Importantly, and 44 as I've said before, please keep your cell phones off. 45 We will now have Rules Chairman Glenda Schultz 46 read the convention rules. 47 48 READING OF CONVENTION RULES 49 50 CONVENTION RULES CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: Good morning,

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1 Madam President Wendy. At this time I will present the 2 convention rules. The convention rules can be found on 3 page 10 of the Book of Reports. Madam President Wendy, this chairman will 4 5 hesitate after each rule so if there is a question or an 6 amendment, that may be presented at that time. 7 Number 1: All meetings of the convention shall 8 be called to order at the designated times or soon 9 thereafter as a quorum is present. 10 Number 2: A quorum shall exist when one-third of 11 the Units in good standing are partially or wholly 12 represented by duly elected delegates or alternates. 13 (Article IV, Section 5, Department Constitution.) 14 Number 3: The audience shall remain seated 15 during the business of the convention. The Department 16 President shall designate certain doors to accommodate 17 delegates who find it necessary to enter or leave the 18 convention hall during reports of committees or when a 19 speaker has the floor. There will be no smoking permitted 20 in the auditorium. Cell phones must be turned off or in 21 vibrate mode. 22 The Chair may deviate from the printed Number 4: 23 program when necessary or expedient. 24 Number 5: The Credentials Chairman shall report 25 registration as directed by the Chair. 26 Number 6: The registration of delegates or 27 alternates shall close at 9:00 a.m. Saturday, June 24th 28 2017. 29 Number 7: Only qualified delegates shall have 30 voice and vote. 31 Number 8: It shall be the responsibility of each 32 District President to see that only accredited delegates 33 and alternates serving as delegates are seated in their 34 District delegation during the business meetings of the 35 Convention. 36 Number 9: If a delegate expects to be absent 37 from the Convention, except for the purpose of attending a 38 committee meeting, she should release her delegate's card 39 to her alternate. The alternate shall then take her seat 40 in the voting section. In the event the delegate does not 41 have the opportunity of reporting to the District 42 President, it shall be the duty of the Chairman of the 43 unit delegation to report to the District President the 44 absence of the delegate and the presence of the alternate 45 or the absence of both delegate and alternate. 46 Number 10: A delegate wishing a privilege of the 47 floor shall rise, address the Chair as Madam Department 48 President, give her name, unit and district numbers, 49 pause, and wait to be recognized by the chair. 50 Number 11, a member speaking in debate on a

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1 question shall be limited to three minutes. No one shall 2 speak more than twice on the same question without the 3 consent of the assembly. 4 Number 12: Delegates attending called committee 5 meetings shall be notified when the convention is 6 considering and voting upon adoption of any change in 7 policy or matters affecting finance. 8 Excuse me. Number 13: Reports of committees 9 which do not appear to be controversial in any nature may 10 be adopted by general consent, if there is no objection. 11 If there is objection, a vote shall be taken. Following 12 the acceptance of a report of the committee, 13 recommendations or resolutions may be presented for 14 consideration and adoption. 15 Number 14: Any committee whose proposed changes 16 in policy might conflict with that of The American Legion 17 shall confer with The American Legion before presenting 18 said change to the Convention. 19 Number 15: A Committee recommending an 20 appropriation of funds for any purpose shall consult with 21 the Department Finance Committee before presenting the recommendation or resolution to the Convention. 22 23 Number 16: All resolutions to be presented to 24 the Convention shall be in triplicate and properly signed. 25 Number 17: Committees may amend resolutions and 26 recommendations referred to them before favorable 27 reporting same. Resolutions or recommendations rejected 28 by a committee shall be marked rejected, signed by the 29 Chairman of the Committee, and returned to the Department Resolutions Chairman immediately following the Committee 30 31 Meeting. 32 Number 18: A Unit, District, or members 33 representing a resolution or recommendation shall have 34 their privilege of explaining same to the Committee to 35 which it was referred. 36 Number 19: Committee shall report to the 37 Convention all resolutions properly submitted and accepted 38 by a majority of the Convention Committee. 39 Number 20: A resolution rejected by a committee 40 may be brought before the convention by two-thirds vote. 41 Number 21: Emergency resolution which may arise 42 during the convention or after the date for submitting 43 resolutions may be presented no later than noon of the 44 second day of Convention. (Article IV, Section 4b, 45 Department Constitution). 46 Number 22: Nomination of Officers, Junior Member 47 of Finance, Department Delegates and Alternates to the 48 National Convention shall be held Friday afternoon, June 49 23rd, 2017. 50 Number 23: Endorsement of candidates for

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1 National Office shall follow nominations. 2 Number 24: Nomination speeches shall be limited 3 to three minutes. There shall be no seconding speeches. 4 Number 25: Election of Department Officers, 5 Junior Member of Finance, National Candidate, Department 6 Delegates and Alternates to the National Convention shall 7 be held on Saturday morning, June 24th, 2017. 8 Number 26: The doors of the Convention Hall 9 shall be closed during the entire election procedure and 10 no one shall leave or enter the hall until Chair states the election is concluded. The exception to this shall be 11 12 in an emergency a member may leave, and if her absence 13 affects the voting strength, the District President shall 14 immediately notify the presiding officer. 15 Number 27: When there is but one nominee for all 16 department officers and but one nominee for Junior Member 17 of Finance, the nominees shall be elected viva voce. (Article V, Section 3 Department Constitution). Upon roll 18 19 call, the District Presidents shall report the number of 20 units partially or wholly represented by newly elected 21 delegates or alternates present in the delegation at the 22 time of the roll call. This is to determine that there is 23 a quorum of units present at the time of election. 24 Number 28: When there is more than one nominee 25 for the Department Officers, Junior Member of Finance or 26 endorsement for National Office, election shall be by 27 written ballot. The District President shall, when they 28 are instructed by the Chair, take a roll call of their 29 respective delegation to ascertain the total voting 30 strength of their District for the election reporting the 31 same to Chair. 32 Number 29: When there are three or more nominees 33 for office, Junior Member of Finance, or endorsement for 34 National Office, unless one nominee receives a majority 35 vote on the first ballot, the nominee receiving the lowest 36 number of votes shall be automatically dropped before 37 proceeding with the next ballot. 38 Number 30: When there is a candidate or 39 candidates for an endorsement to a National Office a 40 majority vote shall be by ballot. (Constitution Article 41 V, Section 13.) 42 Number 31: Each District President Or District Member of the Election Committee shall distribute and 43 elect the votes cast by the District delegation and 44 45 deliver them to the Department Chairman of the Elections. 46 Number 32: Department Officers, Chairman, 47 Committee Member, and Past Department President shall vote 48 with their respective district. 49 Number 33: Each delegate shall be entitled to 50 one vote. The vote of an absent unit delegate not

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1 represented by an alternate shall be cast by the majority 2 of the delegates from the Unit. When two delegates 3 represent three votes, the Chairman of the Unit delegation 4 shall cast the third vote. 5 Number 34: A majority of all votes cast shall 6 elect, except that -- except that in the election of 7 national delegates or alternates of plurality shall elect. 8 Number 35: These Convention rules may be amended 9 during the Convention by a two-thirds vote. 10 Number 36: Robert's Rules of Order, Newly 11 Revised shall be the parliamentary authority on all points 12 not covered by these rules, the Department Constitution & 13 Bylaws and Convention mandates. 14 Madam Department President Wendy, this concludes 15 the reading of the convention rules. I move that the convention rules be considered as read and be adopted as a 16 17 whole. PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Second. 18 19 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Okay. There is a 20 motion on the floor -- oh, okay. Will you please reread 21 number 30? 22 CONVENTION RULES CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: Number 30: When there is a candidate or candidates for an endorsement 23 to a National Office, a majority vote shall be by ballot. 24 25 (Constitution Article V, Section 13). 26 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Hold on just one 27 moment. 28 CONVENTION RULES CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: Sorry about 29 that. Number 30: All members seeking National office 30 shall be endorsed at a Department Convention by a majority 31 vote not more than three years prior to the date they are 32 to be a candidate for office. Vote shall be by viva voce 33 unless there is more than one candidate, then a majority 34 vote shall elect by ballot. (Constitution Article V, 35 Section 13). 36 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Thank you. Okay. 37 Glenda, can you also go back to number 3 and reread number 38 3? 39 CONVENTION RULES CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: Number 3: 40 The audience shall remain seated during the business of 41 the Convention. The Department President shall designate 42 certain doors to accommodate delegates who find it 43 necessary to enter or leave the Convention Hall during reports of committee -- or committees when a speaker has 44 45 the floor. Cell phones must be turned off or in vibrate 46 mode. 47 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Thank you, yes. 48 Okay. So there is a motion on the floor to accept these 49 rules of the convention as a whole. Any questions? If 50 you have a question, could you please come up to one of

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1 the mics. There are three mics up here. Could you please 2 come up? 3 UNIT 621 PRESIDENT WALLER: Madam President -- is 4 it on? Okay. Madam President, my name is Doreen Waller, 5 President of Unit 621, Squaw Valley, California. In 6 number 2 she had stated reading: A guorum shall exist 7 when one-third of the Units in good standing are partially 8 or wholly represented by duly elected delegates or 9 alternates. Article IV, Section -- she said 5. It says Section 3. I just wanted to bring it to your attention. 10 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Okay. Thank you. 11 12 There were a few misreadings, however, what is in Right. the book is correct so that is what will be -- we'll be 13 14 voting on this morning. All those in favor? 15 ALL PRESENT: Aye. 16 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Opposed? 17 (No response.) DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Motion carried. 18 19 CONVENTION RULES CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: Madam 20 Department President Wendy, Rule Number 3 provides it is 21 your responsibility to designate certain doors to 22 accommodate delegates to enter or leave the convention. 23 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Okay. So since 24 the rule said I'm going to do that, I'm going to. Right 25 over here to your left -- my left is the doors that you 26 will come and go through. Please try to be as quietly as 27 possible because there is -- the chairs are very close, so 28 having any intermingling with members in the hall right 29 there or on this side of the doors will be very distracting for the members. So please take your business 30 31 outside if you're going to do it. And the restroom is 32 right down the hall. Oh, yeah. There's that too. Yeah. 33 CONVENTION RULES CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: I would 34 suggest that the Pages request delegates entering the hall 35 to stand quietly and wait for the speaker to finish before 36 returning to their seats. 37 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: That sounds 38 fabulous to me. 39 CONVENTION RULES CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: Madam 40 President, thank you for this appointment and the opportunity to serve you and the Department of California. 41 42 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Thank you so much, 43 Glenda. 44 (Applause.) 45 SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: We had some bad 46 news last night. Elaine Gallagher fell and broke her hip 47 and is having surgery this morning. And Debbie Fletcher's 48 brother has died. 49 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Okay. Well, we've 50 had our three so we don't need anymore. Okay. We have

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1 some guests here this morning. Will the Sergeant-at-Arms 2 and Marshal with the -- with the Distinguished Guest 3 Chairman please bring to the stage Past Detachment 4 Commander Chris Affolter and his aid. Affolter. Excuse 5 me. 6 (Processional.) 7 PAST DETACHMENT COMMANDER AFFOLTER: Good 8 morning, ladies. 9 AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Good morning. 10 PAST DETACHMENT COMMANDER AFFOLTER: I was just 11 thinking maybe she just wore it out. Dang, that's a 12 prison weapon right there. Greetings from the Sons of 13 American Legion. Let me tell you those guys over there, 14 they are wonderful. They put together -- or I should say 15 I as the chairman for the convention city, we put together 16 a deal. And I know I heard some conflict, but we have 17 again the detachment youth party. It will be this 18 Saturday. 19 We are going to be going to water slides and 20 laser tag, mini golf, pizza, amusement rides. And when I 21 say youth, okay, that does not mean the ladies that are 22 over the age of 18. I had to get -- I had -- I had to 23 tell that to the Sons because I had like 20 guys stand up, 24 "I want to go. I want to go," and so -- there are some 25 amusement rides there too. And then we're going to get 26 some great pizza. I've known this guy for 20-some years and he has a place called Nickelodeon Pizza. It's going 27 28 to be over at Grand Terrace/Colton. It's about 15 minutes 29 It's called Fiesta Village. It's a great wonderful away. 30 place. They gave us a really good deal on everything and 31 it is absolutely free for those that are under the age of 32 18. 33 (Applause.) 34 PAST DETACHMENT COMMANDER AFFOLTER: The Sons of 35 The American Legion, I really fought for this because, you 36 know, in the past years we've had video game trucks and 37 pizzas and something like that, and since we're down here in the south -- next year I don't know what they're going 38 39 to do because I won't be on the committee, but the year 40 after that for the 100th, we're going to have a slam dang 41 bang going on. I'm going to push for something big, big. 42 So we'll see what happens. 43 The bus is going to be -- the bus is going to be leaving at 3:00 o'clock sharply, so we would like the 44 45 young ladies to be out there between 2:30 and 3:00. The 46 reason for 2:30 is I've got parent permission slips that 47 need to be filled out. You know, the regular rigamarole. We give them permission to send them to the hospital if 48 they go flipping out of the water slide, that type of 49 50 thing. But that will never happen there because, you

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1 know -- you know, knock on the wooden gavel, we'll be just 2 fine. But that needs to be done. We'll have the forms 3 out there. 4 Now you're probably wondering how many can go. Ι 5 have a total seating arrangement of 50 students that we 6 have paid for or 50 youths that we have paid for. I've gotten many texts this morning from the Sons. There's not 7 8 a lot of Sons over there, so there's definitely an 9 opening. 10 Hey, I know you two. So if you can text me, here's my number. Are you 11 12 ready? Yes, I'm giving you my digits, ladies. Call me 13 any time. Just don't let my wife catch you. 14 (909) 251-2464. And what I need is even if you have a group of girls, that's fine. Text me all of their names. 15 And I also need their unit number. Okay? So that we have 16 17 a little bit of tracking going on. Okay? Can I give a 18 shout out? 19 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Yes. 20 PAST DETACHMENT COMMANDER AFFOLTER: Okay. Shout 21 out to the 18th District. Yeah, ladies. Loving you. 22 And -- and my old homeland, the 21st. Love you, ladies. 23 Let me just tell you, I want to just tell you this is --24 the Auxiliary raised me up in The American Legion or the 25 Sons of The American Legion. I know a few years ago I got 26 to come up here and talk way too many times with my 27 president, but let me tell you, I appreciate the Auxiliary 28 more than you can ever believe. Because I'll tell you, 29 the president and the treasurer and everything, when I was 30 commander of my Sons when I was 16 years old, I'll tell 31 you what, I wouldn't have been able to do it without the 32 ladies Auxiliary. So I thank you for everything that you 33 do, the hard work that you put in for this department, the 34 hard work you put in for The American Legion. And I 35 salute all of you. Thank you so much. 36 (Applause.) 37 PAST DETACHMENT COMMANDER AFFOLTER: Oh, they're 38 meeting at the parking lot all the way that way. So it's 39 the east side of the building. It's the parking lot that's on Third Street. Okay. Go up there, you'll see 40 41 the buses up there or the bus. 42 Oh, by the way, I forgot something. I heard the 43 saddest news yesterday that some of your Pages won't be 44 done until 5:00 p.m. Isn't that horrible? So you know 45 what, I've arranged -- the bus will be back there waiting 46 for them at 5:15. 47 (Applause.) 48 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: You want a shout 49 out? 50 SONS AID DESMEULES: I adore the 19th District,

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you guys. Yahoo. 1 2 PAST DETACHMENT COMMANDER AFFOLTER: If you want 3 to get the slips for the parent permission, they are in the Sons of American Legion office. Just ask my 4 5 beautiful, wonderful wife, member of Unit No. 280 and 13 6 both out of the 18th District. 7 (Applause.) 8 PAST DETACHMENT COMMANDER AFFOLTER: Love you. 9 (Processional.) 10 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: We will now have 11 the report of the National Executive Committeewoman Susie 12 Tozier. 13 14 NATIONAL EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE CONVENTION REPORT 15 16 NEC MEMBER TOZIER: At the close of the 2016 17 Convention for National, I attended the National NEC meeting where the budget was approved. In February I 18 19 attended the National NEC in Washington D.C. where several 20 panels were presented showing the needs of the veterans. 21 That was really a fantastic event. 22 Later we visited the Vietnam Veteran Wall where 23 the National President placed a wreath. My next NEC 24 meeting will be in -- prior to the convention, the 25 Nationals in Reno. And we also -- I also provided readings to the National President for Wendy in Pacific 26 27 Palisades. That was really a wonderful -- she's a very, 28 very nice lady. And her special project is scholarships. 29 Thank you. 30 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Thank you. 31 (Applause.) 32 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Vice President 33 Loretta Marsh, will you please assume the chair so the President can give her report? With all the papers that I 34 35 had to bring to this convention, the one paper I forgot 36 was my convention report. So I have it on an iPad so please forgive the iPad. But, you know, ladies, it is the 37 38 modern technology. So this could be the wave of the 39 future. 40 41 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CONVENTION REPORT 42 43 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: This year our year 44 started off with a fantastic installation for Department President with Linda Fercho at the helm with units and 45 46 districts going on a sea cruise. And what a cruise it's 47 been. 48 My first stop was at the Yountville Veterans Home for the annual picnic. It was a great time for the 49 50 veterans with good food, music, and dancing. Family

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smiles -- friendly smiles by everyone. This was followed by the visit to the volunteer coordinator to talk about our needs at the Yountville home.

I guess it was just a light parade for Christmas, but it still could have been for us.

35 Then it was off to the lovely town of Chico in 36 Seeing what these ladies are doing for our District 4. 37 veterans is fabulous. The National Commander Charlie 38 Schmidt's Northern California visit was very exciting. 39 Myself along with many ALA members participated in the Walk For Veterans around the state capitol. We looked 40 41 like a munch of minions and danced and had dinner to hear 42 his message at Post 77, Christmas with Santa and found out 43 I was going to be a great grandma again for the third 44 Ladies, another Auxiliary member is almost here. time.

In January we attended the National Mission
Training in Las Vegas where we learned how to effectively
develop our future grassroots leaders and new ways to
present our programs.

