## EDUCATION CONVENTION REPORT

EDUCATION CHAIRMAN TAYLOR: Good morning, ladies. Madam President, Distinguished Chairmen of this outstanding organization, the Convention Committee on Education met on June 25th, 2015 in the Sage Room at 11:00 a.m. of the Ontario Airport Hotel, Ontario, California.

The statistical report of this chairman appears on page 28 of the Book of Reports.

Vicki Crow was appointed secretary, Gigi Manno offered prayer, Carolyn Lilles was appointed Sergeant-At-Arms. A total of 19 district delegates answered roll call. There were nine visitors present. Certificates were given in committee for 100 percent reporting and for Give 10 to Education. Second and third place awards will be mailed out. A list of all award winners are in the office.

The committee agreed on the following code change. It now reads as: "The Connie Settles Memorial Trust Scholarship shall be awarded annually to Senior Auxiliary members attending college whose membership dues are paid member for the current and past three consecutive years. One scholarship up to $\$ 5,000$ shall be awarded annually and may include book stipends. The application (E21S) and rules for the scholarship will be mailed to all units and posted on the department website." Adopted 2014.

The change will read as: "The Connie Settles Memorial Trust Scholarship shall be awarded annually to Senior Auxiliary members attending college whose membership dues are paid -- are paid member the current and past three consecutive years. One scholarship up to
\$5,000 shall be awarded annually and may include book stipends. The application (E21S) and rules for the scholarship will be posted on the Department website."

By the direction of the preconvention committee, I move to accept this code change.

EDUCATION CHAIRMAN TAYLOR: Thank you, ladies. Madam President, may I continue with my supplemental report?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Yes.

EDUCATION CHAIRMAN TAYLOR: Madam President Harriet, what an amazing Auxiliary we have here in California. It is evident in the reports that the Units and Districts have sent to this chairman. They've gone to schools and educated them on the education programs available through the American Legion Auxiliary. They worked with the school administrators and the community on the challenges that the children of veterans face, on how important our veterans are, and what they do for us.

The work that our units do for the Give 10 to Education is shown in this program by donating 20,346 items totaling $\$ 24,000$. There were pencils galore, paper, glue sticks, binders, backpacks and everything else a student would need to start the year off with. They also gave out funds for shoes, socks, and underwear as needed. We also had a unit help with English lessons.

There were units that held yard sales, bingo parties, bake sales, and other events to raise money for this program. One unit adopted a teacher and donated \$100 and a gift certificate to use for his students. The units collected Box Tops and Pop Tops of cans, Labels For Education, and other items for monies. Seventeen units gave monetary donations totaling $\$ 5,550$. There were 83 units that reported on this program. Great job, ladies.

The educating continues with our veterans in the
classrooms. There were 41 units that were involved with this program. Ninety-six veterans visited 35 classrooms, grades from preschool, kindergarten through the 12th grade.

A female veteran, which is also an Auxiliary member, visited a middle school and talked about her military service and what it was like to be the first female to serve aboard a Navy ship. She also brought her memory books from her cruises for the students to look at. What a great job.

American Education Week had 20 units
participating in this program with various events. One unit has a recycling program that takes money and uses it to purchase items that includes flags that are given out to students at assemblies, certificates of achievement, patriotic coloring books and rulers, as well as other necessities for students in need.

Another unit donated monies to two different schools each year and rotating them each year because of the many schools in their area. Others provided Spanish/English dictionaries and \$5 gift cards were given out to children who read 20 books.

Honoring the service of our military was done by in conjunction with post and City of Holtville, California. They held the Inaugural Imperial County

Veterans Day Parade. This gave them the opportunity to educate their community by honoring and thanking all military personnel who served the United States in all wars, past and present. What a great job. They had a participation that exceeded their expectations.

Some support the Stand Downs in their areas by providing games and activities to children of veterans. Some members spent the day preparing dinner and serving the veterans.

There were units -- there are units that work the literacy program by reading to children. One unit received a donation of Disney-themed books for children ages four through five and provided a Head Start program with 50 books. They helped with English as a second language and creative writing. They support classes with materials to promote Americanism to adults studying for citizenship.

Some that have a large military presence in their area help children and military personnel who need extra help with her lessons. One unit supported the literacy effort for children in an afterschool tutoring program at a local soup kitchen. How amazing is that?

There were 78 units that purchased poppy seals with a total of $\$ 1,992$ spent. Thank you so much to each and everyone that donated to this program. All proceeds
for the poppy seals sell that are purchased through the Department and not Emblem Sells goes directly to the Department of California Education Program.

Eighty-three units gave scholarships. 90 scholarships were given and totaling in the amount of $\$ 38,783$. Wonderful. Units went out and talked about the Department and National scholarships. They gave out pamphlets and put articles in local newspapers. They went to local school administrators and gave them scholarship information to hand out. One unit gave out seven scholarships totaling $\$ 3500$ to children and family members of veterans.

The chairman for this program are to be commended for their ability in picking the best of the best and forwarding them onto this chairman.

A total of nine districts gave 15 scholarships totaling $\$ 5,636$. A total amount of $\$ 5,767$ was donated to the Department by 126 units. The Department was able to give $\$ 6,000$ in scholarships this year, two $\$ 1,000$ scholarships for continuing and/or reentry student scholarships, one \$2,000 educational assistance, three \$1,000 educational assistance, and one \$5,000 scholarship for Children of Warriors National Presidents' Scholarship. We had also two applicants for the new Connie Settles Scholarship.

National scholarships were received -- National scholarships were received. Eleven were received for the American Legion Auxiliary Children of Warriors National Presidents Scholarship and four for the National Spirit of Youth Scholarship For Juniors. It gives me great pleasure and honor to announce that an applicant for National Spirit of Youth Scholarship for Juniors was awarded a \$5,000 scholarship.
(Applause.)
EDUCATION CHAIRMAN TAYLOR: What an honor and an educating experience it has been for me to work with the District and Unit Education Chairmen of the Department of California. I could go on and on with these praises of what each unit has done individually for the Education program for this state, but $I$ won't.

Madam President, thank you for the honor of this appointment. This concludes my report. May I give out my awards?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Yes, you may.
EDUCATION CHAIRMAN TAYLOR: I sent out notes yesterday. I need Unit 27, 22 -- yeah. Districts. Excuse me. 30. With great honor I would like to present this certificate of appreciation. It's gratefully presented to Danielle White, Most Outstanding Education Award.
(Applause.)
EDUCATION CHAIRMAN TAYLOR: A certificate of appreciation is gratefully presented to LuAnn Capazzi, Unit 684.
(Applause.)
EDUCATION CHAIRMAN TAYLOR: Certificate of appreciation is gratefully presented to Ann Marie Brown, Unit 6, Most Outstanding Scholarship Report.
(Applause.)
EDUCATION CHAIRMAN TAYLOR: This certificate of appreciation is greatly presented to Theresa Brown, Unit 434, Most Outstanding Veterans in the Classroom Report.
(Applause.)
EDUCATION CHAIRMAN TAYLOR: Anybody from 434 unit? Certificate of appreciation is gratefully presented to Ann Marie Brown, Unit 6, Most Outstanding Literacy Report.
(Applause.)
EDUCATION CHAIRMAN TAYLOR: This certificate is presented to Kim Vincent, Unit 138, Most Outstanding Report Honoring the Service of Our Military.
(Applause.)
EDUCATION CHAIRMAN TAYLOR: This certificate of appreciation is gratefully presented to Jean Howard, Unit 460, Most Outstanding Education Report.
(Applause.)
EDUCATION CHAIRMAN TAYLOR: All these have been forwarded to National for judging. Like I said, we have one scholarship, National scholarship that was sent to National. It was Unit 92, District 2. The young lady's name was Kalin Sturtin.

DEPARTMENT ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEMBER MIKESELL: Sturtin.

EDUCATION CHAIRMAN TAYLOR: But this young lady was amazing. It was very -- it was really hard to decide which one of these ladies would receive this. And Katie Pallen was the recipient of $\$ 500$ for her report on Children of Warriors National President, Unit 6, District 22. Thank you, ladies. You did an outstanding job this year.
(Applause.)
EDUCATION CHAIRMAN TAYLOR: Excuse me one second.
DEPARTMENT PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: Our Madam President was very anxious this morning and she really doesn't allow enough time for discussion. So we -- it's all her fault. So we need to go back to that code change because there -- I'm hoping it's a typo. If it's a typo, we can fix it now. If it's not a typo, it needs to go back to committee, but I'm pretty sure it's a typo.

So she doesn't know what it is yet, so let me --
let me just -- it was Code No. 14 and the code reads: "The Connie Settles Memorial Trust Scholarship shall be awarded annually to the Senior Auxiliary members attending college whose membership dues are paid for the current and past three consecutive years. One scholarship up to $\$ 5,000$ shall be awarded annually and may include book stipends. The application of rules for the scholarship will be mailed to all units and posted on the Department website."

But that is not what was read. And so that was supposed to be the way it is now, and then the way they want it to read. When they say this is the way it is now, it needs to be exactly like it is now and it wasn't.

So you know what it was? She had inserted "whose membership dues are paid member the current and past year." That is a correct -- incorrect word there. It should be: "Dues are paid for the current and past three consecutive years." So if this is just a typo --

DEPARTMENT ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEMBER MIKESELL: It was a typo.

DEPARTMENT PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: But we have a reporter who is taking all of this down so we need to fix it. Okay. So read it the way it should be. I just read it the way it is, so now just read the motion by direction of the committee as to the way it should read.

Do you know what it should be?
EDUCATION CHAIRMAN TAYLOR: The change will be as: "The Connie Settles Memorial Trust Scholarship shall be awarded annually to Senior Auxiliary members attending college whose membership dues are paid for the current and past three consecutive years. One scholarship up to \$5,000 will be awarded annually and may include book stipends. The application and rules for the scholarship will be posted on the Department website."

By direction of the committee I move that we accept this change.

DEPARTMENT PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: Second it.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: I need a copy of the paper. The change will read as: "The Connie Settles Memorial Trust Scholarship shall be awarded annually to Senior Auxiliary members attending college whose membership dues are paid for the current and past three consecutive years. One scholarship up to $\$ 5,000$ will be awarded annually and may include book stipends. The application (E21S) and rules for the scholarship will be posted on the Department website."

Any discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: All in favor? AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Aye.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Opposed?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Motion carried.
Thank you.
EDUCATION CHAIRMAN TAYLOR: Thank you, ladies. (Applause.)

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: My skirt did go down there. The Master Lawmaker.

COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN SOLLAZZO: Good morning, Madam President.

## COMMUNITY SERVICE CONVENTION REPORT

COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN SOLLAZZO: The Convention Committee on program Community Service met on June 25th, 2015 in room Walnut of the Ontario Airport Hotel, Ontario, California. The statistical report of this chairman appears on page 27 of the Book of Reports.

Gayle Stewart was appointed secretary, Olivia Jackson offered prayer, and Geni Lefler was appointed Sergeant-At-Arms. A total of 18 district delegates answered roll call. There were four visitors present.

The committee agreed upon the following report. Started the meeting with prayer. The code was read.

There were no resolutions made. District 14 recommended adding code regarding midyear reports. Many of the ladies agreed with the recommendation. Awards were given out. Twelve districts received 100 percent reporting awards and the closing prayer was read at 10:30 and the meeting was closed.

That's my statistical report. May I continue with my supplemental?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Yes, you may.
COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN SOLLAZZO: Thank you. The great Department of California has proven without a doubt that they have been creating relationships with our veterans and their communities. As American Humorist Leo Rosten stated: "The purpose of life is not to be happy, but to matter, to be productive, to be useful, to have it make some difference that you have lived at all."

They have proven time and time again that they as Auxiliary members give selflessly and tirelessly to families in time of need, veterans down in their luck, all while spreading their love and letting the community know who they are, the American Legion Auxiliary.

Our Department of California Auxiliary shows through hard work and dedication that although many of us work full time, raise families, and take care of our elderly, we still have time to volunteer for our
communities. This year, 2,599 volunteers participated in helping our community with the majority volunteering at food banks, 17 percent of our volunteers recycle, and 15 percent volunteer for cancer research. The value of in-kind donations throughout our great department totaled $\$ 132,000$ with the majority of donations given to the women's programs and homeless shelters. 79,838 hours were donated throughout the year, with the majority of the work being done at senior centers, food banks, and nursing homes. $\$ 76,000$ was donated to all of the programs, with cancer awareness being the number one thought on everyone's mind. Donations of 26,000 were donated to cancer awareness, 12,000 has been donated to women programs, and 9,000 to community food banks.

Six districts participated in local Stand Downs for homeless veterans and donated clothing, food, toiletries and home goods in the amount of $\$ 3700$ to these Stand Downs -- sorry. That shouldn't have been there. To these Stand Downs with 1600 in monetary donations.

Two members from District 18, Unit 280 help an organization who looks for homeless veterans and tries to get them off of the streets. These two members have spent hundreds of hours seeking out homeless veterans in parks and under bridges. They were able to get a female veteran off the street and set her up in housing and furniture
which are for her apartment. Great job, ladies.
(Applause.)
COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN SOLLAZZO: Several of our districts hosted lunches, dinners, and barbecues for veteran centers, rescue missions, and homeless shelters. One district helped veterans get jobs by working with headhunter groups. Our Department Auxiliary members have been hard at work donating food, clothing, taking CPR classes, quilting, knitting, transporting veterans and community members to appointments. Several districts donated blood to blood banks and donated $\$ 8,500$ to medical clinics.

Several members are trying to help veterans get back into college, while another unit is always at the airport for Honor Flight to Washington DC takeoffs and landings to help the veterans get to the planes. This same unit always provides afghans for the veterans' flights at takeoff.

District 27 has a member who delivers Meals on Wheels and served 693 meals while putting in 47 hours and 522 miles. A unit bakes cookies for special holidays to be given out with Meals on Wheels. Another unit in this district set up a luncheon for local teachers and donated school supplies. What a great way to help the community and let them know we care.

Several districts went above and beyond during the holidays. For instance, Thanksgiving brought lots of good food cooked by unit members. Posts opened their doors to the public or brought in veterans to serve.

In District 19, Unit 341 and Unit 411 co-host an annual Christmas party for approximately 150 veterans. Each veteran is given a large bag filled with socks, blankets, toiletries, and opens their patio up to the veterans to go clothes and shoes shopping to fill the rest of their bag. They are treated to a home cooked meal and lots of wonderful desserts. This year they gave each veteran a to-go box filled with leftovers, which brought a smile to each of their faces. The Past Unit President was also interviewed on television regarding this successful event and the interview is on the Department of California Auxiliary website.

