1 Number 1: All meetings of the Convention shall be called to order at the designated times or as soon 2 thereafter as a quorum is present. 3 Number 2: A quorum shall exist when one-third of 4 5 the units in good standing are partially or wholly 6 represented by duly elected delegates or alternates. Article IV, Section 3. The audience shall remain seated during the 8 business of the convention. The Department President 9 10 shall designate certain doors to accommodate the delegates who find it necessary to enter or leave the convention 11 12 hall during reports of committees or when a speaker has 13 the floor. Cell phones must be turned off or in vibrate 14 mode. 15 4: The Chair may deviate from the printed program when necessary or expedient. 16 17 5: The Credentials Chairman shall report 18 registration as directed by the Chair. 6: The registration of delegates and alternates 19 2.0 shall close at 9:00 a.m. Saturday, June 27th, 2015. 21 7: Only qualified delegates shall have voice and 2.2 vote. 23 8: It shall be the responsibility of each 24 District President to see that only accredited delegates 25 and alternates serving as delegates are seated in her

district delegation during the business meetings of the convention.

9: If a delegate expects to be absent from the convention, except for the purpose of attending a committee meeting, she shall relinquish her delegate's card to her alternate. The alternate shall then take a seat in the voting section. In the event the delegate does not have the opportunity of reporting to the District President, it shall become the duty of the Chairman of the unit delegation to report to the District President the absence of the delegate and the presence of the alternate or the absence of both the delegate and the alternate.

10: A delegate wishing the privilege of the floor shall rise, address the Chair as "Madame Department President," give her name, unit and district numbers, pause, and wait to be recognized by the Chair.

11: A member speaking in debate on a question shall be limited to three minutes. No one shall speak more than twice on the same question without consent of the assembly.

12: Delegates attending called committee meetings shall be notified when the convention is considering and voting upon adoption of any change in policy or matters affecting finance.

13: Reports of committees which do not appear to

be controversial, excuse me, in nature may be adopted by general consent. If there is no objection -- if there is objection, a vote shall be taken. Following the acceptance of a report of a committee, recommendations or resolutions may be presented for consideration and adoption.

- 14: Any committee whose proposed changes in policy might conflict with that of the American Legion shall confer with the American Legion before presenting said change to the convention.
- 15: A committee recommending an appropriation of funds for any purpose shall consult with the Department Finance Committee before presenting the recommendation or resolution to the convention.
- 16: All resolutions to be presented to the convention shall be in triplicate and properly signed.
- 17: Committees may amend resolutions and recommendations referred to them before favorably reporting same. Resolutions or recommendations rejected by a committee shall be marked rejected, signed by the chairman of the committee, and returned to the department resolutions chairman immediately following the committee meeting.
- 18: A Unit, District, or members presenting a resolution or recommendation shall have the privilege of

explaining same to the committee to which it was referred. 1 Committee shall report to the convention all 2 19: resolutions properly submitted and accepted by a majority 3 of the convention committee. 4 5 20: A resolution rejected by a committee may be 6 brought before the convention by two-thirds vote. 7 Emergency resolution which may arise during 21: the convention or after the date for submitting 8 resolutions may be presented no later than noon of second 9 day of convention. (Article IV, Section 4B, Department 10 Constitution.) 11 12 22: Nominations of Officers, Junior Member of 13 Finance, Department Delegates and Alternates to the 14 National Convention shall be held Friday afternoon, June 15 26th, 2015. 23: Endorsement of candidates for National 16 17 Office shall follow the nominations. 18 Nomination speeches shall be limited to three minutes. There shall be no seconding speeches. 19 20 Election of Department Officers, Junior 25: 21 Member of Finance, National Candidate, Department 22 Delegates and Alternates to the National Convention shall 23 be held on Saturday morning, June 27th, 2015.

The last one also is special emphasis on any goals of the Centennial Strategic Plan are encouraged.

Centennial Strategic Plan is only for four years now, so I think perhaps we need to reword that in such a manner that there's special emphasis on any goal for Department or National are encouraged and leave out the specifics of Centennial. So I move that perhaps the committee needs to go out and -- because I'm not advocating how it should be written, but there's a few things there that I think will cause them problems in the future.

CONSTITUTIONAL & BYLAWS CHAIRMAN SOARES: If I

may have one more comment, please. I don't disagree with Diane that the code does have some rules in it, but I would -- I would encourage you to think about District Chairmen and Unit Chairmen who actually read the code. I'm not saying that nobody does it. A lot of people do. But I know that I have heard over and over again this year and last year that there were no rules for the historian posted on the website, and so I would think that it would be better served to create a rules list that could be listed on the department website for them to access easier as they do for the Chaplain's book and prayer books and things like that. Thank you.

(Applause.)

DEPARTMENT HISTORIAN BELL: Shall I answer that statement, Madam President?

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT TOZIER: Sure.

For some reason they were written four or five years ago and we do not know what happened to them. So I went upon the advisory of some of my past historians to try to get those written history picture rules recreated and that is going to be a recommendation for the next historian to try to get that

put back into the website.

Harriet Clendenin, our new Department President presented her theme C.R.A.F.T.S., Creating Relationships Assisting Families Through Service.

President Harriet aptly created her pin to show two women stitching a quilt together showing the civility of working together in a culture of goodwill to better serve our veterans, their families, and our communities.

Immediately after our installation our team traveled to Girls State. Girls State is always a fun and

exciting time in the Department of California, working with our bright and energetic girls.

Next up, July is a busy month beginning with

President Harriet having the honor to install the incoming

officers of her own District 15 and then off to install

District's 16 incoming officers and have her first DCV

with District 16. Now off to begin the Northern

California VA Medical Center tours and Poppy production

facility tours. Also July sees our Department of

California participating in many 4th of July parades and

patriotic events.

The Yountville VAMC tour is always fun, with an old-fashioned picnic out on the beautiful grounds. The Northern California VAMC tours are a whirlwind with five hospitals to visit in four days. These were extremely important tours reviewing the needs of our veterans in each location and the roles the units have in meeting those needs.

Of note in the discussions with the hospital directors was the revisions being made to the appointments and urgent care for our veterans in the wake of oversight recommendations regarding the VA scandals last year. We were encouraged that our VAMCs were making strides to remedy any veteran complaints and shorten wait times for appointments.

The Mather VAMC was without any Auxiliary deputy for quite some time. President Harriet and our Northern California hospital rep worked diligently with the director and the local Legion family, and with great success we finally gained a new deputy and have ongoing volunteers assisting the veterans in that facility.

Still on the road our team travels to our first department workshop in Rio Linda.

(Applause.)

DEPARTMENT HISTORIAN BELL: This was an exciting workshop with 27 first-time attendees. This was a lively group of Auxiliary members eager to learn the plan of action with each program. With many questions asked and our seasoned Auxiliary giving out lots of easy tips and fun activity ideas to accomplish the program steps. The chairmen made suggestions toward keeping membership and attaining new members by introducing micro volunteering, inviting their communities and Auxiliary members' friends and families to participate in their activities without the burden of coming to a meeting. The Department of California wants to strengthen involvement serving our veterans and our communities, and with that micro volunteering will grow our membership.

Traveling to Clovis the team presented the next training workshop, also reviewing membership goals for the

upcoming year and program activities and how-tos.

Now we are off to Charlotte, North Carolina and our National Convention. What a beautiful city. Clean with old southern charm. California won many awards, particularly membership milestone awards. We were thrilled to march in the parade and attend the Legion family baseball game.

The highlight of the convention was it was being led by our Department of California's own Nancy
Brown-Park. Many Auxiliary members in the national delegation attended with earnest the workshops for attaining for the million member march and learned the program ideas for the new five-year centennial plan. Our Department California President Harriet Clendenin and Vice President Susie Tozier were installed.

Back to work. More DCV visits and the Southern California VAMC tours, to include our remaining poppy production locations. We have two sites in the Department of California that are beginning groundbreaking for much needed Fischer Houses. We have several VAMCs in California that are the beneficiaries of government monies for remodeling and updating the facilities to include state-of-the-art blind center rehabilitation, head trauma centers, and updates to the way our increasing female veteran population receives its medical care.

In cooperation with the VA local companies and our Legion family, there were many stand downs to help our veterans through a rough patch and get them back on their feet. The Department of California has one of the largest homeless veteran populations nationwide, and throughout the state we make it one of our key priorities to address these veterans' needs.

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Our Department of California is proud to participate in Veterans Day parades and barbecues.

November and December find us getting ready to help our veterans have a great holiday. We prepared food baskets, decorated Christmas trees in our VAMC, held holiday parties on our bases and in our post home for our active duty military.

January finds us at our DEC meeting and giving our midyear reports. Our hospital representatives and deputies held a special meeting to report on the status of our facilities. We are marching towards our membership goals with newfound eagerness. Here, President Harriet introduces a new task force committee charged with creating a plan to roll out the five-year centennial plan and Million Member March for California.