Then it was off to a very long ride to Brawley with Susie, and I mean a very long drive with Susie, for

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1 the Area 5 Membership meeting where the ladies are very 2 encouraging to each other. This is a wonderful, wonderful 3 time for the Auxiliary members to get together to 4 encourage each other for membership. It was quite 5 exciting. 6 February found me visiting with many districts, 7 District 7, 16, 20 and 29, where districts combined their 8 meetings with other districts to conserve time, which I 9 was sad to say my husband then had a stroke and wasn't 10 able to travel too far or too long because he was needing 11 me to be home with him. Thank you so much for these 12 districts for combining the sessions. Learning what these 13 members did for our veterans has been such a heartwarming 14 -- you see it on paper, but when you're there and they're 15 expressing it and you see this excitement, it's something 16 to remember. 17 March was a very, very busy month visiting districts every week. Because of my home issues, I had to 18 19 cram lots of things together, and I enjoyed each and every 20 district that I visited. We were invited to the capitol for legislative days with The American Legion learning 21 22 about the bills coming this year to support our veterans. I was invited to District 4 where there was a -- they 23 24 honored female veterans. This was so exciting and the 25 members that were honored were certainly impressed that we 26 recognized them. 27 My visit to District 23, I was so excited to meet 28 our future member. She was dressed like a little sailor. 29 This was Gloria's granddaughter and it was such an honor 30 to be there with her dressed like a little sailor. 31 The American Legion Riders was our next stop to 32 bring greetings to. Then it was off to Junior Conference 33 where many of our Juniors met to run for election. These 34 ladies are outstanding and I think they're going to do a 35 great, great job leading our organization for the next 100 36 years. 37 The next thing was my homecoming. I can't 41 thank my district unit enough for everything that they had 42 done for this. 43 The National President's visit, Mary Davis, we 44 decided her official visit would be in May. Oh, are you sure? I need to open 39 this because it's just, like, so beautiful. Look how 40 beautiful that is. My department president loves 41 peacocks. I mean -- did I say department? I mean 42 district president. She ain't getting this though. Wow. 43 Look at this. 44 (Applause.) 45 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Oh, my God. 46 Loretta painted this. Look at that. 47 PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CAPAZZI: Let's see. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Oh, I'm sorry, 48 49 ladies. That's beautiful. Oh, yeah, the sea. The sea 50 horses. "Serving Veterans From Sea to Shining Sea." Oh,

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1 my God. 2 PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Whoa, Nelly. 3 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Wow, I really like 4 this present. Wow. Holy moly. 5 (Applause.) 6 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: I see the pirates 7 over here are trying to get near me. You made this? 8 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MARSH: Yes. 9 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: You are so good. 10 You know, somebody said that you seem very emotional this 11 weekend. I can't help but be emotional. 12 (Applause.) 13 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Ladies, this 14 department, the Chairmen, the Past Department Presidents, 15 what they do for this organization most of you will never know. There is so much happening behind the scenes that I 16 17 had absolutely no clue until I was in this position. 18 These ladies handle things for you, and that's how it 19 should be. The leaders should be taking care of things so 20 the members don't have to deal with the everyday stresses 21 of this. And you couldn't ask for a better team. 22 I thank you more than anything to all of you, all 23 of you, the Past Presidents who are sitting with your 24 district. Everyone, thank you so much. 25 (Applause.) 26 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: All right. We 27 will have the reports of Department Officers. Will all 28 officers not already on stage please come up quickly and 29 be ready to give your report. Just a reminder to the Department Officers and Chairmen. All reports excluding 30 31 Americanism, Education, Membership, Children & Youth, 32 Poppy, Resolutions, and Veterans Affairs & Rehabilitation 33 per the department code is to be limited to five minutes. 34 This includes your committee report, supplementals, and 35 first place award presentations. 36 Can we have Vice President Loretta Marsh give her 37 report. 38 39 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT CONVENTION REPORT 40 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MARSH: Madam 41 42 Department President Wendy didn't have much advice for me 43 to report on this year, so my report is very short here. 44 I attended the Girls State meeting in the fall 45 and the Four Chaplains Ceremony in Sanger in February. I 46 had the privilege of attending Junior Conference and 47 installing the new junior officers for the year. Those 48 girls are great. 49 I left my quiet country home to travel north to 50 the big city of San Francisco for a budget meeting, then

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1 south to the big city of Los Angeles or in the Los Angeles 2 area for the National President's visit, which I enjoyed 3 immensely, proving that if I am elected president this 4 year, I can deal with the traffic when I have to. I have lived in Los Angeles, but that was my first experience 5 6 driving in San Francisco. Enough said on that. But the best part of my year as Vice President 7 8 was the privilege of working with the great officers and 9 chairmen this year, especially my president who was and is 10 a great mentor and friend. Thank you, Madam President. This concludes my report. 11 12 (Applause.) 13 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Loretta, before 14 you get settled, can you assume the chair so I can bring 15 greetings to The American Legion? 16 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MARSH: You didn't 17 leave me a stepstool. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Sorry. 18 19 (Processional.) 20 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MARSH: Can we have the 21 report of the Secretary/Treasurer? 22 23 SECRETARY/TREASURER CONVENTION REPORT 24 25 SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: That was a little 26 bit of a surprise, wasn't it? Greetings, Madam Department 27 President. Greetings on behalf of the Department 28 Membership Clerk Julie Frisch and Bookkeeper Imelda Cruz 29 and myself. It has been a pleasure and privilege serving 30 as the Department Secretary/Treasurer for the great 31 Department of the -- of California for the past four 32 years. 33 I want to thank Imelda for the outstanding job 34 she does with the finances and for keeping the office 35 going for the five months until we hired Julie as our 36 membership clerk in February. Julie is a welcomed 37 addition to our staff and is rapidly catching on to all of 38 the day-to-day operations of the Department Office and The 39 American Legion Auxiliary. 40 I also want to thank -- take time to welcome our 41 court reporter now, Karen Aufdermaur. Is that correct, 42 Karen? I can't see her. She's back for her sixth year recording the convention proceedings. 43 44 (Applause.) 45 SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: I want to thank 46 Newport Harbor Unit 291 for their generous donation which 47 is going to be used to purchase a computer for our 48 membership clerk. 49 (Applause.) 50 SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: We have three

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1 prospective new units in the process of forming: Leonard 2 Yates Unit 709, District 6; James Fowler Unit 264, 3 District 7; Samuel Patterson Unit 198, District 8; 4 Northside Unit 858, District 13; and Temple City Unit 279, 5 District 18. 6 (Applause.) 7 SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: I traveled to 8 Indianapolis for the Department Leadership National 9 Conference with Loretta Marsh and Joan Cannon where we received a lot of information including that the 2017-'18 10 Junior meeting held in conjunction with the ALA Mission 11 12 Training will be held in Las Vegas on February 3rd and was told that National is proposing a \$3 membership increase 13 14 at the Reno Convention to take effect during the 2018 15 administrative year. If passed, units would be submitting 16 \$20 per capita for senior members with National receiving 17 \$12 per senior member and \$8 for the Department of California instead of the \$17 that you normally submit. 18 19 In my opinion this needs to be discussed and 20 decided whether or not the National delegates attending 21 the Reno Convention will support or reject this proposal 22 based upon the consensus of those present and voting at 23 this Department Convention. Operations of the Department Office are going 24 25 well and finances are in great shape. With more and more 26 new chairmen taking positions at the unit level, I would 27 like to see training developed to increase the knowledge 28 and comfort levels of those assuming new positions within 29 the units. 30 Another area that I would like to see developed 31 is reporting and tracking all the required reports into a 32 system simplified for the user as well as tracking and 33 compiling all those reports we have to do. 34 Madam Department President, I wish for you a most 35 memorable and productive Department Convention and it has 36 been a pleasure working with you serving our veterans from 37 sea to shining sea. This concludes my report. 38 (Applause.) 39 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MARSH: Thank you. We 40 will now have the Chaplain's report. 41 42 CHAPLAIN CONVENTION REPORT 43 44 DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN MOORE: Thank you, Madam 45 President. The Chaplains met on June 22nd in the 46 Raincross B room of the Riverside Convention Center here 47 in Riverside, California. The statistical report of this chairman appears on page 49 of the Book of Reports. 48 C.J. Reyes, District 19, Unit 496 was appointed 49 50 as Secretary, Delores Ryan, District 15, Unit 26 was

1 appointed Chaplain, and Joyce Patton, District 23, Unit 2 252 was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. There were a total of 3 20 district delegates that answered roll call. There were 4 eight visitors present. 5 The committee agreed on the following report. 6 There were no code changes. Second and third place awards 7 for unit and district were presented along with 100 percent reporting certificates. The Chaplains discussed 8 9 the memorial service and songs were distributed to those 10 participating in the choir. 11 And that ends my committee report. May I move on 12 to the supplemental? 13 DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MARSH: Yes. 14 DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN MOORE: The Beacons of Light 15 from the Department of California have been very busy 16 providing the spiritual needs of our entire American 17 Legion Family. As this year comes to a close, we have 18 much to be grateful for and thankful to be part of this 19 great organization. 20 A total of 27 out of 30 districts provided 21 year-end reports details activities of the 258 units 22 within the State of California. 310 deceased members were 23 reported, there were zero juniors reported, and three 24 deceased Gold Star Mothers. Seventy-five units in 17 25 districts held memorial services for deceased members. 26 Seventy-six units draped the charter for deceased members. Fifteen units reported having donated \$1,476.01 to the In 27 28 Loving Tribute Fund. Sixteen units reported having 29 participated in the Chapel of Four Chaplains and donating 30 \$2,133. 31 Ten units brought prayer books to the convention 32 for competition including two junior books. Twelve units 33 are sending -- sent prayers for the Department President's 34 Prayer Book. Twenty-two units reported sending 7,708 35 cards, various cards valued at \$7,725.60. Eighty-four 36 units utilized "Reflections" prayers as a source, and 78 37 units utilized other sources. 38 Many units participated in various patriotic 39 events such as Memorial Day, Veterans Day, Independence 40 Day, 911 Remembrance, and Flag Day. Units and districts 41 participated in 29 other activities including Veterans Day 42 parades, Wreaths Across America, Junior Conference Flag 43 Retirement, and Vietnam Memorial Wall just to name a few. 44 Chaplains reported visiting veterans in 45 hospitals, nursing and convalescent homes. One unit 46 donated 300 lap robes and blankets and hosted Stand Downs 47 searching for homeless veterans on the streets, under 48 bridges and provided needed assistance to those veterans. 49 Members of one unit created a counseling program 50 consisting of veterans and others counseled those in need.

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1 Chaplains have visited children's hospitals bringing 2 cheer, celebrating birthdays, distributing toys and just 3 simple companionship. One district along with the entire Legion Family prepares 2,000 fresh cut carnations, and 4 5 with the assistance of the local police department and 6 Legion Riders parade to the cemetery and places the 7 carnations on grave sites on Memorial Day. 8 One unit maintains a memorial rose garden at a 9 local park which was dedicated in May of 1944 to veterans 10 killed in action. Units of one district raised funds for the burial of a member's loved one and many also donated 11 12 and prepare food for numerous repasts. 13 This Chairman was honored to assist the Honorary 14 Junior Chaplain at Junior Conference who happens to be here today, Teresa Pouliot. She's in the back. Assisted 15 her at Junior Conference. I lost my place here. Sorry. 16 17 With the memorial service. Although there were no reports 18 of Juniors deceased, we conducted a ceremony on the 19 Military Child's Table in honor of those children whose 20 parents are deployed. It was well received. 21 This Chaplain was also honored to give the 22 invocation and benediction at the dinner for National 23 President Mary Davis' official visit in southern 24 California in April. The Beacons of Light have honored 25 your slogan, Madam President, of "Serving Veterans From 26 Sea to Shining Sea" while spreading light, love, hope and 27 prayer throughout the ALA Cruise Line. 28 Madam President, this ends my report and I would 29 like to thank you for this appointment. 30 (Applause.) 31 DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN MOORE: May I move on to the 32 first place awards? We have First Place In Loving Tribute 33 Largest Donation goes to Unit 210, District 4. 34 (Applause.) 35 DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN MOORE: Four Chaplains 36 Largest Donation, first place goes to Unit 291, District 37 29. 38 (Applause.) 39 DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN MOORE: Largest number of 40 cards. First place goes to Unit 258, District 22. 41 (Applause.) DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN MOORE: And now we'll move on 42 43 to the Best Supplemental. Goes to first place Susan 44 Baker, Unit 694, District 28. (Applause.) 45 46 DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN MOORE: First Place District 47 Best Supplemental goes to Arlene Barton, District 25. 48 (Applause.) 49 DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN MOORE: And for the Prayer 50 Book, we actually -- I said ten in my report, but we

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1 actually had 11 senior books and we had two junior books. 2 So we have our First Place Best Prayer Book goes to Amy 3 Gimmel, District 22. 4 (Applause.) 5 DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN MOORE: First place Unit 280, 6 District 18 goes to Rodie Andressi. 7 (Applause.) 8 DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN MOORE: And last but not 9 least, first place goes to Zoey Tiaduey, Unit 283, 10 District 24 for the Best Junior Prayer Book. 11 (Applause.) 12 DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN MOORE: And, ladies, I want 13 you to know that I did not choose them, even though I 14 concur, but we did have a committee and I want to thank 15 the committee that assisted on judging the books 16 yesterday. We had C.J. Reyes, we had Sandy Jacobs, and we 17 had Joyce Patton. 18 Thank you so much, Madam President. And if I can 19 approach your station. Oh, I'm sorry. Let me give you 20 your book. Okay. 21 First of all, Madam President, this is from many 22 units and districts compiled by myself. And with the 23 assistance of all my roommates, we want to present this 24 prayer book to you. And we just love you and I hope you 25 enjoy the book. 26 (Applause.) 27 DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN MOORE: We had so many. We 28 also had a little memory chest here for you that has 29 seashells and other poems and devotions inside. And it 30 says: "My trust is in you, God of miracles and surprises. 31 Daily I feel your presence in a dozen ways." 32 (Applause.) 33 DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN MOORE: Now this ends my 34 report. 35 (Applause.) 36 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: She did an 37 outstanding job, don't you think? 38 (Applause.) 39 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Thank you, Sharon. 40 Okay. It looks like we have another guest, so 41 could we -- could we have The American Legion Riders 42 President Mick Sobczak. 43 (Processional.) ALR PRESIDENT SOBCZAK: Last year you were all 44 45 dancing the last time I did this. I have to admit you are 46 the most fun out of the entire family. 47 (Applause.) 48 ALR PRESIDENT SOBCZAK: You even put my Riders to 49 shame. 50 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: So am I.

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1 ALR PRESIDENT SOBCZAK: I was going to say how 2 many Riders do we have out here? Stand up. 3 (Applause.) 4 ALR PRESIDENT SOBCZAK: And I see my district 5 over here, District 22. Ladies. 6 (Applause.) 7 ALR PRESIDENT SOBCZAK: One thing about the 8 Riders is we're actually the only all-inclusive program 9 within The American Legion. You don't have to be a Legionnaire, Squadron, or an Auxiliary member be a Rider. 10 11 And that's a really good thing, but I'm getting on my veterans' case about that because we have 2,068 members 12 13 within the program, The American Legion Riders', 85 14 chapters, but of that only 334 are Auxiliary members. And I learned early on in life, happy life, happy wife. 15 And I 16 know a lot of the wives out there for these veterans 17 aren't Riders. And a lot of them aren't even Auxiliary members, so I'm getting on them about that. 18 19 So I'm hoping to increase your numbers this year, 20 and that's what my membership office, Department Chairman 21 Gary Teicher has been tasked with. So he actually does 22 all the legwork and I get the credit for it. I love how 23 that works. 24 But I'll be here all weekend. I'm looking 25 forward to having some dinner with you all tomorrow night. 26 I do dress up well. I clean up a little bit better than I 27 do right now. So I'm actually retired from the military 28 finally. February 7th of this year I finally retired from 29 the U.S. Army, so --30 (Applause.) 31 ALR PRESIDENT SOBCZAK: Went to Marine Corps boot 32 camp in 1982, so I'm showing you my age. But I have a 33 plaque here for Wendy. It says thanks for her support to 34 The American Legion Riders. And if I could cut it into 35 little pieces and give every one of you a piece, I would, 36 but she gets it. 37 (Applause.) 38 (Processional.) 39 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Okay. Ladies, 40 it's extremely distracting for the members on this side of 41 the room when you're coming and going through the doors. 42 When there is a speaker especially up here giving their 43 report, please stand in the back and wait to leave the 44 room or to come in so that way it doesn't disrupt their 45 report. There's a lot of business going on outside those 46 doors and so we want to keep it as quiet in here as 47 possible so that we don't have to scream. So thank you 48 very much. 49 (Applause.) 50 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Okay. Our next

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1 report will be given by our Foghorn, Ms. Diane DeLashmit, 2 our Department Parliamentarian. 3 4 PARLIAMENTARIAN CONVENTION REPORT 5 6 PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: Thank you for playing 7 my theme song. Madam President, Captain Wendy O'Brien, as 8 we left port in Fresno, it looked pretty bleak for a year 9 without major storm activity. We were entering turbulent weather and were going to be sounding the foghorn for some 10 11 really rough waters ahead. However, in a short while the storm subsided and we have had smooth sailing ever since. 12 13 There were five articles presented for the 14 Parliamentarian Corner. Hopefully they were helpful. And many 39 of you have asked and were concerned about me this week. It was truly appreciated. I am doing fine now, but I did 40 41 have quite a wake-up call. Thanks again for your concern. 42 (Applause.) 43 PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: You'll only have to 44 hear it a couple more times. Thank you. 45 (Applause.) 46 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Okay. We will now 47 have Joyce Patton give her report. Our Musician. Excuse 48 me. 49 50 MUSICIAN CONVENTION REPORT

1 2 DEPARTMENT MUSICIAN PATTON: I see nobody to my 3 There should be a choir over there. right. 4 Good morning, everyone. The Convention Committee 5 on program named Musician met on June 22nd, 2017 in Room 6 Ballroom A of the Riverside Convention Center, Riverside, 7 California. The statistical report of this chairman 8 appears on page none of the Book of Reports. 9 Barbara Toth, Unit 112, District 25 was appointed 10 secretary, Sharon Moore, Unit 252, District 23 offered prayer, and Jean Cooley-Desmeules, Unit 314, District 19 11 12 was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of ten district 13 delegates answered roll call. There were seven visitors 14 present. 15 I was so excited. The committee agreed upon the 16 following report. There were three recommendations for 17 this committee. The committee wants music back. 18 (Applause.) 19 MUSICIAN PATTON: Song book competition, and a 20 junior music program. There was much discussion regarding 21 music in our department. The committee was very much 22 aware of the fact that music is no longer a program on the 23 National level, but they feel we should have music in our 24 department. Some of the reasoning is the following: 25 One, no guidelines for this program. Two, music 26 is the motivation behind everything we do. Three, music 27 is a part of our heart and soul. Four, being that music 28 is no longer in our schools, we are just giving our 29 children to the streets and the music they run to is rap. 30 Five, our bodies are electrically and skillfully 31 made and that's why we feel good when music is in our 32 lives. Six, children with music in their lives have 33 cognitive and positive lives. Seven, the skill set we get 34 from music can be transferred to many other areas of our 35 lives. There are -- these are some of the arguments as to 36 why we need the music program back. So at this time I 37 would like to move that we reinstate music in this 38 department. 39 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: There's a motion 40 on the floor to -- now do you have that written somewhere 41 exactly how you've said it? Okay. 42 PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: It's right 43 here. 44 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Okay. There's a 45 motion on the floor that we reinstate music in this 46 California Department. Any discussion? 47 (No response.) 48 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: All those in 49 favor, say aye. 50 ALL PRESENT: Aye.

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1 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Those opposed, 2 nay. 3 (No response.) 4 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Motion carried. 5 DEPARTMENT MUSICIAN PATTON: Thank you. 6 (Applause.) 7 DEPARTMENT MUSICIAN PATTON: We rehearsed our 8 song, "Keep on Rowin'" written by Pat Gracey, District 15, 9 and adjourned with prayer at 12 noon. Musically yours, 10 Joyce Patton, Musician. That ends my meeting. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Okay. 11 12 DEPARTMENT MUSICIAN PATTON: May I move to my 13 supplemental? 14 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Yes, you may. 15 DEPARTMENT MUSICIAN PATTON: I'm so excited. 16 Hey, Seashells. First I want to thank President Wendy for 17 allowing me this pleasure of filling in for our great friend and sister Alzora Carter who is now singing with 18 19 our father in heaven. In her first bulletin for Musician 20 it stated: At our Department Executive Committee meeting 21 in January 2017, this Seashell will bring -- will present a monetary gift of \$50 to the District and Unit who will 22 23 send me a CD of your original recording song of the sea --24 or ocean or sea. 25 So it was a pleasure to award Pat Gracey, 26 District 15, our contest winner \$50 for that great song 27 she wrote, "Keep on Rowin'." 28 What is the essence of music. Do you know what 29 it does? The essence of music is communication and expression of one's life and emotions, whatever that may 30 31 This year our Seashells sang The National Anthem in be. 32 their units and district, at the VA hospitals, Post homes, 33 and some in-home service visits. Some District and Unit 34 Seashells had fun by singing nautical songs and ocean 35 songs, music at their unit and district meetings. Music 36 was used at all of our Auxiliary functions and meetings. 37 One unit stated that they had fun creating, 38 performing, and spreading music around the State of 39 California. They also performed at the Greater Los Angeles VA Hospital for the veterans' Christmas party 40 41 where they had a sing-off with the hospital veterans. 42 They also performed for the Department President's dinner 43 as well as the National President's Dinner. 44 One district who had a lot this year stated: We 45 started the year off with a musical presentation at our 46 first official district meeting in September for music 47 month, singing medley of songs. The choir was 48 outstanding, performing songs that were in line with our 49 name, The Musical Seashells. The audience even got up and 50 clapped and sang along with us. Their choir made an

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1 appearance at the Christmas program for the veterans at 2 the VA hospital where holiday songs were enjoyed and sung 3 by all. 4 Their next performance was at their district 5 meeting during the visitation of our Department President. 6 She enjoyed it so much that she stood up and was singing, 7 clapping, and dancing with them. The choir did an 8 exceptionally great get down and get back up performance, 9 as some of the songs were a bit challenging. A good time was had by all. Their last performance was at the 10 11 National President's visit where they performed The 12 National Anthem. 13 Two districts formed a choir, but not many units 14 formed choirs. But as they sang in their units and 15 district, it was choir worthy. DEPARTMENT MUSICIAN PATTON: I would like to move 41 42 on to my awards. 43 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Yes. 44 DEPARTMENT MUSICIAN PATTON: First place award 45 for Best District Supplemental report goes to Matilda 46 Haywood, USS Muhammad Ali, District 23, Unit 639. 47 (Applause.) 48 DEPARTMENT MUSICIAN PATTON: Award for the Best 49 Music Book goes to Jean Cooley-Desmeules, Noisy 19 50 District, Unit 314.

