GIRLS STATE DIRECTOR SOLLAZZO: Good morning, ladies. Madam President, I've forgotten my committee report so I'm going to wing it. The Convention Committee on Girls State called the meeting to order at 9:03 a.m. on June 27th in the Juniper Room of the Ontario Airport Hotel. The statistical report of this Chairman appears on page 21 of the Book of Reports. Lori Comrada, District 22 was appointed secretary. Stella Detrich, District 18 offered prayer, and Janet Haynes, District 6 was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. There were 20 district delegates and four visitors present.

automation, the Girls State counseling staff created a ten-minute video about a day in the life of a Girls State citizen. The video was included at the beginning of the application process so that the delegates/alternates would have to watch it prior to completing their application.

We had a few issues, as with any new process, but we quickly resolved when needed. It was very exciting to have everything come to this Chairman in one place with all necessary signed forms and pictures with completed biographies of each applicant. The delegate/alternate and unit chairmen received automated confirmation emails when the application was completed. This eliminated the need for the unit chairman to wait on mail confirmations from the applicants so they could send paperwork to this Chairman.

By the end of the process it was clear that we had created a more rounded automated process and eliminated a lot of unnecessary paperwork being sent back and forth between applications/unit chairmen and the Department Chairman.

Department of California units are always thinking about membership when it comes to their new and experienced delegates and families. 155 of our 160 units that sponsored delegates to Girls State promoted the Auxiliary and its membership as a way to pay it forward.

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Many of our units actually educate the girls during the interview process about the American Legion Family. Twenty delegates actually joined units prior to Girls State session.

One of the commonalities of the unit reports and district reports was how difficult the selection process becomes each year. This year's candidates are gifted, hardworking, and most have achieved a minimum -- achieved a 4.0 GPA. This year's girls are involved in some type of community service or missions work and have received honors for academic excellence. The units are excited to have the girls come back to their meetings to report on their experiences and to see how it has enhanced their goals for the future.

Every district reported having some type of orientation for the delegates and their families. Some had teas, some had luncheons, and one district even had a smorgasbord. Each district reported inviting past Girls State citizens and Girls State committee members to speak to the girls and answer any questions. This Chairman went to several orientation luncheons and was honored to see a Girls State alumni from 2008 speak to the girls and their families. There were several other Girls State alumni who spoke regarding their career paths and how the Girls State experience influenced what they are currently doing. They
were amazing events as the girls and their families were introduced, fed, and even given certificates from the local town council. 144 units participated in these district orientations.

Another big event was the 100th anniversary of our American Legion. It was so exciting to find out that the American Legion was hosting a float in the 2018 Rose Bowl Parade. The Girls State Alumnae Foundation worked with the American Legion to sponsor a Girls State/Boys State Decorate the Float Day. The 75 th session citizens and Girls State staff/alumni were invited to participate on the first day of float decorations and were given T-shirts that were purchased by the Girls State Alumnae Foundation. It was a great day with all of the citizens coming together once again to participate in this great event.

The Department of California has 529 girls attending our 76 th session. This year there was 100 percent reporting from our districts. Seven districts submitted year-end reports and six unit reports were submitted for first place from districts. 160 units sponsored delegates, an increase of six units from 2018. Eleven units sponsored a delegate for the first time ever. There were 20 requests for schools looking for sponsorship of units for girls this year or for next year's session.

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Eighty units had Girls State delegates participate in service projects. Our service project at the 76 th session this year is collecting miniature toiletries and socks for homeless female veterans, also our Department President's Special Project this year.

Units hosted many different types of events: breakfasts, 50/50 raffles, quartermanias, and tea socials. However, units are reporting that it is getting harder and harder to raise the funds needed to send the delegates to Girls State. 56 units reached out to businesses or outside organizations to get necessary funding. Some Girl State Alumni personally support a girl from their own alma mater. Six units applied for grants through the Girls State Alumnae Foundation and received a total of $\$ 4,000$ to help them fund their delegates.

Thirty-eight units reached out and networked with schools that do not have active units in their area. Forty-three units prepared newspaper articles and submitted them regarding their Girls State delegates. Ninety-nine units reached out to prior years' delegates to help assist with the 2019 program, for example, helping to educate the current applicants or by speaking at a tea/orientation. 109 units promoted the American Legion Samsung Scholarship in their ALA Girls State packets that were sent to the schools. Eighty-six delegates applied
for the scholarship. Fifty-four units that did not sponsor delegates gave donations totaling $\$ 2,181$ and were given certificates of appreciation.

On a sad note, a long time Department Girls State Director passed away this year. Her name was Gerri Cadwalader. She had requested that her estate make a donation to ALA Girls State, therefore we received a check for the amount of $\$ 2500$ for our General Fund. Thank you, Gerri, for your generous donation.

This has been an exciting year for me as the Girls State Chairman and $I$ have enjoyed every part of it. There has been issues this year that we have had to adapt to. For example, the measles scare throughout the Golden State. Through it all working with the citizens-to-be and their parents has been rewarding and always makes me excited to attend Girls State.

I am extremely proud to be part of a program that has such a strong foundation to encourage, guide, and teach the fundamentals of our government. It has been a privilege and an honor to be Department Chairman with the support and help of each of the Unit and District Chairmen, the Girls State committee, and the Girls State support.
(Applause.)
GIRLS STATE DIRECTOR SOLLAZZO: Madam President,
may I now present my first place and district and unit awards?

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MARTINEZ: Yes.
GIRLS STATE DIRECTOR SOLLAZZO: I don't see my first award. My First Place Best Unit Supplemental goes to Unit 166, District 12 Kathy Vasquez.
(Applause.)
GIRLS STATE DIRECTOR SOLLAZZO: Okay. And this is the first time this has been done, but my committee was adamant that this happens. The First Place for District Supplemental, District 12, Chairman Kathy Vasquez.
(Applause.)
GIRLS STATE DIRECTOR SOLLAZZO: And now, Madam President, may I please make a special presentation?

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MARTINEZ: Yes.
GIRLS STATE DIRECTOR SOLLAZZO: I promise I'll be done soon, ladies. So I would like to ask Anita Biggs to come to the podium.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Yes.
GIRLS STATE DIRECTOR SOLLAZZO: I'm so small
compared to her. So I want to make a special presentation to the Jackie Robinson Unit 252 Color Guard and give them a certificate and some Girls State chachee. That's Anita Biggs, captain; Sharon Moore; Renee Alexander; Cheryl Jefferson; and Star Denny. If you're in the audience,
please come up.
(Applause.)
GIRLS STATE DIRECTOR SOLLAZZO: And let me tell you why. They came to Girls State for the first time ever, and on our opening ceremony they were the color guard. And they are spiffed out and they are precise. So Anita and 252 Color Guard, we have a certificate of appreciation for you.
(Applause.)
GIRLS STATE DIRECTOR SOLLAZZO: And this is just for you.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you. I love these pajamas.

GIRLS STATE DIRECTOR SOLLAZZO: So they get a Girls State logo mug. Sharon Moore is co-captain.
(Applause.)
GIRLS STATE DIRECTOR SOLLAZZO: And last night -oh, one more presentation, Madam President. Thank you, Madam President.

Okay. Last night we had a wonderful speaker come to speak to the girls, and her name is Blanca Rubio. She was from or is from -- he's an assemblywomen from the 48th District. She flew all the way down from Sacramento just to speak to the girls. She was inspiring. And honestly I was sitting on the stage when she spoke and at the
beginning the girls were all like hunching, and by the end of her speech, they were all sitting up straight. You could see the emotions in their faces. They had changed. And she presented to Girls State a lovely certificate that I would like to president to Madam President. It says: Assembly Certificate of Recognition presented to the American Legion Auxiliary California Girls State in appreciation of your dedication to providing an important educational opportunity, for encouraging young leaders. Best wishes for continued success. Blanca Rubio.
(Applause.)
GIRLS STATE DIRECTOR SOLLAZZO: Two more things. I would just like to say very quickly thank you for the opportunity to be Department Girls State Chairman. I have learned so much and I have a -- our new chairman who will -- our chairman-elect here, our chairman appointee on stage. I just want to have her stand up and introduce her. Her name is Allyn Kau.
(Applause.)
GIRLS STATE DIRECTOR SOLLAZZO: And she's -- she went to Girls State and she's been part of the program for -- since she was two years old I think. Okay. Fifteen, but still forever. And she is the one that actually helped automate the process. And I'm really excited because we worked really well together and I'm super
excited about next year.
And now, ladies, for my final and I promise I will get off the stage. I have a special introduction to make. Ladies, from District 9, Unit 161, the new Girls State Governor is from Monte Vista High School in Danville. Her high school activities include debate, public speaking, dance, other clubs and community service. Her short-term goals are to fundraise enough money to purchase 20 GED books to distribute throughout California prisons, running an undecided candidates 2020 campaign, and volunteering for Global Youth Justice. She wants to become a policymaker to address the growing concerns of public education and healthcare, climate change, and criminal justice reform. Ladies, please give a warm, warm welcome to Amber Xu.
(Applause.)
GIRLS STATE GOVERNOR XU: Madam President, Distinguished Guests, and the American Legion Auxiliary, thank you for the warm welcome this morning. I'm very excited to be here to speak with you all today. I want to begin by telling you a little bit about my journey throughout this week. I was sponsored by District 9, Unit 161 from San Ramon. In order to be selected, I wrote and prepared a draft answering questions about myself that ranged from my volunteer work with the assemblywoman and
the local debate program to help others, which is how my advanced English teacher would describe me. Then I had an interview where $I$ was asked about the state of U.S. politics and what $I$ would change about my school. A few weeks later I got an email that I had been selected to attend Girls State. I was elated and in a blur, it was the final tests of the school year. Before $I$ knew it, it was time to leave for Girls State. Honestly the night before I was a little stressed. I felt like I didn't know the ins and outs of the programs such as what does it even mean to run for governor for a 17 year old. Well, here I am.

The first few days of Girls State were jam packed with activities from electing our city officials to the city government. When I first arrived, I was exhausted. I had just returned from the longest debate tournament I had ever been to and it seemed that there were things to do every single minute. Until the first part of the election. There $I$ was energized by the sincere passion and genuine desire to make this country better that $I$ felt from all the phenomenal girls around me. I was inspired to take action. Not only did I learn about the girls around me, but I learned what it truly means to be an American and what it truly means for the privilege above self. To be Americans means participating in dialogue
when the actions of the government is lacking behind. To be American means accepting the brazing diversity of people and us all. To be an American means honoring our veterans and their sacrifices like we did this last week at Girls State. We made sock hops with basic necessities and toiletries for homeless women veterans, which to repeat what someone said from that day are three words that should never be heard together.

To be an American means doing the incredible work that -- to be an American means to do incredible work that the American Legion Auxiliary does to inspire civic duty and service. To be an American is to be at Girls State.

Lastly, I want to thank Department President Joan Cannon and all the members of the American Legion Auxiliary, all the unit and district chairs, the Department Girls State Chair Tammy Sollazzo, and all the volunteers who have developed, promoted, and provided the American Legion Auxiliary's California Girls State program.