Spring finds our Department President finishing DCV visits. Of note in the visits throughout California we find increasing attention to support our female

veterans.

Two districts in California honored our female veterans with a Mother's Day Tea and Kentucky Derby hat contest. The female veterans that attended are from the RENEW program, a counseling course to help them rebuild their lives from the sexual trauma that all received while in the military. They found camaraderie, shared their stories, and sang spiritual songs.

May finds California having many Poppy distribution events. Serving our veterans and sharing the Poppy story, we also had several units participate in the Poppy poster contest.

June finds our Department of California getting ready for convention. We will utilize technology to share our convention via Facebook and Twitter. That concludes my platform remarks.

This isn't made for me either. 8 9 GIRLS STATE DIRECTOR HARDY: Madam Vice 10 President, may I give my report? 11 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT TOZIER: Yes. 12 13 GIRLS STATE DIRECTOR CONVENTION REPORT 14 15 GIRLS STATE DIRECTOR HARDY: Madam Vice President 16 Susie -- or Madam President. Pardon me. But your name is 17 not Harriet which is written on my notes. Distinguished 18 Guests and Fellow Crafters, 35 years ago I attended California Girls State as a delegate from District 19, 19 2.0 Unit 314. 21 (Applause.) 22 GIRLS STATE DIRECTOR HARDY: Who could have 23 predicted that all these years later I would still be 24 involved in Girls State as its director. That is the 25 power of this program. We are indeed the dream catchers.

The 2015 session will occur in a few days with now 494 delegates slated to attend and I will be departing after this to prepare. However, let's go back in time so I can tell you a little about the 2014 session. 514 girls from all over the Golden State attended. They were a patchwork of races, religions, shapes, and sizes. They were a diverse group of young women leaders who somehow became a cohesive group and worked to create a fantastic Girls State.

Brittany Patterson from District 21, Unit 200 was elected our 2014 governor. Madeline Ducharme from District 9, Unit 161 and Ogechi Obed from District 24, Unit 283 were selected to represent California as our senators at Girls Nation in Washington D.C. Both young women made us very proud. Maddie served as the Sergeant-at-Arms of the Senate and Ogechi was elected Vice President of Girls Nation.

(Applause.)

GIRLS STATE DIRECTOR HARDY: In addition several members from California served on staff. Kendall Madsen, Sherry Schneider, Yumi Nam and Sandra Rice were part of the California contingent, as well as our own Past National President and my friend Nancy Brown-Park.

(Applause.)

GIRLS STATE DIRECTOR HARDY: This year we

implemented online registration for our delegates and alternates. Like anything new there have been some kinks that will need to be worked through. From my end, however, the online registration was a great success. I didn't have to try to read anyone's handwriting to figure out a name or email address. Keeping in contact with delegates was made simple because I had immediate direct access to them and their parents through email. I am hopeful we can further streamline the process in years to come and work to make the paperwork side of Girls State less cumbersome for everyone. Amen is right.

Thank you to all the unit and Girls State chairmen who were so conscientious and read and followed the directions made available to them. We really appreciate all your hard work in helping this program be a success. I hope you will continue to keep in contact with your delegates and invite them to be a part of your activities. If they are eligible, ask them to join your unit. We will be working at this session to encourage the 296 delegates with eligibility to consider joining our ranks.

(Applause.)

GIRLS STATE DIRECTOR HARDY: Early in my report I spoke about the power of Girls State. This year I saw that power in action over and over again. A young woman

1 wearing a Girls State sweatshirt was stopped in an airport by an older woman who had attended Girls State many years 2 before. They spoke together, sharing the wonderful 3 experience of Girls State. And I posted their picture on 4 5 Facebook. Still others connected through social media to 6 arrange to become roommates at colleges all over the nation. Women reported getting jobs because they had Girls State on their resume or spoke of it in their 8 Even our current Miss America attended 9 California Girls State in 2008. 10 11 (Applause.) GIRLS STATE DIRECTOR HARDY: I bet you didn't 12 13 know that. 14 DEPARTMENT NEC WOMAN BIGGS: I didn't know that. 15 GIRLS STATE DIRECTOR HARDY: This program changes lives. We need to work to make sure it is still available 16 for my granddaughters I hope I'll have some day and our 17 18 future granddaughters, like this young lady down here, to grow as young women leaders and show that every state is a 19 20 Girls State. Are you from Girls State? 21 EVERYONE: Yeah, yeah. 22 GIRLS STATE DIRECTOR HARDY: I am. 23 (Applause.) 24 GIRLS STATE DIRECTOR HARDY: Madam President, 25 this concludes my report. Thank you.

1 (Applause.) 2 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: Boy, she's tall. 3 4 GIRLS STATE CONVENTION COMMITTEE REPORT 5 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: I'm sorry. 6 The Convention Committee on Girls State met on --7 8 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: Can't hear you. GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: The Convention 9 Committee on Girls State met on June 25th, 2015 in the 10 Riesling Room in the Ontario Airport Hotel in Ontario, 11 12 California. The statistical report of this chairman 13 appears on page 28 of the Book of Reports. 14 Elissa Kirkland of District 26 was appointed 15 secretary. Silvia Hillyer, District 6, offered prayer and Bobbi Estes, District 20, was appointed Sergeant-At-Arms. 16 17 A total of 23 District delegates answered roll call and 18 eight visitors were present. The committee read the department code and two 19 20 proposed code changes. We then read Resolution 1. After 21 motion and second, the resolution was discussed. The vote 22 was called for and Resolution No. 1 was rejected. 23 Article VI Subsidiary Organizations of the 24 constitution and bylaws for Department of California and 25 the standing rules proposed changes were provided to the

committee for information. The Girls State director,

Rationale for Code 26 is to add: "The Department Chairman will forward a list, by unit, of number of Girls State delegates to the Department Office for that year's session by March 31st. Any changes will be submitted to the Department Office by the Department Chairman as they occur."

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT TOZIER: Are you going

1 to move for the code change? 2 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: I move for the acceptance of the change to Code 26. 3 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT TOZIER: It has been 4 5 moved and seconded to accept the code change for 26. 6 "Application must be submitted to the Department Chairman 7 and all fees to the Department Office by March 31st. Department Chairman will forward a list, by unit, of 8 number of Girls State delegates to the Department Office 9 for that year's session by March 31st. Any changes will 10 be submitted to the Department Office by the Department 11 12 Chairman as they occur -- as they occur." 13 Is there any discussion? 14 (No response.) 15 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT TOZIER: Hearing none, 16 all in favor? 17 AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Aye. DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT TOZIER: 18 Opposed? (No response.) 19 2.0 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT TOZIER: Motion passed. 21 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: Code 27 currently 22 reads: "A \$50 registration fee shall be required from 23 each delegate attending Girls State. This fee to be paid 24 by the delegate, her parents, or guardian. In case of 25 hardship, the fee can be paid by the Unit, District,

school, and/or outside source, but must be paid no later than the March 31st deadline when the fees are due from the Unit to the Department."

The proposed change will read: "A \$75 registration fee shall be required from each delegate attending Girls State. This fee to be paid by the delegate, her parents, or guardian. In case of hardship, the fee can be paid by the Unit, District, school, and/or outside source, but must be paid no later than the March 31st when the fees are due from the Unit to the Department."

The rationale for Code 27 is to change the \$50 registration fee for each delegate to \$75 to help cover the actual cost of nearly \$425 per girl to attend Girls State and in hopes of making the chosen delegate less likely to change her mind on attending Girls State.

Madam President, I move for this change.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT TOZIER: Is there a second?

PAST NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: Second.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT TOZIER: Code change will read: "A \$75 registration fee shall be required from each delegate attending Girls State. This fee to be paid by the delegate, her parents, or guardian. In case of hardship, the fee can be paid by the Unit, District,

school and/or outside source, but must be paid no later -no later than March 31st when the fees are due from the
Unit to the Department."

Is there any discussion? I have a comment -- I can't say anything.

DISTRICT 22 MEMBER FARRAR: Madam President,
Midge Farrar, District 22. When I contacted one of my
high schools, I told them about that \$50 thing and he said
we can't send a delegate because we cannot ask to have
that paid. So I am hoping to not have this increased now
because that's another \$25 out of the unit. Thank you.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT TOZIER: Say your name, please.

DISTRICT 22 1ST VICE PRESIDENT KOCHUR: April
Kochur, District 22. I oppose this as well in that I
think we're having fewer and fewer units that are paying
-- that are still paying the girls' way. It's all money
out of the unit. There's communities -- and similar with
this proposal that was defeated, is that these communities
are so isolated, so out in the middle of nowhere, if it
wasn't for the Auxiliary to pay those fees, all of it,
they would not go to Girls State. They just wouldn't make
it. Even though it's an extra \$25, that's the burden of
the unit, you know. I think these are areas that we
really need to keep in mind.