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1 (Applause.) 2 DEPARTMENT MUSICIAN PATTON: Jean, I'm telling 3 you, she's a wonder. We didn't ask for a music book, but 4 she gave one. That's what you do when you go over and 5 above. 6 Okay. And last, but not least, this to me is a 7 special award, a lady I met at DC. She came up to me and 8 she -- she says: You know, I used to be Music Chairman 9 and I would like to recommend a song. And I said, oh, that's so nice of you. So I'd like to give her an award. 10 Her name is Arlene Barton, Musician, Unit 777, District 11 12 25. 13 (Applause.) 14 DEPARTMENT MUSICIAN PATTON: Okay. And we're 15 going to sing now. Choir, are you ready? Okay. Are we ready? Ready? We're going to do it acapella. It's 16 17 better that way. Everybody one, two, three. 18 (Singing.) 19 DEPARTMENT MUSICIAN PATTON: Thank you. Madam 20 President, may I approach? 21 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Sure. Thank you, 22 Joyce. I know it was very difficult stepping in under 23 such tough situations, and you did an outstanding job. 24 Ladies who were singing and your award winners, 25 congratulations. You guys did a great job. 26 Now we have a special presentation. Could we 27 have District 30 President Kim Vincent and can the 28 Sergeant-at-Arms and Marshal with the Distinguished Guest 29 Chairman please escort to this station Aurora Saldivar 30 representing Eduardo Garcia, 56th Assembly District. 31 (Processional.) 32 MS. SALDIVAR: Good morning. It's a privilege to 33 join you on behalf of Assemblyman Eduardo Garcia, 34 California State Legislature. Eduardo Garcia is proud to 35 represent the community of the Coachella Valley and the 36 entire Imperial County. 37 And today we're here for a special purpose, to 38 recognize one of your own. But first we would like to 39 commend this body for all their work and advocacy within 40 our California communities. Your work, your outstanding 41 volunteerism really does brings stars and stripes of our 42 flag to vibrant reality within our communities and is a 43 true inspiration. So thank you very much. You all 44 deserve a big round of applause. 45 (Applause.) 46 MS. SALDIVAR: The reason we are here today is 47 because Eduardo Garcia is extremely proud to recognize one 48 from District 30 in our Imperial Valley Community, Ms. Kim 49 K. Vincent for her exemplary service and true patriotism 50 and all of her outstanding work help bring alive veterans

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1 and to serve veterans within Imperial County and the 2 entire community at large of the Imperial County, taking 3 on projects like leading them in the Veterans Day parade, 4 Memorial Day parade and Veterans and you name it. She goes, she works. She -- you know, she really brings to 5 6 life like the constitution. She inspires people. She 7 teaches the importance to serve our veterans, taking on 8 projects like working with the Auxiliary to assembly care 9 packages. 10 And she never quits. Any veteran organization in the Imperial County, and somewhere down the line Kim is 11 12 going to help get it started, gather up volunteers, put 13 out an SOS call on Facebook. She's there. She is there. 14 She is grassroots organizing. She is amazing. You know 15 what, we have this resolution from the State, but there 16 wasn't enough room to list all of her biographies on it. 17 It is just so much. And, you know, I don't have to tell you. I'm 18 19 sure you all know her more than I do. She's one of your 20 families. It just goes to show we're in great company. You're an amazing group of ladies. So Eduardo is so proud 21 22 and we will continue to recognize Kim Vincent throughout 23 the year as our Assembly District 56 Veteran of the Year. 24 Thank you so much. Please accept this. 25 (Applause.) 26 DEPARTMENT 30 PRESIDENT VINCENT: I just wanted 27 to say thank you. This is such an honor to be recognized 28 and I just -- it's all for the veterans and my passion is 29 helping the active duty and our veterans and I'm going to continue to do what I do. And thank you for the 30 31 recognition. 32 (Applause.) 33 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Okay. We'll 34 continue with the officers' reports. Can we have Dolly 35 Rios, our historian, give her report, please. 36 37 HISTORIAN CONVENTION REPORT 38 39 DEPARTMENT HISTORIAN RIOS: Good morning. The 40 Convention Committee on program the Historian met on June 41 22nd in Ballroom A of the Riverside Convention Center. 42 The statistical report of this chairman appears on page 52 43 of the Book of Reports. Harriet Clendenin, Unit 221, District 15 was 44 45 appointed secretary. Keeping -- meeting closed at 10:40 with closing 4 prayer. 5 Madam Secretary [sic], may I go on with my floor 6 report --7 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Yes. 8 DEPARTMENT HISTORIAN RIOS: -- and first place 9 awards? Thank you. Greetings Madam President. "Serving Our Veterans from Sea to Shining Sea" has been a very 10 11 interesting cruise. Beginning with all lifeboats and 12 buoys we stayed afloat, no man overboard. Captain 13 Wendy --14 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: You're going to 15 need to speak up just a little bit. I know. I'm sorry. 16 DEPARTMENT HISTORIAN RIOS: Captain Wendy settled 17 into many ports -- sailed into many ports of call. All 18 her shipmates were very busy getting help to all the veterans and guiding us through troubled waters. 19 There 20 were several workshops which I myself attended some, even 21 had some shipmates become certified leadership 22 instructors. Veterans Day is celebrated with great 23 enthusiasm as shipmates gather at homes as Yountville and 24 give the veterans there an enjoyable visit, entertainment, 25 and barbecue. 26 Children and youth are very important for our 27 voyage. Each day is a blank page on which we write, and 28 at the end of the year we have a book called the Unit 29 History and the District History. These books are important to be passed onto the new generation. Picture 30 31 books are a great source of visually showing what has been 32 accomplished around us, the who, what, why, and when of 33 all that picture -- of that picture. Without that, the 34 picture has no meaning. 35 Madam President, this concludes my report. May I 36 give my supplementals? 37 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: You may. 38 DEPARTMENT HISTORIAN RIOS: Okay. Historian 39 District 19, Unit 359. 40 (Applause.) 41 DEPARTMENT HISTORIAN RIOS: And the First Place 42 District History Book, Dee Ann Graham. 43 (Applause.) DEPARTMENT HISTORIAN RIOS: And the Unit History 44 45 Book, first place was Cathy Medina, District 19. 46 (Applause.) 47 DEPARTMENT HISTORIAN RIOS: Okay. First Place 48 Picture Book, District 19 Jean Cooley-Desmeules. 49 (Applause.) 50 DEPARTMENT HISTORIAN RIOS: And I wish to give

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1 a -- I wish to give a special thank you to Harriet who 2 guided me through this voyage. 3 PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CLENDENIN: You did a 4 great job. 5 (Applause.) 6 DEPARTMENT HISTORIAN RIOS: And the three judges 7 were great, Estella Siegrist, Ellen Baundy, and the 8 expertise of Gigi Manno. 9 (Applause.) DEPARTMENT HISTORIAN RIOS: Madam President, 10 11 thank you so much. 12 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Thank you so much, 13 Dolly. 14 (Applause.) 15 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Okay. Could we 16 have the Sergeant-at-Arms and Marshal, Liz Doidge and 17 Susan Morgan, come give their -- are they here? 18 Okay. So while they are taking care of business 19 in the hallway, we're going to -- I'd like to take a 20 moment to -- I didn't introduce them yesterday because I -- you know, they're supposed to be doing all this for me, 21 22 but I forgot to give them their own gifts, so I didn't 23 want to do it until I had the gifts to give them. 24 These two ladies that I will present to you have 25 supported me in so many ways. Without their help I don't 26 know how I could get through the events. Т 33 don't know that I could ever thank you ladies enough. 34 So, ladies, could you please give a big hand to 35 my Personal Pages, Zana Chaney and Ann Sanchez. 36 (Applause.) 37 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Okay. Well, 38 while -- I don't even see her. Jolina Freeman has left 39 the building, so we'll have to wait on that. Let's 40 have -- let's move onto -- she's probably not in here 41 either because I don't see her either. Estella Avina, are 42 you here? 43 PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: There she is. 44 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Yeah, she's here. 45 Okay. Let's have Estella Avina come up with Judy and give 46 her report. 47 CONVENTION CHAIRMAN AVINA: Judy is missing. 48 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Okay. I know Judy is really busy out in the hall taking care of business. 49 50 If we can have Estella Avina, the Convention Chairman,

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1 come up. 2 CONVENTION CHAIRMAN AVINA: I don't hoe. 3 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: I could take that 4 really bad. 5 CONVENTION CHAIRMAN AVINA: No, that's okay. Win 6 a few, lose a fee. 7 8 CONVENTION CHAIRMAN CONVENTION REPORT 9 10 CONVENTION CHAIRMAN AVINA: Anyway, well, what do I have to say? My partner is outside. She's helping with 11 12 the luncheon. I was helping them too. I disappear from 13 time to time. Sorry. I tell you the boys I take care of: 14 Sorry. Okay. I'm sorry. Oh, you cannot hear me. 15 Seriously? 16 Okay. Anyway, welcome ladies. It is my 17 pleasure. I love doing this, believe it or not. It gets 18 me out of the house. No, I love doing it. I love seeing 19 all of you because it's my one and only time a year I get 20 to see a lot of the friends that I left since I moved to 21 Arizona. But that's why I continue to work with the 22 Auxiliary because I just love it. I love coming and 23 seeing my old friends. And they all know I'm a 24 whackadoodle, but that's okay. It comes with -- thank 25 you, sweetie. Thank you, Bonnie. Love you and I miss 26 your mommy. Anyway, you -- you were around when my husband dressed like a bear and danced with your mom on 27 28 stage in Fresno '91-'92, yes. Because her theme was 29 bears. So my husband dressed up like a bear and he danced 30 with Betty and that was his -- my husband danced with her 31 on stage because she loved to dance. Okay. Back to everything here. You know, we 32 33 hopefully tried to make everything comfortable for you. 34 We hope that there are no major problems, that everybody 35 is kind of having a good time. Aren't you? 36 (Applause.) 37 CONVENTION CHAIRMAN AVINA: Thank you. And I 38 want to introduce some people that, like I say, my side 39 kick isn't in here, but a lot of the gals from the 21st District, stand up. Come on, girls, come on. All of 40 41 these ladies worked very hard to make sure that they 42 supported our needs. And God love you all because I love 43 See how that works. you. 44 Anyway, so I also want to -- okay. All you gals 45 from other districts come in and they offer their help and 46 they say if you need our help, we're here. And they did. 47 And where is Ms. Jackie? Jackie, are you in the room? Where's my sister? Stand up, girl. She's taking care 48 49 of -- she's taking care of the Pages. Hey, wait until you 50 see me at the end of the summer. You'll know we're

1 sisters. Right, Jackie? Thank you, honey. I love you. 2 Anyway, you know, everybody here is just helpful 3 and, you know, they're just good friends and I enjoy every 4 bit of it. And thank you for the pleasure of doing your 5 6 convention, Madam President, El Capitan. You're the 7 captain. You should be. Okay. And Sue Tozier for taking 8 over the banquet. At the end of the banquet you can thank 9 If it goes good, thank her. The Past President's her. luncheon of course is Judy. And I just thank all of you 10 that were there for me. That's it, Madam President. 11 12 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Thank you so much. 13 (Applause.) 14 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Is the 15 Sergeant-at-Arms and Marshal here? Are they still 16 outside? Oh, here comes -- here comes the 17 Sergeant-at-Arms. Okay. So now we will have the Sergeant-at-Arms 18 19 and Marshal, Elizabeth Doidge and Susan Morgan, give their 20 report, please. 21 22 SERGEANT-AT-ARMS AND MARSHAL CONVENTION REPORT 23 24 SERGEANT-AT-ARMS DOIDGE: Good morning, everyone. 25 I'm so sorry about the tail. I have to relax for a 26 second. So I had a lot of trouble coming up with what to 27 say today after what I said at DEC. I think I outdid 28 myself at DEC, so I was, like, crud. So I finally got 29 this done I think Tuesday morning and we left Tuesday 30 evening, so we'll see. 31 Until 1912 there was no set design for the stars 32 and stripes. Hidden in older versions of the flag, its 33 markers laid hints of the country's history and quest for 34 identity. Aptly, given its national anthem is about the 35 flag, the stars and stripes is a key part of America's 36 identity. It hangs in classrooms and courtrooms, on state buildings, and suburban porches. 37 38 It has been the national flag since 1777. And the flag that inspired the anthem was enormous, measuring 39 40 30 feet by 42 feet. It was raised over Baltimore's Fort 41 McHenry during the War of 1812. Its 15 broad stripes and 42 15 bright stars inspired Francis Scott Key to write The 43 Star Spangled Banner, the song that became The National 44 Anthem. But before then half of the flag's 234-year 45 history, there was no official design. The arrangement 46 and appearance of the stars was up to the maker, and that 47 makes it an artwork in a way that other nation's flag are. It's to do with this -- it's to do with this peculiar fact 48 49 that they didn't standardize the design, so you could 50 express different things within each flag.

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Generally speaking, a flag is a flag. It's like a number plate or a logo. It always stays the same. But America -- but in America it didn't, which left room for people to express their creativity or their bile or their sadness.

6 So what are the hidden messages in these notable 7 The basic symbolism of the first flag was 13 stars flags? 8 in the form of a constellation and 13 stripes. Both of 9 those counts reflected the number of original colonies. Multiple stars forming a single constellation was symbolic 10 of the colonies coming together to form a new nation, and 11 12 stars were added as more states joined the union. But 13 they never specified what the constellation was supposed to be. 14

With no official design until 1912, some flag makers arranged the stars into one big star or in a circle or in rows. And some replaced a state's star with its initial to show where their sympathies lay. The many and varied designs encapsulate American individualism in flag form.

21 The Civil War era flag is a stark illustration of 22 the -- stark illustration of the north/south divide at 23 this turbulent moment in this American history. The Green 24 Mountain Boys was a nickname for a Vermont military unit 25 who used it to express her anger against the south. Some 26 flags only showed 20 stars, though there should have been 27 34 or 35. Or at the tail end of the war it should have 28 had 36 stars. The maker has done something that Abraham 29 Lincoln said specifically not to do, which was remove the 30 southern states from the flag during the war.

It is surmised that the maker had lost a son or sons in the conflict and so they said no, these guys are out; I'm not going to include those stars when I make it.

34 This flag, made soon after the Civil War of 1861 35 to 1865, comes from the defeated South. Sorry. This one 36 comes from the defeated south. The stars are configured 37 in a southern cross buried in the design of this flag. 38 That was a subtle way of displaying southern sympathies. 39 They're hiding the confederate battle flag within the stars and stripes. It's as if to say we have been 40 41 forcibly incorporated into the United States, but we still 42 feel southern.

43 As long as you had the right number of stars, you 44 could configure it however you wanted. The most famous 45 American flag of all is a huge banner from almost 200 46 years ago that hung at Fort McHenry. And the most notable 47 aspect of its design is its sheer size. In 1814 the U.S. 48 was again at war with its former colonial ruler. In an 49 attack expected on Baltimore, the commanding officer of 50 Fort McHenry requested a flag so large that the British

would have no difficulty seeing it from a distance, as well as to spook the enemy. He hoped it would also rally the spirits of Baltimore's citizens and soldiers alike. It took Maryland flag maker Mary Pickersgill and her young assistants weeks to sew short strips of wool bunting into the 42-foot flag that would become known as the Star Spangled Banner.

8 Several decades after the flag design was set in 9 stone, Jasper Johns adopted it as a favorite subject. 10 White flag -- no, it's supposed to be that way. White 11 flag from 1955 now hangs in New York's Metropolitan Museum 12 of Art. By painting the flag he expressed how he felt 13 about America. He painted this in the McCarthyist period. 14 Johns was never explicit about the message of his 15 paintings, but observers liken the whited-out stars and 16 stripes to the right-wing patriots suspicion of America's 17 diversity.

18 Under the painting is a collage of beeswax and 19 scraps of newsprint torn from the headlines and articles, 20 adverts and letters to the editor. It's believed that the 21 idea was that all the many -- that all the many voices of 22 America were being submerged beneath the idea of a single 23 nation represented by the flag. It's the conflict between 24 trying to make America a nation and allowing it to be 25 millions of people all expressing their own difference.

26 Johns used the flag because of the U.S. -- Johns used the flag because in the U.S., it is an everyday 27 28 object rather than one brought out for special occasions 29 such as football matches or royal weddings as in the U.K. 30 If you go to Spain or England or Scotland, there may be an 31 occasional flag often tied to idea of separatism, but in 32 America it's everywhere. It is such a huge continent so 33 the flag becomes a point of coherence, a rallying point. 34 And underneath its apparent uniformity, the flag has 35 always been a focus for statements that don't quite toe 36 the patriotic line. It's very interesting that something 37 as uniform as a flag could be adapted to express such 38 different aspects of the American conflict and life. 39 Thank you.

(Applause.)

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Thank you so much.

I love you guys a lot. 20 (Applause.) 21 HONORARY DEPARTMENT JUNIOR PRESIDENT FREEMAN: 22 And I would be remiss if I didn't mention this person. 23 And I stress her out a lot, but I know she loves me. My 24 aunt sitting over there in the corner not paying attention 25 to me. 26 (Applause.) 27 HONORARY DEPARTMENT JUNIOR PRESIDENT FREEMAN: Т 28 see her. She's kind of ignoring me. It's okay. But 29 she's been there through everything and I don't know what 30 I would do without her waking me up in the morning to go to school, reminding me to send out emails to my chairmen. 31 32 And I love you and I appreciate everything you've done. 33 (Applause.) HONORARY DEPARTMENT JUNIOR PRESIDENT FREEMAN: 34 35 And Ms. Ann Philcox and Susie Tozier can come up here, 36 please, if they're in the room. Okay. The first one is 37 for -- sorry. The committee agreed upon the following report. 30 31 Meeting was called to order at 10:30 a.m. Roll call was 32 taken. There were 17 delegates and six guests. Susie 33 reported on the Legislative Awareness Assembly in 34 Washington D.C. It was reported that this was a memorable 35 event walking the halls of the House of Representative. 36 She recommends this for others to attend. There is in 37 March an event for the State Representatives. 38 The code was read. There were no changes. The 39 following awards were presented: Second Place Best District Report, District 22. The Girls State enrollment and registration fees shall be recommended annually by the 43 44 Girls State Committee after the review of the previous 45 year's budget, expenses, and current bids received from 46 colleges, for the following administrative year. The 47 enrollment and registration fees shall be recommended at 48 the Midyear Department Executive Committee meeting for 49 approval at the Department Convention." 50 Any discussion?

