DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN AVINA: Yes, ma'am. Yes, ma'am. I'm actually prepared.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Auxiliary Emergency

Fund, she's on her way. And then that will be followed by Estella with her reports. And then we will go to this lady over here, Wendy O'Brien.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: How soon they forget.

AEF CHAIRMAN PHILCOX: I have walked a long distance.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: And let's call upon the Pages to help you with your certificates to speed things along a little bit. And if you're called forward during the report, come up close enough to where you're right handy.

DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN AVINA: She's breaking our equipment. You just lost your job.

AUXILIARY EMERGENCY FUND CONVENTION REPORT

AEF CHAIRMAN PHILCOX: Good morning, ladies.
Madam President, I'm going to start with my convention
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committee report if that's all right.
The convention committee on Auxiliary Emergency Fund met on June 21st, 2018 in the Cypress Room. The statistical report of this Chairman begins on page 13 of the Book of Reports. Dolly Rios was appointed secretary, Sherry Morehouse offered prayer, and Danielle White was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 19 district delegates answered roll call. There were five visitors present.

The code was read and there was one change to code number 3. As it reads now: "All donations shall be made payable to the National Treasurer and sent to the Department for tracking purposes."

The change to read: "All donations shall be made payable to the National Treasurer with a copy to the Department Chairman for tracking and reporting purposes."

Justification: Department Chairman added so they get a copy of the donation transmittal for better reporting purposes. Delete forward to Department for forwarding to National.

By direction of this committee I move for adoption to number 3 of the department AEF code.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: There is a motion on -- this thing just likes attention. Hello? Hello? We'll see how long it lasts now.
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Okay. There's a motion on the floor for code change which currently reads: "All donations shall be made payable to the National Treasurer and sent to the Department for tracking purposes."

The proposed to change to read: "All donations shall be made payable to the National Treasurer with a copy to the Department Chairman for tracking and reporting purposes." Is there any discussion?

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY MIKESELL: I have a question. Okay. I have a question. It says all donations shall be made payable to the National Treasurer and sent to the Department Office and they changed it to read all donations shall be made payable to the National Treasurer. It should also say and sent to the National Treasurer with a copy to the chairman.

DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: Madam Department President, all donations are not made payable to the National Treasurer. It's paid either to the American Legion Auxiliary, National Headquarters, or to the foundation. They have two ways of making checks to them on the National form.

AEF CHAIRMAN PHILCOX: Okay. So the code is completely wrong then.

DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: Right.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. Is there
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any -- I'm sorry. I think this battery is out because it's blinking.

DEPARTMENT PAGE CHANEY: Yeah, I think they need to change them.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: We want a rebate. That's why we paid for these stupid things so they work.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. Is there any further discussion on this?

DISTRICT 18 DELEGATE TABACCHI: Madam President, Judie Tabacchi, Unit 755, District 18.

AUDIENCE MEMBER: I can't hear you

DISTRICT 18 DELEGATE TABACCHI: I don't have a mic, I'll do the best I can. There is a very simple solution to that. If you look on the transmittal it says mail directly to the National Organization.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Right.

DISTRICT 18 DELEGATE TABACCHI: That's off the transmittal and it would be -- I always ignore the instructions. I send it --

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: You're one of those, huh?

DISTRICT 18 DELEGATE TABACCHI: We get credit every year for what we send, but that is on the transmittal send directly to National.

AEF CHAIRMAN PHILCOX: We're not arguing that. We're not arguing that it's going to go directly to National. What's happening is they're supposed to -- I know it says on the slip directly to National, but they also need to know that they should send a copy to the Chairman.

DISTRICT 18 DELEGATE TABACCHI: If they would take that off and just send it -- I send all of my stuff --

AEF CHAIRMAN PHILCOX: To National.
DISTRICT 18 DELEGATE TABACCHI: No, I do not. I send it to Department.

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY MIKESELL: Judie, that's wrong. Then the Department has to send it to National. Send it to National with a copy to the Chairman.

DISTRICT 18 DELEGATE TABACCHI: Okay.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yes, do you have a copy of the -- do you have a copy of the transmittal, anybody, with them?

AEF CHAIRMAN PHILCOX: I don't, no.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. So as it stands -- as it stands -- oh-oh, somebody call the desk. She's coming. As it stands now there is a motion on the floor. We can withdraw it and have it rewritten, that's your choice, but the motion is there. As it reads you
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want to withdraw it?

AEF CHAIRMAN PHILCOX: Yeah, I'll withdraw it, but it does need to be addressed.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: All three mics are down. If I lose my voice. Okay. On the form that needs to be sent, it says make checks payable to American Legion Auxiliary National --

DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: Foundation.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Oh, Foundation. We want the AEF --

DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: AEF is --

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. Okay. The department code we're reading, the code now, not her report. The department code says: "All donations shall be made payable to the National Treasurer and sent to the Department Office for tracking donations and transmittal to National," is the way it's currently in the code.

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY MIKESELL: They need to withdraw their motion and go out.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. So we'll have you clarify that a little more. And you want -- you want it in there with a copy to the chairman.

AEF CHAIRMAN PHILCOX: Because the chairman is not getting accurate reporting.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Well, you can --
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DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: Just follow the form.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: You have it that donations shall be made payable to the National --

AEF CHAIRMAN PHILCOX: Treasurer.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: And I think that's where the issue is.

AEF CHAIRMAN PHILCOX: Oh, I see. I got it. I see it.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: That's where the issue is.

DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: Put ALA National.

AEF CHAIRMAN PHILCOX: Okay. And then with a copy to the department chairman.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yes.
DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: Remove the word
"treasurer."

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Got it. Okay. You may continue with your report and then come back.

AEF CHAIRMAN PHILCOX: So I've got to meet with my committee just to change this.

Okay. Madam President Loretta, I would like to thank you for the opportunity of serving as your AEF Chairman for the 2017-2018. This has been a learning experience and one $I$ proudly did in service to our
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members.

My year started off slow as I wasn't 100 percent certain of how to proceed, but eventually I got the hang of it and this Daredevil Duck was soaring to new heights. I received 15 year-end reports. I was not able to obtain reporting of all the monies donated as this Chairman was not sent copy of the documentation that was forwarded to National. Please be sure to send your chairman your donation amounts throughout the year so that we can have an accurate account of what the wonderful state of California donates.

Twenty-four units reported a line item in their budgets and seven units increased their budget. Ten units held fundraisers. I forwarded a district and unit supplemental to the National organization.

At the preconvention meeting the following certificates were handed out: 100 percent reporting certificates were given to five districts, two certificates were given to the unit and district for the most monies donated, second place certificates were handed out to the units and districts. A copy of my awards has been given to the Department President and posted in the department office.

Madam President Loretta, this concludes my
report. May I present my first place certificates?
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DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: You may.
AEF CHAIRMAN PHILCOX: Oh, gosh. First Place Supplemental goes to Sandra Richardson, Unit 496 District 19.
(Applause.)
AEF CHAIRMAN PHILCOX: First Place District Supplemental goes to Kat Kat Chairman, District 29.
(Applause.)
AEF CHAIRMAN PHILCOX: And at the end of the morning session will my committee please meet in the lobby. Thank you.

Thank you, Madam President, for this honor.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Actually, Ann, if you want you can go out and meet right now while we're waiting for microphones.

AEF CHAIRMAN PHILCOX: Oh, okay. Perfect. Thank you. All the ladies who met with me the other day, let's go.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: AEF committee delegates, follow Ann.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Hello.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. We're calling Wendy up next for her report when she catches her breath. PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Which one?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Legislative and Convention Chairman.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Oh, okay.
DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN AVINA: May I say something real quick? I'm sorry. Madam President, I have a memo and I think a lot of our members --

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yes, you may quickly.

DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN AVINA: I just got a memo and I -- for all of you, Kathy Harris Richardson, District 23 Jackie Robinson Unit 252 is in grave condition. Can we all say prayers for her because all you who know her. So prayers from all of you for Kathy.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Wendy is on. Wendy is going to give her Legislative and also her Convention Chairman report. And after Wendy I'll call for the Children \& Youth.

## LEGISLATIVE CONVENTION REPORT

LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: Wasn't this fun?

Okay. I gave out -- okay. I see they're coming.

The Legislative program of the American Legion Auxiliary is an important part of this organization to keep our members informed so they can advocate for
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veterans, military and their families which is our job.
I'm sad to say that not all units sent in a report, however the units that did report report wonderful things. Our members had been hard at work contacting local state and federal governmental officials. This year our focus in California's legislation was to increase the participation in the legislative process. I believe we've accomplished that. ALA members have written, emailed, and called senators and legislatures. I did this backwards, Madam President, I'm so sorry.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: You're forgiven.

LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: Okay. Thank you. They have received many replies to our communications along with thanks for being involved with issues concerning this country's veterans. We have found that being able to email the legislators has really helped those that are willing to make contact. Also receiving responses helped them to know that they're being heard.

To help our members become more aware of what the needs of veterans, military, and their families are, they have subscribed to the Legion Dispatch, signed up for the Legion Legislative Actions, handed out brochures such as Legislative Advocacy Guides and Legislative Process - A Citizen's Guide to Participation. That helps explain how a bill is written, introduced, and eventually becomes law.
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Members have attended city hall meetings and some have served as city councilmembers. They have hosted town hall meetings and meet the candidate nights. They have had proclamations signed regarding our programs as well as read American Legion Auxiliary E-news and E-bulletins.

Members also serve in various capacities on advocacy boards at the city, county, and federal levels and interact on several issues with elected officials to reserve issues and change policy. We are happy to see an increase of 75 percent in the number of members that attended the American Legion Legislative Days at the capitol in Sacramento. We also had some that were part of the American Legion's Stormin the Hill where they went in to Washington D.C.

Keeping lawmakers informed about issues that are important is our passion because our views help shape the way lawmakers serve our nation and our military personnel benefit from the positive results. Members are hosting town hall events as it pertains to their community, and this is very successful in increasing awareness of local issues. One city has set up a new commission to improve on what they offer to homeless veterans now and in the future. They have asked that the local Legion Commander and Auxiliary President be part of the board.

Units have hosted monthly breakfasts for the Hero
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Flight veterans from World War II, Korea, and Vietnam where elected officials visit with the veterans. One unit helped a small community of seniors receive mail-in ballots. They were having trouble standing in the lines at the voting booths. With the mail-in ballots this will help more citizens be able to vote on critical issues.

