stay at the right of the stage so that individuals or
group photos may be taken after the chairman's report.
Remember to be as quiet as possible so everyone can hear the reports of the following chairmen. Importantly, and as I've said before, please keep your cell phones off. We will now have Rules Chairman Glenda Schultz read the convention rules.

READING OF CONVENTION RULES
CONVENTION RULES CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: Good morning,

Madam President Wendy. At this time I will present the convention rules. The convention rules can be found on page 10 of the Book of Reports.

Madam President Wendy, this chairman will hesitate after each rule so if there is a question or an amendment, that may be presented at that time.

Number 1: All meetings of the convention shall be called to order at the designated times or soon thereafter as a quorum is present.

Number 2: A quorum shall exist when one-third of the Units in good standing are partially or wholly represented by duly elected delegates or alternates. (Article IV, Section 5, Department Constitution.)

Number 3: The audience shall remain seated during the business of the convention. The Department President shall designate certain doors to accommodate delegates who find it necessary to enter or leave the convention hall during reports of committees or when a speaker has the floor. There will be no smoking permitted in the auditorium. Cell phones must be turned off or in vibrate mode.

Number 4: The Chair may deviate from the printed program when necessary or expedient.

Number 5: The Credentials Chairman shall report registration as directed by the Chair.

Number 6: The registration of delegates or alternates shall close at 9:00 a.m. Saturday, June 24 th 2017.

Number 7: Only qualified delegates shall have voice and vote.

Number 8: It shall be the responsibility of each District President to see that only accredited delegates and alternates serving as delegates are seated in their District delegation during the business meetings of the Convention.

Number 9: If a delegate expects to be absent from the Convention, except for the purpose of attending a committee meeting, she should release her delegate's card to her alternate. The alternate shall then take her seat in the voting section. In the event the delegate does not have the opportunity of reporting to the District President, it shall be the duty of the Chairman of the unit delegation to report to the District President the absence of the delegate and the presence of the alternate or the absence of both delegate and alternate.

Number 10: A delegate wishing a privilege of the floor shall rise, address the Chair as Madam Department President, give her name, unit and district numbers, pause, and wait to be recognized by the chair.

Number 11, a member speaking in debate on a

question shall be limited to three minutes. No one shall speak more than twice on the same question without the consent of the assembly.

Number 12: Delegates attending called committee meetings shall be notified when the convention is considering and voting upon adoption of any change in policy or matters affecting finance.

Excuse me. Number 13: Reports of committees which do not appear to be controversial in any nature may be adopted by general consent, if there is no objection. If there is objection, a vote shall be taken. Following the acceptance of a report of the committee, recommendations or resolutions may be presented for consideration and adoption.

Number 14: Any committee whose proposed changes in policy might conflict with that of The American Legion shall confer with The American Legion before presenting said change to the Convention.

Number 15: A Committee recommending an appropriation of funds for any purpose shall consult with the Department Finance Committee before presenting the recommendation or resolution to the Convention.

Number 16: All resolutions to be presented to the Convention shall be in triplicate and properly signed.

Number 17: Committees may amend resolutions and recommendations referred to them before favorable reporting same. Resolutions or recommendations rejected by a committee shall be marked rejected, signed by the Chairman of the Committee, and returned to the Department Resolutions Chairman immediately following the Committee Meeting.

Number 18: A Unit, District, or members representing a resolution or recommendation shall have their privilege of explaining same to the Committee to which it was referred.

Number 19: Committee shall report to the Convention all resolutions properly submitted and accepted by a majority of the Convention Committee.

Number 20: A resolution rejected by a committee may be brought before the convention by two-thirds vote.

Number 21: Emergency resolution which may arise during the convention or after the date for submitting resolutions may be presented no later than noon of the second day of Convention. (Article IV, Section 4b, Department Constitution).

Number 22: Nomination of Officers, Junior Member of Finance, Department Delegates and Alternates to the National Convention shall be held Friday afternoon, June 23rd, 2017.

Number 23: Endorsement of candidates for

National Office shall follow nominations.
Number 24: Nomination speeches shall be limited
to three minutes. There shall be no seconding speeches.
Number 25: Election of Department Officers, Junior Member of Finance, National Candidate, Department Delegates and Alternates to the National Convention shall be held on Saturday morning, June 24 th, 2017.

Number 26: The doors of the Convention Hall
shall be closed during the entire election procedure and no one shall leave or enter the hall until Chair states the election is concluded. The exception to this shall be in an emergency a member may leave, and if her absence affects the voting strength, the District President shall immediately notify the presiding officer.

Number 27: When there is but one nominee for all department officers and but one nominee for Junior Member of Finance, the nominees shall be elected viva voce. (Article V, Section 3 Department Constitution). Upon roll call, the District Presidents shall report the number of units partially or wholly represented by newly elected delegates or alternates present in the delegation at the time of the roll call. This is to determine that there is a quorum of units present at the time of election.

Number 28: When there is more than one nominee for the Department Officers, Junior Member of Finance or endorsement for National Office, election shall be by written ballot. The District President shall, when they are instructed by the Chair, take a roll call of their respective delegation to ascertain the total voting strength of their District for the election reporting the same to Chair.

Number 29: When there are three or more nominees for office, Junior Member of Finance, or endorsement for National Office, unless one nominee receives a majority vote on the first ballot, the nominee receiving the lowest number of votes shall be automatically dropped before proceeding with the next ballot.

Number 30: When there is a candidate or candidates for an endorsement to a National Office a majority vote shall be by ballot. (Constitution Article V, Section 13.)

Number 31: Each District President Or District Member of the Election Committee shall distribute and elect the votes cast by the District delegation and deliver them to the Department Chairman of the Elections.

Number 32: Department Officers, Chairman, Committee Member, and Past Department President shall vote with their respective district.

Number 33: Each delegate shall be entitled to
one vote. The vote of an absent unit delegate not

represented by an alternate shall be cast by the majority of the delegates from the Unit. When two delegates represent three votes, the Chairman of the Unit delegation shall cast the third vote.

Number 34: A majority of all votes cast shall elect, except that -- except that in the election of national delegates or alternates of plurality shall elect.

Number 35: These Convention rules may be amended during the Convention by a two-thirds vote.

Number 36: Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised shall be the parliamentary authority on all points not covered by these rules, the Department Constitution \& Bylaws and Convention mandates.

Madam Department President Wendy, this concludes the reading of the convention rules. I move that the convention rules be considered as read and be adopted as a whole.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Second.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Okay. There is a motion on the floor -- oh, okay. Will you please reread number 30?

CONVENTION RULES CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: Number 30: When there is a candidate or candidates for an endorsement to a National Office, a majority vote shall be by ballot. (Constitution Article V, Section 13).

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Hold on just one moment.

CONVENTION RULES CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: Sorry about that. Number 30: All members seeking National office shall be endorsed at a Department Convention by a majority vote not more than three years prior to the date they are to be a candidate for office. Vote shall be by viva voce unless there is more than one candidate, then a majority vote shall elect by ballot. (Constitution Article V, Section 13).

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Thank you. Okay. Glenda, can you also go back to number 3 and reread number 3?

CONVENTION RULES CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: Number 3: The audience shall remain seated during the business of the Convention. The Department President shall designate certain doors to accommodate delegates who find it necessary to enter or leave the Convention Hall during reports of committee -- or committees when a speaker has the floor. Cell phones must be turned off or in vibrate mode.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Thank you, yes. Okay. So there is a motion on the floor to accept these rules of the convention as a whole. Any questions? If you have a question, could you please come up to one of

the mics. There are three mics up here. Could you please come up?