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1 (No response.) 2 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Hearing none, all 3 those in favor, say aye. 4 ALL PRESENT: Aye. 5 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Opposed say no. 6 (No response.) 7 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Motion carried. 8 Thank you. 9 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN KIRKLAND: Code 16 current code now reads, 16a: "Shall select registered nurses, 10 secure chief counselor and personnel for the sessions. 11 12 Invitations shall be sent out three months prior to 13 convention. They shall be furnished identification badges 14 containing the name and insignia of the ALA which shall be 15 visible at all times." 16 The proposed change will read, 16a: "Shall 17 select registered nurses and secure chief counselor 18 immediately after the current Girls State session. 19 Invitations shall be sent out six months prior to 20 convention for other personnel. They shall be furnished identification badges containing the name and insignia of 21 22 the ALA which shall be visible at all times." 23 By the direction of the committee I move to adopt 24 Code 16a with the proposed change. 25 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: There's a proposed 26 change for 16a which should read: "Shall select 27 registered nurses and secure chief counselor immediately 28 after the current Girls State session. Invitations shall 29 be sent out six months prior to convention for other 30 personnel. They shall be furnished identification badges 31 containing the name and insignia of the ALA which shall be 32 visible at all times." 33 Any discussion? If you have discussion, please 34 come to the microphone. 35 (No response.) 36 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Hearing none, all 37 those in favor, say aye. 38 ALL PRESENT: Aye. 39 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Those opposed? 40 (No response.) 41 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Motion carried. 42 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN KIRKLAND: There were no 43 resolutions pertaining to Girls State. There were three 44 recommendations, to expand Code 16 to include all 45 director's responsibilities, add to signature packet 46 information regarding reimbursement to fees to unit if the 47 delegate leaves early, and comment a -- recommendation to conference with legal counsel regarding definition and 48 49 inclusion of gender wording in codes. 50 A listing of all awards has been given to all

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1 district delegates, the Girls State Committee, the 2 Department President, and those seated upon the stage. A 3 copy of the list will be posted in the Department 4 Convention Office and it has been posted. 5 Madam President, may I continues with my report? 6 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Yes, you may. 7 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN KIRKLAND: This year Girls 8 State focused on mainly some small changes that we needed 9 to implement after last year. After having had the position for a year previously and learning so much, fine 10 11 tuning was needed as suggested by Unit, Chairmen, and the 12 Committee. We had a few kinks with the website, but once 13 it was up, I found it very easy to use. 14 Changes that were implemented last session 15 include two meal times, allowed us to accommodate more 16 girls; daily flag raising and flag lowering ceremonies; 17 and the Circle of Light Ceremony. All of those were suggestions that we found at the leadership conference in 18 19 Indianapolis. 20 We added a couple of new questions for the girls 21 on the online application because that was suggested at 22 the National Girls State Leadership Conference, was to 23 help us identify if we have any delegates with currently 24 active duty or deployed family members. 25 As suggested by Unit Chairmen, we added lines 26 onto the signature packet to help identify the girls more, 27 school name and phone number. We also made sure to make 28 the signature packet match the code and put in a signature 29 line for Unit Chairmen. Many Unit Chairmen did not notice this addition and skipped it. Please get the word out 30 31 that we like the Unit Chairmen to check and verify the 32 signature packets for completeness. 33 Fourteen grants were offered by the Alumnae, but 34 not many were taken. We had \$1800 donated to the Girls 35 State General Fund that could have gone directly to units 36 if they are struggling. Remember there are four full 37 grants available to new schools and there are also ten 38 matches grants available to units that are struggling 39 financially to support all of the schools they are 40 sending. Ann Kelley, Assistant Director, has been in 41 42 charge of the 75th Anniversary Committee. We are having our Diamond Jubilee 75th Girls State in 2018. Ann has a 43 44 table in the lobby with earrings, necklaces, and pins for 45 sale. 46 If you did not attend DEC, you may not have known 47 that our state Samsung winner, Sadie Mae Mace, Unit 50, 48 District 16 was an overall Samsung winner of \$20,000. 49 (Applause.) 50 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN KIRKLAND: Currently we have

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1 524 delegates to attend the 2017 Girls State session 2 starting this Monday. It's a small increase from last 3 year's session. 275 of these delegates are eligible to 4 become members. 275, ladies. I always encourage the 5 girls to give back to their units by joining them in 6 membership. I am a member again because of the Girls 7 State. Twenty-one delegates are currently members of our 8 organization. 9 Some things I would like to touch on from my 10 end-of-year reports. Eight units reported sponsoring a delegate for the first time within the last three years. 11 12 Eighty-five units invited eligible American Legion Auxiliary Girls State delegates to join their units. 13 14 Thirty-five eligible ALA Girls State delegates joined the 15 ALA, and we received \$4,210 in donations from units. 16 I have had 68 and counting reservations dropped 17 from the list, with two that are already paid for 18 delegates and not having alternates that could attend. We 19 have had 22 delegates drop out. And those were the ones 20 that were covered by alternates. Four units were awarded 21 grants by the Girls State Alumnae Foundation for a total 22 of \$2200. 23 Madam President, at this point I would like to 24 present three special awards. And a list of all awards 25 given at the committee meeting has been provided. 26 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Okay. Thank you. 27 Go ahead. 28 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN KIRKLAND: My first award 29 goes to the unit that sponsored the most girls. I want to 30 thank Unit 161 in District 9 for continuing to support the 31 Girls State program. This year they are sending 18 32 delegates under the chairmanship of Roseann Vicky Bean, my 33 district. 34 (Applause.) 35 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN KIRKLAND: This year I have 36 chosen Judith Samples, District 25. Judith Samples. And 37 she just said it's all because I was her junior when I was 38 little. I was a junior before I left for a few years and 39 she was my -- she was in charge of me as a junior, so --40 (Applause.) 41 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN KIRKLAND: And my final 42 award goes to the Unit Chairman with an outstanding unit supplemental. This year I have chosen Unit 43, District 43 44 24, Chairman Tamara Brown. 45 (Applause.) 46 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN KIRKLAND: Madam President, 47 I would like to thank you for this appointment. This 48 program has had a huge part of my life for the last 18 years when I attended Girls State in 1999, so you can add 49 50 up how old I am. I would like to introduce our committee.

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1 We have our Director Dona Enright. 2 (Applause.) 3 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN KIRKLAND: Our Assistant 4 Director Ann Kelley. 5 (Applause.) 6 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN KIRKLAND: Our Girls State 7 Advisor Nancy Brown-Park. 8 (Applause.) 9 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN KIRKLAND: Our Girls State 10 Nurse Elizabeth Tomlin. 11 (Applause.) GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN KIRKLAND: Our One-Year 12 13 Member Kathy Smith. 14 (Applause.) 15 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN KIRKLAND: Our Two-Year 16 Member Becky Bullard. 17 (Applause.) 18 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN KIRKLAND: Our Three-Year 19 Member Tammy Sollazzo. 20 (Applause.) 21 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN KIRKLAND: Our President's 22 Alternate Gloria Sinopoli. 23 (Applause.) 24 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN KIRKLAND: And our Vice 25 President Alternate Zana Chaney. 26 (Applause.) 27 GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN KIRKLAND: Madam President, 28 this concludes the Girls State Chairman's report. GIRLS STATE DIRECTOR ENRIGHT: Thank you so much. 29 30 Last year I got a comment that they couldn't see me over 31 the podium, so I'm standing to the side. Okay. Thank God 32 you can see me. 33 Good morning everybody, members. As Elissa said, 34 this year we have 524 delegates for Girls State that will 35 be arriving on Monday to attend the session. And this 36 year we will also have all air conditioned buildings. 37 (Applause.) 38 GIRLS STATE DIRECTOR ENRIGHT: Of course we have 39 to move for food off campus to the campus next door 40 because now they're rehabilitating that building. First 41 of all I want to thank Judy Tabachi who just stepped up to 42 become a sitting mom yesterday. 43 (Applause.) 44 GIRLS STATE DIRECTOR ENRIGHT: And then today 45 forgot she had a doctor's appointment for her eyes so will 46 not be attending after all. So we -- so we are still 47 short one sitting mom. If you can come for three days, 48 I'll take you. If you can come for the rest of the term, 49 I don't care. We'll get you trained and you will enjoy it 50 so much that you will be back next year.

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The schedule for June of 2018 -- oh, wait 1 Okay. 2 a minute. I can't even read my own writing. Anyway, I 3 just want to thank everybody for everything. We have made 4 contact with Sacramento State again, so I will be helping them review that and then it will be turned over to the 5 6 new crew to see if we can move Girls State more midstate. 7 (Applause.) 8 GIRLS STATE DIRECTOR ENRIGHT: Thank you, Madam 9 President, for this appointment and I'll see you next week 10 at Girls State. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: 11 Thank you so much. 12 (Applause.) 13 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Okay. Dee Ann is 14 going to wait and give her Community Service after lunch 15 because we have to break at a certain time for the Past Presidents Parley luncheon. So we're going to have our 16 17 Past President Parley Chairman Anita Biggs give her 18 report. 19 20 PAST PRESIDENTS PARLEY CONVENTION REPORT 21 22 PPP CHAIRMAN BIGGS: I'm not even going to try to 23 get that low. Those days are over. 24 Madam President, the Convention Committee on Past 25 Presidents Parley met on June 22nd, 2017 in room Raincross E of the Riverside Convention Center right here in 26 27 Riverside. The statistical report of this Chairman 28 appears on page 56 of the Book of Reports. 29 Glenda Schultz, thank you, District 6 was 30 appointed secretary. Susan Baker, District 28, offered 31 prayer, and Tracy Varnell, Little Fercho, from District 16 32 was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. Yeah, Little Fercho. 33 That's her new name. She's going to change her name. 34 She's going to be Little Fercho. A total of 16 District 35 Delegates answered roll call. There were five visitors 36 present. 37 The committee agreed upon the following report. 38 The code was read with no code changes. There were no 39 resolutions. Committee recommended that nurse 40 practitioners be considered for scholarship consideration, 41 and I will pass this information on to next the chairman. 42 100 percent reporting awards were given to 43 District 6, 10, 12, 18, 21, 24, 27, 28 and 29. Second and 44 third place awards along with honorable mention was given 45 to units and districts. District 6 and 28 were awarded 46 for starting new unit parleys. Give them a big round of 47 applause. 48 (Applause.) 49 PPP CHAIRMAN BIGGS: With no further business the 50 meeting was closed with prayer and adjourned at 10:00 a.m.

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1 Madam President, can I continue with my 2 supplemental and awards, please? 3 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Yes. 4 PPP CHAIRMAN BIGGS: Would all honorees please 5 attend -- assemble in the back with Linda Workman if 6 you're in the room, all luncheon honorees. 7 Madam President, thank you for your motto of, 8 "Serving Veterans From Sea to Shining Sea." I want to 9 first say that this year we had 100 percent district reporting. By hook or by crook, I got you all to report. 10 Thank you so much. This allowed the Poseidon Adventure of 11 12 our Queens of the Sea, our Past Presidents a great 13 platform to recognize active duty servicewomen, honor 14 female veterans, observe outstanding unit members, and 15 seek out students entering our continuing nursing school. 16 We have three new Past President Parleys reported 17 this year. This year found Past President Parleys hosting 18 Valentine's Day parties, with a special party at the West 19 LA VA Medical Center Naomi House for transitioning 20 homeless female veterans with 45 goodie bags filled with 21 hygiene items, pajamas, sweats, scarves, books and gift 22 cards. 23 Many parleys led the way honoring female veterans 24 and active duty servicewomen by hosting luncheons, giving 25 flowers, cards, gift certificates and paying their dues. 26 Other units adopted female veterans by providing them with 27 many comfort items, clothing, pajamas, slippers, scarves, 28 gift cards, hats and coats. Two Unit Parleys helped host 29 an all-female veterans Stand Down in their county. 30 One unit Parley visited a local center that 31 assists homeless female veterans and gave them a special luncheon. The city's vice mayor and councilman were 32 33 invited and presented a special proclamation to the 34 center. All the veterans in attendance received a very 35 special gift bag from the Past Presidents. 36 Another unit Parley held a joint dinner with the 37 Legion and celebrated generations of past and present 38 female veterans. They all wore their uniforms and each 39 told their military story. And this event was published 40 in their newspaper. 41 Units held very unique and creative fundraisers, 42 so I wanted to share with you on the department nursing scholarship one unit parley held a crazy 1 cent/400 cents 43 opportunity drawing. I never heard of that either. 44 45 Tickets are picked that have from 1 cent to 400 cents 46 which is paid at that initial time. Then three lucky 47 recipients were drawn and won \$100 each. This event 48 raised \$592 for nurses' scholarships. 49 Another unit held a gift card extravaganza 50 fundraiser where the winners all receive gift cards. And

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1 this event raised \$410. We received so many qualified 2 nursing school applicants and have awarded \$10,000 in 3 scholarships. That's all from you, ladies. 4 (Applause.) 5 PPP CHAIRMAN BIGGS: With the top applicant 6 receiving \$4,000. All gualified applicants were awarded a 7 portion of the remaining budget. It is through your 8 generous donations that we can continue awarding these 9 excellent students with some much needed financial 10 assistance. 11 Active duty servicewomen deserve an award for all 12 they do, and this year we are awarding two state winners, 13 one representing the Army National Guard and one the U.S. 14 Navy, both highly qualified and excellent contributors to 15 their communities. The two department winners were 16 forwarded to National for further review. 17 The Department President has the honor of selecting the Unit Member of the Year, and there were many 18 19 submissions which made her job very difficult. And it 20 took her quite a long time to get the submission to me, 21 but thank you, Madam President. 22 The Unit Member of the Year, \$4,000 scholarship 23 winner, and the active duty servicewoman winners have been 24 invited to attend our Department Past President Parley 25 luncheon where they will be guests of honor. I'm so proud that we are all here. It is apparent that California Past 26 27 Presidents continue to contribute with their leadership 28 and assistance in the welfare of our many unit members. 29 Madam President, this concludes my remarks. May 30 I continue with my first place awards and present the Unit 31 Member of the Year, the \$4,000 scholarship winner, and the 32 two outstanding Active Duty Servicewomen of the Year to 33 this delegation? 34 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Yes, you may. 35 PPP CHAIRMAN BIGGS: Thank you. The First Place 36 Best Unit Past Presidents Parley overall program goes to 37 Carol Yates, Chairman, Monterey Cypress Unit 694, District 38 28. 39 (Applause.) 40 PPP CHAIRMAN BIGGS: And the First Place Best 41 District Past President Parley Overall Program goes to Ms. 42 Susan Baker, District 28, Chairman. 43 (Applause.) 44 PPP CHAIRMAN BIGGS: 28, they're rocking it. I'm 45 telling you. Great job. Thank you, Susan. 46 It is my pleasure to present to you, Madam 47 President and our delegation, the \$4,000 nurses 48 scholarship winner Ms. Renee Harvey. 49 Will the Sergeant-at-Arms and Marshal and the 50 Distinguished Guest Chairman bring Renee Harvey to the

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1 front. 2 (Processional.) 3 PPP CHAIRMAN BIGGS: Renee is in her second 4 semester at Maurine Church Coburn School of Nursing in 5 Monterey, California. An excellent student, she is 6 described as a nurse we would all love to have. You will 7 hear -- I'll get teared up. You will hear more about 8 Renee at our luncheon. So for now, please give Renee a 9 big round of applause. 10 (Applause.) 11 PPP CHAIRMAN BIGGS: Madam -- oh, are you guys --12 you guys are slow. Linda, you normally would be in the 13 back already. 14 Madam President, these next two heroes are just 15 that and we could not be prouder to honor these two women. 16 Would the Sergeant-at-Arms and Marshal please escort our 17 two Active Duty Servicewomen of the Year. 18 (Processional.) 19 PPP CHAIRMAN BIGGS: I'll let you go down once I 20 introduce you. Oh, they're going to go down there. May I present to you, Madam President and the delegation, First 21 22 Lieutenant Jawana McFadden representing the United States 23 Army National Guard. 24 (Applause.) 25 PPP CHAIRMAN BIGGS: Jawana is from District 23. (Applause.) 26 27 PPP CHAIRMAN BIGGS: And Admin Leading Petty 28 Officer Susana Saenz representing the United States Navy. 29 (Applause.) PPP CHAIRMAN BIGGS: From District 30. You will 30 31 also hear more about these wonderful women at our 32 luncheon. So, ladies, please have a seat. Thank you very 33 much. (Applause.) 34 35 PPP CHAIRMAN BIGGS: And, Madam President, now it 36 is my distinct pleasure to present to you our 2017 Unit 37 Member of the Year. Will the Sergeant-at-Arms and Marshal 38 please escort Ms. Stephanie Janji. 39 (Processional.) 40 PPP CHAIRMAN BIGGS: All right. Thank you. Have a great 16 convention. Oh, here. Everybody smile. We're going to 17 get you in the background. Don't want to take a picture 18 of the wall. Thank you, ladies. Have a great convention. 19 (Applause.) 20 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: I would like to 21 thank you both. You represent so much to us, and this is 22 a little something for you a little later. Thank you very 23 much, Michael. He's from my post and District 6. 24 NATIONAL COMMANDER ELECT FOX: Well, surprised 25 they're giving me a microphone. Wendy, in case you 26 haven't heard, you put a microphone in front of me, you 27 may not get it back. 28 You know, just to reiterate what Commander 29 Parsons said, without the Auxiliary, without a doubt 50 percent of our squadrons would go away. It's because of 30 31 what you guys do to help us that enables us to do what we 32 do for The American Legion Family. Without your support, 33 we would not be as successful as we are. My unit, 521, 34 has supported me for 39 years. 35 (Applause.) 36 NATIONAL COMMANDER ELECT FOX: And the biggest 37 challenge will be coming up very shortly. In 2020 38 California will have another National Commander at the 39 podium. 40 (Applause.) 41 NATIONAL COMMANDER ELECT FOX: So on behalf of 42 the Detachment of California, I truly thank you very much. 43 And I would also like to extend an invitation to you, 44 Wendy, to come over and visit us any time you'd like. And 45 that's an executive decision. Sorry, Mr. Parsons. 46 SAL DETACHMENT COMMANDER PARSONS: No. 47 NATIONAL COMMANDER ELECT FOX: Because quite 48 frankly at this point he's not a Past Detachment 49 Commander, he's the sitting Commander, but us DEC's just 50 have to kind of make decisions for him sometimes. But he

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1 has had a tremendous year. The Sons are at an all-time 2 high in membership. 3 (Applause.) 4 NATIONAL COMMANDER ELECT FOX: And it's all because of the team. I told Matt last year before he got 5 6 elected, it doesn't matter what you do, it's the team 7 around you. The Sons have been on a rampage the last few years growing in membership, the camaraderie. There is no 8 9 division anymore in the State of California. We are one 10 unit working together for a common goal, and that's to 11 make The American Legion Family better. Thank you. 12 (Applause.) 13 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Thank you so, so 14 much. One more hug. 15 (Processional.) 16 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Okay. The 17 chairmen giving their reports after nominations will be 18 Dee Ann Graham for Community Service, Tamra Duron for 19 Constitution & Bylaws, and our Junior Conference and 20 Activities Director Ann Philcox and Mindy Sinclair. Could 21 you please come to the stage. 22 At this time we will proceed with the nominations 23 for Department Officers, Junior Member of Finance, and 24 Delegates and Alternates to the National Convention. If 25 there is no objections, this Chair will open the 26 nominations. Oh, okay. Okay. So can we have someone 27 come up for Department President. Who is presenting for 28 Department President? Nominations are open for Department 29 President. 30 DISTRICT 16 PRESIDENT OCLARAY: Madam President, 31 I am Terry Oclaray, District 16 President, and I'm here to 32 proudly nominate for the position of Department President 33 Loretta Marsh. And I have her bio here. 34 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Okay. 35 DISTRICT 16 PRESIDENT OCLARAY: Okay. Loretta 36 Marsh's eligibility is through her husband of 55 years, 37 Harold, a World War II and Korean War veteran. They have 38 three children, seven grandchildren and two great 39 grandchildren. She is endorsed by Corporal Marshal M. Braden Unit 56 in District 16. 40 41 Through the almost 30 years of membership she has 42 served multiple terms as president of her unit, as well as 43 all unit officers and chairmen positions. She has served 44 as District President in 2004-2005 and multiple 45 chairmanships on the district level. She has served the 46 department for 11 years as a Personal Page, Marshal, two 47 terms as Chaplain, Chairman of Community Service, Americanism, Poppy, National Security, Children & Youth, 48 49 Veterans Affair & Rehabilitation, Membership, and as Vice 50 President.

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1 She has served her community by volunteer work in 2 her church and other veteran organizations, schools, and 3 hospitals. She is dedicated to serving those who have 4 served in our military. Thank you. 5 (Applause.) 6 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Are there any 7 further nominations for Department President? 8 (No response.) 9 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Hearing none, 10 nominations for Department President are now closed. 11 (Applause.) 12 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Nominations are 13 now open for the office of Department Vice President. The 14 chair recognizes Marcia Munroe, District 11 President. DISTRICT 11 PRESIDENT MUNROE: 15 Hello, I'm Marcia 16 Munroe, District 11 President and a member of Unit 249. 17 On behalf of District 11 and McCall-Grisham 249, I take 18 pride in nominating Joan Cannon for Department Vice 19 President for the year 2017-2018. 20 Joan has been a member of The American Legion 21 Auxiliary for 32 years. Her eligibility is through her ex-husband, Vietnam veteran, her father, J.W. Holloway, a 22 23 World War II, Korea, Vietnam veteran and a retired chief 24 petty officer from the U.S. Navy, and her son, David 25 Cannon, a Desert Storm veteran having served in the U.S. 26 Navy as a submariner. 27 Joan has one son, two granddaughters, and two 28 deceased grandsons. Joan is a member of McCall-Grisham 29 Unit 249 in District 11. Joan served as president of her unit, District 11, and held most district chairmanships. 30 31 She is a point of contact for District 11 and she has 32 been -- she's been instrumental in helping many of the 33 units in District 11 with their taxes. 34 Joan has held the following department 35 chairmanships: Elections, Public Relations, Community 36 Service, Children & Youth, and Veterans Affairs & Rehabilitation. Joan is a credit to The American Legion 37 38 Auxiliary. 39 Joan is retired from the Defense Logistics Agency 40 after serving 30 years as a defense distribution center 41 San Joaquin and distribution center New Cumberland, 42 Pennsylvania. During her career she has held many 43 leadership positions. Her analytical and critical 44 thinking skills are some of the reasons Joan will make an 45 extraordinary vice president. 46 McCall-Grisham Unit 249 and District 11, along 47 with her family and friends, are thrilled to nominate Joan 48 Cannon for Vice President the Department of California. 49 Thank you. 50 (Applause.)