The Legislative Chairman's quote for this year was: "What we do does make a difference." This is evident in all the bills that have been signed this year. Some of our bills at the American Legion and Auxiliary members have helped support deal with issues concerning female veterans, the Forever GI Bill regarding schooling, veteran service officers, military retirement, the opiate crisis, homelessness, and of course veteran suicide.

All in all while reports are few, what is reported tells us our members are active in the legislative process. They will continue to actively pursue what is best. By working closely with the American Legion we can make change and improve laws that benefit the veterans of this country

Madam President, that concludes my report. Can I go back and do my committee report?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Please do.

LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: Thank you. Well, the committee was done and I think it was in the Cypress
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room. If you look in the Book of Reports on page 20 , that is the statistical report for this year's Legislative process. We had Cece Harvey from District 13 approved as secretary, Barbara Loducer offered prayer from District 4, and Debbie Hurado from District 14 was sergeant-at-arms. There were only 13 district delegates answering the roll call and we had one guest.

The following -- the committee agreed upon the following report. The department code was read and the following changes were done. On the code number 2 the code reads: "The Department Chairman shall attend the American Legion Auxiliary Washington D.C. conference sponsored by the National Organization. The Chairman's expenses cannot exceed the amount budgeted annually to help defray the costs of attending the American Legion Auxiliary Washington D.C. Conference."

The committee decided to change it to: "The Department Chairman may at their own expense attend the American Legion Auxiliary Washington D.C. Conference sponsored by the National Organization."

And the reason is because the National Organization is no longer helping us with the expenses for our NEC to go to Washington D.C.

PAST NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: Because they changed the location.

LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: Because they changed the location and a lot of our NECs cannot to go on their own. So instead of they shall attend, we thought we need to change it to may, may at their own expense. So they're still invited. So I move that we change the department code number 2 to read: "The Department Chairman may at their own expense attend the American Legion Auxiliary Washington D.C. Conference sponsored by the American Legion."

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. There is a motion on the floor to change the department code in legislative number 2 from: "The Department Chairman shall attend the American Legion Auxiliary Washington D.C. Conference sponsored by the National Organization. The chairman's expenses cannot exceed the amount budgeted annually to help defray the costs of attending the American Legion Auxiliary Washington D.C. Conference."

The new code would read: "The Department Chairman may at their own expense attend the American Legion Auxiliary Washington D.C. Conference sponsored by the National Organization." Is there any discussion?

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT TOZIER: Susie Tozier, District 22, Unit 6. There is a lot out -- what this conference is part of it was because it was combined with another National conference, the expenses weren't really
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high, but there is a budget line to cover whatever the department has there already. So I think you should just leave the -- you know, at their own expense not to exceed what -- you know, they only get reimbursed what's in the budget line. I think you should leave that in the proposed change, and anything above that is at their own expense. There is some money budgeted for it.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. Not having seen the budget yet for this year, we don't know.

LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: Madam President, the justification for this was because they are not -normally National pays for a portion of it and then the Department picks up the rest of it. The National has decided not to pick up any of it so it makes it very difficult on -- and it's in a different city, so it's -it becomes very difficult for the Chairman to support this.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT TOZIER: But at least they get some reimbursement.

DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: As budgeted.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT TOZIER: Yeah. They get some reimbursement for that portion because the Auxiliary just always pays for the portion that you are in Washington for, the legislative part of it, and that's it. LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: Right.

PAST NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: Madam

President?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Say as budgeted or if budgeted.

DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: As budgeted.

PAST NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: Madam

President, I think it's important to leave that -- Nancy Brown-Park, Past National President. I think it's important to leave that budgeted item because we don't know that that's not going to change and that we won't go back to the Washington conference. I think it's also important to remember that the legislative program, we are here to support the legislative program of the American Legion and we do that legislatively by going to the hill with the American Legion and I think that's important that we continue to do that. So I agree that we leave "as budgeted" in the code.

LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: Okay. So, Madam President, do I have to meet with my committee again?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: (Nods head.)

LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: Okay. Would you like to go to the next code change? It is a code change. I'm -- I think it's just -- I don't even think it needs to be changed, but it's something that we don't necessarily do. So code number 6 reads --

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Madam

President, Wendy, are you withdrawing?
PAST NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: No, she's going back.

LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: I'm going back to committee to discuss it. For right now I'm withdrawing my motion and I'll bring it back to the floor.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Thank you.
LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: Okay. Number 6
says: "Legislative Chairman on all levels shall alert the membership with important information and request of the American Legion as transmitted by the dispatch, the American Legion Legislative Action Alerts. Legislative Chairman shall consider these requests of a legislative matters a need for chairman to act immediately and shall urge the membership to respond with cards, letters, telegrams, and emails when requested."

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: I'm sorry, Madam President. I did a code change on this code my year to strike "telegrams," so it should have been changed.

LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: Okay. So at this point it is just a technical error so we don't have to make a motion; correct?

DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: Yes, make a motion.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Just move to have it corrected.

LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: Okay. I move to have "telegram" taken out of number 6 because $I$ don't believe we use that method any longer. Pony Express, you know, telegram.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. I don't think that needs much explanation. So all those in favor of correcting this, please say aye.

ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Opposed?
(No response.)

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Thank you.
LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: Okay. The
Legislative program did not have very many participates send in end-of-year reports. We did give out awards for those that did and the first place awards will be done soon I hope. Madam President, that concludes my report and may I give out my awards now?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yes, you may.

LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: Thank you.
PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Okay. Unit End of the Year Report goes to Inyo Unit 118, District 27 which was submitted also to National, Danielle White.
(Applause.)
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DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: You ladies can move forward up here closer. These finance ladies are quite friendly.

LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: And then the District End of the Year Report goes to District 22 Lois Cornish. See, you've got to be patient.
(Applause.)
LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: She thought we forgot her so $I$ couldn't say you won so I said just wait, just wait.

Madam President, this concludes my Legislative report, so thank you very much.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Do you need this to go back to committee?

LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: I don't know what I need. Okay. Yes. Yes, ma'am. Okay.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: I just can't understand why Wendy should be flustered this morning.

NEC CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: Would you like for me to do my National Executive Committee right now? Because that's the one I brought up.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. While you've got the mic, let's get 'er done.

NEC CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: Okay.

NATIONAL EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE CONVENTION REPORT

NEC CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: Okay. It has been an honor serving you as your National Executive Chairman this year. Lots of changes in the National staff and also the National headquarters. It was decided that we would purchase a new building for the ALA National Headquarters. Their lease was up and it was more cost-effective to pay for a building which we would then own.

The ALA National Headquarters has again received a clean audit. This A plus track record of management effectiveness is outstanding and members deserve to know how well the National Organization is running.

The new program DEC 101 is a tool that can help your units run efficiently and help each member understand her role in the ALA, also making decisions that are good for the organization.

Again questions are being asked about expanding the membership eligibility in the ALA. The membership of the American Legion Auxiliary of organizations is established by federal law and further restricted by regulatory provisions in the $I R S$ which has granted tax exempt status on the Legion Family based on the Legion's federal charter enacted by the United States Congress, so we cannot change our membership -- we can't open up the
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eligibility.
I was very unhappy that it had been decided to not support the NEC going to the Washington D.C.

Conference to Storm the Hill. Ladies are welcome to come at their own expense. This to me is one of the highlights of being an NEC person. They felt not enough -- National felt that not enough was going to make it cost-effective.

What a shame it was to see Commander Rohan speaking to Congress and not a lot of ALA members in the room. I was very disappointed that I couldn't afford to attend, but California did have some representatives there and we thank them very much for being there. I will be representing -- $I$ will be representing you again at the National Convention in Minnesota, I spelled that wrong, in August. Thank you again for allowing me to serve as your NEC. That concludes my report, Madam President.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Thank you. Okay. She's got her convention report. Put another hat on.

DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN AVINA: Does everybody have their lunch?

CONVENTION COMMITTEE CONVENTION REPORT

CONVENTION COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: Madam

President, my report -- okay. My trusty sidekick here.
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As most of you know, it's been quite a year for this Convention Commission -- or, excuse me, Committee. We started out being told that we are having convention and it would be held in Sacramento, but District 6 Legion wasn't even aware of it. When the Legion department finally locked down a place for them, only eight months ago, the only place available was the Crowne Plaza Hotel. And we had some issues with it. The price of the rooms were too high, the number of the committee rooms were too low, but my committee decided we could take care of it. We were able to get the Department hotel rooms down from over $\$ 200$ after taxes to 145 before taxes. However the higher the price of the rooms meant the higher price of the convention rooms. When the price of the hotel rooms went down, the price of the hotel rooms went up. Meeting rooms, excuse me. Up to $\$ 2,000$ a day with a $\$ 25,000$ food and beverage to cover. We brought this up at the DEC and members voted to cover the meeting room cost, and we thank them for that.

To fit the needs of our convention we would have to purchase pipe and drape to make enough rooms to hold the committee meetings. Speaking of the committee meetings, we would like to thank all of the Department Chairmen -- Department Chairmen and delegates for putting up with all the noise. We were hoping that the drapes
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would be a little thicker so that it would cut down on it and it didn't. So we thank you so much for not hurting us.
(Applause.)
CONVENTION COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: We sold cookbooks and candies and nuts and nuts and nuts. So many nuts, I sure hope I don't ever have to see another nut. Okay. We received donations of raffle items to help cover the costs. However, we were very fortunate, and I mean very fortunate, to receive a very large donation to help cut down on the room rates and cover some of the food and beverage costs. We can't thank Pacific Palisades and Amador Posts enough for all their help.
(Applause.)
CONVENTION COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: And believe me, ladies, they helped a lot. I know that the department officers and chairmen would pay the higher costs for the rooms at headquarters, but receiving a refund of $\$ 30$ a day for three nights on their room rate will surely help them. And that came from those posts.

They also were willing to cover the costs of an open bar and hors-d'oeuvres for the ALA candidates reception and again the next night for the Legionnaires candidate, along with a mariachi band. Did you like the mariachi band?

All in all the convention is almost in the history books. Thank you, God. We hope you had a great time in Sacramento and remember this convention for years to come.

Madam President Loretta, I thank you so much for this appointment. It has been quite an experience and one that Sacramento hasn't had in 30 years and I hope you don't mind me saying, I hope it will be another 30 years before we do it again.
(Applause.)
CONVENTION COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: If I may, I'd like to introduce or at least bring up front our committee. And they have a little something for you, Madam President. May we approach your station?
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Let's give them a big hand, ladies. They worked very hard.
(Applause.)
CONVENTION COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: This is just a small percent of the people who put this on. It takes an army to put on a convention. This is just a few of the people, but we thank everyone from District 6, District 7 for assisting us.
(Applause.)
CONVENTION COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: These are
for you.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Thank you.