UNIT 621 PRESIDENT WALLER: Madam President -- is it on? Okay. Madam President, my name is Doreen Waller, President of Unit 621, Squaw Valley, California. In number 2 she had stated reading: A quorum shall exist when one-third of the Units in good standing are partially or wholly represented by duly elected delegates or alternates. Article IV, Section -- she said 5. It says Section 3. I just wanted to bring it to your attention. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Okay. Thank you. Right. There were a few misreadings, however, what is in the book is correct so that is what will be -- we'll be voting on this morning. All those in favor?

ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Opposed?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Motion carried.
CONVENTION RULES CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: Madam
Department President Wendy, Rule Number 3 provides it is your responsibility to designate certain doors to accommodate delegates to enter or leave the convention.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Okay. So since the rule said I'm going to do that, I'm going to. Right over here to your left -- my left is the doors that you will come and go through. Please try to be as quietly as possible because there is -- the chairs are very close, so having any intermingling with members in the hall right there or on this side of the doors will be very distracting for the members. So please take your business outside if you're going to do it. And the restroom is right down the hall. Oh, yeah. There's that too. Yeah.

CONVENTION RULES CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: I would
suggest that the Pages request delegates entering the hall to stand quietly and wait for the speaker to finish before returning to their seats.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: That sounds
fabulous to me.
CONVENTION RULES CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: Madam
President, thank you for this appointment and the opportunity to serve you and the Department of California. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Thank you so much, Glenda.
(Applause.)
SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: We had some bad news last night. Elaine Gallagher fell and broke her hip and is having surgery this morning. And Debbie Fletcher's brother has died.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Okay. Well, we've had our three so we don't need anymore. Okay. We have
some guests here this morning. Will the Sergeant-at-Arms and Marshal with the -- with the Distinguished Guest Chairman please bring to the stage Past Detachment Commander Chris Affolter and his aid. Affolter. Excuse me.
(Processional.)
PAST DETACHMENT COMMANDER AFFOLTER: Good
morning, ladies.
AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Good morning.
PAST DETACHMENT COMMANDER AFFOLTER: I was just
thinking maybe she just wore it out. Dang, that's a prison weapon right there. Greetings from the Sons of American Legion. Let me tell you those guys over there, they are wonderful. They put together -- or I should say I as the chairman for the convention city, we put together a deal. And I know I heard some conflict, but we have again the detachment youth party. It will be this saturday.

prospective new units in the process of forming: Leonard Yates Unit 709, District 6; James Fowler Unit 264, District 7; Samuel Patterson Unit 198, District 8; Northside Unit 858, District 13; and Temple City Unit 279, District 18.
(Applause.)
SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: I traveled to Indianapolis for the Department Leadership National Conference with Loretta Marsh and Joan Cannon where we received a lot of information including that the 2017-'18 Junior meeting held in conjunction with the ALA Mission Training will be held in Las Vegas on February 3rd and was told that National is proposing a $\$ 3$ membership increase at the Reno Convention to take effect during the 2018 administrative year. If passed, units would be submitting $\$ 20$ per capita for senior members with National receiving $\$ 12$ per senior member and $\$ 8$ for the Department of California instead of the $\$ 17$ that you normally submit.

In my opinion this needs to be discussed and decided whether or not the National delegates attending the Reno Convention will support or reject this proposal based upon the consensus of those present and voting at this Department Convention.

Operations of the Department Office are going well and finances are in great shape. With more and more new chairmen taking positions at the unit level, I would like to see training developed to increase the knowledge and comfort levels of those assuming new positions within the units.

Another area that $I$ would like to see developed is reporting and tracking all the required reports into a system simplified for the user as well as tracking and compiling all those reports we have to do.

DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN MOORE: The Beacons of Light from the Department of California have been very busy providing the spiritual needs of our entire American Legion Family. As this year comes to a close, we have much to be grateful for and thankful to be part of this great organization.

A total of 27 out of 30 districts provided year-end reports details activities of the 258 units within the State of California. 310 deceased members were reported, there were zero juniors reported, and three deceased Gold Star Mothers. Seventy-five units in 17 districts held memorial services for deceased members. Seventy-six units draped the charter for deceased members. Fifteen units reported having donated $\$ 1,476.01$ to the In Loving Tribute Fund. Sixteen units reported having participated in the Chapel of Four Chaplains and donating \$2,133.

Ten units brought prayer books to the convention for competition including two junior books. Twelve units are sending -- sent prayers for the Department President's Prayer Book. Twenty-two units reported sending 7,708 cards, various cards valued at $\$ 7,725.60$. Eighty-four units utilized "Reflections" prayers as a source, and 78 units utilized other sources.

Many units participated in various patriotic events such as Memorial Day, Veterans Day, Independence Day, 911 Remembrance, and Flag Day. Units and districts participated in 29 other activities including Veterans Day parades, Wreaths Across America, Junior Conference Flag Retirement, and Vietnam Memorial Wall just to name a few.

Chaplains reported visiting veterans in hospitals, nursing and convalescent homes. One unit donated 300 lap robes and blankets and hosted Stand Downs searching for homeless veterans on the streets, under bridges and provided needed assistance to those veterans.

Members of one unit created a counseling program consisting of veterans and others counseled those in need.

Chaplains have visited children's hospitals bringing cheer, celebrating birthdays, distributing toys and just simple companionship. One district along with the entire Legion Family prepares 2,000 fresh cut carnations, and with the assistance of the local police department and Legion Riders parade to the cemetery and places the carnations on grave sites on Memorial Day.

One unit maintains a memorial rose garden at a local park which was dedicated in May of 1944 to veterans killed in action. Units of one district raised funds for the burial of a member's loved one and many also donated and prepare food for numerous repasts.

This Chairman was honored to assist the Honorary Junior Chaplain at Junior Conference who happens to be here today, Teresa Pouliot. She's in the back. Assisted her at Junior Conference. I love seeing all of you because it's my one and only time a year I get to see a lot of the friends that $I$ left since $I$ moved to Arizona. But that's why I continue to work with the Auxiliary because $I$ just love it. I love coming and seeing my old friends. And they all know I'm a whackadoodle, but that's okay. It comes with -- thank you, sweetie. Thank you, Bonnie. Love you and I miss your mommy. Anyway, you -- you were around when my husband dressed like a bear and danced with your mom on stage in Fresno '91-'92, yes. Because her theme was bears. So my husband dressed up like a bear and he danced with Betty and that was his -- my husband danced with her on stage because she loved to dance.

Okay. Back to everything here. You know, we hopefully tried to make everything comfortable for you. We hope that there are no major problems, that everybody is kind of having a good time. Aren't you?

CONVENTION CHAIRMAN AVINA: Thank you. And I want to introduce some people that, like I say, my side kick isn't in here, but a lot of the gals from the $21 s t$ District, stand up. Come on, girls, come on. All of these ladies worked very hard to make sure that they supported our needs. And God love you all because I love you. See how that works.