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1 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Are there any 2 further nominations for the Department Office of Vice 3 President? 4 (No response.) 5 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Hearing none, 6 nominations for Department Vice President are now closed. 7 Nominations for are now open for the office of 8 Department Junior Member of Finance. The Chair recognizes 9 Deloris Artis from District 24. 10 DISTRICT 24 PRESIDENT ARTIS: Good afternoon. Martha Romano is running for the office of Junior Member 11 12 of Finance. She's currently serving as the unit president 13 of American Legion Auxiliary Unit 283 in the 24th 14 District. She has been an active member for three years. 15 She qualifies for membership in the Auxiliary under her 16 husband, Jerry L. Romano of nine years, a Panama and 17 Desert Storm War veteran who served in the United States 18 Marine Corps. Her three daughters and her mother-in-law 19 are members. Her father-in-law, a Vietnam veteran who 20 served in the United States Army, is a member of Palisades 21 Post 283 and one son is a member of the Sons of the Legion 22 Squadron 283. 23 Martha has served on several committees in her 24 unit and has held the chairmanship for Community Service, 25 Children & Youth, and Poppy at the district level. Angel Van Glider, Unit 318, Sandy Jacob, Unit 149. 16 17 District 14, Gloria Jean Sinopoli, Unit 147 and Ellen McClurg, Unit 147. 18 19 DISTRICT 14 PRESIDENT SINOPOLI: Madam Secretary, 20 Gloria Jean Sinopoli, District 14 President. We need to 21 change our alternate. 22 SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: Okay. 23 DISTRICT 14 PRESIDENT SINOPOLI: We're going to 24 change it to Debbie Herado. 25 SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: At least I know 26 how to spell that this time. 27 DISTRICT 14 PRESIDENT SINOPOLI: Yes. 28 SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: Thank you. 29 DISTRICT 14 PRESIDENT SINOPOLI: Thank you. 30 SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: District 15, Dee 31 Ann Graham, Unit 26 and Zana Chaney, Unit 124. District 32 16, Darlene Duncan, Unit 502 and Linda Fercho, Unit 741. 33 District 17, pass. District 18, Pamela Dixon Hicks, Unit 34 790 and Teresa Lugo-Nunez, Unit 291. 35 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: 261. 36 SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: 261. Sorry. My 37 glasses are not good. Okay. Back to you. All right. 38 Unit District 19, Jean Cooley-Desmeules, 314 and Sheraton 39 Green, Unit 496. District 20, Nancy Heinisch, Unit 507, 40 and Roberta Estes, 507. 41 DISTRICT 20 PRESIDENT HEINISCH: Madam Secretary, 42 we're going to change the alternate to Linda Hayes, 348. 43 SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: From Roberta 44 Thank you. Okay. District 21 Susan Romero, Unit Estes? 45 742 and Leslie Vondra, Unit 519. District 22 the delegate 46 is a blank and we have June Coatney, Unit 460 as an 47 alternate. District 23, Anita Biggs, 252, and Gloria Williams, 252. District 24, Deloris Artis, 283, and 48 49 Marsha Romero, 283. District 25, Donna Scott, 422, and we 50 will be removing Diane DeLashmit as the alternate as she

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1 will be taking the place of the secretary. 2 District 26, Linda Workman, Unit 472 and Louann 3 Johnston, 595. District 27, LuAnn Capazzi, 684 and Danielle White, 118. District 28 passes. District 29, 4 5 Carol Borgman, Unit 277 and Pat Alvarez, 277. District 30 6 passes. The way I count it we have 24 delegates and we 7 are authorized 19. 8 DISTRICT 25 PRESIDENT GRANADO: Ruby? Ruby, 9 District -- Marie Granado, District 25. A total of 22 district delegates 35 answered roll call. Seven visitors were present. 36 The committee agreed to the following report. No 37 changes to the code. Those Mollys also donated baby 6 items, blankets, towels, wash cloths, toys, and hygiene 7 items to a women center. Some members are docents at 8 local missions and museums. Our Auxiliary members are 9 very active in the American Cancer Relay For Life as 10 survivors, a team member, or part of the pre-event 11 volunteer. 12 This year our state afire which devastated many 13 of the mountain county communities. Our Molly Malones 14 were there donating water, supplying blankets, hygiene 15 items and clothing. One unit partnered with their post along with the Halliburton serving a \$5 lunch and raised 16 17 thousands of dollars for those veterans in the nearby -excuse me. Nearby mountain community. 18 One Molly Malone unit organized a team and 19 20 participated in a March Of Dimes walk at the state's 21 capitol, the March For Babies, which benefits pregnant 22 women, unborn and premature babies. They emailed and 23 Facebooked invitations to family and friends to 24 participate and/or to donate to the community's event. 25 During the summer a Molly reported holding two 26 drives, one for food and the other for school supplies. 27 The food was delivered to a pantry at the VA hospital and 28 a naval weapons station, then helped three veterans trying 29 to establish items for their apartments. The school 30 supplies collected were given to two local schools. This 31 outreach in their community allows them to demonstrate who 32 we are and what our mission is and creates goodwill. 33 Mollys reported members assisting seniors and 34 neighbors with transportation and errands, giving care 35 packages where needed and taking meals to those who were 36 ill, disabled, and elderly. 37 Our Molly Malones worked very hard to make their 38 community a better place to live. Our work sometimes goes 39 unnoticed, like cleaning churches, placing flags on 40 graves, volunteering in thrift stores, food pantries, and 41 contributing to animal shelters and animal organizations. 42 They continue to collect can pull-tabs which enables a 43 family to stay one night at Ronald McDonald House. 44 Additional Community Service included members 45 donating to and networking with other agencies such as the 46 Election Board, Women's Clubs, League of Voters, Easter 47 Seals, Civic Councils, DAR, Lung Association, Boys and 48 Girls Scouts, Children's Miracle Network, Paralyzed 49 Veterans, and Salvation Army. 50 Everyone is a Molly Malone whether we realize it

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1 or not. We do the things we do because that is who we 2 are. I am sure our Mollys did not -- I'm sure some of our 3 Mollys did not report every hour or the monies spent. 4 They don't even know how many lives they have touched. 5 There is no real conclusion to this report because our 6 Molly Malones will continue to serve our veterans and 7 community for as long as there is a need. The statistical 8 report outlines their works, but the stories each district 9 chairman shared and wrote meant so much more. 10 Madam President, may I present to you -- I have 11 an honorable mention and our first place winners. 12 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: You may. 13 COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Honorable 14 Mention goes to Marion Rocha-Carlos, District 16, Unit 15 211. 16 (Applause.) 17 COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Unit First 18 Place, Placentia District 29, Carol Chavez. 19 (Applause.) 20 COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: And First 21 Place District 16, Connie Bieger, Chairman. 22 (Applause.) 23 COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Madam 24 President, that concludes my report. 25 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Thank you so much, 26 Dee Ann. 27 (Applause.) 28 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Okay. Now we'll hear from Tamra Duron, the Constitution & Bylaws Chairman. 29 30 And if we can have the Junior Conference Director and the 31 Americanism Chairman please come up here and sit so they 32 get ready to hop in there and get it done. 33 34 CONSTITUTION & BYLAWS CONVENTION REPORT 35 36 CONSTITUTION & BYLAWS CHAIRMAN DURON: Good 37 afternoon, Madam President. 38 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Yes, good 39 afternoon. CONSTITUTION & BYLAWS CHAIRMAN DURON: 40 The 41 Constitution & Bylaws committee met on June 22nd, 2017 in 42 Ballroom B of the Riverside Convention Center. The 43 statistical report of this chairman appears on page 48 of the Book of Reports. Debbie Fletcher from District 25 was 44 appointed Secretary, Pilar Reyes, District 10, was 45 appointed Chaplain, and Linda Diebel from District 19 was 46 47 appointed Sergeant-At-Arms. 48 The Chaplain offered prayer, the members recited 49 the Pledge of Allegiance. Roll call was answered by 16 50 delegates and there were six guests. 100 percent

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1 reporting certificates were given to Districts 5, 6, 7, 2 10, 11, 14, 17, 18, 19, 21, 22, 23, 24, 27, and 28. The 3 department code was read and there were no code changes. 4 Chairman Tamra Duron reported on a correction 5 that needs to be made to the model bylaws. On a motion by 6 Linda Dieble, it was voted to change Article IV, Section 2 7 of the unit bylaws to read: "And one more executive 8 committeewoman." On a motion by Linda Dieble it was voted 9 to change Unit Model Bylaws Article IV Unit Officer 10 Section 3. 11 Once all business was concluded there was a 12 question and answer session with discussion on Junior Past 13 President and the process to surrender a charter. The 14 Chaplain offered prayer and the meeting concluded at 10:10 15 a.m. 16 Madam President, may I proceed with my 17 supplemental? 18 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: No, because we 19 have to address --20 CONSTITUTION & BYLAWS CHAIRMAN DURON: Oh, yeah, 21 you're right. Before I would like to get into the 22 changes, I would like to explain the reason I'm proposing 23 these changes is that approximately 85 percent of the 24 Constitution & Bylaws that I received this year had a 25 problem in this area, so we are attempting to correct that 26 and hopefully the Department Constitutions Chairman for 27 next year will have it much easier as well as the units. 28 I handed out to the front table the portion of 29 the Department Bylaws I will be referring to as well as 30 the portion of the Model Unit Bylaws. 31 Department Constitution Article XIV, Section 1 32 Elected Officers now reads: "Each unit shall elect the 33 following officers: President, First Vice President, 34 Second Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, and one or 35 more Executive Committeewomen. (The offices of secretary and treasurer may be combined.)" 36 37 Our Model Unit Bylaws Article IV Unit Officer 38 Section 2 now reads: "The elective officers shall be: 39 President, First Vice President, Second Vice President, 40 Secretary/Treasurer and at least one Executive 41 Committeewomen and shall be elected annually by majority 42 vote at a meeting designated by a vote of the Unit, 43 provided nominations and elections are held not earlier 44 than April 1st or less than five days prior to the opening 45 of Department Convention. The Unit shall notify their 46 membership and the District President of the time set for 47 election." 48 By direction of the committee I move the 49 following change: "The elective officers shall be: 50 President, First Vice President, Second Vice President,

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1 Secretary/Treasurer and one or more Executive 2 Committeewomen and shall be elected annually by majority 3 vote at a meeting designated by a vote of the Unit, 4 provided nominations and elections are held not earlier 5 than April 1st or less than five days prior to the opening 6 of Department Convention. The Unit shall notify their 7 membership and the District President of the time set for 8 election." 9 The justification in this is to bring the Model 10 Unit Bylaws in line with the Department Constitution. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: 11 There's a motion 12 to change the Model Unit Bylaws Article IV Unit Officer 13 Section 2 to read: "The elective officers shall be: 14 President, First Vice President, Second Vice President, 15 Secretary/Treasurer and one or more Executive 16 Committeewomen and shall be elected annually by majority 17 vote at a meeting designated by a vote of the Unit, 18 provided nominations and elections are held not earlier 19 than April 1st or less than five days prior to the opening 20 of Department Convention. The Unit shall notify their 21 membership and the District President of the time set for 22 election." 23 Any discussion? 24 (No response.) 25 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Hearing none, all 26 those in favor, say aye. 27 ALL PRESENT: Aye. 28 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Opposed, no. 29 (No response.) 30 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Motion passed. 31 CONSTITUTION & BYLAWS CHAIRMAN DURON: Thank you, 32 ladies. Model Unit Bylaws Article IV Unit Officer Section 3 now reads: "The appointive officers shall be," you list 33 them. "And if not elected," number, "Executive 34 35 Committeewomen. Junior past is automatic - no need to 36 list." 37 By direction of the committee I move the 38 following change. Unit Model Bylaws Article IV Unit 39 Officers Section 3 to read: "The appointive officers shall be," you list them. "Junior past is automatic - no 40 need to list." 41 42 The justification in this is there is no 43 provision in the Department Constitution for appointed 44 Executive Committeewomen at the unit level. 45 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: There is a motion 46 on the floor to change Unit Model Bylaws Article IV Unit 47 Officer Section 3 to read: "The appointive officer shall 48 be," and you list them. "Junior past is automatic - no 49 need to list." 50 Any discussion?

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1 (No response.) 2 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Hearing none, all 3 those in favor say aye. 4 ALL PRESENT: Aye. 5 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Opposed, no. 6 (No response.) 7 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Motion carried. 8 CONSTITUTION & BYLAWS CHAIRMAN DURON: Thank you, 9 You have done a good job. Good deal for the next ladies. 10 Department Constitution & Bylaws Chairman. 11 Now, Madam President, may I continue with my 12 supplemental? 13 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: You may. Yes, you 14 may. 15 CONSTITUTION & BYLAWS CHAIRMAN DURON: As the 16 fleet of Wendy's Cruise Liners have sailed the calm, 17 rippling water of the California oceans, many amendments 18 and rewrites were submitted before docking into the many 19 breezy ports of call. Some minor citations were issued 20 for problems such as leaving required officers out of 21 their Constitution & Bylaws or appointing all executive 22 committeewomen rather than keeping the mandatory elected 23 one. 24 The biggest infraction was not using the model 25 bylaws as is necessitated by our department code. Some 26 chose to completely type them rather than use the fill-in 27 provided by the Department. This caused many errors and 28 the return of the Constitution & Bylaws to the chairman 29 for corrections. 30 All in all at year's end I am happy to report no 31 accidents at sea, broken down vessels or arrests have been 32 reported by the many qualified port authority officers of 33 the Department of California. 34 Constitution & Bylaws are the governing document for our organization. They provide guidelines for what we 35 36 can and cannot do in our units, districts and department, 37 as well as provide stability ensuring business is 38 conducted correctly. It is the responsibility of each 39 member to become familiar with this document guaranteeing 40 that the different levels of our organization are 41 operating within the guidelines established for them. 42 When we become familiar with our governing documents, we 43 become responsible members. 44 Operating by our Constitution & Bylaws also 45 provides the avenue for civility within each level of our 46 organization, preventing arguing, tension, and hard 47 feelings towards one another. When the rules are 48 followed, there are no questions about how things are 49 being done. The Constitution & Bylaws should not be used 50 to point out a member's errors, criticizing them for work

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1 done incorrectly. Rather, they should be used as a guide 2 showing them how to do things appropriately and orderly. 3 Constitution & Bylaws are created to protect the 4 rights of members giving them a voice in how the units and 5 districts are ran. We must remember the voice of the 6 minority is just as important as the voice of the 7 majority. This past year several units and districts 8 9 rewrote their Constitution & Bylaws as the ten-year 10 mandate as well as many both amending them. Constitution 11 & Bylaws were reviewed at the beginning of the year, 12 during organizational meetings, district meetings, unit 13 meetings, and executive board meeting. They were also 14 reviewed at the end of the year before elections to ensure 15 elections were held correctly and members would know their 16 responsibilities as they were elected and appointed as 17 officers and chairmen of their districts and units. It is reported that 18 of our 30 districts have 18 19 standing rules with nine revising or reviewing them. 20 Units followed suit with 96 units having standing rules, 21 with almost half reviewing or revising them. Units and 22 districts have Constitution & Bylaws in procedure books 23 for president, secretaries, and the Constitution & Bylaws 24 chairmen as well as giving copies to every member yearly 25 and to new members during initiation ceremonies and when 26 being accepted for membership into the units. 27 Units and districts also report having copies of 28 the Department Constitution & Bylaws for their members and 29 keep Roberts Rules of Order Newly Revised on hand for use when needed. 30 31 Of the units reporting most recite the preamble 32 at meetings and 2,906 members have it memorized. 33 Districts and units alike report knowing the importance of 34 utilizing the Department, District and Unit Constitution & 35 Bylaws and Standing Rules when conducting Auxiliary 36 business. They also realize the role of Roberts Rules of 37 Orders Newly Revised and use it to clarify what is not in 38 the governing documents. 39 This chairmen encouraged members to learn the 40 content of their Constitution & Bylaws and challenged 41 District Constitution & Bylaw chairmen to invent a game 42 encouraging the learning of the Constitution & Bylaws 43 while at the same time keeping it fun. One district participated and won the \$50 cash prize for entering the 44 45 contest. 46 And now, Madam President, with your year coming 47 to an end, I can say this has truly been a rewarding 48 experience for this chairman as I did my best to fulfill my responsibilities and duties as Constitution & Bylaws 49 50 chairman as outlined in our governing document and

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1 department code. You will no longer be receiving large 2 envelopes in the mail from me, however I do have one more 3 set of Constitution & Bylaws for your signature, and I can take Diane DeLashmit off my speed dial. However, I am 4 5 sure I will still make many calls to her and have lots of 6 questions as I learn and grow in my Auxiliary experience. At close of this convention I will be relieved of 7 8 my Constitution & Bylaws duty and I can retire my Port 9 Authority badge. In closing, Madam President, as stated in Clovis, I promised at end of year to inform you if I 10 11 still loved Constitution & Bylaws as I always have. The 12 conclusion is yes, more so now than ever. 13 Thank you, Madam President, for your confidence 14 in me and for this appointment that I have no thoroughly 15 enjoyed. 16 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Thank you so much. 17 You had did an outstanding job. CONSTITUTION & BYLAWS CHAIRMAN DURON: I have a 18 19 good mentor. She's in our district and she can be put on 20 speed dial. Yes. That number on my cell phone is wearing 21 Now may I proceed with my first and second off. 22 supplemental? 23 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Yes, you may. 24 CONSTITUTION & BYLAWS CHAIRMAN DURON: First 25 Place Unit Supplemental, Rizal Unit 598, Pilar Reyes. 26 (Applause.) 27 CONSTITUTION & BYLAWS CHAIRMAN DURON: First 28 Place District Supplemental, District 10, Pilar Reyes. 29 (Applause.) CONSTITUTION & BYLAWS CHAIRMAN DURON: Madam 30 31 President, this concludes my report. 32 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Thank you so much. 33 We're going to have both of these young ladies Okay. 34 come. Junior Conference Director Ann Philcox and Junior 35 Activities Chairman Mindy Sinclair. 36 37 JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CONVENTION REPORT 38 39 JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN SINCLAIR: Good 40 afternoon. The statistical report of this chairman 41 appears on page 53 of the Book of Reports. The Junior 42 Activities/Junior Conference Pre-convention committee 43 meeting was held in room Raincross F on June 22nd. 44 The meeting was called to order at 9:02 a.m. 45 Robin Falkenberg, District 28, was appointed Secretary, 46 DeNyse Laugeson, District 18, offered prayer, and Susan 47 Romero, District 21, was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. Roll 48 call showed 13 district delegates and ten visitors which 49 included six juniors in attendance. 50 The committee agreed upon eight code changes.