CONVENTION COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: Do you want to open them up now or wait? It's up to you. Open them up.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: I would say I would hang this outside my husband's room, but maybe I'll put it at the other end.
(Applause.)
CONVENTION COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: Again, Madam President, we thank you so much for this appointment and we wish for you a continued successful convention.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Thank you. Thank you so much, ladies. We appreciate you.

CONVENTION COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN O'BRIEN: Buy raffle tickets.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. Dee Ann, Children \& Youth. Oh, are -- AEF want to clean that one up over here? Yeah. Ann? Okay. There you are. Yes. We'll clean this up and then --

AEF CHAIRMAN PHILCOX: Are we ready? Okay.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yes.

AEF CHAIRMAN PHILCOX: Okay. As code number 3 of
the AEF reads: "All donations shall be made payable to
the National Treasurer and sent to the Department for
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tracking purposes."
Change to read: "All donations shall be made payable to the National American Legion Auxiliary with a copy to the Department Chairman for tracking and reporting purposes."

Justification: Department Chairman added so that they can get a copy of the donation transmittal for reporting purposes. Delete "forward to Department for forwarding to National."

By direction of the committee $I$ move the adoption of number 3 to the Department AEF code.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Could you read it again please, Ann, because $I$ don't have my copy right here?

AEF CHAIRMAN PHILCOX: The whole thing or the change, Loretta?

DEPARTMENT PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: Just the change.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Just the change.

AEF CHAIRMAN PHILCOX: "All donations shall be made payable to the National American Legion Auxiliary with a copy to the Department Chairman for tracking and reporting purposes."

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. The new -the code as it reads: "All donations shall be made
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payable to the National Treasurer and sent to the
Department for tracking purposes." That's the way it was
read.
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    She's changing it to read -- or the committee
    changing it to read: "All donations shall be made payable
to the National American Legion Auxiliary with a copy to
the Department Chairman for tracking and reporting
purposes."
Is there any further discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: If not, all those in
favor of the code change, please say aye.
ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Opposed?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: The motion carries.
AEF CHAIRMAN PHILCOX: Thank you, Madam
President. I'll make the corrections and get them to you.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Thank you.
You have your ladies?
CHILDREN \& YOUTH CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Yes. They
were notified yesterday.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: If you got a note to
be up here for the Education report --
CHILDREN \& YOUTH CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Children \&
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Youth.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: I'm sorry. I'm not getting confused either. Children \& Youth report, join the finance ladies over here.

## CHILDREN \& YOUTH CONVENTION REPORT

CHILDREN \& YOUTH CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Good morning, Madam President. The convention committee on Children \& Youth met on June 21st, 2018 in room Terrace number 4 of the Crowne Plaza Hotel, Sacramento, California. The statistical report of this chairman appears on page 15 of the Book of Reports.

Elizabeth Doidge, District 28 , was appointed secretary, Grace Huston, District 11 , offered prayer, and Mindy Sinclair, District 18, was appointed

Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 22 district delegates answered roll call. There was one visitors present -- or visitor present. The committee agreed upon the following report and no changes were recommended.
(Applause.)
CHILDREN \& YOUTH CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: We discussed the application process for the TFA and also the Good Deed and the Hero awards. And I do have several suggestions for the chairman for next year regarding that. May I
continue with my supplemental?
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yes.

CHILDREN \& YOUTH CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Our Children \& Youth program demonstrates our passion and attention to our children. This year the Children \& Youth Welfare Fund supported four veterans and their families through difficult times. Our financial assistance made it possible to pay unexpected medical bills, loss of income due to losing a job, or changes in the family's status.

The districts hosted dinners and invited their local government officials to recognize children who demonstrated a good deed or being a youth hero. A unit recognized a Good Deed Award to James Smith. Three years ago at age seven James Smith wanted to celebrate his birthday by supporting Operation Christmas Child filling nine shoeboxes with gifts for children in war torn impoverished countries around the world. This year with the support of his community, generous monetary and gifts, he was able to achieve 157 shoeboxes. Next year his goal is 1,000 shoeboxes. When we recognize our children for their good and the unselfish acts, we secure our place in our community.

One unit hosted their first Halloween party for 60 children. The children played games and decorated cookies and earned them tickets for opportunity drawings
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offering gift baskets and gift cards. They also had costume awards. On each table was placed a tennis shoe bank. Those shoe donations were given to the Ronald McDonald Children Walk. Another unit earned a Halloween Car Show \& Shine. They opened up the back of the SUV loaded with assorted candies and distributed 100 bookmarks with the Pledge of Allegiance printed on them.

Many units reported hosting Christmas parties, inviting children from Head Start programs or from local military bases. They served meals and of course Santa made an appearance with gifts filled with toys. Some units reported having an abundance of leftover toys which they distributed to local missions or women's shelters. One unit reported filling a 30-gallon trash bag filled with aluminum pull tabs. I'd like to see how they carted that to the Ronald McDonald House. While other units reported hosting baby showers and needed baby items to military spouses and female veterans or filling backpacks with school supplies, stuffed animals, cameras and treats in case of -- excuse me. To ease the -- I've got to tell you, I fell a couple weeks ago and I broke my regular glasses, so I'm using an old script. So bear with me

While other used -- while other units reported hosting baby showers and baby needs to military spouses
and family veterans. Or filling backpacks with school supplies, stuffed animals, cameras, and treats to ease the loss and anxiety of being separated by their military parent. Several Josh Dogs were given to critically ill children. To continue to work with our community, nonprofit organizations such as Toys For Tots, Miracle Network, and Special Olympics.

In April we purple up, which gives us a great opportunity to explain why. Our Auxiliary includes juniors and younger SALS to participate and present the military children's table. So by continuing to recognize and demonstrate why we support our military children in our community, it confirms who we are and why we matter.

Madam President, may I present the first place awards?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yes, you may.

CHILDREN \& YOUTH CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: First Place

Monterey Cypress Unit 694, District 28 Sherryl Panek.
(Applause.)

CHILDREN \& YOUTH CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: District on -First Place 16th District Tami Wilkening, Chairman.
(Applause.)
CHILDREN \& YOUTH CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Thank you -thank you, Madam President, for this Chair. This Aqua Lady is going up for air right now.

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(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Thank you, Dee Ann. I'd like to call upon the Chaplain now to give her report and her Editor report at the same time.

DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN AVINA: Are we good? Okay.

DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN CONVENTION REPORT

DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN AVINA: Madam President, convention committee meeting report. The committee met and -- convention committee program on the Chaplain met June 21st in the room -- I don't have the room down because they were all here -- of the Crowne Plaza in Sacramento. The statistical report of this Chaplain will appear on your Book of Reports on 14 and 15.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Can you speak into the mic? Excuse me.

DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN AVINA: Okay. Well, okay. Bonnie Mayer, District 11 was appointed secretary, Unit 22. Sharon Moore, District 23, Unit 2 -- okay. I can't see what that next number is. Anyway. 2 what?

AUDIENCE MEMBERS: 252.

DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN AVINA: 252. That's not a 5, honest to God. There was no Sergeant-at-Arms appointed. A total of 20 district delegates answered the roll call
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and there were three visitors present.
The committee agreed upon the following report. Discussion: Go directly to the Department -- this is on their reporting of deceased membership. Date to final file the reports, for the department to file the reports. Members data forms can go directly to -- okay. I wasn't writing this, so -- computer and find all the information. Okay. If you get on the computer and go to Chaplains, you can find all that information and those things that had to be filled out.

The Chaplain reported all about the deceased.

Department code read. Department memorial service at 2:00 o'clock on $6 / 21$ and all were to wear white.

Madam President, that concludes that. Can I give my awards now? Because that was pretty much it as far as the report on this station. Can $I$ hand out those for you?

DISTRICT 18 CHAPLAIN SANZ-FRANCO: I have a question.

DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN AVINA: Yes.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Your name and
your --

DISTRICT 18 CHAPLAIN SANZ-FRANCO: Susan

Sanz-Franco, District 18 Chaplain. I would like to know where in the code it states that one only Unit Chaplain Book can be submitted at convention. Because when we do
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our reports at year-end, each unit is asked on their year-end report are you submitting a Chaplain Book. Nowhere is it in there that I could find that to say that the unit gets judged by the district and then you bring the winner here. I -- to me, I looked and looked and cannot find anything because it turns out that some Chaplain books from a district were disqualified because there were two unit Chaplain Books that were submitted, yet we cannot find anything that states that you cannot bring two unit Chaplain Books. Where in code is it? Right now I believe it's an assumption, unless somebody can show me or let us know where it states that.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. This is a question we will refer to our Parliamentarian.

DISTRICT 18 CHAPLAIN SANZ-FRANCO: It's just because of the statement on our year-end how many are you submitting. On the yearly summary, it's asking how many books are you submitting. It's not saying how many units. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: It says how many books or are you submitting a book?

DISTRICT 18 CHAPLAIN SANZ-FRANCO: No, it doesn't say a book.

DEPARTMENT PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: I haven't had a chance to read the code. I know it's real short, but I believe any unit can bring their book here and be
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judged as well as the district can bring their book. I believe it's reports. When the officers and chairmen are doing reports, they only submit one report for whatever the officer chairmanship is, one out of however many they have from the district as far as unit report. So if you have 20 units in your district, the best report goes to the Department Chairman. But books, I don't believe there's any limit. I will take the time to read the code to make sure that that's my understanding.

DISTRICT 18 CHAPLAIN SANZ-FRANCO: Because two -there was a district, which is 18 , who brought to unit Chaplain Books and we've been -- both books were disqualified after they did all that work and they brought them up here.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay.
DISTRICT 18 CHAPLAIN SANZ-FRANCO: So you're giving out awards -- not to say that they would get awards, but they should be included in the overall scheme of things because they put a lot of work into them.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: I believe -- yeah, usually it's your unit chaplain that prepares the book for her president.

DISTRICT 18 CHAPLAIN SANZ-FRANCO: Correct.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Now that would be the book that should go in for judging.

DISTRICT 18 CHAPLAIN SANZ-FRANCO: They each submitted books.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: If every member of that unit wanted to make their own books --

DISTRICT 18 CHAPLAIN SANZ-FRANCO: No, no, no. There's two different units submitted their -- brought their books from District 18 and they both have been disqualified because there's two unit books from the same district.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: I see.

