chairman shall submit requests for certificates, pins and hours on the proper forms to the department office. The Department VA\&R Chairman will mail these forms to all units annually as she receives the pricing information from the department office. A copy of each request shall be mailed to the department office, the Department VA\&R Chairman by the department office."

I move to delete this section of the code.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: It's been moved and
seconded to delete the section of the code for Home
Service Code. Is there any discussion on this deletion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: All those in favor say aye.

ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Those opposed say
no.
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Motion carried.
VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: 100 percent reportings
were given to District 4, 6, 7, 9, 10, 18, 19, 21, 22, 23, $24,25,27$, and 28. The following awards were given. Second place best unit report: Unit 291 , District 29. Third place best unit report: Jackie Robinson Unit 252, District 23. Second place best district report: District 25. Third place best district report: District 22.

Districts were beginning to talk about events within the districts. Unfortunately this was cut short due to time. It is recommended in the future that this program be given an hour and a half for their meeting. The meeting closed at 10:00 a.m.

May I give my supplemental?
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Yes, you may.
VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: The balls have sure been
flying into the H.O.O.P.S. 4 Veterans. The year started with Auxiliary members alongside Legion Family in parades, holidays, dinners, and helping the Veterans. The momentum did not stop then. The Legion Family participated in stand downs, food, clothing, showers, medical and dental, haircuts are done. Long Beach held a stand down just for women veterans. Blankets, pillows, towels, clothing, money, and toiletries were collected for this event. Hours of work are put into these events. Now it's time to do this event again. No one complains. They just line up to help.

I attended the opening of the ASPIRE center in San Diego. This joint venture by the VA and the City of San Diego worked together to make this facility available for the PTSD veterans from Iraq and Afghanistan. This facility housed 40 women and men for up to three months. During the veterans' time at the facility, they received job training skills. This is a step to get them off the street and back into being productive.

When President Anita came to San Diego I went with her, Lois Cornish, Cindy Simons and toured the Chula Vista Veterans home, the WAVE Clinic, the ASPIRE Center, and the VAMC in La Jolla. What a busy day. At the WAVE Clinic we met the poppy makers. They are so organized and worked as a team. We walked the halls of the VA hospital and ending with a tour of the spinal cord unit.

I also flew to Palo Alto for a tour with Anita. It was so rewarding to see the wonderful things we do for the veterans. The gardens are a peaceful atmosphere that just helps them to gather their thoughts. We were very lucky to have a tour of the Fisher House. This was the first time $I$ saw one. It was beautiful.

The representatives and deputies coordinated events at the VA facilities with the units. Monthly bingo parties, buddy baskets, gift remembrances, the gift at Jerry L. Pettis, the only hospital that operates a gift
shop. A veteran was allowed to select a gift to give to his granddaughter.

Units along with the Legion Family stuffed 450 backpacks for active military children, coordinated with the Armed Forces YMCA, baby showers for pregnant military wives, Wreaths Across America laid wreaths at Christmas time on veterans' graves, holiday dinners, support Ride 2 Recovery by serving meals to the participants and lining the streets cheering them to the finish, participated in the Stop Soldier Suicide Awareness Run, raised funds to send World War II Veterans to Washington D.C. This will be the last time these veterans will be able to attend because of their age.

One district hosted their annual ball for military children. They coordinate this event with other districts and community organizations. 300 participants have a great time enjoying a wonderful evening of fun.

Home Service is very important. They knitted
afghans, made quilts for laps and beds, provided meals and baked. One unit provided monthly meals for the Wounded Warriors at Camp Pendleton. Welcoming home returning military personnel is very important. One unit stands at the airport welcoming troops. Another unit prepares the barracks leaving notes and gifts on the bed. Department juniors made cards thanking them for their service. The Fisher House is located at various military facilities and VA hospital grounds. One unit member who is part of the Blue Star Mothers helped to raise $\$ 21,000$. The Legion Family in Long Beach is raising money for a new Fisher House. They are getting closer, but far to their goal.

Another Legion Family had operation all the way home. This was to bring a wounded veteran home to his family and friends. This teamwork by the town and people made a dream for the SPC Jerral Hancock come true.

In District 20, a grassroots program was started by Ms. Jamie Goodreau's history class at Lancaster High School. This class adopted a severe -- this is sad. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: It's okay. Breathe,
Susie.
VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: I'm trying.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: I know. Slow down.
It's okay.
VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: This class adopted a severely injured veteran to raise $\$ 500,000$ for a house. This veteran's wife left him with his two small children. He was wounded with a severed spine and burns. He requires 24 -hour care. The Legion Family pitched in and has raised over $\$ 10,000$. Actor Gary Sinise came and put on a concert. The convert raised over $\$ 150,000$. Mr.