A unit in District 21 held a Christmas luncheon for Wounded Warriors at Balboa Hospital. The 25th District had several units that participated in Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners and even provided baskets for the needy families. Total expenses for the baskets were \$1,122.

Several districts either walked in Relay For Life for cancer or supported it by helping on the sidelines. One unit formed a team and raised \$2,000 and walked the
full 24 hours. More than half of our 30 districts volunteered for a whopping total of 398 volunteers and 6,049 hours in support of cancer awareness. This cruel disease has touched many of our lives, so we should be proud to hear how many people are stepping up for cancer research and awareness.

District 27 has a group of Auxiliary members who like to have fun, so they take veterans from an assisted living facility to breakfast and pay for their meal. Another unit in that district participates in a ghost walk at the cemetery by providing baked goods, being guides and also actors for the entertainment.

I could go on and on about all of the wonderful things that are being done by each unit and each district. And you would notice a pattern. The pattern is that no matter who we help, how we help, or where we help, our membership is always willing to take the extra step and go the extra mile to create a relationship with our community and our Auxiliary. As the saying goes, being good is commendable, but only when it is combined with doing good is it useful. Author unknown. Our Auxiliary demonstrates that day in and day out, humbly and selflessly.

Madam President, that ends my supplement. May I pass out my awards?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Of course you
may.

COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN SOLLAZZO: Okay. For Best Unit Supplemental, Unit 146, District 22,

Manuela (inaudible).
(Applause.)
COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN SOLLAZZO: Best District Supplemental, District 22, Lois Cornish.
(Applause.)
COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN SOLLAZZO: All right.
And now we will have the Junior Volunteer of the Year Award. District 21, Unit 53, Kathleen McCoy.
(Applause.)
COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN SOLLAZZO: And
ta-ta-da, Senior Volunteer of the Year, Unit 249, District 11, Joan Cannon.
(Applause.)
COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN SOLLAZZO: Madam President, that concludes my report.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Thank you,
Tammy .
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Will the
Sergeant-At-Arms and Marshal, along with our Distinguished Guest Chairman, please escort Paul Cox, Director of the

War Memorial from San Francisco.
(Processional.)
DIRECTOR COX: Good morning. My name is Paul Cox. I'm a Marine veteran Vietnam.
(Applause.)
DIRECTOR COX: I am a Legionnaire in good standing in Post 315 in San Francisco and I have recently been elected the Chair of the Memorial War Commission in San Francisco which is not a state position. It's a committee of District 8. Is there anybody from District 8 here?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: No.
DIRECTOR COX: Sorry. I also want to apologize. I had to check out of the hotel this morning and I left my hat in my suitcase, so I'm feeling a little exposed up here. I'm just going to speak to you briefly about the situation I'm sure many of you are far more aware of it than I am, but just to very quickly summarize.

In March the Legion voted to move the offices of the state department to Sanger, California. That seems to be a near certainty at this point, but the vote at the convention floor has not yet happened. So it might not fly, but we're sort of assuming it will.

And I think, you know, I think it was Eisenhower that said, "Plans are nothing. Planning is everything."

And so we're sort of planning for eventualities, so I'm here today to invite the Auxiliary to stay in San Francisco. We have --
(Applause.)
DIRECTOR COX: We're certainly hoping that the Legion stays in San Francisco also, but I'm -- but as I said, that's not yet certain, so -- but it is our warmest invitation that if you should choose to stay in San Francisco, we will provide you with really a wonderfully remodeled historic building.

If you're familiar with the Veterans Building, it was built in 1932 it's 230,000 square feet, of which we have about 22,000. It's a little strange that there's -in the Veterans Building the veterans get 10 percent of the building, but we're working on that. We're working on that quite heavily. We have filed with the City of San Francisco to allow us access to more space to provide direct services to veterans. At this point what they have told us is we cannot provide services to veterans. We can have meetings there, we can have offices there, but we can't help veterans. That litigation is just getting started. The first hearing is in three days, and I am sure that we will prevail and wind up with additional space in the building that we can use to provide direct services to VSO.

But as to the Auxiliary, I just toured the remodeled space last week and it's quite nice. It's on the third floor where it was on the first, but it's in the same area of the building but up two floors. The floors are -- the carpet's down, the floors are in, the walls are painted. It has no furniture. And we're certainly hoping that whatever happens with the Legion, if they move to Sanger, that the Auxiliary will stay with us and we welcome you with open arms.

In the many years in the past -- and just in the interest of full disclosure, we would like to talk with you about a small donation to the War Memorial for the administration costs that we have. We have pretty severe budgetary problems, but we're not talking about much money for what is involved with the efforts that we are making. And that will also work for the Auxiliary.

We don't want to talk amounts now, and it's really something for you to decide what you would like to donate to the space. It's your decision how much that might be, but we are asking for a small stipend of a donation for the space.

So now that I dropped that bomb, is there anything else you would like to hear from me?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Do we have any questions from the floor? Please come to the microphone
and state your name and district, please.
DISTRICT 21 MEMBER VONRIGHT: Good morning, Madam President. My name is Leslie Vonright from Unit 519, District 21. My question is can we get the information where to make a donation if we want to, the donation for your War --

DIRECTOR COX: I think they're currently with us in a temporary space. I think the staff knows where it is. We're not asking for donations from you as individuals. We're asking it from the Auxiliary as a donation.

DISTRICT 21 MEMBER VONRIGHT: Well, I'm --
DIRECTOR COX: If you want to give me money, that's fine.

DISTRICT 21 MEMBER VONRIGHT: I'm asking as a unit can we donate to --

DIRECTOR COX: Oh, absolutely.
DISTRICT 21 MEMBER VONRIGHT: That's what I was
asking. Can we donate to you?
DIRECTOR COX: Of course.
DISTRICT 21 MEMBER VONRIGHT: Okay. Not me personally. I would like to support you as a unit, not as -- you know.

DIRECTOR COX: Thank you so much for that.
(Applause.)

DIRECTOR COX: And I do want to say the Auxiliary, the work that you do is just really, really extraordinary work to veterans and we're so appreciative of the great work that you do, both for Girls State and for veterans and veterans hospitals.

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: I have a couple questions. Maybe you can give us an idea. This donation, can you give us -- is there a ballpark figure of what the War Memorial Commission may be expecting or like --

DIRECTOR COX: We are expecting nothing. Something greater than zero.

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: Whatever we decide; is that correct?

DIRECTOR COX: That is correct. It's your donation.

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: Second part of the question is would the War Memorial Commission be willing -- would we be under contract? How is that situation going to be handled?

DIRECTOR COX: You know, when this first came down within the Legion, they said we want to guarantee you'll never ask us for any more money. And our response to that is, hey, you know, I can't speak for the next generation of veterans, but we would happy to provide you
with an agreement for ten years, you know.
DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: Or a year or --

DIRECTOR COX: No, we'll go with ten years. I mean, the whole leadership can then vote for it.

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: Thank you, Paul.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Go ahead. DISTRICT 24 MEMBER SQUIRE: Madam President. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Yes.

DISTRICT 24 MEMBER SQUIRE: Laloni Squire, Unit 43, District 24. To the gentleman, where you say we would like to have you stay in Los Angeles, who is we? San Francisco. I'm sorry. I --

DIRECTOR COX: The War Memorial Commission of which I am the chair. Oops. That's just an accident. The War Memorial Commission of which I am the chair. It's District 8 of American Legion. We are a subsidiary committee of District 8.

DISTRICT 24 MEMBER SQUIRE: And so you are in that building?

DIRECTOR COX: Yes.
DISTRICT 24 MEMBER SQUIRE: That's your home?
DIRECTOR COX: Well, we oversee the veteran portion of it. So in 1932 when the building was built --
or 1921 a trust was established by the veterans of World War I and the arts community in San Francisco. And at that time there were three beneficiaries: The San Francisco Post of the American Legion, the San Francisco Symphony, and the San Francisco Museum of Arts, which later became the Museum of Modern Art. The Museum of Modern Art has moved out; they're gone. So that really only leaves two beneficiaries in the whole complex. There's four buildings. There's the opera building, there's the symphony building, there's the performing arts, and there's the veterans building.

So we're the only beneficiary of a trust that is a solid rock hard trust that guarantees the San Francisco Post of the American Legion stays in that building forever.

DISTRICT 24 MEMBER SQUIRE: Madam President, may I ask one more question?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Sure.
DISTRICT 24 MEMBER SQUIRE: Sir, what is the benefit of the Auxiliary staying in San Francisco? What is the benefit to you and to the Auxiliary?

DIRECTOR COX: Our function is to support the veterans, and the Auxiliary is an extraordinary organization that does that. The Auxiliary and the Legion have been in that building since it opened in 1932, 83
years ago. And, you know, we're family. So the benefit? We love you.
(Applause.)
DISTRICT 24 MEMBER SQUIRE: Thank you.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Any further questions?

DISTRICT 19 MEMBER COOLEY-DESMEULES: Madam President, Jean Cooley-Desmeules, District 19, Unit 314 Hawthorne. This donation that we choose to give to the War Memorial if we stay there, what would that include? Would that include our utilities and our insurance and all of that or would that be an extra cost?

DIRECTOR COX: No. The City of San Francisco has just spent $\$ 210$ million retrofitting this building for seismic upgrading, modernizing, standards, ADA approval, and all of that. They also pay utilities and they pay maintenance. There are no taxes. None of which -- none of which applies to the Sanger location.

DISTRICT 19 MEMBER COOLEY-DESMEULES: Thank you.
DIRECTOR COX: We're not allowed -- people are not allowed to spend the night there.

DISTRICT 7 PRESIDENT BANDERA: Madam President, Janie Bandera, District 7, Unit 119. As a district president, I was in DEC and we had a sheet showing all the benefits of San Francisco. I was wondering if you could
tell everybody -- he did tell some of it, but tell everybody what was listed as the benefits there that we will not be paying for. I mean Internet service.

DIRECTOR COX: Well, Internet.
DISTRICT 7 PRESIDENT BANDERA: There was a sheet there.

DIRECTOR COX: Is this a sheet that's been passed around.

DISTRICT 7 PRESIDENT BANDERA: It was saying what we will be provided.

DIRECTOR COX: I didn't bring the budgets that -the relative budgets with me, but I did just mention the fact that we will not be paying utilities, maintenance, janitorial, or taxes.

DISTRICT 7 PRESIDENT BANDERA: Harriet has it I think.

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: He hasn't seen this sheet, so he's got to look at it first.

DIRECTOR COX: This is similar to other things that are going around. Well, now this is what we've asked from the Legion is $\$ 500$ a month, which may be renegotiated in the future at some point we think. That's pretty low and our budget requires something more than that. We do not expect this amount or anything greater or this amount from anybody, from the Auxiliary.

DISTRICT 7 PRESIDENT BANDERA: But it shows the benefits basically on there.

DIRECTOR COX: All utilities, yes. The square footage for the new space, it's about 2,000 square feet. And at this point your office in a closet and it's probably 8-by-15. And we apologize, it was the best we could get for the interim. But it will be essentially the same size as the space you had prior to moving out. It looks different. It's not -- everything's -- it looks pretty good.

Does that answer your question? So it says utilities, property taxes, security, newly remodeled, state-of-the-art, and a continued relationship since 1932. And that's very important to us. You did mention WiFi, and probably the Auxiliary will be furnish its own WiFi. But you don't have to pay the electricity or any of those other things. Did that answer your question?

DISTRICT 7 PRESIDENT BANDERA: Yes. Thank you.
DISTRICT 15 MEMBER RYAN: Okay. My concern -I'm Delores Ryan, Unit 26, District 15 -- is how the -- if we separate our departments from the Legion department, how is that going to affect our post and units and the things and family working together? Because I know that we have posts in the State of California that would love to get rid of their Auxiliaries and to make them go
someplace else. So we need to continue our American Legion family. And although I would love to stay in San Francisco, I think that if the Legion goes to Sanger, we should go to Sanger.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Delores, do you want a response?

DISTRICT 15 MEMBER RYAN: What?
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Do you want a response?

DISTRICT 15 MEMBER RYAN: No. I just wanted to voice my opinion.

DIRECTOR COX: I would like to respond to that a little bit, which is that is a very difficult decision that you're going to have to make. And I respect whichever. We fully respect and honor the Auxiliary and know that you'll make the right decision for you.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Delores, this is just for information only. Okay? At this time like Mr. Cox has said right from the very beginning, we're still not exactly sure 100 percent what the Legion is going to do.

DISTRICT 15 MEMBER RYAN: I understand that, but I just want to throw out the idea before we vote or anything, that we think about what -- how our --

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: And we appreciate that.

PAST NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: Madam President, can I just quickly respond to being in separate locations. Oh, Nancy Brown-Park, Past National President. I'm sorry. Currently the National organization is in two different buildings in two different locations. We are a Legion family and we will work hard to make that happen, and that's what we continue to do. If we do end up in two different locations, an address is not what makes us a family.
(Applause.)
DISTRICT 29 MEMBER URICH: Madam President, Karen Urich, Unit 291, District 29. My question is for you and the office staff. If we move to Sanger, will the office staff be moving as well? Will they be volunteering their time at that location or not?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: We have been told that our office staff with need to be replaced if we move to Sanger.

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: All three.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: All three.
Thank you.
VA\&R CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: Madam President, Wendy

0'Brien, District 6, Unit 521. I have a question for Mr. Cox. And this is just if we stay in San Francisco as a whole, will there be room in the new building for everyone? The Riders Department, the Sons Department, will there be room in this new facility for everyone to be in the same building in San Francisco?

DIRECTOR COX: If they choose to come, then yes. VA\&R CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: Okay.

DIRECTOR COX: The Riders have never been in the building nor have the Sons.

VA\&R CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: No, they haven't, but my question is because it's been remodeled and going there, is that a possibility?

DIRECTOR COX: It is a possibility.
VA\&R CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: Because that's my understanding is what's happening in Sanger.

DIRECTOR COX: That is correct. So before we had to move out before the retrofit, we had 32,000 square feet. They cut 10,000 square feet out of our space. We're not happy about that and we're fighting for that. It's -- you know, there are buildings all over California and all over the country that are owned by the counties and cities that are going down, and we're not going to go down in San Francisco and we're fighting back very strongly.

But having said that, space is limited so it would be a negotiation with those other organizations. But they're certainly welcome. They're a veterans organization. It's a family, it's a Legion. Oh, hell, yeah, come on.