DISTRICT 18 CHAPLAIN SANZ-FRANCO: It's the same -- District 18 submitted two Chaplain Books from their units and they've been disqualified because there's two books from other units.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. I don't know.
DEPARTMENT PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: I read the code. There's nothing in the code under Chaplain even about the prayer books.

DISTRICT 18 CHAPLAIN SANZ-FRANCO: So they should have been included in the judging and not disqualified.

DEPARTMENT PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: And are we certain that that's why they're disqualified? There generally are rules and it may have been that they're disqualified because they didn't follow the rules per se rather than that there were two from the same district.
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DISTRICT 18 CHAPLAIN SANZ-FRANCO: This is what they were -- what they came to tell me, the two chaplains that submitted these books, that they were told that they were disqualified because there was two from the same district.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: Linda Fercho, Past Department President. And I do admit I was one of the judges and we did follow suit on what is not happening a lot and that is the Chap- -- well, the chairman at the district level choosing one of the best, and it's not written anywhere where it is specifically only for written supplementals. The best unit, only one, goes to the department from each district. That doesn't say that it is exclusive only to written reports, and so the judges were not aware that it was all right to have more than one book.

My best -- my suggestion is -- are the books still back there? -- that we have a new set of judges under this new information and judge them again.

DISTRICT 18 CHAPLAIN SANZ-FRANCO: I think that would make sense.
(Applause.)
PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: And then our Chaplain can come back after lunch, she'll choose three judges now that this has come to light and if indeed --
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and as Leadership in my reporting, I'm going to highly stress that we change every code, a blanket change, to make sure that the District Chairmen know to only send and do send the best unit. They're not doing that. I know it in my own district. And the written reports and in the code probably for not just prayer book, but the music book, the photography book, all of those books, that rule does not apply.

DISTRICT 18 CHAPLAIN SANZ-FRANCO: I think -- you know, I think you might want to take a vote or something because there's other units who have great books too from other districts and you're now having their people vote on these books and it's not all the chaplains or -- I wouldn't want to be the one for -- I'm the Chaplain for the district and I wouldn't want that to fall on my shoulders to have to disqualify books from my district.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: That's what I'm saying is that the code should reflect that for next year recommendation that they put something in there that for those certain things, the prayer book, the -- more than one from a unit. Because the rule for written reports is only one per unit so the chairman at your district has to choose.

DISTRICT 18 CHAPLAIN SANZ-FRANCO: It's still only one per unit. These are two books of two different
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units for the same district.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: I know.
That's what I'm saying.
DISTRICT 18 CHAPLAIN SANZ-FRANCO: No. You're saying same unit.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT FERCHO: That's -- I'm agreeing with you. I am agreeing with you. I am agreeing with you that, yes, they should be allowed to have more than one of the prayer books, scrapbooks and that from a district no matter. I mean like in my district $I$ have 16 units, we could put 16 books back there. It would be fine. But that's not how the committee was under the impression of. They were following the same rules that we follow for written reports.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. My -- as Linda said, we could go ahead and take care of this one for today and next year make the Chaplain then make sure that the code and the rules are clear as to exactly what they want.

DISTRICT 18 CHAPLAIN SANZ-FRANCO: Right.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: And we thank you for bringing this to our attention. Thank you.

DEPARTMENT RULES CHAIRMAN MOORE: Madam

President, Sharon Moore, District 23 Unit 252. I was Chaplain last year. I think there's confusion regarding
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reports and books being submitted. Now if we want to include the rules for the books in the code, you just combine them together. But the instructions are clear in terms of the books. You can -- it -- like you said, all units -- any unit can submit a book, but there's one winner for the unit and one winner for the district, period.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. We'll make this -- thank you for your suggestions. We'll make sure it's clear.

DISTRICT 28 DELEGATE BAKER: Madam President, Susan Baker --

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yes.

DISTRICT 28 DELEGATE BAKER: -- District 28, Past Department Chaplain. Echoing what Sharon said, the books are a separate entity and I really feel that the rules for their entry into competition at the convention need to be placed into the code for maybe next year or upcoming year.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. Thank you. Your suggestions are noted. Joan has jotted them down over here. Thank you

DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN AVINA: What $I$ can do is we can get some judges -- I will get some judges and they can go back and vote again. But $I$ will put down in the back the code for the Chaplain code, and also the code for the
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books, you know, the rules for the books are a little bit different.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yes, the rules are separate from the code.

DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN AVINA: Well, you can have a unit that will bring ten books.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: No. One from each unit.

DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN AVINA: Yeah. Okay. Can I give awards for the ones --

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: No, but we will try to make it clear.

DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN AVINA: Okay. We'll make it clear, but $I$ will give the awards for the ones that have already been -- okay. All right. Panic. Don't panic. The judges already gave me the results for the ones that are back there right now. Wait a minute. Don't panic. Oh, my God. Everybody panics.

Anyway, let me go -- I'm going to get some judges again, some Past Department Presidents, they can go back and judge it and then later on this afternoon $I$ will have the results. Okay?

DISTRICT 18 CHAPLAIN SANZ-FRANCO: Okay. Am I understanding that there are no awards going out and the ones you have up there right now have to come back, have

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to go back into the pool and be judged with the other ones that were disqualified? They cannot be given awards now and then for these other people that were disqualified. No, that won't work. That's not fair.

DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN AVINA: We want to make everybody happy.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay.
DISTRICT 18 CHAPLAIN SANZ-FRANCO: I'm sorry and I'm out of order probably, but it's not about making us happy. It's following the rules that you have set and we need to follow those guidelines to be consistent. And these people put in their time and effort. And we've been talking about bringing people together here, not losing members. If you want them to participate in the years to come, all the units, you should let them submit their books here because this is what they're making these Chaplain Books for is for the convention, not for me to judge.

DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN AVINA: No, no, no.
DISTRICT 18 CHAPLAIN SANZ-FRANCO: But to bring them here to convention and to be judged. That's all -to discourage people from making books, that way you don't have to have people participating.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay.
DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN AVINA: No, it's fine.

DISTRICT 18 CHAPLAIN SANZ-FRANCO: You said it didn't matter a little while ago. That comment you made was not fair. And I'm not the only one that heard you make the comment, that's why I'm back at the mic. And we have to be careful of words we're using because they have impacts.

DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN AVINA: Okay. Thank you.
DISTRICT 18 CHAPLAIN SANZ-FRANCO: And they
discourage others from participating.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN AVINA: Thank you. Thank you.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. So where were you?

DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN AVINA: I will appoint a couple of -- three judges to go back and re-evaluate, and then later we can come back and have the results of that.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. So we will do
that. Do you have your Editor report?

DEPARTMENT EDITOR AVINA: Yes.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: I know there's probably not much there, but -- I didn't mean that. I mean you haven't been doing any editing.

DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN AVINA: Okay. We do have something up here for you. Where is Harriet? Did she
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leave the room?

PAST PRESIDENTS PARLEY CLENDENIN: I'm here.

DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN AVINA: Come here.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Ladies, is this real
short, like a minute?

PAST PRESIDENTS PARLEY CLENDENIN: We may have discussion.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. If you don't mind then we will wait because it is 10:00 o'clock and we need to -- and people need a potty break. Five minutes as fast as you can or you'll get locked out.
(Recess from 10:01 a.m. to 10:15 a.m.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: And can you please be seated? And when you are seated, sit in your respective districts. And remember only delegates and alternates that are replacing delegates should be with their district. Okay. Ladies, we need to get moving.

Will the Sergeant-at-Arms please check the hallway and make sure that everyone who needs to be in here is in here. Check the restrooms and see if the lines are still going. If you are not a delegate or an alternate replacing a delegate, please sit in the rear of the room or leave the hall.

Donna Smith, are the bathrooms cleared? Is
everybody -- okay. Okay. And the hallway is clear?
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Okay. And everybody's in their places.
The session will come to order. Hopefully everyone is seated in their respective districts. Please remember that only delegates and alternates taking their place as delegates will be allowed to be in the room during elections or you may sit in the back if you're quiet.

Will the Sergeant-at-Arms and Marshal please see that everyone who is the lobby knows that the doors are being closed for the election process and if they want to come in, to do so immediately, checking their badges and then close the doors. No one will be permitted to enter or leave except in a dire emergency until -- like you're dying or something -- until Chair states that the elections are concluded.

We will now have the report of the Elections Chairman Danielle White, followed by the reading of the Election Rules by Sharon Moore. After Sharon's report the District Presidents be prepared to come to the mic in numerical beginning with 1 so you don't confuse me.

ELECTIONS CONVENTION REPORT

DEPARTMENT ELECTIONS CHAIRMAN WHITE: The convention committee on Elections was held June 21st, 2018
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in room Cypress of the Crowne Plaza Hotel. The statistical report of this chairman will not appear in the book. [Inaudible] District 18, District 10 -- Unit -well, $I$ can't read. Unit 619 was appointed secretary. Lucy Ochar, District 16 Unit 211 offered pray, and Cece Harvey, District 13 Unit 614 was sergeant-at-arms. A total of 12 district delegates answered roll call. There were two visitor present.

In a sense of having an election held, we discuss ways to have efficient and accurate election. The 13 delegates were very responsive. I believe it was very productive. Thank you. Thank you, Madam President. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. Sharon.

READING OF ELECTION RULES

DEPARTMENT RULES CHAIRMAN MOORE: Election of Department Officers, Junior Member of Finance, National Candidate, Department Delegates and Alternates to the National Convention shall be held on Saturday morning, June 23rd, 2018. The doors of the convention hall shall be closed during the entire election procedure and no one shall leave or enter the hall until Chair states that election is concluded. The exception is this -- the exception to this shall be that in an emergency a member
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may leave, and if her absence affects the voting strength, the District President shall immediately notify the presiding officer.

When there is but one nominee for all Department Officers and but one nominee me for Junior Member of Finance, the nominee shall be elected viva voce. Article V, Section 3, Department Constitution.

Upon roll call the Department President shall report the number of units partially or wholly represented by duly elected delegates or alternates present in the delegation at the time of the roll call. This is to determine that there is a quorum of units present at the time of the election. When there is more than one -DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Sharon, I'm sorry. There's a correction.