I had amazing opportunities to meet girls from all over the state, develop my leadership skills and strengthen my knowledge of debating and to share what I have learned from my school and my community with young women throughout California. It is all of you who have made this experience possible for me and the other 522
delegates.
I must now return to Claremont to conduct the governor's visit of the 76 th session of the American Legion Auxiliary California's Girls State. On behalf of the 522 young women leaders who are citizens of ALA Girls State, I thank you again for giving us this wonderful experience.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MARTINEZ: On behalf of the American Legion Auxiliary, the Department of California, our President Joan Cannon had to step away, but would like for you to have her pin for this year. You are an amazing young lady. And this is our future, ladies. Thank you for your service.
(Applause.)
GIRLS STATE DIRECTOR SOLLAZZO: Madam President, that concludes my report.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MARTINEZ: Thank you,
Tammy. That's an awesome job. You have done a wonderful job over there. You guys need to leave?

GIRLS STATE DIRECTOR SOLLAZZO: We need to go back to session.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MARTINEZ: Thank you.
(Applause.)

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MARTINEZ: At this time I would like to call Terry Mikesell.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Okay. Ladies, 2012-2013 I was Department President. National gave to the State of California several stupendous people an award. We didn't get it then, so now they are here. Okay. Robert Allen Romo Unit 422 Innovative Public Relations, District 25.
(Applause.)
PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Hawthorne Unit 314, Innovative Public Relations, District 19.
(Applause.)
PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: We needed to stay in order. Okay. Santa Clara Unit 419, Innovative Public Relations, District 13.
(Applause.)
PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Newport
Harbor Unit 291, Innovative Public Relations, District 29.
(Applause.)
PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Okay. Susie Tozier, Children \& Youth Most Outstanding Western Division, District 6.
(Applause.)
PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Okay. Let's see here. Penny Lacks-Reynolds, Children \& Youth Best

Western Division Unit 716, District 29.
(Applause.)
PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Okay.
Harriet Clendenin, Veterans Affairs \& Rehabilitation
Western District Best Report, District 15, Unit 221.
(Applause.)
PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Okay.
California Children \& Youth, Susie Tozier, Most
Outstanding Western Division.
(Applause.)
PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Ruth Briggs,
Veterans Affairs Volunteer Service Meeting Perfect
Attendance, District 11, Unit 172.
(Applause.)
PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Cynthia
Simmons Veterans Affairs Volunteer Service Meeting, Unit 422, District 25.
(Applause.)
PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Linda
Fercho, Most Outstanding Legislative Western Division. She's from District 16.
(Applause.)
PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: And then I have one more award that it will have to wait until our Department President comes back. Thank you very much.

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DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MARTINEZ: Thank you, Terry. At this time $I$ would like to call on Donna Scott for the Rules. Here she comes.

## READING OF CONVENTION RULES

CONVENTION RULES CHAIRMAN SCOTT: If you would like to follow along, it's on pages 13 through 15. These are the Department of California 2019 Convention rules.

Number 1: All meetings of the convention shall be called to order at the designated time or as soon thereafter as a quorum is present.

Number 2: A quorum shall exist when one-third of the units in good standing are partially or wholly represented by duly elected delegates or alternate. Article IV, Section 7 of the Department Constitution.

Number 3: The audience shall remain seated during the business of the convention. The Department President shall designate certain doors to accommodate the delegates who find it necessary to enter or leave the convention hall during the reports of the committee or when a speaker has the floor. Cell phones must be turned off or in vibrate mode. And she earlier designated the door to my right and your left.

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Number 4: The Chairman may deviate from the printed program when necessary or expedient.

Number 5: The Credentials Chairman shall report registration as directed by the Chair.

Number 6: The registration of delegates and alternates shall close at 9:00 a.m., Saturday, June 29th, 2019.

Number 7: Only qualified delegates shall have voice and vote.

Number 8: It shall be the responsibility of each District Presidents to see that only accredited delegates and alternates serving as delegates are seated in her district delegation during the business meeting of the convention.

Number 9: If a delegate expects to be absent from the convention, except for the purpose of attending a committee meeting, she shall relinquish her delegate's card to her alternate. The alternate shall then take her seat in the voting section. In the event the delegate does not have the opportunity of reporting to the District President -- reporting to the District President, it shall become the duty of the chairman of the unit delegation to report to the District President the absence of the delegate and the presence of the alternate or the absence of both the delegate and the alternate.

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Number 10: A delegate wishing the privilege of the floor shall rise, address the Chair as Madame President, give her name, unit, district numbers, pause, and wait to be recognized by the Chair.

Number 11: A member speaking in debate on a question shall be limited to three minutes. No one shall speak more than twice on the same question without consent of the assembly.

Number 12: Delegates attending called committee meetings shall be notified what the convention is considering and voting upon adoption of any change in policy or matters affecting finance.

Number 13: Reports of committees which do not appear to be controversial in nature may be adopted by general consent if there is no objection. If there is objection, a vote shall be taken. Following the acceptance of a report of a committee, recommendation or resolution may be presented for consideration and adoption.

Number 14: Any committee whose proposed changes in the policy might conflict with that of the American Legion shall confer with the American Legion before presenting said -- said change to the convention.

Number 15: A committee recommending an appropriation of funds for any purpose shall consult with

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the Department Finance Committee before presenting the recommendation or resolution to the convention.

Number 16: All resolutions to be presented to the convention shall be in triplicate and properly signed.

Number 17: Committees may amend resolutions and recommendation referring to them before favorable reporting the same. Resolutions or recommendations rejected by a committee shall be marked rejected, signed by the chairman of the committee, and returned to the department resolutions chairman immediately following the committee meeting.

Number 18: A unit, district, or member presenting a resolution or recommendation shall have the privilege of explaining the same to the committee to which it was referred.

Number 19: Committee shall report to the convention all resolutions properly submitted and accepted by a majority of the convention committee.

Number 20: A resolution rejected by a committee may be brought before the convention by a two-thirds vote.

Number 21: Emergency resolutions which may arise during the convention or after the date for submitting resolution may be presented no later than noon of second day of the convention. Under the Section 4b, Department Constitution.

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Number 22: Nomination of Officers, Junior Member of Finance, Department Delegates and Alternates to the National Convention shall be held Friday afternoon, June 28th, 2019.

Number 23: Endorsement of candidates for
National Office shall follow the nominations.
Number 24: Nomination speeches shall be limited to three minutes. There shall be no seconding speeches.

Number 25: Election -- Number 25: Election of Department Officers, Junior Member of Finance, National Candidate, department delegates, and alternates to the National Convention shall be held on Saturday morning, June 29th, 2019.

Number 26: The doors of the convention hall shall be closed during the entire election procedure and no one shall leave or enter the hall until the Chair states the election is concluded. The exception to this shall be that in an emergency, a member may leave, and if her absence changes the voting strength, the district president shall immediately notify the presiding officer.

Number 27: When there is but one nominee for all Department Officers and but one nominee for Junior Member of Finance, the nominees shall be elected viva voce. And that's the Department Convention Committees \#2G, Standing Rules. Upon roll call, the district president shall
report the number of units partially or wholly represented by duly elected delegates or alternates present in the delegation at the time of roll call. This is to determine that there is a quorum of units present at the time of the election.

Number 28: When there is more than one nominee for the Department Offices, Junior Member of Finance, or Endorsement for National Office, election shall be by written ballot. The District President shall, when they are instructed by the Chair, take a roll call of their respective delegations to ascertain the total voting strength of their district for the election reporting the same to the Chair.

Number 29: When there are three or more nominees for the office Junior Member of Finance or endorsement of National Office, unless one nominee receives a majority note on the first ballot, the nominee receiving the lowest number of votes shall be automatically dropped before proceeding with the next ballot.

Number 30: All members seeking National office shall be endorsed at a Department Convention by a majority vote not more than three years prior to the date they are to be a candidate for office. Vote shall be by viva voce unless there is more than one candidate, then a majority vote shall be by ballot. That's the Department Convention

Committees 2J, Department Standing Rules.
Number 31: Each District President shall -- each District President and District Member of Elections committee shall distribute and collect the votes cast by the district delegation and deliver them to the Department Chairman of Elections.

Number 32: Department Officers, Chairmen, Committee Members and Past Department Presidents shall vote with their respective district.

Number 33: Each delegate shall be entitled to one vote. The vote of -- the vote an absent unit is not represented by the alternate shall be casted by the majority of the delegate from the unit. When two delegates represent three votes, the chairman of the unit delegation shall cast the third vote.

And number 34: A majority of the votes cast shall elect, expect that in the election of national delegates and alternates, a plurality shall elect.

Number 35: These convention rules may be amended during the convention by two-thirds vote.

Number 36: Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised, shall be the parliamentary authority on all points not covered by these rules, the department constitution and bylaws, and the convention mandates.

Madam President, that concludes my reading of the
rules and I move to adopt them as read.
DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MARTINEZ: It's -- it has been moved and seconded to accept the 2019 Convention Rules in ceratian, or I don't know how to pronounce that, thank you, which is point by point. Any discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MARTINEZ: Hearing none, all of those in favor say aye.

ALL PRESENT: Aye.
DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MARTINEZ: Opposed?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MARTINEZ: Motion carried. Thank you very much, Donna. We appreciate that. CONVENTION RULES CHAIRMAN SCOTT: Thank you, Madam President.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MARTINEZ: At this time we do have a visitor in the house. If I could ask the Sergeant-at-Arms and Assistant Sergeant-At-Arms to escort Ed Grimsley from the American Legion who is the incoming Department Commander.
(Processional.)
DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MARTINEZ: And he knows how to use a gavel.

AMERICAN LEGION COMMANDER ELECT GRIMSLEY: Good morning. How are you doing? It's good to see everyone.

Well, thank you. My name is Ed Grimsley and I am the Legion candidate for the Department Commander 2019-2020.
(Applause.)
AMERICAN LEGION COMMANDER ELECT GRIMSLEY: And I just wanted to stop by and just say a couple words to you ladies to let you know that $I$ am one big fan of yours.
(Applause.)
AMERICAN LEGION COMMANDER ELECT GRIMSLEY: And I have always been a fan of the Auxiliary and I've always taken up with the Auxiliary. District 22, I love those ladies. I love all of you all too, but they're some hard workers. And the motto that $I$ have for this year is you lead, you motivate, and you inspire. If we have all those three things, we can make it. And I'm also a family man. We go around, we walk around, we'll say that we're a Legionnaire Family. Let's do it.
(Applause.)
AMERICAN LEGION COMMANDER ELECT GRIMSLEY: Let's start. Let's do it. Because next year I am working hard to bring us all together. And I hope I can do this. The convention is going to be in Visalia and the headquarters is working hard to make sure that Sons, the Auxiliary, and the Legionnaires is all together at one time.
(Applause.)
AMERICAN LEGION COMMANDER ELECT GRIMSLEY: This

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is stuff I'm working on and $I$ hope $I$ can pull it through. I've been talking about this for years. Because I never did want to see us apart. I didn't like traveling over here because I figured we should have been right down the hall.
(Applause.)
AMERICAN LEGION COMMANDER ELECT GRIMSLEY: And that's what separates us. If we're going to be a family, let's be one family.
(Applause.)
AMERICAN LEGION COMMANDER ELECT GRIMSLEY: This afternoon in the Double Tree Hotel, 1157 -- some of them already know -- there will be a hospitality meet and greet. Please if you're in the area, please stop by and say hi, get a bite to eat, do some camaraderie, get to know each other.