VA\&R CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: Thank you very much. (Applause.)

DISTRICT 22 FIRST VICE PRESIDENT KOCHUR: April Kochur, District 22, Unit 465. My question is for Mr. Cox. That is -- whatever -- how long would the longevity be of the contract agreement? How many years would that be enforced? Is it going to change year to year? Ten years?

DIRECTOR COX: Well, it would need to be negotiated, but we're prepared -- I mean, the War Memorial Commission has authorized me to say ten years, and then -but nobody is going to kick anybody out after ten years are up. That's not going to happen. We've been there since 1932. Stay there forever, please. And it's just that whatever that donation is, agreement is about, we can come to terms on how long that term is. And five years or ten years, leadership and commission can work that out. Okay. But -- and we're not out to gouge anybody. We understand that budgets are a problem everywhere in the Legion, and we really just want you to come and the rest
is all details.
DISTRICT 22 FIRST VICE PRESIDENT KOCHUR: Okay. Thank you.

DEPARTMENT NEC WOMAN BIGGS: Madam President, just to be clear about the -- Anita Biggs, District 23. Just to be clear about the American Legion Riders and the Sons of the American Legion, they are both programs of the American Legion so they are going to have to go wherever the Legion goes. We need to be clear that they're not a separate organization or entity.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Thank you, Anita. Okay.

DIRECTOR COX: Are we done?
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Okay. I think we're done. There is no more, so I want to thank you very much for taking time out of our schedule for us.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: My theme is C.R.A.F.T.S. and it's to cultures working together.

DIRECTOR COX: My wife will probably want this one.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Thank you so much. I appreciate it.
(Applause.)
(Processional.)

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Okay. Ladies, ladies, it's ten to 10:00, and at 10:00 o'clock we need to be back in here and in our seats for elections. So I'm going to give you a ten-minute break.
(Recess from 9:50 a.m. to 10:14 a.m.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Ladies, can we take our seats. This session will come to order.

Will everyone please be seated in their respective districts. Remember that only delegates and alternates taking their place of the delegates will be allowed to be present during elections.

Sergeant-At-Arms and Marshal, please see that everyone in the lobby knows that the doors are being closed for the election process. And if they want to come in, to do so immediately, checking their badges, and then close the doors. No one will be permitted to enter and leave except in an emergency until the Chair states that the elections are concluded.

We will now have the report of the Elections Chairman Karen Bobren followed by the reading of the election rules.

ELECTIONS CONVENTION REPORT

ELECTIONS CHAIRMAN BOBREN: Can you hear me? Can
everyone here me?
AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Yes.
ELECTIONS CHAIRMAN BOBREN: Good morning, ladies. AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Good morning.

ELECTIONS CHAIRMAN BOBREN: The Elections committee met in the Ontario Airport Convention Center in the Juniper Room June 25th of 2015 at 11:30 a.m. Susan Baker from District 28 was appointed secretary, Donelda Denny from District 13 was appointed chaplain, Stephanie Reid from District 16 was Sergeant-At-Arms. Seventeen delegates answered roll call. Seven guests were present, three of them were juniors.

Each delegate received a copy of the 2015 convention rules. The election rules were read and discussed. There were no recommendations or suggestions. The meeting adjourned at 11:50 a.m.

Madam President Harriet, thank you for this appointment. It has been my honor serving as your Elections Chairman. This concludes my Election Committee report.

Madam President, may I proceed to the reading of the election rules?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Yes.

READING OF ELECTION RULES

ELECTIONS CHAIRMAN BOBREN: These will be found in the Book of Reports on pages 18 and 19, Convention Rules No. 25 through 36.

Number 25: Election of Department Officers, Junior Member of Finance, National Candidate, Department Delegates and Alternates to the National Convention shall be held on Saturday morning, June 27th, 2015.

Number 26: The doors of the convention hall shall be closed during the entire election procedure and no one shall leave or enter the hall until Chair states that election is concluded. The exception to this shall be that in an emergency a member may leave, and if her absence affects the voting strength, the District President shall immediately notify the Presiding Officer.

Number 27: When there is but one nominee for all Department Officers and but one nominee for Junior Member of Finance, the nominees shall be elected viva voce. (Article 5, Section 3, Department Constitution). Upon roll call the District Presidents shall report the number of units partially or wholly represented by duly elected delegates or alternates present in the delegation at the time of roll call. This is to determine that there is a quorum of units present at the time of the election.

Number 28: When there is more than one nominee
for the Department Officers, Junior Member of Finance, or endorsement for National Office, election shall be by written ballot. The District President shall, when they are instructed by Chair, take a roll call of their respective delegations to ascertain the total voting strength of their District for the election reporting the same to Chair.

Number 29: When there are three or more nominees for office, Junior Member of Finance, or endorsement of National Office, unless one nominee receives a majority vote on the first ballot, the nominee receiving the lowest number of votes shall be automatically dropped before proceeding with the next ballot.

Number 30: When there is a candidate or candidates for an endorsement to a National Office, a majority vote shall be by ballot. (Constitution Article V, Section 13).

Number 31: Each District President and District Member of the Elections Committee shall distribute and collect the votes cast by the district delegation and deliver them to the Department Chairman of the Elections.

Number 32: Department Officers, Chairmen, Committee Member, and Past Department Presidents shall vote with their respective district.

Number 33: Each delegate shall be entitled to
one vote, the vote of an absent Unit delegate not represented by an alternative, shall be cast by the majority of the delegates from the unit. When two delegates represent three votes, the chairman of the unit delegation shall cast the third vote.

Number 34: A majority of all votes cast shall elect, except that in the election of national delegates and alternates a plurality shall elect.

Number 35: These convention rules may be amended during the convention by a two-thirds vote.

And number 36: Robert's Rules of Order, Newly
Revised, shall be the parliamentary authority on all points not covered by these rules, the Department Constitution \& Bylaws, and convention mandates.

Thank you, ladies.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Thank you, Karen. Will the District -- will the District Presidents please proceed to the microphone and line up numerically. The secretary will call the roll of districts. Thank you, Ruby.

Facebook quickly became a place members were sharing stories and posting resources.

Members have worked so hard this year to get the word out and promote the American Legion Auxiliary in a positive manner. Units and districts have spent countless hours volunteering, working on Poppy fundraisers, memorial service, pocket flag programs, Girls State programs, young military children events, bingo with hospitalized veterans, BBQs, Stand Downs, female veterans tributes, local community cleanups, and post beautification projects. And the list goes on and on.

There have been so many rewarding and wonderful activities, Madam Department President, and I thank you for the honor of this appointment. I would also like to thank all of the units and district that took their time
to send their press releases to be included in your book. Without their assistance I could not have accomplished this task, but I think when you look back and see the extraordinary work that your Auxiliary members have accomplished, I know you will be very proud.

Madam Department President, that concludes my report. May I approach your station to present you with your book?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Of course. (Applause.)

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Thank you, Jennifer. I love it.

POPPY CONVENTION REPORT

POPPY CHAIRMAN MARTINEZ: Good morning, ladies. AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Good morning.

POPPY CHAIRMAN MARTINEZ: Oh, there they were. I knew there were words on the paper somewhere. The Convention Committee on Poppies met on June 25th, 2015 in the Redwood Room of the Ontario Airport Hotel, Ontario, California. The statistical report of this chairman appears on page 32 of the Book of Reports.

Pat Alvarez, District 29, was appointed secretary, Vella Myers, District 27, offered prayer, and

Patricia Patrick, District 23, was appointed Sergeant-At-Arms. A total of 24 district delegates answered roll call. There were four visitors present. Meeting opened according to ritual. The code was read and there were no code changes.
(Applause.)
POPPY CHAIRMAN MARTINEZ: There is one housekeeping change to be made to Code 14. There is no apostrophe S on "presidents." Discussion and recommendation to the Poppy program were made and will be submitted to the successive Department Chairman and Department President.

All certificates of appreciation, participation, and second place awards were given in committee. And those that did not get printed are being passed out by the pages at this time.

This concludes my committee report. May I continue with my supplemental?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Of course.
POPPY CHAIRMAN MARTINEZ: Madam President, it is hard to believe that this year is over. What a wonderful year it has been serving as the Department of California Poppy Chairman. Your theme C.R.A.F.T.S., Creating Relationships Assisting Families Through Service, has been in motion all year and your Magical Flower Makers produced
a garden full of magical flowers.
Our year began with securing our contracts with the Poppy production facilities in Yountville, Long Beach, and the WAVE Clinic for a total of 360,000 Poppies to be produced. Information relating to poppy orders, seals, and displays were distributed at the three workshops. As the poppy orders started coming in, I was not sure my mail carrier was going to survive. She had never delivered that much mail to me in six months. But she did survive. We had 88 percent of the units ordering poppies for distribution and over 65,000 seals were ordered. Thank you, ladies.
(Applause.)
POPPY CHAIRMAN MARTINEZ: Disabled and rehabilitating veterans handmade over 300,000 poppies for distribution to 264 units in the Department of California. Although ten cents per poppy does not look like a lot, it is gold to our veterans when they know they have their own money to purchase the things that they want when they want. Thank you to each and every unit that placed an order.

Members have attended their local city council meetings, town hall meetings, submitted articles to their newspapers, both in print and via Internet. The poppy story along with information on how our poppies are made,
what the income the veteran is used for, and what the donations generated by offering our poppies were distributed to local retailers, businesses and merchants. Units set up booths at their local craft fairs, flea markets, reaching out to many people that may not normally be in contact with.

In addition to getting the word out to the public, units worked with their schools in promoting the poppy poster and window display contest. One member created a PowerPoint presentation of the history and story of the poppy and presented it to a Veterans Museum.

Year-end reports showed that there were --year-end reports showed that there were ten units with poppy window displays and six units with poppy posters. This chairman, however, only received seven posters to consider for competition. Ten units held a Miss/Little Miss Poppy competition within their district, yet there were no entries submitted for consideration to this chairman. And I was so looking forward to presenting a Miss or Little Miss Poppy to this delegation.

Units distributed our poppies at their local grocery stores, setting up booths outside major retailers, attending school award programs, preparing corsages and boutonnieres. Boxes were sent to our troops overseas with poppies enclosed. One unit reported that their Girls

State delegate offers the first poppy in May, and this year the recipient was the head chaplain of the California National Guard.

The Magical Flower Makers of the Department of California planted their seeds, tended to their gardens, and harvested the magic created by our veterans. Memorial Day saw 295 crosses, 43 sprays adorned with our magical flowers, and 1395 flags placed at the graves of our fallen soldiers. Memorial wreaths were placed at various memorial ceremonies.

In addition to honoring those that gave their all, units are also honoring those that have chosen to become citizens of this great country by presenting them poppies, flags, and the poppy story at their nationalization ceremony. Units partnered together with the local youth groups such as the Boys and Girl Scouts, Junior ROTC, and others as they participated in their city Memorial Day programs.

Poppy cans were decorated for Poppy Month.
Social and local media was there to capture all of the tributes to our fallen veterans.

Madam President, may I proceed with the first place awards?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Yes, you may.
POPPY CHAIRMAN MARTINEZ: Thank you. Okay.

Everybody is here except for one because I have a problem with it. First place poster Class V, grades 10 to 11, Jenna Garcein, Salinas, California. I did not write the unit or district before I sent that poster, so I could not send a note, but could someone please come forward?
(Applause.)
POPPY CHAIRMAN MARTINEZ: I realized afterwards that I forgot to write some stuff down. And this is Unit 589, District 28. Congratulations. Thank you very much. (Applause.)

POPPY CHAIRMAN MARTINEZ: Excellent poster. First Place Poppy Poster Class VI, Leslie Chan, Unit 43, District 24.
(Applause.)
POPPY CHAIRMAN MARTINEZ: Thank you. First Place Unit Supplemental goes to Unit 6, District 22, Irma Manthi.
(Applause.)
POPPY CHAIRMAN MARTINEZ: She's on her way. She's on her way. I probably should have put Irma's name on the note when I sent it out. I'm still learning.
(Applause.)
POPPY CHAIRMAN MARTINEZ: First Place District Supplemental goes to District 22, Suzanne Dooley-Baily, chairman.
(Applause.)
POPPY CHAIRMAN MARTINEZ: Thank you. And now for the displays, first place poppy displays. President's Theme goes to Michelle Banks, Unit 751, District 25.
(Applause.)
POPPY CHAIRMAN MARTINEZ: Excellent job, Michelle. Thank you. And again I am learning I need to put the names on it, not just the district. Okay. First Place Poppy Display Freestyle, Unit 261, District 18, Celia Farinella.
(Applause.)
POPPY CHAIRMAN MARTINEZ: Thank you. And first place, only place, Poppy Display President's Choice goes to Unit 2, District 21, Cheryl Flemming. Cheryl, are you here?

## (Applause.)

POPPY CHAIRMAN MARTINEZ: They must have -- okay. I will double-check my pages and see what they did. But Cheryl Flemming. Do we know who that is? Is that District 21? Is she in District 21?

AUDIENCE MEMBER: It's District 21. That's my daughter.

POPPY CHAIRMAN MARTINEZ: I may have the unit wrong, but I have the rest of it right. Thank you, ladies. I had a difficult time kind of deciphering the
judges. We may have left the number off. I may have left the number off.

Okay. One last award for -- and I will have to print a certificate for this. For the unit -- it was to be for the unit that -- I did not get a lot of year-end reports, so this is going to the district with the greatest increase in Poppy orders goes to District 6 with an increase of 29.82 poppies.
(Applause.)
POPPY CHAIRMAN MARTINEZ: Okay. Madam President, I want to thank you for this appointment and allowing me to attend to your Magic Flowers over this past year. It has been an honor and this concludes my report.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Thank you, Kathie. Good job.
(Applause.)
POPPY CHAIRMAN MARTINEZ: Wait, wait, wait. I forgot to write this down. Poppy production managers, this was what I was supposed to put at the end of this report and I didn't. Poppy production managers, Yountville Geri Fitzpatrick.
(Applause.)
POPPY CHAIRMAN MARTINEZ: Lois Cornish. Right here. You guys should come up. My mind was blank. And Long Beach VAMC, Pat Alvarez.
(Applause.)
POPPY CHAIRMAN MARTINEZ: And I do have a small token that I will give to them off stage. Madam President, this now concludes my report. Thank you very much.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Thank you. I'd like to now hear a report from Leadership and Americanism. Norma DuVall, are you in the house? Okay. And Donna Scott, are you in the house?