And the other thing too is I know there's so many units that do pass the entire cost onto the families or whoever, and so I get it that there's no money that comes out of their pocket, not that much, but with the small units or the smaller units, it really does impact them. Thank you.

VA&R CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: Madam President, Wendy O'Brien, District 6, Unit 521. I would just like a little clarification. We pay \$400 now for the delegates to go to Girls State. My understanding is that that was going to be upped to 425. So this \$75 is -- instead of changing it to 425 for each unit, then the girls still pay \$50, it's going to go to try and get our girls -- some girls do not understand the importance because the money is not affecting them; someone else is paying the money. So when they have to take the money out, it becomes more important to them.

So is that my understanding, that it was going to go up to 425, and instead they added it to the expense for the family or we can -- the units can pay it, but is that my understanding? I'd like some clarification on that, please.

GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: That is the intent. It does cost the department almost \$425 per girl, so also it will help offset, but it will go out of department.

DISTRICT 16 MEMBER CROWE: Vicki Crowe, District 16, Unit 741. I speak in favor of the increase. If the girls don't have anything put into this, they end up not coming. Do you know last night two more girls cancelled? If they don't have to pay anything, then it's not important to them.

GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: We've had 16 girls now cancel in the last week.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT TOZIER: Elizabeth first.

GIRLS STATE NURSE TOMLIN: Madam President,
Elizabeth Tomlin, District 29 President, Girls State
Nurse. Ladies, we have to have these girls be enthused.
They need to understand who American Legion Auxiliary is
and why they're going, who's supporting them to send them
to Girls State. We need their buy-in. We can't have them
not understand what is going on. If -- I know there are
some areas that need help, but there's also fundraising
ideas that are around that they can help raise the money.
They can help you with your spaghetti dinners. They can
help do all sorts of things to raise the money to -- they
don't have to pay it from their pocket.

Of the 500 girls that we send to Girls State, maybe 10 percent cannot afford the \$50, but the rest can. So those people we can help them get different fundraising

1 events, different things throughout our community that they can do to help raise their money. Then they have 2 buy-in. They understand what we do, that we serve 3 veterans, that we support them. We need to have them help 4 5 us support our veterans. This is why we set up this 6 program. Thank you. (Applause.) 8 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT TOZIER: Go ahead. 9 Over here. 10 DISTRICT 15 MEMBER RYAN: Delores Ryan, Unit 26, District 15. I am in favor of this motion. We send seven 11 12 schools and are trying to get two more out of Bakersfield. 13 We have 17 high schools, and I have one school that cannot 14 afford this for the girl to pay money. So the good makes 15 that one up. The others all raise the money somehow to pay the cost of that. I even have schools donating money 16 17 for the rest of the money to us out of their athletic 18 funds. So if you work with your school you can raise the 19 20 money and this -- you know, they have raised the money for 21 football, they raise money for basketball, and they can 22 donate some of that money for Girls State. 23 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: Amen. 24 (Applause.) 25 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT TOZIER: Over here,

please.

DISTRICT 18 MEMBER TABACHI: Judy Tabachi,

District 18, Unit 755. Let's be honest, I know that years ago when we put the \$50 in it was supposed to be cancelled at a later date. I have been with Girls State for about 150 years. It is --

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT TOZIER: You look good for 150 years.

DISTRICT 18 MEMBER TABACHI: Well, I had to be 16 to go, so -- no. But anyway, I know that this -- this is supposed to be paid by the parents. If the parents have money invested, they're not -- and I'm going by what I have been told in the past, when the parent called, "My little darling wanted to go to cheerleading camp so she's not going."

And that is a bunch of bull because I think all of us who are doing interviews tell them the dates and are you going to be able to attend. And a lot of the units don't realize that if they do not show up, those parents are supposed to pay the unit back when they sign that thing okay for them to go. There is a line in there that if your daughter doesn't show up, you repay the unit. But we've had too many people or too many girls that don't show up because swim camp comes up or I want to go play golf so this is what we have.

If we put that responsibility on the parents, it's not going to -- I know there's a lot of people from the north that have to fly down and all. There's different organizations you can contact that will be more than happy to get you that money.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT TOZIER: Thank you.

DISTRICT 18 MEMBER TABACHI: And one of them is the alumni association. Thank you.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT TOZIER: Okay. We're going to take a couple more. Maria.

Adame from District 11, Unit 16. I oppose the increase because we do have several low-income families. This year, let's see, we left -- we left -- we sponsored four schools, and one of the schools gave us half and then we give half. But bottom line is this year one of the mothers called me just about a month ago, I think it was, and she was in dire straits. She was sick last year, she lost her job, then her and her husband separated. So she said, you know, we need the money for the flight, so I went ahead and paid because I wanted the girl to go. In this instance I was able to do that.

And yes, we've had fundraisers, but they also now have to pay for their flight which is like 200 plus, and that's just from Stockton. Now I know in the meeting

earlier one of the ladies said that we're far away; we have to pay \$700 for the flight, so it's really -- it's really going to be a hardship. And I know we can have fundraisers, but I guess if it does pass we can go to the Girls State Foundation. But I oppose.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT TOZIER: We're going to take a couple more comments.

Vondrier, District 21, Unit 519. I am in favor for the increases. Now that I started thinking about it it's just — I understand why you're doing it. Last year I had two of my delegates leave Girls State early, so it — to me if the girl cannot afford it, they can always come to the unit and we can help them do a fundraiser for them. They can do a fundraiser at their school for them. Their counselors also told me that they will help them raise the money. They can do car washes or whatever. Because the program to me is such an important program for these girls. I think that it's a great idea. Thank you so much.

(Applause.)

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT TOZIER: Yes.

DISTRICT 6 MEMBER DULGINER: Good morning.

Sylvia Dulginer, District 6, Unit 77, Girls State chair for both the unit and the district and also Girls State

Grandma second year in a row. Number one, I think it's crucial that the interview process be conducted properly because I think there's a disconnect between the interview process and selecting the right candidate. This has to be a priority for the delegates.

Number two, fundraising is also crucial and you should mention that in your appreciation dinner or whatever event you have when the girls come back. Because last year a Gold Star family donated a thousand dollars to the program. But you have to talk about it. You have to tell them about it. And I'm not embarrassed to ask for money. So that's my two cents.

(Applause.)

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Good morning. District 24, Unit 43. I think this is something we need to appreciate. We talk about how fabulous these girls are and the qualities that they have. This is when they learn accountability. When you commit to doing something, you commit, and if it takes a little bit of financial support to go along with them too. So if they're going to commit to Girls State and be a delegate and put us through the effort to get them there, then that financial accountability helps with giving them the moral responsibility. It starts now. It doesn't start when they're in college. It doesn't start when they're in college. It doesn't start when they get a job.

The other thing is, you know, the Auxiliary is great. Theirs fans are great. Their hospitals are great. If they need help with getting the extra \$50, where there's a will, there's a way. But first they have to be made accountable and start doing for themselves, and if they are not held accountable for themselves, then the people who have made the effort to get them to that point and possibly ding somebody else who was qualified to go and now for whatever reason has made other plans and can't hold that spot. Thank you.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT TOZIER: Okay. Terry Mikesell, and then you will be the last one.

DEPARTMENT ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEMBER MIKESELL:
Terry Mikesell, District 2. You know, I've got to tell
you something, ladies. It takes us two and a half, three
hours just to get to the airport. Our units up there, we
pay the Girls State fee, but the parents pay for the
flight, so I'm not going to be willing to ask parents for
more money. I am in favor of Girls State. It's a
wonderful program, but I am against this \$25 increase.
Thank you.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT TOZIER: Wait a minute, please. Terry is going to assume my position because Midge can't speak on this. Sorry.

DEPARTMENT ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEMBER MIKESELL:

Recognizing Susie Tozier.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT TOZIER: District 22 sends over 40 girls. San Diego County has a law. We cannot ask for that \$50 or \$75. All that money has to come from the unit. There was a lawsuit that said it was discriminatory, that low-income families cannot be asked for the money. Even if they want to go to sixth grade camp, we cannot ask for that money. So all that -- all the \$75 for all the students comes from the units in San Diego, and some of the units have over four or five girls they sponsor. Thank you.

DEPARTMENT ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEMBER MIKESELL:
Go ahead.

DISTRICT 24 MEMBER SQUIRE: Leloni Squire, Unit 23, District 24. I am opposed to this increase because what about my girls at risk? What about the lower income girls? With all due respect, what I hear is, oh, my child can't go because of cheerleading. With all due respect, that's a privileged child. I want to see the young girls who don't have the chance, who don't have the opportunity to go to Girls State with all due respect more than -- you know, the privileged children already have the privilege. What about the young women who don't have special privilege. Thank you.

(Applause.)

DEPARTMENT ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEMBER MIKESELL:
Recognizing Nancy Brown, last speaker on this question.