Sinise paid for his band expenses out of his pocket. He performs for wounded warriors all over the United States. It was great to hear that he did this event. The class is getting very close to their $\$ 500,000$ goal. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: That was me. VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: All right. I'm better
now.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Was anybody asleep?
I'm sorry. I was so moved by your reading, I wanted to clap and I hit the microphone. VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: With the permission of Madam President, there will be a resolution thanking Mr. Sinise for all the work he does for the wounded warriors. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: I think District 20
deserves a big round of applause.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Led by Ann Philcox. Ann Philcox, this is her mission in life.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Please continue,
Susie.
VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: Hoops 4 Veterans special projects was the Temporary Financial Aid. Cans were filled and units stepped up again. At the time of my report to National, we had raised $\$ 16,000$. Now to date we are very close -- I think we're over $\$ 25,000$.
(Applause.)
VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: This year I have approved ten TFA cases and I am still being asked for help. Unfortunately there is not enough funds left. I have referred them to the National American Legion and the next year's chairman. The economic times are hard for veterans of all ages. It's not just the young ones anymore.

Lasted year National voted to merge Field Service and Home Service together. There is not -- I'm not going to read that because it's no longer true.

It is recommended that next year's chairman throw away the current report and write one that is very short. I like that one.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: We agree.
VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: I now would like to give
out my awards. I just want -- units donated to the department over $\$ 30,000$ in funds to the department VA\&R program.
(Applause.)
VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: $\$ 10,900$ to gift
remembrance department, and then we have the other which is probably within their districts is 4,725 . They've raised 13,925 for the Fisher House and a value of new or used clothing is $\$ 37,426.18$. Job well done. This is a
very -- this program is so heartwarming and rewarding and it's just -- it's just wonderful. Lots of work.

Okay. My awards. Okay. Best unit report first
place: Oceanside Unit 146.
(Applause.)
VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: Best district report,
first place: District 19.
(Applause.)
VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: Okay. Highest donation at
the time of my report to National for Hoops 4 TFA was
District 6 with $\$ 749$.
(Applause.)
VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: Okay. Now I would like to introduce some very special people and they're going to give you the performance they gave at midyear. Ladies, are you ready?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Sergeant-at-Arms and
Marshal and Distinguished Guest Chairman, please escort our team therapists, our hospital representatives, and departments deputies.
(Processional.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Excuse me. I know you all can sing better than that.

VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: Are you ready?
SINGERS: Take me out to the ball game. Take me out to the crowd. Buy me a peanuts and Cracker Jacks. I don't care if $I$ never get back. Well, it's root, root, root for the home team. California will win. Hooray. For it's $10,20,30$ will win at the old ball game. (Applause.) VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: At midyear we were lucky to have accompaniment by a trumpet player, so it was really wonderful. I would like to introduce -- I hope they're there. San Francisco, Lorraine Sullivan, representative. June Jackson, deputy. Tammy Manini. She's not here. Kathleen Sullivan. Sierra Nevada Healthcare is Mary Lou Warner, and I know she's not here. Sierra Foothills is Bonnie Chavoya. Northern California is Wendy O'Brien, representative. Glenda Schultz, deputy. Redding is Barbara Dailey. NEC CHAIRMAN MIKESELL: She's right there. thank -- oh, would the Sergeant -- we'll wait for her.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: What you need,
Susie?
VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: I was going to excuse
them, but --
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: I'll excuse them.
Thank you. Are you done with your report?
VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: I'm done.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Okay. Before you
go, there's a special presentation that will be made to you by Deputy Becky Bullard.

HOSPITAL DEP BULLARD: From the reps and deps, we present you with this. We hope you will enjoy it. And if you notice somebody pointed this out to me very
poignantly. I put reps and deps and I put an extra zero in the 2014. You will never get another one like this.

VA\&R CHAIRMAN TOZIER: That's wonderful.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Okay. I have a note that there's a king-sized quilt that is -- I think that one in the corner. The money is going to our special project and they'll be giving that away on Saturday. Maryann called; is that right? Hello? The tickets are three for $\$ 5 . \quad$ So please participate.

Joan Cannon, can you please come to the stage. And we'll have our next report. Diana Moreno.

AMERICANISM REPORT
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MORENO: I brought my
friends with me, Betsy Ross and one solider to represent all our soldiers and veterans.

Madam President, good afternoon.
AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Good afternoon.
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MORENO: The convention committee on Americanism met on June 19th, 2014 in Room 202 of the Santa Clara Convention Center, Santa Clara, California. Chris Ann De La Rosa was appointed secretary, Bonnie Christner offered prayer, and Wilma Miner was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 24 district delegates answered roll call. There were six visitors present including one junior.

The committee agreed upon the following report: One code change was recommended by the community regarding Department Americanism essay contest. On page 10, Code 4, Group $V$, children with exceptional needs below that of average students.

Madam President, would you like me to read the entire Code 4? I have one little change in it.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: We have to read it
and --
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MORENO: Okay. "The
Department shall" --
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Is this a
housekeeping change?
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MORENO: No. Okay. "The Department shall sponsor an Americanism Essay Contest. Competition to be in the indicated box below with prizes and citations for first and second place in Group I, II, III, and V and first, second, and third place educational grant winners in Group IV. The amount of prize money may be adjusted if not available. Group I: 4th and 5th grades. Prizes: First - \$100; second - \$50. 2007. Group II: 6th and 7th grade. Prizes: First - \$100; Second - \$50. 2007. Group III: 8th and 9th Grades.