DEPARTMENT PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: You said Department President. It should be District President. DEPARTMENT RULES CHAIRMAN MOORE: Oh, I'm sorry. The District President shall report the number of units. Is that what you're saying?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Thank you.
DEPARTMENT PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT:
Correction.
DEPARTMENT RULES CHAIRMAN MOORE: Okay. Make that correction. Do I need to read it again or just note
that correction?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yes.

DEPARTMENT RULES CHAIRMAN MOORE: The District

President shall report the number of units partially or wholly represented by duly elected delegates or alternates present in the delegation at the time of roll call. This is to determine that there is a quorum of units present at the time of the election.

When there is more than one nominee for the Department Officers, Junior Member of Finance, or endorsement for National Office, elections shall be by written ballot. The District President shall when they are instructed by the Chair take a roll call of their respective delegations to ascertain the total voting strength of their district for the election, reporting the same to Chair.

When there are three or more nominees for office Junior Member of Finance or endorsement of National Office, unless one nominee receives a majority vote on the first ballot, the nominee receiving the lowest number of votes shall be automatically dropped before proceeding with the next ballot.

When there is a candidate or candidates for an endorsement to a National Office, a majority vote shall be by ballot. Constitution Article V, Section 13.

Each District President and district member of the elections committee shall distribute and collect the votes casted by the district delegation and deliver them to the Department Chairman of the elections. Department Officers, Chairman, Committee Member, and Past Department Presidents shall vote with their respective district. Each delegate shall be entitled to one vote. The vote of an absent unit delegate not represented by an alternate shall be cast by the majority of the delegates from the unit. When two delegates represent three votes, the Chairman of the unit delegation shall cast the third vote.

A majority of all votes cast shall elect except that in the election of national delegates and alternates if plurality shall elect. These convention rules may be -- convention rules may be amended during the constitution by two-thirds vote. Convention by two-thirds vote.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Thank you. Will the District Presidents please proceed to the microphone quickly and quietly and line in numerical order beginning with number 1. If you're like me, the quickly is what gives you a little challenge.

Allison, you may represent District 1. The Secretary will call the roll of districts.

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY MIKESELL: Thank you.
District 2 Terry Mikesell reporting one. District 3 Lola Ramey. District 4 Jean Edson. DISTRICT 4 PRESIDENT EDSON: Jean Edson District 4. We have five. DEPARTMENT SECRETARY MIKESELL: District 5. Melanie Taylor, are you reporting? DEPARTMENT PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: She may still be working. She's not here.

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY MIKESELL: District 5, one. DEPARTMENT PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: She's not here. DEPARTMENT SECRETARY MIKESELL: Is Melanie in the room?

DISTRICT 18 PRESIDENT RAMOS: I have -- I have one. Unit 139 is --

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY MIKESELL: I need help with that microphone back there, Zana.

DISTRICT 18 PRESIDENT RAMOS: Unit 139 from

District 18 is not on the floor.

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY MIKESELL: Please come to

We've got one more sonic boom. SAL is hosting a kids party tonight. I just had a bulletin on that and I don't know what $I$ did with it. Tonight from 5:00 to 8:00 at the convention center. Game trucks, ice cream truck, and pizza. All juniors are welcome.

Let me see what $I$ did with it. Somebody gave me a note. At McClellen. Oh, Wendy gave me the note. It's going to be at youth party McClellen Conference Center
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5:00 to 8:00. Game trucks, shaved ice, and pizza. Liz, is there going to be transportation?

NATIONAL PUBLIC RELATIONS CHAIRMAN TAYLOR: No. DEPARTMENT SECRETARY MIKESELL: Liz, I can see you.

JUNIOR ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN DOIDGE: I don't know because the other members just left.

NATIONAL PUBLIC RELATIONS CHAIRMAN TAYLOR: I was told no by Jean Cooley's husband because he was waiting out here.

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY MIKESELL: Gil said no transportation, so --

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Madam

Secretary?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: That's taken care of. Thank you. Okay. We're going to break for lunch, but we have to be out of here early so try to be back here by 12:30. It's 11:34 now. We'll try to get -- I know it's difficult to get lunch in an hour here, but we'll try.
(Lunch recess taken: 11:34 a.m.)

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: All right. Ladies, I know some people are at lunch, but we can take this time to do our walk about or parade. Yeah, so -- so we'll get some music going and you can walk around and meet and greet and show off your super costumes that you have. If any of you saw me last night, I consider my costume duties accomplished. And maybe by that time some of the others will be back from their lunch.

Okay. Consider this session reconvened. We're going to have our walk around, our stroll, our parade. District 25 has it happening over here.

Porterville Unit 20 District 15 remained on probation. City of Paramount 134 District 19 remained on probation.

Clyde F. Hager Unit 465 District 19 removed from probation. Hollydale Unit 723 District 19 removed from probation. Idyllwild Unit 800 District 21 removed from probation. Temecula-Murrieta Unit 852 District 21 remained on probation. Joe Dominguez Unit 742 District 21 placed on probation. San Diego Unit 6 District 22 placed on probation. Dewitt C. Mitchell Unit 201 District 22 placed on probation. Colton Unit 155 District 25 removed from probation. Yucaipa Unit 426 District 25 removed from probation. Bloomington Unit 497 District 25 remained on probation. High Desert Unit 879 District 29 -- District 25 remained on probation. Greenfield Unit 635 District 28 remained on probation. Santa Ana Unit 131 District 29 removed from probation. Mayhew Vince White Cane Unit 266 -- is that -- I'm sorry I didn't put a district number. Is that 29? District 29 placed on probation. Corregidor of Imperial Valley Unit 597 District 30 remained on probation. Bombay Bay Unit 801 District 30 surrendered their charter.

Finance committee moved to accept the attached changes to department policy. One correction was made to the minutes for DEC January 2018 for essay titles for the changing 2018-'19 year and was to -- I had the wrong year in there. That was moved, seconded and carried. Terry Mikesell, Department Secretary.
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I move the acceptance of these DEC minutes. AUDIENCE MEMBER: Second.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: It's been moved and seconded to accept the minutes of the DEC meeting. We're looking something up here. Okay.

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY MIKESELL: Diane, it was on page 7.

DEPARTMENT PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: Number 6.

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY MIKESELL: Number 6. First Friday of June was the correction.

DEPARTMENT PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: Yeah, but it's not on the minutes.

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY MIKESELL: Yes, it is. It's attached to the minutes.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. But they -the change we're discussing up here is number 6 of the department policy code where it states: "Annual report form shall confirm with standard time frames. Unit report forms are to be sent to the District Chairman by the second Friday in April. District report forms are to be sent to the Department Chairman by May 1st. The original unit Poppy financial report along with the check shall be sent immediately to the Department Office, but not later than the fourth Friday in May as designated by the Poppy Chairman and a copy shall be sent to the Department

Chairman and District Chairman. Unit and district report deadlines will be determined annually by the Department Chairman with enough time to adhere to the National deadline."

The change it would currently read -- where it says "the original unit poppy financial report," would just say "a unit poppy financial report." But -- and -yeah, "along with the check shall be sent immediately to the department office," deleting, "but not later than the fourth Friday of May as designated by the Poppy Chairman," deleting that portion, "and a copy shall be sent to the Department Chairman and District Chairman." That would be fourth Friday of May. That was changed to the first Friday in June. That was the change; right?

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY MIKESELL: Yes.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: The change was:
"The unit financial report along with the check shall be immediately sent immediately to the Department Office not later than the first Friday of June as designated by the Poppy Chairman." That would be the change, from first Friday of May to the first Friday of June.

Oh, yes, and a copy -- this is not a change.
"And a copy shall be sent to the Department Chairman and District Chairman." So you want me to read it again so you have it clear in its entirety? "Annual report forms
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shall conform with standard time frames. Unit report forms are to be sent to the District Chairman by the second Friday in April. District report forms are to be sent to the department by May 1st. The unit poppy financial report along with the check shall be sent immediately to the Department Office not later than the first Friday of June as designated by the Poppy Chairman and a copy shall be sent to the Department Chairman and District Chairman."

That's the way it would read. Okay. That's in the minutes. Are there any other things -- the other thing is there's a couple places where "secretary/treasurer" is changed to "secretary and treasurer."

There's -- yes, on page 8: "Annual report forms shall be mailed to the units by March 1st." Currently it says to be sent by certified mail. That's being deleted, being sent by certified mail.

Okay. And number 9 of the department code for Finance is a change. "A fee of $\$ 30, "$ previously $\$ 25$, "will be charged to any unit, district, department officers and chairmen, past department presidents and individual members who wish to receive bimonthly mailings in paper form. All bimonthly mailings via mail will not be charged." No, via email.

Okay. We've got all that straight. That was part of the minutes. So if you accept the minutes, you accept these changes $I$ read with the exception of the $\$ 30$ fee which will come up later.

Okay? So is there any discussion or corrections or any discussion, any questions?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: All those in favor of accepting the minutes of the DEC meeting, please say aye.

ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Opposed no?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Thank you. Okay. Joan, you're ready for our Membership report?

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT CANNON: Yes.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Next is the Membership report. So if you received a note, join the ladies over here on the side. I will ask for the Poppy report next.

MEMBERSHIP CONVENTION REPORT

MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN CANNON: Unfortunately we don't get a rehearsal for this. All right. Good
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afternoon, Madam President. The convention committee on Membership met on June 21st, 2018 in the Sequoia room in the Crowne Plaza Convention Center in Sacramento, California. The statistical report of this Chairman is on page 20 of the Book of Reports. Toni Domondon, Unit 102, District 11 was appointed secretary. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: If you wish to
continue the amendment, you have that option, yes. Okay. An amendment has been proposed or moved that we add an amendment to our Standing Rules to make this a permanent ruling, to add it to the Standing Rules. Is there any further discussion on the amendment?
(No response.)

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: If not, all those in
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favor of this amendment, please say aye.
AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Opposed?
AUDIENCE MEMBERS: No.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. One more
time. All those in favor say aye.

AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: All those opposed?

AUDIENCE MEMBERS: No.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: I think the ayes
have it. So now we go back to the motion. Let me find it again. There is a motion on the floor waiving the Department's portion of the dues for female veterans as along with the amendment. Any other discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: All those in favor, please say aye.

AUDIENCE MEMBERS: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: All those opposed say no.

AUDIENCE MEMBERS: No.

MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN CANNON: Presentation of citations and awards for 100 percent reporting, second and third place supplemental were handed out. The meeting was adjourned at 10:40 a.m. Madam President, may I continue
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with my supplemental?
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yes.

MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN CANNON: Our units and
districts have worked hard this year to renew, rejoin, and recruit many members. I wish to express my gratitude to membership chairmen, membership area support team members, and all members who believe membership is everyone's responsibility.

Our units and districts used many methods to renew, rejoin and recruit new members. Traditional methods of telephone calls, letters, emails, newsletters and now Facebook are used to engage. MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN CANNON: All districts and units reported they actively work to renew, rejoin as well as find new members. The Department of California will continue to grow our membership by serving our veterans, military, and their families throughout our programs.

Madam President, this concludes my report. May I continue with my awards?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yes, you may.

MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN CANNON: And this report was forwarded to National for further judging.
(Applause.)
MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN CANNON: Okay. Let me get the awards out so I'll be ready. Everybody would have --what everything in our membership chairman -- membership chairman actually, we had everything filled, all the awards so that was fantastic. So that's exciting, but that means we have a lot of them.

The Ethel Flynn award, a citation to the unit with the greatest numerical gain over goal at the close of books, the Ethel Flynn is presented to Unit 421 Highland, District 25 Cyd Kinzer, Chairman.

(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT CANNON: And you're right here in my notes. Thank you, ladies, for your support to me, our members and our department. The area -- the Fifth Area has a special presentation they would like to make. Cyd Kinzer will kick off the presentation.

DISTRICT 25 1ST VICE PRESIDENT KINZER: Okay. As she said, my name is Cyd Kinzer. DEPARTMENT POPPY CHAIRMAN DURON: Good afternoon, Madam President. I'm going to -- I'm going to start with our committee meeting report. The convention Poppy committee met on Thursday, June 21 st in the Terrace number 2 room of the Crowne Plaza Hotel in Sacramento, California at 9:00 a.m. The statistical report of this chairman appears on page 22 of the Book of Reports. Jan McCormick, District 13, was appointed secretary. Lois Cornish, and I don't have the district, offered prayer, and Jean Paxton, District 25, was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 24 district delegates answered roll call with seven visitors.

The code was read and the following change was agreed upon by the committee. The current number 11 code reads: "The original unit poppy financial report, along with the checks, shall be sent immediately to the Department Office no later than June 1st. A copy shall be sent to the Department Chairman and District Chairman. Unit and district report deadlines will be determined
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annually by the Department Chairman with enough time to adhere to National's deadline."

Now before $I$ proceed, $I$ have a slight question. In our committee meeting we did not word the change exactly like the financial committee did. Do I read it as we presented it or with the same wording that the financial committee had?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: The way you did it in committee.

DEPARTMENT POPPY CHAIRMAN DURON: Okay. "The original unit Poppy financial report along with the check or checks shall be sent immediately to the Department Office by the first Friday in June. A copy shall be sent to the Department Chairman and District Chairman. Unit and district report deadlines will be determined annually by the Department Chairman with enough time to adhere to the National deadline."

I move the acceptance of this code change by direction of the committee.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: The code per report currently reads: "The original unit Poppy financial report along with the checks shall be sent immediately to the Department Office no later than June 1st. A copy shall be sent to the Department Chairman and District Chairman. Unit and district report deadlines will be
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determined annually by the Department Chairman with enough time to adhere to National's deadline."

There will -- it's changed to: "The original unit Poppy financial report along with the check or checks shall be sent immediately to the Department Office by the first Friday in June. A copy shall be sent to the Department Chairman and District Chairman. Unit and district report deadlines will be determined annually by the Department Chairman with enough time to adhere to the National deadline." It's pretty much saying the same thing, it's just a little different wording.

So it's been moved that we change the Poppy code to read according to the changes. Any discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: All those in favor please, say aye.

ALL PRESENT: Aye.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Opposed?
(No response.)

DEPARTMENT POPPY CHAIRMAN DURON: Thank you.

Second and third place winners for unit and district supplementals and the Poppy poster contest certificates were included in the unit packets. Information was presented to the committee by this Chairman regarding the Poppy poster contest. There was a lot of confusion as to
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the due date for the posters. The Department Poppy poster contest rules gives a date of June 18, while the National Program Action Plan gives a due date of June 1st to the division -- I lost my place. To the division chairman. It is recommended by the committee that the Poppy Chairman next year change the due date for the Poppy poster entry to coincide with the end-of-year reports. This will provide ample time for judging and forwarding to the division chairman.

This Poppy Chairman reported receiving less than one half of the unit Poppy financial reports. This would indicate a loss of 10 percent of the Poppy income to the Department of California unless you sent it to Department and then send it to me. District Chairman were encouraged to follow up with the units in their districts to ensure all Poppy financial reports are sent in. All winners will be posted in the Department Convention Office.

Madam President, may I proceed with my supplemental and first place awards?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yes, you may.

DEPARTMENT POPPY CHAIRMAN DURON: Wow, what a year it was and $I$ can say it was a year. Oftentimes I find myself -- I find I may be asked to do something it and agree to do it before considering or realizing all that is involved. This was definitely true with the Poppy
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program.
For instance, I know we order Poppy each year and they are made by disabled veterans. Poppy orders are sent in and they are received at a later date by the units. What $I$ did not know is that every year at the beginning of the year, the Poppy production managers commit their facility to make a certain number of poppies. The number is generally based on how many Poppy makers each facility has. Well, sometimes Poppy makers go back to work. When this happens, however happy we are for the veteran, it does slow down the production of poppies. This year two of our facilities lost half their makers to employment. I must --
(Applause.)

DEPARTMENT POPPY CHAIRMAN DURON: I must say though that the three facilities worked together as a team to fulfill -- to fill the Poppy orders. These ladies are extremely hard workers and we at the department are grateful to have them working for us. I have truly found them to be competent, committed, and dedicated to our veterans. They have my admiration and appreciation.

I would like to thank the districts and units who sent in their year-end reports and for the several supplementals received by this Chairman. The creativity displayed by our members and chairmen in distributing and
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using the Poppy is phenomenal. It was extremely rewarding to read about the many houses of the poppies and the crazy amount of monetary donations received by the units.

The Department of California completed the year with 19 districts and 119 units reporting with eight districts receiving 100 percent reporting certificates. District 5, 8, 11, 14, 15, 16, 24, and 25 received certificates for 100 percent reporting. Our Poppy Mice used their Poppy powers to generate new means of successfully educating and promoting poppies within their community.

Five districts had units participate in Poppy usage contests, Poppy poster contests, and Poppy window display contests. Several units entered Poppy displays for convention. The Poppy program was promoted by passing out the Poppy story, Poppy bookmark and poppies at Memorial Day and Veterans Day ceremonies honoring those who have sacrificed for our country.

Poppies and bookmarkers were also given out at city council meetings when requesting proclamations from the Mayor. Units published articles in local newspapers and post family newsletters explaining the meaning of the Poppy and the uses of monies earned from donations.

Units report sending poppies to their members, Legionnaires, and the Legion Riders which is proven to be
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a successful tool in increasing poppy revenue. They have given poppies at parades, car shows, social events, at patriotic events within their cities. Poppies have been used in wreaths, as centerpieces for Girls state luncheons, Honor Flight breakfasts, dinners, installations, and as table decorations. Legion Riders reportedly have poppies on their motorcycles during funeral escorts.

One unit reports bouquets were made and put on the grave sites of 48 Auxiliary members as well as placing 316 flags on veterans grave sites. Another unit reports making centerpieces using snack soup cups that were given to students to be used as gifts for their mothers on Mother's Day. 72 of the same arrangements were made and given to veterans in convalescent homes.

Units have put displays in their post homes whenever holding functions as well as in libraries and post offices. Included in the displays were the Poppy story and Flanders Field poem and Moina Michaels story. One unit used poppies in a local highway dedication.

New member installations included a Poppy and the Poppy story. Corsages were made using poppies for unit and district installations. Members placed poppies and the Poppy stories in breakrooms at their places of employment. Head wreaths were made and given to young
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girls.
Units visited schools offering the Poppy story and bookmarkers taking advantage of the opportunity to promote the Poppy poster contents. Units also report ordering 612 sheets of Poppy Seals.

Of the 260 units in California, 62 units increased their orders, 76 units decreased their orders, and 122 units ordered the same amount as last year. The total amount of poppies ordered to date for the state of California is 267,089 poppies. This is a decrease from last year by 1,394 poppies. The states of New Mexico, Texas, and Idaho combined ordered 80,000 poppies from the Department of California. This makes a grand total of 347,089 with an income of $\$ 34,709$ to our veterans. Granted a portion of the poppies were made last year, but they were carried over from then.

Throughout California members have been educating and promoting the Poppy program in the many creative ways listed above. Veterans and military families have been supportive with donations made to the VA\&R fund, Patient Remembrance Fund, and Department and District special projects. Supporting veterans, military families and their children has been and always will be a main objective of the members of the Department of California. Serving as the Department of California Poppy
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Chairman has been a rewarding experience as well as an educational one for me. I feel I have grown as an Auxiliary member and have gained more knowledge as a result of this experience.

Madam President Loretta, I would like to thank your for this appointment and the opportunity to serve you.

Now I have my list here. Before I give the awards for the Poppy posters, I would like to explain something to all of you. Due to the conflict in the dates I had sent out my bulletin requesting the poppy reports at an early date than they normal were accepted. I know that this caused an issue for you because you had your Poppy program already planned, and I do apologize for that. However, my intent was so that we could submit reports to National for judging, and because of that, these first place winners have all been sent to National and they will be judged there.

This certificate of appreciation is greatly presented to Daniella Korea, First Place Poppy Poster Class I, second and third grades.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT POPPY CHAIRMAN DURON: First Place

Poppy Poster Class III, grades 4 and 5, Miranda Wilson. Do you ladies know which are yours? I think I have a
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list. Which one is yours?
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT POPPY CHAIRMAN DURON: I know I have a
list somewhere. Some of the districts weren't listed or the units. Okay. We'll move right along. First Place Poppy Poster Class IV, grades 8 and 9, Serenity Emery. We'll give these out to the correct districts.

First Place Poppy Poster Class V, grades 10 to 12 goes to -- oh, wait. Miranda Wilson. Sorry. We got that. I made several of these. I don't know why.
(Applause.)

DEPARTMENT POPPY CHAIRMAN DURON: I tell you I've been running around making certificates all weekend. So let's see what we have here. Okay. We'll move on to First Place District Supplemental goes to Kathy Mullen, District 21.
(Applause.)