You know, this morning I got up, I made every Legionnaire stand up. I asked them, not made them. I asked them to stand up and face each other and say, "God bless America." Okay. Because this is where we live. We all have our differences and that's a good thing because I don't want to be the same as everybody else. I want to be able to look different, but one thing about it at the end, you must respect yourself and you must respect each other. So that's all I ask.

Ladies, thank you very much and have a tremendous time. And I hope you all have a good convention. And I hope next year I be able to work with you. And my one last thing is if you need to call me, okay, I don't work; I'm a retiree. I have 45 years of government service, so all I do is cook for my wife.
(Applause.)
AMERICAN LEGION COMMANDER ELECT GRIMSLEY: I do laundry.
(Applause.)
AMERICAN LEGION COMMANDER ELECT GRIMSLEY: I mow the lawn. I don't have a dog. And I wash the cars. And when I cook, I take food out to the needy.
(Applause.)
AMERICAN LEGION COMMANDER ELECT GRIMSLEY: So
that's all that I'm about. All right? Thank you, ladies, and God bless you.
(Processional.)
DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MARTINEZ: All right. Is there anything else that we need to -- or should we get back to the program here? Awesome. Okay. The schedule, so to speak. At this time I am going to proceed on the matters that we have. We will start with our reports. I will call up first our Secretary, Treasurer, and then Chaplain. Oh, I'm sorry. I apologize, I apologize.

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Credentials first. We need to know what's going on. Chair Sharon Moore, our Credentials Chairman.

CREDENTIALS CONVENTION REPORT

CREDENTIALS CHAIRMAN MOORE: Thank you, Madam President. This is the Credentials report 2018-2019. Madam President Kathie Martinez, as of 6:00 p.m., June 27th, 2019 there are 122 units registered for this convention and you do have a quorum.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MARTINEZ: Thank you, Sharon. Okay. Now we'll get to our Chairman reports. We will hear from our Secretary, followed by the Treasurer, and then the Chaplain until Madam President returns.

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY CONVENTION REPORT

Ruby and Terry, thank you very much for finding those old forms so I didn't have to reinvent the wheel. And, Ruby, thank you for finding some of my catastrophic mistakes. Thank goodness everything was fixable.

Diane, thank you for helping me when I have questions about procedure when I wasn't 100 percent sure.

Many thanks to Glenda and Susie who came to San Francisco to help me with the Book of Reports.

To Wendy and District 6 for the donation of the binding machine. It will be well used. To District 8 Dara and Teresa who helped me in many ways get ready for convention. Linda Workman, taco Tuesday? And if I may, thank you to to the District Presidents who helped me get the job done.

So here we are celebrating the accomplishments of this year. So while all of you get to learn new jobs next year, guess what, I start all over again. But it is my pleasure and $I$ know it will be easier.

At this time I would like to welcome Karen, our court reporter, who has come back. And this is her tenth
year with us.

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY CLENDENIN: Madam President, thank you. It has been a pleasure.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MARTINEZ: Thank you, Harriet. Awesome jobs, ladies.

## DEPARTMENT TREASURER CONVENTION REPORT

DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: Is it still morning yet? Oh, that's a dirty look.

Madam President, there are only three items I'd like to address today. The first is to remind Units and Districts that all are mandated to file the 199N E-postcard with the Franchise Tax Board and the 990N postcard with the IRS. Once you've established logon these entities, it should only take you no more than 20 minutes to file both of these forms. If a Unit Or District does not file for three years, their tax exempt status will be revoked and it will cost you $\$ 400$ to get reinstated. So save yourself some money and just every November on the 15 th day of the -- the 11 th month, make sure you file those taxes.

The second item I'd like to address is donations to Department. I redid the donation form and put all the
welfare donations on one side of the form and the general fund donations on the other side of the form. So that when donations are made, Units and Districts would write two checks, one for each side of the donation form. We are going to after our committee meeting, finance committee meeting, I will be adding TFA -- VA\&R TFA as an additional donation on that form.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: Please, please, please save me a lot of work and when you are making donations to Department, write one check for each side of the donation form, i.e. general fund donations one check, and when you turn the page, make out a second check.

And the last item is the Auxiliary is sending a lot of credit memos which most can be avoided in most cases simply by double checking the members being transmitted against the check dollar amount and making sure they agree. Units are asked to double check -- units are used to double checking transmittals and making sure the dollar amount is correct for the number of senior and junior members you are transmitting.

Please also check the age of junior members to make sure whether they are still a junior or a senior member and transmit senior dues for the ones who graduated to be a senior. Use the dues chart when figuring the

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correct amount of money to be sent. Chart is online under membership tab, but needs to be updated this year to reflect the change voted on last year.

Madam President, it has been a pleasure serving as one of your officers and both Imelda, the bookkeeper, and I extend our very best wishes for you for a most productive and memorable convention. And this concludes my report.

DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN SMITH: Madam President, this concludes my remarks.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MARTINEZ: Thank you, Donna. You did a wonderful job. Thank you very much. Up next we will have the report from the Parliamentarian. She's back.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: And I'm sorry I wasn't here to hear all the other winners. You'll have to tell me later those of who you got 2013 awards. More stuff for your wall. We'll have our Historian, and after the Historian, our Sergeant-at-Arms and Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms.

Rosemary and Cece, if you're ready you can come give yours while Jean is getting ready. SERGEANT-AT-ARMS and ASSISTANT SERGEANT-AT-ARMS CONVENTION REPORT

SERGEANT-AT-ARMS WEBER: We don't really have a report. We just wanted to thank you, Madam President, for this appointment. It's been a very energetic year.

ASSISTANT SERGEANT-AT-ARMS HARVEY: And we also want to thank everybody for their class and for your patience.

Place District Written History goes to Julie Taing, Chairman, District 18.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT HISTORIAN COOLEY-DESMEULES: First Place Best District Picture Book, and this lady deserves it because she emailed me and texted me and copied everything and asked questions. Julie Taing, Chairman, District 18.
(Applause.)

Madam President, your theme of, "Freedom blooms when veterans are served," was truly evident as we watched the gardens of the Department of California bloom and grow in service to our veterans. Thank you, Madam President.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Thank you, Kathie.
Next we'll hear from our Legislative Chairman Loretta. NEC. I'm sorry. NEC.

NATIONAL EXECUTIVE COUNCILWOMAN MARSH: That's
the one I grabbed first.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: She's going to do her NEC report.

NATIONAL EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE CONVENTION REPORT

NATIONAL EXECUTIVE COMMITTEEWOMAN MARSH: Thank you. On behalf of the Department of California, I attended the National Pre-Convention and Post-Convention NEC meetings in Minneapolis at the 2018 National Convention as well as a February NEC meeting in Indianapolis. I also joined their two meetings by conference calls.

There were several items on the agenda. The first was a proposal to return the Auxiliary's participation in the Washington D.C. conference which had been eliminated for budget reasons. Another item discussed was the elimination of approximately 40 committee members on the National level. Since we don't have committees, only a chairman for most of our programs, this shouldn't have an impact on our procedures.

Other program changes were to have a Unit Member of the Year come under the Leadership program and a Service Woman of the Year under the National Security rather than the current Past Presidents Parley.

A couple of things have come up under membership. One is a proposed change to Standing Rule X. 3 which addresses transfers between units. It has been clarified by adding the sentence: "Transfer is final upon verification of paid membership and acceptance of the transferee by the new unit." This is meant to clear up the confusion over whether or not you must accept a transfer.

Another membership item on the horizon is to change the American Legion NEC as proposed in their membership requirements for the Auxiliary. This change would be only one word. They would be changing the word "wife" to "spouse." This was deemed to be necessary in today's need for inclusion and the fact that 27 states have already passed antidiscrimination laws and others are poised to do so.

Another consideration was the number of women veterans now in the American Legion. We are all aware of the changes that have come about in our world in the 100 years since our inception, so it is inevitable that our organization adjusts accordingly. These are some things that will come up during Legion Department and National Convention, so I'm just giving you a heads up.

As I'm sure you are all aware of, but a reminder, that the updated unit handbook is now available. Madam

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President, this concludes the NEC report.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Thank you. Do you want to do your Legislative report?

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT TOZIER: I have a question for the NEC person. What's the definition of "spouse"? Because I'm going to get asked that question. NATIONAL EXECUTIVE COMMITTEEWOMAN MARSH: Male or female.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT TOZIER: Okay. That's what I wanted. So it means male or female. Thank you. I want to check. I'm Susie Tozier, District 22.

NATIONAL EXECUTIVE COMMITTEEWOMAN MARSH: Yes, a spouse would be a married partner, and that means something different now than it did 100 years ago as we all know.

## LEGISLATIVE CONVENTION REPORT

LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN MARSH: The convention committee for Legislative met on June 27 th in the Sycamore Room of the Ontario Airport Hotel. The statistical report of this Chairman appears on page 23 of the Book of Reports. Kim Vincent served as secretary, Laurie Richards from District 26 offered prayer, and Kim pitched in and
took over for Sergeant-at-Arms also. We had 17 district delegates and four visitors. And no changes were proposed.

We had quite a spirited discussion. By
"spirited," I mean during the course of our discussion we covered that the HR Bill 299, which is known as the Blue Water Navy, was passed and signed.
(Applause.)
LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN MARSH: So that caused a lot of excitement because our ladies were wanting that one. That concludes the committee report. May I continue with my supplemental?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Yes, you may.
LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN MARSH: Okay. The
Department of California not only got busy with contacts to the government officials to promote legislation of importance to the wellbeing of our veterans and their families, they also went to work and made things happen. One district and unit in Southern California worked diligently contacting officials and succeeded in getting a bill, the Transportation ACR-37 if you want to be technical, passed and awaiting the Governor's signature to have a bridge named the Marine Corporal Erik H. Silva Memorial Bridge. They held fundraisers to help pay for the new highway signs. They had the support of and worked
very closely with the city council and mayor.
Another district and unit in Northern California campaigned to have a French Legion of Honor World War II Medalist honored with an assembly resolution and to have him in Sacramento's Hall of Fame. The legislative chairman for the district sent me so many copies of all of her transactions concerning various bills, and the packet is much too large for me to pass on all that they did. She attended Legislative Day in Sacramento with the American Legion in full support for the legislation they were supporting.

Another unit attended city council meetings where veterans were being honored for their service. The city honors six different veterans every six months with proclamations and personal banners posted near a memorial park for six months.

Women veteran issues were given high priority among many units. Blue Star and Gold Star mothers were also honored in many units and districts.