Prizes: First - \$200; second \$100. 2007. Group IV: 10th, 11th, and 12th grades. Prizes: First - \$2500 Educational Grant; second - \$1,500 Educational Grant; third - \$1,000 Educational Grant. 2007. Group V: Children with exceptional learning needs below that of average students. Prizes: Ages 11 to 14. First - $\$ 200$; second - \$100; ages 14 years 9 months to 20 years: First - \$200; second - \$100. 2007. The rules governing these contests for each group shall be made available to the units by September 1. The prize for Group IV shall be financed by voluntary contributions from the units. 2007. Group V are students classified as children with exceptional learning needs below those of average students. All students eligible for special classes, and not admitted because of lack of facilities shall be identified as such at the discretion of the school. 2007."

What we propose to change, and then I can reread the whole thing again if you would like --

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: (Shakes head.)
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MORENO: -- is change the children with exceptional learning needs below that of average students, change the second group within that group of ages 14 years 9 months to 20 years, to change it to ages 15 to 20 years. I move on behalf of the preconvention committee, $I$ move we accept this change.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: The preconvention committee for Americanism proposed change code number 4 as read. The change will be in the category $V$ for ages from 14 years 9 months to 20 years first place $\$ 200$, second place $\$ 100$, and change that age to 15 to 20 years, first place $\$ 200$ and second place $\$ 100$. The only change would be 15 years from 14 years 9 months. Do you understand the code change?

AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Yes.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Is there any
discussion on this code change?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: All those in favor, say aye.

ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Those opposed say
no.
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Motion carried.
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MORENO: Thank you. There was a housekeeping change and we don't need to go over that. Citations were awarded to units and districts for 100 percent and various other awards. Americanism essay certificates and monies were also awarded for second and

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third place essays.
Madam President, this concludes my committee
report. May I continue with my narrative report?
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: We need to know what your housekeeping change was. We just need to know where it is. We need to know what are you changing.

AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MORENO: Well, we were changing -- there isn't a code. It was just on the American essay contest rules for schools -- do you want me to read that?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: No, if it's not in the code, you don't need to. AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MORENO: No, it's not a code change. It's just adding the age to those kids. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you. AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MORENO: The Americanism statistical report can you found on page 13 of the Book of Reports. And there was some concern. There was an error on that page, so I'd like to real quickly just to ease everyone's mine. On page 13 it says: "Number of units participating in the Department Americanism Essay Contest," it says zero. Well, there were 30. Our wonderful Ruby left off the 3 .

ACTING SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: I'm not perfect.

AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MORENO: And the total number of schools was 91 with 126 classrooms participating and 4,296 essays were read and graded by our wonderful unit members.
(Applause.)
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MORENO: The importance of the Americanism program is reiterated each time we recite the preamble of the American Legion Auxiliary in the statement, "To foster and perpetuate a 100 percent Americanism." This head coach is proud to report that the Yankee Doodle Dandies -- all my Yankee Doodle Dandies stand up. All my District Chairmen, Unit Chairmen. Thank you.
(Applause.)
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MORENO: My Americanism team not only included juniors, Legionnaires and Sons in their project and events, they worked alongside organizations including the Blue Star Mothers, Ride 2 Recovery, Boy Scout and Girl Scout troops, the VA and the VFW.

Some exceptional team games included a District 18 unit donating three flags to the Field of Valor in memory of those who have served, in memory of those currently serving, and in memory of all women who have served and are serving. A District 30 unit, along with their post -- come on. You can clap.
(Applause.)
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MORENO: Along with their post holds a flag retirement ceremony at a different school each year and it involves dozens of students and teachers. A District 16 unit held a flag ceremony at a local nursing home where they honored each veteran in the home and gave flags to all in attendance. Unit members of one District 29 unit -- and this really got to me. A District 29 unit spends ten hours every week participating in a downtown lowering of the flag ceremony.
(Applause.)
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MORENO: Patriotic holidays were a slam dunk by units attending or participating in parades and events for 9/11, Veterans Day, Memorial Day, Flag Day, and 4th of July distributing hundreds of flags, patriotic bookmarks, stickers, and coloring books and placing flags on thousands of veterans' graves. I think it was actually tens of thousands.

Unit members kept the ball in motion at schools all over California sponsoring the Americanism Essay Contest, presenting programs and assemblies, giving out student shoe and food vouchers, donating funds to schools and their libraries, presenting flags, patriotic stickers, worksheets, coloring books, pencils, singing songs and cultivating patriotism by involving students in a variety of ways including carrying flags and poem recitations.

A three pointer was scored by Unit 6, District 22 as they continued a tradition established in 1950 of participating in a New Citizen program with one member teaching potential new citizens the Pledge of Allegiance in English and the unit providing --
(Applause.)
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MORENO: And the unit providing each new citizen with a poppy corsage, patriotic ribbon, flag, flag pin, our country's flag and light of liberty.