Donna, could you please follow Norma with your report? Donna, could you please come up here for a second?

## LEADERSHIP CONVENTION REPORT

LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN DUVALL: Thank you, Madam President. The Convention Committee on Leadership met 9:00 a.m. on June 25th, 2015 in the Walnut Room at the Ontario Airport Hotel, Ontario, California. The statistical report appears on page 30 of the Book of Reports.

Gigi Manno, District 22, was appointed secretary. Tracy Varnell, District 26, offered prayer. Alzora Carter, District 23, was appointed Sergeant-At-Arms. A total of 20 districts answered roll call and there were
four visitors.
The Committee agreed on the following report: The code was read and the following changes were presented. Code No. 4 now reads: "Department Chairman will complete the attendance cards upon receipt from certified instructors and forward to Department President for signature."

We have a proposed change to delete this code in its entirety. By direction of the committee I move this change.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: It's been moved and seconded to delete Code 4. Is there any discussion? (No response.)

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: All in favor say aye.

AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Opposed?
NAT'L STRATEGIC PLANNING COMMITTEE MEMBER TAYLOR:
No.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Motion carried.
LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN DUVALL: Thank you. Code No. 7 now reads: "Requirements for certification or recertification of certified instructor. A, passed the National Correspondence Course. B, attended and/or participated in a leadership workshop for a minimum of six
hours. C, certified instructors must conduct or have participated in a workshop every five years to maintain their certification. D, proper forms must be completed by applicant and recommendation made by the certified instructor. E, blue cards will be issued to certified instructors after receipt of the Department Chairman -excuse me. After receipt by the Department Chairman of the application and one dollar. The date of expiration will be placed on the back of the card by the Department Chairman."

We have a proposed change to this code. With the adoption, Code No. 7 will now read: "Requirements for certification or recertification of certified instructor. A, attended and/or participated in a leadership workshop for a minimum of six hours. B, certified instructors must conduct or have participated in a workshop every five years to maintain their certification. C, proper forms must be completed by applicant and recommendation made by the certified instructor. D, after receipt of the application and one dollar, the Department Chairman will complete the blue leadership instructor card to include the five-year term and forward it to the Department President for her signature."

By direction of the committee I move this change. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Proposed code
change: "Requirements for certification or recertification of certified instructor. A, attended and/or participated in a leadership workshop for a minimum of six hours. B, certified instructors must conduct or have participated in a workshop every five years to maintain their certification. C, proper forms must be completed by applicant and recommendation made by the certified instructor. D, after receipt of the application and one dollar, the Department Chairman will complete the blue leadership instructor card to include the five-year term and forward it to the Department President for her signature."

Is there any discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: All in favor? AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Aye.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Opposed? (No response.)

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Motion carried. LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN DUVALL: Thank you. Code No. 9 reads: "White cards will be issued upon receipt of attendance and one dollar each from the certified instructor. Leadership pins, at current cost, are also available and can be ordered from National Emblem Sales by any attendee, but they do not include instructor status.

Monies in full must accompany all requests for pins and cards."

We have a proposed change to this code. With its adoption Code No. 9 will now read: "Department Chairman will complete the white attendance cards upon receipt from instructors of the workshop sign-in sheet and one dollar for each card. The cards will be mailed to the instructors for distributions. Leadership pins, at current cost, are also available and can be ordered from National Emblem Sales by any attendee, but they do not indicate instructor status."

By direction of the committee I move this change.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Code 9 change -proposed change will be: "Department Chairman will complete the white attendance cards upon receipt from instructors of the workshop sign-in sheet and one dollar for each card. The cards will be mailed to the instructors for distributions. Leadership pins, at current cost, are also available and can be ordered from National Emblem Sales by any attendee, but they do not indicate instructor status."

Is there any discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: All in favor?
AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Aye.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Opposed? (No response.)

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Motion carried. LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN DUVALL: Thank you. Code No. 13 now reads: "All members are encouraged to complete the Auxiliary Correspondence Course."

We have a proposed change to this code. With its adoption Code 13 will now read: "The National Leadership course teaches members about our organization, history, basic protocol, and basic conduct of business through a self-paced study course. The course is designed and available for any member in good standing. A, all certified leadership instructors are encouraged to complete the National Leadership Course. B, California is responsible for their own recordkeeping and grading. Ten incorrect answers are allowed for a passing score" -excuse me -- "passing grade. C, every member that participates in the National Leadership Course will send their members instruction sheet and exam answer sheet to the Department Chairman for grading. After grading, the Department Chairman will, 1, record the member's information for recordkeeping. 2" -- that was a typo. "2, issue gray cards signed by the current National President and National Leadership Chairman to each member with a passing grade and mail it with a congratulatory
letter. 3, send a letter to each member that did not pass, encouraging them to review the material and resubmit their test answers."

By direction of the committee I move this change.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: The proposed change will now read: "The National Leadership Course teaches members about our organization, history, basic protocol, and basic conduct of business through a self-paced study course. The course is designed and available for any member in good standing. A, all certified leadership instructors are encouraged to complete the National Leadership Course. B, California is responsible for their own recordkeeping and grading. Ten incorrect answers are allowed for a passing grade. C, every member that participates in the National Leadership Course will send their members instruction sheet and exam answer sheet to the Department Chairman for grading. After grading, the department chairman will, 1, record the member's information for recordkeeping. 2, issue gray cards signed by the current National President and National Leadership Chairman to each member with a passing grade and mail it with a congratulatory letter. 3, send a letter to each member that did not pass, encouraging them to review the material and resubmit their test answers."

(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: All in favor? AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Aye.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Opposed? (No response.)

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Motion carried.
LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN DUVALL: Thank you. Thank you. There were no resolutions or recommendations. 100 percent reporting citations and second and third place winners were presented and will be posted in the department office. With no further business the meeting adjourned at -- I believe it was at 9:55.

That concludes my report. May I conclude with my supplemental?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Please do.
LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN DUVALL: Bless you. Thank you. Each of us is faced with the challenge of finding a way to help and strengthen the units within our respective districts. California is not unique. We join units nationally faced with challenges of reaching membership goals, having effective, productive meetings, and growing our leadership with trained active members. Additional challenges include low number of volunteers, conflicts, bad attitudes, and lack of interest or caring about our mission, vision and purpose.

Oceanside 146 did not let that stop them. By sharing our mission they increased their membership by 19 and I know now has surpassed their 137.78 percent.
(Applause.)
LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN DUVALL: California continues to strive for success in leadership. How are we accomplishing our goals? Camarillo Unit 741 chairman says, and I quote, "Leadership is practiced on a daily basis more through actions than spoken words," end quote.
(Applause.)
LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN DUVALL: Whether working one-on-one or a group setting, California's leaders provide guidance by assisting, encouraging, and mentoring with compassion, pride, and understanding, always keeping the best interest of our organization in mind. Individual members meet and greet, exchange ideas, and bring learning experiences back to the unit. They hold age appropriate hands-on activities. Their knowledge is shared in a practical fashion.

Lakewood Unit 496 chairman stated, and I will quote, "Mentoring through leadership program is a great way to ensure a strong Legion family," end quote. And we are striving to be California strong, being a good role model working together in an atmosphere of responsibility and love for our organization.

Our year always begins with the department officers' and chairmen training, followed by a program workshop to introduce the program goals for the year to our members. This year two workshops had 210 members attending. Twenty-nine units then held workshops with 327 attending. Sixteen out of our 30 districts held workshops with 364 attending, and the National Mission Training was well received with 53 members attending.

Although unforeseen circumstances cancelled two district workshops and attendance was lower than desired at the others, a total of 78 members directly benefited. With the assistance of 12 certified instructors and many more qualified instructors, this chairman conducted four senior department workshops and one department junior workshop traveling from the northern Sierra Nevada area of District 27 to the Los Angeles basin in District 23 through the Santa Ana Valley in District 29 and the San Diego Valley in District 18.

Two of these districts held six-hour workshops that would meet qualifications of certifying or recertifying instructors. The other two districts held either a four- or five-hour Department Leadership workshop to provide a means to help and strengthen their units as well as provide a platform for constructive learning.

Some of the topics for workshop training included
our programs, history, and ALA mission, supporting American Legion family, membership and benefits, unit, district, and end-of-the-year reporting, how to wear the American Legion Auxiliary pin, relationship of post and unit, taxes and legal mandates, effective meetings, ceremonies, awards, tradition, core values, how to select leaders, dos and don'ts, how to make motions, conflict management, and understanding the generation gap.

This chairman put together a 108-page Leadership booklet entitled, "Guide for Leadership Traditions and Unit Management" with sections on our American Legion Auxiliary basics, history including Past Department and National Presidents from California, membership, acronyms and terms, programs, duties and meetings, UD\&R, image, tidbits, and words of wisdom. Other tools used for training included procedure books, role playing and skits. Quizzes -- oh, oh, Madam President.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Go on.
LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN DUVALL: Included role play, quizzes on assessing your unit, parliamentary points, officers' duties and responsibilities, interactive learning through games that included Simon Says for membership and eligibility, Family Feud for programs, game board for the three Children \& Youth program categories, and a $Q$ and $A$ game board for five areas of acronyms,
programs, protocol, membership, and basics.
Various project boards were used as visual aids to display our mission, programs, Legion's four pillars, scholarships, and the American Legion family.

Although there were no exams submitted for the junior course, a total of 19 exams for the Auxiliary basics course included three unit presidents and one district president were submitted, with five passing and 14 needing to resubmit their answers. However, I will make a correction in that because four -- I believe four of those 14 did receive a passing score.

One unit held a training class attended by 17 senior members, several which were new members. Although diligent studying of the material was a great learning tool, their disappointment in the exam records was heartfelt. Hopefully this will not be a deterrent to active involvement by enthusiastic members embracing our vision in the spirit of service, not self.

There were eight districts and two units reporting training on nurturing a culture of goodwill. Others reported no formal training but a continuous effort made at all meetings. Some of the topics included be respectful of each other, work to develop pleasant atmosphere at all events, be supportive, helpful and nice, nurture family feelings and each other, spirit of
cooperation, refrain from talking when others are speaking, greet new members, leave attitudes at the door. Practice, tolerance, promote goodwill at all times.

A unique presentation seen years ago provided the inspiration for this chairman's focus on civility, a virus chest. At each workshop and the midyear meeting everyone received two index cards and was asked to write on one card a negative word or thought and the other a positive word or thought that did not have to be organization specific. All responses on are the project boards, "Is this Civility?" They are over here.

And mind you these are not my words. These are your words. Those of you that each filled out a card, your response is over there, one negative, one positive. If you take the time to look at it, I'm sure that you will realize if you didn't have the opportunity to write one of those words, you probably are going to find it over there anyway because we all are experiencing the same thing. And we need to change the negative.

My hope that the "Virus Chest" exercise focuses on that we are an organization with goals to do good for veterans, youth, and our communities as well as our own members and that we're all individuals and our likes and dislikes are what set us apart and that each of us has the responsibility to treat each other with respect and
courtesy.
San Benito Unit 69 chairman said it the best, and I will quote, "Belonging to the American Legion Auxiliary is a constant learning environment. The information is available everywhere. You just have to reach out and grasp it, read it, absorb it and implement it in your unit," end quote.

This concludes my report.
(Applause.)
LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN DUVALL: May I continue with my first place awards?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Yes, please.
LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN DUVALL: There were no
entries for the Junior Outstanding Leadership Award, Unit Nurturing Goodwill Award, or District Nurturing Goodwill Award .

I have two awards. First Place District Leadership Training award goes to Linda Fariss and Linda Diebel, District 19.
(Applause.)
LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN DUVALL: And the First Place Unit Leadership Training award goes to Oceanside Unit 146, District 22, Kim Crone, Chairman.
(Applause.)
LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN DUVALL: Thank you, Madam

President, for this appointment. This concludes my report.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Thank you, Norma.

Madam Secretary, do you have any notices before we recess for lunch?

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: Ways \& Means wants to remind everyone they have a 50/50 ticket sale going on out there in the back of the room. Get your tickets. You might be the lucky winner.

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS:
Everyone that needs -- that brought colors needs to come dressed and ready to retire colors at the end of today's session.

Here's another one. She's trying to trick me. She's saying that A word. Today we are posting to Instagram. Oh, God. Here we go again. Sites Ontario Bell and ALA For Veterans. Please join the -- oh, conversation and shave? Oh, share. Oh, yeah.

And the Hoops. The Hoops can meet in the bar with Bev's -- oh, they're Team Captains. Whatever.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: This session is
now in recess for lunch until 1:30. Thank you. (Lunch recess.)
(Time noted: 12:02 p.m.)

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Good afternoon, ladies. Let's get started a little bit here.

Will the Sergeant-At-Arms and Marshal please close the doors, unless you want to go all the way around the hotel.

Sergeant-At-Arms and Marshal, please get everyone in the parade and Liz is going to play some Old Time Rock \& Roll as our crafters make their way around the room.
(Parade processional.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Did you have fun?
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: I don't know about you, but I've got to catch my breath. Excuse me, ladies. The Membership Committee needs the delegates to meet outside. So those of you who are -- who are in the -- go outside if you are a delegate. Membership. Membership. If you are a delegate at the Membership Committee meeting, please go outside.

Americanism. And Junior Activities, will you please follow Americanism. And Legislative after that, please.

AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Are you ready?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Yes. Are you ready for us?

AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCOTT: I'm not sure with that Old Time Rock \& Roll.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Okay. I should say are you out of breath like I am.

AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Absolutely.

## AMERICANISM CONVENTION REPORT

AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Okay. Madam President, the Americanism Committee met in the Maple Room on Thursday, June 25th at 10:00 a.m. Genieca Risner, District 15, acted as my secretary, Robin Falkenberg, District 28, offered prayer, and Kathleen Filkens from my District 25 was appointed Sergeant-At-Arms. We had a total of 20 delegates and nine guests.

The code was read and a motion was made to change 6D to add "school address." It will now read -- let me read it in its entirety. I'll read it the way it was first. "6D: A sealed envelope from each group shall be attached to the student's essay and forwarded to the District Chairman for competition. The following must be enclosed: Student's name, address, age, grade, name of school, teacher's name, and name of unit chairman.

Outside of the sealed envelope shall indicate the name and number of the unit and district -- of unit and district number."

The committee voted to because of all the privacy acts, that's the reason that they wanted to change this. Some we were having a hard time getting students' addresses because the schools won't give them out, which is what should happen, they should not give them out, and so they were having problems.

