begin -- I know I'm off. Testing, testing, testing.

Okay. Before we begin, will all those that were delegates in the Poppy Committee yesterday please meet with Tamra Duron outside. You have a little something to discuss. So if you met with Tammy yesterday and you were the delegate, please meet with her outside. Sorry, but you're going to miss my report.

I will be calling three chairmen at a time to come up, so please be sure that your notes are sent out to your award recipients. We're trying to try to move this through as quickly as possible. I know that will disappoint you because $I$ know you like sitting there listening to reports.

Recipients, when you receive your awards on stage, please step off to the right to get your picture taken so that we can move along. And do so as quitely as possible.

At this time we will have our Rules Chairman Sharon Moore read the convention rules.

READING OF CONVENTION RULES

DEPARTMENT RULES CHAIRMAN MOORE: Thank you, Madam President. The 2018 convention rules can be found on pages 10 through 12 in the Book of Reports.

Number 1: All meetings of the convention shall be called to order at the designated time or as soon thereafter as a quorum is present.

Number 2: A quorum shall exist when one-third of the units in good standing are partially or wholly represented by duly elected delegates or alternate. Article IV, Section 3, Department Constitution.

Number 3: The audience shall remain seated until the business of the convention. The Department President shall designate certain doors to accommodate the delegates who find it is necessary to enter or leave the convention hall during the reports of the committee or when a speaker has the floor. Cell phones must be turned off or in vibrate mode.

Number 4: The Chairman may deviate from the printed program when necessary or expedient.

Number 5: The Credentials Chairman shall report registration as directed by the Chair.

Number 6: The registration of delegates and alternates shall close at 9:00 a.m., Saturday, June 23rd, 2018.

Number 7: Only qualified delegates shall have voice and vote.

Number 8: It shall be the responsibility of the District Presidents to see that only accredited delegates
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and alternates serving as delegates are seated in their district delegation during the business meeting of the convention.

Number 9: If a delegate expects to be absent from the convention, except for purpose of attending a committee meeting, she shall relinquish her delegate's card to her alternate. The alternate shall then take her seat in the voting section. In the event the delegate does not have the opportunity of reporting to the District President, it shall become the duty of the chairman of the unit delegation to report to the district president the absence of the delegate and the presence of the alternate or the absence of both the delegate and the alternate.

Number 10: A delegate voting the privilege of the floor shall rise, address the Chair as Madame President, give her name, unit, district numbers, pause, and wait to be recognized by the Chair.

Number 11: A member speaking in debate on a question shall be limited to three minutes. No one shall speak more than twice on the same question without consent of the assembly.

Number 12: Delegates attending called committee meetings shall be notified what the convention is considering and voting upon adoption of any changes in policy or matters affecting finance.

Number 13: Reports of committees which do not appear to be controversial in nature may be adopted by general consent if there is no objection. If there is objection, a vote shall be taken. Following the acceptance of a report of a committee, recommendation or resolution may be presented for consideration and adoption.

Number 14: Any committee whose proposed changes in the policy might conflict with that of the American Legion shall confer with the American Legion before presenting said change to the convention.

Number 15: A committee recommending an appropriation of funds for any purpose shall consult with the Department Finance Committee before presenting the recommendation or resolution to the convention.

Number 16: All resolutions to be presented to the convention shall be in triplicate and properly signed.

Number 17: Committees may amend resolutions and recommendation referring to them before favorable reporting the same. Resolutions or recommendation rejected by a committee shall be marked rejected, signed by the chairman of the committee, and returned to the department resolution chairman immediately following the committee meeting.

Number 18: A unit, district, or member
presenting a resolution or recommendation shall have the privilege of explaining the same to the committee to which it was referred.

Number 19: Committee shall report to the convention all resolutions properly submitted and accepted by a majority of the convention committee.

Number 20: A resolution rejected by a committee may be brought before the convention by a two-thirds vote.

Number 21: Emergency resolution which may arise during the convention or after the date for submitting resolution may be presented no later than noon of second day of the convention. Article IV, Section 4b, Department Constitution.

Number 22: Nomination of officers, junior member of finance, department delegates and alternates to the national convention shall be held Friday afternoon, June 22nd, 2018.

Number 23: Endorsement of candidates for national office shall follow nominations.

Number 24: Nomination speeches shall be limited to three minutes. Here shall be no seconding speeches.

Number 25: Election of department officers, junior member of finance, national candidate, department delegates, and alternates to the national convention shall be held on Saturday morning, June 23rd, 2018.

Number 26: The doors of the convention hall shall be closed during the entire election procedure and no one shall leave or enter the hall until the Chair states that election is concluded. The exception to this shall be that in an emergency, a member may leave, and if her absence affects the voting strength, the district president shall immediately notify the presiding officer.

Number 27: When there is but one nominee for all department officers and but one nominee for junior member of finance, the nominees shall be elected vice-a-versa. Article V, Section 3, Department Constitution. Upon roll call, the district president shall report the number of units partially or wholly represented by duly elected delegates or alternates present in the delegation at the time of roll call. This is to determine that there is a quorum of units present at the time of the election.

Number 28: When there is more than one nominee for the department officer, junior member of finance, or endorsement for national office, election shall be by written ballot. The district president shall, when they are instructed by the Chair, take a roll call of their respective delegations to ascertain the total voting strength of their district for the election reporting the same to Chair.

Number 29: When there are three or more nominees
for the office, junior member of office, or endorsement of national office, unless one nominee receives a majority note on the first ballot, the nominee receiving the lowest number of votes shall be automatic dropped before proceeding with the next ballot.

Number 30: When there is a candidate or candidates for endorsement for the national office, a majority vote shall be by ballot. Constitution Article V, Section 13.

Number 31: Each district president and district member of elections committee shall distribute and collect the votes cast by the district delegation and deliver them to the department chairman of elections.

Number 32: Department officers, chairmen, committee members and past department presidents shall vote with their representative district.

Number 33: Each delegate shall be entitled to one vote, the vote of an absent unit is not represented by the alternate shall be casted by the majority of the delegate from the unit. When two delegates represented three votes, the chairman of the unit delegation shall cast the third vote.

Number 34: A majority of the votes cast shall elect, except that in the election of national delegates and alternates, a plurality shall elect.

Number 35: These convention rules may be amended during the convention by two-thirds vote.

36: Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised, shall be the parliamentary authority on all points not covered by these rules, the department constitution and bylaws and the convention mandates.

Madam President, that ends the convention rules.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Thank you.
DEPARTMENT RULES CHAIRMAN MOORE: Okay. I move that we accept the 2018 convention rules.

DEPARTMENT PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: Second.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: It has been moved and seconded that the rules are accepted and adopted as a whole. All those in favor?

ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Is there any discussion?

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Madam President, Anita Biggs, Past Department President. Minor change. It looks like a correction needed for rule number 24. The second sentence it says, "here." It should be "There shall be no seconding speeches." Omitted the T.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Minor, but major.
Okay. It has been moved and seconded to accept the rules and adopt it as a whole with that one change. Is there

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any discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: All those in favor
say aye.
ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Those opposed?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Motion carries.

DEPARTMENT RULES CHAIRMAN MOORE: Thank you,
Madam President.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yes, thank you. At
this time $I$ will designate the doors for entering and exiting the hall. Please use the rear door because this one up here is disruptive to the body. So please use the rear doors and be as discrete and courteous as possible.

Will Vice President Joan Cannon please assume the chair for the Department President's report.

I was privileged to meet with most districts with a couple of exceptions due to a conflict and a very inconvenient fire that closed the train transportation $I$ was planning to take because at that time $I$ was still unable to drive long distances. One district was able to reschedule, but sorry to say conflicts prevented me from being able to reschedule the second one. So sorry, District 22, for that great opportunity I missed.

I was privileged to have breakfast with National Commander Denise Rohan in her tour of California and meet the Medal of Honor winner that was traveling with her. It was an honor to shake the hand of a real Medal of Honor winner and, of course, it didn't hurt that he had his trustee service dog with him as he was missing a limb. A whirlwind visit with National Vice President -- with the National President was an honor and most enjoyable. The distinguished guest chairman and hostesses at both the southern and northern visit did us proud and made everything very enjoyable.

I visited individual units whenever I could and that was well worth my time. People were wonderful. I attended a veterans' job fair, went to clinics, stand Downs, hospitals, cemeteries, memorial services, dedication ceremonies, funerals and wherever the Auxiliary presence would be of benefit.

I got a little confused, but that's not hard to do, at the end of the year with all the greetings, agendas, and reports that needed to be done and who they should go to, but with a gentle nudge $I$ got them all in on time. Reminded me of a T-shirt $I$ saw one time that said: "I told you I would do it and I will. You don't have to remind me every six months."

Seriously it was a great year of my life and you all made it possible by giving me the honor and privilege to serve as your president, but, ladies, I would not be honest if $I$ led you to believe that it's all roses and honey. We have some serious issues in our Auxiliary. There are units out there that are hurting and struggling to survive. We have attitude problems, ego issues, power struggles, apathy, personal conflicts and an unwillingness to deal with any of them. We have units that have no idea what their constitution and bylaws and standing rules are or where they are. We have posts and units not knowing where their place is in the scheme of things at the

American Legion Family. We have new members that are begging for help because they have taken a position of responsibility as a new member and don't know what to do or how to find help. These are units that do not come to you as district or department leaders because they're not aware of the need to do so. So we need to go to them instead of waiting for them to come to us. When they come to a workshop, we teach them how to do Children \& Youth program, National Security or be a District President, but nothing about how to be a good unit president, how to be a good secretary or treasurer, how to run their unit meetings and what their responsibilities are. These problems are reflected in our drastic drop in membership over the years.

Anyway, I'll get off my soapbox now and again thank you for all the experience I've had this year. Thank you from the very bottom of my heart for your generous support to my special project, Paws For Purple Hearts. You have been super.
(Applause.)

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT CANNON: Thank you, Loretta.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Thank you. We will now have the reports of our department officers. If you are an officer and not already on stage, please come up
quickly to give your report. This is the officers. Just a reminder to department officers and chairmen. All reports excluding Americanism, Education, Membership, Children \& Youth, Poppy and Resolutions and VA\&R, or Veterans Affairs \& Rehabilitation, per the Department code are to be limited to five minutes. And that includes your committee reports and your first place award presentations. Yeah, in this case Constitution \& Bylaws will fit in there too. Don't let that scare you off now.

Okay. We'll hear from our Vice President, Joan Cannon, for her report.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT CONVENTION REPORT

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT CANNON: Good morning. AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Good morning. DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT CANNON: That's good. I began my year attending the department workshop at Clovis, the northern California workshop, and the leadership workshop that was held in District 6. I also attended the Girls State committee meeting in Palm Springs in October 2017. I enjoyed meeting all the members of the committee and being a small part of Girls State's 75th anniversary year. I attended junior conference in April

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and had the privilege of installing the new honorary junior officers.

To support the Department Office, I volunteered to support the last two mailouts and now I know more than I need to know about the Department's copy machine and how to find the local Staples when I need to buy more paper because I messed up previously the paper.

After the two previous trips I actually was able to navigate the San Francisco traffic all by myself and attend the budget meeting in May of 2018. I will also be attending Girls State June 26th and 28th and I'm looking forward to meeting California's delegates.

I thank you, Madam President Loretta, for your mentorship and advice over this year, and this concludes my report.
(Applause.)

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Thank you. I didn't have in my report that $I$ attended junior conference either, but $I$ can't forget that because it was my 56th wedding anniversary. And we had a good time even without my husband, huh?

Okay. I have this little supersonic memo here that needs to be brought up before lunch. If anybody has an extra ticket for the luncheon, the PPP luncheon today, please see Betty Ramos in District 18. And since that
lunch was coming up today, we needed to announce that.

Okay. We'll have the report of the Secretary. She has that look on her face.

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY CONVENTION REPORT

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY MIKESELL: Yeah. Good morning, ladies.

AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Good morning.
DEPARTMENT SECRETARY MIKESELL: This report has been very hard for me to write. So many things I would like to say to all of you. This has been a wonderful year and a very frustrating time in my life. You must adhere to deadlines. There are reasons for them. Please return phone calls and emails. They also have a purpose. It's no wonder Ruby had a stroke. Getting information from some of you is like pulling teeth.

I have talked to so many wonderful members taking care of veterans and working in their communities. Each of you can work with anyone for the time it takes to have a meeting. We are adults. We may not believe it, but we are.

Quit fighting. Work together. You cannot like everyone, but you can work with anyone. Step up and take a chairmanship in your unit and district level.
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(Applause.)

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY MIKESELL: Have fun and help someone while you're doing it. We work hard for every dollar that we raise. Use it wisely. Make donations, help someone in need.

I need to say something about the Poppy program. It is really a three-part program. We order Poppies, a veteran gets a little money, and handing out Poppies is twofold. It is a veterans memorial poppy. And then it's nice when we receive a donation for the poppy, but we do not need a donation for every poppy because of the remembrance of a veteran when a person wears the poppy. In other words, order more poppies.

I could not have been Secretary this past year without the help of several people. Mel, the bookkeeper, who stepped up when our membership clerk, Julie, left for a great job. We have hired a new lady, Laura Costello. Ruby is just on the other end of an email or phone call. Diane DeLashmit, who answers those sticky questions, and let me tell you this year there has been several sticky questions.

Like I said earlier, quit fighting. On that note, we have interviewed for a new secretary. I am so excited, I can hardly contain myself. Thank you -- thank people for their help. Recognition is important. You do

New members cannot be entered into this system until September 1st, 2018. Do not enter them into ALAMIS until September lst or they will owe 2018 dues. Please fill out applications completely. Send your transmittals in in a timely manner.

You can all take from Lucy Roche, Unit 211,

District 18. Personal point of privilege, Madam President? This is for Lucy and I'll tell you why. She does her transmittals on the typewriter and does not make mistakes. No credit memos, balance due emails, refunds or phone call looking for missed any information. For all of that $I$ thank her. Lucy, will you please stand up?
(Applause.)

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY MIKESELL: Thank you, Lucy.

Loretta has been easy to work for. What a giving, caring lady she is. Thank all of you for giving me this opportunity to serve you and for generously pointing out my mistakes. This job is huge and needs lots of support and help to make it happen. Each of you has been part of that process. Once again, thank you for giving me this opportunity.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Thank you, Terry, for all you've done this year, for stepping in at the moment's notice. She never hesitated.

We'll hear from the Treasurer for her report.

DEPARTMENT TREASURER CONVENTION REPORT

DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: You stole it. Well, $I$ hope my report is a little bit more pleasant than what you just heard, but -- we're going to try anyway.

Madam Department President, before I begin I would like to take a moment to thank everyone for all the kind words and many, many cards that I received. Thank all of you. I want to thank Imelda Cruz for holding the office together during the last year and welcome Laura Castillo as the membership clerk. We will be back to full staff come July.

I would certainly like to thank Terry for stepping up to the plate and filling in for this past year. I want to welcome Karen Aufdermaur back with us again for six, right, six years? Ladies, she's been doing the job.
(Applause.)

DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: Ladies, so far the costs exceed our income for several items which had to be raised, and those are the Convention Book of Proceedings has been increased to \$27 and the veteran service pin is going up to \$17. I believe this will be the year of increase because we've been holding down all the costs for so long that we no longer can do it anymore.

When we are trying to balance the budget that will be presented at this convention, you will note a deficit of over $\$ 28,744$ in the general fund. The finance committee is going to be proposing that the $\$ 18,725$ from the Auxiliary News be transferred to the general fund and do away with the newspaper. Even doing so we will still be up -- we will still need a per capita increase to make up the remaining deficit of $\$ 10,725$. Our costs have exceeded our income with the mailing of credit memos and processing checks for units who are due a refund of over -- under $\$ 10$. Unfortunately National required all membership increases to be to them by May 11th, 2018 as
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they have locked rate of membership dues until the next membership change in 2020. So to get around this, Department can make a membership assessment for all senior and junior members. No one likes increases, but we have not raised our dues since 2012 or six years and we need to be realistic. You will be hearing more on this recommendation by the Finance Committee later in the morning.

Those of you who haven't had the opportunity to renew your membership in the President's Club, you have until Sunday. It's \$25 if you'd like to renew. Simply pay your $\$ 25$ to the Finance Committee.

There are a couple of items I'd like to talk directly to the units about and they are: Donations to National. We spend a lot of time rerouting your donations to the National Organization. There's a National form on the website that is strictly for National donations. Please fill out that form, send your donations directly to National and not to the Department office. Please don't send forms to Department unless the form states that it should be sent to Department.