DEPARTMENT POPPY CHAIRMAN DURON: First Place

Unit Supplemental goes to Renee Raymond, District 21 Unit 79.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT POPPY CHAIRMAN DURON: I would like to thank the judges for the Poppy -- judging the Poppy display. They were Anita Biggs, Linda Fercho, Linda Workman. Who else? Harriet Clendenin and there was one
more. Oh, Susie Tozier. Okay. Thank these ladies. They judged the Poppy posters -- Poppy displays. I'm really glad I didn't have to do it because it was difficult.

First Place Poppy Display President's Theme goes to Jeannie Glasador, Unit 52 District 21.
(Applause.)

DEPARTMENT POPPY CHAIRMAN DURON: For Free Form the entries that were there did not meet the Poppy rules so there was no first, second, or third place winners. Sorry about that.

President's Choice For the Poppy Display, Unit 751 District 25 Michelle Banks.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT POPPY CHAIRMAN DURON: That's my district, so good job. Madam President, this concludes my report.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Thank you.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Next I'm calling up Leadership. Don't panic. She's promised me she'd be short. Followed by the Convention Commission Anita Biggs. Time permitting we'll go to VA\&R depending on how long they take. Good.

LEADERSHIP CONVENTION REPORT

LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN FERCHO: Good afternoon, everyone. The Leadership preconvention meeting was held on June 21st, 2018 in room Terrace number 1 of the Crowne Plaza Hotel. The statistical report of this chairman appears on page 19 of the Book of Reports. Debbie Fletcher, District 25 was appointed secretary. LuAnn Capazzi offered prayer, and Tracy Varnell-Fercho, District 16 was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 19 district delegates answered roll call and there were three visitors present.

The committee agreed upon the following report: Meeting was opened with a prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance. The code was read with no code changes.
(Applause.)
LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN FERCHO: Discussion was held on the responsibility of being a chairman. Main focus was on the end-of-year reporting and the importance if you are a District Chairman that you must send to department your first place unit supplemental in a timely fashion and attach just in case it wins, the National award cover sheet. It's very important that you do that. And even if you don't think the unit supplemental is going to win, but it's the best you have, send it in any way because you really don't know. It might and so we want to give
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everybody the opportunity to have the opportunity to report their information.

And also remember on written reports, and I do apologize again to District 18 very, very much, I truly do, I know how hard you worked on those prayer books and I truly do apologize for that, but we all make mistakes and the best thing to do is to just try to admit and then make it right and I hope we have. But be sure to only send one unit supplemental along with your district report. Awards were distributed, prizes were handed out.

Madam Secretary, may $I$ continue with my remarks and first place awards? Did I say that wrong?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: You asked Terry and she's not up here.

LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN FERCHO: Sorry. Madam
President Lady Bug, the Leadership of the Department -wait. I don't have my people up here. I sent notes out. Are they here? Oh, I want you on stage. Hurry. Okay.

PAST NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: It's your mother.

LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN FERCHO: Yes, child. Okay. Madam President Lady Bug, the Leadership of the Department of California is alive and well and in very good hands. I couldn't be prouder of everyone that received Leadership certification this year. We certified and recertified
over 149 leaders. We have several members that took the senior leadership course, but only one, Millie, and I can't pronounce your last name, Zylstra Unit 106, District 25, congratulations, you passed.
(Applause.)
LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN FERCHO: You know, this year we took our show on the road and your Leadership team held nine department workshops and we had a great time. We went up and down the coast and everything. And it's truly my pleasure and honor to introduce to you if you did not know them, your leadership this year, aka, the Three Stooges. Now I was Mo, Tracy was Curlie, and Jeri Adams was Larry. And if you had the opportunity to go to one of our workshops, you'll know why.

I want to thank -- I want to say thank you to all of those chairman that hosted the workshops. It's a big job and it's greatly appreciated and I put an appreciation certificate in each of the folders from the preconvention meeting. And I want to say thank you to all the District Chairman that reported, and congratulations to all those that submitted supplemental reports. Even if you did not win a first place, try again. Please don't get discouraged. You just did an amazing job.

Actually, in all of the supplementals, unit and district, were judged by a group of professionals in my
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office. I work for a financial advisor, and also in Tracy's facility where she has some teachers and professors in an assisted living. So I did not judge any of these, and I want to have that real clear right now.

And my first place awards. There's a gift for you. The box is a little beat up, but, you know, it's not what's always on the outside, everybody. It's what's inside that counts. And the First Place District Award goes to Tamara Duron. Thank you so much. You did a great job.
(Applause.)
LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN FERCHO: And they did an amazing job. And I think they're $\$ 10$ if they have any and I recommend highly that every district try to get one of those in their district. It was amazing.

And the First Place Unit Supplemental for Leadership and this has gone on to National is Tracy

Varnell-Fercho. That's why I couldn't judge them.
(Applause.)

LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN FERCHO: Madam President,
thank you so much again and this concludes my report.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Thank you, Linda. I
know I said we'd try to do the VA\&R, but I think it runs a little too long for what time we have, so I'm going to switch it -- that's my prerogative. I'm going to switch it to Public Relations next.

CONVENTION COMMISSION CORPORATION CONVENTION REPORT

CONVENTION COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BIGGS: Thank you, Madam President. Anita Biggs, Convention Commission report. As you know our chairman has resigned due to family illness and we lost a very capable leader in Bev Sparks.

The ALA Convention Commission has been operating most of this year in the dark. Oh, also I may acknowledge the other commission member which is Melanie Taylor. She's here with us up front. Yeah, you can give her a hand. She deserves a hand.
(Applause.)
NATIONAL PUBLIC RELATIONS CHAIRMAN TAYLOR: Yeah,
come on.

CONVENTION COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BIGGS: The ALA Convention Commission had been operating most of this year in the dark not going much about what was going on with the American Legion. Bev Sparks and I were appointed to the American Legion Convention Corporation representing two Auxiliary votes. However, it looked dismal because we could not make any of the meetings since they were all called with short notice. I suggested to the chairman that we have conference call meetings, which were enacted. Our future looks greater with this reestablishment of the American Legion Convention Corporation for the Department of California.

The American Legion Convention Corporation committee members along with the Convention City Chair and Vice Chair, the current and next year's Auxiliary Convention Chairman have been meeting weekly for the past several months. The corporation will present to the Legion that all future convention city requests must be made in the form of a resolution to the Department for consideration. The resolution must be in the form of a bid to these convention city standing committee for review and approval to move to the floor for a vote. We are accepting any valid city bids at this time. So if your city is interested, you know, make sure we get that
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information.

As you know or may not know, next year's 2019 convention will be held in Ontario. The chairman is Diane DeLashmit.
(Applause.)
CONVENTION COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN BIGGS: Don't show us that -- what was that face? The location for 2020 is possibly Bakersfield.
(Applause.)
CONVENTION COMMISSION CHAIRMAN BIGGS: However, that has not been confirmed, so there's some light there. 2021 has interest from Hollywood. That's very interesting, don't you think? However, the resolution will be presented at the 2019 convention. The convention corporation will meet at this convention on Wednesday, June 20th to discuss upcoming action and clarification. The corporation bylaws from 2013 were reviewed. These bylaws will be written and submitted to the California Secretary of State for approval.

The American Legion Convention City Standing Committee met Thursday, June 21st at the McClellen Convention Center and Vice Chair Karl Risinger reported that all cities requesting consideration for a convention must be placed in the form of a resolution to the department convention. So that has been moved forward.
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The Committee also resolves to change the policy of hosting conventions in a north-south alternating pattern and propose to have one city be the host for three consecutive years. They will be investigating to determine if this can be accomplished. So it's not a -it's not done yet. It is a goal to have conventions planned for a minimum of five years in advance.

The committee has planned the next meeting for July the 12th to assess the Sacramento convention, to learn from mistakes and successes. There will be more information to follow about the new structure of the convention corporation and as it relates to the Auxiliary Convention Commission.

Madam President, this concludes my report and thank you so much for appointing me to the Convention Commission. It's been a true learning experience.
(Applause.)

Good afternoon, Madam President. I'm going to start with my preconvention meeting report. The Public Relations preconvention meeting was called to order at 9:20 a.m. in the Terrace 4 room -- Terrace room 4 at the Crowne Plaza Hotel in Sacramento, California. Upon consent of the delegates the following were appointed: Gail McCafferty was secretary, Elise Spleiss, chaplain, Rosemary Weber, sergeant-at-arms. A prayer was given and the Pledge of Allegiance was recited. Roll call was taken showing 14 delegates and two guests present.

The code was read and approved with no changes. Citations for 100 percent reporting were handed out to District 9, 10, 12, 14, and 27. Awards were handed out to the second and third place winners. Several delegates present were new members and asked for clarification on
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the chain of command. We took time to provide information on the flow of information from Unit to District to Department and finally to National.

We had Nancy Heinisch, our Western Division

National Public Relations Chairman present which gave a clear picture of the different levels of our organization. The meeting was adjourned in prayer at 10:00 a.m.

Madam Department President, this concludes my committee report. May I continue with my supplemental report?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yes, you may.

PUBLIC RELATIONS CHAIRMAN SMITH: Thank you.
Where are my Foxes? I expect to hear from you. Come on, Foxes. Your theme of Real Heroes Wear Dog Tags has been fun and exciting. The Public Relations Foxes have heard the good news of our great organization and have told everyone all about it. Our members have enjoyed spreading goodwill and providing services to veterans, military families, youth, and the community throughout the 2017-2018 year.

Actually all members are Public Relation Foxes. When we show our pride for the ALA and share about our work for veterans, we are doing PR. Districts and units are focused on creating opportunities to build membership and create momentum and preparation of the upcoming
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centennial year. Training workshops are abundant in the department and they enhance Public Relations by providing information because information is power.

This Chairman is very impressed to see the great social media presence on E-news, Facebook, and Instagram throughout the department. The members that aren't so technology savvy continue to stay connected with local newspapers and radio, some even reported TV coverage of some of their activities.

In addition to social media calendars, the use of newspaper calendars for local events is a popular resource for advertising local meetings and events. We have 200 units with websites, 223 that subscribe to E-news, and 141 newspaper articles published from the districts reporting. PSA's were used to advertise Stand Downs, ALA teas to build membership, complete with fancy hats, 4th of July parades and picnics, Memorial Day celebrations, Poppy distribution and Veterans Day parades.

One unit had an anniversary party for the American Legion's first 99 years, complete with a cake decorated with the American flag. The local newspaper coverage showed our members decked out in red, white, and blue Americana apparel. There was also a chairman who provided anti-bullying programs to teachers in the local school district.