And so what they suggested was to change -instead of the student's name, address, age, et cetera, they want to change it to read the student's name, age, grade, name of school, school address, teacher's name, and name of the unit chairman, and the rest remains the same. We thought if we added the school's address it would -possibly that would be easier contact for the students.

With that I move the adoption of this code change.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Can you please read the code in its entirety as -- with the code change.

AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCOTT: With the change?
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: With the change.
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCOTT: "A sealed envelope with each group shall be attached to the unit's winning essay and forwarded to the District Chairman for
competition. The following must be enclosed: Student's name, age, grade, name of school, school address, teacher's name, and name of the unit chairman. The outside of the sealed envelope shall indicate the name and number of the unit and district number."

I move the acceptance of this code change.
DEPARTMENT NEC WOMAN BIGGS: Second.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Just one second.
Okay. "A sealed envelope with each group shall be attached to the unit's winning essay and forwarded to the District Chairman for competition. The following must be enclosed: Student's name, age, grade, name of school, school address, teacher's name, and name of the unit chairman. The outside of the sealed envelope shall indicate the name and number of the unit and district number."

AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCOTT: (Nods head.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Just a second, please. Okay. Is there any discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: All in favor? AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Aye.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Opposed? (No response.)

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Motion carried.

AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Second and third place winners were announced and first place awards to be given on the convention floor. Jean Howard, District 22, recommended that a parental concept form be made to go into the packets presented to the schools. Hopefully this would -- I think we have that in the department office. I think that's -- we use that for other things such as maybe Girls State maybe. So that was just a thought, a recommendation, a suggestion. And the meeting was then adjourned at 11:00 a.m.

May I continue with my supplemental report?
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Yes, you may.
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Madam President, your Crafters of Patriotism have outdone themselves this year. Your theme of Creating Relationships Assisting Families Through Service apparently gave new life to the Americanism program. Unit and district chairmen jumped right in and started the rear off by participating in 4th of July parades with their Legion family.

In August the department workshops began and were well attended. This chairman delivered or mailed out packets of information to each District Americanism Chairman. Included in the packet was a copy of the code and other information to help them work their program. Americanism is a year-round program and our chairmen
certainly have done just that.
Many units began early visiting schools to let them know about our wonderful Americanism essay contest. This apparently worked as 55 units reported receiving a total of 2,027 essays.
(Applause.)
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCOTT: You ladies came through. Great job, members. Of course this made the judging a bit more time consuming, but the essays were well worth our time. Four units reported participation in the National essay contest and this chairman received one entry which was forwarded on to National.

One thing I discovered is that we need more communication in our essay program. Some chairmen did not pay attention to the rules, deadlines, et cetera. The rules are very straightforward and must be followed. Sadly a number of essays were disqualified because rules were not followed. Many contained no information on the student. Others sent more than one essay for the same category, and several other problems caused disqualification all because rules were not followed.

Districts chairmen, please go over the rules with your units and make sure no essays are disqualified. The students work very hard on this program and they deserve to have their work recognized.

American flags were presented to 51 businesses or individuals during the past year for a reported total cost of $\$ 350.94$. Units promoted flying the American flag daily and 81 units promoted patriotism in schools. Another 134 units reported participating in patriotic holiday events and 55 units promoted citizenship/patriotism in schools, with 150 members participating and 108 schools contacted.

The younger students were taught such things as flag etiquette and the proper way to display, respect, and dispose of the flags no longer serviceable. At least 64 units supported American Legion baseball and oratorical contests. Some served as judges for oratorical contests and provided refreshments following competitions.

Forty Blue Star and 20 Gold Star banners were presented to our members -- by our members. One of the most important things we can do as American citizens is a right to vote. Seventy-one units reported participating in the Get Out the Vote campaign by posting articles in Post and Auxiliary newsletters, talking about it at Unit meetings, working with election polls, and even holding mock elections at schools to train students in the voting process.

One unit even borrowed the voting materials from the courthouse in an effort to make the training a reality. They had the sixth, seventh, and eighth grade
students vote on school issues and their ASB candidates. After voting, the students were all given an "I voted" sticker just like the ones you receive at your polling place.

There were 94 units that reported promoting flying the American flag daily. They did this by talking about it at meetings, placing articles in Post/Auxiliary newsletters, and visiting local businesses to present citations to those who did fly the flag daily. Individuals also received citations for flying their flag on a daily basis.

Patriotic holidays were well supported by the Auxiliary. They began the year with 4 th of July parades, barbecues, craft shows, fireworks, and games for the military children at parks and posts. Next came ceremonies for 9/11. Another unit reported their participation -- their spectacular, sorry, parade of 1,000 flags through the streets of their city and told of the breathtaking sight of Old Glory waving in the breeze as they paraded into City Hall.

Veterans Day again finds the Legion families working to provide ceremonies to honor veterans and families, as well as lots of great food and fellowship back to the Post. The last holiday for the year is Memorial Day where again ceremonies are seen throughout
our great state. The Legion family reported placing flags and crosses at local cemeteries for veterans buried there and those with National cemeteries spent hours placing flags and crosses on graves.

Whenever naturalization ceremonies occurred, there you would find our American Legion Auxiliary members. They would present a small American flag to each new citizen as they shook their hand and welcomed them to our beautiful America.

The pocket flag project was also a favorite throughout the department. There were 4286 pocket flags purchased and mailed to our active duty military or given to those ready for deployment. Units enlisted the help of our junior members, Girl Scouts and Boy Scouts in folding and preparing the flags for mailing. All felt this was a very good way to not only introduce and include the youth of their neighborhoods in our programs, but a great way to educate them -- to include them -- to educate them, I'm sorry, in the many aspects of the American Legion Auxiliary and the Legion family.

The statistical report on Americanism can be found on page 24 of the Book of Reports. Please read it and be proud of what all of you have done. After reading the unit and district reports, Americanism essays, and in communicating with so many of our members throughout this
year, this chairman is confident that America is in good hands. The inspiration I received from the outstanding essays was a real eye opener to this chairman.

Thank you, Madam President, for this appointment, and I can assure you that I have a new and much greater appreciation and respect for this chairmanship. This concludes my report -- my remarks, Madam President. May I continue with my first place awards?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Yes, you may. (Applause.)

AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCOTT: I got some notes yesterday. Okay. I'm just going to take these right off the certificates. This one is a first place for Group V essays. This is ages 11 through 14 and it's presented to Vincent Miller of Long Hill Middle School sponsored by Unit 475, District 18.
(Applause.)
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCOTT: First place for Group I. This goes to Sophia Reyes, Long View Elementary School sponsored by Unit 248, District 18.
(Applause.)
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCOTT: And this is first place Group V, ages 14 nine months to 20 years sponsored by -- this goes to Emily Phillips, Julian High School sponsored by Unit 468, District 22, Cindy Sanders,
chairman.
(Applause.)
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCOTT: First place essay Group III goes to Tara Miller, Our Lady of Peace --

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT TOZIER: Yeah, that's our --

AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCOTT: It goes to Tara Miller sponsored by Unit 6, District 22, Susie Tozier, chairman.
(Applause.)
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCOTT: This one is a first place in group -- also in Group II sponsored by -- let's see the name first. Claudia Fedora, Round Valley School sponsored by Unit 118, District 27, Danielle White, chairman.
(Applause.)
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCOTT: This is another first place for Group IV. Name is Heather Navarro, Long Beach High sponsored by Unit 716, District 29, Stephanie Gangi, chairman.
(Applause.)
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCOTT: These essays, I cannot tell you. I've only served on the unit and the district level, and reading the essays, this was a real experience. I mean, there was a lot of essays and these
kids are just -- it just makes your heart full because you know that we are in good hands for our future.

And then we have on the -- on the wonderful writing, this one is for Elizabeth London Sheppard award for best youth program goes to Ann Marie Brown, Unit 6, District 22.
(Applause.)
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Now this one is for the Best Unit Americanism Project Supplemental Report, and it goes to Bradley Keeper, Unit 138, District 30, Kim Vincent, chairman.
(Applause.)
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCOTT: These reports are all amazing. It was very difficult, very difficult job. And we have for the Most Outstanding Americanism Program Targeting Children \& Youth goes to Unit 716, District 29.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: Cheryl, are you done happy or what?

AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCOTT: I wish I could have given everybody a first place award because there was so many wonderful essays and reports at the unit and district level. It was great. And the Best Overall Unit Get Out to Vote Program, this goes to Danielle White, Unit 118, District 27.
(Applause.)
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Danielle, came up. With the election, leave it to her to come up with something like that. She did a great job. And I had another couple ones here too. This one is for the First Place Best Overall District Supplemental. Ann Marie Brown, chairman, District 22.
(Applause.)
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCOTT: I spoke to her yesterday. I spoke to Ann yesterday and I saw her at the other hotel and I wanted so badly to say aren't you going to visit the Auxiliary this year? But I thought, well, I better not.

And my last award goes to -- this one is for the First Place Best Overall Unit Supplemental. And if you can guess who this goes to. Unit 684, District 27, LuAnn Capazzi.
(Applause.)
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCOTT: And I just might add one little thing here. Let's see. Both the best overall unit supplemental and the best overall district supplemental were forwarded to National.
(Applause.)
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCOTT: They were wonderful. Madam President, that concludes my report.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Thank you so much.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Will the Sergeant-At-Arms and can Marshal, along with the Distinguished Guest Chairman, please escort someone that I've been very proud to work with this year, Michael J. Fox, president, or whatever, of the Sons of the American Legion Department of California and his entourage.
(Processional.)
SONS COMMISSIONER: Good afternoon. I'd like to introduce to you California's candidate for National Commander Sons of the American Legion Michael Fox.
(Applause.)
DETACHMENT COMMANDER FOX: Thank you. Thank you. Well, first of all, before $I$ say anything, I need to apologize. Madam President, this year has been I think one of the busiest conventions the Sons I think has ever had. And I'm sorry that I'm just now coming over to see you.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: That's okay. Better late than never.

DETACHMENT COMMANDER FOX: So now the cat is out of the bag. Yes, I am going to be the next National Commander from the Detachment of California.
(Applause.)
DETACHMENT COMMANDER FOX: Today there is not been an official date set yet, but it will happen before 2020. There is a lot of changes going on at National right now with how they operate on the Sons side and the next two years is just going to be kind of waiting to see what they decide to do. But I have no problem telling you ladies out there that whether they decide to give me the blessing or not, California will have a National Commander, and I will run contested if necessary.
(Applause.)
DETACHMENT COMMANDER FOX: You know, for those of who weren't there when I spoke at the DEC and convention last year, the Sons are not going to be able to do it on their own as all of you know. Just the day-to-day operations of the squadron, most of my squadrons would not exist if it wasn't for you ladies. There's no question about it.
(Applause.)
DETACHMENT COMMANDER FOX: The women's Auxiliary is absolutely the greatest asset that the Sons have and I can tell you without a shadow of a doubt Unit 521 has supported me for 35 years now.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Don't you mean

34 and a half?
DETACHMENT COMMANDER FOX: Well, I'm 35 and I have 36 years of membership. I was born in April of 1980 and I was signed up the day I was born. So before I was born I was already in my second year.

Now in also saying that, I did start to become active at a young age. I held my first Detachment office at eight years old. I was Detachment Sergeant-of-Arms when I was eight and it progressed. And, you know, I took sometime time during college and family, and now I'm a single father raising my four girls and traveling all over this state.
(Applause.)
DETACHMENT COMMANDER FOX: And also I would like to say all four of my daughters are Junior Auxiliary members.
(Applause.)
DETACHMENT COMMANDER FOX: It's been a blessing this year to work with Madam President. We've crossed paths at times throughout the year in traveling. As I gave my report earlier, I've gone over 27,000 this year going up and down this state, back to Indianapolis as well. It's been a fantastic year for the Sons of the Legion. The organization has moved and has well exceeded my expectations.

So remember in the years to come I'm going to need the support from everybody to finish this plan. I started this plan two years ago and this is the first stop I've made. The resolution has been passed on our floor and is on its way to the American Legion Department of California to pass there as well. But before I leave, I have a couple of little things for you.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: I like little things.

DETACHMENT COMMANDER FOX: First of all, I have the National Commanders pen this year for the Sons of the American Legion as a gift for you. This year I decided to make up a Commanders pen that I've been given out. They will not be sold. You cannot get them unless they come out of my pocket. So that's for you.
(Applause.)
DETACHMENT COMMANDER FOX: She says that she has one. I started to do a fundraiser in anticipation of my motion getting passed on the floor today, but I'm not going to sell it to you. This is the first pin that I'm going to give away that has come out of my pocket. It says, "A home run hit for National Commander."

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Thank you. (Applause.)

DETACHMENT COMMANDER FOX: And finally for my
tardiness, I would like to make $\$ 100$ donation to your special project.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: I would like to see you later. Thank you so much.

DETACHMENT COMMANDER FOX: Ladies, thank you so much for everything you've done for me personally and everything that you've done for all my squadrons throughout the state because I guarantee you the success that we had this year would have never have happened if you guys were not so involved with the squadrons. So thank you so much.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: I have this, our Book of Reports, and you're in it so --

DETACHMENT COMMANDER FOX: Oh, thank you.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: So I would like to give it to you as a keepsake or whatever.

DETACHMENT COMMANDER FOX: Thank you. And before we all leave, I would like to introduce -- most of you already know Junior Past Commander Chris Affolter.
(Applause.)
JUNIOR PAST COMMANDER AFFOLTER: For those of you that saw me a few years ago, I'm not afraid no more. If you weren't here a couple years ago, I had the pleasure of
serving two conventions as Commander for the Sons of the American Legion preceding him, and the first one they said you've got to go see the Auxiliary. So the ladies here that hadn't been here, I was -- I was scared. That's right. I needed my momma and she wasn't -- she was in the desert.

But it is an honor and privilege of course to be in front of you again. I -- I agree with Mike 100 percent. The Auxiliary is an essential part of the Sons of the American Legion program. Growing up I wouldn't have known how to do my membership if it weren't for the Auxiliary and the members in the Auxiliary. Am I the only one? You know, your squadrons need you. The American Legion is a wonderful, wonderful bunch of guys, but they're not worried about the Sons and they don't realize in some cases that the Sons of the American Legion can make some dollars for you. The Commander -- what was our dollar figure that we earned this year?