Constitution \& Bylaws changes are mailed directly to the Department Constitution \& Bylaws Chairman. Now these cost some money. These are 6 and $\$ 7$ packets that we're mailing out. So please do not send Department your
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Constitution \& Bylaws amendments, changes, or whatever. Send them to the Constitution \& Bylaws Department Chairman.

Madam Department President, I would like to conclude with some corrections to the Book of Reports and if I might have your permission to do that at this time.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yes, ma'am.

DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: District 5 should have three plus 33 delegates and Hospital Deputy Peggy Grabski should be added. District 11 Hospital Deputy Grace Huston should be added. District 16 delegates eight plus -- plus eight equals 53. District 19 delegates plus three equals 44. District 22 plus five equals 62. You add Hospital Rep Angie Acosta. District 23 plus five equals 25, add Gloria Williams 252. District 25 delegates add Hospital Director Mavis Kanka, six plus 71, total of delegates is 850.

Madam President, this concludes my report and have a wonderful convention.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Thank you.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: We have a correction. Ruby, we have a correction.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: You listed Angie Acosta in
District 23. She's a District 25 member.

DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: I said District 23, I meant District 25.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. That was it. Thank you. Thank you. Will that take a while for that resolution?

DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: No.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Do you want to do that now, call up Linda? Okay. We'll call up Linda for the Finance Committee, not -- we're not going to do the budget; don't panic. We're going to deal with this resolution.

FINANCE CHAIRMAN HAYES: Okay. This is Emergency Resolution No. 1. Currently reads: "Article IX, Section 2 per capita tax. Per capita tax shall be payable in advance annually. National senior $\$ 9$, department senior \$7, Auxiliary News assessment \$1, national junior \$1.25, department junior 75 cents." This is from 2012.

Proposed reading: "Article IX, Section 2 per capita tax. Per capita tax shall be payable in advance annually. National senior $\$ 12$, department senior $\$ 10$, national junior \$2.50, department junior \$1.50. 2018."

Justification. It is proposed that the \$1
Auxiliary News assessment be transferred to offset the general fund budget along with an additional $\$ 2$ per capita raised for senior members and 1.50 for junior members.
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Total senior dues units will collect from members: For National per capita $\$ 12, ~ p l u s ~ D e p a r t m e n t ~ p e r ~ c a p i t a ~ \$ 10 . ~$ That's $\$ 22$ total for National and Department per capita plus per unit per capita, whatever that amount is.

National -- national junior per capita 2.50 plus 1.50 for Department per capita for junior members. So it's \$4 per National and Department per capita plus your unit per capita.

This resolution if passed will become effective immediately for the current administrative year 2018-2019. On the authority of the committee, I move the recommended emergency resolution to transfer $\$ 18,725$ from the News Assessment to the General Fund.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: There's a motion on the floor to move 18,000 from --

FINANCE CHAIRMAN HAYES: The News Assessment.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: -- the News

Assessment to the General Fund. Is there a second?

DEPARTMENT PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: You don't need a second.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Oh, you don't need one for this. Okay. Is there any discussion? \$18,000 from --

PAST NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: Madam

President?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yes.

PAST NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: Nancy
Brown-Park, Past National President. I had some concerns about moving the 18,700 plus dollars to the General Fund. This is restricted money, as I understand it, because we took the dues -- we took an increase, an assessment to our members to send the newspaper -- for the newspaper many years ago when we did that. We now have absolutely no communication with our members except a dues notice. So if you are not active, an active member, you get nothing from the Department of California. In fact, you don't get a dues notice, it comes from National.

My concern is, and I can see that we can help subsidize this year, but what do we do in the future? How are we going to communicate with those members? We'll lose them. Why would I send you dues? Why would I renew if $I$ had no communication with this organization?

We went through this on the National level when we thought let's get rid of the magazine. But that's the only communication some people will get. Because you don't reach out to them in a lot of cases, how are we going to keep those members? Look at our slide. If you think about the number of members we're losing, how many years are we going to be here? Ten?

So we need to think of a different way to
communicate. And maybe it's with a some kind of newsletter, but we have to find a way to communicate. We can do this and I'll agree with it, but in future we have to find a way. We're losing too many members and we're losing our organization, ladies. So I -- I guess I'm in favor, but we've got to have a solution.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Thank you. Any
further discussion? Michelle.

DISTRICT 28 DELEGATE SOARES: Yes, madam. Michelle Soares, Unit 694, District 28. So we have known about the National increase for close to a year now and there was a mention of a possible increase at Department DEC, however to my knowledge no notice was ever sent out to the members informing anyone of the decision to actually go with this dollar increase from Department. So it seems like we're trying to pork barrel, for lack of a better word, this $\$ 2$ in with the $\$ 3$ so a vote for one is actually a vote for the other, which seems like it should be two separate issues to me. It seems like the National increase is one issue and the Department increase is a second issue and we have it all in one resolution, and so a vote in favor of one is a vote in favor for both.

DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: A National -- it was a National mandate that's been approved and
automatically approved by the Department of California. DEPARTMENT 29 DELEGATE SOARES: Right. That's not my issue. I don't have a problem with the National increase. I don't even have a problem with the Department increase. I have a problem with them being lumped together as one resolution when it's two separate issues, an increase from National and an increase from Department. DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: I think it's one issue honestly. I don't see where you figure it's two issues, but that's -- that's my opinion. DEPARTMENT 29 DELEGATE SOARES: Well, and I respect your opinion, I do. I just think that when you're doing this without notification to the members, for those members that have already -- who have already adjusted their amendments to their bylaws and such to accumulate for or to compensate for the National increase which we knew about eight months ago, now they're -- you know, maybe they didn't think about, hey, there might be another increase, they're going to be maybe floating on the edge a little bit.

DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: All units were notified by the Finance Committee at the DEC meeting about the possible $\$ 2$ increase.

DEPARTMENT 29 DELEGATE SOARES: That's assuming that all units are at $D E C$ and all districts are
represented, which they are not.
DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: It was in the bulletin that went to the units, so all units received them.

DEPARTMENT 29 DELEGATE SOARES: I never saw a bulletin with a $\$ 2$ increase.

DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: Well, you
probably don't get the mail at your unit.
DEPARTMENT 29 DELEGATE SOARES: Well, that's
true, but $I$ do look at the mail. I do see the

Constitution \& Bylaws and I -- I see all the finance stuff that comes through.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay.

DEPARTMENT 29 DELEGATE SOARES: That's just my opinion.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. Thank you.

DEPARTMENT PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: I have --

DISTRICT 11 DELEGATE MAYER: It's on. Okay. I
just want to say that yesterday --
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Ma'am, could state
your name and unit?
DISTRICT 11 DELEGATE MAYER: Oh, I'm sorry. My name is Bonnie Mayer, District 11, Post 22.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Thank you.
DISTRICT 11 DELEGATE MAYER: I want to say that
we went through our membership, we're losing members because we're all dying. We're an aged group. We need young blood in our -- in our units, in our organization because we're losing more and more. There are World War II -- they're born in the '30s and the '40s and the '50s and we're losing. And so it's our fault if we're not recruiting younger members. That's all I have to say.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. Thank you. I think we're all aware of we need younger people. DEPARTMENT PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: Madam President?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yes, Diane. DEPARTMENT PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: Diane DeLashmit. Trying to teach an old dog new tricks here. Diane DeLashmit, Unit 299, District 25. I just have a couple of questions. We want to move money from the reserves for the newspaper, this amount that's listed here, is that the total amount of money in the reserves or how much is in -- we haven't had the newspaper for two years and at $\$ 1$ a senior member, there should be somewhere around at least $\$ 40,000$ there. So I'm asking are we only -- are we only moving some money, are we moving all money? I -- I need to know that.

DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: We're only moving
one year's -- we're only moving one year's fees over for
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one -- until we have the assessment.

DEPARTMENT PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: Okay.
That answers my first question. This resolution is to be effective immediately. We're already getting dues in from some members for this year without an opportunity to tell them it's $\$ 2$ more. I believe that we need to make this -and when it's a per capita tax increase, it requires it to be for the following year which would be 2019-'20 so that the units have the opportunity to increase their dues if in fact they need to. So $I$ have that as a concern how we're going to get that extra $\$ 2$ from our members particularly when some of them have already paid.

DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: I talked to

National because they have already closed their membership date for submitting any changes right now. They said that departments can assess units any amount of money that they feel necessary to make up the difference. So this is an opportunity -- we were talking -- we're talking about moving the 18,000 actually it's from today on -- on forever until they decide that they're going to have a newspaper or whatever they're going to do, and then we're going to ask the units be assessed $\$ 2$ on top of moving that $\$ 18,000$ which will -- right?

Okay. And so actually the transfer of the 18,000, whatever it is, 700 and some odd dollars is going
to take care of a year and then you're going to be assessed $\$ 2$ for the remaining portion. So it's a total of \$3 that we're asking for Department, but you're only going to be paying two of the three.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Madam

President, Anita Biggs, 23rd District, Unit 252. I -- I'm in agreement with -- the light went out. I didn't touch the button. I went like this. I think the battery is dead. Hello? Okay. There it is.

I agree with Diane DeLashmit with regard to the \$2 increase and I'm -- I was confused, so -- I'm not touching the thing. I think the battery is low. I just hit it. That might work.

I'm confused. The way this was read, it states that it was -- the resolution was read and then we went into the transfer. This was read in total, but to me it's two separate things. The increase, although I'm sure a lot of us are not against it because we do need the funds, but to do it immediately will cause a distress to some of the units who are going to be underwater.

I took a poll, just a poll at my preconvention committee meeting. I had several delegates whose Unit dues are $\$ 20 . \quad$ If they're raised to $\$ 22$, they will have to come out of somebody else's pocket to make up the difference and there is no income for the unit. So
they're per capita, but, you know, you've got to get a bylaw change for most of us. We don't have a standing rule.

The transfer of the funds, I -- Linda Fercho is going to talk on that as well, but I think the -- all the money should be just moved over. If we're going to vote to move some of it, move it all. What we're going to be getting this year because we're not going to have a newsletter until we finish with this ad hoc to figure it out. So that's something we need to do. We must get a newsletter going. It will -- it will help us recruit, it will help us with younger members. There's a lot going on with just this one document, but it needs to be separated out in my opinion.
(Applause.)
PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Linda Fercho, Past Department President, Leadership Chairman for Department. I'd like to amend the motion to -- I'm sorry. I would -- I feel that we need to -- since Diane identified we should have probably $\$ 40,000$ or something that we have saved in the two years we have not been doing the newspaper, $I$ believe this deficit, the entire deficit needs to be paid out of that and transfer the entire deficit out of that money and then assess our membership next year the additional money.
(Applause.)
PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: I feel this way the National organization will get the right thing on our dues notice and could -- because the confusion that's going to go out there between the dues notice and what the units are asking I feel is very confusing. So that's my recommendation. Thank you.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Chair recognizes
Ann. Chair can't hear Ann.

AEF CHAIRMAN PHILCOX: Just a thought. Ann Philcox, District 20, Unit 377. I think what people are thinking about is the membership in saying, oh, we already raised your dues this amount, now we're adding an extra \$2. Instead of doing it that way, why don't units consider holding a fundraiser? I mean it's just a thought. Nobody likes that one. Hey, I think it's a good idea, but, you know, just to get that $\$ 2$ instead of raising your dues. All right, Anita, I see your look. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: That's an option. Thanks, Ann.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT TOZIER: Susie Tozier, District 22, Unit 6. There was confusion in the statement and it's kind of confusing the way you wrote it. Currently you pay $\$ 8$ to Department of your dues, $\$ 7$ goes to membership, $\$ 1$ goes to the News. So it's already in
there, but it gets confusing sometimes with the way you say it and the way you write it here. Because I look at this and I say it doesn't add it, it doesn't add up. Then I relax, sit back and it does add up. But you already pay \$1 of the \$8 towards the dues.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT WORKMAN: Linda

Workman, Past Department President. I would just like to address something that Anita said. Last year we all knew that National was going to be raising their dues and I know my district, everyone has rewritten their

Constitution \& Bylaws or raised their dues, to change your standing rules to have your dues amount in there. So, you know, I'm sorry for those of you who didn't pay attention and rewrite your Constitution \& Bylaws.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. We have -first of all, we have a motion on the -- we'll take this motion by motion here. We have a motion to move the 18,700 -- what is it? 18,725. I had 18,750. 18,725 for the News Assessment to make -- into the General Fund to take care of this year's deficit. Was there a second to that?

DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: Second.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Having heard the
discussion -- oh, do you something more to say?

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Well, Madam
President, Linda Fercho, Past Department President. I would like to amend the motion to transfer the entire deficit from the money that is in the newspaper, which was identified as a sufficient amount, and have the dues increase with the 2019-2020 year.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. What is the entire amount?

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: I don't know. Somebody get a pen and get some figures. I don't know. I figured that covered it.

Linda, what's the amount?
FINANCE CHAIRMAN HAYES: I have to get it from that.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: They have to get the amount too.

DISTINGUISHED GUEST CHAIRMAN WORKMAN: Page 5. Linda, page 5.

FINANCE CHAIRMAN HAYES: Page 5. I just got there. Okay. Auxiliary News.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: At this time in the Auxiliary News there is $\$ 59,139$. That will cover this deficit for a few years.

NATIONAL PUBLIC RELATIONS CHAIRMAN TAYLOR: What is the total deficit amount?

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: How much is the total deficit?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: She says there's 59,149.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: The total
deficit is --
FINANCE CHAIRMAN HAYES: This is one that we did yesterday.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: And do we know what our deficit per year is going to be with the new dues? 30,000 per year.

FINANCE CHAIRMAN HAYES: So for this year --
PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Okay. Madam
President --

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yes.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: -- I amend the motion to move the deficit of $\$ 28,652.35$ from the newspaper funds to cover the deficit for this year and increase the dues $\$ 2$ starting with the 2019-2020 year.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Would you like to make that a round figure?

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Okay.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: 30,000, something like that.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: 30,000?

30,000. Okay. I amend the motion to have transferred 30,000 from the newspaper funds to the -- from the Auxiliary Newspaper funds to cover the deficit for this year and increase the dues $\$ 2$ effective 2019-2020.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yeah, yeah. You've got first -- first could I ask you to amend your motion to just include the $\$ 30,000$ for right now?

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Okay. I amend the motion to transfer $\$ 30,000$ from the Auxiliary Emergency monies to cover the deficit for this year --

NATIONAL PUBLIC RELATIONS CHAIRMAN TAYLOR:

Auxiliary News. You said Auxiliary Emergency.
DEPARTMENT PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: Madam

President, I move to amend the original motion that we transfer $\$ 30,000$ from the News Assessment account into the General Fund.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Second.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: It has been moved and seconded to move $\$ 30,000$ from the News Assessment account into the General Account.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: If you had given me another hour $I$ would have gotten it.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Any further discussion on this particular issue?

DISTRICT 20 DELEGATE KELDRY: Madam President,

Laura Keldry, District 20, Unit 377. I was not at the DEC meeting. Does this -- does this Department run on a deficit all the time? Is this a new deficit? DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: No. DISTRICT 20 DELEGATE KELDRY: And if it is a new deficit, could someone explain to me what that is from, where the deficit came from suddenly. 28,000 is a lot of money.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. Well, I can --

DISTRICT 20 DELEGATE KELDRY: I just would like to know where because my members will want to know. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yeah. Okay. I don't know if you've looked at our membership numbers the last few years, we depend a lot on membership. The per capita, you know, it has dropped over 800 members for the last several years. This year it's, what, 1300, something like that we've dropped? So you add all those figures up and take it times -- what do we get? $\$ 8$ out of that, and that's a lot of money.

DISTRICT 20 DELEGATE KELDRY: So in one year we went from -- we lost $\$ 28,000$ and won't this happen again next year?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: No, over the years this has accumulated, you know.

DISTRICT 20 DELEGATE KELDRY: So we had this
deficit accumulating for several years?
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Well, you know, if you spent --

DISTRICT 20 DELEGATE KELDRY: I'm sorry. I'm just trying to understand.

DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: We have not been in a deficit situation until this year. This year we're in a $\$ 28,000$ deficit situation --

DISTRICT 20 DELEGATE KELDRY: And you sound like --

DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: -- from the General Fund.

DISTRICT 20 DELEGATE KELDRY: Well, I'm understanding from you that that's a big deal and it sounds like a big deal and I don't understand how we got to that in one year.

DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: There's a lot of expenses coming up. That's an operational fund.

DISTRICT 20 DELEGATE KELDRY: Okay. I'm sorry. Linda just explained to me that this has been a membership situation that has built up over years, plural.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: That's one of the issues.