One item in the American Legion has asked for our support for was the bill to close the loopholes in the eligibility for veterans to join the American Legion. The bill would make any veteran that has served since World War II with an honorable discharge eligible for a membership. This bill would affect Auxiliary membership
as well. This bill has passed the Senate with an unanimous vote and is headed to the House as of the writing of this report.
(Applause.)
LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN MARSH: You can find all the statistics for this program in your Book of Reports on page 23. This concludes my report. May I continue with my awards?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Yes, you may.
LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN MARSH: Thank you. Okay. I'm really, really sad to say $I$ didn't receive a lot of them back, very few supplemental reports. I heard some great, great things, but it wasn't necessarily written in a report form for competition. So that being said, I am giving First Place award Unit Supplemental to Unit 422, District 25, Patricia Galatioto, Chairman.
(Applause.)
LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN MARSH: And Patricia is also receiving First Place For District Supplemental Report.
(Applause.)
LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN MARSH: She was the one that got so excited yesterday when she heard the passage of the one bill. Okay. Because I got so few reports but I heard so many things, I wanted this year, since I couldn't do reports, is to recognize two people that did outstanding
work in Legislative programs this year. And one of those people was Kim Vincent, Unit 138 District 30.
(Applause.)
LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN MARSH: She worked very hard. She's the one that worked on getting that bridge named for a veteran.
(Applause.)
LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN MARSH: Another member that worked very hard in Legislative, the one $I$ received the whole stack of communication from was Candace Hamilton from Unit 383, District 6.
(Applause.)
LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN MARSH: Yes, it was a big stack. This concludes my remarks.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Thank you, Loretta.
And we will now have a report of our Honorary Junior Member Tyra Haynes.

HONORARY JUNIOR DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CONVENTION REPORT

I would -- -- I wouldn't have -- okay. I'm sorry. I would like to put out a special thanks to all the Juniors for believing in me. I wouldn't have had an amazing year without them. Thank you.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: We will have --

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HONORARY JUNIOR DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT HAYNES: May I approach?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Yes. And while we're doing that, Susie. Thank you.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Thank you very much. Okay. Will the Sergeant-at-Arms and Marshal get our guests together? Since it's so close to lunch, I'm just going to introduce our guests. I would like to introduce our guests. We have first our Unit Member of the Year Carmen Candelario Haren, Camarillo Unit 741, District 16.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Salute to Active Duty Servicewomen, Amanda K. Baldwin and Evita Yniquez-De La Cruz.
(Processional.)
PAST PRESIDENTS PARLEY CHAIRMAN TOZIER: Carmen, will you stand at the Department President's podium, please?
(Applause.)
PAST PRESIDENTS PARLEY CHAIRMAN TOZIER: And,
ladies, I would like to introduce you to two of our Salute to Active Duty Servicewomen. We have Amanda Baldwin. She was sponsored from District 30. She's in the Navy.
(Applause.)
PAST PRESIDENTS PARLEY CHAIRMAN TOZIER: And Evita Yniguez-De La Cruz. She's in the Air Force. She was sponsored District 25. We will talk more about them and give their history at the luncheon today. I just wanted to introduce you to them.

Also I have our scholarship winner which is Kathryn Fimbres. I don't know how to say her last name. She's from District 28. She was not able to make it today because she's in school. She's our nursing scholarship winner for $\$ 4,000$. Susan Baker is here to accept it for her.
(Applause.)
PAST PRESIDENTS PARLEY CHAIRMAN TOZIER: I will finish my report after lunch since it's so close.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Thank you. Sergeant-at-Arms and Assistant Sergeant-At-Arms along with the Distinguished Guest Chairman, please escort our guests.
(Processional.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: We're now adjourned for lunch. We will adjourn and return at 1:30. 1:30. Thank you.
(Lunch recess taken: 12:21 p.m.)

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Will the Sergeant-at-Arms please close the door that we're not using, the one to my right. Or the Assistant Sergeant-At-Arms. I would like to make an announcement. (Singing.)

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Okay. That's one. Hopefully it will be the only one. If you are nominating someone for our Department Office Or National, please be on stage now because we will be going right after the PPP report.

DEPARTMENT SECRETARY CLENDENIN: Everyone wants me to remind the delegates to pick up their packets and to pick up a special gift if you haven't already.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Okay. The PPP
Chairman Susie Tozier.
PAST PRESIDENTS PARLEY CHAIRMAN TOZIER: First of all, I want to read what we said about the women today because those in the back had a hard time listening. But this is what we had. Okay. Carmen Candelario Haren, Unit 741 is our Member of the Year. She is very active in her unit. She started the Baggies for Love. She asks: Have you ever been sitting at a stoplight or waiting at a line and seen a homeless person? It might be a veteran or just
someone down on their luck. She wanted to help. She started doing the Baggies of Love filled with comfort items. She collected items and spare change to fill these bags. She even started -- she also started doggie treats for veterans. Each baggy has the VA hotline label and she distributes them as she sees a homeless person. This program has received local, state, and national attention. She believes small acts of kindness could be adopted to help the homeless in our community.

Our next was the $\$ 4,000$ scholarship winner, but she's not here. She was sponsor by Monterey Cypress Unit 694, District 28. She is currently in Maurine -- I think I spelled it wrong -- Church Coburn School of Nursing. She will receive an AA degree in 2020 but plans to enroll in a collaborative bachelor of science in nursing pathway. In the future she will pursue her master's degree. She is a single mother with a young daughter. Because of the demands of the nursing program, she has reduced her work schedule to three to four days a week. She is the sole provider for the family. Kathryn Fimbres was unable to attend this luncheon because she is at school today so she was unable to attend.

The honorees for the Active Duty Servicewomen of the Year, we have Colonel Jennifer Shaar. She is USMC. She is on her way to her next duty station in Washington
D.C. Colonel Shaar is a native of Indianapolis, Indiana. She attended Annapolis and the Naval Postgraduate School where she earned a MA in management. And she also attended U.S. War College for MA in strategic studies. She has served as finance -- I have to laugh because I spelled "as" A-S-S. Yeah. She has -- I have to put my glasses on. Let's see. Where did I leave off?

Financial management officer in operational and support commands. She has served at the headquarters of the Marine Corps Department of the Navy financial management and budget, director, comptroller division of the Marine Corps. She has also served as a Congressional Fellow representing the Marine Corps on Capitol Hill. And I will be giving the certificate to her.

Amanda K. Baldwin is an E4 in the U.S. Navy at the Navy Munitions Command Pacific Conus West Division Detachment. She deals with ordnance. She is a team leader for the safe assembly and disassembly and breakout and issue of 438 tons of ordnance in support of 23 Navy Marine Corps and Allied Forces squadrons. She was sponsored by Bradley Cooper Unit 138, District 30.

Colonel Shaar was sponsored by National City Unit 255, District 22.

Evita Yniguez-De La Cruz is a Technical Sergeant E6 for the U.S. Air Force. She is an Iraq veteran and

Gold Star Wife who lost her husband, Sergeant James De La Cruz, to suicide on January 13th, 2013. She started the Veteran Suicide Awareness Project in honor of her husband. She is stationed at the 452 nd aeromedical staging facility at March Air Reserve Base in Riverside where she works for -- she is a nurse also. She is the mother of two children, Marc and Lily. She is also the post commander of Victor Valley Post 725, what used to be Hisperia, and she has started a suicide program. And it's very good and you hear about they walk 20 miles, and she will be doing that tomorrow again.

The statistical report -- I have to fanagle this one because I couldn't get it to work. I had to move it. It will be found in your Book of Reports. Brenda Wardrip was secretary. Joann Shope, Unit 795, District 7 was chaplain. Sergeant-at-Arms was Jackie Cleveland, U578, District 23.

The code was read. The following housekeeping changes needs to be made. Code 5, page 54, end of line 2. Add a space between "of" and "the," the last two words of
that line. In line -- code -- line 5 of that same paragraph, we're going to delete the word "were." "They are to be reverted back to the funds from which they originated." Before it said "were originated." So we're deleting the "were."

(Applause.)
PAST PRESIDENTS PARLEY CHAIRMAN TOZIER: Highest Number of Members Completing ALA Academy 5 Courses for a district, District 21.
(Applause.)
PAST PRESIDENTS PARLEY CHAIRMAN TOZIER: Best District Report, District 25.
(Applause.)
PAST PRESIDENTS PARLEY CHAIRMAN TOZIER: Best Unit Report, Cecil M. Anderson, Unit 589 District 28.
(Applause.)
PAST PRESIDENTS PARLEY CHAIRMAN TOZIER: This concludes my report.
(Applause.)

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Thank you.
PAST PRESIDENTS PARLEY CHAIRMAN TOZIER: And I want to thank everyone for being at the luncheon today. Thank you.

Eighteen district delegates answered roll call and there were six visitors present.

Second place Unit Supplemental went to Laguna Beach Unit 222, District 29. Third place District Supplemental went to Trish Boyd, District 27. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Yes, you may.
COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: Madam President Joan, it's my pleasure and honor serving as the Department Community Service Chairman this year and it makes me proud to report on all of the work that has been done this year. In working Madam President's theme and in her garden, I would like to share some wise words from District 16's report. Our department flower is the Bird of Paradise. Paradise is created by assisting veterans
and military families, networking with other organizations on community projects, securing the basic needs of the homeless, seniors, low income families, women's programs, and volunteering at local care facilities. We have worked tirelessly this year creating this paradise. Thank you District 16.

The end-of-the-year reports prove that our members have been very active within their communities this year. I received reports from 25 districts with eight of those districts receiving 100 percent reporting from their units, with a total of 152 units reporting. They have all given generously of their time, money, and hard work. The reports have shown that the units have been working in many different ways in our communities. Some of the individual projects that were worked from this year include national recognized days of service, working at food banks, senior centers, homeless shelters, job fairs, medical clinics, women's programs, blood donations, nursing homes, libraries and museums, recycling, beautification, and cancer awareness.

The number of volunteers working these projects was reported as 1,839 with over 35,000 hours. Over $\$ 33,000$ was donated with $\$ 88,000$ in in-kind donations. Over 3500 of our members volunteered almost 50,000 hours in community events that aided veterans, our active duty
service members and their families.

One of their members hosted her first Bark for Life event and raised over $\$ 10,000$ for the cancer -- American Cancer Society.
(Applause.)
COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: One of her Junior members led her school in Operation Christmas and filled over 1,000 shoeboxes with gifts and toiletries for underprivileged children around the world. Great work, District 28. Congratulations.
(Applause.)
COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: First Place Unit Supplemental award goes to Big Pine Glacier Unit 457, District 27.
(Applause.)
COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: Highlights from their report included one member running the gift shop at the Northern Inyo Hospital. They lead the Big Pine High School Homecoming Parade. They participate

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monthly in the Big Pine Civic Club, and one of their members is president of the Civic Club. Great work from a small unit. They have 31 members. Congratulations. (Applause.)

COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: The 2018-2019 Junior Volunteer -- Junior Member Volunteer of the Year goes to Tatiana G. Rivas, Calipatria, Unit 135, District 30.
(Applause.)
COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: Tatiana is involved in unit activities and fundraisers. She participated in the Legion bake sale and Christmas gift bags for veterans and delivered them to veterans at the VAMC in San Diego. She assisted with the Month of May Poppy Table sharing the significance of the poppy. She was involved with the many centennial celebrations in the City of Calipatria. In 2018 she attended Junior Conference and was asked to serve as Department of California Junior Leadership Chairman and in 2019 is serving as Junior Education Chairman. She not only is an active member in her unit, but also a leader in our organization. She maintains a 4.0 grade point average and has received the principal's award. Thank you and congratulations, Tatiana.

CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN VINCENT: Okay. Continuing on. "Per Resolution No. 1, by direction of the Constitution \& Bylaws preconvention committee and previously approved by the finance preconvention committee as an update in the Department of California Standing Rules, Dues and Assessments page 31 item la reads: The National per capita dues for Senior members shall include a complimentary subscription to The American Legion Auxiliary National Magazine. A. Per capita tax shall be paid in advance annually. The National Senior per capita dues shall be $\$ 12$. Department senior per capita dues shall be \$7 and Auxiliary News assessment shall be \$1 and National Junior dues are $\$ 2.50$ and Department Junior dues are 75 cents."

By direction of the Constitution \& Bylaws preconvention committee, it was changed to read: "The National per capita dues for senior members shall include
a complimentary subscription to The American Legion Auxiliary National Magazine. Per capita tax shall be paid in advance annually. The National senior per capita dues shall be $\$ 12$, Department senior per capita dues shall be \$10, and National junior dues are \$2.50 and Department Junior dues are \$1.50."

Madam President, I move for the adoption of this change.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Yeah, I'm very sorry, but we're having a little bit of trouble. The Finance Committee is here and is reading that and they can't approve it. We can't change the Constitution Bylaws. So I'll just say let's keep it going without this. We can't vote on it. We can go back to it after the Finance Committee.

DEPARTMENT CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIR VINCENT: Sure.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Okay. Go ahead and do your supplement.

CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN VINCENT: 100 percent reporting certificates were given to Districts 4, $5,6,7,9,10,11,13,14,16,17,18,19,20,22,23$, 24, 28, 29. Citations were awarded to units and districts. Closing prayer was given. Meeting closed.

May I give my supplemental now and first place
awards? We completed the year with 28 District reports including 20 with 100 percent reporting. Constitution \& Bylaws are the governing document for our organization, providing guidelines for our Units, Districts, and Department, a reliable means to ensure business is conducted properly. As members it is our responsibility to familiarize ourselves with this document, ensuring the various levels of our organization are operating within the established guidelines. Becoming familiar with our governing documents aids us in becoming responsible members.

Units and districts have shown their commitment throughout the Department on completing rewrites which are ten years old or rewritten bylaws to conform to mandates, as well as several new amendments and bylaws. Department of California performed an annual review of the Model Unit and District Constitution \& Bylaws with a revision date of December 5th, 2018.

Units and Districts read and reviewed their governing documents throughout the year, including the Standing Rules. It was noted that several units made minor changes, nonetheless, changes that needed to be made by Unit and District membership to further the business of the organization.

With the National organization raising membership
per capita, several units raised their annual membership dues. Additionally, it was suggested to complete a new amendment to bylaws, adding membership renewal dues changes to the Standing Rules, as Standing Rules may be adopted by a majority vote. It was noted that units with annual dues of $\$ 20$ would have a deficit of $\$ 2$ per Senior member and a deficit of 75 cents per Junior member. Several amendments to increase annual dues were received following this suggestion.

Units and Districts throughout the Department sponsored Constitution \& Bylaws activities which included quizzing members and reinforcing the meaning of the preamble by reviewing the words. Several Units and Districts keep the Constitution \& Bylaws and Standing Rules in the procedure books for Unit and District Presidents, Secretaries, and Constitution \& Bylaws Chairmen. Members continue to use the Constitution \& Bylaws, Standing Rules, and Roberts Rules of Order as their guide when conducting Unit and District meetings which further assists us in our mission of serving veterans, Armed Forces, their families, and the children and youth in our communities.

Now for my first place supplemental awards. Okay. Citation of recognition awarded to Cynthia Edes, Chairman of District 29.
(Applause.)
CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN VINCENT: The citation of recognition awarded to Ms. Anita Biggs, Chairman, Jackie Robinson 252, District 23.
(Applause.)
CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN VINCENT: This is for the First Place Unit Supplemental, Best Unit Supplemental. Madam Department President Joan, thank you for this appointment.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: I would like you to officially put on record that you're postponing the vote for your code change.

CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN VINCENT: Yes, I am temporarily postponing our vote for the upcoming code change.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Thank you.
CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN VINCENT: Yes. I am honored to serve you and the Department of California. This concludes my report.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: You can postpone that until the Finance Committee is through. It's postponed until after the Finance Committee is --

CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN VINCENT: Yes, I am postponing the Department code change until after the Finance Committee report.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Thank you very much, Kim, for your patience with us.

CONSTITUTION \& BYLAWS CHAIRMAN VINCENT: Thank you. And I want to thank you for your service to the State of California.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Next we'll have Tracy Varnell-Fercho on Poppies. After Tracy we'll have -- we'll have our Americanism Chairman Tamara Bell. POPPY CONVENTION REPORT

POPPY CHAIRMAN VARNELL-FERCHO: Good afternoon. Give me one second to get all organized here. Everyone can hear me; right? Great. Thank you.

We'll start with the preconvention committee report. The preconvention meeting on Poppy program met on June 27th, 2019 in the Riesling Room of Ontario Airport Convention Center in Ontario, California. The statistical report of this Chairman appears on page 25 -- on page 25 of the Book of Reports.

Pat Alvarez of District 29, Unit 277 was appointed secretary. Dee Ann Graham from District 15, Unit 26 offered prayer, and Liz Doidge, District 28, Unit 593 was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. I was very humbled to have 27 delegates attend my meeting. Thank you, ladies.

The Poppy code was read there was some minor housekeeping which $I$ will turn in to Department. Other than that, no code changes.
(Applause.)
POPPY CHAIRMAN VARNELL-FERCHO: So that would conclude my report on my preconvention. May I continue with my supplemental and awards?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Yes, you may.
POPPY CHAIRMAN VARNELL-FERCHO: So I will change good morning to afternoon, Madam President Joan. I would like to thank you for giving me the opportunity to be the Poppy Chairman for 2018-2019. This has been an amazing year. It has been -- she's waving her arm. Hold up.

Yes, it has had challenges and at times it's been stressful, but overall it's been very rewarding and very humbling.

This year in the Poppy orders we had 277,536 poppies order.
(Applause.)
POPPY CHAIRMAN VARNELL-FERCHO: Which was increased over last year by 12,447. So just to let you know where I'm going to go next, first I would like to give a huge, huge round of applause for the Poppy production managers: Pat, Lois, and Gerda. And I believe two of them are here.
(Applause.)
POPPY CHAIRMAN VARNELL-FERCHO: There is no way that this program could have been possible without them. I personally want to thank them as well. The countless emails, phone calls. And the last-minute orders that they had to deliver right away, they never said no and no order was too large for them.

The other thing I would like to share with this convention is the way that they all work together to help each other to make sure that all orders got filled. It was amazing teamwork and it was true Auxiliary sisterhood.

I would also like to say a quick thank you to Ruby and to Harriet. They too had a huge impact on the success of this program. Without them, I don't know what I would have done without them. They never said no. Thank you, Ruby and Harriet.
(Applause.)
POPPY CHAIRMAN VARNELL-FERCHO: I would like to take a moment -- this could get a little touchy for me so give me a moment. I would like to share with you a little history of why this program is so special to me. I know we all remember our dear Alazar Carter. And when she was the Department Poppy Chairman, I was the District Poppy Chairman for District 16. It was the first year that I had wrote a district supplemental and that year I won

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first place for Best District Supplemental. And it happened to be on my birthday. Now here we are my birthday weekend again and I'm now the Department Poppy Chairman. I know Alazar is looking down on me and I hope I have made her proud.

This Chairman had the honor of being asked to go to Junior Conference this year in Wonder Valley. We had an amazing time with the Juniors. They all made poppy head wreaths while I educated them on the Poppy program. We had some very creative ideas and I believe they are wearing them tomorrow, I sure hope. Junior Conference has always renewed my faith that our Juniors are truly our future.

The next portion I'm going to talk about is the Poppy poster contest. I'm going to deviate from my speech a little bit because $I$ brought a special one. I had a lady, a young lady in Class V who was a first place winner, a Maria Wilson from District 28, Unit 589. She turned in the poster. She won first place, but not only did she do that, but she also made a copy of the poster so I could bring it to convention just in case that she won first place. The reason I'm bringing this up is I'm going to pass it down the table to share, but in her picture she made a portrait of a gentleman, and it says, "Thank you for seeing me as a veteran and not just a homeless man."

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(Applause.)
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POPPY CHAIRMAN VARNELL-FERCHO: The Poppy poster contest was a big success. I had numerous entries and it as very hard to pick the winners. Thank goodness I didn't have to do that. I took them to my work where I had my residents judge them for me. I know it was the chicken way out, but they really enjoyed looking at the entries.

I would like to give a shout out to Unit 66, District 16. They had a whole classroom participate, and even though we could only pick one, we did send certificates of appreciation to each and every one of them. Way to go, District 16.
(Applause.)

POPPY CHAIRMAN VARNELL-FERCHO: As you could see, I was also very humbled by all of the entries this year for the Poppy display. It was also a big success. If you have not seen them, please take a look at the back of the room. Once again the chicken way out, I picked a team to judge them, which consists of Past Department President Linda Workman, Past Department President Anita Biggs, and Past Department President Ruby Kapsalis. I can't wait for you to hear all the results.

I would like to take a moment just to point out a few highlights of the -- what the Units have done with the poppies this year. Unit 79, District 21 teamed up with
the Cub Scouts Troop 997 and they made handprint eagles and added a poppy to them. What a great way to spread the word of the Poppy program.

The Units used poppies within wreaths, corsages, table decorations, and Christmas tree ornaments. Yes, I did say Christmas tree ornaments. They had Christmas in May.

In closing, I think this Chairman was mostly impressed with just how much the Poppy program brings everyone together, whether you are a Legionnaire, an Auxiliary member, or the Sons of the American Legion or riding as a Legion Rider, just how one little red flower and its meaning can be so true to the core of what we really stand for and what we do. Thank you.
(Applause.)
POPPY CHAIRMAN VARNELL-FERCHO: Madam President, may I continue with my first place awards?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Yes, you may.
POPPY CHAIRMAN VARNELL-FERCHO: All my other awards were presented in preconvention meeting and are posted in the department office. For the President's Pick Display, that goes -- so we had Poppy displays in the back and Joan picked her favorite, and that will go to Unit 585, District 26. And I believe it's Dee Dee Waters.
(Applause.)

POPPY CHAIRMAN VARNELL-FERCHO: Thank you. They accepted that award. Thank you. First Place for Poppy Display went to Unit 79, District 21.
(Applause.)
POPPY CHAIRMAN VARNELL-FERCHO: For all the Poppy posters they also get a $\$ 20$ check for first place. For First Place for Class V was presented to Maria Wilson whose poster $I$ showed you, and it was from District 28, Unit 589.
(Applause.)
POPPY CHAIRMAN VARNELL-FERCHO: Poppy First Place winner for Class III was Alan Garcia Ortiz submitted by District 4.
(Applause.)
POPPY CHAIRMAN VARNELL-FERCHO: Class II is
presented to Diana Al Obaidi, submitted by District 16, Unit 66.
(Applause.)
POPPY CHAIRMAN VARNELL-FERCHO: For the First Place Unit Supplemental went to Renee Raymond, Unit 79, District 21.
(Applause.)
POPPY CHAIRMAN VARNELL-FERCHO: And the First
Place District Supplemental went to Terry Oclaray, District 16.
(Applause.)