PAST NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: Thank you,
Madam President. Thank you very much. Nancy Brown-Park,
Past National President. I have attended Girls State
California for a little over 40 years, and things have
changed over those 40 years. I will tell you that 25
years ago there isn't a girl that was selected who would
not show up. They have a lot of other opportunities
today. Whether you're rich or you're poor, you have a lot
of other opportunities today. And sometimes girls don't
make good choices. And the woman that spoke who said that
where there is a will there is a way, there is.

And I think this \$25 increase is twofold. It's going to help those girls make a commitment. The other fold is whether we take it here or we take a fee increase, it's going to happen because we are not meeting our budget. So I think we need to look at it that way as well.

There's -- we have a California Girls State alumni, the foundation, that is willing to help. I sit on that board. We get very few requests for help. So if you need help, if the girls need help, we're here to help. We actually helped a girl this year because she needed money for transportation. We're here to do that.

1 So there's lots of ways to do it, but we're going to need this money one way or another. So I really 2 3 encourage us to do it when we ask the girls to be 4 committed and their parents to be committed. And there 5 is. Where there is a will, there's a way. We can help 6 those that don't have that money. Thank you, Madam 7 President. 8 DEPARTMENT ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEMBER MIKESELL: 9 Thank you, Nancy. Anita. 10 11 NEC WOMAN BIGGS: Anita Biggs, District 23. 12 move to call the question. 13 DEPARTMENT ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEMBER MIKESELL: 14 Thank you. 15 (Applause.) 16 DEPARTMENT ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEMBER MIKESELL: 17 That was only stopping the debate. Okay. All those in 18 favor of stopping the debate, say aye. 19 AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Aye. 2.0 DEPARTMENT ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEMBER MIKESELL: 21 Is there any opposed? 2.2 (No response.) 23 DEPARTMENT ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEMBER MIKESELL: 24 Thank you. Okay. Motion has gone to the floor to change 25 Code 27 from a \$50 registration fee shall be required for

1 each delegate attending Girls State. This fee to be paid by the delegate, her parents, or guardian. In case of 2 hardship, the fee can be paid by the Unit, District, 3 school, and/or outside source, but must be paid no later 4 5 than March 31st when the fees are due from the Unit to the 6 Department. 7 The proposed code will read: "A \$75 registration fee shall be required from each delegate attending Girls 8 This fee to be paid by the delegate, her parents, 9 State. or guardian. In case of hardship, the fee can be paid by 10 the Unit, District, school, and/or outside source, but 11 must be paid no later than March 31st when the fees are 12 13 due from the Unit to the Department." 14 All those in -- all those in favor say aye. 15 AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Aye. DEPARTMENT ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEMBER MIKESELL: 16 17 Any opposed? 18 AUDIENCE MEMBERS: No. DEPARTMENT ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEMBER MIKESELL: 19 20 Okay. We're going to have to take it to the delegates, so 21 we need to know how many votes each delegation has. It's 22 going to have to go to a vote. You have a five-minute 23 recess. 24 (Recess from 10:54 a.m. to 11:04 a.m.) 25 DEPARTMENT ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEMBER MIKESELL:

Ladies, go back to your seats. Okay. Ladies, okay. Diane is going to be giving you some instruction.

DEPARTMENT PARLIAMENTARIAN DELASHMIT: The reason we're doing this is because this is not a one person has a vote. Some districts or units may have several votes as one person may be carrying three or four votes. So we have to do it this way. So what I hope each district has done is some are very small and it doesn't take much time to do it. Other districts are big. Each unit needs to report to your district presidents how many votes your unit has, how many are yes, how many are no, and if anybody is abstaining. You have the right to abstain if you wish. Each unit needs to report that to your district president.

We will have to do a roll call vote, and when your district is called, you need to combine all those units into the vote the district president has and she will say X amount yes, X amount no, and if any are abstaining.

So please, District Presidents, make sure every unit that is represented has given you the proper amount of votes they're entitled to. Do you have any questions? And there will be a roll call and Ruby will be doing that.

Okay. We will still take a minute or two because we have to -- we have to know -- we have to know how many

1 have registered. Hopefully they're not in this room if they have not registered. I think we have a question over 2 3 here. UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Yes, Madam Chairman. 4 5 Delegates in their own right? 6 DEPARTMENT PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: Delegates 7 in their own right have one vote. Even if they're the 8 only person here from their unit there is only one vote. UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: And so how does the 9 District President report those? 10 DEPARTMENT PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: 11 12 included in the total -- with the total district. 13 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Yeah, yeah. All right. Thank you. 14 15 DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: I want 16 to remind all the delegates in their own right, if you're 17 a delegate in your own right and you decide to vote your 18 unit vote, you lose your per diem from the Department of California. 19 20 DEPARTMENT ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEMBER MIKESELL: 21 So, ladies, change your vote so you get to keep your 22 money. Now Terry's unit happens to have three votes and 23 Terry has a vote, that would equal four. But if Terry 24 voted those other three votes, she would be a fool. So 25 Terry is going to vote one vote and Terry's going to vote

reading code changes. A couple of code changes brought a ton of questions from the floor. Do you remember the signature sheet discussion? It's been like today's discussion.

This year we put all those code changes into full throttle. I wish I had known what we know now. Little did I realize we had become a pilot program. I was receiving more questions than a two-year-old. The online application worked well overall, other than the many phone calls asking what the D word was. The delegate code. This process, however, has now proven to be efficient and worth the change.

Ahh, but the eight-page packet mystery was another story. There were nearly 1500 delegates and alternates who sent these packets to me. One by one they arrived in my mailbox, faster and faster as we approached the deadline. When is the deadline?

AUDIENCE MEMBERS: March 31st.

GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: The mailman now knows more about the Girls State program than I do. I wish the delegates were as good as the unit chairmen were back in the day when the chairmen were double-checking these packets. How many Girls State chairmen are here today? Oh, how I appreciated you.

I do believe that everyone dealing with next

year's Girls State next year will be happier with the packet changes that are coming your way. You will once again be the chairman's right hand in checking the packets for errors and completeness. Our eight pages will be condensed so everyone will have an easier job. But there is one thing that is so important for all our chairmen to remember to do, and that is to read your instructions first. You need to know what you are doing before you do it. It will prevent the frustration and confusion we all faced this year.

I ask that you adhere to deadline dates and follow up. There you will also eliminate barrels of your frustrations.

Girls State is a very prestigious program for the best of the best of California, our country's future.

Keep that in mind as you interview next year. It's not a popularity contest. I know most of you have picked some very special and exceptional girls as delegates. I am so excited and eager to meet them in just two days.

How many units here today have made dream catchers for our Girls State delegates? I just picked two up up here. They are beautiful and I am so impressed. But there's one problem I should have thought about before now. How in the world are we going to hang them?

In closing, I want to let you know that despite

your frustrations, my frustrations, despite the many emails and phone calls, despite the many months and hours it took to sort through tons of paperwork and despite the fact I had no living area in the living room, it was more than worth it.

(Applause.)

GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN HAYES: I enjoyed working with you, the Girls State Chairmen. I thank you from the bottom of my heart for everything you did to help me prepare the packets in order to get the girls ready for the experience of their lifetime. Thank you, thank you, thank you.

(Applause.)

thank you even more for entrusting me with this very worthwhile program. It gave me the opportunity to contribute towards the future of so many young women who will go so far. I appreciate this very special and memorable experience you have allowed me. It will always be cherished in my heart, and now in just short days, our hard work showing so much dedication to the Girls State program will begin. Next week at this time we will have 500 girls chanting, "Are you from Girls State?"

EVERYONE: Yeah, yeah.

1 of us will sadly say goodbye to California's best. Please pass a tissue. Yes, it is well worth every minute and 2 hour we put into this program. no and 323 yes. 323 yes. Thank you.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Thank you very
much, Terry.

Will the Sergeant-at-Arms and Marshal, along with the Distinguished Guest Chairman -- here she comes -- please escort James Adames, President of the American Legion Riders.

(Processional.)

RIDERS DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT ADAMES: Let me check to see first. Yep. Good morning, ladies. How are you feeling? Let me start out my remarks, and I'll try to be brief, but I want to start off by apologizing to Ms. Anita Biggs. I have to apologize to you because when I came last year to address the body, I was not taught well on how to be a proper president and so, therefore, I came empty-handed. And she gave me some nice comments, let me tell you. So I will do everything in my power to make that right and I will definitely, most definitely, ensure that the next president is taught correctly.

(Applause.)

RIDERS DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT ADAMES: And Past

President Biggs, I am going to fix that. I will find you

somewhere along the way. I don't care if I have to strap it in the front fender of my motorcycle, I will get something to you.

AUDIENCE MEMBER: Diamonds.

RIDERS DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT ADAMES: I'm sorry?

Did you say diamonds?

(Applause.)

RIDERS DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT ADAMES: Okay. You know, this morning I started out speaking to the American Legion and the Sons of the American Legion, and as they say, you always save the best for last.

(Applause.)