Anyway, so I also want to -- okay. All you gals from other districts come in and they offer their help and they say if you need our help, we're here. And they did. And where is Ms. Jackie? Jackie, are you in the room? Where's my sister? Stand up, girl. She's taking care of -- she's taking care of the Pages. Hey, wait until you see me at the end of the summer. You'll know we're
sisters. Right, Jackie? Thank you, honey. I love you.
Anyway, you know, everybody here is just helpful and, you know, they're just good friends and I enjoy every bit of it.

And thank you for the pleasure of doing your convention, Madam President, El Capitan. You're the captain. You should be. Okay. And Sue Tozier for taking over the banquet. At the end of the banquet you can thank her. If it goes good, thank her. The Past President's luncheon of course is Judy. And I just thank all of you that were there for me. That's it, Madam President.

SERGEANT-AT-ARMS AND MARSHAL CONVENTION REPORT
SERGEANT-AT-ARMS DOIDGE: Good morning, everyone. I'm so sorry about the tail. I have to relax for a second. So I had a lot of trouble coming up with what to say today after what I said at DEC. I think I outdid myself at DEC, so I was, like, crud. So I finally got this done I think Tuesday morning and we left Tuesday evening, so we'll see.

Until 1912 there was no set design for the stars and stripes. Hidden in older versions of the flag, its markers laid hints of the country's history and quest for identity. Aptly, given its national anthem is about the flag, the stars and stripes is a key part of America's identity. It hangs in classrooms and courtrooms, on state buildings, and suburban porches.

It has been the national flag since 1777. And the flag that inspired the anthem was enormous, measuring 30 feet by 42 feet. It was raised over Baltimore's Fort McHenry during the War of 1812. Its 15 broad stripes and 15 bright stars inspired Francis Scott Key to write The Star Spangled Banner, the song that became The National Anthem. But before then half of the flag's 234-year history, there was no official design. The arrangement and appearance of the stars was up to the maker, and that makes it an artwork in a way that other nation's flag are. It's to do with this -- it's to do with this peculiar fact that they didn't standardize the design, so you could express different things within each flag.

Generally speaking, a flag is a flag. It's like a number plate or a logo. It always stays the same. But America -- but in America it didn't, which left room for people to express their creativity or their bile or their sadness.

So what are the hidden messages in these notable flags? The basic symbolism of the first flag was 13 stars in the form of a constellation and 13 stripes. Both of those counts reflected the number of original colonies. Multiple stars forming a single constellation was symbolic of the colonies coming together to form a new nation, and stars were added as more states joined the union. But they never specified what the constellation was supposed to be.

With no official design until 1912, some flag makers arranged the stars into one big star or in a circle or in rows. And some replaced a state's star with its initial to show where their sympathies lay. The many and varied designs encapsulate American individualism in flag form.

The Civil War era flag is a stark illustration of the -- stark illustration of the north/south divide at this turbulent moment in this American history. The Green Mountain Boys was a nickname for a Vermont military unit who used it to express her anger against the south. Some flags only showed 20 stars, though there should have been 34 or 35. Or at the tail end of the war it should have had 36 stars. The maker has done something that Abraham Lincoln said specifically not to do, which was remove the southern states from the flag during the war.

It is surmised that the maker had lost a son or sons in the conflict and so they said no, these guys are out; I'm not going to include those stars when $I$ make it. This flag, made soon after the Civil War of 1861 to 1865, comes from the defeated South. Sorry. This one comes from the defeated south. The stars are configured in a southern cross buried in the design of this flag. That was a subtle way of displaying southern sympathies. They're hiding the confederate battle flag within the stars and stripes. It's as if to say we have been forcibly incorporated into the United States, but we still feel southern.

As long as you had the right number of stars, you could configure it however you wanted. The most famous American flag of all is a huge banner from almost 200 years ago that hung at Fort McHenry. And the most notable aspect of its design is its sheer size. In 1814 the U.S. was again at war with its former colonial ruler. In an attack expected on Baltimore, the commanding officer of Fort McHenry requested a flag so large that the British
would have no difficulty seeing it from a distance, as well as to spook the enemy. He hoped it would also rally the spirits of Baltimore's citizens and soldiers alike. It took Maryland flag maker Mary Pickersgill and her young assistants weeks to sew short strips of wool bunting into the 42-foot flag that would become known as the Star Spangled Banner.

Several decades after the flag design was set in stone, Jasper Johns adopted it as a favorite subject. White flag -- no, it's supposed to be that way. White flag from 1955 now hangs in New York's Metropolitan Museum of Art. By painting the flag he expressed how he felt about America. He painted this in the McCarthyist period. Johns was never explicit about the message of his paintings, but observers liken the whited-out stars and stripes to the right-wing patriots suspicion of America's diversity.

Under the painting is a collage of beeswax and scraps of newsprint torn from the headlines and articles, adverts and letters to the editor. It's believed that the idea was that all the many -- that all the many voices of America were being submerged beneath the idea of a single nation represented by the flag. It's the conflict between trying to make America a nation and allowing it to be millions of people all expressing their own difference. Johns used the flag because of the U.S. -- Johns used the flag because in the U.S., it is an everyday object rather than one brought out for special occasions such as football matches or royal weddings as in the U.K. If you go to Spain or England or Scotland, there may be an occasional flag often tied to idea of separatism, but in America it's everywhere. It is such a huge continent so the flag becomes a point of coherence, a rallying point. And underneath its apparent uniformity, the flag has always been a focus for statements that don't quite toe the patriotic line. It's very interesting that something as uniform as a flag could be adapted to express such different aspects of the American conflict and life. Thank you.
(Applause.)

State focused on mainly some small changes that we needed to implement after last year. After having had the position for a year previously and learning so much, fine tuning was needed as suggested by Unit, Chairmen, and the Committee. We had a few kinks with the website, but once it was up, I found it very easy to use.

Changes that were implemented last session include two meal times, allowed us to accommodate more girls; daily flag raising and flag lowering ceremonies; and the Circle of Light Ceremony. All of those were suggestions that we found at the leadership conference in Indianapolis.

We added a couple of new questions for the girls on the online application because that was suggested at the National Girls State Leadership Conference, was to help us identify if we have any delegates with currently active duty or deployed family members.

As suggested by Unit Chairmen, we added lines onto the signature packet to help identify the girls more, school name and phone number. We also made sure to make the signature packet match the code and put in a signature line for Unit Chairmen. Many Unit Chairmen did not notice this addition and skipped it. Please get the word out that we like the Unit Chairmen to check and verify the signature packets for completeness.

Fourteen grants were offered by the Alumnae, but not many were taken. We had $\$ 1800$ donated to the Girls State General Fund that could have gone directly to units if they are struggling. Remember there are four full grants available to new schools and there are also ten matches grants available to units that are struggling financially to support all of the schools they are sending.

Ann Kelley, Assistant Director, has been in charge of the 75th Anniversary Committee. We are having our Diamond Jubilee 75th Girls State in 2018. Ann has a table in the lobby with earrings, necklaces, and pins for sale.

If you did not attend DEC, you may not have known that our state Samsung winner, Sadie Mae Mace, Unit 50, District 16 was an overall Samsung winner of $\$ 20,000$.

524 delegates to attend the 2017 Girls State session starting this Monday. It's a small increase from last year's session. 275 of these delegates are eligible to become members. 275, ladies. I always encourage the girls to give back to their units by joining them in membership. I am a member again because of the Girls State. Twenty-one delegates are currently members of our organization.