The ALA branding element is the biggest way we spread the news of our organization through our numerous pins and apparel. Utilizing Emblem Sales to get our favorite items representing significant elements of events and programs is a great way to represent and spread awareness. Items such as pins, patches, and hats are great ice breaker conversations that allow us to provide information to those we meet as we attend events or even in daily activities.

One unit chairman describes their best Public Relations as boots on the ground. Another chairman said we have to get out of our comfort zone and be creative so we can continue to grow. If you see Susie Morgan around the convention, you should ask for her autograph. She is a celebrity. She was quoted in the November 2017 ALA magazine saying: "My favorite memories are taking our veterans to the VA to apply for benefits that they never knew they were entitled to, some after 50 years of waiting, and seeing their smiles when they get their benefit letters. And taking some of them to get their percentages raised to 100 percent."

She didn't even know she was going $P R$ when she said it. This is what $P R$ is all about. It is simple but so very important. Show pried and spread goodwill. We are so proud of you, Susie Morgan. She's going to kill me
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for this.
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Thank you, Madam President Loretta, for this assignment. It has been an honor, a fun and fulfilling year serving as your Department Public Relations Chairman. May I continue with my first place awards?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yes, you may.

PUBLIC RELATIONS CHAIRMAN SMITH: And also for

Rosemary Todd is the best overall Public Relations program.
(Applause.)

And if the people that are going to retire the colors, if you can very, very quietly assemble in the back of the room.

## EDITOR CONVENTION REPORT

DEPARTMENT EDITOR AVINA: For the past two years this committee has looked into various options to continue or not being part of the California Legionnaire. We have looked into our own newspaper and we have looked into being once again a part of the Legionnaire.
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While the printing of the paper is minimal cost, the biggest expense would be the mailing. At an estimate of 25 percent of the membership requesting a hard copy of any paper, we have found this not to be feasible.

We suggested an option of like the ALA National
has an E-bulletin, we do as well. This free service will get information to the units quickly as we'll need a committee to be successful. We recommend a committee to include an editor, assistant editor, the web master, and the secretary. If members in the units or districts request a hard copy, we ask that the other members in the units or districts print them and hand them out.

With this option we request that the chairman send us current and pertinent information on a timely manner. As units and districts are encouraged to submit articles and pictures, we could have a page possibly labeled around the department to showcase events that you are welcome to submit. We suggest a bimonthly every other month that the E-bulletin would be available. We specially will encourage the committee that fall into these two months to submit. For example, in the May issue would be a ton of information regarding poppies. Are there any questions?
(No response.)

PAST PRESIDENTS PARLEY CLENDENIN: Is that a no?
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DEPARTMENT PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: She's
moving to accept this recommendation; right?
PAST NATIONAL PRESIDENT BROWN-PARK: Madam
President, Nancy Brown-Park, Past National President. So do $I$ understand that this is a recommendation, not an election?

DEPARTMENT EDITOR AVINA: Yes.

VETERANS AFFAIRS \& REHABILITATION CONVENTION REPORT

VA\&R CHAIRMAN MARTINEZ: Okay. Let me see if I can get this microphone set right. Okay. Madam President, the convention committee on Veterans Affairs \& Rehabilitation met on June 21st, 2018 in the Sycamore room of the Crowne Plaza Hotel, Sacramento, California. The statistical report of this chairman appears on page 24 of
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the Book of Reports.
Norma Billings, District 23, was appointed secretary, Becky Bullard, District 19, offered prayer, and there was no sergeant-at-arms. A total of 23 district delegates answered roll call. There were six visitors present.

Meeting opened according to the ritual. The code was read and the following changes were recommended: Code 10 currently reads: "The Department Secretary/Treasurer shall notify the Department Chairman on an annual basis the current cost of all pins available for VA\&R program. The cost shall include tax and handling expenses. The Department Chairman shall post on the Department website the updated forms for Hospital Certification and Veterans Service Pin Certification. Copies will be mailed to Hospital Representatives who do not have access to the website. Only Hospital Representatives are authorized to purchase hospital pins. New volunteers shall receive an identification patch with her pin. Patches are supplied free of charge by the Department. 2014."

Proposed change to read: "The Department Secretary shall notify the Department Chairman on an annual basis the current cost of all pins available for VA\&R program. The cost shall include tax and handling expenses. The Department Chairman shall post on the
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Department website the updated forms for Hospital Certification and Veterans Service Pin Certification. Copies will be mailed to Hospital Representatives who do not have access to the website. Only Hospital

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letter to the Department Secretary/Treasurer and Department VA\&R Chairman stating no other funds are received and it is not cost-effective for them to open a bank account. 2011."

Recommended change: "Representatives who don't receive any monies from any source other than department allowances will send a letter to the Department Secretary and Department VA\&R Chairman stating no other funds are received and it is not cost-effective for them to open a bank account."

Madam President, by direction of the committee I move the adoption of this change.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: There's a motion on the floor to change the code 8B. And here again it's simply to drop the Secretary/Treasurer and make it simply say Department Secretary. Is there any discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: All those in favor of this code change, please say aye.

ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Opposed?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Thank you. Motion carried. Thank you.

VA\&R CHAIRMAN MARTINEZ: Madam President, there
were some housekeeping changes. Would you like me to read them or just have them given to the Secretary for correction into the code?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay. Just read through them. They don't need a vote, but just read through them.

VA\&R CHAIRMAN MARTINEZ: Okay. Under Medical Center Gift Shops/Patient Remembrance, we need to put a space between "sent" and "will" on line 2.

In the Service to Veterans Code we need a space between "Department" and "Direction."

In the Awards section, replace the word "and" with a semicolon after "service" in line two.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Okay.
VA\&R CHAIRMAN MARTINEZ: Madam President, by direction of the kitty -- committee. By direction of the committee, I move the adoption of these code changes.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: We don't need to make a motion for these housekeeping.

VA\&R CHAIRMAN MARTINEZ: Good because this kitty is done.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: We don't want to have you say that again.

VA\&R CHAIRMAN MARTINEZ: Thank you very much. Okay. Where am I at? 100 percent reporting certificates
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were presented to District 6, 7, 11, 13, 18 and 29 . Certificates of appreciation and/or participation were presented to all districts reporting. Second and third place awards were given in committee. This concludes my committee report. May I continue with my supplemental and first place awards?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MARSH: Yes.

VA\&R CHAIRMAN MARTINEZ: Thank you. Madam President, as we recognize that Real Heroes Wear Dog Tags, Not Capes, it was amazing to see and hear what the units and districts accomplished this past year. The Ms. Fantastics of this department put our superhero strength into action for our veterans. We stretched our arms, budget, time, energy, resources, and donations to ensure that all of our veterans, activity duty military, and their families were taken care of. Our hospital representatives and deputies fully encompassed their role as Busy Bees as they volunteered their time in our hospitals, clinics, homes, and outpatient facilities.

Districts along with our units continued in the caregiver support program by visiting skilled nursing facilities where they sat with veteran patients on a biweekly schedule. A day at the lake was provided by one district. Many dinners, barbecues along with walk for vets were held to support veterans and their families.
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One unit discovered that dealing with a veteran suffering from PTSD can be overwhelming for the family. The unit implemented a PTSD care give support program to help those dealing with this disorder understand and cope with the many aspects of it. Another unit member has taken it upon herself to be with a veteran $24 / 7$ as he fights stage IV lung cancer. Service to our veterans is what we are, what we do, and how we believe.

One unit supported a family that was burned out of their home not once, but twice. Food, meals, clothing, and furniture were but some of the items donated to this family. An adult foster care facility was forced to closed down and they donated what they had to a Vietnam veteran and his family to furnish a mobile home that they had just received.

Boxes were sent to our servicemen and women overseas containing such items as knitted helmet liners, -- I had never heard that; that is awesome -- the front and sports pages of the local newspapers along with the necessary cookies and such. Many of our veterans have gone back to or started college and our members make meals for them on a regular basis.

A PTSD dog training program has been initiated by one unit. This program trains a dog to assist the veteran suffering with PTSD. These special dogs are trained for
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approximately one year before they are introduced to the veteran, then there is additional training to ensure that the fit is right. Other units have taken on the task of providing the homeless with comfort mats which are plastic bags that are crocheted into mats for them to sit or lie on. The bags are donated by various grocery retail stores.

Quilts of Honors is the main project of one unit. This past year 85 quilts were presented to the POWs of Hanoi Hilton and their rescuers, the Son Tay Raiders at the NAM POW conference in Texas. The Paralympics hosted at a local VA facility showcased our handicapped veterans in truly competitive contests. I'm telling you those vets, they -- I wouldn't want to go up against them.

In addition, our members have donated and volunteered to Fisher House, Habitat for Humanity, Creative Arts and Support the Enlisted Program, STEP, Texas flood relief, quilts and lab robes for nursing homes, cards made and delivered by our Junior members to the VA facilities. Our Legion family members have volunteered for Meals on Wheels, sewing, crocheting, ironing, doing laundry, wherever the need, our members are there.

Units/districts organized and volunteered at several Stand Downs, donating countless hours, supplies
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and moral support for those in attendance. Clothing from local casino lost and found lockers were donated to be distributed at the Stand Downs by two districts. Blankets, sleeping bags and other items of need, along with food, toiletries and other personal items were also donated and distributed as well.

Stand Downs are constantly changing. Lessons are
learned at each and every one and the needs of the veterans in the community will always dictate what we need to do to help. One district which has no local veterans facility has organized a Stand Down committee that works year-round collecting donations from local merchants to assist in the Stand Down at a neighboring county's veterans village for homeless women. Many units have partnered with other local facilities to enable them to have what is needed when it is needed. Donations for victims of the local fires, enabling a veteran to send his granddaughter to Girls State, supporting warming rooms with sleeping bags, coffee, and hot chocolate. Gift cards for groceries, rent assistance, toys, clothes, and gifts for Christmas are among the many things our units have accomplished so far this year.

To date the Department of California along with our Legion Posts, Sons and Riders have volunteered over 312,000 hours with the force of 5,000 volunteers,
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collected and donated $\$ 147,000$ and over $\$ 452,000$ of in kind donations for our veterans. Temporary financial assistance totaled over $\$ 13,000$ for our veterans in desperate need.

The members of the Department of California truly embrace our mission statement of service, not self in supporting our veterans, active duty, reserve military. We do what we do because of who we are and we will never know the full extent of what we do for our veterans, their families, and our communities.