Like players weaving their way across a crowded basketball court, units presented full-size flags to schools, city councils, fire departments, a WAVE Clinic and poppy production center, veterans homes, a Girl Scout troop, a senior center and one flag was presented to a patriotic neighbor that could not afford to replace his sad, tattered flag.

The military and their families were provided with food, gift and phone cards, home-cooked meals and free meals at post and unit functions. Blue Star Banners, holiday parties and baby showers. Units sent pocket flags, notes, cards, and care packages to troops overseas. Unit 684, District 27 hosted an annual POW/MIA candlelight ceremony with the VFW and the USO and was generously
supported with donations raised by District 18 members delighting everyone with an old-fashioned USO show.
(Applause.)
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MORENO: The National Guard
and their families were supported by units sponsoring
farewell and welcome home ceremonies; inviting them to post and unit events, hosting holiday parties and presenting Blue Star Banners. One unit honored those with 25 plus years in the Guard and another donated 120 student backpacks to the Armed Forces YMCA.

Members not only attended the American Legion Oratorical Contest, or they provided assistance, refreshments and judges. American Legion baseball participation included fundraisers, attending games, transportation and providing sports equipment.

Do you mind if $I$ get personal for a moment?
National has asked us to show pride in our organization. Are you team players proud to be a member of the American Legion Auxiliary?
(Applause.)
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MORENO: Then jump up and say it. I am proud to be a member American Legion Auxiliary.
(Applause.)
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MORENO: Our team players showed their membership pride by wearing poppies, Auxiliary pins and clothing, saying it in emails, in letters, on Facebook, and in line at the grocery store. They Twittered, they Tweeted -- now do you remember all remember Patriotic Patty? Well, she even twerked. I told her that's not showing pride. And marched in parades on the 4 th of July, on Veterans Day and Memorial Day, at stand downs. And one unit proudly displaced bouquets of poppies at the base of flagpoles at five local cemeteries.

In conclusion, this Yankee Doodle Dandy head coach would like to thank you, Commissioner Biggs, for the opportunity to serve on your Dream Team and to wish you well with the remainder of your season as Department of California Commissioner.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Please do.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you so much. Thank you.

(Applause.)
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MORENO: And there's a check for $\$ 100$ to the child.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Please take your photos after your report.

AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MORENO: I was going to say, after, ladies. First place, group II, grade 6 and 7 awarded $\$ 100$ to Kennan Davis, McElroy School, Auxiliary Unit 118, District 27.
(Applause.)
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MORENO: When I think about those 4,296 essays that were read, I have to take my hat off to all these ladies. Okay. First place group III, grades 8 and 9, "What does the Pledge of Allegiance mean to me?" Sponsored by Unit 694, District 28, America -how could she not win? -- Osornio of L.A.M.S. And a check for $\$ 200$.
(Applause.)
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MORENO: First place, group IV, and this is a -- oh, and group IV is grades 10, 11, and 12, for the $\$ 2500$ educational grant -- she'll be receiving 500 and $\$ 2,000$ will be credited to her college or university of her choice within two years of graduation. That is Tatiana Youpa of Marina High School, Auxiliary Unit 694, District 28.
(Applause.)
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MORENO: $\$ 200$ for first place in group $V$, ages 11 to 14 , children with special needs essay titled, "What is a veteran?" Sponsored by American Legion Auxiliary Unit 587, District 7, Jimmy DaRe, Foresthill Divide School. And he even -- he wrote his little essay telling what he felt a veteran was and he included a handmade drawing of the American flag.
(Applause.)
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MORENO: And he received \$200. I'm not sure if I said that. First place group ages 15 -- I should have said 14 years 9 months. Ages 15 to 20, "What is a veteran?" David Gutierrez, Princeton Junior/Senior High School, Auxiliary Unit 98, District 4.
(Applause.)
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MORENO: And a check for $\$ 200$. Thank you. Thank you, ladies. And for my supplementals I have -- let's see. Wait a sec. Wait a sec. Three awards. One for first place best unit Americanism project, and that goes to Kim Vincent, Unit

138, chairman District 30. And that's for their flag retirement ceremony held on November 8th at Finnley Elementary School.
(Applause.)
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MORENO: Best unit -- where are you? Here, sweetie pie. Best unit supplemental goes to Stephanie Janji, Unit 76, District 29.
(Applause.)
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MORENO: Now this will make you cry. This goes to -- our little soldier goes for our first place best overall district supplemental, Debbie Fletcher, District 25.
(Applause.)
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MORENO: Madam chairman, that concludes my year as the Americanism Chairman. Thank you all and God bless America. Oh, wait. I'm not done. I forgot. I even talked to the National President about this. Where are you? Where are you? To all the team players here today, this chairman asked you to take with you the knowledge you have gained and the experiences that have inspired both smiles and tears. And in the words of National President Nancy Brown-Park: Pass it on. Pass it on. Pass it on.

AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Pass it on.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you so much, Diana Moreno. That's a great report. Give her a big round of applause.
(Applause.)
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MORENO: Since I managed to get through that okay. Thank you for your support this year. I lost my husband a year ago. I got hundreds and hundreds of cards from units and districts throughout California and I can't tell you how much it meant. Thank you.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: We love you, Diana. We have your back. We are there for you. He was a great veteran and Legionnaire. Did you have any submissions, Diana, for the Veronica Spence award?

AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MORENO: Actually, there were none.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: We want to make sure that our juniors are utilizing this potential earning. You know, we have this money here and it's only for junior members. And we need to support them and perhaps have an essay to make sure we pass that on at our high schools and whatever school they're in. It's not for grade school and up.

AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN MORENO: I'm going to post a
list. There were none.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: And could you please
give a copy of your scholarship award winners to our court reporter? Thank you.

Before we move on with our next to last, we're going to have our Distinguished Guest Chairman speak and then we're going to have an address by our National
President Nancy.
Someone from the 3rd district, there's no name on here, but they lost $\$ 60$. It fell out of their purse this afternoon and they really need that money. ## DISTINGUISHED GUEST CHAIRMAN REPORT

DISTINGUISHED GUEST CHAIRMAN WORKMAN: Madam Department Presidents and Delegates. Okay. So at midyear meeting $I$ stated that as general manager of our Dream Team I would know the difference between a golf ball and an exercise ball and a basketball by convention, but all I can tell you is that one is white, one is orange, and one is any color you want it to be. I'm still wiping up my chin, so $I$ got that dribble thing down, but not the kind that you do with a ball.

Now I've heard about the Sweet 16 . There's something eight and a final four, but I still don't know how you decide who wins the Superbowl of basketball. I tried that running thing, but it didn't work out so well for me so $I$ gave up that part. The only running $I$ do is after my grandkids.

I do want to thank you all for sending me the stiletto tennis shoe websites, but seeing how I couldn't do any of the other basketball functions, I thought buying those shoes was pretty useless. But thanks to Madam President --

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: And the 27th
District.
DISTINGUISHED GUEST CHAIRMAN WORKMAN: -- and the 27th District $I$ was able to wear these today.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: I passed it on.
DISTINGUISHED GUEST CHAIRMAN WORKMAN: Pass it on. Madam President, it has been a pleasure to serve you this year as your Distinguished Guest Chairman. I was able to meet with my long lost Ginger Cox, Western Division National Vice President, as not only did we have so many things in common, but she also shares the same birthday as I. Some of you might know, I was a twin and my sister died at birth. My mom would always say that she wouldn't know what she would do with two like me, but I think that $I$ found my match in Ginger.

Here at convention it has been my honor to assist with the official visit of our very distinguished guest, National President Nancy Brown-Park. Don't get too used to this, buddy, because in August we're back to sharing rooms and other stuff.

Okay. Madam President, I would be remiss if I did not thank you for allowing me to work with Cherie Galvan and Taadhimeka Stovall, your department Sergeant-at-Arms and Marshal. They have been the greatest.
(Applause.)
DISTINGUISHED GUEST CHAIRMAN WORKMAN: For those of you who will be attending the banquet, I know you'll have a wonderful time and enjoy the entertainment tonight.

Now normally I leave you with a little bit of wisdom, so here's just a little thought. A psychology teacher had just finished a lecture on mental health and had proceeded to give an oral quiz to the students. Speaking specifically about manic depression, the teacher asked how would you diagnose a patient who walks back and forth screaming at the top of his lungs one minute and then sits in a chair weeping uncontrollably the next. A young man in the rear of the room raised his hand and answered. A basketball coach.

Madam President, this concludes my platform remarks.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you, Linda, for your wise words once again. We have our head coaches out there. They know what we're talking about.

At this time $I$ would like to bring up our most distinguished guest; Nancy Brown-Park of Palm Desert, California was elected National President of the American Legion Auxiliary during the organization's 93rd National Convention last year.

Our Nancy, a 66-year member, joined the ALA through her father Richard E. Brown, a World War II Army Air Force veteran. Nancy was the first honorary Junior Department President. Nancy followed in the Past Department President footsteps of her mother, Jean Brown,
making them the first mother/daughter to serve the state's highest office.

She is also eligible through the service of her husband, Jim Park, a Navy Vietnam veteran and officer, by the way. She exemplifies the ALA's model of "Service, not self" by actively volunteering in her community and other organizations.

Please give a California welcome to our own Nancy Brown-Park, the National President of the American Legion Auxiliary.
(Applause.)
ADDRESS BY NATIONAL PRESIDENT
NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: I'm practicing. So I want you to know that Terry put her hands over her head when she heard I was 66. You didn't know that?

NEC CHAIRMAN MIKESELL: No.
NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: I am a 66-year
member. And it's funny how across the country people go, "Really?" Well, I was four days old when my parents signed me up, so now you know how old I really am.