Some things I would like to touch on from my end-of-year reports. Eight units reported sponsoring a delegate for the first time within the last three years. Eighty-five units invited eligible American Legion Auxiliary Girls State delegates to join their units. Thirty-five eligible ALA Girls State delegates joined the ALA, and we received $\$ 4,210$ in donations from units.

I have had 68 and counting reservations dropped from the list, with two that are already paid for delegates and not having alternates that could attend. We have had 22 delegates drop out. And those were the ones that were covered by alternates. Four units were awarded grants by the Girls State Alumnae Foundation for a total of $\$ 2200$.

PPP CHAIRMAN BIGGS: I'm not even going to try to get that low. Those days are over.

Madam President, the Convention Committee on Past Presidents Parley met on June 22nd, 2017 in room Raincross E of the Riverside Convention Center right here in Riverside. The statistical report of this Chairman appears on page 56 of the Book of Reports.

Glenda Schultz, thank you, District 6 was appointed secretary. Susan Baker, District 28, offered prayer, and Tracy Varnell, Little Fercho, from District 16 was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. Yeah, Little Fercho. That's her new name. She's going to change her name. She's going to be Little Fercho. A total of 16 District Delegates answered roll call. There were five visitors present.

The committee agreed upon the following report. The code was read with no code changes. There were no resolutions. Committee recommended that nurse practitioners be considered for scholarship consideration, and I will pass this information on to next the chairman.

100 percent reporting awards were given to District 6, 10, 12, 18, 21, 24, 27, 28 and 29. Second and third place awards along with honorable mention was given to units and districts. District 6 and 28 were awarded for starting new unit parleys. Give them a big round of applause.
(Applause.)
PPP CHAIRMAN BIGGS: With no further business the meeting was closed with prayer and adjourned at 10:00 a.m.

Madam President, can I continue with my supplemental and awards, please?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Yes.
PPP CHAIRMAN BIGGS: Would all honorees please attend -- assemble in the back with Linda Workman if you're in the room, all luncheon honorees.

Madam President, thank you for your motto of, "Serving Veterans From Sea to Shining Sea." I want to first say that this year we had 100 percent district reporting. By hook or by crook, I got you all to report. Thank you so much. This allowed the Poseidon Adventure of our Queens of the Sea, our Past Presidents a great platform to recognize active duty servicewomen, honor female veterans, observe outstanding unit members, and seek out students entering our continuing nursing school.

We have three new Past President Parleys reported this year. This year found Past President Parleys hosting Valentine's Day parties, with a special party at the West LA VA Medical Center Naomi House for transitioning homeless female veterans with 45 goodie bags filled with hygiene items, pajamas, sweats, scarves, books and gift cards.

Many parleys led the way honoring female veterans and active duty servicewomen by hosting luncheons, giving flowers, cards, gift certificates and paying their dues. Other units adopted female veterans by providing them with many comfort items, clothing, pajamas, slippers, scarves, gift cards, hats and coats. Two Unit Parleys helped host an all-female veterans Stand Down in their county.

One unit Parley visited a local center that assists homeless female veterans and gave them a special luncheon. The city's vice mayor and councilman were invited and presented a special proclamation to the center. All the veterans in attendance received a very special gift bag from the Past Presidents.

Another unit Parley held a joint dinner with the Legion and celebrated generations of past and present female veterans. They all wore their uniforms and each told their military story. And this event was published in their newspaper.

Units held very unique and creative fundraisers, so I wanted to share with you on the department nursing scholarship one unit parley held a crazy 1 cent/400 cents opportunity drawing. I never heard of that either. Tickets are picked that have from 1 cent to 400 cents which is paid at that initial time. Then three lucky recipients were drawn and won $\$ 100$ each. This event raised $\$ 592$ for nurses' scholarships.

Another unit held a gift card extravaganza fundraiser where the winners all receive gift cards. And
this event raised $\$ 410$. We received so many qualified nursing school applicants and have awarded \$10,000 in scholarships. That's all from you, ladies.

PPP CHAIRMAN BIGGS: With the top applicant receiving $\$ 4,000$. All qualified applicants were awarded a portion of the remaining budget. It is through your generous donations that we can continue awarding these excellent students with some much needed financial assistance.

Active duty servicewomen deserve an award for all they do, and this year we are awarding two state winners, one representing the Army National Guard and one the U.S. Navy, both highly qualified and excellent contributors to their communities. The two department winners were forwarded to National for further review.

The Department President has the honor of selecting the Unit Member of the Year, and there were many submissions which made her job very difficult. And it took her quite a long time to get the submission to me, but thank you, Madam President.

The Unit Member of the Year, $\$ 4,000$ scholarship winner, and the active duty servicewoman winners have been invited to attend our Department Past President Parley luncheon where they will be guests of honor. I'm so proud that we are all here. It is apparent that California Past Presidents continue to contribute with their leadership and assistance in the welfare of our many unit members.

Madam President, this concludes my remarks. May I continue with my first place awards and present the Unit Member of the Year, the $\$ 4,000$ scholarship winner, and the two outstanding Active Duty Servicewomen of the Year to this delegation?

Our Auxiliary members are very active in the American Cancer Relay For Life as survivors, a team member, or part of the pre-event volunteer.

This year our state afire which devastated many of the mountain county communities. Our Molly Malones were there donating water, supplying blankets, hygiene items and clothing. One unit partnered with their post along with the Halliburton serving a \$5 lunch and raised thousands of dollars for those veterans in the nearby -excuse me. Nearby mountain community.

One Molly Malone unit organized a team and participated in a March Of Dimes walk at the state's capitol, the March For Babies, which benefits pregnant women, unborn and premature babies. They emailed and Facebooked invitations to family and friends to participate and/or to donate to the community's event.

During the summer a Molly reported holding two drives, one for food and the other for school supplies. The food was delivered to a pantry at the VA hospital and a naval weapons station, then helped three veterans trying to establish items for their apartments. The school supplies collected were given to two local schools. This outreach in their community allows them to demonstrate who we are and what our mission is and creates goodwill.

Mollys reported members assisting seniors and neighbors with transportation and errands, giving care packages where needed and taking meals to those who were ill, disabled, and elderly.

Our work sometimes goes unnoticed, like cleaning churches, placing flags on graves, volunteering in thrift stores, food pantries, and contributing to animal shelters and animal organizations. Debbie Fletcher from District 25 was appointed Secretary, Pilar Reyes, District 10, was appointed Chaplain, and Linda Diebel from District 19 was appointed Sergeant-At-Arms.

The Chaplain offered prayer, the members recited the Pledge of Allegiance. Roll call was answered by 16 delegates and there were six guests. 100 percent
reporting certificates were given to Districts 5, 6, 7, $10,11,14,17,18,19,21,22,23,24,27$, and 28. The department code was read and there were no code changes.

Chairman Tamra Duron reported on a correction that needs to be made to the model bylaws. On a motion by Linda Dieble, it was voted to change Article IV, Section 2 of the unit bylaws to read: "And one more executive committeewoman." On a motion by Linda Dieble it was voted to change Unit Model Bylaws Article IV Unit Officer Section 3.

Once all business was concluded there was a question and answer session with discussion on Junior Past President and the process to surrender a charter. The Chaplain offered prayer and the meeting concluded at 10:10 a.m.

Madam President, may I proceed with my supplemental?

(The offices of secretary and treasurer may be combined.)"