DISTRICT 20 DELEGATE KELDRY: But the deficit is
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only now brand-new this year. I'm confused.
PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT TOZIER: This year is the first year in a while that we are having more paid employees in the office. Everything has been done on a voluntary situation. We also have an issue in 2020, the minimum wage goes up to $\$ 15$ an hour. So because we're getting the people in the office and we had the minimum wage requirement with the State of California, everything is going up. And we're losing members.

DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: And we're also hiring a new secretary this year.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yeah. It all adds up.

DISTRICT 20 DELEGATE KELDRY: So the deficit is for new employees to come?

DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: I have volunteered my time and energies to the Department of California serving as Secretary/Treasurer for five years. I have not got paid anything.
(Applause.)
DISTRICT 20 DELEGATE KELDRY: Bravo, bravo. I think we all --

DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: And now we have an employee that is coming on board who will be a paid employee.

DISTRICT 20 DELEGATE KELDRY: Okay. So we're hiring an employee and that's for 28,000 going --

DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: Well, part of it. That's where part of it's going.

DISTRICT 20 DELEGATE KELDRY: You're all in agreement that is something we've all agreed to do as well? Okay. I'm fine. Thank you.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Thank you. Thank you for your concern. Okay. Back to the motion. We have a motion on the floor to transfer $\$ 30,000$ from the News Assessment to the general account. Amendment. Yes, it's an amendment to the motion. All those in favor please say aye.

ALL PRESENT: Aye.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Opposed?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. Now the original amendment -- original motion. See now you're getting me confused. That's because I've written so many things down here $I$ can't remember which one to read.

Okay. So we have a motion on the floor to move $\$ 30,000$ from the News Assessment account to the general account. Any further discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Thank you. All
those in favor --
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: All those in favor, please say aye.

ALL PRESENT: Aye.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Opposed?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Thank you. The ayes
have it. Now back to the per capita tax. Now we'll
tackle the per capita tax as a separate motion.
FINANCE CHAIRMAN HAYES: I move that the 2019-2020 per capita dues for each senior member be increased by $\$ 2$ to cover the -- that's not to cover -period.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. There is a motion made to make the per capita increase by $\$ 2$ for the year 2019-2020. Is that right?

FINANCE CHAIRMAN HAYES: Yes.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. Any
discussion? For a senior. That's a senior. Okay, ladies. Okay. Conferring with the Parliamentarian here, she said go ahead -- we should go ahead and put all of the per capita tax in one motion, so we would include seniors and the juniors in this motion.

FINANCE CHAIRMAN HAYES: Can I take that one
back?

DEPARTMENT PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: Amend it. FINANCE CHAIRMAN HAYES: Okay. I move that we increase the senior per capita dues by $\$ 2$ and the junior members per capita dues by 1.50 for the $2019-2020$ year. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. There's a motion on the floor. Or is that treated as an amendment?

Okay. There's a motion on the floor to raise per capita -- increase per capita for senior members by $\$ 2$ and junior dues by 1.50 beginning in 2019-2020. Any discussion?

DISTRICT 11 DELEGATE MUNROE: Marcia Munroe, District 11, Unit 249. To me that might seem confusing because in the old one it says the dues are $\$ 7$, we increase it by two, that would be \$9. Are you increasing it to $\$ 9$ or $\$ 10$ ? Because then you're including the assessment. It doesn't say. You just say we're increasing the dues.

FINANCE CHAIRMAN HAYES: The assessment is already on there so the total is just going to be increased by $\$ 2$.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yeah, these are increases.

DISTRICT 28 DELEGATE SOARES: Madam President, Michelle Soares. It's just a matter of -- Michelle

Soares, District 28. It's just a matter of the wording. You said by a dollar. It should be by 75 cents if we're going to word it that way. Because it's going from 75 cents to 1.50 , so it would be raised by 75 cents. Or you could say raised to 1.50. It's just a matter of the wording.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT TOZIER: Susie Tozier, District 22, Unit 6. In regards to the comment a little bit -- a minute ago, $\$ 7$ of $\$ 8$, you currently send to as a per capita goes to membership. One dollar goes to the newsletter. So you currently are paying $\$ 8$ right now, so the increase of plus two equals ten.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Madam

President?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: And we're voting on the increase, not the total amount.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT TOZIER: I was just explaining Marcia's comment. She thought it should be nine, you know, because it's membership, but we get assessed in that $\$ 8$ currently for the newsletter. This is for the following year increase that our dues are due. So $\$ 7$ plus the $\$ 1$ for the newsletter assessment equals eight, with a $\$ 2$ increase in membership, membership will be nine, plus the one dollar equals ten.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: For the

Department.
PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT TOZIER: For the department.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Madam

President, Wendy O'Brien, Past Department President. My question is this. Is that $\$ 2$ going to be enough to cover the bills that we have coming up or are we going to have to do this again next year?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. The motion is still on the floor for the $\$ 2$ per capita increase by $\$ 2$ for seniors and 1.50. That's an increase to begin 2019-2020. That motion is still out.

DEPARTMENT PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: Madam

President, Diane DeLashmit, District 25, Unit 299. I move we table this until we have the finance report and the budget where we can look at it. Most of us haven't even seen the budget.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: And that will give you -- that will give you a few minutes to mull it over and understand it hopefully.

Okay. At this time I believe I'm expected half hour ago over at the Legion, so if I could ask the Vice President to come up and continue the reports, please.

Okay. I'll postpone my visit a few more minutes. I believe we have guests in the back of the room. Will the Sergeant-at-Arms and Marshal, along with the Distinguished Guest, please present our guests.
(Processional.)
AMERICAN LEGION RIDERS PRESIDENT SOBCZAK: How are you all doing today?
(Applause.)
AMERICAN LEGION RIDERS PRESIDENT SOBCZAK: This is my favorite part of coming to convention is to see you ladies.
(Applause.)
AMERICAN LEGION RIDERS PRESIDENT SOBCZAK: You treat us so well, it is amazing. And I have to thank you because, you know, unlike my State Vice President Ray Ruiz and I, you don't have a skin in this game and you're here supporting us anyway. So I have to thank you for that. My hat goes off to you.
(Applause.)

AMERICAN LEGION RIDERS PRESIDENT SOBCZAK: So I've already addressed the Legion and the Sons of the American Legion and I want to apologize for not being here yesterday. They had this meeting and my name was on it so they kind of said I had to be there. So I do apologize. We just came and we gave an $\$ 11,000$ check for VA\&R.
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(Applause.)
AMERICAN LEGION RIDERS PRESIDENT SOBCZAK: We are going to do the Legacy Ride this year and I asked them for donations. I'm going to be asking the Squadron and the Auxiliary for donations because the Department of California has never given a check at National Convention to the Legacy Scholarship Fund. And, you know, you've heard the phrase that we're a family; right? Well, the American Legion, if you've ever noticed only, uses that term when it's convenient for them. But I'd like to get a check from the American Legion Family in Minneapolis because we are a family.

But this is my third and final year addressing you. I'm term limited to three years as a state president of the Riders. We've never had a three-year president before, so I am extremely humbled to do this. But $I$ know the Riders are going to be in great hands, hint, hint, when I'm out of here. He's always done good things. You don't mind if I take like another two minutes, do you?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: (Shakes head.)
AMERICAN LEGION RIDERS PRESIDENT SOBCZAK: All
right. So when $I$ was over there addressing the Legion, I kind of embarrassed them. And I love doing that, I really do. Because I told them, you know, the Riders, we've been
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on a five-year plan and I wish the American Legion would have a five-year plan, but they've got this 365-day plan and it hasn't worked out real well for them recently. I've watched their numbers.

So our five-year plan, in our first year we wanted to bring in new chapters, and in two years we've got 17 new chapters in the department.
(Applause.)
AMERICAN LEGION RIDERS PRESIDENT SOBCZAK: We have 89 chapters. Closest department to us is Florida with 42. Our goal is 100 chapters for the 100-year anniversary of the American Legion. So --
(Applause.)
AMERICAN LEGION RIDERS PRESIDENT SOBCZAK: But year two $I$ kind of mimicked every National Commander and Department Commander for the past 50 years because I said we're going to bring in new members. Because we already built a home for them by bringing in new chapters, so now we had to fill those homes because they were vacant. So we got the new members. We brought in 400 new members last year.
(Applause.)
AMERICAN LEGION RIDERS PRESIDENT SOBCZAK: How many American Legion Riders are out here? Better not have your vest on because this is an Auxiliary convention. I'm
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just saying.
PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Thank you very much.

AMERICAN LEGION RIDERS PRESIDENT SOBCZAK: But our third year I kind of deviated and I told the American Legion $I$ would love to hear a National or Department Commander say this because our goal this year is membership development. We're going to teach them about -- our Riders are going to learn about the American Legion, the Sons of the American Legion, and the American Legion Auxiliary and the Riders.
(Applause.)

AMERICAN LEGION RIDERS PRESIDENT SOBCZAK:

Because how many of you knew the American Legion was responsible for creating the VA in 1933? For writing flag code? Creating the GI bill, the post 9/11 GI bill?
(Applause.)

AMERICAN LEGION RIDERS PRESIDENT SOBCZAK: The only veteran service organization to have a sitting president sign legislation at our convention.
(Applause.)
AMERICAN LEGION RIDERS PRESIDENT SOBCZAK: You know, no one can say that. And if we teach this history, we're going to have people begging to be part of our family. And that's what $I$ want. But then year four,
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we're going to have a past president's club because we don't have one in the Riders. And we're going to mentor and develop our future leaders. And then five years later, we're going to be a National level program. That's my goal. We've already written the resolution and it will be heard in Minneapolis, but it's going to be done in the image of the Sons which is not as convoluted. I'm honest. We can do our business by a cell phone in conference call. We don't need to fly to Indianapolis or ride to Indianapolis. Save money, put the money back into the organization, put the money back into the communities and do things via conference call. Do it the right way. (Applause.)

AMERICAN LEGION RIDERS PRESIDENT SOBCZAK: And before I close and get my plaque, one of the things I asked the Legion today was a question $I$ posed to my Riders in Hollister last year. I asked my Riders if your chapter was to close tomorrow, would your community notice? Three chapters were able to raise their hand. This year 85 chapters are going to be able to raise their hand.
(Applause.)
AMERICAN LEGION RIDERS PRESIDENT SOBCZAK: So I ask that same question to the American Legion. If your post shuts its doors tomorrow, will the community notice? On the Legion side that room was quieter than a church.
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Yeah, there was some people looking around doing some soul searching on that one. Because the Auxiliary, you stand alone as a widow unit if the post closes. See, I know that. But the post, if they were just to disappear, 85 percent of the community would not notice if a post closed its doors and that's sad because they're not out there working the programs the way you are, the way the Squadron is. The Legion relies on you and it's wrong and you need to smack them in the face. Tell them to get off their butts and do their job. They're part of the family too.
(Applause.)

AMERICAN LEGION RIDERS PRESIDENT SOBCZAK: So I'm going to give a plaque here for saying thank you for a year's worth of support to the Auxiliary from me, but -and we'll take a picture in a second. Where's your camera person? But $I$ also want to show you for the first time in our history we have a state coin.
(Applause.)

AMERICAN LEGION RIDERS PRESIDENT SOBCZAK: \$10 each and the money goes to VA\&R. But our coin is designed to look like a poker chip because we do so many poker runs, but this is a metal coin. So $\$ 10$, hint, hint, I'll be in the back.

So, ma'am, this is for you. And I truly appreciate everything you and all of you women have done
for us. And I do call you the Auxiliary, not the ladies' Auxiliary because I know if you're Auxiliary, you have to be a female. I'll tell those guys in the blue caps because they don't get that. That's another reason you can smack them. I thank you all and I love you all.
(Applause.)
DISTINGUISHED GUEST CHAIRMAN WORKMAN: I just want to say I'm going to start the bucket rolling around this convention floor for donations for the Legacy.
(Applause.)
DISTINGUISHED GUEST CHAIRMAN WORKMAN: The bucket will be passed, don't worry.

AMERICAN LEGION RIDERS PRESIDENT SOBCZAK: I'll be here all weekend. Remember to tip your waiter.
(Processional.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. At this time I will go over to the Legion side and Joan Cannon is in charge.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT CANNON: I'll be careful. Okay. We're going to continue with our officers' reports with Parliamentarian Diane DeLashmit.

DEPARTMENT PARLIAMENTARIAN CONVENTION REPORT

DEPARTMENT PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: Madam
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President Loretta, our Lady Bug. Many of you may have noticed that at the Clovis workshop I was not able to find a plush eagle which was my mascot for this past year. So I brought the next best thing, and that was this. And I said, well, at least it's a bird, but I -- okay. Well, since that time many people have provided me with eagles. I got this eagle and $I$ got this eagle. And then $I$ got this eagle, this, and then $I$ got -- even from a Legionnaire I got this eagle. Okay. And this morning I came in and what did $I$ have at my place over there?
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: So I have all my eagles. Thank you for providing me with my flock.

Now I love the signs out there: pow, wham, shazam, kapow. What a year this has been for this Captain Marvelous that she named me. It feels like I've been put through the ringer. It is said that fact is stranger than friction -- fiction. Friction, yeah, fiction. And believe me believe it is. I visited four units this year that had major problems and many more that I communicated with either by email, phone, or snail mail. I don't know how many miles I drove, however to one unit alone $I$ drove 1100 miles round-trip.

Madam President Loretta traveled with me and I enjoyed her company very much. On that three-day trip our
eyes were opened to what's happening in our units.
In this day and age of technology and instant everything, we need to slow down and take stock of what we are doing. Using ATM cards to get cash and not having a paper trail for our expenses is not a good policy, particularly for the auditors as they're trying to do their job. Unfortunately unnecessary hours are being spent trying to decipher what is going on in and -- and in the end a much higher price to pay than it is if it's done properly in the first place. In some cases that could be criminal and lead to charges.

There's a huge need of training and duties and responsibilities of officers and chairmen, and I really don't know what the answer is and how to reach these units until they are so far gone. District presidents should be able to sense a unit is in trouble when they make their official visits. Try to get them help, even if it's outside your district or your area.

We are losing members and units at a very fast pace. A lot of it is due to misunderstanding and personality issues. My flock's in the way here. In many cases we have lost focus on what our mission is. Let's get back on the flight path. It is sad that we need to be reminded in song by Tim McGraw to be humble and kind and Kenny Chesney to get along. Put our differences aside and
work together for our military, veterans, youth, and communities.

For those units and districts that are soaring like eagles by doing great work, keep going strong and being an example to those that are struggling. Reach out to provide encouragement to them. I go along with what Luke Brian says in his song: I believe most people are good.

Madam President, this concludes my reports so I'll take my flock and fly.
(Applause.)

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT CANNON: Thank you. Good report, Diane. Next we'll have Musician Donna Scott.

DEPARTMENT MUSICIAN CONVENTION REPORT

DEPARTMENT MUSICIAN SCOTT: Madam President, the incredible Hummers for the department were very busy spreading music and happiness throughout their districts. Many units participated with their posts that need holidays and special events where music was included. Our song contest did not receive many entries. Those received, however, were very good. We do have some very real talented eagles in our department. Of particular interest was one entry for an Auxiliary prayer song
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written to the tune of Auld Lang Syne.
Although not a lot was reported in the Music category, this chairman is confident that most units and districts do include music in their meetings. The songs ranged from our National Anthem to the many patriotic songs that we have to choose. Music makes meetings better, more uplifting, more positive, so keep saying -singing, playing tapes or CDs at your meetings. Can you imagine a world without music? I certainly can't. To quote Confucius, "Music produces a kind of pleasure which human nature cannot do without."

Thank you, Madam Department President Loretta, for this appointment. I have truly enjoyed the year. May I continue with my committee report and awards?

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT CANNON: Yes, you may. DEPARTMENT MUSICIAN SCOTT: Our committee met at 11:30 in the Sycamore Room. Elva Skys was appointed secretary, Bonnie Bradbury offered prayers, and LaToya Williams was appointed sergeant-at-arms. We had only eight districts answer our roll call and three guests.

We looked over the code because many feel that music should be put back into our -- into our programs as a regular program. It was taken out years ago when National dropped it as a chairmanship or as an office, and everyone there thought it was important to put it back in.

So we wrote up a suggestive department code. You should have a copy. And the only change we made was I had to write that in because $I$ had already printed up these. The code for Musician would read -- that we're suggesting that you accept: Number 1. The allowance for the Department Musician shall be as adopted in the annual budget. We added to that amount not to exceed $\$ 45$, and they only put that in as a last thought because of awards, you might want to get an annual award for the first, second, and third prizes.

Chairman shall submit an end-of-the year
statement of the expenses incurred and proposed recommendations affecting the program budget for the next year to the Finance Committee by May 1st.

Number 2. The Department Chairman shall offer citations for first, second, and third place for best unit and district songs and best supplemental reports.