So I'm excited to be here. It's been an incredible few days to be back home again. I have really missed California. And when you travel around the United States, everybody does things differently, but nobody does things like we do in California.
(Applause.)
NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: And that's a good thing. Ruby said, "Is that good or bad?" That's a really good thing. So Diana, Diana, your report was awesome and I understand you're moving and you're going to Nevada and can I tell you, I said to Harriet, they really, really need her in Nevada. Oh, yeah, and I said in the spirit of goodwill California's willing to share because Nevada really needs some help. So the very best of luck. Your report was wonderful and thanks for all your spirit and your pass it on spirit. Thank you, Diana.
(Applause.)
NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: I want to
recognized some really important people. Everybody is really important. I did that the other day with that poem too, but some really important people to me, the Melgard family were in the back. So you can stand, Melgard family.
(Applause.)
NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: Thank you. And I had some national representatives that are serving with me this year. So if you'll stand, Melanie Taylor, who is the National Legislative Chairman. LuAnn Capazzi -- and maybe
we'll get them all up so that we can clap at once for them. LuAnn Capazzi who is Vice Chair of Americanism. Pilar Reyes, who is a Western Division Community Service Chairman. Lou Thompson -- is Lou still here? Lou Thompson is the Vice Chair of the Cavalcade of Memories. Linda Fercho who is the Vice Chair of Membership. Midge Farrar, Western Division Americanism. Kendall Madsen, who is my Scrapbook Chairman. Sandra Rice, who is not here with me today, but she is serving as the Western Division Girls State chairman. Diane DeLashmit is the National Parliamentarian. And $I$ have four personal pages: Linda and Sherry, Linda Workman, Sherry Schneider, Val Hardy and Tammy Sollazzo. And they're going to serve with me at convention. So I'm really excited. And our very own NEC Terry Mikesell. So thank you very much, everybody.
(Applause.)
NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: You have all done an amazing job and $I$ really, really appreciate all your service and all your help. Thank you.

My theme I think this year is "Pass It on." I really truly believe that it is our turn to pass on the legacy of this organization to the next generation. You know we are at a crossroads in the organization. And that crossroads is that most of us in this room aren't going to be here in 40 years. And that's kind of a shame. I mean, we would all like to do this forever, but we're not going to be here in 40 years.

We all each I think love this organization and can you imagine your life without the organization? Can you imagine the friendships, the support, the love that we give each other. I think Diana shared with you when she lost her husband the support she got. I know I did when I lost both my mother and father. And so can you imagine if we didn't have the American Legion Auxiliary what our lives would be like.

We serve veterans every single day. That's what we do. Veterans, active duty military, and their
families. I think a lot of us honor their service by that. So if you look around today, we primarily serve Vietnam veterans or veterans hospitals or veterans homes. That's primarily that we serve today. So if we don't pass on this incredible legacy to the next generation to give them the opportunities that we have to serve, who is going to serve? Who's going to do it? So it is our responsibility as good caretakers of the organization to pass it on.

So do you think you can all do that? Do you think it's time that we pass on this organization? Okay. Don't everybody speak at once.
(Applause.)

NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: Oh, good. Oh, I see him back there. I have to stop now. My husband is in the room. Actually, both my husbands are in the room. My husband, the first dude Jim Park is right in the back and he's with Lyle Workman who is Linda's husband. And I always called him -- you know, he was around before my husband was, so -- so my husband has been absolutely incredible. He's been with me every single step of the way.

Honey, I love you dearly and I'm so glad you could be here. You know, Mr. Gopher just went out there for me.
(Applause.)
NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: SO I'm going to give you just a few numbers because $I$ think it's important that you know that our members volunteer over eight million hours.
(Applause.)
NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: That's amazing. Our members raised or spent on veterans and military families almost 36 million dollars.
(Applause.)
NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: So the total value of Auxiliary members volunteers service is 1.85 billion dollars.
(Applause.)
NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: So now stop and think about that. Think what happens if we don't pass on that legacy. Who's going to help all those veterans, active duty military and their families? So this is the time when we dig down and say why do we belong? Why are we here? We're here to serve. What we need now is to pass that on.

Have you ever -- we -- so I had a goal when I started this year and my goal was to secure the future of the American Legion Auxiliary. And you think, wow, crazy. That's a great big goal. But when $I$ broke it down $I$ said how are we going to do that. So $I$ knew it was important that we had a plan in place before $I$ left. I can't do it by myself. We can all do it together. As a national organization. We can do it together.

So we decided we would have a new strategic plan. So our new plan is called the Centennial Strategic Plan. And I think at the very beginning when Anita made her report yesterday, she talked about the five goals. Those five goals are brand identity, department and unit development, leadership, goodwill, and to do all four of those things, we can make that million member by our centennial birthday. But we can't do that unless we all do it together.

So we created the plan, your incoming -- no, your newly elected department president, your acting secretary, and your vice president, department membership chairman were asked to create a plan to put a plan in place. And they've done that. And I know that President Harriet is going to share that with you so that we can begin to make the changes that we need to make.