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1 Awards were presented to members. We recognized our 2 juniors who earned patches this year. Miley Ann Culp from 3 District 6 received nine patches. 4 (Applause.) 5 JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN SINCLAIR: And Sara 6 Johnson received the National President Special Patch. 7 (Applause.) 8 JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN SINCLAIR: Awards for 9 Junior Conference tickets. Junior Auxiliary member, Zoe 10 Dulle, age 7, sold 14 books. 11 (Applause.) 12 JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN SINCLAIR: Auxiliary 13 Member Ann Philcox, Junior Conference Director, Unit 377, 14 District 20, sold 112 books. Since she was Junior 15 Conference Director I also awarded one to the general membership. Christine Evans from Unit 755, District 18, 16 17 sold 34 books. Assigned 43 44 Senior Advisors will serve as group counselors and as 45 chaperones on the conference grounds." 46 If adopted the code will read: "Junior groups 47 will be formed and housed according to age groups, 48 combining large and small communities statewide. Assigned 49 Senior Advisors will serve as group counselors and as 50 chaperones on the conference grounds. Senior Advisors

will not have Junior members that are relatives assigned 1 2 to their room, unless there are extenuating circumstances, 3 and it has been approved by the Junior Conference Director 4 and Department President." 5 I move for the adoption of this code change. 6 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Okay. Motion on 7 -- oh, okay. Motion for number 11 to be changed to: 8 "Junior groups will be formed and housed according to age 9 groups, combining large and small communities statewide. 10 Assigned Senior Advisors will serve as group counselors 11 and as chaperones on the conference grounds. Senior 12 Advisors will not have Junior members that are relatives 13 assigned to their room, unless there are extenuating 14 circumstances, and it has been approved by the Junior 15 Conference Director and Department President." 16 Any questions? Any further discussion? 17 (No response.) DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: All those in 18 19 favor, say aye. 20 ALL PRESENT: Aye. 21 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Opposed, nay. 22 (No response.) 23 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Motion carried. 24 JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN SINCLAIR: The code 25 currently reads, number 13: "Eligibility for attendance at the conference shall be limited to Juniors ten to 18 26 27 years of age. If a Junior member is elected to an office 28 or serving as a chairman at any level and attains the age 29 of 18 during her term, she may complete her year in office 30 and attend Junior Conference. In addition to age 31 requirements, she shall have given at least five hours 32 during the current fiscal year to her Unit. If any Unit 33 does not provide the opportunity for the Junior to serve 34 the required hours, five hours of service to a community 35 organization may be substituted." 36 If adopted the code will read number 13: 37 "Eligibility for attendance at the conference shall be 38 limited to Juniors eight to 18 years of age. It is 39 understood that Junior members sent to Junior Conference 40 are comfortable with staying away from home over night and 41 able to enjoy to away from home experience. If a Junior 42 member is elected to an office or serving as a chairman at 43 any level and attains the age of 18 during her term, she 44 may complete her year in office and attend Junior 45 Conference. In addition to age requirements, she shall 46 have given at least five hours during the current fiscal 47 year to her Unit. If any Unit does not provide the 48 opportunity for the Junior to serve the required hours, 49 five hours of service to a community organization may be 50 substituted."

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1 I move for the adoption of this code change. 2 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Okay. The motion 3 for number 13 is: "Eligibility for attendance at the 4 conference shall be limited to Juniors eight to 18 years 5 of age. It is understood that Junior members sent to 6 Junior Conference are comfortable with staying away from 7 home over night and able to enjoy to away from home 8 experience. If a Junior member is elected to an office or 9 serving as a chairman at any level and attains the age of 18 during her term, she may complete her year in office 10 11 and attend Junior Conference. In addition to age 12 requirements, she shall have given at least five hours 13 during the current fiscal year to her Unit. If any Unit 14 does not provide the opportunity for the Junior to serve 15 the required hours, five hours of service to a community 16 organization may be substituted." 17 Any questions? 18 PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Linda Fercho, 19 Past Department President. I have been to Junior 20 Conference many times and I acted as Junior Conference 21 Director and I love the girls and I love Juniors. And if 22 anyone knows me, they know that's my passion, but I do 23 believe eight-year-olds are a little young. It's hard 24 even working with the ten year olds sometimes. They're so 25 cute and they're so darling and they're so hyper and 26 usually it's an all-night affair sometimes. I know my own granddaughter cried all night and 27 28 Bonnie Christner called my daughter Tracy and said "Jackie 29 is crying." And Tracy gets on the phone and says: "Knock 30 it off and go to bed." Jackie asked: "Can I go horseback riding?" "Not if you don't go to bed." She went to bed. 31 32 And those who have been to Junior Conference know 33 that I would love to see more girls go. I mean, and this 34 would be a way to get more girls to go, but my daughter 35 wouldn't have been ready at eight, I can tell you that. 36 So I just really feel that we need to consider that and 37 get more girls between ten and 18 to go. Thank you very 38 much. 39 (Applause.) 40 JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN SINCLAIR: I 41 understand that a lot of people are thinking that eight is 42 too young and, yeah, it would bring up our numbers, but the main reason for this is I had 15 telephone calls from 43 44 parents whose children have fulfilled all their 45 requirements and when they turn six to ten, they're doing 46 everything that a Junior Auxiliary member does, but 47 they're not getting their reward for it. 48 The little girl that got all the certificates, I 49 can't remember what unit, she's seven years old. She's 50 seven years old. And she did all that work by herself.

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And she went to one of our workshops and she was just 1 2 like: Come on; I want to go. And I think even if we try 3 it for one year, you know. I mean, I got 15 phone calls. 4 That's a lot of phone calls. 5 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: The Chair 6 recognizes Tracy. 7 NATIONAL SECURITY CHAIRMAN VARNELL: Hi. Good afternoon. I'm Tracy Varnell Fercho, Past District 8 9 President. I have been to Junior Conference. Jackie and 10 I had a great time. Where is she? My girl. I understand 11 about wanting juniors to go; I definitely get that. And 12 yes, they do do a lot, but personally I do have to agree 13 with Linda Fercho. Eight years old does seem a little 14 young to me. 15 And the problem is that if you haven't gone to 16 Junior Conference and you have to deal with that 17 eight-year-old and then you have a big span -- in my 18 opinion a big span between 18 and eight and you have to 19 find different activities. Because eight-year-olds are 20 not going to be dancing like the 16- to 17-year-olds 21 because I personally wouldn't want my eight-year-old to 22 dance like my 16-year-old. 23 So I personally have to agree that eight I feel 24 is a little young just because of the difference of their 25 maturity levels. Thank you. 26 (Applause.) 27 PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Madam 28 President, Anita Biggs, District 23, Unit 252. I've been 29 going to Junior Conference I believe for the last five, six years consistently. And I understand the rationale 30 31 for lowering the age. I kind of don't like the word "understood" because I don't know what that means. 32 Ιt 33 says "understood." I like the word "required" more so only because it would have to be -- "understood" is a good 34 35 word in a way, but a requirement that -- it has to be 36 required that the child understands that they're going to 37 like a camp. It's only a weekend. I'm for the lowering 38 of the age only because I think it would improve and 39 increase the number of girls. The direction of the conference by whomever is in 40 41 charge, that is where the tone is going to be set so that 42 they get enough counselors to monitor these children, the 43 youngsters. You know, I call them youngsters. So as long 44 as they have enough supervision and they're in a situation 45 where they're together, they can comingle with the other 46 girls and it wouldn't be -- it's not a -- it's not --47 there's no dirty dancing done anymore. I mean, maybe when 48 you were there, Tracy, you were dirty dancing. 49 Okay. But I think it is -- I think it would be a 50 good thing to maybe increase our Junior Conference

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1 attendance. I mean Juniors grow up. That's the problem. 2 They grow up and out, and so we just have to keep them and 3 to keep the program alive to keep our Juniors going. This 4 might be an opportunity -- if it doesn't work for -- try 5 it out. If I doesn't work, change the code next year. 6 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Thank you. 7 DISTRICT DELEGATE GREETI: Madam Department 8 President, Susie Carrow-Greeti. I am a Past Junior

9 President. And I agree with lowering the age for several 10 reasons. One, I think it's great. The younger that we 11 can get our children involved to learn our programs at a 12 younger age, the better we are. It is up to the parents 13 to make sure that their daughters are eligible and 14 understand the validity before allowing them to go.

15 So a parent also has a little more responsibility 16 as well, but to allow these children -- because children 17 are having children and I think as long as the child is 18 willing to do the job and go out and be a part of our 19 family, allow them to do it at the age of eight and older. 20 I enjoyed my time being a Junior. I also enjoyed my time 21 being the Department President as far as the Juniors and I 22 enjoy being involved with my family here. Thank you. 23

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Go ahead.

24 DISTRICT 16 DELEGATE REID: Good afternoon, Madam 25 President. My name is Geneivere Reid and I'm with 26 District 16, Unit 48. I have gone to Junior Conference for the last three years. I am also the mother of three 27 28 daughters and I personally feel that eight-year-olds is 29 too young. We've had -- I have I think eight active Juniors right now and they all want to go to conference, 30 31 but they're just not ready.

I agree maybe lowering it one year would be a 32 33 good start, but I think jumping two years is just going too much for these kids. And unless they're doing other 34 35 activities that are overnight away from their parents 36 first, it's too much.

37 I mean, what are we going to do about counselors 38 with the younger kids? Because they're going to require 39 so much extra attention and care. I think nine years old 40 would be a good place to start, but jumping two years is 41 just too much.

42

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Thank you.

DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN MOORE: Sharon Moore, 43 District 23, Unit 252. I've been a room mom for the past, 44 45 what, seven, maybe eight years. This was the first year 46 that I did not have kids in my room, but I agree that 47 eight-year-olds -- there are many mature eight-year-olds 48 and it's up to the parents to decide if they're mature 49 enough to say that eight-year-old is okay to go. That's a 50 choice. Okay. That gives us more opportunity to be able

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1 to get more girls out. 2 So if you know your child is not mature enough at 3 eight, then, you know, maybe they can wait until the next 4 year. But I think we should open it up for them to have that opportunity. And I agree with the young lady that 5 6 indicated about teaching them, you know, early on. Junior 7 Conference is a great way to bring them up in the 8 organization. And we need the young folks. Look at our 9 convention here. This is the smallest convention I've ever seen since I've been coming. We need to get these 10 11 young girls started at an early age, as early as we can 12 and it's up to the counselors to choose the age that they want. And we have -- we had so many counselors this year. 13 14 So that's my opinion. Thank you. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Thank you. 15 16 DISTRICT 24 PRESIDENT ARTIS: Deloris Artis, 17 District 24. I have been a counselor -- a director of the Junior Conference several times through the years and I 18 19 think my opinion is we need to change the program back to 20 when we had younger children and adopt the program. We 21 can't have eight-year-olds if we're having meetings --22 setting meetings all day like they were the last time that 23 I was director. So let's revamp the program and have our 24 eight- and nine-year-olds come because there's so many 25 things we can teach them. 26 DISTINGUISHED GUEST CHAIRMAN WORKMAN: Madam 27 President? Madam President? 28 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Yes, ma'am. 29 DISTINGUISH GUEST CHAIRMAN WORKMAN: Madam 30 President, Linda Workman, Past Department President. Т 31 move for the previous question. 32 PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Second. 33 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Okay. There's a 34 motion on the floor to discontinue the conversation and 35 call for the question. Yes. This is only for to stop 36 talking about it. All those in favor -- or excuse me. 37 Any discussion? 38 (No response.) 39 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: All those in 40 favor, say aye. 41 AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Aye. 42 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Opposed, no. 43 AUDIENCE MEMBERS: No. 44 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Okay. Motion 45 carried to not talk about it anymore. So now we're going 46 to call for the vote. And the vote for the motion is for 47 number 13: "Eligibility for attendance at the conference 48 shall be limited to Juniors eight to 18 years of age. It 49 is understood that Junior members sent to Junior 50 Conference are comfortable with staying away from home

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1 over night and able to enjoy to away from home experience. 2 If a Junior member is elected to an office or serving as a 3 chairman at any level and attains the age of 18 during her 4 term, she may complete her year in office and attend 5 Junior Conference. In addition to age requirements, she 6 shall have given at least five hours during the current 7 fiscal year to her Unit. If any Unit does not provide the 8 opportunity for the Junior to serve the required hours, 9 five hours of service to a community organization may be 10 substituted." 11 All those in favor, say aye. 12 AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Ave. 13 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: All those opposed, 14 say no. 15 AUDIENCE MEMBERS: No. 16 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Okay. I think the 17 nays and ayes are too close to count. So could we have 18 all those that agree and say aye stand up, please. Okay. Fine. Sit down. And all those against, please rise. 19 20 Yes, the ayes have it. Motion carried. 21 (Applause.) 22 DEPARTMENT EDITOR AVINA: Madam President? 23 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Yes, ma'am. DEPARTMENT EDITOR AVINA: My granddaughter, she 24 25 was a Past Junior Officer and stuff just had a baby girl 26 three weeks ago, and the first thing she said is, "I can't 27 wait until she can go to Junior Conference." 28 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Well, now she has 29 to wait a few years. JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN SINCLAIR: Madam 30 31 President, someone at the podium took the rest of my code 32 changes. I don't have them. 33 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Okay. Welcome to the -- okay. Whoever came up --34 35 JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN SINCLAIR: Did you 36 want me to stop? Is that it, Anita? Okay. The code currently reads number 27: "The Junior Activities 37 38 Chairman, Junior Conference Director and the Committee 39 will choose two Department Junior representatives to 40 Junior National Convention or Junior Mission Training at 41 Junior Conference. The representatives may or may not be 42 the Honorary Junior Department President or Honorary 43 Junior Department Vice President but must exhibit 44 leadership qualities. If the representative turns 18 prior to or during the Junior National Convention or 45 46 Junior Mission Training, she will be eligible to attend 47 junior National Convention or junior mission training but 48 will not be eligible to hold a National Office." 49 The code change for this is taking out Junior 50 National -- or the Junior National Convention since it has

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1 been discontinued. So the new code if accepted would 2 read: "The Junior Activities Chairman, Junior Conference 3 Director and the Committee will choose two Department Junior representatives to Junior Mission Training at 4 5 Junior Conference. The representatives may or may not be 6 the Honorary Junior Department President or Honorary 7 Junior Department Vice President but must exhibit 8 leadership qualities. If the representative turns 18 9 prior to or during the Junior Mission Training, she will 10 be eligible to Junior Mission Training but will not be 11 eligible to hold a National Office." 12 I move that we accept this code change. 13 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Okay. The motion 14 for number 27 is: "The Junior Activities Chairman, Junior 15 Conference Director and the Committee will choose two 16 Department Junior representatives to Junior Mission 17 Training at Junior Conference. The representatives may or may not be the Honorary Junior Department President or 18 19 Honorary Junior Department Vice President but must exhibit 20 leadership qualities. If the representative turns 18 21 prior to or during the Junior Mission Training, she will 22 be eligible to Junior Mission Training but will not be 23 eligible to hold a National Office." 24 Any discussion? The chair recognizes Susie 25 Tozier. 26 NEC MEMBER TOZIER: I just have one question. 27 Mission training is open to all Juniors. Does this mean 28 that just those two juniors are going to get a per diem? 29 Is that the only reason for this change --30 PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Yes. 31 NEC MEMBER TOZIER: -- or is it -- I know you're 32 talking about Mission Training. The one that's before us 33 right now says instead of being National Convention, 34 Mission Training. So are these Juniors going to get per 35 diems? 36 PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Yes. 37 NEC MEMBER TOZIER: Okay. That's what I needed. 38 Mission Training is open to any Junior who wishes to 39 attend whether or not -- okay. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: We are on 27, and 40 41 the only thing that was being taken out is the National 42 Convention. Correct, ladies? 43 PAST NAT'L EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE TAYLOR: Yes. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: 44 Okay. Any other 45 discussion? 46 (No response.) 47 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: All those in 48 favor, say aye. 49 ALL PRESENT: Aye. 50 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Oh, where's the

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1 question? Oh, okay. I'm sorry. The floor recognizes 2 Linda Dieble. 3 DISTRICT DELEGATE DIEBLE: I just have a 4 question. On the bottom of that you say "National 5 Office." If there's no more National Juniors, why would 6 you have National Office? 7 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: There is a 8 National Office. 9 DISTRICT DELEGATE DIEBLE: There is? Okay. 10 That's fine. 11 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Any other 12 questions? 13 (No response.) 14 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: All those in 15 favor, say aye. 16 ALL PRESENT: Aye. 17 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Those opposed say 18 nay. 19 (No response.) 20 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Motion carried. 21 JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN SINCLAIR: The code 22 currently reads for number 28: "Airfare, \$100 per diem 23 for two days and the registration fee will be paid for by 24 the Department Office for the first representative to 25 Junior National Convention or Junior Mission Training. 26 Should the first representative not be able to attend, the 27 second representative will move up to first 28 representative. The Department President, Junior 29 Activities Chairman, Junior Conference Director and Junior 30 Conference Committee will select a Junior that attended 31 the current year Junior Conference to attend as the second 32 representative. In the event that both the 33 representatives are unable to attend Junior National 34 Convention or Junior Mission Training, the Department 35 President, Junior Activities Chairman, Junior Conference 36 Director and Junior Conference Committee will select two 37 Junior members that attended the current Junior Conference 38 to attend as the first ask second representative." 39 If adopted the code change would read -- it would 40 be taken out, the airfare and per diem, but we heard that 41 they didn't need the airfare anymore so it was reading --42 number 28: "Should the first representative not be able 43 to attend, the second representative will move up to first 44 representative. The Department President, Junior 45 Activities Chairman, Junior Conference Director and Junior 46 Conference Committee will select a Junior that attended 47 the current year Junior Conference to attend as the second 48 representative. In the event that both the 49 representatives are unable to attend Junior Mission 50 Training, the Department President, Junior Activities

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1 Chairman, Junior Conference Director and Junior Conference 2 Committee will select two Junior members that attended the 3 current Junior Conference to attend as the first ask 4 second representative." 5 I move that we accept this code change. 6 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Okay. The motion 7 "Should the first representative not be able is for 28: 8 to attend, the second representative will move up to first 9 representative. The Department President, Junior Activities Chairman, Junior Conference Director and Junior 10 Conference Committee will select a Junior that attended 11 12 the current year Junior Conference to attend as the second 13 representative. In the event that both the 14 representatives are unable to attend Junior Mission 15 Training, the Department President, Junior Activities 16 Chairman, Junior Conference Director and Junior Conference 17 Committee will select two Junior members that attended the current Junior Conference to attend as the first ask 18 second representative." 19 20 Any questions? 21 PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Madam 22 President, Anita Biggs, District 23. 23 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Yes. 24 PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: I disagree with 25 airfare allowance. It should be more than that, but that's what we have in the budget for them to go to the 26 27 two days for Mission Training because who's going to pay for them to go? Otherwise they'll have -- there's a 28 29 problem. They were going to National Convention now they 30 have to go to Las Vegas at this point and there is a cost. 31 So I disagree with deleting that line. The only agreement 32 I have is take out anything referencing National 33 Convention. 34 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Okay. 35 PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Can I move to 36 amend? Can I move to amend to state: "Airfare \$100 per 37 diem for two days and the registration fee will be paid 38 for by the Department Office for the first representative 39 to Junior National Convention" -- excuse me. Strike that. "To Junior Mission Training." Where are we at? So that's 40 41 the first sentence, and then the rest of the code would be 42 the same as read. 43 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Okay. There's a motion on the floor to amend the motion for number 28 --44 to amend 28 to read: "Airfare, \$100 per diem for two days 45 46 and registration fee will be paid for by the Department 47 Office for the first representative to Junior Mission 48 Should the first representative not" --Training. 49 Okay. That's okay. So we're voting on putting 50 that back into the new code. So any discussion on that?

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1 (No response.) 2 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Not hearing any, 3 all those in favor, say aye. 4 ALL PRESENT: Aye. 5 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Opposed, no. 6 (No response.) 7 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Okay. The motion 8 carries. Now 28 will read -- we'll vote on that. 9 "Airfare, \$100 per diem for two days and the registration 10 fee will be paid for by the Department Office for the 11 first representative to Junior Mission Training. Should 12 the first representative not be able to attend, the second 13 representative will move up to first representative. The 14 Department President, Junior Activities Chairman, Junior 15 Conference Director and Junior Conference Committee will 16 select a Junior that attended the current year Junior 17 Conference to attend as the second representative. In the 18 event that both the representatives are unable to attend 19 Junior Mission Training, the Department President, Junior 20 Activities Chairman, Junior Conference Director and Junior 21 Conference Committee will select two Junior members that 22 attended the current Junior Conference to attend as the 23 first ask second representative." 24 Any discussion? 25 FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN MIKESELL: Madam 26 President Wendy? 27 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: The chair 28 recognizes Terry. FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN MIKESELL: Terry 29 30 Mikesell, Finance Chairman. In the budget, line GF62506, 31 National Junior Training, two delegates, they budgeted \$750. So I don't understand this \$100 problem because the 32 33 Junior Conference approved this budget, \$750 for two 34 delegates. 35 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Thank you. 36 (Applause.) DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Any other 37 discussion? Right, right. Okay. All those in favor, say 38 39 aye. 40 ALL PRESENT: Aye. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Opposed? 41 42 (No response.) 43 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Mission -- motion 44 carried. 45 JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN SINCLAIR: And the 46 last one. 47 (Applause.) 48 JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN SINCLAIR: The code 49 currently reads, 29: "It shall be the responsibility of 50 the Junior Conference Director to contact the

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1 parents/quardian of any Junior member that is selected as 2 a representative to attend the Junior National Convention 3 or Junior Mission Training to ensure they will have a chaperone while traveling to, from and during the Junior 4 5 National Convention or Junior Mission Training. The 6 outgoing director shall coordinate with the Department Secretary to ensure all necessary paperwork is complete 7 8 and forwarded to National."