RIDERS DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT ADAMES: Now my wife who's not here -- she's actually taking care of her grandmother back in Puerto Rico -- told me because I'm -- usually by now I'm not speaking with any notes. This is the way I normally speak, but she said when you get ready to speak, make sure you have your thoughts at least written down on your iPad or something so I don't ramble like I'm doing right now.

So I gave a very passionate speech over there about what we do, what -- why are we here. We're here to conduct Legion business, Sons business, and the ladies business, but why were we here? We're here to help veterans; correct?

1 (Applause.)

RIDERS DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT ADAMES: So I took it a step further and I said we're here to help veterans and their families.

(Applause.)

RIDERS DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT ADAMES: Because the families serve. Their loved one is off defending our freedoms and you're left at home to take care of the kids. You're everything. You're everything while that soldier, sailor, Coast Guard is out there defending freedom. You're everything at home. That is the toughest job I believe in the whole wide world.

So we're here to do that, and one of -- oh, let me say this. This is one reason I should have notes that I don't have. May I have everybody who is associated with the American Legion Riders please stand up so you can see who they are.

(Applause.)

RIDERS DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT ADAMES: Thank you very much. You know what. One of the things that we do at the American Legion Riders is we have benefits for whatever organization that's going to benefit from the organized event that we have. And my own personal -- and I don't know. Some of you may remember. I lost a daughter to cancer. So mine is the American Cancer

Society. That's what I do.

(Applause.)

RIDERS DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT ADAMES: Now I didn't do this at the other two conventions, but I will do it here and you'll see why. If you were affected in any way, a family member, you had it, you're a survivor, God bless you. Raise your hand. Look around the room. Sadly I want this number of hands to go down eventually and that's why I do what I do for the American Cancer Society and that's why when I organized a -- you know, my old chapter 211, now chapter 48, has taken the handle on that and we have raised over \$20,600 in Sarah's name -- my daughter's name is Sarah -- for the American Cancer Society so we can make sure there's a lot less hands raised around the world.

(Applause.)

RIDERS DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT ADAMES: So let me make a pitch now. If you're not busy September 19th, come on out to Chapter 48, Post 48 in beautiful Oxnard, California. But I thank you because in my travels as president and even before I was president just riding around, some of the hardest working people that work in the post are the ladies. You take the money, you make sure we are straight, and we got everything just right. So without you I think the whole ball of wax falls apart.

We can't go far without you.

And so let me finish by saying I personally thank you for everything you do for us. I personally do.

Because without you, a veteran cannot be healthy. Without you a family cannot be healthy. Remember that. We're more than just -- in my case we're more than just a patch. We're more than that. You are more than that. You help. We all help. We help veterans, we help their families.

And before I go, I learned a great lesson last year and, again, I am going to make that right. So -
DEPARTMENT NEC WOMAN BIGGS: You said it in front of all these people.

RIDERS DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT ADAMES: I said it in front all of these people. And I am a southern gentleman from the great state of Texas and we make sure we follow what we say. No. Oh, Ms. Biggs' comes later. I'll get hers in person. That didn't sound right, did it? Seriously, I had to follow a toilet paper out of the dress joke. I've never had to follow that joke.

Okay. That's all I'm going to say. Okay. So on that with the American Legion -- I don't know if you can see it or not. It says the American Legion Riders,

PAST PRESIDENTS PARLEY CONVENTION REPORT

PAST PRESIDENTS PARLEY CHAIRMAN FERCHO: Well, it's almost after noon. Not quite, but close. Madam President, I would like to start with my convention committee report.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Yes.

PAST PRESIDENTS PARLEY CHAIRMAN FERCHO: The convention committee on Past Presidents Parley met on June 25th, 2015 in Room -- in the Walnut Room. That's where we were. We had a good time. Of the Ontario Airport Hotel. The statistical report of this Chairman appears on page 32 of the Book of Reports. Linda Diebel of the 19th District was appointed secretary. Sharon Moore, 23rd District, offered prayer. Connie Biggers was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 18 district delegates answered roll call and there were seven visitors.

The meeting opened promptly and the above appointees were approved and the Chaplain led us in prayer, the Sergeant-At-Arms led us in the Pledge of Allegiance, and the secretary read the roll call. The code was read and a proposed addition was made. By

direction of the committee I moved that we add number 18 to read: "The nomination form and rules for nominating women who are currently serving our country in the U.S. Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Air Force or Coast Guard (including National Guard and Reserve components of each branch) for the 'Salute to Servicewomen Award' can be found on the Department website. The completed form and a written narrative (750 words or less) or a YouTube video (3 minutes or less), done by the nominee must be sent to the National Past Presidents Parley Chairman by deadline set by National. A copy of this nomination must also be sent to the Department Past Presidents Parley Chairman by the second Friday in May so that she can contact the nominee regarding the Department function that she will be honored at."

There was discussion. This is being added because there is at this time no reference in the PPP code for this award.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Okay. The proposed code change at number 18 to read: "The nomination form and rules for nominating women who are currently serving our country in the U.S. Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Air Force or Coast Guard (including National Guard and Reserve components of each branch) for the 'Salute to Servicewomen Award' can be found on the

1 Department website. The completed form and a written narrative (750 words or less) or a YouTube video (3 2 minutes or less), done by the nominee must be sent to the 3 National Past Presidents Parley Chairman by deadline set 4 5 by National. A copy of this nomination must also be sent 6 to the Department Past Presidents Parley Chairman by the 7 second Friday in May so that she can contact the nominee 8 regarding the Department function that she will be honored at." 9 10 Is there any discussion? (No response.) 11 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: All in favor --12 13 yes? 14 DEPARTMENT NEC WOMAN BIGGS: Madam President, 15 Anita Biggs, District 23. Can we just drop the "at" at 16 the end of that sentence? Just end it with "honored." I 17 move to amend the code. I move to remove the "at" at the 18 end of the code. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: 19 Okay. It's been 20 moved and seconded to amend the code. Do I read it to 21 eliminate the "at" at the end of the code change? Is 22 there any discussion? 23 (No response.) 24 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: All in favor? 25 AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Aye.

1 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Opposed? 2 (No response.) DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Motion carries. 3 We'll go back to the first reading of it with the "at" in 4 5 it. 6 DEPARTMENT PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: Amended. 7 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Okay. We will vote the motion as presented and as amended. All in 8 favor? 9 10 AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Aye. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: 11 Opposed? 12 (No response.) 13 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Motion carried. 14 Thank you. 15 PAST PRESIDENTS PARLEY CHAIRMAN FERCHO: 16 you, Madam President. All awards except the first place 17 awards were handed out in committee. A copy of the awards 18 were given to the Department office -- oh, a copy of the awards were given to the Department office for posting. 19 20 All certificates of appreciation to women veterans for 21 their service were to be -- were to be placed in the 22 District envelopes. And I do apologize. I did not get 23 that done. I had my -- everyone in the room has had this 24 issue. The computer. Literally the power, the hard drive 25 burnt out. So I went to my laptop. Lights on, no one

home. No screen. I got another tower, hooked it up.

Well, I didn't have the disc to hook up the printer so I couldn't print. It just went on and on and on.

So I am going to mail those to the districts that reported to me. And I thank you very much for sending me those names. I truly want to honor all women veterans, and I apologize that I didn't get it done. It's one of those things. So we also had -- I'm also going to be honoring some of the attendees at the PPP luncheon today. And I want to thank those that made sure that I knew that they were going to be there so that we can do that as this year is a special year for honoring our women veterans as always, but a little special this year.

We had a closing prayer. We were dismissed at 11:30. By the direction of the committee I move the adoption of this report.

(Applause.)

PAST PRESIDENTS PARLEY CHAIRMAN FERCHO: If I can go on with my remarks. This isn't in my state remarks, but I noticed something that went on today that I really want to congratulate all of you about, and that is that I know having sat in the audience many, many years and thought, gee, I really want to speak to that, but you know what that little girl in me that was in the classroom that said: Oh, no, don't say nothing. Sit where you are.

That's scary getting up and saying something. What if they don't like it?

I was amazed today how many of you stood up and went to the microphones and spoke on the Girls State.

Thank you for doing that.

(Applause.)

PAST PRESIDENTS PARLEY CHAIRMAN FERCHO: And thank you for all of the Past Presidents in this room, all of the mentors that have gotten these so that the women feel comfortable speaking out. I was just very impressed. We're doing a great job and I just wanted to make that little note.

Now moving right along, Master Quilter Harriet, this year has been a fun year with your theme C.R.A.F.T.S. and I've had a great deal of fun welcoming everyone to my kitchen. Your Master Canners have been very busy this year recognizing and assisting active duty service women, taking advantage of the opportunity provided by National and Department waiving the per capita for new members who are women veterans, looking in the kitchens of their units they have sought out their very special unit member of the year for that award, and promoting the nurses scholarship through donations.