And number 3. Department Chairman shall encourage units and districts to provide music in their meetings.

Very simple code just to put music back in -just to put music back in our Auxiliary programs. Madam President, by direction of the committee, I move that we adopt this code addition.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT CANNON: Donna, I'm a

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little confused. Do you have the -- on 2 and 3 -- I understand number 1, but on 2 and 3, is this new or is this what's already there?

DEPARTMENT MUSICIAN SCOTT: We don't have anything there.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT CANNON: Okay.
DEPARTMENT MUSICIAN SCOTT: Actually, Madam

President, I think Joyce Patton when she was musician here a couple years ago, I think she asked that this be added back in and she tells me that there was a motion, I don't remember exactly, and that it was accepted but nothing apparently has been done so that's why we brought it up again.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT CANNON: All right. There's a motion on the floor to -- okay. Currently Department Musician Code 1 how it's currently read: "The allowance for the Department Musician shall be adopted in the annual budget. The Chairman shall submit an end-of-the-year statement of the expenses incurred and proposed recommendations affecting the program for the next year to the Finance Committee by May 1st."

The code change would read: "The allowance for the Department Musician shall be adopted in the annual budget; amount not to exceed \$45. The Chairman shall submit an end-of-the-year statement of the expenses
incurred and proposed recommendations affecting the program for the next year to the Finance Committee by May 1st."

DEPARTMENT PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: Madam

President, Diane DeLashmit, Unit 299, District 25. I believe we should leave the amount out and just leave it as budgeted. So I would amend the code to just be the way it was originally read without the not to exceed $\$ 45$. That would be up to the Finance Committee and the -- you know, the amounts may go up and if they need to be adjusted I believe, you know, could be adjusted annually. DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT CANNON: Any more discussion?
(No response.)

DEPARTMENT PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: My brain
is mush already today. I move to amend this code to delete the "not to exceed \$45."

PAST NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: Second.
DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT CANNON: All right. We
amended the motion is to have Department Code Musician code number 1, leave it as it is currently written and not to add the amount not to exceed \$45. Is there any further discussion?

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: I have a question. I'm sorry. I'm sorry. My bugs are bothering
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me. We have a question. Is this the code already? Is there no code and these are all new codes for -- okay. So that clears it up.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT CANNON: Number 1 is completely new. There's no number 1 in your code?

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: There's no music code at all.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT CANNON: Thank you, Past Department President Wendy. Okay. So department code musician. The amended motion: "The allowance for the Department Musician shall be adopted in the annual budget. The Chairman shall submit an end-of-the-year statement of the expenses incurred and proposed recommendations affecting the program for the next year to the Finance Committee by May 1st."

Any further discussion?

DEPARTMENT MUSICIAN SCOTT: Thank you. One other thing we discussed was we used to have a musician in our department. We had BJ Graceley, of course, who played the piano eloquently.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT CANNON: Donna, we're not quite done on the voting. We still have to vote for 2 and 3 together, so I -- so the original motion -- so now Department Code Musician number 2 -- and just clarify, there was no Musician code so this is all new. So we will now have one. Okay? All right. The vote was for the amendment. Now we're voting on the code. And we'll vote for all three of them together.

And just to clarify, because I know it was unclear in my mind, the Musician did not have a department code, so now we will be voting on -- the first vote which we had which was the amendment. So now we're voting on the new code 1, 2, and 3. So I'm going to read them all again? Yes, music. Yes.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Madam

President? Madam President, Anita Biggs, District 23, 252. I move to amend the name of the department code to "Music" versus "Musician."

Department code 2: "The Department Chairman shall offer citations for first, second, and third place best unit and best district songs and best supplemental reports."

Department code 3: "The Department Chairman shall encourage units and districts to provide music in their meetings."

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT CANNON: Hearing none,
those in favor say aye.

ALL PRESENT: Aye.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT CANNON: Those opposed
say no.
(No response.)

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT CANNON: Very good. Go
ahead.

DEPARTMENT MUSICIAN SCOTT: Okay. We're done with that. The other --

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT CANNON: Go ahead.

Continue.

DEPARTMENT MUSICIAN SCOTT: The other thing we discussed as I mentioned was having a department musician. We had Ruth O'Connor and BJ Graceley for many years and we don't have them anymore, so if anybody has any suggestions from their districts for a musician, that would be nice. That was the other thing that was discussed. May I continue with the awards?

GIRLS STATE DIRECTOR CONVENTION REPORT

GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN SOLLAZZO: Good morning, everybody. Okay. Elissa had to go back to Girls State to get ready for Girls State so she left me her report.

Madam Department President Loretta, Esteemed Guests, and Convention Delegates, I am here to report on any updates we have for the Girls state session at this time. We are only a couple days from our start date of the 75th American Legion Auxiliary California Girls State Week.

Currently we are low on our total number of delegates attending the 2018 ALA California Girls State session. We're under our 510. We also are short a couple of city moms. If any of you want to step up, we still need two city moms. I know you have heard from our previous director, Dona, about the participation that is needed by our Auxiliary members to keep this program running and to continue sharing the American Legion Auxiliary mission. We need willing and able members to participate in this program annually. Please think about coming on as a staff member for a future session.

I want to thank all of the units that graciously donated items or funds to help with the wish list this year. Girls State Committee Member Karen is still collecting donations and will be bringing them down to Girls State session. It was great to see many units help out in any way that they can.

Something new this year as voted upon by the committee was that we did not charge the girls that are flying in for shuttle. We as a committee felt that the budget could cover the costs of the shuttle to help keep the delegates' fees at a minimum. We know that most of these girls already have to pay a little extra to cover their transportation to and from southern California.

We also have a new online store up and running. We have heard the positives and the negatives regarding this store. We will be working with the company to offer more smaller items for the next session.

I am sorry I have to leave early as I have work obligations. I want to thank you, President Loretta, for giving me this opportunity to serve as the American Legion Auxiliary Department of California Girls State Director. Respectfully submitted, Elissa Kirkland.

GIRLS STATE CONVENTION COMMITTEE REPORT

GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN SOLLAZZO: Okay, ladies. Madam President, I will begin with my convention committee meeting report. The convention committee on Girls State met on June 21st, 2018 in the Sycamore room of the Crowne Plaza Hotel, Sacramento, California. The statistical report of this chairman appears on page 17 of the Book of Reports.

Gloria Jean Sinopoli was appointed secretary, Silvia Hillyer offered prayer, and Zana Chaney was appointed as sergeant-at-arms. A total of 23 district delegates answered roll call. There were five visitors present.

The committee agreed upon the following report. Code changes. The committee read the code changes which are just general organization changes. LuAnn Capazzi moved that the code be accepted as changed. Second was made. Committee agreed without discussion.

Resolutions, none. Recommendations. Discussion
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ensued regarding changing venues of Girls State session to up north, cost, and transportation. Also discussed adding more computerized format for rest of forms for next year. Possible code changes to enhance responsibilities for Girls State committee and more description of chairman versus director responsibilities.

Presentation of awards. A listing of all awards was given to the district delegates, the Girls State committee, the Department President, and the Historian. A copy of the list will be posted in the department convention office. Madam President, may I now continue to my report?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yes, you may.

GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN SOLLAZZO: Okay. So instead -- excuse me. Madam President, may I now present the committee's proposed department code changes?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Oh, yes.

GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN SOLLAZZO: Okay. So please note before everybody panics that we did not make any wording changes. The code has been organized into sections and it was read in the committee and there are no verbal changes, none. We rearranged it into a proper order numerically. So I'm going to only read instead of six pages of code, I'm going to read what the old numbers were and you can look in the Girls state code and read how
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we've renumbered it. And each district received this copy, so if you are curious, please go to your Girls State District Chairmen and get the information from her.

So we start with general information. The old code 9 is now number 1. Ten is now number 2.11 is now number 3. 12 is number 4. 13 is number 5. 26 is now number 6. 27 is now number 7. 29 is now number 8. And 23 is now 9.

Then we categorized it to Finance. Number 1 is now 10. Number 2 is now 11. Number 3 is now 12. Number 4 is now 13. Number 5 is now 14. Number 6 is now 15. Number 7 is 16. 25 is now 17. And 28 is now 18.

We then went to Girls State Committee responsibilities. 8(b) is now number 19. 24 is now number 20.

We then went to department Girls State Chairmen responsibilities. $8(a)$ is $21.14(b)$ is 22. District Chairmen responsibilities is next. Number 22 is now 23. Unit Chairmen responsibilities, number 17 is now 24.18 is now 25. 20 is now 26 and encompasses (a), (b), (c), (d), (e), and (f).

Then we went to Director responsibilities. Number 16 is the new 27 and includes (b), (c), and (d), (a), (b), (c), and (d). And then we went to delegates eligibility requirements, and number 14 is now $28(a)$, (b)
-- (a) is (a), (c) is now (b). 19 is now (c). 21 is now (d). Then our last category is school faculty guidelines, and 15 is now the new number $29(a),(b),(c),(d),(e)$, and (f).

So by the direction of the committee I move to adopt the new arrangement of the code with the proposed changes.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: There is a motion on the floor by the committee that we adopt these code changes which is changing numbers only. All those in favor -- or any discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: All those in favor say aye.

ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Opposed?
(No response.)

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Thank you. Motion carried.

GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN SOLLAZZO: Madam President, may I please continue with my report? Girls state has been quite the whirlwind for this Chairman. I volunteered to be Girls State Chairman in July 2017 and now it's June 2018 already. In October we held our Girls State committee meeting where we reviewed the code, made
committee appointments, and set the budget. March came and went as the delegates' and alternates' online applications start rolling in. Wow. Little did I know how much time goes into checking the girls' bios, matching pictures to their bios, asking for missing medical information, and then waiting on the parents' signature packets and any missing information that completes the applications.

There were several chairmen who helped and it was very much appreciated. A western division Girls State report was submitted. Pictures were provided. Next due were the year-end reports from units and districts. I received 26 district year-end reports out of 30. Next year let's shoot for 100 percent reporting.

159 units reported sponsoring a delegate to the 2018 session of Girls State. This is an increase of ten units from 2017. Five units sponsored a school for the first time. 112 units invite their eligible delegates and alternates to join their units and ask them to at least become involved to gain community service hours. 95 units reached out to previous delegates to help with their 2018 program in one way or another. 115 units promoted the Samsung Scholarship to their delegates and alternates.

As of May 1st, 201855 units had donated a total of $\$ 3,485$, however $I$ know that donations have continued to
roll in after that. There were only seven district supplementals received by this chairman with six unit supplementals. Units reported that Girls State delegates and alternates are invited to help with events such as crab feeds, raffles, steak and barbecue nights and more. It's fun to hear the units have all kinds of fundraisers ranging from spaghetti dinners to dinners at restaurants where the proceeds go to funding the girls for Girls state.

Girls State delegates are also asked to help with placing flags at cemeteries on Memorial Day and serving dinners for special occasions. Several units reported that even if the girls are not eligible as members, they volunteer at the posts to gain volunteer hours for college. All districts hosted Girls State teas or luncheons, while several hosted teas/luncheons with Boys State delegates.

Several districts asked higher Girls State delegates to speak or be present at the event for introductions and questions. One district actually hosted one of the very first Girls State citizens at their tea this year. She is currently 95 years old and she talked about the first session in 1940 that was held in Sacramento at Grace Union High School. There were only 115 girls in session at that point. How exciting for the
newest delegates to hear of how it used to be.
The Girls State Alumnae Foundation has awarded grants to help units sponsors delegates. This year they awarded $\$ 4,000$ in grants with four grants being awarded to specific units. The remainder of the grant money will go into our donated enrollment fees budget line item. They are also generously awarding two \$1,000 scholarships this year to the outstanding citizen and a Blue Goldstar Girl. We need to spread the word about the alumnae grants, so please take the information back to your unit for future use.

I know several units declined because they could not raise the money to send even just one girl. The alumnae grant could have helped these units. I could go on and on, but I won't. I have learned a lot this year and am very excited about my second year as chairman.

I know you are all excited for your girls to attend this session, as we have some very special events planned for the 75th anniversary. For starters, each delegate was asked to provide their hero to be put on buttons. Trish Ward from Kansas made 613 hero pins of which 507 are custom-made for the delegates, 47 for the staff, and 56 heros for backup buttons. The hero buttons are a great way for the delegates to understand the mission of the Auxiliary. Trish has done this for the
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past three years and we are incredibly thankful for what Trish has done.

Lastly there will be an alumnae activity that includes a meet and greet, a joint session of senate and assembly, a city expo and mock trial, dinner and the flag lowering. There will be a talent and slide show to cap off the day's activities.

In closing, this chairman is looking forward to another successful Girls State session. So are you from Girls State?

AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Yeah, yeah.
GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN SOLLAZZO: Madam President, may I please present my first place awards now?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yes.

GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN SOLLAZZO: Okay. I have the first place Program Support Award and this person has -this unit has had the most girls that they have supported through Girls State. And I don't know, I don't see any of my people up here. One. I have Roseann Vicky Bean, District 9 Unit 161 who sent 18 years to Girls State.
(Applause.)
GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN SOLLAZZO: Okay. This is my first place award for Best Unit Supplemental. I have District 21 Unit 500, Chairman Kathy Newleen.
(Applause.)

GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN SOLLAZZO: And last, my
first place District Supplemental goes to District 11 Mary Adame.
(Applause.)
GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN SOLLAZZO: Madam President, this concludes my report, but may I make a personal comment very quickly?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Sure.

GIRLS STATE CHAIRMAN SOLLAZZO: Everyone, I do have the Girls State jewelry with me today for the 75 th anniversary: a pen, a necklace, and earrings. They're $\$ 10$ each or if you buy the little set they're 25. And I will be here until 4:00 o'clock today and then I am zooming away for Girls State. So please come and see me sometime today. Thank you.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Tracy, is your report short and sweet? I know you, that's why I asked. And after this report we'll call on our Past Presidents Parley.

COMMUNITY SERVICE CONVENTION REPORT

DEPARTMENT COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN VARNELL: Good morning, everyone. Okay. Thank you very much. I
want to get this done and get it out of the way and, kabaam, I'll be out of here.

Okay. So I'm going to start with my
preconvention meeting. Community Service Super Tiggers did meet on June 21 st in the Terrace number 3. Our statistical report is on page 15 and 16 . Jennifer Turner was appointed secretary, Rosemary Weber offered prayer, and Starr Manning was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. We had a total of 21 district delegates answered to roll call and four visitors were there. There were no code changes. Yay.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN VARNELL: We did have one recommendation that I will get together with next year's chairman on and that was just basically to make sure that we know the exact amount that's in the disaster fund for the State of California since we've been hit with so many disasters.

Madam President, just a quick note on my meeting yesterday. I was very, very excited to report we had five ladies there that was their first time convention here at our American Legion Auxiliary convention, so I was very, very excited.
(Applause.)

DEPARTMENT COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN VARNELL:

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Jennifer Turner was one of them and also Starr Manning was a dual member, so it was very -- it was a lot of fun. So thank you, ladies, for coming.

Madam President, may $I$ go ahead and continue with my report and my first place awards?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yes.

DEPARTMENT COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN VARNELL:

Wow, what an amazing year. I was honored to be the
Department Community Service Chairman. All I can do is roar with pride with awesome things that all you ladies have accomplished. The things that you did all year long were beyond amazing. There were no words to express how it made my heart fill with such happiness and joy.

This year I really enjoyed being a part of the Leadership workshop. At times I thought I was only asked so $I$ could drive long distances and carry all of Linda Fercho's stuff. Just kidding. No, in all seriousness, it gave me a great opportunity to get out there and meet all you Super Tiggers and to be a part of so many special moments.

DEPARTMENT COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN VARNELL:

And our First Place Community Service Senior of the Year goes to Susan Winters, Unit 383 District 6.
(Applause.)

DEPARTMENT COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN VARNELL: Madam President, just a side note real quick. So I work for an assisted living which everyone knows. And I did not judge their reports. They were too good. They were too amazing. I got professors and staff to judge these reports, so if anybody is mad, you can go talk to them. Thank you and have a great convention.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Thank you. We will hear next from our Past Presidents Parley Chairmen so that we can prepare for lunch.

PAST PRESIDENTS PARLEY CONVENTION REPORT

PAST PRESIDENTS PARLEY CLENDENIN: Madam
President, good morning. The convention committee on Past Presidents Parley met on June 21st, 2018 in the room Terrace number 3 of the Crowne Plaza Hotel, Sacramento, California. The statistical report of this chairman appears on pages 22 and 23 of the Book of Reports. Susan Baker, District 28, was appointed secretary. Sylvia Alcantar, District 25, offered prayer. Debbie Hurado, District 14, was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 18 district delegates answered roll call. There were zero guests present.

