NATIONAL EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE CONVENTION REPORT

NEC CHAIR CLENDENIN: Good morning, Madam

confidentiality which were passed. These issues don't
directly affect the departments, but there were three I
would like to share with you today.

One -- sorry. One is titled renew priority and intensify efforts with the American Legion to obtain American Legion Auxiliary federal charter. Many of us, including myself, had thought we were already congressionally chartered, and I am sorry to say that is not the case. While it is true what we do matters and does get reported to Congress, these reports go through the American Legion.

The other significant resolution is in regards to our strategic plan. The original wording of goal number one is to achieve one million members. That has been reworded to enhance membership strength. That seems easier to achieve and not nearly as scary.

The third is to intensify efforts with the American Legion to resolve IRS issues that negatively impact posts and units. While we have great support in California, Ruby, that isn't always the case.

While in Washington D.C. I had the opportunity to go to three offices of California congressmen who are on the VA subcommittee. While all three of the VA reps were in meetings, I have been able to communicate with them personally since returning about issues that directly affect our veterans. Also I was able to meet with my own congressman's staff members and have built quite a relationship with them.

I had been asked by National President Sharon to make sure the California congressmen on the VA subcommittee of which there were five were visited while in D.C. And thankfully Past National President Nancy Brown-Park lives in one congressman's district and Western Divisional Vice President Linda Workman lives in the district of another. Thank you to Nancy and Linda for helping me touch base with these members.

I look forward to going to National Convention in August and to see the new friends I have made and to finish out my year as NEC. Thank you again for allowing me to represent you all on the national level as NEC.

And I'll share with you one more thing. If you ever go to Washington D.C., contact your senator or congressman and set up a tour. Very worthwhile and more one on one. Also take more than three days to see the city.

Thank you again and, Madam President, that concludes my report.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT TOZIER: Thank you. It's kind of nice. This is the President's report.

The veteran families have busy lives. How can we get them interested? How can we reach them? District 12 participated in the butterfly festival. Some contacted joint members to renew their membership.

All other organizations are having the same problem. Don't be afraid to try something new.

I watched 200 motorcycles on their Christmas toy run in Marysville. And last, but not least, bringing five pounds of apricots on an airplane. Janeen Thomas, Imelda Cruz and myself want to thank the members for all the courtesies and cooperation you've extended and given to us throughout the year. It's hard to believe that in January both have been working for you and the Department three years and in September will be three years that I have served as the Department Secretary/Treasurer.

There are two other volunteer employees that have done a tremendous job for the past three years, and they are Terry Mikesell and Pilar Reyes.

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: Terry and Pilar, please stand. Where are you?

(Applause.)

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: Thank you for always being there and doing what you can whenever called. I view both of you as Tony the Tigers. You're great. Thanks to the help of these ladies, the Department hasn't paid any overtime nor had to hire any additional help during peak workloads for the past three years.

(Applause.)

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: They have saved this Department a tremendous amount of time and money. Thank you, Terry and Pilar. You are truly great.

ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEMBER REYES: You're very welcome.

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: There have been other volunteers that help. Lorraine Sullivan, Tammy Manini, Robin Falkenberg, and Diane DeLashmit even drove all the way to San Francisco and stayed four to five days to help. Thank you, ladies.

There are 30 additional Tony the Tigers that deserve recognition and appreciation, and they are the district presidents. I have relied on them throughout the year for many things and they followed through like champions. Thank you for all your help and an outstanding job. It has been a pleasure working with each of you.

There is one above all others that has gone above and beyond for this organization, and that is my husband, Art.

(Applause.)

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: A great big debt, deep gratitude and loads of love for all his support and always being there.

(Applause.)

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: The Department now has 161 units, 15 districts, and six units with two logons that are signed up as live units or units that have signed up to have access to their unit membership information on the National ALA Management Information System. From all the feedback that I have received, all love it and feel it is a very valuable membership tool. All live units are asked to go into the unit leaders tab and list all the newly elected officers and chairmen for your units.

It is also -- it is also a great time saver and benefit for the Department of California if all live units enter all new members into the ALA MIS system. Please print a receipt and send in with your membership. This saves the Department a lot of time posting dues into the system. If any unit or district is not signed up, it is very simple to sign up. Simply send an email to the Department Secretary/Treasurer requesting your unit be signed up, giving the name and good email of the member who will be serving as the point of contact, and then you pay \$10 fee per logon annually in September. And, oh, by the way, this fee has been added to the bottom of the Department donation form to make it easy to send in fees when you send your donations to Department.

Paying dues online was initiated this year and as of this writing, 624 members from 174 out of 258 units paid their dues online. A list of all the dues paid online is posted and updated weekly on the website under membership and is sorted by unit numbers. Live units can obtain a list of all their members that have paid online any time they want just by logging into the ALA MIS system and going to unit reports and clicking on paid dues online, and it will give you a complete listing of everybody in your unit that has paid online.

As far as the Department is concerned, getting the unit portion of their dues to them for members paying online hasn't been a tremendous burden and sending credit memos to those units whose portion is less than \$10 is working out real well and more cost effective than cutting checks. I do hope it is working well for the units, and if anyone is having any problems, please don't hesitate to contact me.

Next year of the 2016-'17 membership year, members will no longer have to pay dues to the old unit if they are delinquent in their dues before they can $\frac{1}{2} \int_{-\infty}^{\infty} \frac{1}{2} \left(\frac{1}{2} \int_{-\infty}^{\infty} \frac{1}{2} \left(\frac{$

transfer. This is going to be a change in the new handbook that's coming out. So a member that wants to transfer can pay any unit they want to. They do not have to pay the one that they belong to because they're not going there. And the reason for this is a lot of members don't want to pay the old unit, but we're losing members so the national organization decided this. It was redone, and so henceforth a member can pay whatever unit they want.

Renewals for 2016-'17 can be sent to Department starting in July, however, new members for the 2016-'17 membership year will not be accepted until September 1st. If you do not want a new member processed for 2016, this is new members only, do not send them to Department until or after September 1st. And the reason for this is National -- as long as we post members in before two thousand -- I mean before September 2016, they are still working on their membership year through the end of August. And if we at the Department level post your members dues before September 1st, a new member, they will be counted for 2016, not 2017.

SENIOR FINANCE COMMITTEE MEMBER MIKESELL: Ruby, that includes adding them into ALA MIS before September 1st. So if they add them in before September 1st --

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: Right. And if you're an ALA MIS unit, live unit, don't even add them into the system until after September 1st. Because when you add them into the MIS system, it puts those members over there in pending and you don't want to do that. So renewals you can start sending in July, no problem at all. New members, remember September 1st. Do nothing before September 1st.

Okay. District Presidents can pick up their 2016-'17 membership cards for all units in their district in the Department convention office. Please make sure that it's distributed to all units. And we're going to designate the time because Terry Mikesell is going to volunteer to help me get these cards distributed, so you can see me at lunch.

SENIOR FINANCE COMMITTEE MEMBER MIKESELL: Lunch tomorrow.

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: Starting at lunch tomorrow. If you don't know -- does everybody know where the office is? No? Okay. It's upstairs on the second floor. Get out of the elevator, turn left, meander around, and it's right around there. It's easy to find.

After elections on Saturday, national delegates and alternates can pick up their packets in the convention department office. Please note that there is time

sensitive information in these packets. Deadline for reservations is July 22nd, 2016. Reservations for the States Dinner must be in no later than July 29th or the price increases. Hotel reservations and checks for the commander's banquet tickets are to be sent directly to the Legion in Sanger, and all other reservations for States Dinner, guest badges, and alternate badges and checks are to be sent to the Department office in San Francisco.