POPPY CHAIRMAN VARNELL-FERCHO: Thank you,
ladies. Enjoy the rest of your day.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Thank you. Thank you, Tracy. This is Tracy's -- her birthday is tomorrow so she gets to give her report today so she can celebrate tonight. After Tammy we're going to have Ann Philcox for the National Security report.

AMERICANISM CONVENTION REPORT

AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN BELL: The convention committee on Americanism met on June 27th, 2019 in the Maple Room of the Ontario Airport \& Convention Center Ontario, California. The statistical report of this Chairman appears on page 16 of the Book of Reports. Gayle Stewart was appointed secretary, Gloria Altman offered prayer, and Gabby Wilson was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 21 district delegates were present. There were nine visitors present.

The code was read and after spirited discussion the committee voted to change the following code. Shall I read the first code and then the proposed changes?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Yes.

AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN BELL: "Code 4: The

Department shall sponsor an Americanism Essay Contest. Competition to be in the indicated box below with prizes and citations for first and second place winners in Group I, II, III and V and first, second and third place Education Grant winners in Group IV. The amount of prize money may be adjusted if funds are not available.

Group 1: 4th and 5th Grades. Prizes: First, \$100. Second, \$50. 2007.

Group II: 6th and 7th Grades. Prizes: First, \$100. Second, \$50. 2007.

Group III: 8th and 9th Grades. Prizes: First, \$200. Second, \$100. 2007.

Group IV: 10th, 11th, and 12th Grades. Prizes: First, $\$ 2500$ Education Grant. Second, $\$ 1500$ Educational Grant. Third, \$1,000 Educational Grant. 2007.

Group V: Children with exceptional learning needs below that of average students. Prizes: Ages 11 to 14 years. First, \$200. Second, \$100. Ages 15 to 20 years. First, \$200, second, \$100. 2019.

The rules governing these contests for each group shall be made available to the units by September 1st. The prizes for Group IV shall be financed by voluntary contributions from the units. 2007. Group V shall be classified as students with exceptional learning needs below those of average students. 2016."

The proposed changes would be --
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Tammy, I just want to say one thing. Do them one at a time.

AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: And then you make your motion.

AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN BELL: One for each box; right?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Yes.
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN BELL: Okay. The first proposed code change would be: "The Department shall sponsor an Americanism" --

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Tammy, tell us what code number it is.

AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN BELL: We're on Code 4 still.
"The Department shall sponsor an Americanism Essay Contest. Competition to be in the indicated box below with prizes and citations for first and second place winners in Group I, II, III and V and first, second and third place Education Grant winners in Group IV." Inserting: "The prizes for all groups shall be financed by voluntary contributions from the Units."

I make a motion to accept this code change.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Okay. Americanism

Code 4 currently reads: "The Department shall sponsor an Americanism Essay Contest. Competition to be in the indicated box below with prizes and citations for first and second place winners in Group I, II, III and V and first, second and third place Education Grant winners in Group IV. The amount of prize money may be adjusted if funds are not available."

The proposed change: "The Department shall sponsor an Americanism Essay Contest. Competition to be in the indicated box below with prizes and citations for first and second place winners in Group I, II, III and V and first, second and third place Education Grant winners in Group IV. The prizes for all groups shall be financed by voluntary contributions from the Units."

AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN BELL: It's the other way around.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: That's the way you have it written.

AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN BELL: I know. I'm sorry. I lost the plumbing in my room this morning.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: So you want to back out the amount of prize money?

AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN BELL: No. We want to insert the prizes for all --

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Please, please,

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come over here and show me.
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN BELL: Okay.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: It's -- okay. I'm sorry. One more time. Code 4 Americanism as it now reads: "The Department shall sponsor an Americanism Essay Contest. Competition to be in the indicated box below with prizes and citations for first and second place winners in Group I, II, III and $V$ and first, second and third place Education Grant winners in Group IV. The amount of prize money may be adjusted if funds are not available."

The proposed changed: "The Department shall sponsor an Americanism Essay Contest. Competition to be in the indicated box below with prizes and citations for first and second place winners in Group I, II, III and V and first, second and third place Education Grant winners in Group IV. The prizes for all Groups shall be financed by voluntary contributions from the Units. The amount of prize money may be adjusted if funds are not available." Is there any discussion?

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Madam
Department President, Anita Biggs, 23rd District. I'm confused as to why we would need to add that the prizes for all those will be financed. Well, first of all, financed is a loan so it shouldn't be "financed" as a
word, but we already fund those awards and it's sponsored by the Department. All of our -- anything that we do is funded by the Unit members and the other organizations when donations are made to us. So I don't agree with this addition.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Okay. The Chair recognizes Cathy McCoy.

DISTRICT 21 PRESIDENT McCOY: Cathy McCoy, District 21. The way I'm hearing it is the Department is not going to give out any prizes. It's going to have to come from the unit, period. So I disagree with it.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: No, that's not what it says.

DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: Madam Department President, Ruby Kapsalis, District 28, Unit 591. Department is not making any changes to any of the Americanism essays. We're still going to fund all the essays that are shown in your Americanism code. What she's trying to do is to insert this sentence, "The prizes for all groups shall be financed by voluntary contributions from the units. 2019," and that should be inserted up before the last sentence. But the units are already funding the Americanism essay, so I don't feel that this is necessary.

I move to delete the sentence: "The prizes for
all groups shall be financed by voluntary contributions from the units. 2019."

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Second.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Any discussion?
DISTRICT 24 DELEGATE STORE: Rebecca Store,
District 24. My concern is that it says, if I'm understanding what you're saying, if the funds are not there, they will be adjusted. Am I understanding what you're reading? Yes, no?

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: That's always the case.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: That's always the case in any program.

DISTRICT 24 DELEGATE STORE: But I'm not seeing that in writing. Is it?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: It's in the code.
DISTRICT 24 DELEGATE STORE: I'm seeing that now.
I think it's here. This is unlike position because we're making a statement saying we're going to give these young people this dollar amount, and if that dollar amount is not in the funds, we're adjusting it to a lower amount. So how do we as members adjust the amount to exclude that we're taking the funds away.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: The Chair recognizes Diane DeLashmit.

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PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: The way it reads right now on this particular sentence is the prizes for Group IV shall be financed by voluntary contributions from the units. I think that's a given and all she's trying to say is all groups are financed by voluntary contributions, not just Group IV.

AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN BELL: (Nods head.)
PARLIAMENTARIAN DeLASHMIT: I believe that's what she's doing, even if we take the whole thing out or we change it to all.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: We have a motion on the floor. Chair recognizes Wendy O'Brien.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: I could have sat down. Thank you. Wendy O'Brien, District 6, Past Department President. There's a lot of confusion on how it's being said. It sounds like the department was giving these scholarships away and now it's being taken away and the Units are going to have to fork over the dough.

The Units have always gave the money for this fees, these awards, so what they're trying to do is so that all of the categories either take out the one that it's Unit voluntary money or put it in all of them. Just put it at the bottom that all of them are from Unit members, but it's not going to change. We are still giving that money out for the awards.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT TOZIER: Madam
President, Susie Tozier, District 22. Ladies, you have been giving the money all along and if you don't give the money, we can't give out the prizes. It may start that the first and second place winners get a prize and that's it. So if you don't donate to these funds, we will not be able to recognize those wonderful children or whoever puts in for that. That's basically -- we've done that in the past and I think it's already in the Standing Rules that we cannot exceed what is in the fund. So if you don't donate, you don't have the money.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Thank you. We have a motion on the floor to delete -- go ahead.

DISTRICT 14 DELEGATE WILSON: Candace Wilson, District 14. When she read the whole thing, there's actually a sentence at the bottom that says that Group IV will be -- you know, it's through the voluntary funds. All we were doing is changing that wording and moving it up into the sentence. It's already there, we're just rearranging the orders.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Okay.
DISTRICT 14 DELEGATE WILSON: It's not changing anything that we do.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: That may have been right if it was added after. But it looks like you're
only changing Group IV, that's all.
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, it's being -- the rationale is to change that sentence from Group IV to prizes for all groups and then inserting it up into the language with the rest of the prize distributions. That's all.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Well, maybe instead of moving it, since you already have it, just leave it where it's at. And we do have a motion on the floor. Is there any further discussion to delete the entire code change?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Hearing none, all who is in favor, say aye.

DELEGATES: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Those opposed say no.

DELEGATES: No.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Motion carries.
The change did not carry.
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN BELL: The second proposal under Code 4 is in the prize box. Group V now reads: "Children with exceptional learning needs below that of average students."

The proposed code change would be: "Group V:

Children with exceptional learning needs relative to average students."

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: I think I'm going to have you to -- we have the second change and it's Code 7 and it's talking about essay titles?

All right. We're going to go to the Code 4. Please turn the music off. "Group V: Children with exceptional learning needs below that of average students."

AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: That's how it currently reads?

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Yes, it does.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Is this correct?

AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, ma'am.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: This is from the
Code 4. Group V: "Children with exceptional learning needs below that of average students."

The proposed change: "Children with exceptional
learning needs relative to average students."
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN BELL: That is the proposal, yes.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: That is the proposed change. Any discussion?

COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAIRMAN SCHULTZ: Yes. Glenda

Schultz, District 6. I think we should take out the "learning" word because special needs in schools is not -those classes are not just learning disabilities. They are children with all special needs.
(Applause.)
DISTRICT 28 DELEGATE: This is Kathy [inaudible] from the District 28. I am a special educator. I commend Glenda on that and will say that as well because our students are not just learning disabled, they have other issues. So it kind of -- it puts them out there. Thank you.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: If somebody wants a change, I need a motion.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Glenda, they need a motion.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT TAYLOR: Madam President, Melanie Taylor, Past Department President. I move to amend it to read: "Group V: Children with exceptional needs relative to average students."

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Is there any discussion?

DISTRICT 22 DELEGATE: Good afternoon.
[Inaudible] from District 22, Unit 310 in San Diego. My challenge is for the word "average" being in this because some of those students with special needs are above
average, some of them are below average, so get the "average" part out when it concerns the students.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Thank you.
(Applause.)
PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT TAYLOR: Madam

(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Okay.

Any discussion?
(No response.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Those in favor, say aye.

DELEGATES: Aye.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Opposed say no.
DELEGATES: No.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Passes.

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AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you very much. Ladies, as I stated, we did have a very spirited discussion. And I was searching for the proper political correctness on that.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Tami, you made a motion so we have to vote on that too.

AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN BELL: Okay.
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: As amended.
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN BELL: Shall I reread my motion?

of the Code 4 shall be a housekeeping change and it shall be deleted because it is redundant. And that's on the original paper.

May I now proceed with code change 7? Code change 7. DISTRICT 21 DELEGATE STOWE: Leanne Stowe from District 21, Unit 574. I have a concern with that. As a mom and somebody who volunteers at my kids' school every day, when we go into the schools and give the teachers and administrators something at the end of the school year, to make that where they'll want to be more successful for us with the essay contests, we can't give the teachers another thing at the end of the school year that they have to think about.