The committee agreed on the following report. The code was read and reviewed with the following code changes. Code number 5 now reads: "The scholarship applicant has only two years to initiate use of the funds awarded. If the scholarship is not claimed by the university/college on behalf of the applicant within a two-year period, the Department Office will inquire in writing as to why these funds have not been used. If the use of the funds is not initiated in that time frame, they are to be reverted back to the funds from" -- excuse me. "They are to be reverted back to the funds from which they were originated. If circumstances of nonuse are of a
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medical or personal nature, it is by discretion of the Department President, Secretary/Treasurer, and the Chairman to extend the claim for a period not to exceed 18 months before funds are reverted back to where they were originated."

If approved the code will now read: "The scholarship applicant has only two years to initiate use of the funds awarded. If the scholarship is not claimed by the university/college on behalf of the applicant within the two-year period, the Department Office will inquire in writing as to why these funds have not been used. If the use of the funds are not initiated in that time frame, they are to be reverted back to the funds from which they were originated. If circumstances of nonuse are of a medical or personal nature, it is by discretion of the Department President, Secretary or Treasurer, and the Chairman to extend the claim for a period not to exceed 18 months before funds are reverted back to where they were originated."

By direction of the Past Presidents Parley preconvention meeting, I move for the acceptance of this code change.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. It has been moved that the code change number 5 which now reads Secretary/Treasurer -- I'll read the whole sentence so you
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know what it concerns. "If circumstances of nonuse are medical or personal nature, it is by discretion of the Department President, Secretary/Treasurer, and the Chairman to extend the claim for a period not to exceed 18 months." The proposed change would say "Secretary or Treasurer."

All those in favor of this code change -- is there any discussion by the way?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: All those in favor of this code change, please say aye.

ALL PRESENT: Aye.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Opposed?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Motion carried.

PAST PRESIDENTS PARLEY CLENDENIN: Thank you, Madam President. Code now 8 -- I'm sorry. Code number 8 now reads: "The Department Chairman shall make financial arrangements with the nursing school according to their policies. The Secretary/Treasurer shall forward payments to the school as soon as confirmation has been received by the Department Office that the student has been accepted."

If approved the new code will read: "The
Department Chairman shall make financial arrangements with the nursing school according to their policies. The
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Treasurer shall forward payments to the school as soon as confirmation has been received by the Department Office that the student has been accepted."

By the direction of the Past Presidents Parley preconvention meeting, I move for the acceptance of this code change.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. The code
number 8 has been changed to read from: "The Secretary/Treasurer shall forward payments" to read: "The Treasurer shall forward payments." Are there any questions?
(No response.)

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: All those in favor of this code change, say aye.

ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Opposed?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Thank you. Motion carried.

PAST PRESIDENTS PARLEY CLENDENIN: Thank you.

Code number 14 now reads: "The corsages and Past
Presidents Parley Luncheon tickets for the $\$ 4,000$ scholarship winner and/or the Auxiliary Member of the Year and the Women Veteran Honorees who attend the luncheon will be paid out of the Convention expenses. As a
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courtesy for the recognition a Past National President brings to California, her Past Presidents Parley Luncheon ticket will be paid out of the Convention expenses."

If approved the code will now read: "The
corsages and Past Presidents Parley Luncheon tickets for the $\$ 4,000$ scholarship winner and/or the Auxiliary Member of the Year and the Woman Veteran Honorees, if not in uniform, who attend the luncheon will be paid out of the Convention expenses. As a courtesy for the recognition a Past National President brings to California, her Past Presidents Parley Luncheon ticket will be paid out of the convention expenses."

By the direction of the Past Presidents Parley preconvention meeting, I move for the acceptance of this code change.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. The code 14 has been a motion to change it from: "Honorees who attend the luncheon will be paid out of the convention expenses to veteran honorees, if not in uniform, who attend the luncheon," these are for the corsages, "will be paid out of the convention expenses. Are there questions?

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY MIKESELL: Yes, ma'am. The way this reads it's encompassing their luncheon ticket as well as their corsage.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Corsages, yes, it
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does at the Past President Parley luncheon.
DEPARTMENT SECRETARY MIKESELL: So it's wrong.
It needs to be change just strictly to pertain to the corsages, not the tickets. We still pay the tickets. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. PAST PRESIDENTS PARLEY CLENDENIN: Right. So that's correct. I will take this into committee and come back.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yes. So we'll take this up, redo that.

PAST PRESIDENTS PARLEY CLENDENIN: It was just for the corsages.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Right. It's
supposed to be just about the corsages and that's because a woman in uniform cannot wear a corsage.

PAST PRESIDENTS PARLEY CLENDENIN: So I will get rid of that motion for the time being. Okay.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: The motion has been withdrawn

PAST PRESIDENTS PARLEY CLENDENIN: Okay. I lost my place a minute. Okay. A recommendation was made that Department help offset the cost units incur having Service Member of the Year attend Department Convention, and this recommendation will be forwarded to the next Past Presidents Parley Chairman. Second and third place unit
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district awards were presented. Prayer was said. Meeting closed about 9:50.

Madam President, may $I$ go on with my presentation and report and awards?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yes.

PAST PRESIDENTS PARLEY CLENDENIN: Thank you. I knew it was right there. The Magical Dragons are the mentors. They have been setting the example and they have been busy this year. We have raised money for nurses scholarship. We have scoured the state looking to honor our female veterans, active duty. Units reported over 40 new female veterans have been given first year memberships throughout the department.

Units and districts report assisting veterans by hosting parties, baby showers for our female veterans. One district reported participating and distributing to the Department of Veterans Affairs Nationwide Baby Shower held May 11, 2018. WIC, First Five, and breastfeeding information were made available to only the female veterans and active duty soon-to-be moms. Units provided gifts to the moms as well as attended the event and were very much excited to meet the local female active duty and veterans.

While four units submitted an application for Unit Member of the Year, there were many more units
reporting they honor their unit members. One unit reported that they have members nominate a unit member in May and at installation in June, the member with the most nominations will receive a $\$ 50$-- I'm sorry. A five -- a $\$ 50$ gift card recognition. This department raises funds for veterans and their immediate family members for nursing scholarships.

Judged by nurses, this chairman is excited to have been able to give all ten applicants a scholarship of anything from 500 to the deserving $\$ 4,000$ scholarship award. The comments received from the judges locally was they were very excited about the quality of nurses that applied. They are hopeful that this is an example of the current nurses that will soon be entering into the workforce. Kudos to the units that found these exceptional students. Excuse me a second.

The Department -- sorry. The Department, Districts, and Units know the most important part of the PPP program is mentoring. The Past Presidents have been there, done that. But in order for the ALA to continue another hundred years, they need to educate the new members. We know we need to do this in a kind and gentle way and we need to carry ourselves with grace and dignity in all aspects of our life. Our Past Presidents rise to the occasion. One district reported at their PPP luncheon
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the new members named "little sister" are assigned to a "big sister" for educating and mentoring in all aspects of the ALA.

In a recent ALA "In The Know" bulletin, if we are going to mentor or give advice, we must ensure that we are doing it in a way that is without humiliation and is presented in a positive manner. Mentoring is not trying to persuade others to our way of thinking. This is bullying. Mentoring is creating a connection of camaraderie to help build and strengthen our organization and ourselves to accomplish the mission of the American Legion Auxiliary. This can also apply to our daily lives and our interaction with family, friends, and strangers. This is an important message.

How many of us gasp when we see a newer member reach between the flags. Or we complain when someone says "I make a motion to," instead of "I move to." There are correct ways to educate and $I$ know there is a fine line between mentoring and bullying. Let's all be mindful, use kind words, and educate, not bully or offend.

Madam President, that concludes my floor report.
As you can see the Magical Dragons have truly displayed your theme of Real Heroes Wear Dog Tags, Not Capes especially evidenced in our very special guests. May I present my first place awards? And I am so excited to
have you introduce our very special honorees.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yes.

PAST PRESIDENTS PARLEY CLENDENIN: Okay. First
Place Unit award goes to Lakewood Unit 496 District 19,

Chairman Mina Carrasco.
(Applause.)

PAST PRESIDENTS PARLEY CLENDENIN: First place

District Award goes to District 25, Chairman Sylvia
Alcantar.
(Applause.)
PAST PRESIDENTS PARLEY CLENDENIN: She took your prize. Oh, no. Yeah, she did. Thank you. You did such a good job.

Okay. Madam President, will you please introduce our very special guests?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Unfortunately our Unit Member of the Year had a death in the family and is unable to attend, so we have asked Susan Sanz-Franco, Unit President of Pasadena Unit 13 to come and accept her award on her behalf.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: This award is
presented to Lucy Ann Marie from Unit 13 District 18. And what stood out amongst her application was the usual things about all the things that she's done for the
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Auxiliary which were commendable, but what really was striking was what she did outside the Auxiliary. She works with veterans almost on a full-time job, but volunteers. And I don't have the copy of her resume in front of me -- report in front of me, but it is outstanding. This woman does wonders for our veterans. And she's a veteran herself.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Will the
Sergeant-at-Arms, along with the Distinguished Guest Chairman, please -- and Marshal along with the Distinguished Guest Chairman please escort to this stage the $\$ 4,000$ scholarship winner Max Rivera-Orozco, application submitted by Unit 589 District 28, Molly Smith, Chairman.
(Processional.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: He is a U.S. Air
Force veteran.
(Applause.)
PAST PRESIDENTS PARLEY CLENDENIN: And he's cute too, ladies.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Max, the U.S. Air Force veteran --
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: -- we are proud to
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be able to give him a scholarship. Would you like to say a few words?

MR. RIVERA-OROZCO: First of all, I want to thank the ALA Unit 589. Molly, she lit the fire underneath me and helped me get my paperwork in, so I appreciate that very much.
(Applause.)
MR. RIVERA-OROZCO: I am truly honored that I received this scholarship. It's going to help out a lot and it will be returned back I know. Currently I'm from Salinas, Hartnell College, first year RN student. I have one more year to go. And they just opened a VA clinic or I guess improvements to the VA over in Marina, and hopefully one day I'll come back there and work with us vets.
(Applause.)
MR. RIVERA-OROZCO: So thank you very much.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Good luck. Thank
you. Thank you very much. We'll see him later at lunch.
Will the Sergeant-at-Arms along with the

Distinguished Guest Chairman please escort to the stage Marine Corps Servicemember of the Year Victoria Passo.
(Processional.)

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Victoria's
application was submitted by Kim Vincent from District 30 .
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(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Would you like to say a few words?

MS. PASSO: Good morning, ladies and gentlemen. It's an honor to be here especially since this year in the Marine Corps it's our 100 years of women serving in the Marine Corps.
(Applause.)
MS. PASSO: 1918 Opha May Johnson was the first female to join the Marine Corps, so for me to be here and be able to represent women is empowering and I'm incredibly honored. Thank you.
(Applause.)

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Thank you. Will the Sergeant-at-Arms, along with the Marshal and the Distinguished Guest Chairman, please escort to the stage our Servicemember of the Year representing the U.S. Navy, Emily Flores.
(Processional.)

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Her application was also submitted by Kim Vincent from District 30 .
(Applause.)
MS. FLORES: So I just want to say that I'm very honored and humbled to be here today. I come from a very long line of military people in my family, but I'm the
first female, so --
(Applause.)
MS. FLORES: So my family is very, very proud. I wish they could be here, but they can't. But I am so very happy to be among you ladies and everything you do for us and our communities. I know in my deployment I got a care package from the American Legion and they told me to check this box if you're a female and this box if you're a male. And I didn't understand until I got back to my office and I opened it and there's makeup remover wipes and hair ties, and I'm thinking on the way down here only the American Legion Auxiliary would know to do that because men would not know to do that.
(Applause.)
MS. FLORES: Thank you. Thank you very much. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: And we'll see her later at lunch. Thank you.

PAST PRESIDENTS PARLEY CLENDENIN: Again, Madam President, thank you for the opportunity to be your PPP chairman and meet these incredible veterans and honorees. I look forward to hearing more about them at the luncheon. Thank you.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Thank you. And we will rush off to lunch as soon as we have some supersonic waves from our Secretary.

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY MIKESELL: Okay. And before I start we have two tables for Past President Parley lunch that the tickets are available, and now I've totally broke the microphone. But then -- and then I thought, well, maybe it's the parents, like they have trouble getting out here; right? But then $I$ come here and there's like not

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JUNIOR ACTIVITIES/JUNIOR CONFERENCE CONVENTION REPORT

JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN DOIDGE: The statistical report of this chairman appears on page 18 of the book of reports. The Junior Activities and Junior Conference preconvention meeting was held in the Cypress Room on June 21st, 2018.

JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN DOIDGE: And we're done with code. Awards -- thank you, everybody. I'm always nervous. Awards were presented to members. Unit supplemental third place was awarded to Sherryl Panek, District 28 Unit 694. Second place was awarded to Bea Foster, District 19 Unit 291.

What? Oh, District 29. Sorry. District

Supplemental third place was awarded to Sherryl Panek, District 28 and second place was awarded to Lori Altman of
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District 19. We recognized the following juniors who earned patches this year: Madison Beasley, Jennifer Pitcher, Zoe Dooley, Miley Ann Culp and the following SAL Junior Members Cameron Turley and James G. Culp. Closing prayer was offered and the meeting was adjourned at 9:55. Madam President, may I continue with my supplemental?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yes.

JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN DOIDGE: California Juniors spent over 1,900 hours serving 1,924 veterans and their families this year. Juniors held opportunity drawing booths and assisted in selling snacks during a corn hole tournament which raised funds for Boys and Girls State programs. They collected items for Give 10 to Education, helped the historians with written and picture history books, lead parts of the unit meetings, served as unit officers and chairman, and gave reports during meetings. They distributed and pinned poppies on veterans and raised donations for the Poppy funds.

During the holidays, junior members collected toys, gift cards, and food to send to 50 military families including 380 children for local VA homes, while other juniors helped deliver over 300 gifts to veterans and their families. They also help to provide supplies for troop boxes by painting rocks and making Christmas cards.
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For Valentine's Day they had a party with food, cards, treats, juice and canteen books. For veterans that were unable to attend, the juniors delivered the goodies to them, had a champagne brunch and organized an Easter egg hunt and cupcake and cookie decorating for military families. They filled eggs with candy, papers for free drinks, and notes thanking everyone for supporting the Junior Auxiliary program. Juniors also gave out 267 personalized cards, lollipops, and poppies to each veteran at a VA home on National Grandparents Day. During the week of Veterans Day, juniors did bedside visits and gave out socks, canteen books and poppies to veterans.

They have spent several hours at local VA hospitals serving food, talking to veterans, singing karaoke with veterans, decorating and announcing bingo. Girls who were also members of the Girls Scouts played games with the VA residents and donated cookies and other snacks. They spent time with sick members of the Legion after they came home from the hospital and served food at local posts to veterans and military families.

Juniors helped fold flags, assisted in flag disposal services, handed out flags and flag etiquette books, and participated in the Pocket Flag Project. They took food to food banks and clothes to homeless shelters, helped pick up trash at local parks and school yards and
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helped the city plant trees. They have donated clothes and served food at local Stand Downs and helped at food booths at sporting events. Girls also assisted at their schools with grading tests, helping set up class supplies and tutoring other students. Juniors served at the local food pantries.

One Junior group adopted 17 veteran families and participated in four yellow ribbon events. One junior made 200 pillowcases while working with a local Quilt Guild and church members. Another junior member is currently on a team called Find You which is for tracking children. They have been recognized by Telemundo, La Opinion Newspaper, and Sharktank. Their goal is to adapt the GPS system for our military in hopes that we will have no more missing in action.

We have four Junior Auxiliary members -- I already mentioned those. We have four Auxiliary members and two SAL members who earned six red patches, five gold patches this year, and four National membership patches. Junior Conference had 30 girls in attendance this year. They held their annual meeting which included nomination and elections of Department Junior Chairmen for the 2018-2019 year. Juniors voted to have fundraising events for another member whose father was in a motorcycle accident. They held a flag retirement ceremony, roasted
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hot dogs and smores, played games, made capes and masks, folded pocket flags and overall had a very productive meeting.

NATIONAL SECURITY CHAIRMAN WILLIAMS: Good afternoon, Madam President.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Good afternoon. NATIONAL SECURITY CHAIRMAN WILLIAMS: Can you hear me now? Okay. Good afternoon. The convention committee on National Security met on June 21st, 2018 in Terrace 1 of the Crowne Plaza Hotel, Sacramento, California. The meeting convened at 11:00 a.m. Starr Manning from Unit 252, District 23 was appointed secretary, Barbara Thompson Unit 791 District 13 offered prayer, and Maureen O'Brien-Sacco was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms from Unit 18 District 13. A total of 20 delegates answered roll call. There were two visitors.