DETACHMENT COMMANDER FOX: If you combine the hours with the National dollars and all the monies and goods that we brought in, over $\$ 15.8$ million dollars.
(Applause.)
JUNIOR PAST COMMANDER AFFOLTER: So I can tell you that your support and your help made that happen. So thank you, ladies, and give yourselves an applause.
(Applause.)
JUNIOR PAST COMMANDER AFFOLTER: And a shout out to District 18, the ladies there. Thank you very much.
(Applause.)
JUNIOR PAST COMMANDER AFFOLTER: They're mentoring me as I go along. I tell you, I've been corrected by them more than I have the Legionnaires. But today I come to you with an award. Normally our Public Relations Chairman does that, but this year he's a Past National Commander, and you know how those people are. So he wanted to go sit back and here I am to present it to you.

So this is the Dottie Shurad 2015 Auxiliary Member of the Year presented to Socaro B. Telford in recognition of your service and outstanding leadership, service and dedication to the principles of the Sons of the American Legion, and for your efforts on behalf of the programs of the American Legion family. Given the Sons of the American Legion Detachment of California June 2015. Michael Fox, Commander and Paul C. Rodriguez, Commissioner. Is this young lady here today?

AUDIENCE MEMBER: Belen Telford?
JUNIOR PAST COMMANDER AFFOLTER: Well, the middle initial is B. Is she here?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: No, she's not, but is somebody here to receive this?

JUNIOR ACTIVITIES DIRECTOR VINCENT: I will accept it on her behalf.
(Applause.)
JUNIOR PAST COMMANDER AFFOLTER: I've got one
more shout out because I grew up in the 21st District. Thank you, ladies.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Thank you very much. We wish you the best of success in your future endeavors.
(Applause.)
(Processional.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: First the parade and then them. Wow. Is it just me?

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT TOZIER: Harriet, on behalf of all your chairmen and your district presidents and everybody, this is a gift for you, one I was supposed to give you the other day.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Thank you very much. I have to open it.
(Applause.)
NAT'L STRATEGIC PLANNING COMMITTEE MEMBER TAYLOR:
All right. All right. All right. That's beautiful.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Oh, you wanted
me in the picture? I've been in enough pictures. It is beautiful.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT TOZIER: You have other craft item to start getting work done on.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Now that I'll have a few minutes. Yes, thank you. Thank you very much everybody. Thank you, Susie. Did you make that? Sort of? Okay.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT TOZIER: I did put some stitches in, yes.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Thank you very much. Okay. Kim.

## JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CONVENTION REPORT

JUNIOR ACTIVITIES DIRECTOR VINCENT: Okay. Good afternoon. The Convention Committee met on Thursday, June 25th, 2015 in the Maple Room of the Ontario Airport Hotel, Ontario, California. The statistical report of the Chair appears in the Book of Reports on page 29.

Junior Conference Committee Member Kathy Harris, District 23, was appointed secretary. Junior Conference Committee Member Jacqueline Cleveland, District 23, was appointed Chaplain offering prayer. Ellen McClurg, District 14, was appointed Sergeant-At-Arms, and Junior

Conference Director Diana Livas was present. Fifteen district delegates answered roll call. Three visitors and three junior members were present.

The committee agreed on the following report. The code was read and the following change was recommended, to combine the Junior Activities and Junior Conference Appendix A by combining Codes 4 into 2 and deleting Code No. 4 and renumbering all following codes accordingly.

Code 2 and 4 currently read: "2. The Junior Conference shall be self-supporting and the current income from the fundraising project and contributions shall be used to support the current Junior Conference. The Department Junior Activities Chairman will be responsible for the promotion of the conference and all fundraising efforts in support of the conference. 2009."

Number 4. "Funds raised for the statewide conference session shall only be used for planning and conducting the conference. There will be no exceptions."

The proposed change merging the two codes will read: "2. The Junior Conference shall be self-supporting and the current income from the fundraising project and contributions shall be used for planning and conducting the Junior Conference. There will be no exceptions. The Junior Conference Committee will add a line item of \$120
to the Junior Conference budget for the Veronica Spence Americanism Essay Awards for Junior members adhering to rules as outlined in the Department Americanism Code. The Department Junior Activities Chairman will be responsible for the promotion of the conference and all fundraising efforts in support of the conference. 2009." Americanism Code No. 9b -DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: You don't have to read that. JUNIOR ACTIVITIES DIRECTOR VINCENT: Okay. Thank you. Madam Department President, by the motion of the committee I move acceptance of the code.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: We're going to conference for a second. Kim, did you go to finance about the money?

DEPARTMENT ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEMBER MIKESELL: No.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: No? JUNIOR ACTIVITIES DIRECTOR VINCENT: No. (Music playing.)

JUNIOR ACTIVITIES DIRECTOR VINCENT: Excuse me. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Okay. JUNIOR ACTIVITIES DIRECTOR VINCENT: Madam Department President, by direction of the committee I move the acceptance of this code change.

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: They want you to read it again.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Well, I can read it; right? The code change merging the two codes will read: "2. The Junior Conference shall be self-supporting and the current income from the fundraising project and contributions shall be used for planning and conducting the Junior Conference. There will be no exceptions. The Junior Conference Committee will add a line item of \$120 to the Junior Conference budget for the Veronica Spence Americanism Essay Awards for Junior members adhering to rules as outlined in the Department Americanism Code. The Department Junior Activities Chairman will be responsible for the promotion of the conference and all fundraising efforts in support of the conference. 2009."

Is there any discussion?
District 28 PRESIDENT BAKER: Madam President. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Yes. District 28 PRESIDENT BAKER: Susan Baker, District 28. Question. Can only a junior member who attends conference win that award?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: No, it doesn't say that. Any junior member in good standing who's paid the dues. Is there any further discussion?
(No response.)

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: I will now call for the question. Those in favor of the code change? AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Aye. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Those opposed? (No response.)

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Motion carried. Thank you.
(Applause.)
JUNIOR ACTIVITIES DIRECTOR VINCENT: May I give my supplemental award and first place awards?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Yes, please. JUNIOR ACTIVITIES DIRECTOR VINCENT: In keeping with the Master Quilter's theme Creating Relationships Assisting Families Through Service, we completed the year with 24 district reports. The amount of monetary donations raised by stitchers totaled $\$ 2425$ with in-kind donations collected totaling over $\$ 2200$ in toys for children of active duty service -- active duty military families and a total of $\$ 440$ that was donated to Junior Conference.

The amount of volunteer hours reportedly performed by Stitchers was 1,602, including participation from 87 Stitchers. Thirty-nine Stitchers regularly attend meetings.

The Master Sewers were asked to focus their

Stitchers on the Patch Program. It was reported the Stitchers worked extremely hard this year to reach new goals, reportedly earning 27 Red Level patches, 117 Gold Level patches, and 128 Blue Level patches, including one sixth grader who earned the special Junior patch by raising money for the National President's Scholarship Fund. From District 18, Unit 261, Monica Hernandez.
(Applause.)
JUNIOR ACTIVITIES DIRECTOR VINCENT:
Congratulations to all the Stitchers who worked the programs to earn these patches. Knowledge is wealth and I see a patriotic movement growing throughout the Department of California.

Unfortunately I did not receive many of the patch report forms from the Master Sewers to submit for patches, leaving the Stitchers earning zero Red Level, 27 Gold Level, and eight Blue Level, for a total of only 35 patches. These girls work extremely hard throughout the year to earn these patches, so it's very important that you go back to your units and districts and you print those forms out. The District Chairmen need to initial or sign them that these girls have completed and earned these patches. And you can get them to me. I have got to send these forms to the Department, and I will do it by August 1st. So please in 30 days get those forms to me so I can
forward them to National for those girls' patches. With the Million Member goal in mind, I am extremely pleased to say that one Junior group is actively recruiting new Junior members, adding seven new members this year alone with five more in process.

With a goal of attending Junior Conference, Junior members sought donations for Junior Conference opportunity tickets, held bake sales, sold jewelry items, assisted with unit fundraisers and district meetings. And one Junior group revitalized, bringing together old and new faces, elected officers, and planned fundraisers. A Junior Leadership workshop was held in one district by the Department of California Leadership Chairman, while a reorganization took place in another district. There was also a unit expansion of Junior members working together with SAL members.

Various service projects that Junior members participated in included creating and donating gifts to women veterans at the Barstow Veterans Home, the Naomi House, and the West Los Angeles VA. As others hosted veterans from Saticoy Veterans Home for dinner.

For the homeless and needy, Junior members baked goodies and collected and donated clothing and food, also giving food baskets. Additionally, Junior members adopted a veteran's family, donated school supplies to veterans'
children and other children in need, made thank you cards and baked goods that were given to first responders, sent care packages monthly to hurricane survivors in Haiti, distributed scholarships to schools, donated Box Tops, soup labels, and collected tabs, assisted others with technology, and one junior member participated in the Americanism essay contest.

Junior members participated in Veterans Day, Memorial Day, and POW and MIA ceremonies, parades, a USO show, placed flags in cemeteries and throughout their communities, held a flag etiquette class, made poppy posters and projects, participated in the pocket flag program, and shared in Honor Guard detail for Department President Harriet's official visits.

Furthermore, Junior members led the Pledge of Allegiance at the National President's Southern California visit, served dinner during Department President Harriet Clendenin's visit, topping it all off with two junior members walking in a 5 K to benefit the Wounded Heros Fund.

The total amount of Junior Conference tickets sales was \$4,474.

JUNIOR ACTIVITIES DIRECTOR VINCENT: The unit that sold the most Junior Conference tickets was District 25, Richard 0. Reed, Unit 777.
(Applause.)
JUNIOR ACTIVITIES DIRECTOR VINCENT: A huge thank you for all the monetary donations, as well as all the items for the Junior Conference store. The Stitchers loved the variety of items.

I had the unique opportunity to attend the Junior Conference in April. What an enlightening experience to room with six 11- and 12-year-olds. And two of them are here today as pages. And I thank all of the juniors that attended today and are participating with this year's convention.
(Applause.)
JUNIOR ACTIVITIES DIRECTOR VINCENT: There was lots of giggling and face painting going on. The Junior Conference Director Diana Livas tasked all teams to create a skit based on one of the programs of the Auxiliary. Juniors put a lot of thought and effort into their skits and put on an excellent show to assist others in learning by hands-on doing.

Following the skits, Team Americanism passed out pledge cards to stop bullying. Junior members and counselors signed and returned their pledges.

(Applause.)
JUNIOR ACTIVITIES DIRECTOR VINCENT: Three supplementals were forwarded or submitted for National recognition. And I just wanted to -- oh, okay. Let me go here. During the Junior Conference I was proud to conduct the flag retirement ceremony with the assistance of the many Stitchers that attended. In appreciation for this year's hard work, Honorary Department Junior President Maya Novicki, please join me.

JUNIOR ACTIVITIES DIRECTOR VINCENT: Please accept this flag in memory of your Junior Conference.
(Applause.)
JUNIOR ACTIVITIES DIRECTOR VINCENT: When we hold these flag retirements in my community, we always present a school in appreciation for them hosting us, and I just
felt it was very important to honor our Honorary Past -our Honorary Department Junior President, our Department President Harriet, and our Conference Director with those flags.

JUNIOR CONFERENCE CONVENTION REPORT

JUNIOR CONFERENCE DIRECTOR LIVAS: Good afternoon, ladies. Let's hope I don't fumble this up.

I'm very nervous about being up here. The American Legion Auxiliary has the motto of Service, Not Self. This year using this motto as our base, this committee dedicated itself to teaching our Juniors about our organization.

## LEGISLATIVE CONVENTION REPORT

LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN BIGGS: Good afternoon, ladies. The Convention Committee on Legislative met on June 25th, 2015 at 10:30 a.m. in the Sycamore Room at the Ontario Airport Hotel here in Ontario. The statistical report of this chairman appears on page 30 in the Book of Reports. Please look at the numbers. They're amazing and outstanding.

Patricia Galatioto from District 25 was appointed secretary, Pilar Reyes from District 10 was appointed Chaplain and offered prayer, Wendy $0^{\prime}$ Brien from District 6 was appointed Sergeant-At-Arms and led the Pledge of

Allegiance. A total of seven district delegates answered roll call. There was one visitor present.

The committee agreed upon the following report: The code was read with two code changes. Code 2 currently reads: "The Department Chairman may attend the American Legion Auxiliary Washington D.C. conference sponsored by the National Organization if approved by the Department President. The Chairman's expenses cannot exceed the amount budgeted annually to help defray the cost of attending the American Legion Auxiliary Washington D.C. conference. 2013."

If amended will read: "The Department Chairman shall attend the American Legion Auxiliary Washington D.C. Conference sponsored by the National Organization. The Chairman's expenses cannot exceed the amount budgeted annually to help defray the cost of attending the American Legion Auxiliary Washington D.C. Conference."

The rationale is that the NEC Woman is automatically appointed as Legislative Chairman and would be called to the Washington D.C. by the National organization. By direction of the Legislative Committee, I move the acceptance of this code change.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: If amended code 2 will read: "The Department Chairman shall attend the American Legion Auxiliary Washington D.C. Conference

If amended will read: "Legislative Chairmen on all levels shall alert the membership with information and requests of The American Legion as transmitted by The Dispatch and The American Legion Legislative Action Alerts. Legislative Chairmen shall consider these requests of legislative matters a need for Chairmen to act
immediately and shall urge the membership to respond with cards, letters, telephone calls, emails, and social media communications when requested."

The rationale is that The American Legion Legislative Action Alerts are now used on a consistent basis. I don't know of anybody who sends telegrams. They might, but I don't know who they are. And telephone calls are also -- needed to be added as well as social media. We'll move up to this century. By the direction of the Legislative Committee, I move the acceptance of this code change.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: "Legislative Chairmen on all levels shall alert the membership with information and requests of The American Legion as transmitted by The Dispatch and The American Legion Legislative Action Alerts. This Chairman recommended that all District and Unit members with email sign up for The American Legion Legislative Action Alerts. Action Alerts have been proven to work with recent email blasts to legislators that have resulted in approved veteran legislation.

Awards were presented to second and third place Units and Districts with 100 percent reporting citations to Districts 3, 4, 8, 9, 18, 19, 21, and 24. Districts 6, 12, 13, 18, 19, 21, and 27 received a citation for submitting a supplemental report and outstanding participation. Everyone in attendance received a patriotic corsage and button. There being no further business, the Chaplain offered prayer and the meeting was adjourned at 11:00 a.m.