The units sought out homeless women veterans living on the street, providing them with food, clothing,

personal items. One unit recruited 31 volunteers that sought out 52 women veterans, of which 41 were homeless, and brought them into their post home and provided all of the above. The units were very generous providing numerous items for the Naomi House, which is a transition home for homeless women veterans who are on -- it's on the West LA Hospital grounds. These were delivered by our own Master Quilter along with the National President Janet Jefford when she made her visit to California.

One unit held a Salute to Women in Uniform - Past and Present luncheon. This was their first year, but they are planning to continue on on an annual basis.

Speaking of signing up new women veterans as members, one unit signed up a women veteran who was 94 years young.

(Applause.)

PAST PRESIDENTS PARLEY CHAIRMAN FERCHO: World War II veteran. And she is quoted as saying she signed up to be an Auxiliary member because she wanted to be in the same organization with her daughter. And, boy, are they glad to have her; she's amazing.

I want to thank everyone that donated to the nurses scholarship and this year we were able to give away a \$4,000 scholarship and a \$2,000 scholarship to two very deserving women, one of which you will meet real soon.

But please continue to put this on the top of your donation list and maybe see if you can increase your donations next year by adding a few more dollars. It would be great if the Past Presidents Parleys held a special fundraiser for this very worthwhile program.

This year we only have reported sending \$4,001, so I did call Ruby, and bless her heart, we had more than that so we were able to award two -- one 4,000 and one 2,000. So please keep this in your mind for next year to increase if you can so we can make sure we continue to give these women this help that they need.

I know our Master Quilter had a tough time choosing the Unit Member of the Year, but the nominee she chose is an amazing woman who you will not only meet, but you will hear all about her at the PPP luncheon where she will be honored. This year we had seven nominees, but I'm sure there are a lot more deserving unit members out there. Please start as soon as you get home and look into your kitchen and see who's cooking and start writing down all her accomplishments because it is so easy to forget at the end of the year when you're trying to recall it all.

I want to thank all who submitted to be recognized, and I made certificates for them and they're being mailed. We had two active duty servicewomen nominated for Salute to Servicewomen Award, but one of

1 these nominated retired prior and became ineligible, and the other one is Lieutenant Dorothy Reid, Army, sponsored 2 by John M. Armitage Unit 684, District 27, but she is 3 currently serving in Texas and will be deployed to 4 5 Afghanistan in October. So could you please keep her in 6 your thoughts and prayers. She is unable to be with us. Master Quilter Harriet, this concludes my remarks. May I continue with my presentation? 8 9 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: 10 PAST PRESIDENTS PARLEY CHAIRMAN FERCHO: My first place award Unit Supplemental goes to LuAnn 11 12 Capazzi, Unit 684 John M. 1 foremost, Madam President, I want to personally thank all of our members on behalf of the staff, Janeen Thomas, 2 Imelda Cruz and myself for all of the courtesies and 3 understanding that you have provided throughout this year. 4 5 Our number one goal is to be there for each of you 6 providing outstanding customer service that exceeds your and my expectation which I believe and hope has been done 8 throughout the year. 9 Do you like the colored Book of Reports cover?

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: You can thank the Convention Committee as they paid the costs to print in color and Lyle Workman printed them. Thank you --

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DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: you, ladies, and, Linda, please convey a job well done to Lyle for us.

The Legion annual sweepstakes continues to be our largest annual fundraiser, bringing in almost \$9500 a year. We owe a debt of gratitude to the American Legion for giving us the opportunity to participate and to all the Auxiliary members who purchase the sweepstakes tickets. I want to encourage all members to participate. Take a chance. Who knows. You may be that lucky winner.

The more Auxiliary members participating, the more income the Auxiliary will receive.

President's Club is another fundraiser that specifically helps the general fund and charms and cards will be presented by President Harriet when schedule permits. So if you haven't signed up, it's not too late and we'll get you added to the list of the presentations.

August 24th through the 31st is the approximate time frame set for moving back into the War Memorial Building, if that is where we are moving to. The War Memorial Commission does not plan on renewing their present contract for current office space past August 31st, 2015. So by September 1st, 2015, we will be home wherever that may be, in San Francisco or Sanger, depending upon decisions made by the Legion and the Auxiliary at this convention.

In September the Franchise Tax Board,

MyFTBAccount and the person who is registered for the

account can view all your notices, tax returns and

correspondence received and sent to and from the Franchise

Tax Board. If you notice a tax return is not visible when

the expanded version of the account goes live, let me know

and I will get in touch with my point of contact and she

will make it visible for you. This will enable you to

view and print copies of all your state returns and

correspondence.

There are two membership changes that are going to take place in 2016 that everyone needs to know about. And they are National will be setting all the unit membership goals. Setting goals is in conjunction with the strategic or centennial plan of reaching one million members by 2020. Although it is not clear exactly how all of this will work as yet, more information and guidance will be forthcoming.

With the 2016 membership year, members will be able to pay their dues online directly to National and National will reimburse the department their portions -- the Department's portion plus the Unit's portion of dues and then Department will have to turn around and send the Unit's portions directly to the unit. This is the same way the Legion is operating at present, and although there are pitfalls, it's a new way of doing business that we need to embrace and get ready for this change.

Currently the Department has 139 live units and 11 live districts with viewing rights only for the ALA Management Information Systems or what I call ALAMIS. I believe if you ask any one of the current users they will tell you they love it and that it is a great and valuable membership tool. Are you laughing because of this? Oh.

Live units can monitor their membership and get

reports with little to no effort whenever and from whenever they want them. Units do assume the responsibility of manning their unit database to the extent that National allows them to do so, such as making name or address changes or inputting all new members' information into the system before they transmit the membership to Department.

When units fulfill these responsibilities, it is a tremendous timesaver for the Department in processing and getting posting into ALAMIS. The policy of the Department is to process membership transmittals and checks and get membership posted into ALAMIS within two days of receipt. And I am happy to report we have successfully been able to do this largely due to Terry Mikesell stepping up to the plate and volunteering her time and efforts to make this happen.

(Applause.)

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: Thank you, Terry. We couldn't have done it without you.

Unfortunately there are times when the two-day policy doesn't work, and that is when membership applications are not submitted with membership transmittals or are submitted but not filled out completely and correctly, not enough or too much money is sent in with transmittals, and that's when the transmittals get into the dreaded pending

file until such time as the unit gets back to the department with the information or correct amount of dues needed to post the membership into ALAMIS.

Common errors: information is not legible, no name of deceased eligibility. Even if a veteran is deceased, we must have his or her name on the application. No post affiliation for living eligibility. We do not have -- we do have members that do not have -- do not know that in order to join the American Legion Auxiliary, eligibility must belong to a post. We actually have members that didn't know that and quite -- and more than that one. That is common knowledge to those of us who have been affiliated to this organization for so long, but that information is not always known to all members and particularly new members.

There is another misconception that Auxiliary members are eligible through their father-in-law's service, and this is not true. Please look at the relationship on the membership application for eligibility. Eligibility is set by Congress and cannot be altered. It says "daughter," not "daughter-in-law." We have approximately 19 members on the department pending list currently that the department can't process because we need information that only the unit or member can provide. That's 19 members your units, districts, and

department are not receiving credit for, and more importantly those members assume they are members, and as far as the Department and National are concerned, they are not members until the dues have been processed into the National database.

Help us end this problem by taking a few minutes to review all membership applications before you mail them in to the Department to ensure that the membership application is completely filled out providing all the requested information and is signed by a post certifying the eligibility of sponsor or unit secretary in case of female veterans. If you can't read the information, you can be assured we can't either. So please make sure applications are legible.

New changes to ALAMIS: National has set up a paid dues online report. This report will show any members who have paid their dues online for our department through ALAForVeterans website.

Wondering who has transferred within your department? You now have the department transfer report. This report displays any members who have transferred within your department to a new unit. National will still be sending emails for those members who transfer from one state to another.

UnitView Security Group has now been added to

ALAMIS. UnitView only allows units to see unit reports and export them. They are locked out of all our functions of ALAMIS; the cost is still \$10 per user per unit.

How many of you even thought about litigations and lawsuits when you joined this organization to help others? It's a total different world out there, ladies, today and units need to consider new avenues to protect their unit and their officers through director and officers liability insurance. Each district has been given a flyer of recommended insurance coverage recommended by National. If you haven't received it yet, I'm going to have to get it to you.

Another protection for offices is becoming incorporated which provides another level of protection for you officers and generally protects them. Because if there is a lawsuit, the corporation is normally sued and not the governance. On the other hand, all officers have a fiduciary responsibility serving in governance position and if neglect can be proven, incorporation doesn't prevent an officer from a personal lawsuit regardless of whether the entity is or isn't incorporated.

The best course of action is to contact a local insurance company in your community for guidance, then take this information to your governance for a decision on course of action that best suits your particular needs.

This is a recommendation and not a mandate.