The code was read and approved by the committee
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with no changes. A discussion regarding the program was reviewed. Awards and certificates for Second Place Unit Supplemental and Third Place Supplemental were presented and handed out at the meeting. Certificates of appreciation for five units were handed out. The meeting adjourned with prayer at 11:45 a.m. Gloria Williams, National Security Chairman.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yes.

NATIONAL SECURITY CHAIRMAN WILLIAMS: Madam
Department President, it has been a great pleasure to represent the Department and your Super She Heroes who were very active this year in supporting our National Security program. I am sorry to report that we did not receive 100 percent reporting from the districts, but those that did report spent countless hours of volunteerism, dedication helping our active military members and their families.

Sisters representing the Green Arrow of the Department of California have witnessed horrific national disasters, yet we remain strong. Many of our members used their accredited cert training to assist the fire departments and Red Cross during our recent disasters. Coupons, either you love them or you don't.
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Sending coupons can be labor intensive. However, we have a few units that commit to this program without hesitation. District 14 Unit 509 sent $\$ 292,602.32$. District 28 reported $\$ 10,975$, and District 16 Unit 211 reported a grand total of $\$ 6,126.74$. Members from other units have donated countless hours in helping military families through this program.

Bundles for Babies. District 16, Unit 211 is actively involved at Vandenberg Air Force Base in a program called Bundles for Babies. This is a free class focused toward military personal and their families. They discuss resources available in the community and how a new baby may affect a marriage. Several hours by the members are donated in making booties and hats.

Military support. Members of Unit 43, District 24 use their talents in establishing a strong national defense by providing tools to strengthen our military families throughout Los Angeles. They donated 1193 hours to support service members and their families. Working cooperatively with their Legionnaires, they stayed abreast of the status of hot topics and National Security issues and this ensured that all action, whether co-sponsored or independent, was in accordance with the American Legion family values.

Legislative and civic practices are supported by
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many units on issues affecting our veterans, community and nation. Unit 742 set up an information booth at a local restaurant during Military Appreciation Day. Letters were written to soldiers by Auxiliary, Post, and Junior members. These letters were forwarded to the Blue Star Moms. The unit also hosted a Military Mess Hall and a Military Ball at the Legion post. The members of the Department of California have shown that they are vigilant about our nation and the service personnel abroad.

NATIONAL SECURITY CHAIRMAN WILLIAMS: Madam

President --

NATIONAL PUBLIC RELATIONS CHAIRMAN TAYLOR: I don't want to give out the wrong award.

NATIONAL SECURITY CHAIRMAN WILLIAMS: Thank you for your assistance.
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(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. Now the moment we have been waiting for. We have a couple of guests that are probably going to be a little skittish and a little shy, so maybe we shouldn't do a whole lot of noise and racket and clapping, but just do a lot of oohs and awes. That's good.

So at this time we have a special surprise for you. As you all know my special project this past year has been Paws for Purple Hearts and you know how passionate I've been about it and you've all been so receptive and generous. You've been awesome. It gives me great pleasure to have here with us today Laura Douglas and Matt Decker with their dog Larson, and they've got a couple of special guests with them.

Sergeant-at-Arms and Marshal, along with the Distinguished Guest Chairman, please escort to this stadium Laura Douglas and Matt Decker with their dogs.
(Processional.)

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Ladies, I was given the privilege and honor to name this puppy, so meet Liberty. I still call her Baby, but her name is Liberty. She's eight weeks old. And I want to put her in my pocket.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CAPAZZI: Wait. She
wants to say a few words in the microphone.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: She choose a black one because she can smoother it out of here easier.

NATIONAL PUBLIC RELATIONS CHAIRMAN TAYLOR: He's nibbling on my ears.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. While their oohing and awing over the puppies here, I'm going to have Laura say a few words.

MS. DOUGLAS: Hello everyone. I'm Laura Douglas with the organization Paws for Purple Hearts. We want to thank you so much for your generous donation to our program. And we are very proud to introduce Liberty, also known as Libby, who was named by your -- Loretta and your members in honor of the generous donation that you made to our program.
(Applause.)
MS. DOUGLAS: Your financial support will go towards Libby's training and will help us pay for things such as vet care, food, toys, training equipment, and other things like her harness, leash, and her service dog vest. And by donating to our program you're multiplying your impact because not only will Libby go on to change the life of the veteran with whom she's paired as a service dog, but she will also change the lives of the veterans who work with her in our canine assisted therapy
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program. We anticipate that Libby will work with at least 30 veterans who are undergoing treatment for posttraumatic stress disorder over the course of her training to become a service dog.
(Applause.)
MS. DOUGLAS: So thank you for your support of Paws for Purple Hearts and thank you for your commitment to the men and women serving America.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. Laura, on behalf of the American Legion Auxiliary Department of California, all these ladies have really got behind this. Their hearts were in it, they were passionate about it. We would like to present you a check for $\$ 25,165$.
(Applause.)
DISTINGUISHED GUEST CHAIRMAN WORKMAN: Madam
President, we just received another check from the 26 th District for $\$ 150$, so --

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Cool.

PAST NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: Madam
President? Madam President?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yes.
PAST NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: Laura, the
girls from -- so $I$ know that you're coming over to California Girls State on Monday and California Girls
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State always has a service project and their service project this year is Paws for Purple Hearts. And this is their service project this year, so 500 girls are bringing with them anything from peanut butter to toys to leashes to Cheerios. So they will be there and I know you have somebody coming to pick that up and they're going to make that connection between the girls and where that donation actually goes to. So you've got a little bit more coming.

MS. DOUGLAS: Wonderful. Thank you so much. Thank you so much.
(Applause.)

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Aren't they
adorable? We thank you so much for taking your time to bring them over. Are they the cutest or what?

AUDIENCE MEMBER: What's the black one's name? MR. DECKER: This is George.
(Applause.)

MR. DECKER: Good afternoon. My name is Matt

Decker. I'm the clinical director for Paws for Purple Hearts. I spent from '02 to '08 in the United States Marine Corps and I did six tours in Iraq. Oorah. After coming back I figured that I needed to continue to serve so I got a degree in social work and started working for the VA doing one-on-one counseling with dogs. Something kind of rare, not a lot of $V A$ employees doing that. And
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Paws For Purple Hearts contacted me about the possibility of placing a dog with me to assist me in that work. They did. Two years later the CEO hunted me down like a bloodhound and says you are going to come work for me. He said you work for vets one on one right now, and $I$ can make your wingspan hundreds. So if you're telling me I can improve the lives of hundreds of vets, I'm in.

Been with the organization three months, met dozens of vets that $I$ love dearly, seen the impact the dogs have. And the dog that they gave me is the one you heard about before, Larson. And I couldn't do the job without him. I supported the vets in the valley fires. I supported them at the Yountville shooting. I supported them at the Oroville Dam crisis. All crises where Larson sat in a mobile office laying on laps, giving kisses where necessary, and cuddling.

The impact that the dogs have on our vets is -it's unreal. I -- I don't have a therapist, but if anybody asks I would say, well, my therapist has a wet nose. Your generosity is overwhelming. We can't thank you guys enough. And the impact these dogs are going to have to your friends, your family, your loved ones, our veterans is going to be astronomical. And like Laura said, they don't just touch one, they'll touch dozens by the time they're done with their training. And the impact
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that we're having -- we have five sites. The impact that we're having, we're seeing lower acuity, decrease in suicide risks, and that in my opinion is saving lives because my job, let's make sure that nobody else dies by suicide.
(Applause.)
MR. DECKER: Thank you so much again for your generosity.
(Applause.)
VA\&R CHAIRMAN MARTINEZ: Kathie Martinez, 23rd District. Can we find out the ages and the breeds of these dogs? We're asking what kind of dogs are they.

MS. DOUGLAS: So Liberty is a Golden
Retriever/Labrador Retriever mix. Her mother was a Golden Retriever and her father is a Labrador Retriever and he is eight weeks old. And George is a full Labrador Retriever and he is eight weeks old as well.
(Applause.)
VA\&R CHAIRMAN MARTINEZ: Thank you.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. While they make their way down, we're going to go into our nominations. So those of you who are making nominations for an office, please come to the stage if you can get your eyes off the puppies.

(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Thank you. Are there any further nominations for Department President?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Hearing none, nomination for Department President are now closed.

Nominations are now open for the office of Department Vice President. The Chair recognizes Anita Biggs from District 23.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you, Madam President. And on behalf of Community Unit 46 the 23rd District, it is with great pride that $I$ nominate Kathie Martinez for the office of Department Vice

President for the year 2018-2019.
(Applause.)

DISTRICT 14 PRESIDENT SINOPOLI: Madam Department President, fellow Auxiliary members, District 14 and Unit 110 out of Oakhurst are happy to place in nomination the
name of Kae Orcutt for Junior Member of Finance. Kae has been eligible for the American Legion Auxiliary through her late husband, Dwight Orcutt, a U.S. Air Force veteran from the Korean War. She was a charter member of her unit which was formed in 2010. And has served as the unit treasurer from that day forward. Okay. Now we will proceed to the nominations for the Delegates to National Convention. Terry, I know we have five delegates for our charter and one for every 1500 members, but $I$ don't know what that number is. 19. Okay. So we need 19.

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY MIKESELL: Okay, ladies. You're going to have to excuse me about this here. We have -- well, first off we had confusion about the number of delegates we have. Anyway, some of the nominations I've received and some districts haven't responded.

We have 19 delegates and alternates. Four are

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY MIKESELL: I did need help. Okay. So I need 16. No, I've already got four. DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: You have 20 -- I mean 19 delegates for the 1500 per members for the members. You have five delegates for the charter. So that's 24.

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY MIKESELL: I knew you were lying to me. Okay. So I need 20.

DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: Right. You filled four so you need 20.

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY MIKESELL: Diane, do I start at District 1?

DEPARTMENT PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: Yes, but I'm asking how much is our membership at this point.

DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: 21,000 something or other.

DEPARTMENT PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: Okay.

Divide that by 1500 .
PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: That's 13.

DEPARTMENT PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: Plus five is 18, but I think -- no, it's not 24 . It's based on 1500 members for each delegate or major fraction thereof. So we probably round up. All right. So you had how many? PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: It will be 14 rounded up.

DEPARTMENT PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: 14 and we have five for charter is 19. So it's what I told you. PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: You were right, Terry.

District 14 Gloria Sinopoli and Debbie Hurado.

District 15 Dee Ann Graham, delegate, Zana Chaney, alternate. District 16 Linda Fercho, delegate, Tina Moore, alternate. I didn't hear from 17. I heard from District 18 late, Maureen O'Brien-Sacco and Patricia Martinez. Oh, just do the delegates. Okay. Momma has told me I'm just going to supposed the delegates.

You know, Glenda, if you don't have a piece of paper, I'm not going to talk to you so you get a form and then I'll talk to you. Okay? Well, she didn't -- they

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didn't send any paperwork in with the delegate and the
alternate, certify it. Yes. And I'll come back to you
because I'm going to be up here for 25 minutes.
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Okay. District 17 I didn't hear from. District 18 Maureen O'Brien-Sacco. District 19 Jean Cooley. I didn't hear from 20. I didn't hear from 21. District 22 Susie Tozier. District 23 Anita Biggs. District 24 Deloris Artis. District 25 Donna Scott. District 26 Linda Workman. District 27 Lu Ann Capazzi. District 28 Robin Falkenberg. District 29 no delegate. Pat Alvarez. And, Pat, you are the alternate?

HOSPITAL REP ALVAREZ: Yes.

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY MIKESELL: Okay. And the delegates that are going in their own --

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: What about 30?

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY MIKESELL: I did not hear from 30. So I have Loretta Marsh, Joan Cannon, Melanie Taylor, Diane DeLashmit. So I need 15. Ms. Paper Lady, how many do I have?

DEPARTMENT PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: Well, I was trying to write as fast as you were saying them.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Yeah, you were going really fast.

15. Anita, I'm going to have to put a sock in your mouth.

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY MIKESELL: Thank you, ladies, for your patience. And hopefully tomorrow I will have a clean list. Don't hold your breath.

Thank you. This has been a pleasure, Loretta. Meow.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yes, she has. And I lost my place. Okay. So now we can continue with the Department Chairmen reports. Do you -- is the Musician back there? I was wondering if we could have kind of a peppy-pippy song to sing.
(Singing.)

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DISTINGUISHED GUEST CHAIRMAN WORKMAN: Madam

President?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yes.

DISTINGUISHED GUEST CHAIRMAN WORKMAN: Linda

Workman.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yes.

DISTINGUISHED GUEST CHAIRMAN WORKMAN: On a note, I want to thank all of you for your donations to the Legacy Scholarship. \$910.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. Well, we will continue with our Department reports here if $I$ can figure out where we are. Okay. Is the Americanism Chairman ready to report? And after the Americanism Chairman, we'll call on Education.

## AMERICANISM CONVENTION REPORT

DEPARTMENT AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: Okay. Good afternoon, ladies. The Americanism Convention Committee met on Americanism on Thursday, June 21st, 2018 at the Crowne Plaza Hotel in Sacramento, California. The statistical report for Americanism appears in the Book of Reports on page 13. With the consent of the delegates. Kathy Smith was appointed secretary, Donna Scott offered
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prayer, and Rachel Carnelison-Baltad was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 18 delegates answered roll call. There were four visitors present.

100 percent reporting certificates were given to districts 6, 11, 12, 13, 18, and 26. Citations were awarded to units and districts. Americanism essay certificates and checks for second and third place awards were announced and presented to district chairmen. First place awards will be announced on the convention floor.

The code was read and the following changes were proposed. The first code change is on page 10 in the graph for Group IV. It currently reads: "Group IV. Grades 10, 11, and 12. Prizes. First \$2500 Educational Grant. Second \$1500 Educational Grant. Third \$1,000 Educational Grant."

The proposed change is: "Group IV. Grades 10, 11, and 12. Prizes. First $\$ 500$ and $\$ 2,000$ Educational Grant. Second \$250 and 1250 Educational Grant. Third one \$100 and \$900 Educational Grant."

By recommendation of the committee I move the acceptance of this change.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. It has been moved that the code that currently reads -- I'm going to read the changes and that's in the prizes being granted. Currently reads first prize is $\$ 2,500$ educational grant.

Second prize $\$ 1,500$ Educational Grant. Third prize $\$ 1,000$ Educational Grant. The code changes would be -- would be changed to first prize $\$ 500$ with a $\$ 2,000$ Educational Grant. Second prize would be $\$ 250$ and a 1250 Educational Grant. Third prize to be \$100 and a \$900 educational grant.

Is there any discussion? If you have questions. DEPARTMENT AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: This was just so it would be done easily to know that it would be a $\$ 500$ check and the rest would be done in the grant. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yeah, they're just breaking it up to \$500 at the time and they're just receiving a $\$ 2,000$ grant. I mean, that's what we do anyway.

DEPARTMENT AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: Yeah, it actually is done this way now. The only difference is it didn't say that. It just said $\$ 2500$ grant, but actually $\$ 500$ of that $\$ 2500$ is given to them in check. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yeah, so we're really not changing anything. We're just clarifying it. DEPARTMENT AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: Clarifying it, correct. It's not changing any money amounts. It's just clarifying the way that it's done. PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Madam Chairman, maybe we need to clarify this a little bit. On
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the proposed change, instead of it just saying first 500 and then 2,000 Educational Grant, maybe we should have first 500 cash and then a $\$ 2,000$ Educational Grant for all of them.

DEPARTMENT AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: And we did talk about -- sorry. We did talk about that, but it was that we're not giving them cash so we didn't want to put a cash in there because it's a check.

NATIONAL PUBLIC RELATIONS CHAIRMAN TAYLOR: Maybe say a check.

DEPARTMENT AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: Just say a check.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Or we can put -- Madam Chairman, we can say either a $\$ 500$ check and then $\$ 2,000$ for a total of 2500 for first prize.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Would you like to -DEPARTMENT AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: So you want me to amend it?

DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: Why are we
changing it?
DEPARTMENT AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: It was being changed just as clarification for the chairman. Because they thought it was confusing to say that we're giving them $\$ 2500$ and we're really not doing all of that in a grant, that 500 of it is in a check.

DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: Well, it's the same amount of money so why change it at all?

DEPARTMENT AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: They felt that it was confusing to the Americanism chairmen in the units to explain it to the schools, that they can hand them a piece of paper that showed that it was this much money in a monetary amount and then the rest in an Educational Grant, it would be easier to explain.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: And since we're not drastically altering it or we're not altering but just kind of rewording, do you want to go ahead and make it a \$500 check with a -- just add the check in there? I mean I think you need to make your motion to change it to first $\$ 500$ check and then $\$ 2,000$ Educational Grant.