Madam President, may I proceed with my supplemental and my first place awards?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Thank you.
LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN BIGGS: Thank you. And before I go on, I received an email from Dana Nichols, who is our legislative advocate and liaison, and you, ladies, we received a National Alert and it was sent out right
before convention to ask for permanent funding of the Veterans Services Organizations. And guess what? It passed.
(Applause.)
LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN BIGGS: The government signed the $\$ 5.6$ million budget to help the local service officers with direct funding for veterans. So give yourself a big round of applause. You made that happen.
(Applause.)
LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN BIGGS: Madam President, this has truly been an outstanding year of Legislative participation. Your C.R.A.F.T.S. theme of Creating Relationships Assisting Families Through Service to Veterans was really just perfect. All Legislative Chairmen were known as Mosaic, each a different beauty and when crafted together, they make a masterpiece.

I want to thank all of the District and Unit Chairmen for taking time out to report on the activities for veterans. We have many unit members appointed to the National Legislative Council who have direct contact with their state and federal legislators. I sent many emails to our members who in turn used the American Legion Legislative Action Center to easily contact all their representatives. All unit members sent emails, wrote letters, and made phone calls to state legislators with
over 27 bills signed into law that directly affect veterans and active military.

Through our strong support there has been recent temporary funding, which now has passed; I just got the email, and that was for the $\$ 5.6$ million to serve veterans. So we needed that to be permanent and you made it happen.

Members also wrote Congress, the Senate, and the White House. Many unit members report receiving responses from those contacted, including from the White House. One district played a major role in obtaining approval of the National Cemetery in Orange County to accommodate the approximate 14,000 veterans that unfortunately die each year in Los Angeles and Orange County.

A unit in this district had success with another key legislation of the SAV Act or S-A-V Act, HR 203, which was Clay Hunt Suicide Prevention for American Veterans which passed in both the House and the Senate with bipartisan support.

LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN BIGGS: During the congressional Hill Walk at the Washington D.C. conference, Legion priority sheets were passed out while visiting U.S. Senators Feinstein, Boxer, and Congress members. While meeting with Congressman Ruiz, Past National President

Nancy Brown-Park scheduled an appointment to meet with him back in Palm Desert to plan a new homeless veteran initiative. She explained that to you yesterday about what the project says. So we are very proud of our Past National President Nancy Brown-Park. Please give her a big round of applause.
(Applause.)
LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN BIGGS: Nancy was directly responsible for writing and getting the Senate Resolution 506 to Senators Boxer and Feinstein that honors Auxiliaries. This recently passed legislation recognizes and validates the great service our members provide to the many veterans of this country. Thank you, Nancy, for your efforts as National President and bringing attention to all of us. We really appreciate it.
(Applause.)
LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN BIGGS: Senators Boxer and Feinstein also introduced S223 which recently became law which provides grants to Veteran Service Organizations to help homeless veterans transition to permanent housing with household goods. Just think of our VA\&R buddy basket program. It's the same concept. So we led that; right? We led the way.

This year 95 American Legion family members attended the American Legion Legislative Day. I was
unable to attend and I want to thank District 6 Chairman Wendy O'Brien -- thank you, Wendy.
(Applause.)
LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN BIGGS: And District 13
Chairman Joyce McLeod for their reports and photos. Auxiliary members accompanied Legionnaires as they spoke to Senators and Assemblymen/Women about the progresses in California legislation. The speakers discussed the new Sacramento Veterans Village groundbreaking, the new National Cemetery in Monterey, and how Veteran Service Organizations handle over $\$ 1.8$ billion in veteran claims. That's an outstanding number, and we've done a great job.

Our strong American Legion Family Legislative presence at the State Capitol has proven quite successful to address veterans' needs. Our members are always ready to support, advocate, and lead the charge to get the laws that will improve the lives of our nation's veterans.

## VETERANS AFFAIRS \& REHABILITATION CONVENTION REPORT

VA\&R CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: The Convention Committee on VA\&R, or Veterans Affairs \& Rehabilitation, met on June 25th, 2015 in the Juniper Room of the Ontario Airport

Hotel, Ontario, California. The statistical report of this chairman appears on page 34 of the Book of Reports. Gloria Sinopoli, Unit 147, District 20 -- excuse me -District 14 was appointed secretary, Delores Ryan, Unit 26, District 15 offered prayer, and Ruth Hackney, Unit 283, District 24 was appointed Sergeant-At-Arms. A total of 22 district delegates answered roll call. There were eight visitors present.

The committee agreed upon the following report: The code was read and the committee voted on the following changes: Number 1 currently reads: "The Department Veterans Affairs \& Rehabilitation (VA\&R) Chairman oversees and is responsible for all aspects of the VA\&R program and serves as the Hospital and Field Service Director as well as Chairman."

If amended will read: "The Department Veterans and Rehabilitation (VA\&R) Chairman oversees and is responsible for all aspects of the VA\&R Program and serves as the Hospital and Service to Veterans Director as well as Chairman."

All completed sewing sent to representatives by April 15th should be included in her annual report to reach the Department Chairman by May 1st."

If amended will read: "The Department Chairman shall contact Representatives early in the year for a needs list at their particular center. Information shall be issued in bulletin form regarding these needs and the

Units through their District Chairmen are encouraged to provide items to a specific center by contacting the Representative for instructions, directions, and quantity desired. There was a typo there. "Assignments of where gifts are to be sent will be made by the Department Chairman who will evaluate the reports of the representatives and the needs of the Centers."

At the direction of the committee I move to accept these changes.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Okay. If amended will read: "Christmas Gift Shop and Patient Remembrance under the Department direction shall be provided for patients in the VA Medical Center.

Assignments of where gifts are to be sent will be made by the Department Chairman who will evaluate the reports of the representatives and the needs of the Centers."

VA\&R CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: Okay. Then under that code, the Field Service Code No. 3 currently reads: "The Department shall give non-compensated veterans at Veterans Homes of California a monetary gift at Christmas; the amount to conform to Department Chairman's recommendations."

The committee recommends that we delete No. 3. And I'm real sure if -- so you'll have to tell me if I'm not correct. We would like to change it to a totally different No. 3 that will read: "Christmas Gift Shop and Patient Remembrance funds under the Department direction shall provide to the residents at California Veterans Homes a gift at Christmas. Assignment of where gifts are
to be sent will be made by the Department Chairman, who will evaluate the reports of the representatives and the needs of the center."

At the direction of the committee I move to accept this code change.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: The new No. 3 will read: "Christmas Gift Shop and Patient Remembrance funds under the Department direction shall provide to the residents at California Veterans Homes a gift at

Christmas. Assignment of where gifts are to be sent will be made by the Department Chairman, who will evaluate the reports of the representatives and the needs of the center."

Is there any discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: All in favor? AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Aye.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Opposed?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Thank you. Motion carried.

VA\&R CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: Thank you very much.
Certificates for 100 percent reporting, second and third place, and participation awards were handed out in committee. I will post the awards in the office after
first place is presented. With no further business the meeting was adjourned at 10:02.

Madam President, this concludes my committee report. May I continue with my supplemental and first place awards?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Yes, you may.
VA\&R CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: The Master Bakers along with the rest of the American Legion Family have been baking up a storm this year to promote our mission of enhancing the lives of veterans, military, and their families. I'm excited to report that we have had 100 percent in district reporting.
(Applause.)
VA\&R CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: With 17 districts having 100 percent as well. Looks like combining the Home and Field Service hours together into Service to Veterans has helped with making filling out reports easier than ever.

Our Classy Cookies as well as the rest of the Auxiliary Members are doing heartwarming work at the VA Hospitals and outpatient clinics. They along with other volunteers have worked at sponsoring and supporting many different kinds of activities and entertainment for the veterans during the year. Activities such as homeless veterans outreach, Stand Downs, welcome home celebrations, and salute to hospitalized veterans.

One unit donated a blanket warmer at a cost of over $\$ 2500$ to the oncology department at the VA. Sometimes when the veterans are having treatment they become very cold and this machine warms the blankets before the nurses hand them to the patients. Some of the patients have said it is kind of like getting a big hug. There was also lots of entertainment in the VA hospitals and CLC for the veterans such as bingo games, birthday parties, and luncheons. We even had a group provide fishing supplies and licenses so the veterans could enjoy fishing. They have sponsored baby showers, job fairs, and Military Appreciation Days.

There were many parties during the holiday season starting with the 4th of July BBQ, reverse trick or treat for Halloween where our Junior members go to the different facilities and offer treats to the patients and residents. There were parties on Valentine's Day and the "Salute to Hospitalized Veterans." Thanksgiving and Christmas parties were held at all the different facilities, donations of turkeys, hams, and all the goodies that go along them with.

The VA has a program to help homeless veterans into transitional housing. Our members have provided household items such as furniture and bedding to make these houses a home. They have also been happy to assist
with buddy baskets. These baskets are filled with many of the household needs of the veterans and/or family members such as bedding, towels, dishes, cleaning supplies, and gift cards.

Units have adopted the Defenders Lodge at Palo Alto as well as many Fisher Houses in the state, donating money as well as comfort items that are needed for the family members of veterans in the hospital for treatment that live far away from the facility.

Some of our units are not located by a VAMC or military base and have found working with the local County Veterans Service Officers, Veterans Assistance League and Family Readiness Groups is a great way to find out what some of the needs or wishes of our vets are.

Many units throughout the state also assist with bingo, which is the preferred entertainment of many of the veterans in convalescent and state homes as well as at the VA. Our members have worked in the games, providing refreshments, monetary donations, and lots of game prizes.

Local communities have Stand Downs, which is a one- to three-day program to help some homeless veterans get the needed services they have earned. Things like VA benefits, seeing a doctor or a dentist for no cost treatment, employment opportunities, counseling and court services.

Auxiliary members have donated clothing, coats, shoes, socks, and many personal hygiene items. They have spent hundreds of hours setting up camp and cooking meals and other jobs that need to be done to keep the veterans they are working with comfortable for the duration of their stay.

One unit has a special program that is unique to their community. They have a training program for veterans from all over the country coming to learn how to service wind turbines. The unit has helped over 2800 of these veterans and their families with food and other items that were totaling $\$ 8,800$.

Members have supported the Creative Arts Festival locally and nationally and many Fisher Houses throughout the state. We also coordinated with many other groups that support our mission such as the USO, Reins of Hope, Never Forget Our Fallen, Toys For Tots, and Blue and Gold Star Mothers just to name a few.

Units worked with the Honor Flights and Afghans for Veterans programs which send World War II and Korean War veterans to Washington DC to see the memorials. Then when they returned home the veteran receives a homemade afghan to thank them for their service. 289 veterans, at no cost to them, have enjoyed this program, and in the month of May almost 100 Vietnam veterans are going to have
the same privilege.
(Applause.)
VA\&R CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: Auxiliary members have spent hundreds of hours sewing, crocheting and knitting caps, slippers, scarves, stump covers, wheelchair bags and lots and lots of lap robes and blankets. They've cooked and baked goodies to be offered to veterans, whether they are in the hospital or at home. They have showed their patriotism by participating in parades and ceremonies for veterans and Memorial Day. They have decorated cemeteries with flags, crosses, and flowers. They have visited veterans at their homes or in convalescent facilities to let them know they are not forgotten.

Many still support the Ride 2 Recovery program which is a bike ride for Wounded Warriors. They provide food and entertainment at luncheons, dinners, rest stops, and line the streets with flags and banners to cheer on the riders and their escorts.

Many units have worked with organizations like The Blue Star Moms to pack boxes for the troops, filling with them all kinds of goodies to give our deployed service member a little taste of home. Members attended and participated in the Wreaths Across America ceremonies. This ceremony is held in the national VA cemeteries at the same time all over the United States. This is a wonderful
way of remembering our fallen heroes.
They have given out hundreds of backpacks filled with all kinds of goodies as well as gift cards. Dinners were provided to active military and families and lots of baby showers with lots of blankets and goodies for newborns of veterans and active military families. We have a member who offers haircuts once a month to our veterans. Some Juniors that needed a project for school were recruited to help veterans at their homes with gardening and upkeep.

Many participate in a POW/MIA remembrance ceremony, a service to honor POW and MIA and their families. Thousands of dollars in cash and in-kind have been collected for our veterans and families, things to keep them from becoming homeless, like rent, utilities, food, helping get their transportation fixed so they don't lose their jobs. These are just a few of the ways we are supporting veterans. With the large amount of people coming out of the military and so few jobs, we find that this need for assistance is growing.

The Department has received requests to assist 15 veterans so far this year for almost \$13,000. We have had an increase of 52 new regularly scheduled volunteers between April 1st, 2014 and May 31st, 2015. I could go on forever talking about all the wonderful events and
thousands of dollars our members have collected and supplied to complete our mission of enhancing the lives of veterans, military, and their families which I think we are doing a beautiful job. Don't you?
(Applause.)
VA\&R CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: Madam President, this concludes my supplement. May I present my first place awards?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Absolutely.
VA\&R CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: And may I right after that have you -- thank you. Okay.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: I knew what she meant.

VA\&R CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: And by the way, the awards will be in the office, but -- I think I put them in there already. So I know that for the district supplemental, the Best District Supplemental goes to, and please forgive me because I do not have it with me, but it goes to Tami Bell from District 29.
(Applause.)
VA\&R CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: And you'll have to forgive me because I do have a winner for unit supplemental and that award was sent also off to National. And her name was Mary Risner, but forgive me -- District 21.
(Applause.)
VA\&R CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: Okay. And for our award for 500 hours plus for the senior volunteer at the VA hospital goes to District 30, Kim Vincent.
(Applause.)
VA\&R CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: And I have a junior that is over 50 hours -- 50 hours at the VA hospital, and her name is Lala Dooley. Lala, Lala from District 24.

LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN DUVALL: And it was very nice that Susan Baker, District 28, took on the responsibility of coordinating with the District Presidents to assemble
all of the quilt squares. And Geri Fitzpatrick was kind enough to know someone in her district, Vivian Johnson, Unit 807, District 4 who is also a quilter, and she assembled this quilt. So they would like to present this to you, Madam President.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Okay.
LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN DUVALL: And I know that every district wants to get a picture of their square. Each of the squares has the district theme on it.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Thank you very much.

District and Unit Color Bearers, please retire to the back of the room so that the Sergeant-At-Arms and Marshal can prepare for the recessional.

Just a second, ladies. Just a second, ladies. Before we leave, we have one more report, and it is rather important. So will the Constitution \& Bylaws Chairman please come to the podium.

Please be seated, ladies. We're not going to do the recessional today. Ladies, please take your seats. I stand corrected. We will do the recessional tomorrow. We do have to get through this next program. It's very, very important. It's our Constitution \& Bylaws, so --

CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN SOARES: Madam President, at this time I would actually like to ask if
most or all of you did receive a copy of the proposed Constitution \& Bylaws changes when you checked in. For those of you that did not, may I please ask the Sergeant-At-Arms and Marshal to pass out -- or maybe the junior pages, the extra copies that we have.