So that's a Legion -- if you're going to National and you want -- normally the housing is reserved by the American Legion. You would put your housing reservation directly to the Legion giving them the credit card and then you pay for your Commander's Banquet to the Legion. Those are the only two things that go to Sanger. Everything else comes to San Francisco and made payable to the ALA Department of California.

In working with the Department Chaplain Susan Baker this year and the Chaplain's death list with the list of deceased members from the National ALA management information system, it was discovered that approximately 90 members who passed on are still in the national membership database. A membership database is only as good as the information in it and it's vital that information be kept up-to-date and current.

The only way to get these members removed from the database is by sending a member data form to Department. Sending in two forms, the death notice to the District and the Department Chaplain and a member data form to Department has for many years been very confusing for units, and I am very pleased that Department Chaplain introduced a code change in her committee meeting reducing death notification to one form, eliminating the chaplain's death notice and sending in only the member data form. We hope that you will support this change.

The Department Chaplain will work with the department office to provide whatever copy is needed by the Department Chaplain so that she can fulfill the requirements of her job to provide her at the district level, whatever information you need for your memorial ceremony.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT TOZIER: Ruby, I need to leave to go to the Legion. Will the Sergeant-at-Arms and Marshal go with me? Would you please come to the stage and escort me. Wendy, I need you to come. I get to runaway.

(Processional.)

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: For the past couple of years the cost of charms for the President's Club has increased to \$10. And finding a company to make the President's Club charms has been a

challenge, to say the least. Because the Department President's pin is so detailed, when it is reduced to fit the size of a charm, it is so small it's hard to see what it is.

This year we had to make a change with little time to do it, so an administrative decision was made to order a key chain because we couldn't get a charm. In the future the Department President is going to have to look at what is available and choose the gift of her choice to be given to all the members of the President's Club. The key chain is absolutely beautiful and think everyone will like it. It has little places for little charms.

For all of you who normally sign up for the President's Club and have forgotten or haven't had a chance to do so, I do -- Karen Munch at Ways & Means has the forms and I do have the cards here which will be presented later on at Madam President's luncheon. So you do have time to sign up. See Karen Munch and she also -- if you want to look at the charm, Karen has that available so that you can look at them.

As we've gotten more and more into the electronic world, more and more questions arise as to electronic voting. As quoted from an email from the ALA National Secretary, "The ALA Department of California's and Unit's bylaws or business practices need to conform to the e-voting requirements/permissions as provided in state law governing organizations incorporated in the State of California. Most states have laws regarding how annual meetings, notice requirements, and business must be conducted by corporations headquartered in that state. Usually that government office is the Secretary of State or whatever state office oversees state corporation filings."

If the State of California has no applicable laws re e-voting for state corporation, then the subject of electronic voting would be governed by Robert's Rules.

Now you know California has laws. In California we've got a lot of -- a law for everything. California of course does have laws. Under Section 5211(b) of the Nonprofit Corporation Law, a board can take action outside of a duly held meeting only if all directors consent to the action in writing. I'm not going into that. It's a -- but I just wanted to make you aware it exists because there are questions out there by units. This applies to nonprofit public benefit, mutual benefit, and even religious corporations.

There's only one exception to the unanimity requirement for written consent: When a board is approving a transaction involving a conflict of interest or a transaction where it shares one or more directors

with the counterparty, for public benefit corporation, Section 5233 and 5234 respectfully, the interested or common directors do not need to be counted and the consent can be unanimous without their input. That's only a conflict of interest.

Anyway, there have been a lot of questions and you need to know that these laws -- we are a corporation and we are required as a nonprofit to operate under California's corporate laws. And the Secretary of State, there's a lot of it on the Internet. If you need more information on it, dig into it. And I'm sure that the direction of the Department will change in the future about how this is handled, but that's all I'm going to highlight at this point.

The Department annual audit was completed and distributed by email to all Department Executive Committee members. The 2015 Convention Book of Proceedings is finally done and will be distributed or in some cases has already been distributed to those who ordered or are designated to receive them. I'd like to thank Terry Mikesell for getting the copies made and bringing them with her to convention.

Taxes. I believe the majority of our units and districts are doing really well, but there are still a few with lots of problems. Units do not need -- units do need to make sure they have their own Employer Identification Number. Do not use the post EIN. This will get you in more trouble than you'll ever know. IRS has been attaching Auxiliary unit's bank accounts or billing them to the tune of four, \$5,000 because the unit or post are using the same EIN. In some cases the post is using the Auxiliary's EIN. So be careful. Make sure your unit is separate from that post.

And I will tell you another thing that's really If that post closed and your unit stays alive, scary. they're coming after you for whatever bills that post owed. A grieving widow. So anyway, they're serious. They're not going to let up. They don't want us unincorporated units. We're nonprofit. We're a headache. Too many of them to the IRS, so they're not going to make it easy for us. So you just make sure -- and make sure that your officers -- find out where your minutes are, your tax records are kept and passed on. Because don't put it in the hands of somebody who's going to get mad, quit the Auxiliary, and take them with her. Because you're going to have a mess on your hands trying to recreate all those records. It can be done. It is not going to be easy. So anyway, guard safe your unit. Units are going to be hearing more and more about the Auxiliary's strategic plan that all the departments

are working, and one goal that I would like to see adopted by members in the units is goal number two, enhancing a culture of goodwill.

(Applause.)

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: I truly believe that once this goal is achieved, all other goals of the strategic plan will fall into place. You will hear more about these plans and how they will work when the committee gives their report, but the reason for my comments is I wanted to share with each of you that the one part of this job that bothered me most and very disheartening were the numerous calls received from either units or members in our department experiencing personality conflicts or unkind treatment.

I challenge each of you to pledge and make a commitment of creating a culture of goodwill with everyone you come in contact with, and especially with our members and in our units and our district. Let's be the best that we can be and step up to the challenge of making our units, districts, and Department a place every member is proud to say they belong.

RESOLUTIONS CHAIRMAN FERCHO: Bravo. (Applause.)

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: One last reminder. For all donations to National, please fill out -- please, National -- there is a National donation form, and any time you send money to National you must fill out that form. And send the money with that form directly to National. Do not send your checks payable to ALA Department of California when it's for AEF because we don't have a department AEF account. Those are all donations directed to National. But even on the National donation form there are two ways that you have to make those checks. Some of those donations are going to the foundation and some are going to ALA National headquarters.

Treasurers, you have to be careful. You have to look at the form, put your -- the amount of money you're donating and send the form directly to National headquarters. If you would like to send the department a copy of the form, that's fine, but we really don't need a copy and I think I'm going to remove that on the National form because we can always get the information directly from National if we need to know how much has been donated in different areas. So it may be less confusing, believe me.

I've got checks made out to ALA Department of California, and then I have to turn around and either deposit them and rewrite a check to the Department of California or endorse them on the back to say payable to

ALA National headquarters or the foundation depending on what the donation is for.

But if you could do that, that will save the bookkeeper a lot of headaches. Because she can't endorse them. I can endorse them, but I don't work in the office every day. I usually go up like every two weeks.

With that, Madam President, it has been a challenging year, but always a pleasure serving this great department. Have a super convention.

(Applause.)

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Thank you so much, Ruby. Okay. And now we're going to have the Chaplain Susan Baker give her report.

CHAPLAIN CONVENTION REPORT

DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN BAKER: Okay. Madam Vice President, Madam President, the convention committee on chaplains met on June 23rd, 2016 in Room 2008 of the Fresno Convention Center, Fresno, California.

The statistical report of this chairman appears on page 23 in the Book of Reports. Carol Fuqua, District 25, Unit 777 was appointed secretary; Geri Johnston, District -- I'm sorry. District 21, Unit 53 offered prayer; and Connie Raya, District 28, Unit 694 was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 26 district delegates answered roll call. There were eight visitors present.