There is strong encouragement from National that departments embrace the National centennial or strategic plan. And one of the hottest topics of concern right now is fostering a culture of goodwill and also called civility and Goal 2 of the ALA centennial plan. Foster an internal culture of goodwill. The reason it is such a hot topic is from past American Legion Auxiliary surveys, incivility, bad behavior is the main reason our organization is unable to retain members. Within three years of joining, 45 percent of new members drop out. A copy of the information that was presented to the ALA NEC in February 2015 in Washington DC was distributed to the Department Executive Committee meeting for review, study, and possible future implementation into our Department's own strategic plan.

Also given to the Department Executive Committee members is a social media policy establishing guidelines for all the social media now being used through websites, Facebook, Twitter, et cetera. Tweeting, whatever. Rather than reinventing the wheel, establishing our own guidelines, the National guidelines were taken and slightly modified to fit our department.

As far as our financial situation, we are doing very well and in the best shape that I have ever seen for

many years, largely because we are not paying a third salary.

(Applause.)

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: Many of you will remember the email that was distributed about all the unclaimed property listed on the State Controller's unclaimed property website belonging to the name of the American Legion Auxiliary that wasn't affiliated with a live unit or an active unit. I processed the claim and I'm happy to report that the Department received a check in the amount of \$1,224.91 --

(Applause.)

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: -- from the State of California. There are still four items remaining on the list that may belong to one of your units. One is for \$36.58 for Unit 310; one in Santa Maria, no unit number, \$100 and over; one in Oxnard, a safe deposit box. Contents I have no idea what's -- that may be lots of good stuff. And last one doesn't identify a city at all for \$20. If I -- I do have copies, and if you belong to those units and you want the copy, see me after the meeting and I'll be happy to provide it.

Madam Department President, I would like to thank
Kathie Martinez for obtaining a donation from her boss to
offset printing costs for the budget. She has done this

for three consecutive years and is a big savings to the

Department of California. Would you please have Kathie

come forward for the presentation you will be presenting

to her?

(Processional.)

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Okay. It says this is a citation of recognition awarded to Kathie Martinez, citation of recognition awarded to Joe Krieger, regional manager, Traction Heavy Duty for rendering to this organization invaluable help and support donating the printing costs for 600 copies of 11 pages per year of the department budget for the past three consecutive years. In grateful acknowledgment of outstanding contribution to the American Legion Auxiliary printing cost of 2013, 2014, and 2015. The citation is awarded today. Would you please give this to him on our behalf?

(Applause.)

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POPPY CHAIRMAN MARTINEZ: I will do that. Thank you.

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: Madam

Department President, on behalf of the staff and myself it

has been a pleasure working with and for you and serving

this great organization. And we extend our best wishes

for a memorable and most successful convention. And this

concludes my report.

(Applause.)

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: We will now continue with the Department Chairmen reports. Will Children & Youth, National Security, and Editor please come to the stage. Scratch that. Ladies, no rush. We need to finish with the officers. And I'd like to start with the Parliamentarian, please.

PARLIAMENTARIAN CONVENTION REPORT

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DEPARTMENT PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: I feel like a good portion of my report has already been given. You guys are going to hear some of the same things.

Madam Master Quilter Harriet, this has been a busy year as usual. Your theme Creating Relationships Assisting Families Through Service is a good place to start when we encounter problems. Most of the problems seem to be personality and/or control issues, in other words, relationships.

We need to give opportunities to our newer members so that they can learn what we are all about and carry on after us. Over and over I hear the same people holding the same positions, and that includes me. If we continue to do this, there will be no one to take our place when we are no longer able. We need to mentor and

build relationships to carry on our good work. The culture of goodwill -- I think we've heard that a few times today -- needs to be adopted. Respect for others and their ideas is essential if our organization is going to be around for another generation. How we handle situations like these tells a lot about our character.

Those of us that are seasoned members need to be more open to our newer members. Just because we have always done something a certain way does not mean it is the right way or that there isn't a different way to do things. I find it fascinating to hear someone say we have always done something a certain way when they have only been a member for five or ten years. Someone else's always may be 50 years or more, and I don't know of anyone that has been here since 1919 and that was our beginning. Try to avoid that phrase as everyone's always is very different and usually is based on how long they have been a member.

Newer members need to avail themselves of the opportunity to attend training sessions on proper ways to do things. My experience is that those that need it the most do not attend and those that have a pretty good grasp of things are continually attending to learn more.

I'm diverting a minute. We have Odette Cuccaro over there, and I'm not sure how long she's been a member.

About 65 years? How many? Sixty-five years. She still goes to workshops.

(Applause.)

DEPARTMENT PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: Let's see. Where was I? To hear that we have never -- I'm sorry. To hear that they have never been told something troubles me, especially if we don't go to anything where we can learn. Often members do not want to take time out of their regular meetings for any training, so when and where are they going to learn?

In your theme, Madam President, parliamentarians are notions that hold everything together, or try to anyway. It is obvious to me that we need some training on the Constitution & Bylaws, unit and department level.

Many answers to the questions and concerns can be found in these documents, however, we either don't know how to find what we're looking for or it's just easier to ask someone.

If you take the time to research various questions or concerns, you will find it easier in the future and you will remember the answer and where you found it.

Many times procedures we are using are not at all correct, especially for voting on new members, elections, or preconvention caucuses. There needs to be a review each year to make sure that we are in compliance and button up any holes.

I combined my report with my 22 supplemental with my pre-caucus meeting, and then I was 23 listening and I realized it was done different, so I'm 24 going to report it a little bit differently than my actual 25 report as you're seeing just so it's the same.

Kiss and Def Leppard promoted hiring veterans while on their summer tours. Trace Adkins and Casey James performed at the USO/PenFed Concert in Fort Hood.

Nashville co-star Clare Bowen performed for troops at Tinker Air Force Base in Oklahoma. Idina Menzel performed the National Anthem at the Superbowl. Trisha Yearwood, Phillip Phillips, Little Big Town, Carlos Santana, Aaron Lewis, the Kansas City Symphony, and Joyce DiDonato performed the National Anthem before each game of the

World Series.

Hopefully you have heard -- hopefully you have heard of a couple of the musicians. These musicians and many others support the troops by performing for them each year. Thanks again to Madam President Harriet for this appointment.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Thank you, Liz.

SERGEANT-AT-ARMS & MARSHAL CONVENTION REPORT

CHILDREN & YOUTH CONVENTION REPORT

CHILDREN & YOUTH CHAIRMAN MARSH: I don't know if this is going to go down low enough for me or not. Madam President, the Convention Committee on Children & Youth met on June 25th in the Maple Room of the Ontario Airport Hotel, in Ontario, California. The statistical report of this chairman appears on page 26 of the Book of Reports.

Ann Philcox was appointed secretary. Bea Foster offered prayer, and Terry Oclaray was appointed

Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 22 district delegates

answered roll call. There were ten visitors present.

The committee agreed upon the following report:

The code was read and no code changes were made.

(Applause.)

CHILDREN & YOUTH CHAIRMAN MARSH: Gifts were

contributed to the chairmen. There was a question and answer period that followed. Awards were presented for 100 percent reporting. Second and third place supplementals were presented. The list of these awards are posted in the office. The meeting was adjourned at 11:38 with closing prayer. This concludes this portion of my report. May I continue with my supplemental?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Please do. Thank you.

CHILDREN & YOUTH CHAIRMAN MARSH: Once upon a time in 2014 in a land far away, California, a princess named Harriet Clendenin became president of the American Legion Auxiliary Department of California. She chose a theme for her merry workers to create teamwork and motivation. She chose C.R.A.F.T.S., Creating Relations Assisting Families Through Service. She charged each chairman in the department to designate a craft as the theme for her chairmanship. The Children & Youth Chairman chose Cupcake Decorators with the analogy that they were taking sweet small things and decorating their lives to make their world a more beautiful place.

With this theme in mind the District and Unit
Chairmen set to work doing wondrous works and the
Auxiliary flourished. While the chairmen enjoyed playing
with their theme, they were very serious about their

dedication and work for the children and youth in their respective units and communities.

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Reported were 661 activities to raise money and property to donate to needy children. Easter baskets and Christmas and Thanksgiving baskets were prepared for the needy and homeless veterans' children as well as others in need. One unit collected 104 pairs of new shoes and were rewarded by the excited faces of the children grateful for receiving a brand-new pair of shoes.

One unit reported collecting 368 jackets, gloves, and beanies that provided warmth to many children. A disastrous fire that burnt 43 homes in one unit's area created much need. The unit purchased \$50 Kmart gift cards and provided them for children that needed new backpacks and school supplies. Another unit sees to it that the smallest children are also cared for by providing diapers, receiving blankets, pacifiers, sleepers, powder, bibs and other baby items to families stationed at the local Navy base. Many hero packets were assembled and given out by other members.

The unit in one area spent months preparing a hometown heroes event. They recruited local merchants that pitched in and helped along with other organizations in town. Parents signed picture consents and 36 young heros were shown a wonderful time with all kinds of

activities for them that helped them to forget for the day that one of their parents was far away. It was a well-planned wonderful day with the whole community working together.