As I travel around the United States, I know, I see it, and each of you do too. We're broken internally. We're struggling as an organization. So now is the time that we need to come together to change that and we can do that with this new strategic plan. So when you get to National Convention you're going to hear some great big budget numbers because we're going to start to invest in ourselves and that's what we have to do.

You know, I say we have 30 million dollars in the bank, but we haven't invested in ourselves. And if we don't, we lose 25,000 members a year. So how long do you think it's going to take before we're sending in an annuity check, each one of us because we won't be an organization. So $I$ think together we can make those changes. So that's our plan.

I want to tell you a story and I'm going to tell you a story of why $I$ each and every day get up -- and some days it's not easy -- and do what I do. You know, I wear my button, Honor Their Service button with pride, and it's got my father who's a World War II veteran and my husband who was a Vietnam War veteran. I wear that every day, but I met a veteran when $I$ was in Oregon and he was at the home, veterans home. And $I$ was meeting everybody and greeting, and that's one of my very favorite things to do is either visit a VA hospital or a veterans home.

And while $I$ was there, when $I$-- this man was behind me and he wanted to meet me. So I met him. And I said, "How are you?" And he said, "Great." And he looked at me and he said, "There were too many dead bodies." And I said, "Well, I'm sorry to hear that." And he said it twice. So I said, "When did you serve?" He said "Vietnam." And I said, "What did you do?" He said, "I worked in the morgue." I said, you know, "When did you join?" He said, "I was drafted right after high school." I said, "When did you graduate from high school?" He said, "1965."

I graduated from high school in 1965. Look at my life and look at his life. He'll never leave that veterans home. That's why we do what we do every single day.

So I'm going to change the subject a little bit and I'm going to tell you a little bit about some of our foreign travel. Jim and I had the opportunity to travel
with the National Commander and the first lady and we went to South Korea. South Korea is a pretty amazing place because it really is -- it's still a war zone. So you never know. They're not very far away from the North Koreans.

But we got there and they said, "Oh, Peggy
Thomas." And I said, "Do I look like Peggy Thomas?" So we kind of laughed and Peggy had raised last year, I think a lot of people last year donated money for computers for the DMZ. So we raised so much money that we still have extra money, but they had Peggy's picture on the wall, they had -- I said: Wait a minute. How do I get my picture on the wall?

So they were great. But one of the things we found is they really are, they're the forgotten area. They haven't seen a care package since 1956. I don't know what the date was, but it was a long, long time ago. So when I got back, I had the opportunity to be on an email trail with the National Security Team and I said, you know, something you might consider is thinking about sending boxes to the DMZ. And this was after
Thanksgiving. We were there for Thanksgiving.
And so, boy, they jumped on that. Do you have an address? And before you knew it, there were over 200 packages at the DMZ. That is what the American Legion Auxiliary is all about.
(Applause.)
NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: So we had an incredible time in Korea. We went to Okinawa. We were in Taiwan. And I loved all the food. Everybody was worried about the food. I loved the food, except the soup that had the chicken head floating in it. That was not very good.

So then just recently we just got back a week ago today from Europe. We had an incredible trip. We had -it was the 70th anniversary for D-Day. And can I tell you that the people on the Normandy coast 70 years later still are thankful for what the Americans did when we landed on that Normandy coast. They are still thankful. There are signs that say, "Welcome Liberator." It's 70 years later. It's pretty incredible.

So it was for us a pretty incredible thing. We were able to see 600 plus paratroopers from the $82 n d$ airborne division that landed in the same place they landed the day before D-Day. So that reminded us of all those sacrifices that were made by so many and by so many families.

And when you're there and you see those graves and they're lined up perfectly, it makes us stop and remember why we do what we do. Why we belong to this
organization.
So I have a special project this year and I want to thank the Department of California for your really kind donation. It was great. And you were all awesome. You gave such a nice donation. \$3,300.
(Applause.)
NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: And so the good part of that is you also received a grant; you received a grant from the Veterans Foundation Project and that grant was to buy iTunes cards to take to the wounded warriors. So we purchased the iTunes cards. We took them. We didn't have enough Wounded Warriors for the number of iTunes cards that we received, so the balance are going to Walter Reed during Girls Nation during the picnic that we have at Girls Nation.
(Applause.)
NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: But I want to thank you for the Walk, Run \& Roll. That was my special project. It's community service and it was meant for every department to be able to create awareness and raise funny -- not funny. Raise money that would stay in your department for veterans active duty and military. And I understand to date, and it's going to be higher tomorrow, that you've raised over $\$ 7,097$.
(Applause.)
NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: So Joan Cannon, you did an awesome job. Thank you, Joan. It was awesome. I want to thank some special people. Linda Workman, who's been my campaign manager. Did she leave?