The committee agreed upon the following report. The code was read and the following change to code number 2 was approved by the committee. The present code reads: "The chaplain will forward each month a listing of deceased members. Copies to be forwarded to the Department Office, Editor, and a courtesy copy to the Department President."

The committee voted to amend code 2 to read as follows: "The chaplain will request a list of deceased members from the Department Office each month for posting to the Department website. A courtesy copy will be shared with the Department President."

The rationale for this is currently two forms must be filled out by units -- okay. Let me start again. Currently two forms must be filled out by units for deceased members: the member data form and the death notice. Since this is not only confusing for units and the same objective can be accomplished by eliminating the chaplain's death notice and filling out only one form, which must be filled out anyway, the member data form, and submitting it to the department office. The department office already makes these changes to get deceased members

Page 23 off the mailing list and into the ALA management intranet system, which has the capability of outputting a report in 3 whatever format is needed, and that report will show all 4 deceased members for whatever date you want. 5 By adopting this change there will be less 6 confusion, less work, less paper, and less posting all 7 around by units and the Department Chaplain. Another unit chaplain and members created a Wall of Honor at their post home, complete with pictures of all deceased members.

Another district chaplain implemented a project called Grace With Meals. Prayers for various occasions were gathered, some were modified to suit different occasions. The prayers were then printed on table tent cards and used for all major holidays and POW/MIA day. The cards were sold for \$1 each and the money is deposited into a district In Loving Tribute Fund which allows the chaplain -- the chaplain is being tested. Are you live? Are you live?

The prayers were then printed on table tent cards and used for all major holidays and POW/MIA Day. The cards are sold for \$1 each and the money is deposited into a district In Loving Tribute Fund which allows the chaplain to make In Loving Tribute donations on behalf of the district.

And yet another district chaplain honored the memory of the 14 lives lost in the San Bernardino California massacre last December at her district meeting. A single white candle was lighted and the chaplain shared with members a prayer that had recently been printed in her local newspaper to honor the victims and those who were wounded that day. As you can see we chaplains serve in very diverse ways.

Our chaplains have spent hundreds of hours visiting with the homebound, elderly members and veterans. We've made uncountable visits to VA hospitals, Fisher House facilities, and nursing homes that house veterans.

We've sung carols at hospitals and senior centers and presided at memorial service and Draping the Charter ceremonies for deceased members. Many of us have attended funeral services, spent countless hours with grieving families, offered prayers and provided caring words, thoughts, and hugs to those in need.

We have visited hospitalized members, sat with families in hospital waiting rooms while a loved one underwent a surgery and we have witnessed firsthand the pain of suffering and the finality of death. We have attended vigils, viewings at funeral homes and we've shared joyous laughter on happier occasions and cried with grieving families. And yet, we chaplains still manage to go carry on wherever and whenever needed. Our abiding faith in God and community somehow sees us through.

Madam President, thank you for this appointment. It has been my honor to serve as your Chaplain this year. This concludes my report.

PARLIAMENTARIAN CONVENTION REPORT

PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: Good morning, Madam President Susie. Another year has come and gone and the pages of the Farmers' Almanac are tattered and torn for being used so much. Even though California is in a drought, there has been no shortage of weeds in our garden. In fact, I think we have had a bumper crop of requests for advice and solutions to numerous situations. Each year seems to get worse for problems within our units

and districts. Many are common problems from previous years and others seem to be quite unique.

A major concern is a lack of leadership and knowledge of our relationship with the American Legion. We need to provide more education on who we are and what we do. New members don't automatically become well versed in the Auxiliary when they sign an application. It takes years of attending conventions, workshops, unit and district meetings as you take in a little information at a time.

More seasoned members need to mentor newer members or there will be no one to take over when the older members or more seasoned members are no longer with us. Holding the same positions for years on end is not helping your unit or your district.

PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: There were many requests concerning a lack of officers and how to proceed. Do we offer to them help and really mean it? So many times I get, oh, I'm available, and when they have a question, no one is there to help. Invite them to attend workshops. And I know this is a daunting task. Getting them there is not easy. The ones that need it the most don't avail themselves of the opportunity. Often we are preaching to the choir. A lot of the answers are found in the unit bylaws. I recommend that the bylaws be studied perhaps one article at each meeting.

It was suggested that a Parliamentarian Corner be added to our website. I received many remarks in favor and many shared how they were using it. There were five articles submitted, and I confess I sort of fizzled out the last few months. I will continue to do this next year, however, I need your questions that are of interest to you so please submit those inquiries.

Kudos to 5th Area Commander Ed Grimsley for his remarks at his last meeting of June 12th. He began by holding an Auxiliary charter and stating that during his travels he encountered many problems with relationships between the two organizations. He told his assembly that the Auxiliary has their own charter and programs that enhance the Legion's. Some posts feel the Auxiliary does nothing for them, however the Auxiliary's many hours of service are recorded and that reflects on the Legion. He emphasized that the Auxiliary volunteers receive no pay and many of the Legionnaires receive a stipend for what they do. It was great to have a Legionnaire speak to his members on our behalf.

promoting the nurses scholarship through donations and providing schools with applications. Thank you for increasing your donations this year. There were several very deserving submissions. Four scholarships were awarded.

The units sought out homeless women veterans living on the street and provided them with food, clothing, and personal items. Units recruited volunteers to seek out veterans in parks, on the streets, and under bridges, provided help and referrals to service. The units were very generous providing women -- or providing numerous items for Naomi House, which is a transition home for homeless women on the West LA Hospital grounds.

One unit and district participates in the Vet Hunter Project in their area. The units assisted women veterans at stand downs with personal care items, referrals to services, closing, sleeping bags, blankets and gift cards. Baby showers were hosted for those pregnant veterans. Hospitals were visited with special gifts and cards for women veterans.

One unit hosted a day spa for women veterans with personal care take home gifts, along with a special luncheon. Certificates, lunches, dinners and tea were hosted for women veterans.

Speaking of signing up new women veterans as members, one unit signed up 28 women veterans.

attending the District 21 workshop. I presented the same information that I had at the Clovis workshop. I was unable to attend the 2015 ALA Girls State directors conference. I want to thank the alumni foundation for offering to pay for my flight and hotel stay while at the conference.

I also attended a planning meeting up in the Sacramento area for the counseling staff. In October we had our deadline for reservations. When they were received, I would email or call the unit chairman and cc the district chairman to confirm that I had received the reservation and to confirm the number of spots reserved for. We ended up having over 550 reservations sent in this year.

I also implemented a new Google sheet called the reservation sheet where one can check up on their status by viewing it online. We also held our Girls State committee meeting at my house in Grand Terrace. I updated the committee and district chairmen regarding our recommendations for the budget, code changes, and packet changes.

November and December was spent trying to verify our location for the 2016 session. I kept in touch with the district chairmen via email, updating them when I could. Many district chairmen would send emails to their unit chairmen and cc me on the correspondence. I really appreciated the hard work that they did during this time. Session dates and location was confirmed at the end of December.

In January I released all the forms required for the 2016 session. This included the online application, signature packet, and unit information packet. I participated with my mom's unit to inform potential candidates at the high school I teach at about the program. I began receiving online applications mid-January from girls. I sent my required midyear report to Western Division Chairman. I attended DEC and met with the Girls State committee prior to DEC starting.

Upon agreement from the committee, director, and chief counselors, we decided to increase the Girls State size to accommodate 540 delegates by having two meal times. I updated everyone on this during the DEC conference. I was excited to only have 14 schools left on the waiting list.

February, unit and district end of year forms were updated and sent in the February mail out. I quickly began to realize that the girls would hit "submit" multiple times on their online application and I would need to fix the multiple entries.