Units in another area also put months of work and dedication into an annual military children's ball which is -- or children's military ball which is a huge success with over 100 children and their families from the military base in attendance. Hours of planning, hard work, and money goes into putting on these events.

Special attention is paid to the homeless children attending veterans' Stand Downs around the state. Donations for children's items are requested. Backpacks are supplied with healthy, and some not so healthy, snacks and juices for them to take with them. It is so sad to see the homeless families.

Others that benefit from the generosity of the Auxiliary members include local schools, Girl Scout troops, 4-H groups, USO children's rooms, sports clubs, City of Hope, St. Jude's Hospital, children's hospitals, preschools, daycare centers, libraries, children's reading rooms, Toys For Tots, Christmas wish trees, and many others. Parties are given for hundreds of children to celebrate various holidays throughout the year with food, toys, and gifts in abundance. Many, many school supplies

were provided to students.

One unit had a mother who took her young son to grandma's house for a holiday dinner and reminded him they had not prayed yet. He replied, "We don't have to pray here." His mother reminded him we always pray before a meal. His reply was, "Oh, we don't have to pray here. Grandma knows how to cook."

(Applause.)

CHILDREN & YOUTH CHAIRMAN MARSH: That's not part of the report. I just wanted to see if you were paying attention.

Units participated in the Star Spangled Kids
program with enthusiasm. They went to schools to hand out
flags and tell the students about veterans. Patriotic
music was used to interest the students. Sometimes
veterans went with them to meet and talk with the kids
about veterans.

The books Light of Liberty, Pledge of Allegiance, Our Country's Flag, pocket U.S. constitutions were tools of education. 5,669 booklets and pamphlets were handed out. Many classrooms wrote letters to mail to veterans. Valentines were made by elementary students. Junior members folded pocket flags to be given to deploying military members.

To encourage, educate and help Children & Youth

chairmen develop a successful program, each chairman received a packet at the beginning of the year explaining the various aspects of the program and encouraging each to concentrate on things they could be passionate about and create their goals for the year. Each again received a personal communication from their department chairman during the holidays. A second packet was sent out to the department chairmen after the department executive committee in January to make sure all district Children & Youth chairmen that were unable to attend received all the information.

Also, three separate department workshops were held early in the year to make sure the northern, central, and southern districts all had equal access to all the information available. The Star Spangled Kids program was highlighted in all of these informational opportunities. The Star Spangled Kids program was the current National children in need for the project.

No doubt about it, the California Auxiliary ladies have been busy. Over 13,000 volunteers served 3,263 families, 33,826 children, volunteered 58,618 hours, and spent \$259,453 to serve the children of the department of California. When I look at all the units that did not report, I cannot help but wonder what the statistical report would look like if we had 100 percent of the units

Denise Coleman, District 23, Unit 228 was appointed secretary. Danielle White, District 27, Unit 118 offered prayer, and Janice Scott, District 18, Unit 359 was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 18 District Delegates answered roll call. There were six guests present.

By the direction of the committee the following report is submitted for acceptance by this delegation.

The code was read with no changes to the code. There were no resolutions referred to the Committee. By executive command 26 districts reported and 15 received citations for 100 percent reporting. Third and second place awards were presented in committee with a listing included in the district packets. Those of you who did not receive those listings, I do have them for you at the end of the session today. Listings are also posted in the Department Convention office and attached with the report for the executive board. Questions and answers and discussions on

reporting and supplementals followed. With no further business the meeting was adjourned at 10:00 a.m.

If you will refer to your Book of Reports, page 31, National Security. Districts participating, 26 districts reporting. If you'll go down to total volunteers, the number should be 9448. 9448, total volunteers. Total hours volunteered, 29,442.50. 29,442.50. Total awards presented, 87. Total care packages sent. This is correct, 1,017. Total dollars spent on military was 77,171.95. 77,171.95. Total military served, 32,601. The dollar on the coupons is correct, and the Services to Gateway is 44. This concludes the report of the National Security and I move for its acceptance. And, Madam President, may I continue with my supplemental?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Yes.

NATIONAL SECURITY CHAIRMAN STEWART-WILSON: Thank you. California's National Security Chairmen worked their year focusing on maintaining, promotion, and strengthening strong support for our military personnel and their families. Every Auxiliary counts current or former members of the US Military and the National Guard as part of their population, thus all individuals in the United Armed Forces were recognized at whatever event we

participated in.

The American Legion Auxiliary recognizes the value that these men and women bring home as a result of their service and implemented programs and invested in resources to supplement to support their needs and those of their families. Recognizing this, we tried to meet their needs ultimately at the state and community level.

Members of the Department of California National Security team put on their working clothes and began surveying the much-needed services that were needed within their communities. California's Auxiliary has units located in every part of the state you can imagine: mountains, seashores, cities, and floating. Our Legion families have been involved with fundraisers, run/walk-a-thons, parades, animal societies, health foundations, ROTC and JFOTC because they are trainable and our future is on their shoulders and a host of other innovative, fun, yet helpful, events.

Members partnered with community groups to pack care packages to send overseas to military personnel. We work with family readiness groups providing gifts and needed school supplies to children of deployed soldiers. Community organizations invited us to participate in their honor programs. "Homes for Troops" invited the Legion Family to help welcome a severely disabled veteran to his

new home, which was designed especially for his disability.

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All From The Heart provides electric wheelchairs for veterans who have a special need. We partnered with one of the USO programs called Veterans Without Families where a Legion family member attends the memorial service for a veteran whose family is unable to attend or possibly they have no family.

We started every year by promoting emergency preparedness to everyone and any organization that will listen to us. We unified in collaboration with organizations putting on emergency fairs and Stand Downs. We wanted our state to be the first to have all our posts registered with the American Legion Red Cross as community emergency centers. Unfortunately we didn't make that goal.

We prodded our post executive boards to get first aid kits in our post homes, making sure they were identified by location to post members. We collaborated with training centers to offer cardiopulmonary resuscitation training (CPR) for our members and the surrounding community neighbors. This chairman spoke at an area Legionnaire caucus and sent notices to our state disaster and emergency services commission encouraging posts to invest money in purchasing automated external

defibrillators, depending on the size of their facility.

We focused energy on our members imploring them to have home disaster kits and family disaster plans, reminding them to not forget their furry four-legged friends. They need food, water, and blankets too.

A district contributed \$200 to the Dog Handlers
Military Program. Another unit donated funds to the new
K-9 dog training program that trains dogs to be comfort to
returning wounded soldiers. Donation drives were planned
and completed because our veterans are always in need
somewhere.

I'm going to go down to the middle of the second paragraph, for those of you following. We participated in 113 Heroes to Hometown ceremonies where we provided welcome hugs for troops, fed many who have not had home-cooked meals for many months, provided personal care items to help them restore their personal comforts, and just shared a comfortable safe place for them to come back to.

Many of our Auxiliary members raised funds to supply items to the hangars where families waited for their loved ones. Child care services were provided to give parents some time alone while completing paperwork or picking up supplies, exhibiting service, not self, attitudes, instilling pride and loyalty in new Auxiliary

members who are learning what we do and who we really are.

The middle of the second paragraph. At USO locations throughout California, Auxiliary members provide much-needed supplies for troops transitioning through our airports. Personal touches are increasingly important when veterans are supplied with personal survival kits as they utilize the facilities. Twenty-five units either worked at USO or encouraged their families, friends, and community to donate much-needed items to the USO in their area.

Attached to your report, platform members, is a flyer that this Chairman has sent out statewide to help the Ontario USO facility this June 2015. Having been in regular contact with the center manager, she indicated they are expecting 9,000 reserve units from the Mojave Viper Movement to pass through their facility and will be in great need of the items listed on the wish list.

As a proud patriotic American, we are always eager to honor the brave men and women who made heroic sacrifices to protect our way of life. 195 units participated in some type of POW/MIA program. Most units attended ceremonies honoring POW/MIA's, held regular flag draping rituals prior to the opening of their meeting, met the plane delivering the soldier, or walked behind the family and coffin as it went through the streets of their

town.

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Some of the Auxiliary members, as myself, had an opportunity to speak with family members of the deceased or spoke to post members who knew the soldier and wanted all to know how dedicated the soldier was to his commitment of being a soldier.

I'm going to the next paragraph. Working with Local Blue Star and Gold Star Mother Programs was richly rewarding as we learned of the projects that were created to help family members in touch with their home in the states. 332 units interacted with these mothers working Stand Downs, giving out personal items and useful information about VA benefits. They raised funds to help a wounded warrior with his hospital bills.

It has been a tremendous honor and a privilege to represent you as the Department of California National Security Chairman. Thank you so much for working with me and I am extremely proud of you who worked very hard and were dedicated to the office that you took. Thank you, ladies. You are truly appreciated. Together we make a difference.