Our Model Unit Bylaws Article IV Unit Officer
Section 2 now reads: "The elective officers shall be: President, First Vice President, Second Vice President, Secretary/Treasurer and at least one Executive Committeewomen and shall be elected annually by majority vote at a meeting designated by a vote of the Unit, provided nominations and elections are held not earlier than April 1st or less than five days prior to the opening of Department Convention. The Unit shall notify their membership and the District President of the time set for election."

By direction of the committee I move the
following change: "The elective officers shall be:
President, First Vice President, Second Vice President,
[Page 68]

Secretary/Treasurer and one or more Executive Committeewomen and shall be elected annually by majority vote at a meeting designated by a vote of the Unit, provided nominations and elections are held not earlier than April lst or less than five days prior to the opening of Department Convention. The Unit shall notify their membership and the District President of the time set for election."

The justification in this is to bring the Model Unit Bylaws in line with the Department Constitution.

CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN DURON: As the fleet of Wendy's Cruise Liners have sailed the calm, rippling water of the California oceans, many amendments and rewrites were submitted before docking into the many breezy ports of call. Some minor citations were issued for problems such as leaving required officers out of their Constitution \& Bylaws or appointing all executive committeewomen rather than keeping the mandatory elected one.

The biggest infraction was not using the model bylaws as is necessitated by our department code. Some chose to completely type them rather than use the fill-in provided by the Department. This caused many errors and the return of the Constitution \& Bylaws to the chairman for corrections.

All in all at year's end $I$ am happy to report no accidents at sea, broken down vessels or arrests have been reported by the many qualified port authority officers of the Department of California.

Constitution \& Bylaws are the governing document for our organization. They provide guidelines for what we can and cannot do in our units, districts and department, as well as provide stability ensuring business is conducted correctly. It is the responsibility of each member to become familiar with this document guaranteeing that the different levels of our organization are operating within the guidelines established for them. When we become familiar with our governing documents, we become responsible members.

Operating by our Constitution \& Bylaws also provides the avenue for civility within each level of our organization, preventing arguing, tension, and hard feelings towards one another. When the rules are followed, there are no questions about how things are being done. The Constitution \& Bylaws should not be used to point out a member's errors, criticizing them for work

done incorrectly. Rather, they should be used as a guide showing them how to do things appropriately and orderly. Constitution \& Bylaws are created to protect the rights of members giving them a voice in how the units and districts are ran. We must remember the voice of the minority is just as important as the voice of the majority.

This past year several units and districts rewrote their Constitution \& Bylaws as the ten-year mandate as well as many both amending them. Constitution \& Bylaws were reviewed at the beginning of the year, during organizational meetings, district meetings, unit meetings, and executive board meeting. They were also reviewed at the end of the year before elections to ensure elections were held correctly and members would know their responsibilities as they were elected and appointed as officers and chairmen of their districts and units.

It is reported that 18 of our 30 districts have standing rules with nine revising or reviewing them. Units followed suit with 96 units having standing rules, with almost half reviewing or revising them. Units and districts have Constitution \& Bylaws in procedure books for president, secretaries, and the Constitution \& Bylaws chairmen as well as giving copies to every member yearly and to new members during initiation ceremonies and when being accepted for membership into the units.

Units and districts also report having copies of the Department Constitution \& Bylaws for their members and keep Roberts Rules of Order Newly Revised on hand for use when needed.

Of the units reporting most recite the preamble at meetings and 2,906 members have it memorized.
Districts and units alike report knowing the importance of utilizing the Department, District and Unit Constitution \& Bylaws and Standing Rules when conducting Auxiliary
business. They also realize the role of Roberts Rules of Orders Newly Revised and use it to clarify what is not in the governing documents.

This chairmen encouraged members to learn the content of their Constitution \& Bylaws and challenged District Constitution \& Bylaw chairmen to invent a game encouraging the learning of the Constitution \& Bylaws while at the same time keeping it fun. One district participated and won the $\$ 50$ cash prize for entering the contest.

And now, Madam President, with your year coming to an end, I can say this has truly been a rewarding experience for this chairman as I did my best to fulfill my responsibilities and duties as Constitution \& Bylaws chairman as outlined in our governing document and

And if anyone knows me, they know that's my passion, but I do believe eight-year-olds are a little young. It's hard even working with the ten year olds sometimes. They're so cute and they're so darling and they're so hyper and usually it's an all-night affair sometimes.

I know my own granddaughter cried all night and Bonnie Christner called my daughter Tracy and said "Jackie is crying." And Tracy gets on the phone and says: "Knock it off and go to bed." Jackie asked: "Can I go horseback riding?" "Not if you don't go to bed." She went to bed.

And those who have been to Junior Conference know that I would love to see more girls go. I mean, and this would be a way to get more girls to go, but my daughter wouldn't have been ready at eight, I can tell you that. So I just really feel that we need to consider that and get more girls between ten and 18 to go. Thank you very much.
(Applause.)
JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN SINCLAIR: I
understand that a lot of people are thinking that eight is too young and, yeah, it would bring up our numbers, but the main reason for this is $I$ had 15 telephone calls from parents whose children have fulfilled all their requirements and when they turn six to ten, they're doing everything that a Junior Auxiliary member does, but they're not getting their reward for it.

The little girl that got all the certificates, I can't remember what unit, she's seven years old. She's seven years old. And she did all that work by herself.

And she went to one of our workshops and she was just like: Come on; I want to go. And I think even if we try it for one year, you know. I mean, I got 15 phone calls. That's a lot of phone calls.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: The Chair recognizes Tracy.

NATIONAL SECURITY CHAIRMAN VARNELL: Hi. Good afternoon. I'm Tracy Varnell Fercho, Past District President. I have been to Junior Conference. Jackie and I had a great time. Where is she? My girl. I understand about wanting juniors to go; I definitely get that. And yes, they do do a lot, but personally I do have to agree with Linda Fercho. Eight years old does seem a little young to me.

And the problem is that if you haven't gone to Junior Conference and you have to deal with that eight-year-old and then you have a big span -- in my opinion a big span between 18 and eight and you have to find different activities. Because eight-year-olds are not going to be dancing like the 16- to 17-year-olds because I personally wouldn't want my eight-year-old to dance like my 16-year-old.

So I personally have to agree that eight I feel is a little young just because of the difference of their maturity levels. Thank you.
(Applause.)
PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Madam
President, Anita Biggs, District 23, Unit 252. I've been going to Junior Conference $I$ believe for the last five, six years consistently. And I understand the rationale for lowering the age. I kind of don't like the word "understood" because I don't know what that means. It says "understood." I like the word "required" more so only because it would have to be -- "understood" is a good word in a way, but a requirement that -- it has to be required that the child understands that they're going to like a camp. It's only a weekend. I'm for the lowering of the age only because $I$ think it would improve and increase the number of girls.

The direction of the conference by whomever is in charge, that is where the tone is going to be set so that they get enough counselors to monitor these children, the youngsters. You know, I call them youngsters. So as long as they have enough supervision and they're in a situation where they're together, they can comingle with the other girls and it wouldn't be -- it's not a -- it's not -there's no dirty dancing done anymore. I mean, maybe when you were there, Tracy, you were dirty dancing.