So I literally the last three months of school was at school every single day and can tell you that not one of those teachers in the last two months of school is going to be doing something or planning something that they're going to remember for the following school year. They have so many activities that are going on that they're focused on every day that I feel that, you know, schools at least in our area start in August, so that's something we should be planning on doing at the beginning of the school year when school starts and giving them something new to look forward to that year and to plan for that year, not something at the end of the year that's going to be forgotten over the summer.
(Applause.)

AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN BELL: May I say the rationale on this is mainly because the titles are submitted to the website and the code before was that the Chairman was to give it to the website in March where it goes on the Department minutes from the interim board meeting, and we want to change it back to April because somehow or another some people found the titles from the board meeting early and so that's why we're changing it that it's submitted to the website in April.

DISTRICT 21 DELEGATE STOWE: Yeah, I know and I understand, you know, it coming out to the Units and the Districts, but as planning on going to the schools at the end of the school year for something like that doesn't work for the schools and doesn't work for the teachers.

EDUCATION CHAIRMAN DURON: Madam Department President, sorry. Hello. Tamra Duron, District 25. Having worked in a school district directly with teachers and special ed teachers, a lot of teachers that I work with do not -- they do plan for the next year and I believe that in giving this to them in April is just a reminder like it is in the future. And then we will go back to the schools and remind them again when the year starts so it's fresh in their minds at that time.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Thank you. The

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Chair recognizes Ruby Kapsalis, Department Treasurer.
DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: Madam Department President, I think this is kind of burdensome. All we're trying to do is keep the titles unpublished until April. So why don't we just where it read Code 7: "Essay titles shall be submitted by the Department Chairman and approved at the Interim Board Meeting in January for the following fall semester and presentation to the units not earlier than April."
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: And then you can remove "for presentation to the school administrators or curriculum board before the close of the spring semester," and then, "The Chairman" can stay.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Second.
DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: You see what I mean?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: I --
DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: Okay. Where it says -- everything stays the same until "be directed to the units not earlier than April." And then, "for presentation to the school administrators or curriculum board before the close of the spring semester" all can be removed.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Is that what you're

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making a motion for?
DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: You're funny. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Well, I started writing and --

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT TOZIER: Okay. Madam President?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Susie.
DEPARTMENT TREASURER KAPSALIS: I move to accept the recommended change. I move to amend Code 7 to read: "Essay titles shall be submitted by the Department Chairman and approved at the interim board meeting in January for the following fall semester and presentation of the same be directed to the units not earlier than April. DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Motion carried.
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN BELL: Madam President, we have an addition to a code change to a resolution that $I$ would move that we postpone until reviewed by the Finance Committee.

Going forward, ladies. The Americanism titles as voted on at the interim board meeting 2019-2020. Group I, Grades 4 through 5: How can $I$ help a veteran in need? Group II, Grades 6 and 7: What does the National Anthem mean to me? Group III, Grades 8 and 9: Does it matter if I vote? Group IV, Grades 10 to 12: Why our Veterans are America's Heroes. Group V, Special Needs: Why I love my
country.
Madam President, if $I$ can read my floor report. Thank you. The Department of California American Legion Auxiliary is always busy promoting Americanism in our communities. The Get Out the Vote campaign was very important throughout California this year. California had 67 units spend 894 hours to help the community get to the polls. We had Auxiliary members stand outside of grocery stores handing out voter information brochures. Many Auxiliary members worked in their polling precincts while others offered rides to polling booths, helped homebound members fill out mail-in ballots and of course most importantly helped to dog sit while members went to their polling locations.

California had some of their Junior Auxiliary members participate in teaching their high school classmates the importance of how their voice matters and translates into voting in the legislative process.

Twenty-one California units participate in the Pocket Flag Program. One California unit has twin Auxiliary members that teach the community children how to fold the flags at their various patriotic activities. California Auxiliary members have many active deployed -active duty troops they support and the pocket flags are sent in troops support boxes and handed to the soldiers

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with a great big hug when they deploy. 183 hours were volunteered in this program with $\$ 1,352$ spent.

This Chairman actively promoted the National Essay Contest. The theme is so relevant to California which has one of the highest homeless veteran populations in the country. We were proud to submit to our National Chairman our essay contest. As this essay contest is relatively new to California, seven units participated spending 139 hours promoting the activity.

California does have its own essay contest with different titles for each age group. We had 192 units volunteer 521 hours to their community schools, Girls State candidates, Scouts, and home-schooled students to promote essay activity. This Chairman was happy to have four Auxiliary members, one Legionnaire, one former teacher, and two neighbors judge the 27 essays submitted by our units throughout California. We will announce the winners at our Department Convention in June.

California is a very patriotic state. 75 percent of our Auxiliary members fly the flag in front of their homes daily. We have many businesses throughout California that also fly the flag. We had 50 units present new American flags to the neighbors or community businesses. One unit donated two POW/MIA flags to their community organizations. 107 Units promoted flying the

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flag daily, counting 335,513 hours. This Chairman is sure that is a very low figure. California as well as many other states pretty much has outdone with reciting the Pledge of Allegiance in our classrooms.

We have one Auxiliary member who felt so passionate about this tradition she worked with her community school district superintendent and together they brought back the daily Pledge of Allegiance and the Auxiliary unit donated 18 new flags for every classroom.

Another unit -- another unit donated new flags to every neighbor in a senior mobile home park in need of a replacement, together with the flag etiquette brochure and showed proper care of their new flag. Several California Auxiliary members gave out certificates of appreciation to their neighbors and local businesses for flying the flag. California has one community that has a Mules Day Parade with their Memorial Day weekend observations. Twenty mules led in single file, each mule covered in flags to represent their communities' lost soldiers, the hoof beats being the only -- the only sound in somber and stunning treatment to those that never came home.

Another California community handed out over 2,000 flags lining the streets in their Veterans Day parade. As California was ravaged by fire last year, one district donated flags to their first responders.

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California had 54 units promote patriotism in their schools, volunteering 1,659 hours to explain about flag etiquette, how to hold your hand over your heart when reciting the Pledge, and proper disposal of the flag. Units spent $\$ 2,548$ on flag etiquette books in their schools.

Our California Auxiliary is proud to join with their Legion Families and communities to promote and participate in patriotic holidays. On Memorial Day, one California community saw its own brave soldier given a Purple Heart by their local Congressman, while another community lined its main street with 191 flags and 217 flags at the veterans' cemetery.

Another California unit has an old-fashioned picnic celebration for the 4th of July with Auxiliary members even joining together with the children in three-legged races and potato sack runs. I'm sure this Chairman wouldn't make it to the finish line. Several California units have booths at their community fairs, distributing membership applications and brochures on scholarships, Girls State, and poppies.

Several units work with their active duty military installations in their communities to acknowledge their soldiers on Veterans Day. One unit was invited to the USS Hornet where they passed out poppies with our

Department President to the soldiers, veterans, and non-veterans. One district with an especially large military presence tolls a bell for every deceased veteran. Many districts in California with veterans homes invited the veterans to their patriotic celebrations. 135 units in California spent $\$ 12,272$ and volunteered 3290 hours on patriotic celebrations. Again, I'm guessing that's very low.

California proudly joined with their Legion posts to support Legion baseball and the Oratorical Contest. Twenty-five units in California volunteered 232 hours working in snack shacks at baseball games and spent $\$ 632$ for lunches for the speakers and families at the oratorical contests. One district in California had its Legion sponsored baseball team make it to the national playoffs.

California had 12 units distribute 157 Gold and Blue Star Banners to their very deserving mothers. One unit in California was honored to have their Gold Star Banner resident home host their military children's Christmas party.

This chairman is proud to promote patriotism and responsible citizenship throughout the great state of California. Our Department of California Auxiliary has showed what it means to be the best in the west.

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(Applause.)
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN BELL: And now one last thing before $I$ give out my awards. We're going to go with the kids first and it's by school. First place category, \$100 Adam Jacob Brelanta of Hudman Elementary School. It didn't have a unit or district on it either. It only had the school on the back of it. Russell Carrington of Heritage Oaks School, First Place Category II, \$100. And that's Danielle White.

No. Danielle, is that your school? Heritage Oaks School. Heritage Oaks School.
(Applause.)
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN BELL: First Place Category III, Julie Ann Maurice of Round Valley School, \$200.
(Applause.)
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN BELL: First Place Category IV, Vallia L. Colorian of Buchanan High School, \$500.
(Applause.)
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: She's coming, Tami.
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN BELL: Okay. And First
Place Category V, Nick Funk of Castor Intermediate School, $\$ 200$.
(Applause.)
AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN BELL: He was our only
special needs entry. I did have some entries that we sent

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to National for the National essay contest. I did give second and third place awards for those at committee.

And now First Place Class V, Nathan Saltzman of American School. I think that's Jacquelin's. And First Place Class III, McKenna Swifton of Laguna Middle School. Oh, I'm sorry. The other one was Pat Gracie. Nathan Saltzman was Pat Gracie.

And our First Place Unit and our First Place District Supplementals that also went on to have their National award discover sheet and they went on for consideration is First Place Unit Supplemental, Unit 118, Danielle White, Chairman.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Thank you very much. After Ann Philcox we'll have Education.

NATIONAL SECURITY CHAIRMAN PHILCOX: I have no code changes.

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NATIONAL SECURITY CONVENTION REPORT

NATIONAL SECURITY CHAIRMAN PHILCOX: The convention committee on National Security met on June $27 t h, 2019$ in the Syrah Room of the Ontario Airport Hotel and Convention Center in Ontario, California. The meeting convened at 9:00 a.m. Nancy Heinisch, District 20, was the appointed secretary. Loretta Marsh, District 16, offered prayer, and Molly K. Smith was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms in District 28. A total of 18 delegates answered roll call. There were five visitors.

The code was read and approved by the committee with no changes. Discussion regarding the program was reviewed. Awards and certificates for second place unit supplemental and third place supplemental were handed out at the meeting. 100 percent reporting certificates were presented to ten units. The meeting adjourned with prayer at 9:45 a.m.

Madam President, may $I$ continue with my
supplemental? Madam President, it has been my pleasure to serve as your National Security for the year 2018-2019. The National Security Chairmen are known as the Gladiolas. We started off as a bulb and we are now blooming

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magnificently. There are 30 districts and a total of 24 reported with ten attaining 100 percent reporting.

The figures from the Department this year are astounding. Total volunteer hours: 27,851. Total dollars spent: \$107,703.34. Service members served: 14,036. Our members are still participating in CERT classes. One unit purchased a defibrillator for the post. One district has created five play areas at the local veterans hospitals and clinics to occupy the children while they wait for their parents. Units have supported enlisted programs in their communities. There have been blood drives. One district went to see the veterans off on their honor flight.

This Department has collected coupons totaling $\$ 279,697$. Unit 520 from District 20 sent a total of $\$ 150,320$. This was done by one member.

Many districts went to their local military bases and provided picnics, toys, and goodies for the veterans. One district had a suicide prevention program that was attended by 100 veterans. I could go on and on about all the work our Gladiolas have done this year, but I don't think I can write a book.