In March our deadline was fast approaching. I

continued to log information into the reservation sheet as quickly as I could. I received hundreds of online applications, signature packets, transmittals, and photos both via email and snail mail. By mid-March we no longer had schools on the waiting list. The deadline for submission of online applications was March 15th. Transmittals and signature packets were due to me March 31st and fees due to the department on March 31st.

In April I sent out a PowerPoint presentation that the district chairmen could use at their teas. We also had a working weekend in La Quinta for our planning session as the counseling staff. I was also invited to attend four district teas. I was able to attend two of those from District 21 and 25. End of the year reports started coming in and I was working on finishing up the current reservation list with all delegate information received.

In May end of the year forms continued to arrive. I sent out Samsung information to the delegates that were eligible to apply. I was invited to another three teas this month and was able to attend two of them in District 22 and District 18. Mid month I submitted an annual report to the Western Division Chairman. I also submitted my report for convention. I worked on the financial spreadsheet to make sure all units had paid their appropriate fees. At the end of the month I scored my first online Samsung scholarship.

This June I sent out legislation information to the girls on how to submit legislation. I began to prepare for the convention and make any changes from delegates dropping out.

Overall we currently have 523 delegates -- 522 now -- attending this session. It's an increase of 34 girls from last year.

(Applause.)

GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN KIRKLAND: We received \$4,807 in donations from units. I have had 69 reservations dropped from the list with two already -- actually it's three now -- with three already paying for delegates and not having any alternates to attend. We have had 18 delegates drop out and counting. Ten matching grants were awarded by the Girls State Alumni Foundation for a total of \$2,000.

Madam President, at this point I would like to present three special awards. And a list of all awards given at committee meeting has been provided. My first award goes to the unit that sponsored the most delegates. I want to thank Unit 161 in District 9 and their chairman, Vicky Bean, for continuing to support the Girls State program. This year they are sending 17 delegates under

Page 46 the chairmanship. (Applause.) 3 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN KIRKLAND: In each gift they 4 receive -- I'll say that at the end. My next award goes 5 to the district chairman with the best district supplemental. This year I have chosen Ann McCauley from 6 7 District 12. Her district supplemental included information regarding their honor nights, orientation 8 9 luncheon, and fundraiser luncheon. 10 (Applause.) 11 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN KIRKLAND: And my final 12 award goes to the unit chairman with an outstanding unit 13 supplemental. This unit chairman not only consistently 14 updates with me emails, but continues to go over and 15 beyond by organizing a bus for girls to attend the 16 session. Ann Kelley, unit chairman for Unit 83 in 17 District 12. 18 (Applause.) 19 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN KIRKLAND: She also provided 20 tons of newspaper clippings in her report. Thank you. And each of them receive a pot with morning glories that 22 they can grow. Thank you for helping our girls bloom. 23 (Applause.) 24 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN KIRKLAND: The last thing 25 I'm going to do is introduce my committee. They were a patchwork of races, religions, shapes, and sizes. They were a diverse group of young women leaders who somehow became a cohesive group and worked to create a fantastic Girls State.

If I botch the name, I'm sorry. Taylor Goethe from District 20, Unit 311 was elected our 2015 governor. (Applause.)

GIRLS STATE DIRECTOR ENRIGHT: The outstanding citizen of Girls State was Aria Schwartz from District 5, Unit 179.

(Applause.)

GIRLS STATE DIRECTOR ENRIGHT: Emily Demsetz from District 16, Unit 741 and Emma Farr from District 9, Unit 161 were selected to represent California as senators at Girls Nation in Washington D.C.

(Applause.)

GIRLS STATE DIRECTOR ENRIGHT: And they both made us proud. And also Emma will be attending the Naval Academy and leaves in a few weeks. In addition, our own Kendall Madsen served on staff.

As many of you know, online registration was implemented for alternates and delegates. This year we were able to place more documents within the online application process and cut the paper handling down to two signature pages. We still have a few kinks to work out and they will be handled. Keeping in contact with delegates was made simple because we had immediate direct access to them and their parents through email. Hopefully we can further streamline the process even more in the years to come and work to make the paperwork side of Girls State less cumbersome for everybody.

Thank you to all the unit and district Girls State chairmen who were very consciousness and read and followed the directions made available to them. We really appreciate all your hard work in helping this program be a success. Please continue to keep in touch with your delegates and invite them to be part of your activities. Invite them to your unit meetings at Girls State so all of your members become aware of the impression our program and our organization has made on them. Now I want to say a special thank you to Elissa and our chief counselor Becky Grace without whose help I would not have been able to accomplish so much. Also to Val for a great procedure book which helped guide me along the way.

And last thank you, Madam Department President Susie, for this appointment. I had forgotten what it was like to work a full-time job. And to all of you out there, are you from Girls State?

And of course the walk, run, roll number, there was seven reported.

(Processional.)

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT TOZIER: Hi, Scott. We finally get to meet after several phone calls.

MR. STUMP: Absolutely. Madam President, officers, ladies, what a welcome. I always love to come to the Auxiliary because there's a little bit of a difference in the energy level. Have you noticed that, anybody?

(Applause.)

MR. STUMP: I mean, you've got music, you've got costumes. I mean, you guys are having fun. My name is Scott Stump. I'm from Waynesville, South Carolina, and I'm the president and CEO of the National Desert Storm War Memorial Association.

And I want to start off real briefly, I have to ask for forgiveness for something real quickly. Every time I go across the country and do presentations, I always have a suit, coat, and a tie. And I've managed in the two days I've been in California, I've managed to have a wardrobe malfunction and my trousers are in San Clemente. I'm here and I didn't find out about it until Pismo Beach when it was too late. So my apologies. I'm a little more casual than I like to be. Thank you. Thank you for understanding.

(Applause.)

MR. STUMP: I want to start out real briefly, if you all just think back real quickly to about almost 26 years ago. And if anybody does not have a 26-year long memory, I apologize, but I'm also really jealous. But think back to when a gentleman invaded the country that both of us had never heard of that gentleman. We couldn't find the country on the map. Of course we're talking about Saddam Hussein back in 1990, August of 1990. And of course that led to the events that unfolded that we now know as Operation Desert Shield and Desert Storm.

And a lot of people forget what a big deal that was back then. They forget that there were tens of thousands of body bags that left unfilled by the grace of God that we didn't have to use, compared to how many there were. There were many people around the world too that were saying that America was washed up. Remember how we couldn't do it and this was an Army and they were just going to slaughter us; we were done.

And I was in the Marine Corp at that point and served over the country as a crewman. Thank you. But a lot of people have forgotten and Desert Storm has been

relegated to a footnote in history. And this effort has been started, it's in its sixth year now, to create a war memorial. And there's many reasons why this memorial is needed, and I just want to highlight the top three very briefly.

First and foremost, we have 380 Americans, 383 Americans that made the ultimate sacrifice, 15 of them being woman. I don't know if anybody was aware of that, but 15 ladies passed away in Operation Desert Storm. Their memory cannot be forgotten, their sacrifice cannot be forgotten. We need to remember them.

We also need to remember the service of the over 600,000 who were deployed. Twenty years from now, 50 years from now Americans need to member that sacrifice of Americans from the very beginning of our country and its founding.

Secondly, we liberated the country Kuwait. And I know what some of you are thinking. I used to think it myself. Well, that's kind of neat, it's kind of quaint, it's kind of nice, but it really was a big deal. And if anybody doesn't think it was important and a big deal, I'll refer you to a young friend of mine from the Kuwaiti embassy in Washington, Guy named Silvan Ohad. Silvan has the sensation of having two births certificates from two different countries. Ever heard of anything like that? He was born in August of 1990 -- I'm sorry. It was actually September of 1990, so he has an Iraqi birth certificate and a Kuwaiti birth certificate.