DISTINGUISHED GUEST CHAIRMAN WORKMAN: I'm here. NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: Oh, good. She's always got my back. Linda, who has been my campaign manager, one of my closest friends, who's always been there to support me, who's helped me along the way. Linda, I cannot thank you enough. You and Lyle both you both have been incredible friends to me.
(Applause.)
NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: And Lou Thompson has been the keeper of the funds for the campaign, and Lou you've done an incredible job. You've kept us on track. I really, really thank you for every bit of work that you do for us. Thank you, Lou.
(Applause.)
NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: Linda Fercho and Dennis and Terry who was my homecoming chairmen. Thank you for everything. You were awesome. My homecoming was terrific. I got to go to Disneyland. That was kind of the highlight to me because $I$ absolutely love Disneyland. And thank you so much.

Lakewood unit and post, Tammy and Bill, you were

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awesome. Thank you for allowing us to bring all these people in. Thank you so much. It was awesome. We had a great time. Thank you so much.
(Applause.)
NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: And Newport
Beach. Wow, it was awesome. Thank you. Both the unit and the post, we had an incredible time. Oh, my God, it was just great. The water, the -- it was amazing. The kids that entertained us. It was absolutely incredible, so thank you so much.

My unit, Unit George Tadlock. Awesome. My girls, we're all good friends, and we've all kind of came together in this sort of motley crew of this unit. And so it's been really fun so thanks to my unit. And to District 26 where I've spent so many years, thank you very, very much for all your help and all your support. And to all the units, all the districts, all the members, everybody that donated to my campaign. I can't thank you enough for all that you've done for me. I can't wait to see a sea of gold shirts on the way out the door in Charlotte, North Carolina. I really thank each and every one of them. And Charlotte is going to be a lot of fun. We're going to do things a little bit differently than usual. We did things differently in Washington D.C. We had a flash mob which was really fun to create some awareness. And so its going to be fun. The banquet will be the Golden Age of Hollywood. So we're going to have big band music because I'm from California. I'm a California girl and it's my favorite, favorite time of the year.

So I would encourage you each of you to think about the organization, think about how you can change it. What do we need to do. What do you need to do to build your infrastructure again. What do we need to do. Do we need to raise our dues. Do we need to raise money. Do we need to be able to find a way to reinvest in ourselves to be a very strong Department of California again.

And you notice I say "we." I would encourage us to work closely with the Legion Family, that we work with the American Legion and that we work with the Sons of the American Legion and, of course, the Legion Riders.
Because we are one big family and that's how we're going to be successful.

So thank you again. God bless each one of you, God bless America, God bless our troops and their families and our veterans. Thank you for the hospitality. Thank you so much.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you, Nancy.

AUDIENCE: Pass it on. Pass it on.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: This has been a fantastic convention, if $I$ say so myself. I've enjoyed myself and I'm so happy that National President Nancy can be here at this time.

Would the district and unit color barriers please get to the back of the room so that the Sergeant-at-Arms
and Marshal can prepare for the recessional of colors. Before we do that, we will have a dribble by Linda Workman.

DISTINGUISHED GUEST CHAIRMAN WORKMAN: For those of you who received an official invitation for the cocktail party this evening for President Anita, the room has been changed to 1425.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: 1425 for the
cocktail party at 6:00 p.m. for anyone who received an invitation. Please come to 1425. Thank you.

NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: Just quickly, my National President's pins will be at the back and the pages will pass them out. The pages and Sergeant-at-Arms and Marshal will pass them out. Please, you can only have one. I want to make sure that everybody gets one, so I can only give one to each person.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you. They're passing them out now. That's fabulous. We have a final total for the Walk, Run \& Roll contest.

COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN CANNON: Actually, the final total will be tomorrow because very generous people gave me some more money. But $I$ was giving awards out to the greatest amount donated by a district, unit, and an individual. So for our district $I$ would like to announce it was District 28, $\$ 350$, Sue Baker, chairman.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: How much? They

COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN CANNON: District 28.

(Applause.)
COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN CANNON: So Maryann, if you're here or somebody from District 28 can come pick it up for her. And thank everybody that donated and is still donating. Thanks to Norma for lending me her Peter to help at the Legion getting money for us. And for Wendy O'Brien for continually buying more and more. And she did a great thing. She's buying them and giving them to the people who sponsored her as a thank you gift. So there's
still more. And there will be a final total tonight, but right now like National President said we're at \$7,097 which I have a little bit more in the bucket. Thank you all very much.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: As we are preparing for the recessional, Madam Secretary, do you have any dribbles?

ACTING SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: I want to remind all the outgoing chairmen that they need to turn in their procedure books to the department office with a corrected copy of their convention report to be included. (Applause.)

Where is it? It's at 7:00. Do we know where it is? Here comes Linda. Maybe she knows. Well, you know, they like you to get there early so you get a seat. Hotel?

DISTINGUISHED GUEST CHAIRMAN WORKMAN: Up the escalator.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Second level.
DISTINGUISHED GUEST CHAIRMAN WORKMAN: It's Santa something.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Where the Sons were meeting if you happened to see that. So if you get there at 6:30, just follow all the ladies that you see in pretty dresses. If you have any presentations for the National President, you may do so at the banquet.