Raise your hand very high so that they can see you. Okay. They're coming around. They're coming around, ladies. So just give me one minute.

And if Madam President does not mind, I will go ahead and read my report and give my awards while that's happening, if that's okay.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Yes.

CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CONVENTION REPORT

CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN SOARES: The Convention Committee on Constitution \& Bylaws met on June 25th, 2015 in the Sycamore Room of the Ontario Airport Hotel in Ontario, California. The statistical report of this chairman appears on page 27 of the Book of Reports.

Carol Fuqua from District 25 was appointed secretary, Anita Biggs from District 23 offered prayer, and Linda Diebel, District 19, was appointed Sergeant-At-Arms. A total of 19 district delegates answered roll call and there were three visitors present.

The committee agreed upon the following report. The code was read and there were no recommended code changes at this time. We then discussed the proposed Departmental Constitution \& Bylaws changes and the addition of two new Standing Rules. With the housekeeping of some spelling errors and removal of words that did not pertain to California, because this was taken from a National text law and it did not change for content or meaning, all were approved by the committee.

We then opened the floor for Q and A and everyone was satisfied with their answers and we adjourned at approximately 10:15 a.m.

Madam President, may I continue with a short supplemental and my awards?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Yes.
CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN SOARES: Madam Department President, this year, as you are well aware, we had 25 units rewrite their bylaws and 20 amended their bylaws. Actually, that number has grown because I had to bring five sets of bylaws with me to convention including 731's. And we had a couple more units that needed them. And we had one district that also amended their bylaws.

All I can say is the women of California are very crafty indeed. I think I went through every little emoticon on my computer or phone. The happy face, the sad
face, the confused face, and then there were just those moments. You know, the ones that make you say, oh, yay, everything is good. Or, oh, no, this doesn't look good. And then there are those that just make you lean back and say what? Really? OMG. WTH. And then there's the never to be forgotten, "What are they doing?" "Hello, Diane? Can I run something by you?"

I would really like to thank Diane for her work with the proposed changes and for doing all the heavy lifting. And many thanks also to Ruby for revising the Standing Rules.

However, all is not lost. We have some very great women here who do the heavy lifting every day, helping lift new members by making them aware of their Unit Constitution \& Bylaws, Standing Rules, and learning the preamble to the American Legion Auxiliary.

Hollywood Unit 43 has a unique and successful program to help people learn the preamble. They print the preamble on various colors of paper and let the members choose their favorite color. What they have found is by doing this, their members are more likely to look at it at home and bring it back to unit meetings. Their numbers are increasing on memorization because of this technique.

Other units have buddy programs and welcoming packets with all information inside. All in all they are
all on the ball.
Madam Department President, thank you for this appointment. It has truly been a real learning experience for me. This concludes my report. I said I was going to make it short because we have a lot to go through. May I continue with my first place awards?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Please.
CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN SOARES: All awards are posted in the office for 100 percent reporting, second and third -- second and third places. Excuse me. My First Place District Supplemental goes to Carol Fuqua from District 25.
(Applause.)
CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN SOARES: Carol has officially my stamp of approval. My First Place Unit Supplemental goes to Hollywood Post 43, Rebecca Stewart-Wilson, chairman.
(Applause.)
CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN SOARES: And if anyone wants to know about the second and third places and the 100 percent reporting, they are posted in the office.

The proposed Constitution \& Bylaws changes at the Department level. The first nine pages pertain to the separation of duties of the Department Secretary/Treasurer. It allows us to have the option of
separating that position into two separate positions if we want to or if we can. It's a lot of pages and a lot of words and it really doesn't change anything except to define who does what. The Secretary does this, the Treasurer signs the check.

So if I can have the consensus of the delegation, I would like to forego the actual reading of the first nine pages of these changes because they do not really change anything.
(Applause.)
CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN SOARES: I so move.

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: Second. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: It's been moved and seconded to forego the reading of the first nine pages of the Constitution \& Bylaws changes. Is there any discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Hearing none, all in favor?

AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: All opposed? (No response.)

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Motion carried. CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN SOARES: Thank
you.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Thank you. CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN SOARES: Thank you very much. It was a lot. Okay. If you would like to follow along with me, I'm going to start with Article VI, Subsidiary Organizations. Page 9. It's at the bottom of page 8. As it now reads: "Section I. Regulated by the American Legion Auxiliary (Page C-7). Subsidiary organizations in the Department of California shall be the County Councils, and all other groups may be organized under the name and jurisdiction of the Department of California."

Proposed change to read: "Section 1. Regulated by the American Legion Auxiliary. Subsidiary organizations in the Department of California shall be the County Councils, California Girls State Alumnae Foundation and all other groups as may be organized under the name and jurisdiction of the Department of California."

VA\&R CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: This is not what we have.
CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN SOARES: What is different?

NAT'L STRATEGIC PLANNING COMMITTEE MEMBER TAYLOR: Girls State is not on here.

CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN SOARES: I am so sorry. I am on the wrong page. It happens. It happens
to us all. I apologize.
Okay. As it now reads: "Section 1. Regulated by the American Legion Auxiliary. Subsidiary organizations in the Department of California shall be the County Councils and all of the groups as may be organized under the name and jurisdiction of the Department of California."

Proposed change to read: "Section 1. Regulated by the American Legion Auxiliary Subsidiary organizations in the Department of California shall be the County Councils and all other groups as may be organized and listed in the Department Standing Rules under the name and jurisdiction of the Department of California."

I know where the confusion is. The original -- I already know where the confusion is. The original version that went out included the page I was reading previously, and then it was -- it was recommended by National to move that stuff into the Standing Rules instead, and so that's where the confusion is. I think that's where the confusion is.

And so the Girls State Alumnae Foundation will not be in the subsidiary organization anymore. It will go -- well, it is -- it's going to be listed in the Standing Rules. Do I need to read the original and then the change? Are we good?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Yes.
CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN SOARES: Are we good? Okay. Do I have to go down each one by one? I so move the -- this code or this Constitution \& Bylaws change.

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: Second.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Proposed change to read: "Section 1. Regulated by the American Legion Auxiliary Subsidiary organizations in the Department of California shall be the County Councils and all other groups as may be organized and listed in the Department Standing Rules under the name and jurisdiction of the Department of California."

Is there any discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: All in favor?
AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Opposed?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Motion carried.
CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN SOARES: As it now
reads: "Article VI, Section 1A Composition (Page C-8)
Subsidiary organization in the Department of California shall be the County Councils and all other groups as may be organized under the name and jurisdiction of the

Department of California."
Proposed change to read: "Article VI, Section 1A Composition. Subsidiary organization in the Department of California shall be the County Councils and all other groups as may be organized and listed in the Department Standing Rules under the name and jurisdiction of the Department of California."

I so move the adoption of this Constitution \& Bylaws change.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: The proposed change will read: "Article VI, Section 1A Composition. Subsidiary organization in the Department of California shall be the County Councils and all other groups as may be organized and listed in the Department Standing Rules under the name and jurisdiction of the Department of California."

Is there any discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: All in favor?
AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Opposed?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Motion carried.
Thank you.
CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN SOARES:

Originally they were going to have a new Article VI, Section 3 called the Girls State -- California Girls State Alumnae Foundation. That's going into the Standing Rules too. So we're all on the same page, if you can flip to the Standing Rules. 1 through 6 are already the Department's Standing Rules.

So with the change we would be adding a No. 7: "All subsidiary organizations must follow the following rules -- the following rules in keeping with required uniformity under U.S. trademark law. A, all officers, directors, trustees, et cetera, must be named by the department, usually nominated by the subsidiary organization and confirmed by the governing body" -- oh, "board. And confirmed by the governing board. I think I need reading classes. B, all vacancies in the subsidiary organization must be filled by the department in the same manner. C, the subsidiary must report to the department (the parent organization) no less frequently than monthly. The reporting must included the subsidiary's financial reports. If the subsidiary did not meet in a particular month it must still report to the department in writing that it did not meet, and still must report the month's financial statements. 7D, the department treasurer must be a signatory on all accounts of the subsidiary. E, the articles" -- if you remember when I was reading my report,

I said that we took out words that did not pertain to California. And it might say like "financial board" or "financial officer," something like that. It doesn't really -- we kind of made it uniform for our department, and these copies were all made days before convention.
"7E, the" -- now you are going to find some scratched out words here, but trust me it doesn't change one iota of what it actually means. "The articles of incorporation, bylaws, and all amendments of a subsidiary organization must be approved by the department. If a subsidiary organization is currently operating and its articles of incorporation or bylaws have not been approved by the Department Executive Committee, then the department should take action immediately to ensure that the subsidiary's governing documents are received for the Department Executive Committee's review and approval. Likewise, the Department Executive Committee must approve all officers and directors of the subsidiary and any members serving on a subsidiary committee or committees. Number 8, California Girls State Alumnae Foundation is a subsidiary organization of the American Legion Auxiliary, Department of California."

I move the adoption of these two new Standing Rules.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: "All subsidiary
organizations must follow the following rules in keeping with required uniformity under U.S. trademark law. A, all officers, directors, trustees, et cetera, must be named by the department, usually nominated by the subsidiary organization and confirmed by the governing board. B, all vacancies in the subsidiary organization must be filled by the department in the same manner. C, the subsidiary must report to the department (the parent organization) no less frequently than monthly. The reporting must included the subsidiary's financial reports. If the subsidiary did not meet in a particular month it must still report to the department in writing that it did not meet, and still must report the month's financial statements. 7D, the department treasurer must be a signatory on all accounts of the subsidiary. E, the articles of incorporation, bylaws, and all amendments of a subsidiary organization must be approved by the department. If a subsidiary organization is currently operating and its articles of incorporation or bylaws have not been approved by the Department Executive Committee, then the department should take action immediately to ensure that the subsidiary's governing documents are received for the Department Executive Committee's review and approval. Likewise, the Department Executive Committee must approve all officers and directors of the subsidiary and any members serving on
a subsidiary committees. Number 8, California Girls State Alumnae Foundation is a subsidiary organization of the American Legion Auxiliary, Department of California." Is there any discussion?

DISTRICT 24 MEMBER SQUIRES: I have a question. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Please go to the microphone. If you can speak up.

DISTRICT 24 MEMBER SQUIRES: Yes, Madam
President. Laloni Squires, Unit 43, District 24. I don't understand E, and if I am going to vote for something I need to understand it. So could you explain to me in laymen's terms what E means?

CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN SOARES: What it means is that we need to have proof of their incorporation or their governing documents which is like their Constitution \& Bylaws and who is their -- you know, their -- what am I trying to say? Their officers and things like that. But we need to have proof of that.

DISTRICT 24 MEMBER SQUIRES: Who is they?
CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN SOARES: They is the Girls State. Well, it's any subsidiary organization, and right now we only have one which is the Girls State Alumnae Foundation. In the past it might have been 840, it might have been, you know, some other group, but right now we have one subsidiary organization and that is the

Girls State Alumnae Foundation.
But what this does is it protects the American Legion Auxiliary so that we don't let them run off and do willy-nilly whatever they want while they're under our umbrella.

DISTRICT 24 MEMBER SQUIRES: So it's specifically
Girls State. Is that what you're talking about?
CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN SOARES: No. It's the Girls State Alumnae Foundation, which is a fundraising organization that helps girls that want to go to Girls State or -- it helps the Girls State program. It's not about the program itself. And that is -- it is confusing. This has nothing to do with the Girls State program. It has only to do with the foundation that helps us raise money for Girls State.

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS:
Basically what this is doing, these are -- our trademark law Items A through E cover all subsidiary organizations and what they need to do to meet our guidelines to be a subsidiary organization under the American Legion Auxiliary. And we must include their bylaws. We must include their governing documents. And it just stipulates -- this is something that should have been done when Girls State Alumnae was done. It was neglected and now we're back to doing it again. But Item No. 8 lists the first
subsidiary organization, but 7A through E is governing documents for all subsidiary organizations.

DISTRICT 24 MEMBER SQUIRES: Which would include any in the future?

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: Yes.
DISTRICT 24 MEMBER SQUIRES: Great. Thank you very much.

CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN SOARES: Are there any other questions?

District 28 MEMBER TOMLIN: Yes. Elizabeth Tomlin, District 28, Unit 22. My question is if you move the Girls State Foundation into this area in the Standing Rules and then you have all the requirements, have they met any of these requirements? I just want clarification. Does the foundation know that they have these requirements?

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: Once these items are approved by the delegation, the Alumnae will receive a letter with a copy of these changes and ask them to provide the documentation that is requested in this document.

District 28 MEMBER TOMLIN: So so far they haven't?

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: Well, I think -- so I think Nancy Brown-Park sits on the board and
so yes, indirectly they do know it's coming and they agree that it should be done. They know that it needs to be done.

District 28 MEMBER TOMLIN: Thank you.
DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: It's really protecting our trademark and our Auxiliary emblem.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Are there any other questions? Of course.

EDUCATION CHAIRMAN TAYLOR: Rosalie Taylor, District 14.

CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN SOARES: Give me a break, Rosalie. Go away.

EDUCATION CHAIRMAN TAYLOR: I just have a very simple question. When these are written up and presented on the website, are they going to be presented as read or as what was given out here on the floor? The wording is what I'm asking about because the handout that we've got is so --

CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN SOARES: They will be as I read them.

EDUCATION CHAIRMAN TAYLOR: Okay. So what we've got here is not --

CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN SOARES: Right. We changed a little bit of the wording in committee.

EDUCATION CHAIRMAN TAYLOR: Okay. Thank you.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Is there any further discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Hearing none, let's vote. All in favor?

AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Opposed?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Motion carried.
CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN SOARES: Thank you, Madam President. That concludes everything for Constitution \& Bylaws.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: I hope to see you all at the banquet tonight. No host cocktails will be at 6:00 p.m., dinner at 7:00. This session is in recess until 4:00 a.m. Oh, there's -- I thought I would just see if you are still awake.

Actually, Ruby has some notices.
DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: No, I'm not going to do it. Ways \& Means will be selling raffle tickets and 50/50 tickets until 8:30 a.m. tomorrow. Ladies, get your tickets. You can't win if you don't buy.

All flower orders scheduled for pick up have been sent to your rooms by the front desk.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Any Juniors at a quarter to 6:00, they can meet in the lobby and we'll get them where they need to go.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: Thank you. DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: Thank you.