Okay. But $I$ think it is -- I think it would be a good thing to maybe increase our Junior Conference
attendance. I mean Juniors grow up. That's the problem. They grow up and out, and so we just have to keep them and to keep the program alive to keep our Juniors going. This might be an opportunity -- if it doesn't work for -- try it out. If I doesn't work, change the code next year. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Thank you.
DISTRICT DELEGATE GREETI: Madam Department President, Susie Carrow-Greeti. I am a Past Junior President. And I agree with lowering the age for several reasons. One, I think it's great. The younger that we can get our children involved to learn our programs at a younger age, the better we are. It is up to the parents to make sure that their daughters are eligible and understand the validity before allowing them to go. So a parent also has a little more responsibility as well, but to allow these children -- because children are having children and $I$ think as long as the child is willing to do the job and go out and be a part of our family, allow them to do it at the age of eight and older. I enjoyed my time being a Junior. I also enjoyed my time being the Department President as far as the Juniors and I enjoy being involved with my family here. Thank you. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Go ahead. DISTRICT 16 DELEGATE REID: Good afternoon, Madam President. My name is Geneivere Reid and I'm with District 16, Unit 48. I have gone to Junior Conference for the last three years. I am also the mother of three daughters and I personally feel that eight-year-olds is too young. We've had -- I have I think eight active Juniors right now and they all want to go to conference, but they're just not ready.

I agree maybe lowering it one year would be a good start, but $I$ think jumping two years is just going too much for these kids. And unless they're doing other activities that are overnight away from their parents first, it's too much.

I mean, what are we going to do about counselors with the younger kids? Because they're going to require so much extra attention and care. I think nine years old would be a good place to start, but jumping two years is just too much.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Thank you. DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN MOORE: Sharon Moore,
District 23, Unit 252. I've been a room mom for the past, what, seven, maybe eight years. This was the first year that I did not have kids in my room, but I agree that eight-year-olds -- there are many mature eight-year-olds and it's up to the parents to decide if they're mature enough to say that eight-year-old is okay to go. That's a choice. Okay. That gives us more opportunity to be able
to get more girls out.
So if you know your child is not mature enough at eight, then, you know, maybe they can wait until the next year. But I think we should open it up for them to have that opportunity. And I agree with the young lady that indicated about teaching them, you know, early on. Junior Conference is a great way to bring them up in the organization. And we need the young folks. Look at our convention here. This is the smallest convention I've ever seen since I've been coming. We need to get these young girls started at an early age, as early as we can and it's up to the counselors to choose the age that they want. And we have -- we had so many counselors this year. So that's my opinion. Thank you.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Thank you.
DISTRICT 24 PRESIDENT ARTIS: Deloris Artis,
District 24. I have been a counselor -- a director of the Junior Conference several times through the years and I think my opinion is we need to change the program back to when we had younger children and adopt the program. We can't have eight-year-olds if we're having meetings -setting meetings all day like they were the last time that I was director. So let's revamp the program and have our eight- and nine-year-olds come because there's so many things we can teach them.

C.A.L.P.A. PRESIDENT ELLIS: Thank you very much. Post 739 in Indio, California. Is our Commander Mary Riser here? How about our District President? That would be Susan Romero from District 21. There she is.
(Applause.)
C.A.L.P.A. PRESIDENT ELLIS: The California

American Legion Press Association works with Auxiliaries across the state, Legionnaires, Riders and Sons. And our mission is simple. Our mission is to work with you in elevating your program visibility. What we do is we create flyers. Now if you stop down near our booth, you'll see examples of flyers including one that we did for a no bake sale. I don't know what Auxiliary member thought that up where you've got to pay money for pie and cake that you never get and can eat, but they raised like 700 bucks for that. I created a flyer for that. I could create one for you. And it doesn't cost a dime. We create flyers, we create Facebook pages. We can help you with a press release. We can help you with your website. We can help you with your newsletter.

And, look, here's what it comes down to. When we can elevate the visibility of The American Legion across every unit, membership increases. Attendance at our events becomes greater because word is getting out. It's getting out in many different forms, you know, in the newspaper, in the media. And when we do that, what's going to happen; right? Membership increases, more fundraising comes in, and greater community recognition occurs. And that is what C.A.L.P.A. does for you at absolutely no cost. Now there's a membership fee. Oh, gosh. It's ten bucks a year. That's it, ten bucks a year.

Now you do not have to be a media professional to be a member of C.A.L.P.A. You don't have to be a press member, but what you do get, excuse me, is a press card. You can see that right there. And it shows that you represent the community. And the fact that you are here at this convention sitting in those chairs showing that you care that you represent your individual posts, you represent your district, you represent your area and we want to help you make it even better.

Now right now how many of you out there are currently C.A.L.P.A. members? Raise your hand. Okay. This is -- there you go. Now an interesting thing about C.A.L.P.A. is $I$ made a pitch to the Legionnaires at a district meeting and a small number of them joined C.A.L.P.A. That's okay, but the Auxiliary did in mass. The women got it because who are the movers and shakers in
the post? Who gets things done? Who puts the flyers out there; right?

C.A.L.P.A. PRESIDENT ELLIS: You know, a little bit of a story. Here's kind of how we work. We had a young man in our community at the local high school from the band, the high school band and he played Taps for the funerals of our veterans. Well, we created a flyer. Actually it was free. It was a certificate of appreciation to present to this young man at his local high school in front of his band members. And he didn't know we were coming. The principal was there, his grandparents were there, his mom and dad were there, but we got $A B C$ and CBS television to be there and it was on the local news that evening and the next morning. We can help you do that.

Don't think that you can't get that type of publicity for your local post. They will answer if we knock, and that's what we're doing. We're helping you to do the knocking. We're here to point the direction. Here's how you get the article in the newspaper. Here's how you get the local $T V$ station to come into your unit. So maybe you don't know how to do it, but we do. We're C.A.L.P.A. We've got a whole group of professionals waiting in the wings just for you.

So I would like to invite each and every one of you to join the California American Legion Press Association. Represent your post. Represent your district. Represent your area. And when this convention closes for today, myself and/or some staff members, there's Ryan Bagley, we'll have applications when you file out that door. It's just ten bucks a year. ## AMERICANISM CONVENTION REPORT

AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SMITH: There's lipstick on the microphone. Ahoy. The Convention Committee on Americanism met on Thursday, June 22 nd, 2017 in the -- in

Raincross C in the Riverside Convention Center, Riverside, California. The statistical report of this chairman appears in the Book of Reports on page 46. With the consent of the delegates, Linda Fercho was appointed Secretary, Donna Scott offered prayer, and Joan Cannon was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 21 delegates answered roll call. There were nine visitors present.

The code was read and the committee agreed on two housekeeping items that we handled during the committee meeting. It was just punctuation.

The delegation asked a question about the increase in the cash award for Group V. With the input of the delegates on the floor, we concluded that this was due to the age of the essay students competing in that category. Many of the Group $V$ students are in the same age bracket as the students in Group IV.

It was stressed for the unit and district chairmen to ensure that all information requested in the instructions are provided on the back of the essays. The student addresses were needed when the Department Chairman is processing the awards.

100 percent reporting certifications were given to Districts 3, 7, 10, 11, 12, 13, 17, 18, 20, 24, 25, 28. Citations were awarded to units and districts. Americanism essay certificates and checks for second and third place awards were announced and presented to the District Chairmen. First place awards will be announced on the convention floor.

Two items were discussed as follows: It was noted that a person from another country reciting the Pledge of Allegiance should not salute the flag, but instead stand with their hands at their sides. The second is a remainder that the line, "One nation under God" should not include a pause and that we should train all citizens to recite the pledge correctly.