DEPARTMENT AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: Okay. So I will amend my motion to say that the new way it will read is: The first prize will be a $\$ 500$ check and $\$ 2,000$ in an Educational Grant. Second prize will be $\$ 250$ in a check and $\$ 1250$ in an Educational Grant, and then third prize will be $\$ 100$ in a check and $\$ 900$ in an educational grant.

DISTRICT 22 DELEGATE CORNISH: Madam President, Lois Cornish. The first time in 20 years. I'm from District 22. And $I$ was in the Americanism meeting and $I$ had to leave, but why do we not just say a $\$ 500$ advance
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and then the grant. And the advance would be in the form of a check.

DEPARTMENT AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: Well, one thing, the check goes to them and the grant goes to the school, so we want it to be correct.

DISTRICT 22 DELEGATE CORNISH: I understand that the grant would go to the child.

DEPARTMENT AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: But it's not really an advance. It's a first prize. They get that even if later they don't collect on the rest of the grant.

DISTRICT 22 DELEGATE CORNISH: Isn't the whole thing a prize?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yeah, but sometimes they don't come back and collect the rest of it because they change their mind and don't go to school, so --

DISTRICT 22 DELEGATE CORNISH: I just thought the advance would specify each one.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. Thank you.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT TOZIER: Susie Tozier, District 22, Unit 6. Instead of saying check and cash, say monetary. Monetary is better. It can be check or cash. Instead of saying a check or cash, a monetary award plus a grant for your schooling.

DEPARTMENT MUSICIAN SCOTT: Madam President,

Donna Scott, District 25. Glenda, why don't you go to the next page and see how it actually verbally breaks out that and read that verbiage and see how they say it. That next page it does break it out as $\$ 500$ upfront when they win or something and then it 2,000 in a grant and it breaks it out for each category.

DEPARTMENT AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: The next page does say -- or one of the proposed changes will be that it will say that this is how it's distributed, and that is continued on the next page.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: It does say on the next page how it is distributed?

DEPARTMENT AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: Yes.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: So there's no need for a code change. Do you want to persist on it or you just want to withdraw your --

DEPARTMENT AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: Do I need to come back to do that? Because they set up a recommendation for it.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yes, go back. DEPARTMENT AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: Okay. We will take that back to the committee. So we will meet shortly after -- well, when we break we'll meet.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. You can go ahead and finish your report and then we'll pick this up
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when you --
DEPARTMENT AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: So
leave that for the next proposed change and just go onto the motion?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yeah, just go on with the report.

DEPARTMENT AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: Madam

President Loretta, your theme Super Heros brought many extraordinary opportunities for Americanism across our great state. The Americanism Captain USAs have made California proud and have inspired us with their many reported activities assisting veterans and our military and their families. These superheros have been hard at work reminding members of the community of proper flag etiquette and demonstrations on the proper way to dispose of the American flag.

The American Legion Auxiliary Junior Conference participated in an inspiring flag disposal ceremony led by Kim Vincent. Our ALA chairmen are doing a great job in grooming our future leaders. Members continue to pass out flag etiquette brochures, sharing personal feelings of patriotism and participating in legislation to ensure that we maintain the laws that protect our veterans. Chairmen reported the efforts made on Get Out to Vote. Many members led the campaign to get citizens registered to
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vote. They worked hard at the polls and walked precincts. Patriotic holidays are celebrated by sharing food, participating in parades and honoring veterans across the state. Members continue to watch the condition of flags and ensure that worn and tattered flags are replaced when needed. They continue to sponsor Stand Downs, hold job fairs -- sorry. Job fairs for our veterans and provide support for community and Children \& Youth.

The Americanism essay contest was a great success. It was enlightening to read all of the ideas that the students shared in their grade levels. It is a great exercise to help children think about American ideals, improve their writing skills, and follow instructions. The essays clearly show that the students have a great understanding of patriotism and the pride and benefits of being an American. Their insights are amazing. They really love helping veterans and honoring their family members that have served.

Members decorated military and veteran based facilities at holiday time. They sponsored bingo, made cards and spent time reading them with the veterans in the hospital. Units presented Blue Star Banners to local families. There is never a shortage of patriotic pride among ALA members. We love to show our spirit by
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supporting our red, white, and blue, our pins, and our patriotic gear. Members also take every opportunity to share the importance of our mission with their communities.

ALA members are proud to belong to the world's largest women's patriotic organization. Participation in the promotion of the American Legion Americanism program included the oratorical contest and supporting American Legion baseball. The total dollars reportedly spent by the Department of California members was $\$ 28,367$. Total hours volunteered were 18, 299.

I am honored to report the wonderful activities and accomplishments of our Captain USAs in fulfilling our mission of service to our veterans, active duty, service members, their families, and the children and youth in our communities. I witnessed the meaning of proud to be an American as we worked to promote Americanism this year. ALA members truly show pride and love for our country, our veterans, and our community.

May I proceed with my presentation awards?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Before you do that, Glenda, why don't you -- do you have a couple more proposed changes? We can go ahead and work on those and just save that one so that one is all you have to worry about.
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DEPARTMENT AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: Okay. The second change is on page 11 and it's number 5. Currently number 5 starts with A. The proposed change is to insert the following statement: "Number 5. The prizes for Group IV will be distributed as follows."

By recommendation of the committee I move for the acceptance of this change.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. She is proposing a change by inserting, if $I$ understand it right, "Number 5. The prizes for Group IV will be distributed as follows." You just want to insert that into the code?

DEPARTMENT AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: It's just inserting the one sentence. We just want to add that one sentence that says: "The prizes for Group IV will be distributed as follows."

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. That's answering it. Okay. There's a motion on the floor to insert: "The prizes for Group IV will be distributed as follows," just inserting the line. All those in -- is there any discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: All those in favor?

ALL PRESENT: Aye.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: All those opposed?
(No response.)
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DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Motion carried.

DEPARTMENT AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: Thank
you. The third change is on page 13, number 10. It
currently reads: "The Department Chairman shall provide a list of essay winners' names to the Department

Secretary/Treasurer no later than June 1st when a monetary price is awarded. 2012."

The proposed change is: "The Department Chairman shall provide a list of essay winners' names to the Department Secretary and Treasurer no later than June 1st when a monetary price is awarded."

By recommendation of the committee I ask for acceptance.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: So she made a motion that it be changed from "Secretary/Treasurer" to "Department Secretary and Treasurer." Is there any discussion?
(No response.)

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: All those in favor of this code change, say aye.

ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Opposed?
(No response.)

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. Motion
carried.
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DEPARTMENT AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: Thank you.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Now you may go on. DEPARTMENT AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: Thank
you. I would like start by saying we did have one district supplemental that was forwarded to National, and that was from Lu Ann Capazzi.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: Okay•
For the Best Overall Unit Supplemental, it goes to Maureen O'Brien-Sacco, Unit 13 District 18.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: Best

Overall District Supplemental goes to Danielle White, District 27.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: The

Largest District Donation Per Capita to the Americanism Program goes to District 5.
(Applause.)
NATIONAL PUBLIC RELATIONS CHAIRMAN TAYLOR: Wow.
Shocked me.

DEPARTMENT AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: The

Largest Unit Donation Per Capita goes to Unit 69, District 22.
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(Applause.)
PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT TOZIER: What unit was
that?
DEPARTMENT AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: 69.
PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT TOZIER: We don't have a Unit 69.

DEPARTMENT AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: I'm sorry. I will check it and get it corrected.

Okay. For my essay contest winners. Group I, first place goes to -- I hope I'm pronouncing it right. Shiv Mahorda Dharma and that is District 14.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: Group
II first place winner goes to Helen Collins and that is Kelly Gimerod, District 5.

NATIONAL PUBLIC RELATIONS CHAIRMAN TAYLOR:
Woo-hoo.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: Group III first place winner goes to Abby Jabster and that is Pat Gracie from District 15, Unit 221.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: Group IV first place goes to Megan Salsman and that is Pat Gracie 221, District 15.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: Okay.
And Group IV -- I'm sorry. Group V, the first age group, Group A goes to Skylar Callahan and that is District 6.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: And I
know that might look strange, but he was the only one in that age group that submitted so that's why he's the only one. And Group $V$ in the second age group. First place goes to Dominic Lanes and that is Ellen McClurg's District 14.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: And we have the Veronica Spence award. First place goes to Alexa Flores of Unit 180, District 18.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: If you ladies are waiting for awards, you can come closer.

DEPARTMENT AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: Thank you. That's it, Madam President. I would like to say that it's my honor to have served you and the Department of California as Americanism Chairman. Thank you.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Thank you. Glenda, will you take your committee and get that one code change done?
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DEPARTMENT AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: Yeah.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: And we'll take care
of that before we leave today. The committee that was with Glenda in her committee meeting, the delegates, please meet outside with her.

And, Harriet, are you ready to straighten up your one?

PAST PRESIDENTS PARLEY CLENDENIN: No. My printer didn't work. Sorry.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. Education. And if she has sent you a note, you can come closer up here. And if chairmen need help distributing them, we have a Page back here that will help you to move things along.

EDUCATION CONVENTION REPORT

DEPARTMENT EDUCATION CHAIRMAN VINCENT: Good afternoon. The Convention Committee on Education met on June 21st, 2018 in the Terrace room number 2 of the Crowne Plaza Hotel in Sacramento, California. The statistical report of this chairman appears on page 16 of the Book of Reports. Delores Ryan was appointed secretary, Sharon Burton offered prayer, and Cecilia Cunningham was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 20 delegates
answered roll call. There was one visitor present.
The committee agreed upon the following report: The code was read and the following is a proposed code change. Number 15: "The scholarship applicant has only two years to initiate use of the funds awarded. If a scholarship is not claimed by the university/college on behalf of the applicant within that two-year period, the Department Office will inquire in writing as to why these funds have not been used. If use of funds is not initiated within that time frame, they are to be reverted back to the funds from which they were originated. If the circumstances of nonuse are of a medical nature, it is by the discretion of the Department President, Secretary/Treasurer, and the Chairman to extend the claim for an additional time period not to exceed 18 months back to where they were originated."

The proposed change: "The scholarship applicant has only two years to initiate use of the funds awarded. If a scholarship is not claimed by the university/college on behalf of the applicant within that two-year period, the Department Office will inquire in writing as to why these funds have not been used. If use of funds is not initiated within that time frame, they are to be reverted back to the funds from which they were originated. If the circumstances of nonuse are of a medical nature, it is by
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the discretion of the Department President, Secretary or Treasurer, and the chairman to extend the claim for an additional time period not to exceed 18 months back to where they were originated."

By the direction of the preconvention Education committee, I move for the acceptance of this code change.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. There is a motion on the floor to change code 15 in the scholarship department code or the Education: "The scholarship applicant has only two years to initiate use of the funds awarded. If a scholarship is not claimed by the university/college on behalf of the applicant within that two-year period, the Department Office will inquire in writing as to why these funds have not been used. If use of funds is not initiated within that time frame, they are to be reverted back to the funds from which they were originated. If the circumstances of nonuse are of $a$ medical nature, it is by the discretion of the Department President, Secretary or Treasurer and the chairman to extend the claim for an additional time period not to exceed 18 months back to where they were originated."

Is there any discussion?
DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: Madam Department
President, Ruby Kapsalis, District 28.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yes.
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DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: The Department Office doesn't have time to be writing letters to all these colleges and tracking them. We tell them they have two years to collect on the scholarship and I think we ought to leave it at. I think that one sentence -- it says right here the department -- it says: "The Department Office will inquire in writing as to why these funds have not been used." That needs to be deleted. Well, that needs to be deleted.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yeah, that's in the old one. So is there any further discussion? Okay. So the discussion -- if there is no further discussion and no amendments, the motion is to accept the new code change. All those that accept, say aye.

AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Opposed?
AUDIENCE MEMBERS: No.

DEPARTMENT EDUCATION CHAIRMAN VINCENT: I just wanted to say the only code change that that included was taking the slash out between secretary and treasurer and putting a comma. That was the only code change. It really had nothing to do with --

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Changing the code.

DEPARTMENT EDUCATION CHAIRMAN VINCENT: So we
need to -- that's a whole separate issue; right?
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DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: We are voting on
right now either to --
DEPARTMENT EDUCATION CHAIRMAN VINCENT: Just a comma. Just a comma.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: We're just changing the secretary/treasurer to secretary or treasurer. That was the point. So if -- at another time if we need to remove that, that would be another --

DEPARTMENT EDUCATION CHAIRMAN VINCENT: I can make a recommendation, yes.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: So we're voting on now whether to change the secretary/treasurer to secretary or treasurer. So again let's -- because we have both ways. Those that want that vote for that, say aye, please.

AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Voting against it say no.

AUDIENCE MEMBERS: No.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: And this -- if this is an issue, it can be brought up again as a separate issue. Okay?

DEPARTMENT EDUCATION CHAIRMAN VINCENT: Okay.
Next year.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: We're going to send
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you back in the hall.

DEPARTMENT EDUCATION CHAIRMAN VINCENT: I will
put it in for the recommendation of the possibility of changing that, that Ruby brought up.

A recommendation was made to look at the possibility of extending our scholarship applicants to include direct descendents of veterans.

100 percent citations were given to District 6, $7,9,11,12,18,22,27,28 . \quad$ Citations were given to units that gave students scholarships and those who participated in Give 10 to Education. Citations were awarded for second and third place unit and district supplementals. Closing prayer was given and the meeting was closed at 11:52 p.m. -- a.m. Sorry. It's been a long day. May I give my supplemental report and first place winners?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yes, please.

DEPARTMENT EDUCATION CHAIRMAN VINCENT: In
keeping with Madam President's theme Real Heroes Wear Dog Tags, Not Capes we completed the year with 23 district reports, nine with 100 percent reporting. The Department of California members promoted the Education program. Units continue to educate senior and junior Auxiliary members during meetings as well as the public on the education programs that our organization has to offer.
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Members are setting new goals and focusing on opportunities at all levels from kindergarten to senior high and through continuing education for students of all ages including our veterans, active duty military, and their families.

Monetary donations to the department Education program totaled $\$ 8,797$ from several units. Units also purchased Poppy Seals. Units participated in Give 10 to Education with the value of items totaling \$28,094. Auxiliary members organized school supply drives and donated items to assist teachers in the classroom including a special education teacher. Backpacks were filled with school supplies and delivered to children of active duty military who attended the child and youth program on board a Naval Air facility. Units assisted military children by promoting scholarship and backpacks were filled with school supplies and given to homeless and disadvantaged children. Units participated for the veterans community -- sorry. Community school program with members scheduling several veterans from World War II, Korea, Vietnam, and other eras to speak with youth at several churches and schools, to enhance respect for the sacrifices of our military heroes. Sorry. Veterans were treated to thank you cards and hugs.

Units participated in National Education Week.
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Bilingual speaking members participated in a dual language program to integrate native English and native Spanish speakers for academic instructions. Promotion of scholarships, certificates given to teachers and staff, treats delivered to staff lounges, books donated to schools. Members judged a school debate team that was sponsored by the Lion's Club and handouts, education pamphlets and coloring books were distributed. Pledge of Allegiance bookmarks were given to encourage and promote reading and participation. You're so sweet. Thank you. John M. Armitage Unit 684, District 27
implemented an antibullying program, Angels and Doves, to staff at schools showing that we value the lives of their students. Units participated in literacy programs. Members taught students how to read and assisted with adult education classes at high schools. The poetry out loud contest challenged students to interpret, memorize, and recite famous poetry. Promotion of scholarships included making contact with high schools, community colleges, California universities, Girls State citizens, and Explorer programs of the local fire and police departments. Scholarship pamphlets were left and units and districts use monthly letters to share about scholarship opportunities. Local scholarships and department scholarships were awarded for the Children of

Warriors National President Scholarship, Spirit of Youth Scholarship, Educational Assistance, and the Connie Settles Memorial Scholarship, totaling \$46,725.

Units made contact with veterans who wish to retain a higher education or vocational education. Silent auctions, used treasure sales, and opportunity drawings are a few of the many ideas members use to raise funds for scholarships. Sponsoring a flag retirement ceremony at an elementary school where several students participated proved to be very educational. Students played a vital role in the ceremony, whether speaking a part to share the meaning of the red and white stripes, the blue field and the stars carrying one of the 13 colonies that represent those fields -- those stripes. I'm sorry. The student who humbly played taps, or those students who assisted veterans while they retired old glory. The hope that all in attendance walked away with a sense of pride and knowledge for our history and our American flag. Education is experience.