I was honored to be chosen as your National Security Chairman this year for the Department of California. My gratitude and congratulations go out to

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every District in our department, and $I$ know that our membership will continue to serve our veterans and their families and the community. This ends my reports. May I proceed with my awards?

(Applause.)

NATIONAL SECURITY CHAIRMAN PHILCOX: Madam President, this concludes my report.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Thank you, Ann. Education Chairman, followed by our Children \& Youth, Gloria Williams.

EDUCATION CHAIRMAN DURON: Gloria was trying to cut in front of me.

EDUCATION CONVENTION REPORT

EDUCATION CHAIRMAN DURON: Good afternoon, Madam Department President Joan. The preconvention meeting of the Education committee met in the Walnut Room of the Ontario Airport Hotel on June 27th, 2019 at 11:00 a.m. LuAnn Capazzi from District 27 was appointed secretary. Becky Clark from District 25 was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms, and Gigi Manno from District 22 was appointed as chaplain. The chaplain offered prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Roll call showed 20 members and seven guests present. The code was read and there were no code changes.
(Applause.)
EDUCATION CHAIRMAN DURON: The report of this Chairman is on page 21 of the Book of Reports. Chairman Duron thanked the District Chairmen for their end-of-the-year reports and the work they have done for the Department of California. Second and third place district and unit reports awards, sorry, along with several other awards were provided in the district packets. 100 percent reporting certificates were given out for District 9, 11, 16, 23, 25, and 27. The list of awards will be placed in the department office.

The Department Chairman and National Western

Division Chairman encouraged units to review scholarship applications to make sure all required items are turned in with the application. Several applications were received incomplete and therefore disqualified.

The Department Chairman stated in hindsight awards were given to districts rather than units as units are not listed on the end-of-the-year report. The recommendation will be made for the next chairman to include units on the end-of-the-year report certificates. It was all -- okay. That's it. With all business concluded, the meeting adjourned at 11:35 a.m.

Madam President, may I proceed with my supplemental and first place awards?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: You may.
EDUCATION CHAIRMAN DURON: Freedom blooms when veterans are served. The Goldenrods have toiled the land, fertilized the ground, planted the seeds of freedom, and watered their gardens. They have dug out weeds, rid their gardens of pesky insects, and are now in full bloom displaying the beautiful flowers of their harvest.

The Goldenrods of American Legion Auxiliary Department of California have been shining examples of the Auxiliary mission statement by enhancing the lives of veteran families through Education program. They have reached out to high school counselors, campus veterans
groups at colleges, and contacted veterans educating and informing them of scholarship opportunities available to them.

By reaching out to schools, students and veterans in their cities, units and members have promoted Goal One of the Five-Year Centennial Strategic Plan by investing in opportunities to attract, engage, and retain members. They have endeavored to interest new members by providing school supplies, honoring teachers and giving scholarships to students in their cities. They have successfully communicated the opportunities of a higher education.

Many units supported the Give 10 to Education program providing pens, pencils, crayons, composition notebooks, binders, glue sticks, glue, scissors, erasers, Kleenex, and craft items. Total donation for supplies amounted to $\$ 11,771.19$. District 6 made the largest donation of items totaling 2,350.
(Applause.)
EDUCATION CHAIRMAN DURON: That's right. You deserve a hand. District 6 made the largest donation of items totaling 2,350.
(Applause.)
EDUCATION CHAIRMAN DURON: One unit donated 925 backpacks with school supplies totaling $\$ 5,500$. Fifty backpacks stuffed with school supplies for grades K-8 were
provided to homeless students on skid row in Los Angeles. One unit raised $\$ 1,925$ to send a student to Europe to achieve their dream of becoming a foreign exchange student. Other units participated in local trunk or treat night and held fundraisers to help build a school playground.

Several units promoted Teacher Appreciation Week by providing snacks in break rooms and dinner for local teachers. Teachers were awarded with certificates of appreciation, gift cards, school supplies, and were honored for promoting patriotism in their schools.

National Education Week was celebrated by 11 units with donation of books and reading to students at elementary schools. Members encouraged older students to read to younger students. Units were encouraged to contact schools inquiring of needs they might have and offering to help with those in needs. Members helped teachers grades $\mathrm{K}-6$ grade papers, while another unit has an annual adopted a teacher program honoring two teachers during the week.

Units assisted and supported military children by providing meals at a veterans village, also given were new and gently books, CD players with books on CD. Money was donated for low income family children to participate in field trips. Oh, I'm sorry. Low income military children

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to participate in field trips.
Members attended flag raising ceremonies at their
local schools. Box tops were collected for making donations to band and music programs, giving out goodie bags for Halloween and purchasing books for school libraries.

Sixty-three units donated $\$ 4,252.45$ to the Department's Education Fund. The largest donation was made by District 29 with a total donation of $\$ 1,025$.
(Applause.)
EDUCATION CHAIRMAN DURON: District 25 had all 19
of their units donate to the Department Education Fund. Eighty-three units in 12 districts ordered $\$ 1,222$ in Poppy Seals, enabling the Department to continue offering scholarships. District 25 had the most units, with 17 of their 19 units ordering Poppy Seals.

Thirteen units participated in the Veterans in the Classroom involving 39 veterans at 18 schools for grades $1-12$. Veterans read to students, shared their military experience and answered questions. Three veterans presented a flag to a classroom and one unit had a veteran who was asked to be principal for a day at a grammar school, donating six hours. Veterans visited a first grade classroom teaching the students how to use toothpaste and toothbrushes.

Units throughout California participate in a literacy program by holding workshops, participating in weekly school library reading programs and working in the classrooms helping children read. Students were tutored in phonics and members tutored English to Spanish speaking units.

Pamphlets were handed out and radio announcements were made regarding scholarships and educational programs. Forty units provided scholarships totaling $\$ 45,400$. It is astounding to consider the students you have helped in lessening the burden of achieving their goal of a higher education.

Students in grades $1-7$ organized a Veterans Day program at a local retirement home with a focus on branches of the United States Military. The students sang the theme song of each branch of the military as well as gave a brief history of each of the branches. One Junior member donated 40 hours mentoring a Junior choir and tutors kinder and lst grade students.

Books and encyclopedias were provided to schools as well clothing and uniforms to Para Los Ninos. Units continue their work in anti-bullying programs involving trained professions and giving out anti-bullying comic book to students. Red Ribbon Week is supported with one district sponsoring a writing contest. Students were
asked to write an essay on the effects of drugs. Certificates were given to each contestant.

Each year that $I$ have served the Department of California I have been awestruck by the amazing ways our members reach out to those in needs. From the smallest to the largest units you fundraise and generously provide services and volunteer to meet the needs of our veterans, active duty military, their families, and our communities. We are all truly blessed to be a part of such a remarkable organization.

CHILDREN \& YOUTH CHAIRMAN WILLIAMS: Madam

CHILDREN \& YOUTH CHAIRMAN WILLIAMS: The preconvention committee meeting for Children \& Youth met on June 27th, 2019. The meeting was called to order at 11:00 o'clock in the Ontario Airport Hotel Maple Room. Rosemary Weber from District 16 served as our secretary. Lydia Sanders served as chaplain from District 23, and Robin -- I'm messing up here -- Falkenberg, she served as Sergeant-at-Arms and she's from District 27.

Okay. Prayer was given and pledge was recited. Roll call was taken and we had 19 delegates and we had seven guests. Citations for 100 percent reporting were presented to the following districts: 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 12, 13, 14, 16, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 26, 29, and 30 .

The code was read there was no changes made to the code.

CHILDREN \& YOUTH CHAIRMAN WILLIAMS: I know you're happy about that. We had supplemental awards that were given out. The second place district, Gigi Manno, Chairman. Third place went to District 20, Carol Harville, Chairman. Second place, Unit 310, District 22, Thomsena Martin. Third place, Unit 348, District 20, Linda Hayes, Chairman. And the honorable mention award went to Unit 496, District 19, Chairman, Tamara Bell. The meeting adjourned at about 12 -- no. 12:00 o'clock. I think it was 11:45, but I'll just say 12:00.

Madam President, may I continue with my report?
DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CANNON: Yes, you may.
CHILDREN \& YOUTH CHAIRMAN WILLIAMS: As we celebrate our Centennial, California Districts and Units continue our dedication to ensuring that the Children \& Youth program continues to maintain the integrity of all children, especially those in military families. The Auxiliary's National Children \& Youth Action Plan was shared with all districts in California through a monthly news bulletin.

Several units gave away backpacks and school supplies to hundreds of children. Some units received
donations while others sold dinners, received funding for their Post family, and other charitable entities.

Patriotism was displayed at schools throughout California. Children were lectured about the flag and Pledge of Allegiance. One unit brought an American Legion Rider to place a flag at the school and showed children how to salute the flag when it was placed. Pocket flags, patriotic comic books, constitutional facts and other patriotic items were used to instruct school-age children about our country's traditions.

Districts hosted trunk of treats, gave out Halloween safety brochures along with lots of candy. Three units reported partnering with Million kids to fight child abuse and trafficking. One unit partnered with anti-trafficking task force and ribbon organization and held lectures about child trafficking and how to identify the signs and how to report and rehabilitate the victims.

Another unit explained when our Department Convention ends, they immediately began their new year of planning and executing their Children \& Youth program. They earn money to support their events through bus trips, dinners, breakfasts, and at least one gala event. This year they ordered over 2500 assorted brochures along with educational scholarship applications, American essay applications, and safety and drug brochures. They have
been very successful with gaining the support of their local newspaper to cover all of their ALA events.

Our military families are a major concern to this country and our organization. This year seven Temporary Financial Assistance, TFA, awards totaling $\$ 3350$ were awarded to veterans with children to help defray their living expenses.

There were four Youth Good Deed Awards received. Three of these were from one district. One sister and brother opened a soup kitchen using food that would normally be thrown away from their family restaurant to feed the homeless and seniors on fixed incomes.

Our next youth heros were three young brothers who wanted to help victims of the Paradise fire in Northern California. With the help of their mother, they sold hot chocolate to those who visited Christmas displays in their neighborhood. Money raised was $\$ 4,250$ and given to the Camp Fire Evacuation Relief Fun to assist the victims in Paradise.

Our next young hero was a young girl who had been interviewed by the Girls State. After she witnessed a horse trainer struggling with an unruly horse, this young lady showed her determination and bravery while controlling the situation in a calm and constructive way.

Early this year, a five-year-old junior member
handed out bag lunches to the homeless around the State Capitol. With the help of another Junior, 24 nutritional lunches were packed. The Juniors greeted men and women individually as they gave out the lunches.

We have several units that support children from the California National Guard and Air Aviation Battalion Auxiliary members have adopted troops and their children. They have volunteered and assisted specifically in Family Readiness Group activities, deployment family and holiday parties. Two units have ordered two Josh Dogs and one unit reported a fundraiser to support two girls that will attend Girls State.

As of May 1st, total reported spent on goods for our youth was $\$ 10,946.75$. Total hours reported is 21,122 . Total Children/Youth served 9,492. The total Children \& Youth donations \$10,946.75.

California's hope is that children see their hope is attainable and they will change the world.