New business. The delegates discussed some of the challenges related to the Americanism titles this year, noting that we need to ensure that each title is phrased correctly with the proper punctuation. Many teachers and chairmen have offered suggestions to alleviate ongoing frustration and streamline the instructions to enhance the Americanism program. The committee would like to recommend that the incoming chairman form a committee to revise the instructions with several past chairmen and bring recommendations to the membership at next year's convention. Meeting closed at 10:50 a.m.

Madam President, may I continue with my supplemental report and first place awards?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Yes, you can.

DISTRICT 2 PRESIDENT HENDERSON: Judy Henderson -- is this on? Judy Henderson, District 2 President.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: The Chair recognizes Judy.

DISTRICT 2 PRESIDENT HENDERSON: I did Americanism last year for Group $V$ and we had an issue with the part about the addresses. Because with special ed, there's a real high confidentiality and with that with the confidentiality issue, you cannot reveal the names and addresses because of the confidentiality thing. My teacher told me that $I$ was not allowed to put the addresses of the children's names on it because of the confidentiality issue.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Yes, Judy. It's just a recommendation for next year's chairman.

DISTRICT 2 PRESIDENT HENDERSON: Well, I'm
just --
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: So it's a point --
DISTRICT 2 PRESIDENT HENDERSON: Well, I'm just mentioning that because she said it's a recommendation and I'm saying that my teacher is well versed --

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Right, right.
DISTRICT 2 PRESIDENT HENDERSON: -- in that issue of confidentiality told me that you cannot -- I personally could not put the addresses on there because of the confidentiality issue with special ed children which is in Group V.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Yes. Thank you very much. Go ahead.

AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SMITH: Thank you. Madam President Wendy, your nautical theme brought extraordinary opportunities to strength and patriotism at ports of call from sea to shining sea. Our Manta Ray Patti has grown up. She's become very mature. I don't know if you saw her when she was little at the beginning of the year. And she has become a mom and there are at least 30 babies playing on the decks of the cruise line. Can those babies stand up? Anybody that has babies. That's it. Come on. Where is our babies?

Okay. The Americanism Manta Rays have made us very proud and inspired us with many tales of the sea, assisting veterans, military troops, and family. The Manta Rays have been hard at work reminding members and the community of proper flag etiquette and demonstrations on the proper way to dispose of the American flag. The American Legion Auxiliary Junior Conference participated in an inspiring flag disposal ceremony led by Kim Vincent. We were amazed by the reactions and the questions from the Junior members. Over one hundred pocket flags were folded to be sent to active duty military. The ALA members are

doing a great job grooming our future leaders.
Members continue to pass out flag etiquette brochures, sharing personal feelings of patriotism, and participating in legislation to ensure that we maintain the laws that protect our veterans.

Vote. Many members led campaigns to get citizens registered to vote, worked at the polls, and walked precincts. One of the essays stated that they had participated with grandparents in working the polls.

Patriotic holidays are celebrated sharing food, participating in parades, and honoring veterans by all ports of call across the state. Members continue to watch the condition of flags to ensure that worn and tattered flags are replaced when needed, sponsor Stand Downs, hold job fairs for events and provide support for community and children and youth.

The Americanism Essay Contest was a great success and it was enlightening to read the profound ideas that the students shared in their grade levels. It is a great exercise to help children think about American ideals and in honing writing skills and the ability to follow instructions. The essays clearly show that the students have great understanding of patriotism and the pride and benefits of being an American. Their insights are profound. They really love helping veterans and one student stated he really likes helping old people over the age of 50 .

Members decorate military and veteran-based facilities at holiday time, sponsor bingo, make cards and spend time reading them with veterans in the hospital. One unit supports a local Fisher House providing meals and support for families experiencing catastrophic illnesses. One unit had kids participate in a scavenger hunt looking for patriotic icons and symbols in and around the post. Units present Blue Star Banners to local families, present patches to the children scripted with, "We honor those who served."

There is never a shortage of patriotic pride among ALA members. We love to show our spirit by supporting our red, white, and blue, our pins and patriotic gear. Members also take every opportunity to share the importance of our mission within their communities. ALA members are proud to belong to the world's largest women's patriotic organization, participating in local city government meetings, speaking at community events, taking every opportunity to share the importance of caring for our veterans and reminding them of the ultimate sacrifice that was made for our freedom.

person who acted as Sergeant-at-Arms at the preconvention committee here? She was very good.

A total of 19 district delegates answered roll call and there were 14 visitors present. The committee agreed to the following report: Basically that we would like to see the Children of Warriors award be awarded \$500 scholarship if they do not receive the National. I think this is just because this is a fairly new scholarship, National scholarship that it was not incorporated into our programs. So when I'm not -- anything that has to be voted on, I am just going to suggest to the next Education Chairman that she look into making this a part of the department code.

We discussed Veterans in the Classroom, Welcome Home For Vietnam Veterans, and units that offer scholarships. Delegates were urged to encourage donations to Department Education Program and purchase Poppy Seals. The meeting adjourned at 12:02.

One unit held a paint and sip party for the teachers of a local school. They were sipping tea. That's what their report said.

Our most recent program of Veterans in the Classroom is growing in popularity as more units and more veterans are embracing the method of reaching out to our children. As veterans related their experiences in the military, all could see how favorably the students
reacted. The children were so thrilled that they asked the veteran how to join the service after graduation.

We were able to reach children in kindergarten through sixth grade, eighth grade, and llth grade.
Earlier in the school year one unit provided meals at a local junior college with a large veteran enrollment. At the request of the school they are now donating $\$ 50 \mathrm{a}$ month to the food pantry. One of our units has an annual fundraising event where they sell meat pies. They raised enough for four $\$ 1,000$ scholarships at this four-day festival. Pretty neat to do all your fundraising in four days.

We had volunteers who read to children, mentored those children who were below the level they should be. One member works with the learning dynamics reading system. Another unit provided two ladies to read to six children of four mothers whose first language is not English.

We were pleased to report that The American Legion Auxiliary joined with other organizations in Read Across America and 211 Call to Courage that works with wounded military personnel that want to further their education. The volunteers work to find community colleges, trade schools, and adult schools that can fill the needs of the veterans.

We continue to collect Box Tops and Campbells labels. Many units made direct donations to local schools in addition to the Give 10 Program. A couple of units donations -- a couple of the unit donations were particularly interesting. Remembering those in need -what did I write? Remembering those most in need, one unit donated $\$ 400$ to a class for autistic children and another made a large donation to a local school district to purchase backpacks, sweaters, umbrellas, and school supplies for the homeless students that live in the district's junior high and high school areas.

It is fascinating to learn of all the different ways that our members further the education program, such as one unit adopted a teacher to whom they presented school supplies and a stipend. A luncheon was held for a Head Start Program. Donations to Junior ROTC and 15 backpacks were filled with school supplies for a dual language class. Many of our members volunteered in classrooms and as playground monitors. We distributed literature regarding some of our other programs: I Pledge Allegiance, Light of Liberty, Our Country's Veterans, and Say No to Drugs.