But liberating Kuwait was really a big deal and changed or altered not just our history, but world history. It really was very important. And I will add also that we added the coalition of 34 countries. Anybody remember that? Thirty-four countries came together and really at its core did the right thing. We can't even get 34 states to agree and we had 34 countries who came together that did something remarkable.

(Applause.)

MR. STUMP: And last, but in no way least, Operation Desert Storm was a turning point in our country's history, a very big turning point. You see our citizens finally realized what a terrible mistake it was the way we had treated our Vietnam veterans. It was despicable. I served with some of those folks.

(Applause.)

MR. STUMP: I served with some of those folks, and some of the stories that they had were just incredible. You know, I just can't even imagine. I hope that none of your loved ones or hopefully none of you experienced that firsthand, but it was a very big turning point. And I really believe that if we would not have

learned that lesson back in 1991, I don't think our folks who had been deployed on the War on Terror since 2001, I don't think they would be treated with the level of dignity and respect that they absolute deserve for learning those lessons back in 1991.

And I'll say one other thing about the Vietnam connection, and there are many, but the other thing people will say is sometimes they'll say, Scott, you know, the reason why Desert Storm was such a resounding and rapid success is because the Iraqis were so bad. Anybody heard of ISIS? They weren't that bad. I believe that we were that good. We were that good because all of our leaders were Vietnam veterans and they were not going to let what happened the first time around happen to us.

(Applause.)

MR. STUMP: And I just want to give them the credit publicly that they deserve as I always do. I'm able to speak to you today because of that leadership and the guidance that I get from the Vietnam veterans.

So where are we in the process now. Well, as I mentioned, this started in December of 2010, so almost six years ago. We've made a lot of progress. We actually are down to the top two locations for the memorial in Washington D.C. Some people say why in Washington D.C. Well, 20 million people a year go there. It's very important. It's a focal point of all of our past wars and this fits in with everything else that has happened. It helps to tell that story. It's very important.

We have those two locations. We have just been granted the area one designation, which means they will be right there among everything else. So we're very happy with that. I just wanted to humbly and sincerely -- was that me? Okay. I was going to start marching.

But here's where you all come into play. I would like to humbly and sincerely ask you, we need your help and we need your help because in order to continue this process with the site, engineering costs, everything in Washington D.C. including salaries of our congressmen and women which are overinflated -- you ever notice that? But we won't go over that road, but everything is expensive. But we are in the need to raise \$800,000 by the end of the year to continue this process with the site selection and engineering so we can make this happen.

This is not a long-run process. In fact, our goal, what we're shooting for is to have this memorial up and dedicated, done within two years, three years at the most. And I would just like to humbly ask your help. Maybe it's at a post level. Maybe it's at a district level. Maybe it's at a department level. However you want to help us, we would sincerely appreciate to ask the

posts to deliberate. We need to build this memorial and to get this done and move on. Because it's already been 25 years. The time is now. This is the right time and I'd just like to ask you for your help in making this happen.

I'm going to be around. I'm spending the night here in Fresno. I've never been here. I've never been in this area. I'm going to be here. I do have some information with me. If anybody sees me, I'll have that with me. I've got business cards, points of contact. We have a website, www.nationaldesertstormwarmemorial.org or you can just do the acronym ndswm.org. If you see me, feel free to stop me. I've got cards and information and we can see how we can involve you and get you all involved anyway you see fit.

I just want to first and foremost thank you in advance for your consideration and for considering, you know, partnering with us. Thank you very much for your attention. It's really an honor, ladies, it really is. And thank you so much. God bless you.

Harriet has put together this presentation. There's only a few slides. And you do need to remember that San Francisco is already set up and Sanger is not. They are not going to make that area for us unless we decide to move there, and it is at that time that they will make that space available.

NEC CHAIR CLENDENIN: Yes, I'm ready now. Can everybody hear me? Okay. Thank you. I want to start by letting you know that you can go to the Auxiliary website and on the bottom of the page is this PowerPoint presentation. I understand that some of you in the far reaches may not see it as well. We want everybody to see it.

The idea when we put this together is to give you a visualization. Personally I need that. I like to see what I'm talking about, so this is what we did.

First place we went to was San Francisco. Go ahead. This highlights to just show the space as best as we could. And this is the membership office and the clerk's office -- yeah, membership and Department Secretary. Could you turn the lights down too, please?

As you can see in the back wall we have some memorabilia things and there are two enclosed offices. The secretary uses the one on the left and the president uses the one on the right. Okay. This one I wanted to show you some of the things that we have that would have to be moved: display case, mirrors, cabinets, desks, et cetera.

This is the floor plan. The one on the left is the space that we're using and the one on the right is the space of the whole floor with our portion highlighted.

This is going to be a little bit tricky. This is the Memo of Understanding between the War Memorial Commission and us. These are things that we talked about. For example, I'll give you an example. The War Memorial Building can allow patriotic organizations to use the space for a donation. Okay? The American Legion Auxiliary falls into that category. And space is built to suit. The ALA has space on the third floor and it is approximately 1300 square feet.

The War Memorial complex consists of the Davies Symphony Hall, the War Memorial upper building, and the War Memorial veterans building for veterans organizations. All three are owned by the City and County of San Francisco and are managed by a mayor-appointed War Memorial board of trustees. Excuse me.

The San Francisco post of the American Legion, collectively District 8, are a beneficiary of the Legion War Memorial Commission and is the standing committee of District 8 with the sale -- wait. Sole chart of managing the Legion space within the veterans building. The ALWMC

does not have a seat on the board of directors and the trustees do not sit on the commission.

 This terminology is important, but it's also confusing. Since the board of trustees is actually a city commission and the ALWMC is actually a district committee, at this time other than a donation there are no other expenses such as utilities, landscaping, et cetera. All other expenses such as copier, Internet, and phone are paid by the ALA.

There are conference rooms that can hold as many as 200 or small ones that will hold 20 which can be reserved if needed at no additional cost. There is 24-hour security and an employee may enter the premises at any time. There are seven assigned parking spaces shared with all ten veterans organizations. Should the ALA to move out, space is not guaranteed and the new patriotic organizations will they have to pay for utilities and service charges if the board of trustee policies stands up.

Now we'll talk about Sanger. What we tried to accomplish with this picture is to give you a sense of what 600 square feet is. The one at the end in front of the safe, vault, if anybody's been there you know what I'm talking about, that's the 600 feet. Now the cabinets and the counters and all that stuff would be removed.

ADVISORY COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BIGGS: When your face goes, take the microphone.

NEC CHAIR CLENDENIN: Okay. This is the outside of the Sanger building to the American Legion, the flags, and all the parking spaces. Okay. This is again a floor plan. Where is it? Right. Okay. Right around there is the 600 -- okay. The Sanger building will allow the American Legion Auxiliary 600 feet of space next to the conference room. The space needs to be built out to include an enclosed office. This will allow us to comfortably set in two desks or cubicles. And the American Legion has two poles. We can do something similar to those.

The ALA space will have a door on two sides with some privacy since the area behind has a printer and workspace that can be used by us as well. There will be no rent, however, we are asked to pay somewhere between one-quarter and one-third of utilities, pruning services, and gardening. Copy, phone, and Internet expenses may be piggybacked with the TAL. However, we do have contracts for our copiers which we may continue until the length of its service.

There is a -- hello? Okay. There is a conference room that can hold as many as 80 or an office that may be utilized should we not -- should we need a

much smaller space. Any employee may enter at any time and will be given the alarm code. There are 56 parking spaces on the premises with free parking on the street. General office hours are 8:30 to 4:30, Monday through Friday. The TAL will need to build out the space to accommodate, and the soonest as we may be able to move in is spring of 2017.

PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: Are you finished? NEC CHAIR CLENDENIN: I'm done.

PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: So now if you want to look at your sheets, I would suggest we put them side by side and that's kind of what we're going to go over.