Additional activities units have promoted and participated in included collecting Box Tops For Education, Read Across America, supporting the Red Ribbon Week, a drug prevent awareness program, partnering with the Girl Scouts of America and other community organizations, Star Spangled Kids Christmas party, and
essay contests in the classroom.
One school held a veterans in the community
school assembly for Veterans Day. Such wonderful
opportunities. As you see, there are endless
opportunities to promote the Education program and raise awareness of scholarship opportunities. This chairman is proud to report on the various opportunities that members have participated in, many great accomplishments for our veterans, active duty service members and their families.

Madam Department President Loretta, thank you for this appointment. I am honored to serve you and the Department of California. This concludes my report.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT EDUCATION CHAIRMAN VINCENT: Okay. If you can just hold your applause to the end, I'm just going to read our scholarship winners. I do not believe they are here and I have already sent them their congratulations letters as well as the units have the letters and certificates for their records.

The $\$ 500$ Children of Warriors National

President's Scholarship was awarded to Miranda Wilson of Cecil M. Anderson of Unit 589, District 28.
(Applause.)

DEPARTMENT EDUCATION CHAIRMAN VINCENT: The 500

Spirit of Youth Scholarship awardee was Katherine Toy of
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San Mateo Unit 82, District 26 . The $\$ 2,000$ Educational
Assistance General Scholarship was awarded to Katie Earlige from Monterey Cypress Unit 694, District 28. And the $\$ 2400$ Connie Settles Memorial Scholarship was awarded to Denise Jun of Idyllwild Unit 800, District 21.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT EDUCATION CHAIRMAN VINCENT: All the winners are posted in the Department Office -- the office here. Okay. For the Best Overall District Supplemental it went to District 16 Madeline Lee.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT EDUCATION CHAIRMAN VINCENT: And the Best Overall Unit Award goes to Danielle White, Inyo Unit 118, District 27.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Thank you. Do you have a list of those awards for us, Kim, for the records?

DEPARTMENT EDUCATION CHAIRMAN VINCENT: For like 15 of them?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: The awards -they're not on here, the report that you gave us.

DEPARTMENT EDUCATION CHAIRMAN VINCENT: Oh, yes. And I believe I emailed it into the department, but I can give you this or $I$ have another one in my binder. Thank you.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. At this time we have another guest. Past National SAL Commander Eugene Sacco is here to tell us about the 100th Anniversary Tournament of Roses. Sergeant-at-Arms and Marshal with the Distinguished Guest Chairman, would you please present him to the stage.
(Processional.)
PAST NATIONAL SAL COMMANDER SACCO: Thank you, Madam President. On behalf of Pasadena Post 13 and the National Organization of the American Legion and Nancy and Loretta, I appreciate the time you're giving me to talk about the upcoming festivities to kick off the centennial year of the American Legion and the American Legion Family.

A couple years ago $I$ approached members of the National Organization of the American Legion about the idea of kicking off the American Legion and the Legion Family Centennial year by having a float in the 130th Annual Tournament of Roses Parade in Pasadena.
(Applause.)

PAST NATIONAL SAL COMMANDER SACCO: The
leadership of the National Organization was very enthused about the idea and they -- through their own internal workers they found the money to actually submit an application to have a float in the parade. And we
submitted that application and I am here to tell you today that just last week the Tournament of Roses officially accepted the application.
(Applause.)

PAST NATIONAL SAL COMMANDER SACCO: Nancy

Brown-Park and I kind of felt that we were going to get accepted, so we kind of just started to work on getting things together to have something to present to all of you here in the Department for this convention and give you hopefully some enticement to come down to Pasadena, California and what we're calling Tournament of Roses Week. Tournament of Roses Week for us -- oh, okay. Thank you.

Tournament of Roses Week for us will basically start December the 26 th and conclude with the Rose Bowl game at the Rose Bowl on January the 1st. At this time we still are in the very preliminary stages of putting together an actual package of events and things to do for anyone throughout the entire United States and the American Legion Family who come out Pasadena and throughout all California.

But right $I$ can tell you one of the things we're going to do is we're going to have quite a few events in the Pasadena area that are American Legion Family oriented. One of the things we're planning on is one full
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day where the Girls and Boys Staters and alumni from past classes can go to the float builders facility and actually help decorate the float.

On another day we're inviting all of the American Legion Family, regardless of where they're coming from, to also participate in decorating the float and then after participate in the decorating the float, come to Pasadena Post 13 for what we're going to call a family day.

Another thing that's in the planning stages is December the 30th, we're going to have a black tie event in celebration of the 100th Anniversary kickoff at the Pasadena post as well. Again all these things are still in the planning stages. We are also asking and have met with different representatives of the Legion family and the different districts within southern California if their post and districts would like to host some type of event during Tournament of Roses Week, and that will be coming together as we move forward in the next couple of months in putting all that together.

One thing that $I$ can tell you right now is that the National Commander of the American Legion, the incoming National Commander of the American Legion, his wife, his aid, his aid's wife, I believe the National President of the -- the incoming National President of the American Legion Auxiliary and also the incoming National
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Commander of the Sons of the American Legion will be out for all or part of Tournament of Roses Week. With that said, those individuals will actually be riding on the float.
(Applause.)
PAST NATIONAL SAL COMMANDER SACCO: We are -- the
American Legion is also looking towards -- looking and trying to organize approximately another seven individuals that are going to ride on the float. Right now a lot of different ideas are being considered back at National, but one of the things that they're looking to do is identify and invite a Metal of Honor recipient from each era, from World War II up to present which I think will be six individuals -- yes, six individuals to ride on the float and also a celebrity that has a long-standing history of supporting veterans and their families or a -- a sports individual such as some -- such as a Major League -- a retired Major League Baseball player that also played Legion Ball possibly who was on a World Series championship team in the past to also ride on the float.

Another idea, which I thought was an extremely good idea from the standpoint of having a woman veteran ride on the float.
(Applause.)
PAST NATIONAL SAL COMMANDER SACCO: And to
possibly consider -- and I apologize since I don't know her name; I don't remember much today -- is that female veteran who safely landed the Southwest Airlines plane, that she -- you know, she's a veteran, possibly seeing if we can get her to ride on the float too. So again, all of that is very fluid right now and at the end of the day it's going to be the National Organization that makes that decision.

There are two local representatives that are kind of representing National as we put this whole program together. It's myself and Past National Commander of the Sons as well, Michael Seaton. We're kind of the local people coordinating everything together along with Nancy from the Auxiliary and whoever else would be interested. We're also looking at generating -- not generating, but creating some California Legion Family T-shirts with a picture of the float on the $T$-shirt as a fundraiser. There will be pins available, specially made pins of the Centennial float that will also be available for sale.

And we're also looking at getting a hotel within about a 15-mile radius in Pasadena to give us a block of rooms that we could offer to all of you or anybody else that is coming that would like to attend all or part of Tournament of Roses Week.

Now one of the things I would like to share with you is this. If in fact we get a block of rooms and all the rooms within that block are reserved, there will be enough people obviously there to where for the big events such as attending the parade, et cetera, we'll be able to bus you in and out. So it's not going to be something where you have to worry about your own transportation. Again, those are all things that are going to be planned.

If any of you also are interested in having an RV, obviously Crown Seating has two reserved actual spots where you can park your RV. They're private lots. They are expensive; however, in Pasadena starting about three or four days before the parade, you actually can park your RV on some of the public streets, stay there, live there for the three or four days and just walk on the parade route on that day.

We're also looking at getting a block of seats, grandstand seats along the parade route for anybody that is wanting to purchase grandstand seats. Sharp Seating has worked out a deal for us where they will give a 15 percent discount to any veteran or their family if they would actually like to purchase a seat. The seats cost anywhere, depending on location, from $\$ 55$ to $\$ 100$ per seat. Now you don't have to purchase a seat. Obviously almost a million people a year line the five and a half
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mile parade route on Colorado Boulevard. You can literally find a place if you get up early enough on January 1st, walk to an area on Colorado Boulevard and see the parade, bring your own seat, your own ladder, whatever you want to do.

One of the other things, fun things we're possibly thinking about doing, this hasn't been arranged yet, is actually have different sections along the parade route where the department, the districts, whatever, they kind of like block out a section for themselves, put 25 or 30 seats along -- as long as someone is there the night before, as long as someone is there for that entire period to watch your seats, you guys can rotate it, that whole area could be yours and there's no charge for that either. So there's a lot of different ways you can do this to make it affordable. Obviously you don't have to do it that way. You can purchase everything as well.

Couple just final things I want to make sure everyone is aware of. Tournament of Roses, Pasadena Tournament of Roses is not just a Rose Parade or Rose Bowl. Prior to the parade and the Rose Bowl game, there are a lot of different events the Tournament of Roses has that the public can go to.

Obviously we have Equestrian Fest, they have Band Fest, they have a lot of -- a few other events that you
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can do a few days prior to the parade. You can also go to different Rose Pavilions and watch other floats being built as well. So there's a lot to do.

The one thing $I$ want to encourage all of you to think about is that this is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for all of you. This isn't going to happen again not in our lifetime to be able to participate in something this grand, this memorable, to be part of -- of a Rose Parade that is going to be watched by millions of people not only in the United States, but around the world and be part of a grand celebration.

With that said, $I$ would also encourage all of you
to help Nancy in any way possible for this last thing I want to bring up to you. I have discussed with the float builder the possibility to if you want to joyously conclude the Centennial year at the help the American Legion Auxiliary specifically celebrate their 100th anniversary is to have a float in the 131st Rose Parade. Now with that said obviously that's going to have to be something that National is going to have to decide on, but the float builder because we're having one in this coming Rose parade, the float builder has agreed to hopefully offer a 25 to 30 percent discount on the overall cost of the float for the Auxiliary to have one in the following year.

So this could be -- and when I say encourage and help Nancy, obviously Nancy is going to be spearheading this at National trying to get the National organization in the Auxiliary to approve this and, you know, anything you guys can do or Nancy would like you to do to help her try to get this approved so we have two floats in the parade, let's do it. This is a great opportunity for the Legion Family of California to really do something as a family. You know, the Sons of the Legion and us, we don't do many family things in California like other departments do, but this is something that we can unite around. It's unique to California. There isn't a state in the union that does this. That's how lucky we are and it's very unique to California and I really hope the Auxiliary and the Legion and the Sons really take this opportunity to not only have a grand time the last week of the year, but take this opportunity to help us help you because you're not going to get a better way to advertise the American Legion Family and the Auxiliary and to try to generate new members and hopefully activate some of your existing members that haven't participated before.

So as we move forward, we will update the Auxiliary. We'll give you information that you can post on your website and any other publications you have. Same thing with the Legion, same thing with the Sons. While we
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have everything together, the packages done, you'll have a point of contact, you'll have an address and phone number and -- to send your money to if you want to purchase tickets to any of this stuff. And we'll make sure that it's extremely organized and well done so there will be no stresses on any of your end when you come down to southern California during Tournament of Roses Week.

I think I've covered it all, have I not, Nancy? Okay. So if there's any questions, I'm more than happy to answer it real quickly.

CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN COOLEY-DESMULES:

Yes. Mr. Sacco, who is the designer?

PAST NATIONAL SAL COMMANDER SACCO: Oh, the designer is Phoenix Decorating. They're the ones that are designing the float.

AUDIENCE MEMBERS: When will there be fliers to pass out?

PAST NATIONAL SAL COMMANDER SACCO: We're hoping that will be done either right before or right after National Convention.

AUDIENCE MEMBER: I could -- will I be able to volunteer to put flowers on the float?

PAST NATIONAL SAL COMMANDER SACCO: Yes, absolutely you will be able to volunteer to help decorate the float. There is one thing I do want to make sure
everyone is aware of. Due to insurance guidelines by the float builder, they really are discouraging really young kids help decorate the float. What they're looking for is children anywhere from like 11 years old and up.

Now that doesn't mean you can't take your fiveor six-year-old to go see, but they have to be right near you. They can see what's happening with the float, but from the standpoint of getting on scaffolding and ladders to put things on the float, that just can't happen due to insurance reasons /and I'm sure everyone understands that.

AUDIENCE MEMBER: I don't know if you're aware, but the Pacific Palisades, some people in the Pacific Palisades SALs are working on having not a float, but perhaps a band in the Rose Parade honoring the 100 -year of the Centennial of the end of the World War I which is when the American Legion was started. American Legion was started at the end of that war by World War I veterans. So we were trying to do something to kind of coincide with that.

We're actually also right now in the process of raising funds to build a statue to commemorate, a memorial to commemorate World War $I$ for the Los Angeles National Cemetery, and this is all going to be part of a whole thing. So maybe we can coordinate with you in some way. PAST NATIONAL SAL COMMANDER SACCO: Yep,
absolutely. And I'll talk to Greg and everybody from the Palisades there as well.

AUDIENCE MEMBER: Okay. Hank Elder is the one who's spearheading it as well. I don't know if you know him.

PAST NATIONAL SAL COMMANDER SACCO: Yes. Thank you.

AUDIENCE MEMBER: All right.
AUDIENCE MEMBER: And what is the cost for the float?

PAST NATIONAL SAL COMMANDER SACCO: The float is costing the American Legion $\$ 275,000$. Putting a 55-foot float in the Rose Parade is not cheap. But I'll be honest with you, the investment is well worth it from the standpoint of exposure and what the Legion family will get out of it overall.

Oh, I'm done. Nancy is kicking me off the -Madam President, I thank you and I hope to see many of you in Pasadena. Thank you so much.
(Applause.)
(Processional.)

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. I know the hour is late, but we're going to finish up a couple of loose ends here and then we'll call it a day. Glenda is ready to rephrase her code change on the Americanism.
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DEPARTMENT AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: Madam
President, on the recommendation of the committee, I rescind my motion to change the code.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: All right. Okay. She rescinded the motion.

PAST PRESIDENTS PARLEY CLENDENIN: No such luck.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. Now we have the $P P P$ wanted to finish up here.

PAST PRESIDENTS PARLEY CLENDENIN: Code 14 now
reads: "The corsages and Past Presidents Parley luncheon tickets for the $\$ 4,000$ scholarship winner and/or the Auxiliary Member of the Year and the Woman Veteran Honorees who attend the luncheon will be paid out of the Convention expenses. As a courtesy for the recognition a Past National President brings to California, her Past Presidents Parley luncheon ticket will be paid out of the Convention expenses."

If approved it will read: "The corsages and Past Presidents Parley luncheon tickets for the $\$ 4,000$ scholarship winner and/or the Auxiliary Member of the Year who attended the luncheon will be paid out of the Convention expenses. The Woman Veteran Honoree who attends the luncheon will also be paid out of the Convention expenses. As a courtesy for the recognition a
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Past National President brings to California, her Past Presidents Parley luncheon ticket will be paid out of the Convention expenses."

By the direction of the Past President Parley convention committee meeting, I move for the acceptance of this code change.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. The code now reads code 14: "The corsages and Past Presidents Parley luncheon tickets for the $\$ 4,000$ scholarship winner and/or the Auxiliary Member of the Year and the Woman Veteran Honorees who attend the luncheon will be paid out of the Convention expenses. The Woman Veteran Honoree who attends the luncheon will also be paid out of the Convention expenses. As a courtesy for the recognition a Past National President brings to California, her Past Presidents Parley luncheon ticket will be paid out of the Convention expenses."
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Any discussion?
(No response.)

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: All those in favor

PAST PRESIDENTS PARLEY CLENDENIN: Thank you.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Thank you.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. Supersonic waves.

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY MIKESELL: Okay. Box lunches for Saturday, see Ramona Tafoya District 6. She'll be out by the raffle. So if you want a box lunch tomorrow. They're excellent; I had one today, go see Ramona.

Okay. Linda Workman has National Convention Legion shirts. You can order from Linda and she will show you the shirts and then they're going to deliver them over here. So if you want a Legion Convention National shirt, see Linda Workman.

Okay. Melanie's Balloon Pilots, Sue's
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Lighthouses, Ronnie's Roses, Margie's Magic Chefs, and Barbara's Creators will meet for breakfast tomorrow in the hotel at 7:00 a.m.

Ladies, if you bought a charm bracelet, the bracelets are ready to be picked up at Ways \& Means table.

All District Presidents to meet in front of the stage at 7:00 a.m. Saturday to go over their district delegate count.

On that note, I have one special thing. The Department is poor. The Department Office has nine more of these. They're American Legion Auxiliary wall plates. The 70th Anniversary of the American Legion Auxiliary from 1919 to 1989. And I have nine of them. They're \$25 apiece. Very nice. Six people have already purchased them. But they're here, they're in the Department Office, and I beg of you please come by because Ruby said I couldn't sell them. She said nobody would buy them unless they felt sorry for me.