One of those units who hoped to keep our children from trying drugs gave out antidrug literature as well as 100 book -- 100 bookmarks at the Mule Day Parade, an
important event that draws people from long distances.
Our department is large and varied. Some units are in tall mountains, others are below sea level. Some are near sunny beaches, while others are in desolate deserts. No offense. We have units in bustling urban areas and peaceful farmland. However, all are interested in the education of our children and youth. We all know that only through better education can we assure better lives for our next generation.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Yes, you may.
CHILDREN \& YOUTH CHAIRMAN MARTINEZ: Madam
President, as we strive to serve our veterans from sea to shining sea, I am amazed at the work our units and districts have done during this past year. The Angel Fish truly showed their dedication to the Children \& Youth of our military families and those of non-military but still in need. Units work as a family with their post, squadrons, and Riders and also reached into their communities for the partnership -- for partnership from other philanthropic and community organizations to meet the needs within their areas.

Most units sponsored Halloween parties, Christmas parties, Thanksgiving dinners, Easter parties, but it was the uniqueness of some of them that made them special. Realizing there are many needs within a community and putting into practice our mission is what makes our members.

Many of the units reached out to their local fire, police, and community resource centers to find those families that were in need of our assistance. One such family was a victim of a tragic auto accident which took the lives of a mother and two daughters. The unit hosted a car wash and raised $\$ 150$ to help with final expenses.

Another unit has committed to buying groceries year-round to help the families in their community. Units partnered with their local schools hosting spaghetti dinners, Texas Hold-em tournaments to raise funds for the band, and cheerleading uniforms as the school district did not have a budget for these items.

Stuff a Stocking, six-foot stocking, was a big fundraising partnership for one unit. Unit members along with other groups donated many gifts and sold tickets for their stocking. The winner of the stocking was a female veteran with two children, and upon winning the stocking this family took one gift each for the children and then took the remaining gifts to their local fire department for their Toys-for-Tots events and helped pass out their remaining gifts along with other gifts and toys that had been donated to the families in the community.

Backpacks were filled by many of our units, some for school, where they were stuffed with necessary items for the upcoming year. One unit was made aware that many of the children in the schools received free breakfast and lunch, but had nothing to eat when they got home, so there were backpacks filled with snacks to send home. Another unit filled backpacks with clothes, pajamas, and robes to be given to foster children. A total of 800 backpacks were filled and distributed.

Education of our children was a very -- was very

evident as units gave and gave and gave to their local schools. School supplies, art supplies, and four $\$ 1,000$ scholarships were given by one unit. Another unit recognized the teachers by having goodie packs which were presented to their local teachers in teacher appreciation night.

Units are promoting Veterans in the Classroom, and as a result of that many of the children made thank you cards to be sent to those serving in other countries as well as those in the local -- as well as those in the local veteran facilities. Operation Valentine found unit members back in the classroom with $K$ through 2 students making Valentine's cards to send to those serving overseas.

The U.S. Vets Long Beach Cabrillo, a transition facility for female veterans with children, has become the main focus for one unit. Donations of clothes, household items and other essentials are made on a monthly basis. Children there were treated to a special carnival in addition to other holiday parties and festivals. Day of the Child Program held by one unit operated a booth handing out pamphlets on child safety, drug and alcohol abuse and suicide prevention. Crayons and pictures of the flag and Liberty Bell were handed out. McGriff Child Safety materials were utilized at elementary school assemblies by this same unit. Mini workshops were held with and for our Juniors promoting Star Spangled Kids. Units celebrated Constitution Day by promoting and providing information on our constitution and how our democracy works. Make-A-Difference Day saw our Senior and Junior members placing over 300 yellow ribbons in the windows of merchant stores in their community.

Children \& Youth celebrations in the month of April showed just how dedicated our units are in their communities for both military and non-military children. Units held outings in the park where children were treated to ice cream social, triathlons were held for the kids, ducky pond races. Foster children were the guest of honor at luncheons, Easter egg decorating, ducky pond races. All participants in every event were awarded prizes -excuse me -- and no child went home without a gift.

Josh Dogs were purchased by one unit and donated to their local children's hospital to help those in need. There were 18 Youth Good Deed awards presented by the units in California. These young citizens worked in a variety of areas from erecting a wall for fallen K-9 officers, slowing down traffic in their residential streets, painting Legion halls, assisting in fire evacuations, donating to Locks of Love, rescuing lost animals, assisting with house/yard work for senior
citizens, transporting veterans when called upon, promoting, organizing, and working food banks for their community.

Temporary financial assistance was stretched to the max. A total of six families needed our assistance this past year cases for a total of -- cases for a total of $\$ 7,900$. And $I$ am proud to say that no request went unanswered. Thank you, ladies. Thank you, Finance Committee.

CHILDREN \& YOUTH CHAIRMAN MARTINEZ: Many units stepped up and made sure groceries were purchased, utilities remained on, cars were repaired, in addition to many other needs were met. Thank you all for your generosity.

The units with the help of the Post, Squadron, Riders, and community organization volunteered over 44,000 hours utilizing 1800 volunteers, collected over $\$ 90,000$ and $\$ 35,000$ in in-kind donation to help over 20,000 children and their families throughout the year.

MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN MARSH: Madam Department
President Wendy, the Auxiliary Sea Turtles, as the membership team was called this year, has worked very hard from hatching after last year's convention and making their way to the ocean representing their ultimate goal of 100 percent. Some made it with great speed and determination, some a little slower but with great determination, and others are still struggling to get there before the close of books for Nationals in July. Some are so close that their feet are getting wet, so just a little push or one more step will get them there. You can still do it. After all, turtles rule.

In spite of the outstanding work of many units, I have a little gloom to add to my report. The Department Membership statistics showed us at 94.89 percent on June 14th. One may think that almost 95 percent doesn't sound all that bad, but that is a loss of 853 members for one year. This week that went down to 124 . So we did gain. This is as of June 14th.

One may -- oh, this trend has been ongoing for a few years now. The impact of this is far reaching. Not only does it diminish our influence over congressional issues for veterans, it is detriment tremendously to the health and vitality of our units and has a tremendous financial impact from the unit all the way to the National coffers. Based on $\$ 25$ per year dues, loss of 853 members represents a $\$ 6,824$ financial loss to the units and also to the department annually. Multiply that over five years and you have over $\$ 34,000$ lost of funding to the units and the department.

And of course on the National level, the loss is even more significant because they've got so many --

they've got the whole nation. So there is much to motivate us to bring in new members and find ways to overcome negative attitude and apathy to renewing memberships.

Okay. Enough negative stuff. Let's talk about the praises the units have deserved. Units have worked very hard. And we realize some units do not have the resources others do. They have worked many tools to bring in new members. Free breakfasts, lunches, teas and dinners have been offers to stimulate dues payments. Letters, cards, phone calls and social media have been utilized. Graduation and free dues for a year have been given to juniors to keep them interested in staying involved. Women veterans are still offered the first year of membership for year. Members are involving their Legion members by encouraging them to help them recruit their wives, daughters, and granddaughters as members. Units are initiating new members and preparing new member packets.

District 29 Chairman reported a new member suggested that new member packets should include a summary of what a new member can expect when she attends her first meeting so she is aware of protocol and expectations to make getting acquainted with the Auxiliary a more comfortable experience.

Social functions such as community events and fairs, various holiday observances and parades and joining with other organizations in their functions are all being used to promote membership. And hard work has produced results. A total of 486 citations were presented for reaching goal on the first three comparison dates. One hundred citations were given for 100 percent of their goal. Of those 23 were over 110 percent. Four were over 120 percent. San Luis Obispo, Unit 66 District 16 reached 130.99 percent.