Now I don't know if we have to go over every single item on this. We will point out some of the bigger ones because some are minor little things. Okay. I told you about the first line on the San Francisco, so we'll start with footage. At San Francisco we have 1300 square feet. I don't know if she mentioned it. That lunchroom is shared by the people that will be next to us. At this point it's vacant.

At Sanger it's 600 feet. There is a little bit more as far as the front from the foyer for the display cabinets. The next thing is -- okay. The rent. She's already talked about rent. At the present time there is no rent. We don't anticipate any rent at San Francisco, but we are giving them \$200 a month donation. At Sanger, the -- let's see.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT TOZIER: Can we ask them to turn the lights back up? Thank you.

PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: There is no rent at Sanger, but they do expect us to pay parts of the utilities and some maintenance things, from one-third to —— I'm sorry. From one-quarter to one-third of the utilities. And it's going to be based on 750 feet even though we only have 600 feet because they're including our share of the conference rooms whenever we need them.

Okay. Both facilities we're able to access 24/7. And even though the office hours are 8:30 to 4:00, we have access. So if we want our hours to be different, that would be okay. Let's see. I'm going to have to turn around so I can see this. Right now we have four -- we have three employees really. One's not an employee; it's a volunteer. We have two employees and the volunteer secretary-treasurer and the Legion has seven. But we could have up to four space-wise.

At San Francisco as far as getting the employee pool, I know in the past we have had some schools that have helped us with getting people there to work. At Sanger I'm told that the employees in that area often are not year-round, they work seasonal. There are more

seasonal employees and they would like to have year-round employment.

And at this time the Legion has had some people come to work there that were given their credentials in various areas and they need to have experience in order to get a job. So I know of one that came to, quote, work there without pay to get the experience to put on their resume. And then we have the colleges there that like to work with them, and we probably do -- okay. I did want to say when I looked at the pay scales, some of them say under \$10, but I think we all know that law is going into effect that we have to give \$10 an hour for pay and eventually it will be 15. So when you look at -- there's a couple on the Sanger side that are under \$10, and with the job titles and what their hourly wage is and what their annual wage is, annual wages are full-time employees, and at the present time I believe we have one full-time and one part-time.

So if you want to look at those and look at the differences, the salaries in the system are in some cases much higher, but it's based on their experience level. You can look at those in your spare time.

At one point it was sort of suggested that the Legion be part of the hiring board. They didn't really call it that, but they wanted everybody to be compatible. They wanted to make sure that the employees could be compatible. When we went back and talked to them, the hiring practice, I was told, is strictly by the Auxiliary. And if they move to Sanger, there may be training requirements because my perception is that the employees we now have working in San Francisco are probably not going to go to Sanger, so that means we would have to hire new people.

They do have -- I told you they do not want us to move in until spring of 2017, and that is -- they are not going to start to renovate that area that we would be occupying until we say yes, we're moving or no, we're not. And so they wanted to do all the infrastructure before we move in. That's the length of tables for phones and all of that. And that makes sense. They don't want us to be there to put all of that in, so we're looking at the spring of 2017.

For the move, the cost of the move. The cost of the move when we went to San Francisco was \$462.60. We received an estimate for move to Sanger to be \$3,558.70. Now the reason for that is we can't possibly move everything that's in the San Francisco office to Sanger because it won't fit. Now there's things that don't fit in San Francisco also, but they're already there so —because it really is limited space.

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I have listed down here the inventory that we took of things that would have to be moved. Remodeling expense is kind of up in the air because it depends on whether or not we're going to reuse the desks and the things that we have or if we want it to look like the Legion side. The Legion side is not using desks and all of that. We have beautiful old desks, but they have converted theirs to cubicles like you see in many offices. And they're about this high. They are higher -- I think they're five feet, which I guess would be about this high. I can't look over them, and that's a good thing. actually they purchased -- I believe I'll say used from other places, but they looked great. They did not look used. Okay. So the cost on those they estimated was \$1,000 a cubicle. And so they put down 3,000, so that's the cost.

Cost of equipment at Sanger. They want us to -- actually, they're not pressuring us, but they would like for us to share equipment. So that's going to have to be another decision. By sharing, of course, it won't take up as much space and there are ways you can do that. You put in a code and you know how much paper the Legion used and how much the Auxiliary used. So you can do that.

If we want our own things there, then we have to make sure we have room for them and hook them up. And yes, we still have contracts with the copiers and with the stamp machine and they're still for two years. Of course by then it would be down to about one year. And they said they renegotiated their contracts and it was -- it was easier. It was less costly.

Let's see. What else do we have here? All right. We can utilize the same phone system. If we choose to have our own, of course we're going to have to pay for that. Let's see. They suggested a shared employee for a receptionist. I'm not sure we need a receptionist, but that was offered to us. There would be one enclosed office for the Secretary-Treasurer and it would be in the area where the vault -- just outside of the vault. I think maybe we should be inside of the vault, but -- but anyway, and then we just close the door.

Let's see. Harriet told us about the conference room, 80 occupancy. And actually it's Bill Siler's office now. That would hold eight. There are 56 parking spaces. Two are handicapped with street parking.

San Francisco, as she told you, there are seven spaces for ten veterans organizations and there is metered parking on the street. I don't want to jump around too much, but you can read all of those statistics.

When we checked on the area crime rate, well, I went on the website and San Francisco, to be honest, I

really couldn't tell because it's color coded and some of the colors ran together. It was really hard to see what a medium red was to a darker red. So I'm going to say it was average -- no, not average. High, but it could be very high, but I put down just high.

Sanger came up with an average -- I'm sorry what? That's just the average crime rate, you know. People want to know is this a city that's crime free. Well, there's very few of those. I'm not sure if there is any. They're saying that the average, the crime rate in Sanger is average. I have to say that would be for that size community. San Francisco is high. And that was just something that came up, would we have to walk over homeless to get here and there, and so I thought, okay, that's a concern of somebody's, so, okay, I checked that out.

There is room at Sanger for cabinets. We have a beautiful cabinet in San Francisco. The PDP pictures are up on the wall and we have very nice display cases for them. They're older in nature that I would almost say they're antiques. Very — they're very nice and they hold many things. Hold pins, things that belonged to many of ours Past Department Presidents.

DELEGATE MEMBER: Question. Can we -DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT TOZIER: We will have a
question and answer period after Diane is finished.

PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: Let's see. Then there is a place in Sanger across the windows in our area will be -- they would fit up there. They're above the windows. And I asked if we could have more space and they said we could put the other memorabilia in the foyer, which for me is a nice place to put it because everybody who comes in would see it. I don't think we're going to have as much space as we have currently now at San Francisco.

Some extra costs -- I'm not sure I have the papers in the right order. The normal things that go with it, employees are going to be the same. I was checking as far as tax things and such, but we're all in the State of California so all of those are going to be the same. And the City of San Francisco has some extra things in their policies, but basically those are going to remain the same. We have no costs at San Francisco for maintenance or any of those things. You know, if the plumbing goes out and air conditioning, we have no -- no extra costs there.

In Sanger they said that they would like us to pay one-fourth to one-third of maintenance. Well, we have to kind of figure out what they're talking about, so I said if the air-conditioner goes out and we have to get

somebody, do you expect us to pay for that? Well, we first were told probably a quarter of it, and the last time I talked, well, we probably would pick that up. But that was their answer, we probably would pick that up. Probably.

Okay. And by the way, we have a Memorandum of Understanding from San Francisco. We have asked for one from Sanger. To my knowledge we don't have one yet. Okay. So yes, I did write down one -- actually, I should have written it the other way in these copies. It should be one-fourth to one-third, not one-third to one-fourth.