9 If accepted the new code would read, number 29: "It shall be the responsibility of the Junior Conference 10 Director to contact the parents/guardian of any Junior 11 12 member that is selected as a representative to attend the 13 Junior Mission Training to ensure they will have a 14 chaperone while traveling to, from and during the Junior 15 Mission Training. The outgoing director shall coordinate with the Department Secretary to ensure all necessary 16 17 paperwork is complete and forwarded to National."

I move that we accept this code change.

19 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Okay. And the 20 motion is for 29: "It shall be the responsibility of the Junior Conference Director to contact the parents/guardian 21 22 of any Junior member that is selected as a representative 23 to attend the Junior Mission Training to ensure they will 24 have a chaperone while traveling to, from and during the 25 Junior Mission Training. The outgoing director shall 26 coordinate with the Department Secretary to ensure all 27 necessary paperwork is complete and forwarded to 28 National."

29 Any discussion? 30 (No response.) 31 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Hearing none, all 32 those in favor? 33 ALL PRESENT: Aye. 34 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Opposed? 35 (No response.) 36 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Motion carried. 37 JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN SINCLAIR: Madam 38 Department President, may I continue with my supplemental 39 report? 40 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Very brief. 41 JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN SINCLAIR: Very 42 quickly. While I'm reading this, Juniors if you want to 43 come stand in front so everyone can see you. This has 44 been a great learning experience and this chairman has 45 enjoyed working with the Juniors along with the committee. 46 I'd like to introduce Ann Philcox, the Junior 47 Conference Director, and the Junior Conference Committee 48 members Robin Falkenberg, Susan Romero and Patricia 49 Jackson-Kelly. Thank you to all who have helped in 50 different ways this year. Teamwork made the Junior

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1 program a success. Thank you to the entire Legion Family 2 for your participation with Junior Conference tickets, the 3 Sand Dollar Jars, T-shirts and caps and other fundraising. 4 With tickets and additional fundraising we were able to 5 raise over \$10,000 this year. 6 (Applause.) 7 JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN SINCLAIR: Exceeding 8 this Chairman's goal. Thank you to all of you for helping 9 make that happen. 10 We held three Junior Leadership workshops in 11 southern, central, and northern California. We appreciate 12 the Department Chairmen and District Chairmen who 13 participated in teaching the girls about our major 14 programs in hands-on learning. And thank you to the units 15 who hosted these workshops. We had a total of 34 girls 16 attend between the three workshops. 17 So many girls earned patches last year. There 18 was over 50. This Chairman only received paperwork for 19 two girls this year. If your Juniors did the work for 20 their patches, please make sure you get the paperwork in 21 so that they are -- they can be awarded their 22 well-deserved Patches. Please continue to encourage your 23 Juniors to continue to work on the Patch Program. 24 I know our are Juniors busy. They had facials 25 and membership parties. They helped with dinners, 26 fundraising with bake sales, parties, placing flags on 27 Memorial Day, and care packages to send overseas. 28 At this time, Madam President, may I proceed with 29 my first place awards and scholarship winner? 30 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Yes, you may. 31 JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN SINCLAIR: First place 32 Unit Supplemental is Palisades Unit 283, District 24. 33 (Applause.) 34 JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN SINCLAIR: First Place District Supplemental goes to Bea Foster from District 29. 35 36 (Applause.) 37 JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN SINCLAIR: We have a Past Department President Junior Scholarship being awarded 38 39 this year to Jabrese Staton for \$1,000. 40 (Applause.) 41 JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN SINCLAIR: Jabrese is 42 from Unit 252, District 23. At this time I was going to 43 introduce Ann so she can introduce our Juniors. JUNIOR CONFERENCE DIRECTOR PHILCOX: Good 44 45 afternoon, ladies. I'm going to be quick. First of all, 46 would everybody that acted as a counselor at Junior 47 Conference this year please rise. 48 (Applause.) 49 JUNIOR CONFERENCE DIRECTOR PHILCOX: This is not 50 everybody. We had 21 counselors this year. Okay. Your

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officers for 2007 were President Jolina Freeman, 2016-'17. 1 2 (Applause.) 3 JUNIOR CONFERENCE DIRECTOR PHILCOX: I'm sorry. 4 Vice President Le La Dooley. 5 (Applause.) 6 JUNIOR CONFERENCE DIRECTOR PHILCOX: Secretary 7 Alyssa Hurtado is not here. Chaplain Teresa Pouliot. 8 Historian Asia Williams. Sergeant-At-Arms Aliya Combs. 9 Marshal Amanda Favella. Americanism Aubrey Wardrip. 10 Children & Youth Magenta Stubs. Community Service Desiree 11 Gibbens. Education Taylor Houser. Poppy Erykalynn 12 Santana and VA&R Jabrese Staton. 13 (Applause.) 14 JUNIOR CONFERENCE DIRECTOR PHILCOX: Now officers 15 for the 2007-'18 team. President Le La Dooley. 16 (Applause.) 17 JUNIOR CONFERENCE DIRECTOR PHILCOX: Vice 18 President Asia Williams. Secretary Alyssa Hurtado. 19 Chaplain Teresa Pouliot. Historian Aliya. 20 Sergeant-at-Arms Alyssa Hurtado. Marshal Cassandra 21 Cardenaz. Chairmen. Americanism Kaylee Fox. Children & 22 Youth Taylor Sinclair. Education Casey Fox. Poppy Kinzee 23 Davis. VA&R Vanessa. Community Service Raquel Suzette, 24 and Leadership Monica Hernandez. 25 I would also like to thank Sharon Moore for 26 putting together the adult talent show. We had fun. And 27 I would also like to make the statement that no children 28 got hurt, but my beloved assistant fell and broke her 29 ankle. So we don't have to worry about the horses. We 30 just have to worry about high heel shoes and grass. Thank 31 you. 32 (Applause.) 33 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Thank you so much, 34 ladies. 35 JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN SINCLAIR: Okay. May 36 we approach the podium real quick? 37 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Really, really 38 fast because we have a quest here so we have to hurry. 39 He's been patiently waiting. 40 (Applause.) 41 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Okay. Before --42 without further adieu, and I have to give him a lot of kudos for waiting patiently, will the Sergeant-at-Arms and 43 Marshal with the Distinguished Guest Chairman please bring 44 45 to the podium John Ellis from the California American 46 Legion Press Association. 47 (Processional.) 48 C.A.L.P.A. PRESIDENT ELLIS: Well, good 49 afternoon. Well, you probably have seen us out in the 50 expo hallway. My name is John Ellis, United States Marine

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1 Corps veteran. 2 (Applause.) 3 C.A.L.P.A. PRESIDENT ELLIS: Thank you very much. 4 Post 739 in Indio, California. Is our Commander Mary 5 Riser here? How about our District President? That would 6 be Susan Romero from District 21. There she is. 7 (Applause.) C.A.L.P.A. PRESIDENT ELLIS: The California 8 9 American Legion Press Association works with Auxiliaries 10 across the state, Legionnaires, Riders and Sons. And our mission is simple. Our mission is to work with you in 11 12 elevating your program visibility. What we do is we 13 create flyers. Now if you stop down near our booth, you'll see examples of flyers including one that we did 14 for a no bake sale. I don't know what Auxiliary member 15 16 thought that up where you've got to pay money for pie and 17 cake that you never get and can eat, but they raised like 18 700 bucks for that. I created a flyer for that. I could create one for you. And it doesn't cost a dime. 19 We 20 create flyers, we create Facebook pages. We can help you 21 with a press release. We can help you with your website. We can help you with your newsletter. 22 23 And, look, here's what it comes down to. When we 24 can elevate the visibility of The American Legion across 25 every unit, membership increases. Attendance at our 26 events becomes greater because word is getting out. It's 27 getting out in many different forms, you know, in the 28 newspaper, in the media. And when we do that, what's 29 going to happen; right? Membership increases, more 30 fundraising comes in, and greater community recognition 31 occurs. And that is what C.A.L.P.A. does for you at 32 absolutely no cost. Now there's a membership fee. Oh, 33 It's ten bucks a year. That's it, ten bucks a qosh. 34 year. 35 Now you do not have to be a media professional to 36 be a member of C.A.L.P.A. You don't have to be a press 37 member, but what you do get, excuse me, is a press card. 38 You can see that right there. And it shows that you 39 represent the community. And the fact that you are here 40 at this convention sitting in those chairs showing that 41 you care that you represent your individual posts, you 42 represent your district, you represent your area and we 43 want to help you make it even better. 44 Now right now how many of you out there are 45 currently C.A.L.P.A. members? Raise your hand. Okay. 46 This is -- there you go. Now an interesting thing about 47 C.A.L.P.A. is I made a pitch to the Legionnaires at a 48 district meeting and a small number of them joined 49 C.A.L.P.A. That's okay, but the Auxiliary did in mass. 50 The women got it because who are the movers and shakers in

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1 the post? Who gets things done? Who puts the flyers out 2 there; right? 3 (Applause.) 4 C.A.L.P.A. PRESIDENT ELLIS: You know, a little 5 bit of a story. Here's kind of how we work. We had a 6 young man in our community at the local high school from 7 the band, the high school band and he played Taps for the 8 funerals of our veterans. Well, we created a flyer. 9 Actually it was free. It was a certificate of appreciation to present to this young man at his local 10 high school in front of his band members. And he didn't 11 12 know we were coming. The principal was there, his 13 grandparents were there, his mom and dad were there, but 14 we got ABC and CBS television to be there and it was on 15 the local news that evening and the next morning. We can 16 help you do that. 17 Don't think that you can't get that type of publicity for your local post. They will answer if we 18 19 knock, and that's what we're doing. We're helping you to 20 do the knocking. We're here to point the direction. 21 Here's how you get the article in the newspaper. Here's 22 how you get the local TV station to come into your unit. 23 So maybe you don't know how to do it, but we do. We're 24 C.A.L.P.A. We've got a whole group of professionals 25 waiting in the wings just for you. 26 So I would like to invite each and every one of 27 you to join the California American Legion Press 28 Association. Represent your post. Represent your 29 district. Represent your area. And when this convention 30 closes for today, myself and/or some staff members, 31 there's Ryan Bagley, we'll have applications when you file 32 out that door. It's just ten bucks a year. So join with 33 us because we need you just like you need us. And you 34 know why? Because it's for the good of the Legion. Thank 35 you very much. 36 (Applause.) 37 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Thank you. Okay. 38 We're now going to hear -- okay. From the Americanism 39 Chairman Kathy Smith and --40 (Processional.) 41 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: And if the 42 Education Chairman Linda Fariss and Kathie Martinez --Kathie Martinez and Linda Fariss, could please come up and 43 44 be prepared to give your talk? 45 46 AMERICANISM CONVENTION REPORT 47 48 AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SMITH: There's lipstick on 49 the microphone. Ahoy. The Convention Committee on 50 Americanism met on Thursday, June 22nd, 2017 in the -- in

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1 Raincross C in the Riverside Convention Center, Riverside, 2 California. The statistical report of this chairman 3 appears in the Book of Reports on page 46. With the 4 consent of the delegates, Linda Fercho was appointed 5 Secretary, Donna Scott offered prayer, and Joan Cannon was 6 appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 21 delegates 7 answered roll call. There were nine visitors present. 8 The code was read and the committee agreed on two 9 housekeeping items that we handled during the committee 10 It was just punctuation. meeting. 11 The delegation asked a question about the 12 increase in the cash award for Group V. With the input of 13 the delegates on the floor, we concluded that this was due 14 to the age of the essay students competing in that 15 category. Many of the Group V students are in the same 16 age bracket as the students in Group IV. 17 It was stressed for the unit and district 18 chairmen to ensure that all information requested in the 19 instructions are provided on the back of the essays. The 20 student addresses were needed when the Department Chairman 21 is processing the awards. 22 100 percent reporting certifications were given 23 to Districts 3, 7, 10, 11, 12, 13, 17, 18, 20, 24, 25, 28. 24 Citations were awarded to units and districts. 25 Americanism essay certificates and checks for second and 26 third place awards were announced and presented to the 27 District Chairmen. First place awards will be announced 28 on the convention floor. 29 Two items were discussed as follows: It was 30 noted that a person from another country reciting the 31 Pledge of Allegiance should not salute the flag, but 32 instead stand with their hands at their sides. The second 33 is a remainder that the line, "One nation under God" 34 should not include a pause and that we should train all 35 citizens to recite the pledge correctly. 36 The delegates discussed some of New business. 37 the challenges related to the Americanism titles this 38 year, noting that we need to ensure that each title is 39 phrased correctly with the proper punctuation. Many 40 teachers and chairmen have offered suggestions to 41 alleviate ongoing frustration and streamline the 42 instructions to enhance the Americanism program. The 43 committee would like to recommend that the incoming 44 chairman form a committee to revise the instructions with 45 several past chairmen and bring recommendations to the 46 membership at next year's convention. Meeting closed at 47 10:50 a.m. 48 Madam President, may I continue with my 49 supplemental report and first place awards? 50 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Yes, you can.

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1 DISTRICT 2 PRESIDENT HENDERSON: Judy Henderson 2 -- is this on? Judy Henderson, District 2 President. 3 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: The Chair 4 recognizes Judy. 5 DISTRICT 2 PRESIDENT HENDERSON: I did 6 Americanism last year for Group V and we had an issue with 7 the part about the addresses. Because with special ed, 8 there's a real high confidentiality and with that with the 9 confidentiality issue, you cannot reveal the names and addresses because of the confidentiality thing. 10 My teacher told me that I was not allowed to put the 11 12 addresses of the children's names on it because of the 13 confidentiality issue. 14 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Yes, Judy. It's 15 just a recommendation for next year's chairman. 16 DISTRICT 2 PRESIDENT HENDERSON: Well, I'm 17 just --DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: So it's a point --18 19 DISTRICT 2 PRESIDENT HENDERSON: Well, I'm just 20 mentioning that because she said it's a recommendation and I'm saying that my teacher is well versed --21 22 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Right, right. 23 DISTRICT 2 PRESIDENT HENDERSON: -- in that issue 24 of confidentiality told me that you cannot -- I personally 25 could not put the addresses on there because of the 26 confidentiality issue with special ed children which is in 27 Group V. 28 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Yes. Thank you 29 very much. Go ahead. AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SMITH: Thank you. 30 Madam 31 President Wendy, your nautical theme brought extraordinary 32 opportunities to strength and patriotism at ports of call 33 from sea to shining sea. Our Manta Ray Patti has grown 34 She's become very mature. I don't know if you saw up. 35 her when she was little at the beginning of the year. And 36 she has become a mom and there are at least 30 babies 37 playing on the decks of the cruise line. Can those babies 38 stand up? Anybody that has babies. That's it. Come on. 39 Where is our babies? 40 Okay. The Americanism Manta Rays have made us 41 very proud and inspired us with many tales of the sea, 42 assisting veterans, military troops, and family. The Manta Rays have been hard at work reminding members and 43 44 the community of proper flag etiquette and demonstrations 45 on the proper way to dispose of the American flag. The 46 American Legion Auxiliary Junior Conference participated 47 in an inspiring flag disposal ceremony led by Kim Vincent. 48 We were amazed by the reactions and the questions from the Junior members. Over one hundred pocket flags were folded 49 50 to be sent to active duty military. The ALA members are

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1 doing a great job grooming our future leaders. 2 Members continue to pass out flag etiquette 3 brochures, sharing personal feelings of patriotism, and 4 participating in legislation to ensure that we maintain 5 the laws that protect our veterans. 6 Chairmen reported the efforts made on Get Out the 7 Many members led campaigns to get citizens Vote. 8 registered to vote, worked at the polls, and walked 9 precincts. One of the essays stated that they had 10 participated with grandparents in working the polls. 11 Patriotic holidays are celebrated sharing food, 12 participating in parades, and honoring veterans by all 13 ports of call across the state. Members continue to watch 14 the condition of flags to ensure that worn and tattered 15 flags are replaced when needed, sponsor Stand Downs, hold 16 job fairs for events and provide support for community and 17 children and youth. 18 The Americanism Essay Contest was a great success 19 and it was enlightening to read the profound ideas that 20 the students shared in their grade levels. It is a great 21 exercise to help children think about American ideals and 22 in honing writing skills and the ability to follow 23 instructions. The essays clearly show that the students 24 have great understanding of patriotism and the pride and 25 benefits of being an American. Their insights are 26 profound. They really love helping veterans and one 27 student stated he really likes helping old people over the 28 age of 50. 29 Members decorate military and veteran-based facilities at holiday time, sponsor bingo, make cards and 30 31 spend time reading them with veterans in the hospital. One unit supports a local Fisher House providing meals and 32 33 support for families experiencing catastrophic illnesses. 34 One unit had kids participate in a scavenger hunt looking 35 for patriotic icons and symbols in and around the post. 36 Units present Blue Star Banners to local families, present 37 patches to the children scripted with, "We honor those who 38 served." 39 There is never a shortage of patriotic pride 40 among ALA members. We love to show our spirit by supporting our red, white, and blue, our pins and 41 42 patriotic gear. Members also take every opportunity to 43 share the importance of our mission within their 44 communities. ALA members are proud to belong to the 45 world's largest women's patriotic organization, participating in local city government meetings, speaking 46 47 at community events, taking every opportunity to share the importance of caring for our veterans and reminding them 48 49 of the ultimate sacrifice that was made for our freedom. 50 Participation in the promotion of The American

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1 Legion Americanism programs includes the Oratorical 2 Contest and supporting American Legion Baseball. 3 Total dollars reportedly spent by the Department of California members was \$17,207. I'm sure that we 4 didn't get all the costs in there. And total volunteer 5 6 hours donated, 141,383. This Chairman is honored to 7 report to you the wonderful activities and accomplishments 8 of the Manta Rays throughout the 2016-2017 year in order 9 to fulfill our mission to service veterans, active duty service members, their families, and the children and 10 11 youth in our communities. 12 In closing I offer a quote from one of the 13 District Chairmen: "Americanism isn't a pill that someone 14 can take and suddenly become filled with patriotism. It 15 is a seed that needs to be planted early in a child's 16 life." 17 Over the past year as the Americanism Chairman, I 18 have seen the efforts that The American Legion Auxiliary 19 makes to ensure that seeds are planted. We are developing 20 the future leaders of America through units, districts, 21 Girls State, Junior Conference, and in our daily lives. 22 When my granddaughter and I left Junior Conference, she was inspired stating, "I want to distribute Poppies and 23 help veterans." She said, "I know I did that in the past, 24 25 but I thought it was because I was cute, but now I 26 understand the real meaning." 27 When I dropped her off, she went to her room and made a poster with all the things she collected at Junior 28 29 Conference. It said, "I am proud to be an American." She sent me a picture on my phone before I even had time to 30 31 drive home. 32 I witnessed the meaning of proud to be an 33 American as we worked to promote Americanism this year. 34 ALA members truly exude pride and show love for our 35 country, veterans and communities. 36 Now for my first place awards. Okay. These are 37 the essay awards. First Place, Mary Powers, Group IV 38 Veronica Spence of Unit 249, District 11. 39 (Applause.) 40 AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SMITH: I forgot the most 41 important thing, the money. How could I have forgot that? 42 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Kathy, was that 43 the Veronica Spence Award? 44 AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SMITH: Mary Powers. Did I 45 say that? 46 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Yeah, I think you 47 did. 48 AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SMITH: Okay. First place 49 in Group I, Grades 4 and 5, go to Georgia Sinicar, Unit 50 221, District 29.