And it's kind of funny because the poor receptionist, I don't know what his name is, but they said he's the receptionist, but he also does the janitorial work. And he may do the lawns too. So he might be our maintenance person too. I'm not sure.

And then we come to -- okay. So what happens if the Commander changes? Will things change for us too with whoever comes in? And they said no. The Commander does not come in and change things from one Commander to the other. But that is why we wanted to have a Memorandum of Understanding so this is what we had agreed upon. And even though it's not a contract, it's in writing. But we have discussed our expectations on that. At San Francisco they have issued a Memorandum of Understanding.

So I think I'm down to the last. Did I miss something that was really important? Okay. So that's a rough idea of the two locations. So I guess at this point, Madam President --

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT TOZIER: Okay. If you have any questions, please come to the microphone to talk on the subject. Two minutes. You have two minutes.

PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: Three.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT TOZIER: Oh, Diane is giving you three.

Some of -- some of the things that were asked of us or given to us, remember it's -- it's -- really Auxiliary isn't into Legion business, and so things like that we did not feel like we could really address. So you're going to have to take -- figure that out. That's why you're going to have

First of all, I wanted to state because I was in the apartment business, 600 square feet is about the size of an average side one-bedroom apartment, if that helps people get a mental picture of what we're talking about. 1300 square feet is the size of many three-bedroom apartments. So just to kind of -- because most of us are not very spacial.

DISTRICT 19 DELEGATE FARRIS: And what is the -- oh, I remember. The person coming in, I thought he was the manager. I don't know who he was came in last year and addressed us. He told us we were going to get the whole second floor, and now we're back to 600 square feet.

PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: I don't think so. DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: 1300 feet is what we have.

DISTRICT 19 DELEGATE FARRIS: I made notes.
PARLIAMENTARIAN DELASHMIT: The man that came to
talk to us last year was from San Francisco. I don't
think we had anybody here from Sanger. And the old
upstairs of Sanger is not very big. It's not the whole
building, it's just a portion of it.

DISTRICT 19 DELEGATE FARRIS: Okay. Maybe I misunderstood. If we get into the situation where we're sharing -- we're sharing a printer with the Legion, who decide who gets to use it when?

PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: Good question, good question. And that is one of the issues that we perhaps want to use our own.

DISTRICT 19 DELEGATE FARRIS: And how -- what is the total square feet of the first floor?

PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: The first floor?
DISTRICT 19 DELEGATE FARRIS: The floor we would be on in Sanger.

PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: What is the total footage? Well, I was told that 600 feet is the same work area space that their employees have. Now I have a little

question about that because one thing that we have to have on our side is a walkway that is wide enough for wheelchairs. It's an ADA thing. I don't know if that was included in our 600 feet. So maybe we would have to 5 design the office to be the -- probably would be whatever 6 we decided to do, a table or cubicles, would have to be up 7 against the wall and where the windows are and out. 8 Because then we would have to allow that walkway or path 9 or whatever you want to call it and then have the file 10 cabinets or whatever on the other wall. But somewhere in there we would have to allow for a certain width for ADA. 11 DISTRICT 19 DELEGATE FARRIS: One last question. 12 13 Does anyone know why the Legion chose to move to Sanger in 14 a falling down bank building? 15 PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: I can't tell you 16 that. I just know for years and years I've 17 heard about the Legion trying to find property in mid 18 California so that it was not all the way up north and --I mean, it really isn't all the way up north. There's a 19 20 whole lot of land past San Francisco. And I've heard that 21 for years and years and I guess they just did it. 22 DISTRICT 19 DELEGATE FARRIS: Thank you, Diane, and thank you to the whole committee for all the work you 23 24 put in. 25 (Applause.) 26 DISTRICT 21 DELEGATE VONDRA: Yes, I'm Leslie 27 Vondra from Unit 519, District 21. My first question is 28 how much of that 1300 square feet do we actually use in 29 San Francisco? 30 PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: All of it. 31 DISTRICT 21 DELEGATE VONDRA: All of it. 32 PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: It's a little more 33 spacious. I mean, they do have quite a bit of room to walk around. They're able to have -- we have a table that 35 probably seats about eight right there in the main office 36 so if you want to have a short meeting that doesn't need 37 the privacy and things, we have that table. Plus the two offices and a huge table in the lunchroom that we're using 38 39 right now because we're not sharing that lunchroom with 40 anybody until somebody moves in next door. 41 DISTRICT 21 DELEGATE VONDRA: My other question 42 is when the Legion decided they were going to move to 43 Sanger and thought about the Auxiliary moving with them, 44 did they not think that we would need more space than 600 45 square feet? And what would be the main benefit for us? 46 Why do they want us to move in that building with them? 47 What would be the benefit to them? 48 PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: I think it's the 49 perception of a Legion Family. I think they want us to be together as a -- you know, in San Francisco to -- until we

moved -- until we moved last year, the Legion and Auxiliary were right next to each other. I don't know how much actual communication went on because I didn't work there, but they were right next to each other. This way we would be separated so I -- I think they -- and I shouldn't say what I think, but I think they just assumed we're part of them and that we would go with them.

You know, and I'm not saying this about any particular person, but there's a lot of misconceptions about our relationship. I think many of us experience that in our local areas where they think they kind of control us or --

(Applause.)

PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: You know.

DISTRICT 21 DELEGATE VONDRA: You see, that is why I was asking. Because since the Auxiliary is a separate entity, what benefit do we have by moving into Sanger?

PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: I think we would have to use that -- you're going to have to figure that out.

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: Diane, I just wanted to add one comment that these -- the membership is not aware of. At the War Memorial Commission, we have storage space allocated in the basement that we're storing a lot of stuff down there as well. So not only do we have 1300, we have probably another 600 feet down there for storage.

(Applause.)

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: And to go back to the question that was asked, I don't think the Legion really talked to us about moving before they did it. It was something they did for the Legion and it was an afterthought of how the Auxiliary was going to handle it.

(Applause.)

PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: Let's see. I think maybe you're next.

DISTRICT 9 PRESIDENT RIOS: Dolly Rios, District 9. What happened to last year they talked about the Legion moving to Sanger and also the Riders moving there. What happened there?

PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: I did ask that question when they were up there and they said not at this time. Maybe they're waiting for us to make the decision. Maybe if we don't use it, that's going to be for them. But that's what they told me, not at this time.

DISTRICT 23 DELEGATE MOORE: Sharon Moore, 23rd District, Unit 252. Ruby kind of answered my question, but, Ruby, this is to you. The staff there at San

DISTRICT 22 PRESIDENT KOCHUR: Okay. Thank you. PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT SPARKS: Beverly Sparks, District 25. I haven't been involved in the last few years, but it seems to me there are way too many questions that need to be answered. Because our group up here of three have a list of advantages and disadvantages of this move. Too many ifs. I can't imagine 600 square feet with storage and 15 cabinets and desks and cubicle walls. I mean, you're going to be in a closet. So, sorry, I know the Legion and family is very important, but, boy, you get two families that are fighting over space, I don't know what you're going to have at that point.

(Applause.)

PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: That's why we wrote this up the way we did, issue by issue for you to figure out yourself what are the advantages and the disadvantages. We — the three of us are not trying to convince you to go to one place or another. You take these things and you figure out, okay, this is an advantage, this is a disadvantage. So you work it out and whatever you think is the best place to be for the Auxiliary, that's — that's the way you need to vote.

DISTRICT 19 DELEGATE NEEBLE: Linda Neeble, 19th District. I just have a question. I understand the building was originally a bank and that there is a vault in that building. Is that vault on our side of the building and is considered as part of our 600 feet? Thank you.

PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: Well, the vault is about 600 feet. It's huge. I want to say there's three rooms in the vault. They're not big rooms, but enough to -- I mean, you have three separate little whatever areas. So, no, that -- it is on our side of the room, but no, it's not part of the 600 feet.