(Applause.) 1 2 AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SMITH: First place in Group 3 II, Grades 6 and 7, goes to Riley Argularias, Unit 118, 4 District 27. 5 (Applause.) 6 AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SMITH: First place in Group 7 III, Grades 8 and 9 goes to Dylan Jagaliski. Okay. Unit 8 475, District 18. 9 (Applause.) 10 AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SMITH: First place in Group 11 IV, Grades 10, 11, and 12 goes to Christina Corles, 12 District 14. And I didn't have your unit number. Oh, 13 it's you, Gloria. 14 (Applause.) 15 AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SMITH: Congratulations. 16 First place in Group V, children with exceptional needs, 17 goes to Thomas Walker, Unit 118, District 27. 18 (Applause.) 19 AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SMITH: And now for my unit 20 and district supplementals. First Place Best Overall Unit 21 Supplemental goes to Hollywood Unit 43, District 24. 22 (Applause.) 23 AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SMITH: First Place District 24 Best Overall District Supplemental goes to District 24, 25 Martha Romano. 26 (Applause.) 27 AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SMITH: All winners will be posted in the Department Convention office. Madam 28 29 President Wendy, thank you for this appointment. I am 30 honored to serve you and the Department of California. 31 Madam Department President, this concludes my report. 32 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Thank you so much. 33 (Applause.) 34 AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SMITH: May I approach? 35 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Really quickly. 36 We'll set it up here with all of the other creatures. 37 Okay. Next we will hear from Linda Fariss, 38 Education. 39 40 EDUCATION CONVENTION REPORT 41 42 EDUCATION CHAIRMAN FARISS: I always follow tall people. Can everyone hear me? I've got the mic right? 43 44 The Convention Committee on Education met on June 22nd, 2017 in room Raincross E at the Riverside Convention 45 46 Center, Riverside, California. The statisti- -- the 47 numbers report of this chairman appears on page 51 in the Book of Reports. Gigi Manno was appointed Secretary, 48 Christine Williams offered prayer, and we had a wonderful 49 50 Sergeant-at-Arms and I couldn't read their name. Is the

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1 person who acted as Sergeant-at-Arms at the preconvention 2 committee here? She was very good. 3 A total of 19 district delegates answered roll 4 call and there were 14 visitors present. The committee 5 agreed to the following report: Basically that we would 6 like to see the Children of Warriors award be awarded \$500 7 scholarship if they do not receive the National. I think 8 this is just because this is a fairly new scholarship, 9 National scholarship that it was not incorporated into our programs. So when I'm not -- anything that has to be 10 voted on, I am just going to suggest to the next Education 11 12 Chairman that she look into making this a part of the 13 department code. 14 We discussed Veterans in the Classroom, Welcome 15 Home For Vietnam Veterans, and units that offer 16 scholarships. Delegates were urged to encourage donations 17 to Department Education Program and purchase Poppy Seals. 18 The meeting adjourned at 12:02. 19 Madam President, may I continue with my 20 supplemental? 21 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Yes, you may. 22 EDUCATION CHAIRMAN FARISS: And I want to say I 23 choose School of Tuna for the name of our education 24 program because it takes a lot of people to get us 25 educated. It takes a lot of us working with our young 26 ones that we have to protect and keep around, keep them 27 toward the middle of the pack. And so we are proud to say 28 that we've been doing that. 29 From the information provided by 19 districts, 30 California accomplished a great deal this past year. We 31 provided scholarships at the unit, district, and 32 department levels. We donated generously to the 33 department scholarship program both through monetary 34 donations as well as the Poppy Seals program. In fact, it 35 was gratifying to see reports come to me with Poppy Seals 36 on the envelopes. I'm one of those that buys the Poppy 37 Seals, puts them away and forgets to put them on anything. 38 Many of us participated in a Give 10 to Education 39 benefiting numerous schools that needed supplies. We 40 honored our teachers, educators, and staff with school 41 supplies, refreshments, Girl Scout cookies, thank you 42 cards and certificates during National Education Week and 43 among other forms of recognition. One unit held a paint and sip party for the teachers of a local school. 44 Thev 45 were sipping tea. That's what their report said. 46 Our most recent program of Veterans in the 47 Classroom is growing in popularity as more units and more 48 veterans are embracing the method of reaching out to our 49 children. As veterans related their experiences in the 50 military, all could see how favorably the students

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1 reacted. The children were so thrilled that they asked 2 the veteran how to join the service after graduation. 3 We were able to reach children in kindergarten 4 through sixth grade, eighth grade, and 11th grade. 5 Earlier in the school year one unit provided meals at a 6 local junior college with a large veteran enrollment. At 7 the request of the school they are now donating \$50 a 8 month to the food pantry. One of our units has an annual 9 fundraising event where they sell meat pies. They raised enough for four \$1,000 scholarships at this four-day 10 11 festival. Pretty neat to do all your fundraising in four 12 days. 13 We had volunteers who read to children, mentored 14 those children who were below the level they should be. One member works with the learning dynamics reading 15 16 system. Another unit provided two ladies to read to six 17 children of four mothers whose first language is not 18 English. 19 We were pleased to report that The American 20 Legion Auxiliary joined with other organizations in Read 21 Across America and 211 Call to Courage that works with 22 wounded military personnel that want to further their 23 education. The volunteers work to find community 24 colleges, trade schools, and adult schools that can fill 25 the needs of the veterans. 26 We continue to collect Box Tops and Campbells 27 labels. Many units made direct donations to local schools 28 in addition to the Give 10 Program. A couple of units 29 donations -- a couple of the unit donations were 30 particularly interesting. Remembering those in need --31 what did I write? Remembering those most in need, one 32 unit donated \$400 to a class for autistic children and 33 another made a large donation to a local school district 34 to purchase backpacks, sweaters, umbrellas, and school 35 supplies for the homeless students that live in the 36 district's junior high and high school areas. 37 It is fascinating to learn of all the different 38 ways that our members further the education program, such 39 as one unit adopted a teacher to whom they presented 40 school supplies and a stipend. A luncheon was held for a 41 Head Start Program. Donations to Junior ROTC and 15 42 backpacks were filled with school supplies for a dual language class. Many of our members volunteered in 43 44 classrooms and as playground monitors. We distributed 45 literature regarding some of our other programs: I Pledge 46 Allegiance, Light of Liberty, Our Country's Veterans, and 47 Say No to Drugs. 48 One of those units who hoped to keep our children 49 from trying drugs gave out antidrug literature as well as 50 100 book -- 100 bookmarks at the Mule Day Parade, an

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1 important event that draws people from long distances. 2 Our department is large and varied. Some units 3 are in tall mountains, others are below sea level. Some 4 are near sunny beaches, while others are in desolate 5 deserts. No offense. We have units in bustling urban 6 areas and peaceful farmland. However, all are interested 7 in the education of our children and youth. We all know 8 that only through better education can we assure better 9 lives for our next generation. 10 The recipient of the Education Assistant 11 Scholarship is James Ziebell --12 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Ziebell. 13 EDUCATION CHAIRMAN FARISS: I got confused. 14 James Ziebell sponsored by Monterey Cypress 694, District 15 28. He received \$2,000. 16 (Applause.) 17 EDUCATION CHAIRMAN FARISS: And the recipient of 18 the Connie Settles Re-entry or Continuing Education 19 Scholarship is Beatrice (Bea) Jansen sponsored by Cecil M. 20 Anderson Unit 589, District 28 for \$5,000. 21 (Applause.) 22 EDUCATION CHAIRMAN FARISS: Madam President, may 23 I present my first and -- first place winners? That's 24 what they are. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Yes, you may. 25 26 EDUCATION CHAIRMAN FARISS: That's what they are. I learned so much. I learned so much from being the 27 28 Education Chairman. I'm especially proud of \$50,000 in 29 total amount that we Californians presented in 30 scholarships. 31 (Applause.) 32 EDUCATION CHAIRMAN FARISS: Give yourself a big 33 hand. At the president level, at the unit level, up to 34 the department level. I have first place certificates for 35 these folks. And I made two copies because if they're 36 like my president, they always try to take my certificate. 37 So I made a plain one to give to them and a fancy one for 38 you to keep for yourself. For you to keep for yourself. 39 Okay. I have a special award for Molly Smith, District 40 28, Education Chairman. 41 (Applause.) 42 EDUCATION CHAIRMAN FARISS: For the district at 43 the most scholarships won in the Education program. 44 (Applause.) 45 EDUCATION CHAIRMAN FARISS: She was so great 46 because she was afraid that James' scholarship wouldn't 47 get to me in time, so she scanned it and emailed it and 48 then mailed it and she wanted to make sure that he had an 49 opportunity. 50 The First Place Education Program at the unit

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1 level is presented to Chula Vista Unit 434, Chairman. Т 2 love this. The unit members, everyone pitched in and 3 worked on the Education. 4 (Applause.) 5 EDUCATION CHAIRMAN FARISS: Presented to District 6 22 Gigi Manno, Department -- from the Department Education Chairman First Place for District Education and 7 8 scholarship program with a supplemental. 9 (Applause.) 10 EDUCATION CHAIRMAN FARISS: Madam President, that 11 is my presentation. 12 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Thank you very 13 much, Linda. I appreciate it. 14 (Applause.) DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Next we're going 15 16 to hear from our Children & Youth Chairman Kathie 17 Martinez. And she is going to speed right threw it, I'm sure of it. 18 19 CHILDREN & YOUTH CHAIRMAN MARTINEZ: You betcha. 20 Yeah, it's getting late, ladies. 21 22 CHILDREN & YOUTH CONVENTION REPORT 23 24 CHILDREN & YOUTH CHAIRMAN MARTINEZ: Good 25 afternoon, ladies. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Good afternoon. 26 27 CHILDREN & YOUTH CHAIRMAN MARTINEZ: We've got to 28 get the paperwork done. Half a second here. The 29 Convention Committee on Children & Youth met on June 22nd, 30 2017 in the Raincross C room of the Riverside Convention 31 Center, Riverside, California. The statistical report of 32 this Chairman appears on page 49 of the Book of Reports. 33 C.J. Reyes, District 19, was appointed Secretary. Gloria Williams, District 23 offered prayer, and Dee Ann Graham, 34 35 District 15 was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 20 36 district delegates answered roll call. There were seven 37 visitors and one junior present. 38 Meeting opened according to ritual. The code was 39 read, and with the exception of a minor housekeeping change to Code 14, there were no changes to the code. 40 41 (Applause.) 42 CHILDREN & YOUTH CHAIRMAN MARTINEZ: Good job. 43 There was discussion on the purpose of the Children & 44 Youth with questions being answered by this chairman and 45 delegates in attendance. Certificates for second and 46 third place unit and district supplemental reports and for 47 the 100 percent reporting were presented, along with a 48 token of appreciation to all delegates from this chairman. 49 This concludes my committee report. May I 50 continue with my supplemental and first place awards?

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1 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Yes, you may. 2 CHILDREN & YOUTH CHAIRMAN MARTINEZ: Madam 3 President, as we strive to serve our veterans from sea to 4 shining sea, I am amazed at the work our units and 5 districts have done during this past year. The Angel Fish 6 truly showed their dedication to the Children & Youth of 7 our military families and those of non-military but still 8 in need. Units work as a family with their post, 9 squadrons, and Riders and also reached into their communities for the partnership -- for partnership from 10 11 other philanthropic and community organizations to meet 12 the needs within their areas.

Most units sponsored Halloween parties, Christmas parties, Thanksgiving dinners, Easter parties, but it was the uniqueness of some of them that made them special. Realizing there are many needs within a community and putting into practice our mission is what makes our members.

Many of the units reached out to their local fire, police, and community resource centers to find those families that were in need of our assistance. One such family was a victim of a tragic auto accident which took the lives of a mother and two daughters. The unit hosted a car wash and raised \$150 to help with final expenses.

Another unit has committed to buying groceries year-round to help the families in their community. Units partnered with their local schools hosting spaghetti dinners, Texas Hold-em tournaments to raise funds for the band, and cheerleading uniforms as the school district did not have a budget for these items.

31 Stuff a Stocking, six-foot stocking, was a big 32 fundraising partnership for one unit. Unit members along 33 with other groups donated many gifts and sold tickets for 34 their stocking. The winner of the stocking was a female veteran with two children, and upon winning the stocking 35 36 this family took one gift each for the children and then 37 took the remaining gifts to their local fire department 38 for their Toys-for-Tots events and helped pass out their 39 remaining gifts along with other gifts and toys that had 40 been donated to the families in the community.

41 Backpacks were filled by many of our units, some 42 for school, where they were stuffed with necessary items 43 for the upcoming year. One unit was made aware that many of the children in the schools received free breakfast and 44 45 lunch, but had nothing to eat when they got home, so there 46 were backpacks filled with snacks to send home. Another 47 unit filled backpacks with clothes, pajamas, and robes to 48 be given to foster children. A total of 800 backpacks 49 were filled and distributed.

50

Education of our children was a very -- was very

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evident as units gave and gave and gave to their local schools. School supplies, art supplies, and four \$1,000 scholarships were given by one unit. Another unit recognized the teachers by having goodie packs which were presented to their local teachers in teacher appreciation night.

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7 Units are promoting Veterans in the Classroom, 8 and as a result of that many of the children made thank 9 you cards to be sent to those serving in other countries as well as those in the local -- as well as those in the 10 local veteran facilities. Operation Valentine found unit 11 12 members back in the classroom with K through 2 students 13 making Valentine's cards to send to those serving 14 overseas.

The U.S. Vets Long Beach Cabrillo, a transition facility for female veterans with children, has become the main focus for one unit. Donations of clothes, household items and other essentials are made on a monthly basis. Children there were treated to a special carnival in addition to other holiday parties and festivals.

21 Day of the Child Program held by one unit 22 operated a booth handing out pamphlets on child safety, 23 drug and alcohol abuse and suicide prevention. Crayons 24 and pictures of the flag and Liberty Bell were handed out. 25 McGriff Child Safety materials were utilized at elementary 26 school assemblies by this same unit. Mini workshops were 27 held with and for our Juniors promoting Star Spangled 28 Kids. Units celebrated Constitution Day by promoting and 29 providing information on our constitution and how our 30 democracy works. Make-A-Difference Day saw our Senior and 31 Junior members placing over 300 yellow ribbons in the 32 windows of merchant stores in their community.

33 Children & Youth celebrations in the month of April showed just how dedicated our units are in their 34 35 communities for both military and non-military children. 36 Units held outings in the park where children were treated 37 to ice cream social, triathlons were held for the kids, 38 ducky pond races. Foster children were the quest of honor 39 at luncheons, Easter egg decorating, ducky pond races. 40 All participants in every event were awarded prizes --41 excuse me -- and no child went home without a gift.

42 Josh Dogs were purchased by one unit and donated to their local children's hospital to help those in need. 43 44 There were 18 Youth Good Deed awards presented by the 45 units in California. These young citizens worked in a 46 variety of areas from erecting a wall for fallen K-9 47 officers, slowing down traffic in their residential 48 streets, painting Legion halls, assisting in fire evacuations, donating to Locks of Love, rescuing lost 49 50 animals, assisting with house/yard work for senior

1 citizens, transporting veterans when called upon, 2 promoting, organizing, and working food banks for their 3 community. 4 Temporary financial assistance was stretched to 5 the max. A total of six families needed our assistance 6 this past year cases for a total of -- cases for a total of \$7,900. And I am proud to say that no request went 7 8 unanswered. Thank you, ladies. Thank you, Finance 9 Committee. 10 (Applause.) CHILDREN & YOUTH CHAIRMAN MARTINEZ: Many units 11 12 stepped up and made sure groceries were purchased, 13 utilities remained on, cars were repaired, in addition to 14 many other needs were met. Thank you all for your 15 generosity. 16 The units with the help of the Post, Squadron, 17 Riders, and community organization volunteered over 44,000 18 hours utilizing 1800 volunteers, collected over \$90,000 19 and \$35,000 in in-kind donation to help over 20,000 20 children and their families throughout the year. 21 Madam President, may I present my first place 22 awards? 23 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Yes, you may. 24 CHILDREN & YOUTH CHAIRMAN MARTINEZ: Thank you. 25 First Place Unit Supplemental Children & Youth presented 26 to John M. Armitage Unit 684, LuAnn Capazzi, Chairman. 27 (Applause.) 28 CHILDREN & YOUTH CHAIRMAN MARTINEZ: Thank you. 29 First Place District Children & Youth Supplemental 30 presented to Ann Marie Brown, District 22. 31 (Applause.) 32 CHILDREN & YOUTH CHAIRMAN MARTINEZ: In closing I 33 can only restate a line from one of the reports I received. "The Children & Youth program encompasses the 34 35 true meaning of the Legion Family and community working 36 together jointly to promote programs to protect, care for 37 and support children and youth, especially those of our 38 military veterans." 39 Madam President, thank you for this appointment. 40 It was an honor to serve. This concludes my report. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Thank you so much, 41 42 Kathie. 43 (Applause.) DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: 44 We'll now hear 45 from the Membership Chairman Loretta Marsh. 46 47 MEMBERSHIP CONVENTION REPORT 48 49 MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN MARSH: Okay. The convention 50 committee on Membership met on June 22nd in room Raincross

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1 D in the Riverside Convention Center, Riverside, 2 California. The statistical report of this chairman 3 appears on page 55 of the Book of Reports. 4 Ann Philcox was appointed secretary, Pat 5 Sinibaldi offered prayer, and Maureen Guacalone was 6 appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 16 district 7 delegates answered roll call. There were 14 visitors 8 present. 9 The committee agreed upon the following report. 10 Code was read and no changes were made. Awards were 11 presented for 14 -- March 14th goal accomplishment date, 12 100 percent goal, 100 percent reporting, Recruit 1, Rejoin 13 1, and second and third place supplementals. Floor opened 14 to a productive discussion time. Meeting adjourned at 15 11:15 a.m. Madam President, this completes the report of the 16 17 committee. May I continue with my report? DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: 18 Yes. 19 MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN MARSH: Madam Department 20 President Wendy, the Auxiliary Sea Turtles, as the 21 membership team was called this year, has worked very hard 22 from hatching after last year's convention and making 23 their way to the ocean representing their ultimate goal of 24 100 percent. Some made it with great speed and 25 determination, some a little slower but with great 26 determination, and others are still struggling to get 27 there before the close of books for Nationals in July. 28 Some are so close that their feet are getting wet, so just 29 a little push or one more step will get them there. You 30 can still do it. After all, turtles rule. 31 In spite of the outstanding work of many units, I 32 have a little gloom to add to my report. The Department 33 Membership statistics showed us at 94.89 percent on June 34 14th. One may think that almost 95 percent doesn't sound 35 all that bad, but that is a loss of 853 members for one 36 year. This week that went down to 124. So we did gain. 37 This is as of June 14th. 38 One may -- oh, this trend has been ongoing for a 39 few years now. The impact of this is far reaching. Not 40 only does it diminish our influence over congressional 41 issues for veterans, it is detriment tremendously to the 42 health and vitality of our units and has a tremendous 43 financial impact from the unit all the way to the National 44 coffers. Based on \$25 per year dues, loss of 853 members 45 represents a \$6,824 financial loss to the units and also 46 to the department annually. Multiply that over five years 47 and you have over \$34,000 lost of funding to the units and 48 the department. 49 And of course on the National level, the loss is 50 even more significant because they've got so many --

1 they've got the whole nation. So there is much to 2 motivate us to bring in new members and find ways to 3 overcome negative attitude and apathy to renewing 4 memberships. 5 Enough negative stuff. Let's talk about Okay. 6 the praises the units have deserved. Units have worked very hard. And we realize some units do not have the 7 8 resources others do. They have worked many tools to bring 9 in new members. Free breakfasts, lunches, teas and 10 dinners have been offers to stimulate dues payments. Letters, cards, phone calls and social media have been 11 12 utilized. Graduation and free dues for a year have been 13 given to juniors to keep them interested in staying 14 involved. Women veterans are still offered the first year 15 of membership for year. Members are involving their 16 Legion members by encouraging them to help them recruit 17 their wives, daughters, and granddaughters as members. 18 Units are initiating new members and preparing new member 19 packets. 20 District 29 Chairman reported a new member 21 suggested that new member packets should include a summary 22 of what a new member can expect when she attends her first 23 meeting so she is aware of protocol and expectations to 24 make getting acquainted with the Auxiliary a more 25 comfortable experience. 26 Social functions such as community events and 27 fairs, various holiday observances and parades and joining 28 with other organizations in their functions are all being 29 used to promote membership. And hard work has produced results. A total of 486 citations were presented for 30 31 reaching goal on the first three comparison dates. One hundred citations were given for 100 percent of their 32 33 goal. Of those 23 were over 110 percent. Four were over 34 120 percent. San Luis Obispo, Unit 66 District 16 reached 35 130.99 percent. 36 (Applause.) 37 MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN MARSH: Herman Granados Unit 38 739, District 21 reached 131.82 percent. 39 (Applause.) 40 MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN MARSH: Richard M. Nixon Unit 41 679, District 29 reached 161.54 percent. 42 (Applause.) MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN MARSH: And Hoopa Unit 415 in 43 44 District 1 reached 166.67 percent. 45 (Applause.) 46 MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN MARSH: Congratulations, 47 ladies. Well done. Sixty units earned the Josie Melgard 48 Congratulations, ladies. Well done. award. 49 Madam President, this concludes my report. May I 50 continue with my awards?

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1 DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Yes, you may. 2 MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN MARSH: Thank you. Awards 3 for second and third place district and unit supplemental 4 reports were presented in committee. The Ethel Flynn 27 Award this year goes to East Pasadena Unit 280, District 28 18. 29 (Applause.)