NEC CHAIR CLENDENIN: The vault -- actually where the vault door is is the beginning of our 600 feet. Then it goes this way. Does that help?

While I have the mic I wanted to be sure that you

people know that when we started talking about our trip and doing this fact finding, we are trying very, very, very hard to compare apples to apples and not apples to grapes. So that's why you have two pieces of paper with the same questions.

DISTRICT 25 PRESIDENT DURON: Tamra Duron, District 25. First off I would like to ask, this MOU that we have from San Francisco, is it dated -- is it for 50 years, a hundred years? Because I have an MOU with my union, it's negotiable and it can be changed. So are we guaranteed this MOU for a certain amount of period?

PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: I don't think so. It was -- I mean, it will be dated as to whenever it will be effective. There is no ending date. We have had not a contract, but -- I don't know if we had a written Memorandum of Understanding, but it was 1931 and we have been there since then and this is now 2016. So we're talking about 85 years or so. I have pretty much an understanding that -- and even though we've been there that long, the Auxiliary hasn't paid a dime all of those years because we were really part of the Legion and the Legion paid the donation. So we had not had any conflict there in over 80 years. I don't anticipate any now.

DISTRICT 25 PRESIDENT DURON: Okay. I'd also like to say that there's been a lot of comments what was the Legion thinking, why did the Legion do this. We can't speak for the Legion. If we'd like to know those answers, we need to go to the Legion and ask them.

PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: Correct.

DISTRICT 25 PRESIDENT DURON: Also I'd like to state that I work for a school district and we can take 600 square feet and put six to eight employees there and work efficiently and effectively. Square footage does not effect the quality of work that we do. Thank you.

(Applause.)

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: Well, I you have liked you to have been there on 13th when we had three people in 900 square feet and it was not pleasant.

Madam Department President, I was just told by one of our members that stage is approximately 800 feet. What you're standing on is 800 square feet.

PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: That looks about

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: Okay.
What I would like to let everyone know is when we were at

13th Street, I shared an office with Bill Siler and with MJ, his secretary. We had three phones in that room. We could not -- either one was talking too loud, one couldn't hear. If you had a private conversation, you had to go

outside in the hallway because the Auxiliary does have

business that the Legion doesn't need to know. And the same way vice versa.

(Applause.)

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: We have a beautiful facility in San Francisco. I myself can think of family, yes, family is good, but my family is from New York. You have family in other places and we operate and work together as a family no matter where we're at. We don't have to be under the same roof.

(Applause.)

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: We don't have that much interaction with American Legion when we're sharing offices with them. We do our own thing, they do their own things, and we intermingle when we need to. And we work cooperatively together, but I can tell you when the Legion decided to move, we had no place to go because they could not take us at Sanger. I went to the War Memorial Commission. I said would you accept -- could we come back to the War Memorial Commission, not knowing about the Legion that they would even allow us there. They took us under their wing and they have taken care of us ever since for almost three years.

(Applause.)

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: I've been thinking nothing but downside moving to Sanger, no upsides. I have -- the War Memorial Commission, I have a parking spot. I have a key. We share when I'm not in the office the keys. We have a key.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT TOZIER: Okay. Ladies, these are the last three that we have because it's almost 5:00 o'clock. It's 4:58.

DISTRICT 24 DELEGATE ARTIS: Madam Chairman, at first I wanted to piggyback on the evils about the -- I want to piggyback on the -- well, first I'm Deloris Artis, District 24. I was just at the Sanger building about two months ago for the Junior Conference and in there I saw that there was a small -- there was an office that the Legionnaires has that was a closed-in office. If we're talking about that there was going to be a small office for the Auxiliary, where do you plan on putting this small office? Because I'm seeing that 600 square space and I don't see where you can put the enclosed office there.

And then with that vault being there, who's sharing that vault? That vault is going to be storage space that's going to be Auxiliary and the Legionnaires. And then you look at the acoustics. I retired from a cubicle office where three of us shared an office space in this cubicle space that we had and it was a little closed-in office, but as I said, when we really needed to handle business, when it was something that myself as a

legislative analyst for the State of California that I did not want the Los Angeles County person hearing, I had to take private calls somewhere else. So -- because the acoustics of the cubical, everybody heard.

So you have to look at the fact of this that in that small space like in this big open arena that you're in right now, the acoustics bounce all over the place.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT TOZIER: Okay. We need to move on. Sorry. Okay.

DISTRICT 24 DELEGATE ARTIS: I just want you to look at the fact you'll have acoustics problem and you have the --

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT TOZIER: All right. Linda Workman.

PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: Just a second. Let me add to that. The vault is the Legion's. It's up to us to design how we want our 600 feet. They're not dictating to us how it has to be. We —— they suggested that the enclosed office would be —— it would be in that corner where the vault is and the east wall that it would be kind of piggyback to that —— not piggyback, but say this is the building, it would be in that corner. So one part of the wall would be the vault. The other wall would be the outside wall on the other side. So then it would just be two sides that would actually be the enclosed secretary's office and it's on the opposite side of where the Legion's offices is. And it could be a little smaller than that, than the Legion's. Okay. Linda?

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Linda Fercho, Past Department President, District 16, Unit 741. First I want to thank you very much, very, very much for all your hard work in bringing both sides together and giving us a very good --

(Applause.)

RESOLUTIONS CHAIRMAN FERCHO: -- cross-reference on this. And I want to thank Ruby and that whole staff in San Francisco who have pulled us through amazing things.

My question is this. We have been looking at trying to find a secretary/treasurer. Ruby's been advertising for years and we have not been able to find that or have not employed anyone in San Francisco.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Hey, I didn't do anything wrong. You didn't have to hit me.

 $$\operatorname{\textsc{DEPARTMENT}}$$ PRESIDENT TOZIER: Well, you were going to get smashed.

RESOLUTIONS CHAIRMAN FERCHO: If anything was to happen in San Francisco, how hard is it going to be to find someone to replace them should anything happen. Second of all, I do know that in Sanger that the Legion when they did interview, there was many, many, many

qualified candidates.

I think we kind of have to look at change is uncomfortable. It's inevitable. And make sure that when we make the decision, we can continue staffing for a long period of time. And hopefully we can get even more staffing in San Francisco. Thank you.

PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: Okay. This is our last speaker. Linda, you have brought up an excellent point. We all know that we had a relative secretary for three years and we certainly appreciate that and do not know what we would have done without her.

(Applause.)

PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: We have had difficulty filling the position and I too have heard there's all kinds of people in the Sanger area that would jump at working there.

There was something else I was going to say about that. Also the wages have a lot to do with it. If we look at the pay scales, the amount of pay at Sanger and many areas is considered way less than what it is in San Francisco. This is one of those things you need to weigh advantages, disadvantages. So yeah, that's where that's at.

PUBLIC RELATIONS CHAIRMAN COOLEY-DESMEULES: Hi. My name is Jean Cooley-Desmeules from District 19
Hawthornes. I don't know how many have been to the National office. You're all wanting us together.
National is in two separate buildings about five miles away from each other. Okay. They work together hand in hand even though they are in separate buildings. Okay.

My number two question, Ruby just said that we have 600 feet down in the basement of nothing but storage. Our size of building what we're going to get of that building which is long and narrow because I was there is 600 feet, what are we going to do with this extra storage? We're going to have to rent storage off site which is an extra additional cost.

PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: It may not be off site. It might be in the parking area. We have -- in Sanger there's 56 parking spots. Presently the Legion has seven employees.

So yes, you're right, we would have -- if we're going to keep that stuff, whatever that stuff is I don't know.

SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: Records.

PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: We would have to probably rent some storage area, whether we go, you know, to a like a public storage thing or if we have our own storage, we would probably be on site.

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: I just
